INNOVATIVE THINKING AND SHEER WILLPOWER WILL BRING KILLARNEY BACK

The infrastructure, its natural advantages and the fact that Killarney is a world class tourism destination will all help in the recovery of the town following the COVID-19 pandemic. In the first month of his tenure at the helm of Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce, newly elected President Niall Kelleher has said that if any town in the country has the capability and resolve to recover from the economic and social devastation caused by the coronavirus it is Killarney but it will take time and initiative.

Cllr Niall Kelleher, whose two-year term at the helm of the organisation commences this month, said there are very significant challenges ahead for businesses but they must rise to meet them with innovative thinking and sheer willpower.

"I am very much aware that many businesses in all sectors, from retail to hospitality, have been devastated by the events that have occurred since last March and that, in many cases, the rainy day fund is now gone.

"There is huge resilience out there, however, and if any town is equipped to bounce back, it is Killarney because of its infrastructure and its natural advantages as a world class tourism destination.

"We saw that during the few months businesses were allowed to reopen in the summer and Killarney became the number one destination of choice for so many people," Cllr Kelleher said. "As we prepare for a post Covid world, big opportunities to rebuild will be provided through our national park with a focus on the great outdoors to promote fitness, health and adventure," he added.

Cllr Kelleher, who is a member of Kerry County Council for the Killarney Municipal District, said while great benefits for businesses exist online, people must remember that money spent locally circulates in the local economy and locals must support locals.

"The big challenge for Killarney over the next

two years will be to get back on the path we were on before the virus struck and to work to further enhance the wonderful destination we already have," he said.

He said the progress to develop Killarney as a gateway to the Wild Atlantic Way would bring significant advantages and chamber will play its part, working with all the other agencies, to ensure it is implemented

It was hugely positive news, he said, that Killarney was chosen as one of two pilot areas to test the gateway concept over a three-year period as the Wild Atlantic Way has been a phenomenal success.

Another of his priorities during his term as president will be to continue to work with the relevant authorities to tackle traffic congestion in Killarney which was a major issue prior to Covid and will be again when the town gets back to normal.

"Everybody must work towards the ultimate goal of getting the outer relief road from Farranfore to Killarney underway as it is absolutely vital that the project is brought to shovel ready stage as soon as possible," he said. Cllr Kelleher said he is looking forward to the new cycleway from Ross Road to Muckross Road being completed as it is a hugely exciting initiative and there are several other infrastructural projects in the pipeline which the government has pledged to support.

On a personal level, Cllr Kelleher acknowledges that he is facing a very busy two-year period combining his chamber duties with his role as a councillor but, he insists, he is more than up for the challenges it will present.

"I have been a member of the chamber for many years and vice president for the last two and I have seen that the organisation shares many common goals with the council.

"Sometimes, of course, there will be different views but that can only lead to healthy debate as we are all working with one goal in mind and that's to create a better Killarney and to ensure it continues to prosper as a wonderful town to

live in and to do business in," he stated.

Cllr Kelleher thanked outgoing chamber president, Paul Sherry, for his enormous work and the huge commitment he demonstrated during his two-year tenure.

"It sounds a bit of a cliché but I have a very hard act to follow. Paul had a vast amount of knowledge, particularly from a retail perspective, and he did an excellent job," he said.

Maternity Restrictions in place in the UHK and CUH

Due to the surge in COVID-19 infections and the move to Level 5 restrictions, from Monday, 11th January, partners will not be able to attend the routine 20-22 week anatomy scan at the four Maternity Hospitals/units in the South/South West Hospital Group (Cork University Maternity Hospital, and maternity units in University Hospital Waterford, University Hospital Kerry and South Tipperary General Hospital). The South/ South West Hospital Group are very mindful of the distress these restrictions may cause and in line with national guidance, we will review these measures on a weekly basis. The South/South West Hospital Group fully understands how challenging visiting restrictions at our four Maternity Hospitals have been. However, in light of the move to Level 5 restrictions and the increased rate of transmission within the community there is a need to minimise footfall to our maternity units, to limit the risk of the virus spreading. The safety of women, their babies and maternity



staff is central to the provision of our maternity services which must be continuously available when required by our patients.

However in CUMH and the maternity units of UHW, UHK and STGH the birthing partner will still be able to attend:

- · as soon as the mother is in established Labour;
- · for the birth itself;
- · for delivery by caesarean section;
- · can stay for some time in the immediate post

birth period either in the Labour Ward or the Theatre Recovery except in STGH the partner can return to the ward with the patient for one hour as there is no Theatre Recovery room available at the hospital;

•When a baby is in the Neonatal Unit or Neonatal Intensive Care Unit one parent (at a time) can visit their baby – of note the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit visiting times are unrestricted. Also as a Directorate:

• We are sensitive to specific situations regarding pregnancy loss, stillbirth and unexpected complications and we have adapted our visiting restrictions in these situations;

• All patients who receive a pregnancy loss diagnosis are to be offered the opportunity for her partner to attend at that time. Her partner can attend all subsequent visits.





WORLD WIDE WALKS FOR THE GET OUTSIDE CHALLENGE

D n 30th December, Tralee woman Catherine White caught sight of NewsTalkFM "get outside" challenge set by breakfast presenter Ciara Kelly to walk for thirty minutes a day for one hundred days starting 1st January. Given the lockdown and looking for an achievable challenge, Catherine decided to ask her friends on FB if any were interested in walking with her virtually. She was hoping for one or two to join simply to have a routine and a bit of accountability to keep going, little did she anticipate how it would grow in less than a week.

Catherine is now at day 15 of the challenge and has been joined by almost 50 friends locally, nationally and internationally walking together virtually in Tralee, Ballyheigue, Kilcummin, Castlegregory, Killarney, Killorglin, Cork, Kanturk, Ballyhooly, Longford, Kildare, Meath, Louth, Leicester, Whetstone, Loughborough, Nottingham, Derbyshire, Anglesey Wales, Edinburgh Scotland, Alicante Spain, New Hampshire, Long Beach, Indiana and Arizona in America and Melbourne Australia.

On the first day, Catherine created posters for each member in the group to create a sense of doing it together, at that time 15, but given the quick increase, decided to create a video clip of the selfies to be taken and everyone's own individual locations. On Day 6, the video clip has grown in length to just under four minutes. The daily video collection includes family



members, partners, dogs, kids, grandkids, exotic animals with each member showing where they are walking to create a sense of kinship and everyone gets the opportunity to see where the others live and their weather conditions.

One of the first members to join the challenge Joe Burkett from Ballyheigue thought it was a great way to start the New Year. 'I thought it was the most fantastic way to kick start the New Year. Getting out and getting active in a safe way while connecting with people felt so right. It had been amazing getting to know everyone in the group and seeing all the amazing locations around the world where people are doing their walks.'

Catherine herself said she simply did not



anticipate the contagious energy, excitement and enthusiasm each person has shown when joining the challenge. Each day is a cause for smiling just that little bit more watching friends getting to know other friends across continents.

What makes this group unique is that it is a mixture of ages, ability, gender, cultures and languages including English, Irish Sign Language, British Sign Language, American Sign Language, Australian Sign Language. Members of the group are hearing, Deaf and CODA, all are welcome, the only requirement is to go outside every day for half and hour and take pics of yourself and location.

Back for Business...

APPLICATIONS NOW OPEN for returned or returning emigrants

A Former participant in the Back to Business programme is urging people to get involved. Kayleigh Breen, who runs The Wedding Wizard with her husband Mike experienced first hand how beneficial the programme is.

This is the fourth year of the highly-successful Back for Business developmental programme, which is funded by the Department of Foreign Affairs.



Past participants on the first three years of the programme have recorded increased sales, created new jobs, and won export contracts. The combined turnover of the 2020 group tripled during the programme – despite the Covid pandemic.

The Back for Business initiative was established to foster and support entrepreneurial activity among returned emigrants or those returning to live in Ireland. It addresses the challenges that all early-stage entrepreneurs encounter – as well as the additional barriers faced by those who have been living outside the country for some time.

Back for Business is aimed at those who have lived abroad for at least a year and have returned in the last three years or those planning to return to live in Ireland in the near future.

Organising their wedding from Dubai inspired Kayleigh and Mike Breen to create The Wedding Wizard – a wedding planning platform that eases the stress of planning a wedding. Kayleigh took part in the second cycle of Back for Business and then participated in the further development phase. Having experienced at first hand the benefits of participation in Back for Business, Kayleigh encourages others to apply for the programme.

"Back for Business is a really beneficial programme for any entrepreneur returning home with a business idea. It is not just a programme where you will theoretically plan what you could do as many others are, this a programme that gives you real practical insights

that you put in place in your business plan that will have an impact", Kayleigh said. "Coming back home from Dubai and starting a business from scratch wouldn't have been possible without the family and business support," says Kayleigh.

"Back for Business has been a phenomenal help, especially when we first arrived back to Ireland as new entrepreneurs, with a battered network and no one to share the challenges with. Back for Business created a very positive environment for everyone. I really appreciate the support I got from my Lead Entrepreneur and the other entrepreneurs in the group. It really helped me to stay motivated and to continue on the journey.

"I'm still in contact with members from my original group. I also participated in the Further Development phase in 2020. We worked together remotely during lockdown and having that support from each other really kept us going through the dark days."

The Wedding Wizard released a basic level wedding planning platform in May 2020, after a year of work behind the scenes. Despite the Covid-19 lockdown and the reduced number of weddings this year, they have had lots of couples and suppliers sign up to use the platform.

"With the reduced numbers of weddings this year, we have decided to focus on building our users and developing new features," says Kayleigh. "We are in the process of getting feedback from couples and suppliers, so that we improve our services to give people what they want."

As well as developing new features, they are partnering with The Kerry Wedding Show in a virtual format in January 2021. Kayleigh and Mike are also hoping to expand their business in 2021 and grow their team.

The call is currently open for applications for the 2021 programme, which will run from February to July 2021. There is no charge for those selected to participate.

The closing date for applications is January 25, 2020. There are places this year for up to 40 entrepreneurs to participate for the first time in Back for Business, with an additional ten places being made available on a further development phase for those who completed a cycle previously. €2.6BN HIT TO IRISH HOTEL REVENUES IN 2020

Bernadette Randles, Chair of the IHF Kerry branch has issued an urgent call to the Government seeking an Emergency Tourism Budget.

Hotels and guesthouses in Kerry and across the country are facing massive challenges as the latest survey from the Irish Hotels Federation (IHF) reveals a $\in 2.6$ billion drop in revenues during 2020 compared to the previous year, representing an unprecedented financial hit to the sector. Down 60% year on year, the collapse in revenues due to Covid restrictions has affected all areas of hotel operations – from accommodation, food and beverage to corporate events and social gatherings.

Results show a dramatic decline in room occupancy levels for the sector, plummeting to a record low of just 30% nationally last year compared to 73% in 2019 as a result of severe restrictions and an obliteration of overseas tourism into the country. With significant Government restrictions set to remain in place for the first of half of 2021 and beyond, the sector continues to face enormous financial challenges and uncertainty. Urgent additional Government supports are required if tourism businesses are to survive.

The IHF is calling on the Government to put in place an Emergency Tourism Budget with additional targeted measures to ensure the viability of tourism businesses and the hundreds of thousands of livelihoods they support throughout the country.

"We have experienced nothing short of a catastrophic financial shock, with risks of a prolonged and devastating impact on our industry and the ability of tourism businesses to survive and recover. Government supports so far have been piecemeal and fallen far short of what is required given the extended restrictions and economic damage facing our sector", Ms Bernadette Randles, Chair of the IHF Kerry branch stated:

Emergency Tourism Budget

"The Government must come forward with a more coherent, sector-specific programme of supports and measures to secure the long-term financial sustainability of hotels and guesthouses. We are calling for decisive Government action in the form of an Emergency Tourism Budget to include substantial increases in payments to tourism

businesses under the Covid Restrictions Supports Scheme (CRSS), enhanced employment subsidies, extension of the local authority rates waiver until the end this year and a further six-month moratorium on bank term loans to support cashflow.

"We also calling for a clear commitment from the Government to retain the 9% tourism VAT rate to assist recovery and secure a viable and sustainable future for our industry. Tourism businesses such as hotels are now contracting for international business up to two years out in an exceptionally competitive market with one hand tied behind their back. As yet, they have no pricing certainty in relation retention of this critically important VAT measure and this must urgently be addressed."

"It is critical that we get certainty around supports for business recovery. We cannot afford any delay if businesses are to have a fighting chance of getting back on their feet this year. A severely devastated hotels sector

would be a major loss to Ireland's economy and society for many years to come. This can and must be avoided."

Five Urgent Measures Required from Government Covid Restrictions Supports Scheme

(CRSS): Targeting businesses with 75% drop in revenue, doubling of payment amounts irrespective of level of Covid restrictions as well as removal of the current €5,000 weekly cap

Employment Wage Subsidy Scheme (EWSS): Extension of the scheme up until the end of 2021 to enable tourism businesses retain staff. **Local Authority Rates:** Extension of waiver for tourism businesses until end of 2021. After that, payment of local authority rates should be based on reduced levels of activity due to the crisis and until the industry has recovered. **Liquidity Measures** – Further six-month moratorium on bank term loans to support cash flow. Additional mortgage deferment for employees impacted by the crisis.

9% VAT – Clear commitment re retain 9% tourism VAT at least up until 2025 to assist recovery and provide certainty for tourism businesses.

"As Ireland's largest indigenous employer, tourism has been hardest hit by Covid restrictions. Prior to Covid, tourism businesses supported 270,000 livelihoods - one in ten of all Irish jobs. In Kerry, where hotels are a key component, it supported 15,700 jobs and generated €592m in local revenues. An estimated 160,000 tourism jobs have now been lost across the country since March last year, and the Government's priority must be to ensure everything possible is done to recover these jobs.

"These jobs matter – not only to the people working within the industry but also to the wider economy, especially the many parts of regional Ireland where tourism is the only show in town. A failure to support the industry now will have ramifications for the future of Ireland's tourism offering and for the economy that could take decades to recover fully," adds Ms Randles.




Sister Act... National Parks to pair in new agreement

VACCINE ROLLOUT

uch patience and resilience may be Mich putterice and controlled the imminent rollout of the Covid-19 vaccine according to a Kerry County Councillor.

"This vaccine rollout is probably going to be the most important public event that any Irish person will experience in their lives as it offers hope of a return to normality for our population" stated Councillor Michael Cahill. "A sensitive operation by those entrusted with this ultra important operation is essential to its success. But we all have our part to play in the process" said the Fianna Fáil Councillor.

"We must be patient with the frontline staff who are taking on this enormous task and cooperate with any and all instructions to ensure that this vaccination reaches everybody in a timely manner" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Some of course, may have queries about their priority position for vaccination, and I am aware that there is a process in place and I also understand that there is an appeal system available to them, if required " said the Kenmare Municipal District member.

"There are presently large backlogs at Covid Testing Centres, with GPs advising Close Contacts to attend only if suffering symptoms. I have previously called for increased numbers of staff and Test Centres in this regard and I wish to again reiterate that call today and I now urge that sufficient resources be deployed for the vaccination process" said Councillor Cahill. "We have one opportunity to get this right and we'd better not mess it up" he added.

Six Kerry projects awarded almost €700,000 from the Government's Town and Village Renewal Scheme

Norma Foley TD this week welcomed the announcement of €687,505 in funding for six Kerry projects under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme The funding will assist towns and villages to implement measures that can help them to respond to the challenges associated with COVID-19. Funding has been awarded to projects in the towns of Spa, Milltown, Castleisland, Ballybunion, Rathmore and Portmagee.

Minister Foley said: "I welcome the news that funding of €687,505 has been awarded to six initiatives in Kerry. This government funding will help towns and villages in Kerry thrive as communities respond to the challenges presented by Covid-19."

The Kerry communities to benefit are as follows:

- In Spa Village, over €96,000 will go towards a new footpath to link the village safely to the Tralee Bay Coastal Amenity Trail.

- In Milltown, over €94,000 will be spent to upgrade the historic square and for a scoping study on the development of a Business Innovation Hub.

In Castleisland, over €96,000 will go towards implementing Phase 1 of an Urban Connectivity project and a study on the future use for derelict and vacant properties in the town.

In Ballybunion, €100,000 will go towards improved signage and parking capacity for visitors.

In Rathmore, €100,000 will go towards undergrounding ESB wires in advance of a safety scheme due to commence early this year.

In Portmagee, €200,000 will go towards public realm improvements and undergrounding of utility wires, including the provision of EV charging, WiFi Access points and information points.



Are some Member States more equal than others in EU vaccines programme? - MEP Kelleher

EU Commission has more questions to answer on EU Vaccine Scheme -

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that the European Union Commission has a number of serious questions to answer in relation to its Vaccine Purchase Programme.

Kelleher was commenting, as it was alleged that some Member States were obtaining higher levels of certain vaccines relative to the agreed distribution agreement and that decisions regarding which manufacturers to enter into advance purchase agreements with was being influenced by certain larger Member States.

"In an article in the German news magazine, Der Spiegel it is alleged that Germany will receive a disproportionate amount of the recently approved Moderna vaccine, and that France and Germany will also receive a larger proportion of the Pfizer BioNTech vaccine.

"What is also deeply concerning is the allegation that larger Member States have attempted to influence the overall buying strategy with France putting pressure on the Commission to buy the French-produced Sanofi vaccine, with the German government equally favouring the Germanproduced Pfizer BioNTech vaccine.

"Of major concern to me is the allegation that Germany has struck a deal, separate to the Commission agreement, to purchase its own supply of the Pfizer BioNTech vaccine. This simply flies in the face of the concept of European solidarity in my opinion.

"All of these allegations are guite serious, and require urgent answers. There may be legitimate reasons for these things happening but at this stage, I am worried that Vaccine Nationalism is damaging the overall EU response.

"If Member States other than France or Germany attempted to do some of the things alleged in this article, there would be rightly serious repercussions. I really hope it is not the case that, in the eyes of Germany, France, and the Commission that, "All Member States are equal, but some more equal than others," concluded Kelleher.

Full transparency needed on Covid 19 vaccine contracts from Commission - MEP Kelleher

ommission and Member States must publish weekly all details of deliveries and vaccines administered to public.

"Contracts signed by the European Commission with pharma companies developing covid 19 vaccines must be made public, and not hidden away from scrutiny," said Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher.

Kelleher was commenting after a meeting of the Renew Europe Group where the EU's Covid 19 Vaccine strategy was discussed with the participation of the Chair of the Parliament's Public Health Committee, Pascal Canfin MEP.

"In a somewhat underwhelming act of transparency, the Commission made available redacted version of an advanced purchase agreement between them and the manufacturers of CureVac.

"While a step in the right direction, CureVac hasn't even been approved yet. Crucially, the contracts signed with Pfizer BioNTech and Moderna have not been made available yet. "These contracts must be put into the public domain immediately," argued Kelleher.

"Furthermore, I also raised the issue of full transparency from the Commission and Member State governments on both vaccines delivered to each country and how many vaccines are being administered on a weekly

.



basis. "For the last few weeks, both sides have been attempting to lay the blame on each other. It needs to stop. Citizens do not care who takes the credit or otherwise; they just want vaccines administered as efficiently and safely as possible.

"There must be a quid pro quo. The Commission must publish on a weekly basis how many of each vaccine type approved has been delivered to each member state, and a forecast of how many of each vaccine will be distributed in the future.

"Equally, the Member States should also publish how many vaccines, from each producer, have been administered on a weekly basis, and their forecasts for future vaccinations.

"Europe has agreed to buy 2.3 billion doses of vaccines. Not all of them will be available in 2021; the Commission and the Member States must ensure that the public is kept in the loop at all times on what has been delivered and administered, and what is yet to arrive," concluded Kelleher.

€1.05m initial Brexit Reserve Fund allocation : DERELICT for Ireland with more to come - MEP Kelleher

Fishing, Agri-Food, Hospitality & Tourism sectors must be supported with hard cash -

Fianna Fáil MEP for Ireland South, Billy Kelleher has said that the 25% allocation for Ireland in the EU's Brexit Reserve Fund is a recognition of the impact Brexit will have on Ireland.

Kelleher was commenting after the EU Commission announced its allocation key for the fund and the timeline for when payments will be made in the future.

"This is further recognition from the EU that Ireland, and in particular our fishing, agrifood, hospitality and tourism industries, will be damaged no matter the type of Brexit that comes.

"It is expected that Ireland will receive €1.05 billion in 2021 with further funds being made available later on.

"How these funds are used by the Irish government is now of crucial importance. The funds must get to the people who are losing out, and not as general supports to the sector.

"We must remember that people's incomes will drop, especially in fishing communities,



and their families and communities, need hard cash to keep going.

"The Irish Government must also be prepared to seek support at Council and Commission level in the next few years to increase the Reserve Fund if the impact of this Brexit deal is worse than expected," concluded Kelleher.

PROPERTIES

A Kerry County Councillor has said that we should encourage owners of derelict properties to develop them by providing Grant funding and by continuing to expand the present Town and Village Regeneration Schemes.

According to Councillor Michael Cahill, the imposition of levies could be seen as a form of intimidation and would have a negative effect.

"Property owners have been financially effected, the same as all other business owners in our county" stated the Fianna Fáil man.

"Further penalising them by imposing levies will only bring more hardship and lead to these properties being placed on the market" said Councillor Cahill.

"With the help of Regeneration Schemes and Grant Aid, people can be encouraged to develop and invest in business projects which can bring employment in to our communities. Everybody could do with some encouragement in these testing times as it is difficult to see light and hope for business projects" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"The Town and Village Regeneration Scheme is already having a positive effect in Cahersiveen, Portmagee, Killorglin , Castleisland and should be extended even more" said the Fianna Fáil man.

The beauty around you... RATHMORE COMMUNITY COUNCIL FOCUS ON THE OLD ROAD

 $W^{\rm hile}$ it's been hard to find positives from 2020, having more time to discover our locality has definitely been something we've enjoyed.

One amenity in the Rathmore area is the Old Road, which during 2020 has seen a significant upgrade through the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme. Kerry County Council, IRD Duhallow and Rathmore Community Council worked collaboratively on this project.

The Old Road should be explored on foot, and best to start by walking up the hill at the Forge Cross.

As you walk up the road, you will leave the traffic noise behind. Heading up that hill, the initial need to catch your breath on its incline will take all your focus. There are some beautiful mature trees lining the road.

A walk up to the top of this hill to the first access gate, provides the answer to that ageold question as to whether the Church Place area or the Rathmore-Shinnagh area is the 'real Rathmore'. Up here you will find the actual Ráth Mhór, the earliest evidence of settlement in this area. An Ráth Mhór, means "big ringfort" and the actual archeological site of An Ráth Mhór can be explored by veering off the Old Road to the left of this access gate, although it is best to do so during a dry spell, rather than during this current Level 5 period. It is likely it was occupied during the Bronze Age right through to the Early Christian period and even beyond. At the time people tended to live in enclosed farmsteads, ring forts. These were circular areas, measuring approximately 20-60m in diameter, usually enclosed with one or more



earthen bank enclosures. An Ráth Mhór also has a great example of a large cupped stone as well as a souterain (a man-made underground tunnel consisting of creep-ways or chambers, perhaps used as a place of refuge or storage area). Smaller forts are also recorded in the area (eg Shinnagh, Rathbeg, Raheen).

Plagues, Viking, Norman and British invasions as well as religious upheaval may have affected the rest of Ireland, but life in Sliabh Luachra changed very slowly, likely due to the geographical isolation of the area. The boggy land combined with the mountains meant that for 10 months of the year the area was largely impassable. This geographical isolation while impacting on our access to trade and opportunities, also allowed us to preserve and develop our language, culture, music, customs and way of life, after they had been lost to other areas of Ireland.

It is likely that some semblance of roads in the area of the Old Road existed, and the people would've used it to travel to fairs and markets.

The local gentry were reluctant to spend their money on roads outside of their own lands. However the English Army during the 18th Century required roads to facilitate the passage of troops and supplies. They tended to lay these roads in straight lines from one military point to the next. Gun barrel type roads were made by military engineers from Cork City through Millstreet and Shinnagh Mill toward Killarney. There is no definite date for this construction, but likely prior to 1750. This road improved access to surrounding areas and markets, including the butter market in Cork. Butter became one of the main exports from Ireland to the West Indies and South America, mainly due to the mild climate and the many dairy farms in Ireland. The farmers travelled from Kerry to Cork, bringing their goods to market - a long journey in all weathers. This road also brought more exposure to the English language, and in the wake of the Great Famine, access to emigration. The population of Rathmore dropped by 20-25% during the Great Famine, and Irish speaking reduced by approximately 65% At the top of the hill, to the left, this road would've continued towards the village, and on to Cork. While no longer passable towards the village this road would've continued over to Shinnagh. Turn right, and you can walk along to another access gate, with the road to Killarney You will find yourself passing above the secondary school, graveyard, primary school and come out by the Grotto . You can loop back towards the Church and back along the path along the 'new road'. Please remember to leave no trace, and close all gates after you.







WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Taxable Cash: You may be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash.

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

DURING A JANUARY OF REMOTE LEARNING, CAO APPLICANTS MUST **KEEP A CLOSE EYE ON THE TIMELINE**

AO application season is in full swing and ✓with 80,000 plus applicants competing for about 50,000 college places, it's vital to submit a complete application form. Stay focussed and be aware of key dates and the important tasks to be done in the weeks ahead.

The 2021 CAO online application remains open until 1st Feb. Open your CAO interactive online account via "Apply" on www.cao.ie, by 20th Jan to get a discount rate of €30. After that the fee increases to €45 until the 1st Feb. The closing date for online Change of Course Choices, which is free, is also 1st Feb.

You may use the online Change of Course Choices facility, fee €10, from 5th Feb to 1st March to add any restricted courses not already listed. Restricted category applicants may also use this facility. All other applicants should use the free Change of Mind option, between 5th May and 1st July, to make any course changes.

Completed online Higher Education Access Route (HEAR)/Disability Access Route to Education (DARE) forms must be submitted by 1st March. HEAR/DARE supporting documentation must arrive in CAO by 15th March.

Late online applications, fee €60, will be accepted from 5th March to 1st May. From 5th May, you may register a change of course choices online at www.cao.ie. Check that your courses have been updated by using the "My Application" facility before 1st July. Before the end of May, you will be sent a Statement of Application Record to verify that all your information has been recorded accurately. If you find any error in the document, contact the CAO.

Course choices and preferences may be changed as often as desired, free of charge, between 5th May and 1st July. If you submit a Change of Mind, it cancels all the previous course choices, which you have submitted. The two categories (Level 8 and Level7/6) are completely separate from each other for this purpose. Any restricted application course, added for the first time via a Change of Mind won't be considered unless it shares the same assessment procedure with a course you had applied for by 1st Feb.

In early July, offers of places (Round A) are issued to deferred applicants, mature applicants and to those who need to make visa arrangements. In early August, offers of places (Round Zero) are issued to certain non-standard categories of applicants such as FET/QQI and graduate applicants. Round One, the main body of offers will be issued shortly after the Leaving Cert results.

Last year. 53,815 CAO applicants received at least one of the 78,950 courses on offer in Round One. The offers consisted of 47,162 at Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) where demand is always strong and 31,788 at Level7/Level 6 (Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates) where interest continues to decline. CAO always issues more offers than there are places available in anticipation of a level of refusal by applicants. Offers are issued independently in respect of the two lists (Level 8 and Level 7/Level 6), so it's well worth filling in both lists. CAO will release details of the finalised 2021 offers and acceptance schedule later in the year.

Q & A WITH B WELL FITNESS

Question: what to do for shoulder pain when in that seated position at a desk all day? Part 2

Answer: We are assuming that the shoulder pain experienced is due to muscle tension, and not a soft tissue or joint injury - these should obviously be assessed and you should follow the recommended rehab.

Stretches – what ones? For how long? How many times per day?

• Raise your right arm until shoulder height, move it across your chest then place your left hand just above your right elbow and pull into your chest, hold for 10 secs and switch sides

• 2 hands behind your lower back and pull back your shoulders, hold for 10 secs • Place your right hand behind your neck, then place your left hand on your right elbow and gently pull down

• Sit at the desk and pull your chin down to your chest, hold for 10 secs

• Place your left hand under your seat, then bring your right hand over your head and place just above your left ear, then gently pull your head to one side & hold for 10 secs – gently! Switch sides

• Take any opportunity during your day to perform these simple stretches, but you should also perform at home both morning and evening

 Shoulder mobilisation after stretching would include arm circles both forwards and backwards

As we said already we are assuming that the pain is due to muscle tension. If symptoms persist or worsen then we recommend getting it assessed by your therapist and follow their rehab instructions.

DISAPPOINTMENT **OVER GREENWAY DELAY**

Councillor Michael Cahill has expressed his disappointment that the final decision on whether the South Kerry Greenway can progress to construction, has again been postponed due to Judicial Reviews being applied for on behalf of interested parties.

"At the outset, let me acknowledge that everybody has the right to protect their property and use the Legal Process to do so" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I am disappointed however, that a further delay is now inevitable. I am confident that we will eventually get there, given the outstanding potential of the project and it's expected value to all the community" said the Fianna Fáil Councillor.


When asked about claims that the Compulsory Purchase Order had turned land owners against the Greenway, Councillor Cahill had this to say; "I worked on behalf of the landowners and I was instrumental in securing an annual maintenance payment for them. They were due to be the first landowners in Ireland to receive such a payment in respect of a Greenway" "CPO was not the route any of us, including Kerry County Council, wished to go down obviously, but given the fact that there are approximately 200 landowners, 100% agreement was never really possible".

"Without 100% agreement on a deal between landowners and the Council, CPO was the only way this project could possibly be progressed"

"Other commentators of course, will hang their hat on CPO as the problem, but I am well used to these people talking out of both sides of their mouths in a populist attempt to appear to support both business and land owners" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"They are fuelling division in the community and are blocking progress in South Kerry and more specifically in Caherciveen and throughout Iveragh. They are condemning future generations of our children to emigration, just to survive, and that is not acceptable" said a visibly angry Councillor Cahill. "I have said a thousand times that the South Kerry Greenway will be a "Lifeline and A Gamechanger" for Caherciveen, Glenbeigh, Iveragh, South Kerry and will benefit the entire county.""I still believe this"

"We must now let the Legal Process take its course, as we look forward to better days" added Councillor Cahill.

STAY AT HOME AND SAVE LIVES Hospital group issues statement

As the number of Covid-19 cases continues to increase across the country, as the projected trend in admissions based upon community transmission levelsincrease and as hospitals get busier, management at the South/South West Hospital Group are strongly urging members of the public to stay at home and to follow the Government's current Covid-19 guidelines to ensure that they do not contribute to the spread of the coronavirus.

The S/SWHG is urging members of the public to focus on the following: limiting your contacts, not to make any unnecessary journeys outside their 5km radius, hand washing, cough etiquette, wearing masks in public spaces, being aware of and recognising Covid 19 symptoms, and taking the appropriate course of action if symptoms present themselves. The Emergency Departments across S/SWHG are extremely busy over the last number of days due to people presenting with Covid-19 symptoms and staff who are unavailable for Covid-19 related reasons. Due to this increased level of activity and subsequent admissions, it is regrettable that some patients may experience a delay in the ED. Therefore management have requested that, where appropriate, the public contact their GP/Out of Hours service in the first instance



and explore all other options available to them prior to attending the Emergency Department if their needs are not urgent. The Intensive Care Units across the Group are busy, however Critical Care Capacity in S/SWHG is actively managed as a group resource; thereby ensuring patients always have access to the best possible care setting with inter-hospital transfer as required. The necessary arrangements are in place across all sites to upscale Critical Care capacity should that be required. Due to the rapid increase in the number of patients with confirmed Covid-19 being admitted to hospitals all elective work has been suspended across the Group, aside from emergency surgery and only time critical elective cancer surgery are being scheduled. Management at the hospitals acknowledge that staying at home and staying isolated will be very difficult. Nevertheless, hospitals want to remind people again that they can save lives by staying at home and following the current Government and Public Health guidelines.

Kerry Golf clubs to benefit from €2.8m Club Resilience Fund Open For Applications

Golf clubs in Kerry are now able to apply for funding under a scheme announced recently.

Golf Ireland has confirmed details of the Club Resilience Fund for clubs located in the Republic of Ireland. Delivered by Sport Ireland, the fund aims to provide short-term financial help to golf clubs, support business resilience and future sustainability post COVID-19.

To be considered for funding, applicants must meet the criteria and conditions set out for the fund which is designed to assist clubs most in need of financial supports.

Some of the areas in which clubs could consider applying include sustainability, service improvement, training and education for staff and/or volunteers, programmes for vulnerable and under-represented groups to engage them in golf, modification of facilities and ways to reduce costs. Clubs are however encouraged to apply for other ventures which fall within the terms of the funding rules.

Killarney man Mark Kennelly, CEO of Golf Ireland said: "We are delighted to have secured this funding for golf clubs in the Republic of Ireland and I'd like to express our thanks to Minister for Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Media and Sport Catherine Martin TD, the Minster for State for Sport and Gaeltacht Jack Chambers TD and Sport Ireland for considering the submissions that Golf Ireland made on behalf of golf clubs." "Many golf clubs have suffered a losses in

revenue because of the pandemic and Golf Ireland is committed to supporting clubs in every way possible. This is a substantial allocation for golf, and it underlines the important role of golf in the sporting landscape. I encourage all clubs to inform themselves of the requirements of the fund and to submit their applications".

The initial allocation for golf was €2.7m but an additional €100,000 has since been secured by Golf Ireland to bring the total support package to €2.8m.

Clubs have until 20th January 2021 to submit their applications with an announcement of recipients expected in early February. Grants of up to €25,000 will be awarded to successful clubs. As this programme is state-funded, a list of successful clubs and the amount they have been awarded will be published on the Golf Ireland website once all applicants have been contacted.

Clubs may also at this time apply for Sports Capital Funding (Republic of Ireland) and the Sport Sustainability Fund(Northern Ireland) which are separate funding opportunities to the Club Resilience Fund.

JAMIE THE GIANT KILLER

Chances are that you never heard of Chorley FC before last weekend. I certainly hadn't. The English FA Cup is famous for the occasional giant-killing feat – a young Harry Redknapp's Bournemouth beating Man United in 1984 and Burton Albion repeating it a year later, Wrexham 2 Arsenal 1 in 1992, Exeter holding Man United to a draw in 2005, Barnsley taking out both Liverpool and Chelsea in 2008.....

But a team that are currently tenth in the National League North (albeit climbing after a recent run of good form) – it's the sixth tier of English football, teams like this can only dream of Vauxhall Conference – taking out a championship side? Moreover, with a manager who honed his playing skills with Killarney Athletic and Killarney Celtic and in school at St. Oliver's in Ballycasheen and St. Brendan's College?

That would only be comparable to David versus Goliath if David had a broken arm and his slingshot wasn't working.

Jamie Vermiglio was born in Liverpool but grew up in Killarney after his parents moved here. One of Jamie's first coaches would have been his uncle John, still a hugely respected coach and a great player in his day. Jamie obviously listened and learned – he played for Scarborough (which I have heard of – because it's in the title of a Simon and Garfunkel song), Telford United, and Chorley.

It's very difficult for people here to understand the onion layers of soccer in England. A GAA player here might have to compete with 300 players around his position to wear an intercounty jersey. In England, it's easily going to be 30,000 competitors for a professional soccer career. Understand that squad members for Derby are likely to be earning a minimum of several thousand pounds a week. Playing in the sixth tier doesn't sound very impressive to us here because most people can't grasp how big the game really is over there. Don't think of Chorley as a Junior club in Irish terms; a team of that standard would give any League of Ireland team a good game. I would actually love if the likes of Shamrock Rovers or Dundalk could have a go at the FA Cup some time (any group of lads can enter a team if they register and can rent a home venue) just to see how far they would get.

In those circumstances, lowly Chorley FC taking out Derby is a colossal shock, and deservedly so. Now, honesty compels me to acknowledge rapidly that Derby were missing all of their first team, several of their first choice reserves, and their manager Wayne Rooney because of covid. I also have to reluctantly say that running the FA Cup at all between teams with such disparate testing procedures and protocols was and is



utter madness, to be honest about it. English soccer is not remotely safe right now (players who broke the rules on social distancing should have been banned for the entire rest of the season, in my opinion) and the amount of games being postponed because of covid is a real and serious warning sign.

So you could argue that Chorley and their manager (a primary school headmaster in Selford) got lucky. The betting odds on the match, after all, were only a mere 9/1 instead of astronomical.

Here's the thing. Jamie's been getting remarkably lucky for quite a while now, it seems. Because they beat Wigan and Peterborough in the previous round to reach this third round for the first time in their history, and you'd have gotten very long odds against that one as well. Jamie also took them to the Conference Finals. There's a point where luck simply can't be the only factor involved. This is a manager to keep an eye on, and there will be huge Killarney interest in their round against Wolves.

It's not the only giant-killing feat of the weekend, either. Arguably even more notable was Crawley Town's (nope, never heard of them either) 3-0 defeat of Leeds United. Crawley play in League Two, four tiers below the Premiership. Now, I have to add a small caveat to that one. The truth is that I don't think Leeds' manager Bielsa was exactly throwing the handle after the hatchet in that game – I mean, at 2-0 down he took off his strikers! He also rested a number of senior players.


Another game where the underdogs earned massive plaudits is Aston Villa versus Liverpool. Villa basically had to field a youths side (covid

again) but acquitted themselves well and gave a strong Liverpool side a real battle. 17 year old Louie Barry, who represented Ireland at underage before switching to his native England, got Villa's goal with a superb finish past Caoimhin Kelliher. Barry is very highly rated (PSG offered a E3.2m package for him as a 16 year old but he opted for Barcelona before a lack of game time brought him back to his family's lifelong club Villa) within the game – and now outside it. However, as much as Villa deserved their plaudits, it has to be noted that Liverpool did put the tie to bed with three second half goals in five minutes.

Spurs, Man City, Man United, Chelsea, and Arsenal all managed to get through to the next round reasonably comfortably, even with resting players. The truth is that the days when the FA Cup Final was the most glamorous match in the calendar (believe it or not, for many years it was the only televised game) are long gone and it's really a fairly unnecessary distraction from the vital bread and butter of league success for the big teams.

PREMIERSHIP

Obviously the big one and the most anticipated match so far this season is going to be the top of the table clash between Liverpool and Man United. Liverpool's challenge has slipped slightly off the rails in recent times (in fairness, they have been hit with injuries, none more crucial than Van Dijk – the referee admitted this week that he got the decision not to red card Pickford for that challenge wrong), while the same Ole Gunnar Solskjaer who appeared to be clinging to his job by his fingernails before

Christmas is flying. Solskjaer famously scored to win the European Cup; two of his team-mates that night are set to join up as it sounds like Phil Neville is likely to leave his post as the English Womens' Manager to join David Beckham's new project, Inter Miami.

I suspect myself that both teams will be passed in the slipstream by a resurgent Man City. A certain Guardiola has a pep back in his step at the moment, even with Aguero still out injured. Fernandinho and Dias are absolutely flying and they are looking far more effective at both ends of the field. Pressure has also eased somewhat on Mikel Arteta with Arsenal. This week finally saw the end of the long-running saga of Mesut Ozil's departure. Ozil at his best (which, in fairness, he didn't always produce for Arsenal) was a playmaker extraordinaire, whose sumptuous passing and uncanny technical skills could destroy opposition teams in the blink of an eye. The one thing he couldn't do was be a pressing midfielder, which is absolutely required in the current style of play. The hard truth is that Arteta gave him plenty of chances, but he was a luxury player at a time when they couldn't afford one on the field of play.

Frank Lampard is feeling the heat at Chelsea at the moment, and a certain Roman Abramovich is not exactly known for his patience. Personally, I'd be very slow to make changes in this year of years, but it's a very fickle job at the best of times...

DUFF DEPARTS

The FAI's woes continue. Damien Duff, once regarded as one of the best wingers in the world and more recently earning praise as a coach with Glasgow Celtic. Stephen Kenny's Ireland I obviously a much longer work in progress, and I remain a little bit sceptical of that much-praised but fruitless 'progress' (nothing to do with Kenny, a phrase about silk purses and sows' ears comes to mind), but Duff was quietly and efficiently earning praise in his role as Assistant Manager. Until now. Like so many decent men before him, frustration with the ineptitude of the FAI has finally gotten the better of him. We're told that the issue was the leaking of a video (believed to be Englishman Ken Loach's 'The Wind that Shakes the Barley', ironically - very good movie, by the way) used as a motivational tool in the build-up to the game against England that Ireland lost 3-0. Prompted by it's reported 'anti-English stance in the Daily Mail (which, to be blunt about it, has as much to do with actual journalism as Donald Trump does with statesmanship), FAI Interim CEO Gary Owens announced an 'urgent investigation'. Duff, very much to his credit, treated said 'urgent investigation' with the respect that all internal FAI investigations have deserved for decades - complete disdain.

In fairness, I do actually sympathise with Owens' mishandling of what should have been a fairly simple affair - those journalists who queried whether it was appropriate for Irish players to feel anti-English prior to playing....well, England....should have been answered in a strong affirmative. Yeah, of course. What exactly is anybody's problem with this? Anyone trying to conflate instilling a sense of justified aggression with implicit racism should be treated with disdain and nothing else. But Owens was trying to lead a flat broke and credibility-lacking FAI out of a severe crisis of their own making as well as a global crisis. He overreacted and effectively offered up Irish management as a sacrificial lamb to political correctness gone awry, in a bid to avert controversy. I do sympathise with his position - but Duff's furious reaction is even more understandable. Unsubstantiated rumours suggest that Lee Carsley (I(can't see him leaving his U20 role with England) or much more likely John O'Shea (likely to move up from our own U20 team) are the likely replacements. His failure in another matter is much more serious. During Owens' tenure - and this is after financial irregularities at the FAI were wellknown - the interim CEO managed to award an E80,000 contract to human resources expert Yvonne Clancy for a review of the FAI's structure and morale. This contract was not advertised or put out to tender. This is pretty basic stuff when you've just received a E30 million bailout. There is no question but that Ms. Clancy was eminently qualified and an appropriate choice, but yet again the handling of a basic financial matter.....could the FAI, while standing deep in a E70m hole, at least put down the shovels for a while? I'm beginning to understand what the FAI mean when they talk about 'transparency'. They mean that everybody can see right through them.

GAA

We're in a lull period right now. Maybe no harm, either, going by the conduct of some counties. I am referring, of course, to Cork and Down. Both have been caught red-handed carrying out training sessions (spare me the embarrassing guff from Cork officials about 'team bonding sessions' - if anyone is gullible enough to believe that, I'm willing to sell them Muckross House at a discount). Look, Kerry have a long and proud history with both counties, and I have a great appreciation of both, but their conduct in recent days is an outright disgrace. Do you think the likes of Maurice Hayes or Weeshie Murphy would condone this? There is a very obvious and very strong reason for the current training ban - hint: it's the reason that frontline staff are working so hard in trying and dangerous circumstances, why children can't go to school, why so many businesses are barely hanging on by a very thin thread.

In those circumstances, inter-county teams who should be leading the way but instead do the exact opposite are simply nothing short of a disgrace. And yes, you have my word that I would call out Kerry on it should such a situation arise.

MEP Sean Kelly has called for such counties to be thrown out of this year's National League. I agree with him completely. Fair enough, that sanction wasn't in place for these breaches and can't be applied retrospectively, but let's draw a line in the sand right here.

GOLF

It's hard to imagine anything that demonstrates the polarisation of America more than golf turning on it's most famous, or arguably notorious, aficionado. Golf in the US was traditionally for a demographic that was white, male, and ultra-rich - it isn't that long ago that people were stunned to hear that the best golfer in the world was black (Tiger) and the best rapper was white (Eminem). Augusta only allowed women members as late as 2012. Jack Nicklaus and Annika Sorenstam are both strong Trump supporters. So it says something that the 2022 PGA Championship, which had been awarded to Donald Trump's Bedminster course in 2012, has been withdrawn from the venue.

Meanwhile, in Britain, the R and A have confirmed they have no plans to host any events at Trump's Turnberry course in Ayrshire. There is, and always needs to be, a line between sport and politics, but I have never subscribed to the theory that they have to be completely separate. After all, a lot of sports bodies are first in the queue when grants are being dished out, and sport (very much including golf) has played a huge role in the success of Irish tourism and our economy. Politics and business are indistinguishable from sport in many ways. Right or wrong, you'd find very few Irish people complaining if Doonbeg was awarded a major championship over the next while.

Certainly our golf courses, which have been closed and will be for the immediate future (something that I as a non-golfer don't agree with – social distancing would not be difficult

in the outdoors pursuit and it suits all demographics and ages) are going to need all the help they can get.

RUGBY

Every sport is having scheduling problems at the moment. English soccer and US sports, two countries which have handled this pandemic absolutely appallingly, are barely functional when you dig into the numbers. Rugby has actually done better than most, but at the time of writing. The 2021 Six Nations and the last two rounds of the Champions Cup are facing postponement (the Women's Six Nations is almost certainly off, unfortunately)after the French sports ministry expressed serious doubts about French clubs continuing their participation against English teams. That's not a belated revenge for Agincourt – the English rate of infection justifies the decision.

Also in serious doubt is the British and Irish Lions Tour to South Africa this summer. South Africa is another country where the rate of infection is huge, leading to speculation that it might be the South African team that actually do the touring. If that were to be the case, then Croke Park is being strongly billed as the venue for the first test.





DEALING WITH DEPRESSION PART 3

When we are feeling depressed, we can experience our feeling state like a sink that is blocked with no outlet. Our reactions to events and unwelcome thoughts seem to go round and round, rather than just flowing through our mind. Tubridy and Corry describe depression as a natural response to life's experiences – and maintain that depression is an emotion and not a disease. Just as we respond to life with feelings of anger, joy, sadness, love and fear – depression is another way in which we respond to life. Depression however doesn't just come upon us randomly and by chance. Instead it is a defence we build up around ourselves when we feel under threat or in danger. We build up barriers to protect ourselves and these can act as a very effective defence. However, when the time comes to remove the barriers, we may be unable to do so - thus our barriers of protection become our own prison.

Often our Psychological Skin has become too tight or too loose. When too tight we find it difficult to give or to allow others in. We feel the need to control everything ourselves and can't delegate or trust others. This however leads to feeling isolated and being cut off from growth in our lives. When our skin has become too open, we readily take on the problems and worries of others – often feeling overwhelmed and unable to set boundaries and say no. The optimal situation is to be neither too open nor too closed. Permeable boundaries allow us to open and let in when needed say no when we need to and reserve our energy.

Frequently people who are experiencing depression can feel plagued by tiredness. The constant effort to keep everything under control, to not upset people or to meet the needs of others can all lead to a constant anxiety and despair, which in turn leads to tiredness.

Some ways out of our depression include:

 Have something positive that you can say to yourself (e.g. All will be well, or This too shall pass) or some inspiring music that you can put on when things feel dark and you feel alone. Choose something that works for you

Develop the habit of doing at least one enjoyable, pleasant thing for yourself each day.

 Keep a diary or a journal where you can record inspiring words, valuable insights or special memories. Whenever you feel low, read what you have written.

Counselling can provide a great support to help deal with depression.



Surveying for National Broadband Plan continues across Kerry

National Broadband Ireland (NBI), the company rolling out the new high-speed fibre broadband network under the Government's National Broadband Plan (NBP) today announced that surveying works in several areas of Kerry are well underway.

Surveying

NBI contractors have been on the ground across the country for eight months and over 150,000 premises nationwide have been surveyed to date. This involves physically walking the routes and documenting images, notes and measurements of the poles, cables and underground ducts in each area. This will enable network design solutions for the provision of a fibre network to every premises in the Intervention Area – a map of over 544,000 premises nationwide identified by the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communication (DECC) - as not being served with adequate broadband speeds.

In Kerry, there are 26,905 premises in the Intervention Area (IA), which includes homes, farms, commercial businesses and schools. This equates to 30% of all premises in the county. Under the National Broadband Plan, Kerry will see an investment of €107M in the new high-speed fibre network.

This will enable e-learning, remote monitoring of livestock or equipment, e-health initiatives, better energy efficiency in the home, and facilitate increased levels of remote working.

NBI crews have made substantial progress in Kerry, the following areas are being surveyed: Rathmore, Knocknacopple, Mounthorgan, Kilquane Upper, Barraduff, Cloonteens, Gneevegullia, Tureenamult, and Renasup.

In June 2020, NBI crews started initial works for surveying in townlands around Killarney.

All NBI contractors will also carry official ID cards and essential worker letters, and have received training on adhering to all Covid 19 guidelines. They will have vehicles, PPE and signage with both their own, and NBI logos.

In advance of the fibre to the home roll out, the NBP provides for the delivery of BCPs nationwide. Over 60 of these sites are now 'live' and have both internal and external broadband access.

These facilities - which include GAA clubs, community centres and tourist sites - will provide free public access to high-speed internet in the rollout area.

These will pave the way for rural communities to receive the benefits of broadband, from mobile working, e-learning and mobile banking, to digital tourism.

A full list can be found at /bcp-map/ Primary schools in the Intervention Area are also being connected for educational access as part of the NBP. Locations of Broadband Connection Points in county Kerry will include Gneeveguilla, Kielduff Community Centre, Killenagh, and Chapeltown Community Centre.
