



PERMANENT BASE FOR KILLARNEY WATER **RESCUE UNIT**

At the last Killarney Municipal District meeting, Mayor Of Killarney Cllr Martin Grady raised a notice of motion calling on the Council to write to National Park and Wildlife Services requesting that a suitable location be identified for a base for the Killarney Water Rescue Unit.


This is a matter of real importance for our community. The Killarney Water Rescue Unit provides a vital service to the people of Killarney and the surrounding areas. Our town is surrounded by lakes and rivers, and in recent years we have seen a notable increase in the number of incidents where their assistance has been required.

Despite their crucial role, the unit currently has no permanent base within Killarney town. Their boats and equipment are stored outside the area, meaning valuable time can be lost in emergencies when every minute counts. Having their resources housed closer to the high-risk areas would significantly improve response times and operational efficiency.

Killarney Municipal District Cllrs were in agreement with the Motion it was seconded by Cllr Brendan Cronin to engage with Killarney National Park in the search for a suitable site. We believe it is essential that the unit be provided with a secure and practical location where they can safely store their boats and equipment, ideally close to the lakes and rivers, where there's risk.

The Killarney Water Rescue Unit have dedicated active members, all of whom give their time voluntarily to help others. They provide an invaluable service, often under challenging and dangerous conditions, to ensure the safety of residents and visitors alike.

Their dedication and professionalism deserve the full support of the local authority and community. Providing a proper base for the unit is not just a matter of convenience, it's a matter of public safety.



DEER, OH DEAR.

I may need to eat out more in the High Street. Which is fast emerging as the hub of fine dining. Two chefs - from Harrow and Treyvaud's, both neighbours of Bricín - Harrow is next door it said - have been in contact wishing to say they too serve venison.

But the bottom line remains venison is not as popular or as standard as it might be, and is still rather niche given the number of deer we have in Kerry and elsewhere. And need to get rid of. Documents from the national deer management strategy group released under the Freedom of Information Act to the Irish Deer Commission set out the difficulty in the following words:

"Irish people don't eat venison – seen as expensive, elite meat, difficult to cook and very strong tasting."

A marketing campaign for the domestic market was necessary, the strategy group feel, and

Bord Bia must also research how it could be promoted as a premium product in export markets.

Jerome Cahill of Kerry Wild Game, a venison supplier business in Killorglin since 2020 says the wild venison market is ready to be developed and supported more.

The media are slow to be interested in venison and an event last year did not attract the press attention it deserved, Jerome felt.

His is a fully licensed wild game operation inspected by the Department of Agriculture. Often our idea of venison comes from being given whatever the hunter does not want and the impression is venison is tough, and strong, Jerome said.

His venison - sika from Kerry , fallow and reds from elsewhere in Munster- is hung and aged and that is the secret.

The saddle and loin of venison are the most popular cuts but other cuts are used in stews. Sika is definitely the most popular, he said.



And it is sika who are the main source of annoyance as well as meat in Kerry.

Meanwhile the Irish Deer Commission are warning venison must not go to the dogs. They are concerned that venison is high value meat and will complement our existing meat industry, and any attempt to downgrade venison as a secondary meat for the dog food industry will have negative consequences for deer management.

JIM FINUCANE - FEAR UASAL AND A FRIEND TO KILLARNEY.

Jim Finucane, a major figure in Fine Gael in Kerry was as the Tanaiste described him probably the best Oireachtas member Fine Gael never had. The former Tralee Fine Gael councillor and chair of the ETB who died unexpectedly last week was an enormous figure in Tralee, and in education circles across the county and might have represented Kerry at the height of Government.

A native of Tarbert he strongly supported plans for Shannon LNG managing to rise above the at times very negative attacks by opponents of the project.

Jim was also that rare thing in Tralee: a friend to Killarney.

We don't often find friends in Tralee for Killarney at council or at any level whether official or representative. But when the Killarney hospitality college gets going, it will be thanks to Jim who powered ahead with the idea and to Simon Harris who as higher education minister listened to Jim and gave the preliminary go ahead.

(This column played a small role in it too - something $\,$ acknowledged by Mr Harris and the late Jim).

The Tanaiste, mayor of Kerry and Fine Gael councillors including the chairman of Kerry County Council were prominent at his funeral mass on Saturday, occupying the front seat on the right hand side of the aisle opposite the family in Tralee's stately St John's Church.

Another leading member of Fine Gael, Killarney MEP Sean Kelly was also present, albeit seated at a distance on the left aisle away from the main Fine Gael front bench as it were.

I met minister Michael Healy Rae there too as well as leading figures from the Kerry media, education, local history, councillors and officials past and present from Tralee and Kerry County Council .

It took over an hour for the mourners to express their sympathy such was the genuine outpouring to Jim's wife Sheila, daughters and son and to his wife's family the Sheehys.

The Ukrainian ambassador who was in Tralee just weeks ago to appoint Jim the first honorary Ukrainian counsel for the south of Ireland, a historic occasion, was present as were many of the Ukrainian Kerry community.

Then on Monday at the meeting of Tralee MD, Councillor Anne O'Sullivan, (FF) assistant to Norma Foley and councillor in Tralee put it well: "Fear Uasal" best described Jim, Anne said.



The new health forum for the south west seems to be efficient and Kerry is at last getting a look in.

We recall that as health

We recall that as health minister Taoiseach Micheál Martin got rid of the old health boards and replaced them with the dinosaur Dreadnoughtus Titanosaurus. Otherwise known as the HSE. We are now back to Cork and Kerry once more.

One of the most riveting pieces of information was elicited by Deirdre Ferris. Deirdre (SF) has been pursuing empty and vacant buildings across the council and the HSE. In June she found out there were 14 vacant buildings owned by the HSE in Kerry alone.

At the same time as it spends close to Euro 2.5 million a year on leasing 21 properties.

Responding to the information provided to her, Deirdre asked if HSE buildings could be "repurposed" and if for instance HSE's own services could be "decentralised" into the large and historic Dingle Hospital. Tralee town centre buildings in Pembroke Street and Denny Street should also be

"repurposed" and used to retain footfall in the town, she said.

Maintaining the empty buildings cost the HSE over Euro 186,423 in the past 12 months alone, Deirdre was told.

Meanwhile, Maire Moloney and Jackie Healy-Rae both had questions down about the Killarney Nursing Unit.

A number of final technical matters - commercially sensitive and so not divulged - is holding the whole thing up, the councilors were told.

In other words, we learn nothing much because if it is not data protection it is commercial sensitivity when it comes to State bodies not giving out information.

The new unit will be handed over by the end of the year but that doesn't mean it will take in patients. There will be more red tape by bodies other than the HSE.

Just as the structure of the health boards had to be rowed back decades to the old Cork and Kerry, is it not time to dispense with the HIQAs etc and roll it all into the one Department of Health?





Attendees praised the evening as informative, insightful and entertaining in equal measure, with John's unique ability to connect real-life stories to broader reflections on personal well-being and social responsibility.

"We were delighted to host John Lonergan, once again for what was a truly memorable evening. His message about empathy, resilience and connection resonates deeply with our work at Torc CFRC and within our Social Prescribing Service, where we support individuals to enhance their well-being and strengthen their sense of community."

CIVIL WAR IN KERRY AND ITS LEGACIES EXPLORED IN NEW EDITED COLLECTION

The Civil War in County Kerry and its many impacts and legacies feature in a new book which is published this week by Four Courts Press and edited by Bridget McAuliffe, Mary McAuliffe and Owen O'Shea.

'The Civil War in Kerry and Beyond: Histories, Memories and Legacies' is a compilation of essays from a range of academics, historians and researcher who spoke at the highly acclaimed Kerry Civil War Conference which was held in Tralee in February 2023. It will be launched at the Kerry County Museum later this month.

The conference was devised and organised by Bridget McAuliffe, Mary McAuliffe and Owen O'Shea who had previously worked together on an edited collection on Kerry and the 1916 Rising. Over three days, a range of experts presented the events of 1922-1923 to a wide audience by analysing, debating and embracing the complexities, contradictions and nuances of this extremely turbulent, divisive and traumatic period.

"The conference was part of the Decade of Centenaries Programme and was very well received. After the conference, many of those who attended, including the late Dr Martin Mansergh, suggested that we publish the papers presented so that the research could be shared with a wide audience," said Bridget McAuliffe, one of the editors.

"We are grateful to have received support from the Department of Culture, Communications, and Sport as well as Kerry County Council and Kerry Library to enable the book to be



published. We hope that it will serve not only as a reminder of the excellent contributions made to the

conference but also as a definitive collection of research on this important period," she said. The chapters in the book deal with the events of the war itself – in Kerry and elsewhere – as well as themes and topics of gender, trauma and loss, politics, social and economic impacts, and the many legacies of the Civil War a century

later. It also features a chapter based on the innovative creative media exhibition on the conflict which was presented at the conference by students of Kerry College and MTU Kerry Campus.

The new book will be launched at Kerry County Museum on Friday, 21 November at 6.00pm. Guests speakers will be Minister Norma Foley and the Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr Michael Foley. The book is available now in bookshops and from the Kerry Civil War Conference website.



Kerry Football Club are delighted to confirm the signing of defender Jonas Häkkinen, who has put pen to paper on a multi-year contract with the Kingdom.






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DOING YOUR BEST IS GOOD **ENOUGH**



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WHEN WAS YOUR LAST SIGHT TEST?

As well as an eye health check, Risk of falls a sight test may detect signs of underlying general health conditions, such as diabetes, high cholesterol, and high blood pressure. It is especially important in early identification of leading causes of preventable blindness such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy. Everyone should have a sight test every two years or more often if recommended.

Glaucoma

Glaucoma affects 1-2% of the population, and is a leading cause of sight loss. In the majority of cases, glaucoma is asymptomatic, so regular sight tests are important for detecting glaucoma. The majority of patients with glaucoma are diagnosed following referral from an optometrist. Without regular sight tests, the prevalence of late presentation, sight threatening glaucoma, would rise. Diabetic retinopathy

People with diabetes are at a high risk of developing retinopathy and possible blindness if untreated. Attending regular sight tests allows signs of developing retinopathy to be identified

Uncorrected vision in older people also increases the risk of falls. Falls are the leading cause of disability and death from injury among people over 75.

Risks for children

Undetected conditions such as amblyopia (lazy eye) have been shown to affect reading ability and therefore may impact on future educational attainment.

Hyperopia, or long sightedness, has also been linked to poorer literacy in young children. Spotting vision problems through regular sight tests is critical to a child's future health and education.

Driving risks

Undiagnosed vision problems can increase the risk of accidents, particularly those that affect distance and side vision.

More people than ever can now avail of a free sight test using their PRSI or medical card.

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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL – Killarney Municipal District Meeting

Cllr. John O'Donoghue Highlights Importance of Killarney's Laneways and Urgent Road Repairs

At the recent meeting of the Kerry County Council – Killarney Municipal District, Cllr. John O'Donoghue raised several key issues of importance to the local community.

Restoration of Killarney's Historic Laneways

Cllr. O'Donoghue called on the Council to formulate and implement a multi-annual restoration project for Killarney's laneways, citing their deep historical and cultural significance.

"The laneways of Killarney are of enormous historical and cultural significance as they represent the 'Old Killarney', the heart of where the town's early residents lived and worked. They are an integral part of our heritage and tell the story of how Killarney grew into the

thriving town it is today," said Cllr. O'Donoghue. He noted that while the laneways remain functional and safe, many have become tired and in need of renewal. He proposed that a structured restoration programme could revitalize these areas, enhance their tourism potential, and contribute to Killarney's Tidy Towns efforts.

"With the right resources, our excellent outdoor staff could completely rejuvenate these laneways. Many already host cafés and restaurants and could become an attraction in their own right, similar to the charming side streets and laneways found in great cities abroad."

Urgent Works on Muckross Road

Cllr. O'Donoghue also addressed the urgent need for repairs along Muckross Road, extending as far as Flesk Bridge. He described the road's condition as "deplorable in parts," particularly near Woodlawn Cross, and called for emergency funding and engagement with the NTA/TII to support the works.

"This is one of the main arteries into our town and a heavily used tourist route. For too long, its poor condition has been both an eyesore and a hazard, especially during the winter months."

Cllr. O'Donoghue welcomed the commencement of works along the stretch, praising the decision to carry out the repairs at night to minimize traffic disruption.

"I commend the Council for finally tackling this long-overdue issue. I trust that proper drainage works are also being included, as water lodging has been a major problem for both motorists and pedestrians in recent years."

He emphasised the importance of maintaining the presentation and safety of Killarney's key routes, which form the first impression for visitors returning to the town after exploring the wider region.

Minister Healy-Rae criticises Social Democrats for failing to back Irish farmers in nitrates debate

Minister of State for Forestry, Horticulture and Farm Safety Michael Healy-Rae TD has criticised the Social Democrats and Deputy Jennifer Whitmore for their comments following last week's meeting with European Commissioner for the Environment Jessika Roswall.

Minister Healy-Rae said he was glad to be part of the Irish delegation that met with Commissioner Roswall on Friday last, where he made it clear that the Nitrates Derogation is absolutely vital for the survival of Irish family farms and the rural economy.

"The Social Democrats' position is completely out of touch with the realities on the ground," Minister Healy-Rae said. "To suggest that we can simply do away with the Nitrates Derogation shows a total lack of understanding of how Irish agriculture works and how many livelihoods depend on it. Will the Social Democrats face down the over 2,000 farmers who turned up to hear Minister Martin Heydon address them in Cork last Monday? Those farmers spoke with one clear

voice, the derogation must be retained."

Minister Healy-Rae added that farmers have made enormous environmental progress over the past 20 years through improved nutrient management, water protection measures, and investment in technology, but they cannot continue to be unfairly blamed for every environmental challenge.

"Our farmers are custodians of the countryside. They've invested heavily in better slurry storage, buffer zones, and nutrient plans, and they're continuously improving. What they need is support and partnership, not condemnation," he said

"The Social Democrats do not represent the farmers of this country, and their position does nothing to protect either the environment or rural Ireland. If they had their way, they would destroy family farming and the communities that depend on it. I will continue to stand with the farmers who feed our nation, protect our landscape, and sustain our rural way of life."

Cahill Welcomes Funding Boost for Kerry under 2025 LGBTIQ+ Community Services Fund

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has warmly welcomed the announcement by his party colleague Minister for Children, Disability and Equality, Norma Foley T.D., of €1.7 million in national funding under the 2025 LGBTIQ+ Community Services Fund, including significant allocations for Kerry.

"These projects together underline the Government's commitment to inclusion, equality, and supporting wellbeing at every level," Cahill continued. "I'm particularly proud that Kerry continues to feature strongly in national initiatives that protect rights and strengthen community life." Minister Norma Foley announced the €1.7 million fund as part of the Government's National LGBTIQ+ Inclusion Strategy II 2024–2028, which aims to promote inclusion, protect rights, and enhance quality of life and wellbeing for LGBTIQ+ persons across Ireland.

"This funding ensures that local and national organisations can continue their vital work in promoting equality and providing frontline supports. It's about building communities that are welcoming and inclusive for everyone," Deputy Cahill concluded.

Minister Michael Healy-Rae Opens Irish Self-Catering Conference and Calls for Urgent Action on Short-Term Letting Rules

Minister of State for Forestry, Horticulture and Farm Safety, Michael Healy-Rae TD, opened the Irish Self-Catering Federation (ISCF) Conference this week in Spanish Point, Co. Clare, using the opportunity to strongly highlight his ongoing concerns about Government proposals on short-term letting (STL) and their potential impact on rural Ireland.

Speaking to operators from across the country, Minister Healy-Rae described the self-catering sector as "a proud tradition, a thriving family business network, and a vital part of the rural economy." He highlighted that according to Fáilte Ireland, over 40% of Ireland's tourism beds are provided by the self-catering sector, most of which are located in rural towns and

"I was proud to open this important conference today and to stand with the people who have kept rural tourism alive through decades of change," he said. "But I am deeply concerned them to continue operating without requiring

that current Government proposals on shortterm letting could undo decades of good work and destroy viable family-run businesses in towns and villages across the country."

The Minister reiterated his strong opposition to the proposal that would require all STL operators to apply for full planning permission and would effectively block new permissions in towns with populations over 10,000.

"This one-size-fits-all approach makes no sense. Places like Killarney, Dungarvan, Ballina and Tramore will be hit hard and the reality is that these properties will not return to the long-term rental market. They were never part of it to begin with," he said.

Minister Healy-Rae called for:

- The 10,000 population threshold to be raised to 15,000, to protect tourism-dependent towns.
- A grandfather clause for operators who have been in business for 7 years or more, to allow

new planning permission.

· A greater role for the new Fáilte Ireland Register for Short-Term Tourism Letting (STTL), with clear and fair guidelines instead of blanket restrictions.

"The people I met today didn't create the housing crisis and they won't solve it by shutting their doors," Minister Healy-Rae said. "We need regulation that works with rural Ireland, not against it."

He confirmed that he has met Government Leadership on this matter over the last number of months and with Minister for Housing James Browne last week to raise these concerns directly, and reiterated that that Government cannot punish rural businesses.

"We need to see sense. We need to protect jobs, preserve bed nights, and support rural tourism, not dismantle it."

Cahill Welcomes Historic Space Mission by Dr Norah Patten and Calls for Government Support

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has warmly welcomed the remarkable achievement of Dr Norah Patten, who is set to become the first Irish person in space, following her selection by the International Institute for Astronautical Sciences to fly aboard Virgin Galactic's next-generation "Delta" spacecraft in 2026/2027.

Deputy Cahill, together with Kerry County Councillor Tommy Cahill, had the pleasure of meeting Dr Patten in Killarney last Thursday.

"Both Tommy and I were absolutely delighted to meet Dr Norah Patten in Killarney. She is an inspiring and truly amazing young woman, an Aeronautical Engineer and STEM advocate whose work and determination have brought her to the very frontier of human achievement," said Deputy Cahill.

"Norah's story is one of passion, education and perseverance. She is not only making history for Ireland but also inspiring young people, especially girls, across the country to dream big and pursue careers in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. She is a tremendous ambassador for our nation."

Dr Patten, who hails from Ballina, County Mayo, has been preparing for her mission for several years, undergoing astronaut training including high-G flights, microgravity research, and hypoxia exercises. Her upcoming sub-orbital flight, known as Mission Delta, will conduct vital research in microgravity, marking a proud milestone in Ireland's growing role in space and science innovation.

To ensure the Government supports this landmark achievement, Deputy Cahill has submitted a Parliamentary Question to the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, James Lawless TD, asking that every possible assistance be provided to Dr Patten in her mission.

"Dr Patten will undoubtedly represent Ireland with pride and distinction," Deputy Cahill added. "This is a unique opportunity for Ireland to stand behind one of our own as she literally reaches for the stars."




KILLARNEY GYMNASTS ON THE **NATIONAL STAGE**





RSA Welcomes Learner Permit Changes –

A Step Towards Safer, Fairer Driving

The Road Safety Authority (RSA) has welcomed new regulations signed by the Minister for Transport to address repeated learner-permit renewals, calling the move a positive and necessary step to support safe progression to a full driving licence.

The changes, which take effect from 1 November 2026, will ensure that learner permits continue to serve their intended purpose, to help people learn to drive safely, build real experience behind the wheel, and develop the skills needed to pass the driving test.

Under the new rules, the following will apply: Learner drivers will need to have taken a driving test within the previous two years to renew a third or fourth learner permit.

A fourth permit will be valid for one year only. After seven years or four permits, a learner wishing to continue must restart the learningto-drive process, including the theory test, lessons, and driving test.

The new measures apply to cars (B), tractors/work vehicles (W), motorcycles (A, A1, A2) and mopeds (AM).

Currently, over 64,000 learner drivers in Ireland have held three or more learner permits meaning they have been learning to drive for six years or more. This change is intended to encourage progress through the licensing system and reduce long-term reliance on

learner permits.

Among these figures:

Over 22,000 people are on their 10th to 20th learner permit.

More than 1,800 are on their 20th to 30th permit.

14 individuals currently hold their 30th or more learner permit.

Geographic distribution: Two-thirds of these drivers reside outside of Dublin, with a notable concentration in rural counties.

Age profile: The average age of drivers in this cohort is 37 years. A significant majority (68%) are aged in their 20s and 30s, indicating that younger adults form the core of this group. Nearly one-in-five drivers are aged 50 years or older, reflecting a presence of long-term learner permit holders across age groups.








JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY takes a look at all things sport...

'Unbeatable – **Handball Supremo** Fr. Tom Jones'

Fr. Tom Looney's last book was about one of the most famous Kerry sportsmen of a generation. 'King of a Kingdom of Kings' was about Dick Fitzgerald of Dr. Crokes, a man who not only typified the Kerry of his time and shaped it for the next generation. Most famously, of course, in football - if Kerry had a Mount Rushmore of the name, Dick Fitzgerald's visage would most certainly be graven on it.

His latest book is about a Kerry sportsman of the generation before Fitzgerald, up among the greatest Kerry sportsmen ever, and in many ways an even more fascinating character. To say that he lived an adventurous life is an understatement. Calling him a prodigy is also an understatement. Remember when David Clifford scored 4-4 in an All Ireland Minor Final? To match Fr. Tom Jones achievements at the same age, David would have had to have scored it in the Senior Final. Now do you understand what I mean when I say that he was a prodigy? He was born in Castle Street, but that was a temporary residence; the family moved to Rock St. soon after and the Rockies (now Austin Stacks) still consider him as one of their own. Born in 1868, he was one of thirteen children (four siblings after his father remarried after the death of his first wife). It may be a coincidence (I very much doubt it) that he was always musical, eventually mastering thirteen musical instruments as well. He once famously regaled a visiting scout troop in later life on retreat by blowing tunes on a leaf. One of the small but fascinating details in the book, for me, is that Fr. Tom notes that where written references of the time speak of 'bagpipes', they are actually talking about uilleann pipes.

This book obviously centres around the life of the protagonist, but because of the meticulous research and detail, it's equally as fascinating to me because this is a real snapshot of a Kerry and an Ireland that I wasn't familiar with. We think of Irish history prior to the 20th century in terms of the big events rather than ordinary realities for most people. The Land League, Conradh na Gaelge, the GAA, recovering from the Great Famine, Parnell....these were huge topics (and Fr. Tom played more than his part in terms of nationalism (he was a target of the Black and Tans at one period because he ministered to republicans), language (he was a noted scholar, author, and translator into Irish) and sport (more anon). We, or rather I, can be guilty of assuming a certain insularity about Ireland of that time. It's true that many people never strayed too far from their native hearth, but there were plenty of Irishmen who travelled far and wide, and priests were very much among them.

Another personal confession. I've never really thought of priests as storybook heroes. And that's already an obvious omission on my part. Think about it. Not only were priests the foremost community leaders of a people determined not to be suppressed by English colonialism (Fr. Murphy in 1798 being the most obvious but far from the only example) but Fr. Tom was raised by the first generation of catholics who could even stand for election. Priests were at the very heart of the hardest issues of the day and champions of the poor when poverty was much more common. And quite frankly, you could think many things about Fr. Tom Jones from start to finish, but he could never have been described as a shrinking violet. He'd fit just fine into any Kipling poem or Robert Louis Stevenson or Mark Twain novel. The fictional Indiana Jones never met, but if he had, he would have doffed that famous fedora in salute.

I also never knew until I read this about the preeminence of handball in Irish sporting culture. I knew it must have been a big sport - the presence of so many handball alleys is a reminder. I had no idea just how big, or why. You must understand that very few sports were organised as we would understand it. There wasn't a Handball Association that arranged local, provincial, and national competitions. In athletics, for example, you turned up, entered, and would win a prize if you prevailed. The same in handball - except that in handball, as players made a name for themselves, there was a lot of money to be made with side betting. Consequently the prizes put up often amounted to serious money, and I do mean

serious amounts. The tradition developed, similar to boxing in particular, of public challenges being issued and these attracted huge attention.

Young Tom Jones was a noted exponent of the art by his mid-teens. His father Michael was good at the game, and in fact had built a handball wall at the back of his house in Rock St. where the children could practise. Jerry Casey, himself one of the best, coached the young Tom and before long realised his talent. Tom was nineteen when Casey issued a public challenge to Joe O'Leary of Kanturk. That was already setting the sights high indeed, but it was no problem for the young Jones. He was to go almost eight years unbeaten in the game, 1887 to 1895. Stories of his triumphs abound. O'Shea of Carrick-On-Suir.....Tom didn't concede a single rubber to him. Imagine if Tipperary met Kilkenny in a hurling match, and Kilkenny didn't score a single point? His comeback against John Delaney, himself a world title contender.... Fr. Tom includes a full account of the contest from the time, and with good reason. He won the Doubles with his neighbour Jim Fitzgerald; to this day the Tralee Handball Club bears their names jointly.

There was only one regret. Tom Jones, widely acknowledged as the best around, never got to meet the Irish Champion of the time. Not for want of trying - John Lawlor, who would lose a challenge to the American Phil Casey for the World Championship title (Fr. Tom beat Casey a year later), would never meet with Fr. Tom in a match. Challenges were issued, but Lawlor's initial response was it was not his intention to take any notice of "fireside challenges such as Jones';if he did, he would be getting them from all over the country, and if he accepted one, he would be expected to accept them all".

To which my own response would have been, g'wan away with that rubbish, lad, you have issued and accepted plenty of 'fireside challenges' and you know who Tom Jones is full well. Your problem is that you also know that you can't beat him.

I don't know; I'm reading between the lines. Lawlor did once accept a challenge from Jones, only to cry off at the last minute with a sore thumb.

You need to understand that this was closer to professional than amateur sport. Young Tom was earning good money, very good money. He was invited onto the American circuit whi;e still a student in St. Brendans, Killarney, in 1890. Phil Casey was promoting a tour and would have given Tom a share of the profits if he would participate. Tom was tempted, but refused. He had earned enough to pay his fees to Maynooth and would not delay his vocation for even a single day for the sake of handball. Tom had played almost every sport with

distinction in the Sem - boxer, gymnastics, athletics, weight-throwing....everything and anything except golf. That one sport was played too slowly for him.

He entered Maynooth as a 21 year old (not unusual at the time) and he appears to have thrived. He certainly won awards and distinctions in several academic disciplines. Maynooth, though it did not compete against other colleges, had a huge internal sporting structure. Handball was big, and the central alley of three became known as the 'Kerry Alley' because of Jones' prowess. It seems almost certain that he would have played cricket (it could make a case itself for being the national sport before the GAA took firm hold) and rugby. He was ordained in 1896 and his first parish aws Newtownards, his second was Glenarm, and then he was 'loaned' to Yorkshire. A year later he was on his way to Queensland.

He embraced the challenge. After travelling for a month, he arrived in the small town of Winton. On his way to the Bishops' house, he heard some cheering and made enquiries. It was the annual sports day....you can imagine the rest. Fr. Tom Jones entered as a competitor and when he actually arrived at the Bishop's residence a few hours later, he was laden with cups and medals.

This was the Australia of the outback. A colossal parish where journeys of over a hundred miles were common, sometimes much longer. Fr. Tom travelled alone on horseback, more like Ned Kelly than Mundy Prendeville. A man once grabbed his bridle and told him that he was taking his horse. "You can have it if you are a better man than me," said the priest. It turned out that the lad wasn't – Fr. Tom was talking about pugilism rather than virtue.

In March 1905 ill-health caused him to be sent back to Ireland, but first he took a four month tour of the US. Among many others he caught up with his old doubles partner and neighbour James Fitzgerald, who had beaten Lawlor but always stated that he could not have beaten Fr, Tom. After a pleasant four months, Fr. Tom returned to Kerry as curate in Ballyferriter. While there he ministered to all and sundry, including the Blasket Islands, and one of the saddest days there was the drowning of a local young man and a noted gaelgóir and suffragette, Eveleen Constance Nicolls, who was certainly a friend of Pádraig Pearse and was rumoured (without foundation) to be more. Even in those tougher times, it was an awful tragedy. In 1916 he was to be the central figure in another near-tragedy, but one with a much happier ending thanks to Fr. Tom. German u-boats were attacking shipping at this time. At one point a Norwegian crew had to abandon ship, with eight survivors ending up at the foot of the sheer cliff at Ard na Caithe. Their situation looked hopeless.... Fr. Tom ordered that he be lowered on a rope down that impassable cliff face and, with great difficulty in the wind and rain, managed to bring them up one by one. Even in a heroic life, this was spectacular, and was recognised as such by the King of Norway, who presented the brave priest with an inscribed silver cup. Again, the whole incident is documented faithfully and with meticulous research in Fr. Looney's book.

It was soon after that incident that he was sent

to Killorglin. The War of Independence was raging. Fr. Tom was not an active participant, but his sympathies were well-known and he had to take precautions not to fall into the hands of the Black and Tans, whose willingness to kill men of the cloth (or anybody else) was well established.

His next parish was Dingle, Lispole, and Ventry. Subsequently Bishop Michael O'Brien (wo had replaced Charles O'Sullivan) sent him to Cahirsiveen, straight across the bay, and in 1932 he returned to Glenbeigh.

His was a most extraordinary life, and he was peerless in many ways. This is no hagiography, though, Fr. Tom was certainly not without flaw. He was a strong personality and, like many priests of the time, could be very autocratic. He was also parsimonious, seemingly notoriously so. While there his curate was Fr. Mícheál Galvin - later President of Austin Stacks GAA Club, much-loved parish priest in Fossa, and for whom East Kerry's Fr. Galvin Cup is named. There are links that bind all our stories together down through the years. The two men had great respect for each other, but I cannot help noting that the Bishop, knowing of Fr. Tom's frugality, decided that Fr. Micheál could have his dinner each evening in the Towers Hotel at Fr. Tom's expense. He knew his man well. In fact. Fr. Tom would leave enormous sums for the time in his will to religious orders, and I do mean enormous. There was some controversy and a court case regarding the Revenue innocuous oversight, really.

Naturally, while there, Fr. Tom instigated the first handball alley in Glenbeigh in 1946, with Fr. Galvin establishing a new one in 1979. It is no surprise to find that many of the best modern exponents of the game, the likes of the Quirkes, especially John Joe, Dominick Lynch, and Jack O'Shea.

Fr. Looney's book is a superb documentary of an extraordinary man, and fascinating in that regard alone. But, for me at least, it is a glimpse into a Kerry that I never knew about. Remember, Fr. Tom lived through two great world wars and two more local ones , the switch from horse to cars, electrification, the State's foundation.....this book does not centre on any of those. It centres mostly on Kerry and a fascinating Kerryman, and is all the better for it.

All Stars

For once, and thankfully, I have to say that there was no real controversy about his year's All Star selections. Yes, there is too strong an emphasis on the latter stages, leading to the scales being weighted in favour of the stronger counties rather than the best individuals. Kind of hard to avoid, really.

Davod Clifford being Footballer of the Year for a third time can't come as any surprise. Frankly, given his dominance this year, it would have cost the All Stars all credibility had it been otherwise. Joe O'Connor had a phenomenal year himself – I think it could genuinely be compared to Seán Cavanagh's 2008 tour de force – but David was untouchable. Michael Murphy – and again, I say this with great and genuine respect – should not have received

the nomination ahead of Michael Lanagan. Yes, Langan did not have a great final, but you can't say that Murphy did either, and Lanagn had been imperious up to that stage.

Finbarr Roarty was also favourite to get Young Player of the Year, and rightly so.

Among the team selection, I would say that everybody who is there deserves to be there, while a few other players can feel unlucky, but there is nothing to inspire any real bursts of indignation.

As regards the hurling, I'm not going to claim to have seen enough games to be able to judge fairly.

Championship Semi-Finals Preview

The Dr. Paddy O'Donoghue Memorial Cup is the most coveted prize in East Kerry football. In recent years current holders Rathmore and Dr. Crokes have dominated the competition, and look on course to contest it once again – but both face big semi-final snares in Kenmare Shamrocks and Spa.

Dr. Crokes v Spa, Saturday, 2.15pm, Fitzgerald Stadium

Dr. Crokes avenged last year's defeat to Kilcummin in their guarter-final but had guite a battle to do so. A sparkling Tony Brosnan helped them into an eight point lead in the first half, only for a pair of Brendan Kealy two point frees to trim the gap to two points at the break. Once again Dr. Crokes forged ahead in the third quarter but Kilcummin still hung in there and it was only after Billy Courtney's fourth quarter goal that they pulled clear. It's no secret that Crokes are hurting after their defeat at the hands of Mid Kerry in their quest to retain the Bishop Moynihan, and they will want to retain a cup they have lifted 31 times previously. Kenmare Shamrocks, of course, are relatively new to the competition and have never won it, but are quite capable of doing so, having reached the County quarter-final themselves before losing to Austin Stacks. They had a real ding-dong battle with Glenflesk, coughing up a huge deficit but then settling with the wind and Paul O'Connor in peak form, they pulled it back to prevail by a single point in a thrilling finish. Stephen O'Brien is likely to return for the semi-final, but Seán O'Shea is a major doubt and his absence could just tip the scales in favour of Dr. Crokes.

Rathmore v Kenmare Shamrocks, Sunday, 2-15pm

Rathmore have been something of a form team all year. Paul Murphy and the Ryan brothers have been to the fore, but the emergence of the likes of Ciarán Collins and Andrew Moynihan among others makes them a strong overall team and took them to a County semifinal against Austin Stacks. They dominated neighbours Gneeveguilla for long periods to lead by 1-12 to 0-4 at the break and had enough in the tank to see off a determined fightback by Gneeveguilla, but it was a close enough thing. Mind you, Spa got to a County guarter-final themselves and had an absolute rollercoaster of an East Kerry quarter-final themselves. In fact, it took a second goal from David Spillane in injury-time to finally see off a determined Listry. Spa played Rathmore in the Senior Club Championship, with Rathmore prevailing by 2-15 to 2-10, and Rathmore will be hoping for a similar result on this occasion.

O'Sullivan Cup Final

Tralee CBS v St. Brendans, Fitzgerald Stadium, Tuesday 18th November, 1.30pm Football at all grades is throwing up new contenders in most competitions but in the O'Sullivan Cup, it's the traditional big two, the Green and the Sem, who will face off for this year's title.

Tralee are likely to go in as slight favourites. They won their quarter-final convincingly over S. Michaels Listowel and then saw off holders Mercy Mounthawk with no less than nine points to spare. Ronan Carroll has been the standout forward of the competition but Tralee also have the likes of Eoin Flaherty, Fionnán Ryan, the Hurley brothers, and Máirtín McKivergen in top form, while Nick Lacey and Dann Kingston oth impressed off the bench in that semi-final. With Gearóid White among others waiting to return from injury, the Green have a lot of cards to play.

St. Brendans looked home and hosed when they led by 2-7 to 0-0 at half-time in their quarter-final against PS Inbhearr Scéine, but that was with gale force wind and rain and it was a very different story in the second half, with the Sem actually fortunate enough to prevail in a very tight finish. They were more impressive in their semi-final against IS Killorglin, with their Kerry minor contingent of Liam O'Brien, Ben Kelliher, and Joey McCarthy amassing a 2-10 combined total. With Kacper Robak in goal and the likes of Cian Mulcahy and Jack Rudden in defence and Mark O'Carroll in midfield, St. Brendans won't have any fear heading into this one.

The Sem were in real danger of failing to get out of the group stages after a chastening opening round loss to Clonakilty CC. For that matter, they aren't necessarily out of the woods yet and will still need a win against Skibbereen in the final round to be certain, but this win over Coláiste Choilm Ballincollig gives them breathing space. It was hard-earned and in fact the Sem could be thankful in the end that a careless breach and then some lose discipline cost Ballincollig the chance to equalise.

The sem were still missing some top players (to be fair, Ballincollig were missing their key forward Danny Miskella), but manager Kieran Herlihy will be much happier with the display. With Joey McCarthy giving a man of the match display as the attacking fulcrum and Liam O'Brien and Ben Kelliher able to turn it into profit on the scoreboard, the Sem showed much more cohesion and concentration. In fact, it was a good game of football by both teams especially when the torrential weather is taken into account – ducks would have started carrying umbrellas.

Ballincollig made the early running, with Kevin O'Leary absolutely outstanding around the middle. Luke O'Mahony opened the scoring the full forward drifted out subsequently as a third midfielder, and it certainly did pose problems for the Sem. Cian Ahern added a free before Liam O'Brien pulled one back for the Sem.

The Sem needed a spark and a good turnover

by Bryan Walsh found Joey McCarthy, who sent a brilliantly measured pass into Liam O'Brien for a cracking goal that nudged the Sem in front by 1-1 to 0-2. Even though Ballincollig got it back straight away with a goal of their own from Cian Ahern, the Sem seemed to grow in confidence, not least with Mark O'Carroll and Mark Kennelly starting to edge the midfield battle. Joey McCarthy had a two pointer tipped over the crossbar by Nathan Tait (reducing it to one point as the old rule is still in effect) and Taitmade a superb sae to deny Ben Kelliher a goal. Ben Kelliher did curl over from outside the arc just before the half-time whistle to give the Sem a commanding 1-7 to 1-2 lead at the break. However, it should be noted that they would be facing the elements in the second half.

Joey McCarthy teed up Liam O'Bien for the opening point of the second half. Joey Miskella kicked a beautiful two pointer to trim the gap. Cian Ahern added a free and Seán Murphy nipped in for a goal after Kacper Robak saved Cathal Murphy's initial effort. That left just a point in it, 1-8 to 2-4. Ballincollig were on top now, with impressive sub Rian Coakley firing over an equaliser. Entering the fourth quarter, a Liam O'Brien free nudged the Sem back in front and he added a point from play.

A well-worked move was finished by Joey Miskella to leave the minimum between them. However, a breach of the three up rule was to prove costly as it gave Ben Kelliher a handy free to stretch the gap.

To say that the finish was frantic was an understatement. Ballincollig had plenty of play but a bit of indiscipline (remember, these are young lads in a high pressure environment) was to cost them. They actually had a free brought forward for not releasing the ball, only for the referee to sport another breach, this time of three at the back. It was a big reversal, giving Ben Kellier another free and putting two points between them, while Ballincollig also lost Cian O'Connor, their linchpin in defence, to a second yellow card. It was a big call by referee Cormac Dineen, but in all honesty he got it spot on. There was still time for Colm Herlihy to score a great point to leave the Sem sweating (only in the proverbial sense - it really was miserable weather) but the Sem (I think their greater experience in terms of last year's Corn uí Mhuirí and Frewen Cup campaigns stood to them; certainly, their discipline and focus were very impressive when it was most needed) held out for a narrow and crucial win. Unfortunately, a frustrated Ballincollig picked up another three red cards after the final whistle as they surrounded the referee, who quite rightly was having none of it. That could cost them in their final game.

The group remains finely poised, to say the least – Clonakilty have two wins, St. Brendans and Ballincollig have one each, and Skibbereen have none. The Sem will play Skibbereen in the last round, a Skibbereen side who gave Clonakilty a very tough game, and scoring difference may well come into play to decide the pair that qualifies for the quarter-finals. Still not the most desired scenario – but things were looking much better for the Sem at the final whistle than at the initial throw-in!

Advancement in the cup for Utility Trust St Pauls Lakers with a repeat of their league win over Tipp Talons from two weeks ago. And while the scoreboard shows they won comfortably in the end it belies the fact that the home side were in firm control of the game for long stretches. In direct contrast to the league game it was the Talons who made the better start and led by as much as 16,54-38 in the third quarter. But the Lakers came with a wet sail and surged past them with a power packed display in the last fourteen minutes of play. They did so without the injured Jack O Sullivan, a blow considering his recent form.

The key minutes in the final quarter were undoubtedly supplied by Pablo Murcia and Mark Sheehan. Murcia perfected two steals on his Talons counterpart to run in for two easy layups, thereby facilitating the easiest of four point swings. Sheehan hit two massive threes, one to give them his side the lead with three minutes the go and he followed that up with a similar effort to give the Lakers a 79-72 advantage with 1.18 on the clock. The Lakers were also successful in shutting down the impressive Emmanuel Kabengele. He had plundered 19 points in the first half but was held to 4 in the second half, aided no doubt by foul trouble. It now means the Lakers have a December 6th quarter final date with Templeogue in Dublin and that should keep spirits high in training this month.

The Talons started the game with great intensity, no doubt fuelled by their disappointment at the recent league showing. Kabengele stepped out to open the scoring with Pablo Murcias free throws being the Lakers opening salvo. Matthew McHale was on form for the Talons alongside Rian Broderick and when Kabengele again hit from outside the lead was now 10-2. The aforementioned McHale then struck from distance with Stephen Kelly netting for the visitors trying to find their feet. McHale and Kabengele continued to combine but the Lakers were starting to get their mojo with Marko

Bencic making a welcome return. Despite a Kelly three and good work from Captain Eoin Carroll, a Sam Grant basket still had the Lakers trailing by 30-19 with two minutes to go in the quarter. Carroll found himself outside the arc to punish the Talons and with Grant following that up the board made better reading at quarters end.

Grant and Kelly carried that vibe into the second quarter but the Talons resumed their grip on proceedings with Niall Walsh, Kabengele and Aleksander Kovacevic driving it onto 41-29. Carroll and Rui Sariava tried to keep the Lakers in tow but Kabengele was rampant and when Michael Pierre netted the gap was now 16, 48-32. The only pebble in the Talons shoe at this point was they were committing fouls that led to points with Kelly, Saiava and Carroll all going 100% from the charity stripe. That facilitated a Lakers comeback of sorts, 49-38 in arrears at the interval.

There was little sign of a Talons back down in the opening stages of the third quarter with McHale widening the gap to 16, 54-38. But Brunell got into their stride with Joseph and Lauryn Homan finding the mark. Tara Cousins was getting her eye in from outside and alongside Denise Dunlea they opened up a 17-11 lead. Thornton was on the bench at this stage so it was left to Cluse to keep up the fight as Brunell went inside often and early. They hit her sides last nine points of the quarter but Cousins, Burnham and Lovisa Hevinder ploughed on to ensure St Pauls had a 23-18 advantage.

Scanlon opened the second quarter as she did the first with a basket but you could see the Brunell screw was starting to tighten. Thornton was back in the box seat with Joseph starting to get some joy. Katie Walshes three pushed them closer and midway through the period it was tied up at 29 each, Burnham and Cousins keeping the home fires burning. But St Pauls were starting to struggle offensively, reliant on free throws and Cousins' accuracy, all the while Cluse punched away, leaving the teams tied at 36 each at half time.

The third quarter saw Cousins and Burnham give their side an early lead , Cousins getting joy from a fine Leah McMahon assist. The game was now at its most intense with neither side buckling but Thornton was starting to control matters. Scanlon was fighting hard inside and there was still parity at 45 each with the quarter

closing. But Brunell took a major step forward in the following minutes with Homan and the Walshes, Ava and Katie giving them their biggest lead of the night, 52-45. But a big three from the inform Denise Dunlea gave St Pauls hope, cutting the gap to four as the teams straightened for home.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

th the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry

County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mts when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.







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HEDGING

Hedges can make a much more natural background to a garden than a wall or a fence. They can provide shelter and are cheaper and require a small amount of maintenance.

Because a hedge allows the wind to filter through it reduces its velocity.


Tall or low growing, clipped or informal, there is a hedging plant for every purpose. One thing to remember about a hedge is that it is intended to be a permanent feature in the garden so therefore should be chosen with care and planted in well prepared soil. To choose the right hedge for your garden, here are a few pointers to think about:

- 1. The type of soil you have.
- 2. How exposed the garden is i.e. what direction is it facing.
- 3. 2. The eventual height and width the hedge will be
- 4. 4. Does it need to be evergreen.

When you have chosen the type of hedge that you want, it's time to prepare the soil. Start preparing the soil by digging thoroughly and forking in some well rotted farmyard manure. Hedges can be planted all year around but the ideal time is between November and March as all hedging plants will be dormant at this time.

What that means is when you go to buy your hedging plants, they are lifted straight from the ground and are called bare-rooted hedging. This enables you to replant straight back into the ground when you get them home. Just make sure that when planting that the roots are spread out well as this will encourage them to root quickly when the growing season starts. If you have missed the bare rooted season at the end of March, you can plant container grown hedging all year aroud

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
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A TRAGIC FALL FROM GRACE

We are a sporting nation, playing many games, With a high degree of skill, and international fame. We've won Olympic gold at boxing, with heroic women, And Gold Cups over fences, for years at Cheltenham. Each county has its heroes, with big ball and sliothar, Who now are immortalised, in Dublin, Cork and Kerry. These heroes are role models, revered in verse and song, For they were pure icons, who could do nothing wrong. One county's hero, can be another county's villain, Like poacher Seamus Darby, who denied the Kingdom, Five All-Irelands in a row, just when history beckoned, For all sport is a romance, with passion and depression. DJ Carey was a star, who shone out like a beacon, In the stripes of Kilkenny, and was an inspiration, But he was flawed in business, incurring many debts, And conned his Cat devotees, with fables of ill-health. He made crazy decisions, which left his name in shame, And tarnished the legend, of his glory and his fame.



"But Ruth replied... 'don't ask me to leave you and turn back. Wherever you go, I will go; wherever you live, I will live. Your people will be my people, and your God will be my God. Wherever you die, I will die, and there I will be buried. May the Lord punish me severely if I allow anything but death to separate us!" (Ruth 1:16-17).

Welcome back dear student, last week our Scripture from Psalms forty rejoiced on how God rescues us from the mire of despair and sets us on a new path. Ruth was the daughter-in-law of Naomi. She was from a different nation and culture but chose to stay with her mother-in-law after both their husbands had died, for Naomi was all alone. The verse above is from a passage often read at weddings - signifying the devotion of the newlyweds to each other no matter what the future brings. In Naomi's time, the outlook for a widow was not favourable. Once her money was gone her future was starvation, unless someone took her in. So, Ruth staying with Naomi rather than going home to find a new husband, was a sacrificial act. Now the reality set in when they came to Naomi's home place: Bethlehem, which incidentally translates 'House of Bread'. They returned as beggars, causing Naomi (which means 'sweetness' in Hebrew) to want to change her name to 'Mara' - meaning 'bitter'. She had lost her husband, the breadwinner, and her two sons - her legacy, so she was desolate. To survive Ruth went to work in the fields gathering leftovers from those who were bringing in the barley harvest. The practice in Israel was to let the poor glean behind the reapers to feed themselves. God's plan of Redemption for Naomi and Ruth now kicked into action. "The steps of the godly are ordered by the Lord. He takes delight in their journey" (Psalms 37:23). This is how the Lord works - when all looks hopeless and lost 'light shines in the

The field that Ruth was working in belonged to Boaz, who unbeknownst to her, was a close relative to Naomi. He saw Ruth and inquired who she was. Already a good report had gone out about her in the city — that she was the widowed daughter-in-law, who chose to look after Naomi. Friend, oftentimes we do things, or go through things that no one notices — but God knows everything! He knows the truth. The Lord Jesus sees you at your weakest — He knows what it feels like (Hebrews 4:15). He understands the sacrifices, the pain, and the heartache, and He is your Redeemer! (Job 19:25) This means He will bring healing for all that has been lost. God is the One Who restores the years the locusts have stolen (Joel 2:25). He rebukes the devourer for our sake (Malachi 3:11). Things may not turn out like you had planned or imagined, but if you trust Him the Lord
