

Heart of Ireland take centre stage at HeartBeat

eart of Ireland certified another group of people this week as 20 members of HeartBeat were trained in the skills of CPR & AED use in Killarney.

The training, organised by HeartBeat saw the Heart of Ireland instructors equip their members with the skills to save a life.

"Knowing how to do CPR and using an AED can be the difference between life and death. Now there are 20 more people in Killarney that have the skills to save a life", Damien Baker, Heart of Ireland told the Killarney Outlook.

Recently HeartBeat installed a Public Access AED on the wall of the Parish Hall.

"The Parish Hall serves the Killarney Community and is used frequently. The importance of using an AED on someone in the seconds after a cardiac arrest is vital. This AED ensures that should someone suffer a cardiac arrest, the delay of getting an AED to the patient is minimised", Leo O'Connor, Heart of Ireland said. HeartBeat, a support group for cardiac and stroke patients have hosted many information evenings with the Killarney Cardiac Response Unit for their members, and they took the opportunity of installing the AED to offer a CPR & AED course to the public.

Damien Baker thanked the members of the public who took the time to learn CPR. "It's only when something happens close to home that people think we should have learned CPR" Damien added. I would urge anyone interested in learning CPR and how to use an AED to get in contact with the Heart of Ireland facebook page to find out details of a course near you. The Heart of Ireland project is going from strength to strength with more old Irish Phone Boxes across the country being re-introduced into community's housing life-saving defibrillators. The Heart of Ireland, a volunteer run project aims to promote the locations of Public Access Defibrillators across Ireland. In the coming months locations of more Phone Box AEDs will be launched and a part of Irish history that kept families together will do so once again right across the country. The Heart of Ireland group is calling on community groups across the country to support this project by taking the lead on bringing one to their community. The first Phone Box AED in Main Street Killarney not only serves as a life-saving piece of equipment but has proved to be a huge tourist attraction with visitors to the town.

"This qualification is something employers in the health care and child care sectors in particular are looking for but it is also sought extensively across other employment sectors" Bridie added.

Speaking at the presentation, Maurice Lawlor of the DEASP said that it is very important that as many supports are put in place for the region as is possible. "Having the LES operating in the area providing training as well as providing all the relevant information to prospective employees is a key component of these supports" Maurice said.

SKDP CEO Noel Spillane paid tribute to the

participants who completed the training and pointed to the very strong working relationship that exists between the DEASP and SKDP. "Schemes such as TUS and the RSS make significant contributions to the local communities in South Kerry and there are very good links between participants on these schemes and the LES with many going on to take up new roles across the region" he said.





The Killarney Municipal District of Kerry County Council is inviting submissions from members of the public as part of a review of the daytime pedestrianisation trials of Plunkett Street on the following occasions in 2018:

From Saturday, 31 March to Monday, 9 April, both dates inclusive. From Friday, 11 May to Monday, 21 May, both dates inclusive From Friday, 29 June to Monday, 3 September, both dates inclusive.

Plunkett Street was closed to traffic between the hours of 11.00 am and 7.00am, seven days a week, on a trial basis.

Kerry County Council is now encouraging everyone including local businesses, community groups and the general public to have their say on how the pedestrianisation trials operated.

Cathaoirleach of the Killarney Municipal District, Cllr John Sheahan said: 'We voted last March to introduce the trials of pedestrianisation on Plunkett Street, with the intention of assessing the impact on pedestrians, shoppers, motorists, and businesses. Now we would like to hear what the people of Killarney and further afield think about this matter.

'This is an informal consultation with the public but I hope that people will engage with it before we, as elected councilors, decide on any future pedestrianisation system which might apply,' he said.

Welcome for reduction in speed limits

Cllr. Brendan Cronin has broadly welcomed two very important changes which are to be part Kerry County Councils speed limit review. In the review it has been agreed witnin the Killarney MD that a 50klm speed limit will be put in place on all approaches to schools which are located on all local county roads and it is proposed that this be implemented county wide. This will be a very important step for Boards of Managment and school principals who have been seeking improvements in awareness and road safety for traffic, pedestrians and children approaching and accessing schools on local county roads.

Also agreed as part of the review is the implementation of a 30klm speed limit within all residential developments and estates that have been taken in charge by the Council where the road is public. This is also an important safety measure for residential areas.



Killarney said goodbye to one of it's favourite residents this week as Joe Mulvihill was laid to rest. A regular visitor to the Killarney Outlook - Joe will be missed by many. Joe's friend and neighbour Enda Walshe remembers Joe, who he met on a daily basis on his way to work.

Being a resident of the Upper Lewis Road for 20 years I have the unique advantage of not having to rely on the motor age to bring myself to the hub of the town centre. On my daily stroll I have the privilege to fully take in my surroundings. Just before I reach the home of Kerry football, Fitzgerald Stadium, Mangerton Mews is on my right and as the years went by I found myself halting my stride to make conversation with the inhabitants of these houses. They are under the auspices of the HSE who provide excellent care for the residents. One such lodger was Paddy Turner who left his own indemible mark on the town.But one of Paddys closest friends was Joe Mulvihill. Joe arrived in Killarney on a similar curve to Paddy having been placed in the States care at an early age. He found happiness in South Kerry initially but unfortunately his guardian died unexpectedly and his time was spent moving from one place to another. He eventually anchored in Killarney and it was here that he was happiest. Never shy of work Joe was always helpful no matter where he was tasked and he built up a great relationship with a number of town residents.

He set up home in Lewis Road and in no time he struck up a friendship with Paddy Turner. Paddys infectious personality rubbed off on Joe and Joe thoroughly enjoyed his company overlooking the town. It was here I first met Joe and I always found him to be extremely honest. Like Paddy, he was fond of his fashion, and he always made sure he was well turned out.Being employed in Quills my most loyal and honest customers were Paddy and Joe . Joe was a huge sports fan with Kerry Football, Legion and Manchester United being to the forefront. His grá for Legion was nourished by the time he spent in the company of the likes of the late Bernie O Connor and Jameso Donoghue who he helped when the club purchased it's home in Direen in the early 90s. He counted Johnny Culloty as one of his idols and notwithstanding the towns rivalry he also had a fondness for the Dr Crokes as both clubs supplied him with some excellent carers. He was fanatical about the Kerry senior team and especially enthusiastic, in the recent past, about the work Peter Keane was indulging in. Only last Friday he called to me and urged me to bring him home a programme from the Kerry vs Dublin clash in Tralee. It was fervent wish that Kerry would be the ones who stopped a possible 5 in a row for the Dubs. Joe also ensured he had both Kilcummin and Beaufort flags for last weekend because his love of football meant he wanted to show every club his support. He was furnished with both clubs colours and Joe .on that eve of a momentous weekend, was full of anticipation, but alas when the ball was thrown in at headquarters on Saturday afternoon, he was on the highway to heaven. I have no doubt that he had a helping hand in both Beaufort and Kilcummin victories.

Having spent all his early years in Kerry, Joe learned to embrace it's beauty. You can be sure that on one of its finest days no one would have stood taller.

Joe Mulvihill had Kerry and Killarney to the forefront of his thoughts and enjoyed his routine of calling to his favourite haunts on his Friday trips.In the newly established Reidys and Der O Sullivans he was treatly like royalty and his recently kicking of the habit made him a regular in the Vape shop in High Street. He embraced modern technology and always ensured he had the most up to date phone. The Mens Shed, a recent and outstanding initiative, was where he spent a lot of his time and in the ethos of the organisation he was made feel extremely welcome. Huge tributes have to be paid to his carers in the HSE who made sure that upto his last breath Joe was seen after in a courteous and helpful way.

He took huge interest in nature and was at his happiest tending to the garden in his home in Mangerton Mews.His floral display was his pride and joy and he also gave great assistance to Mike Doherty in his time as overseer of the lawns and hedges in the facility.

And so when the full time whistle was blown on Joe's time in Killarney he had developed a huge affection for the town and its a tribute to the town's people that they returned it in spades to Joe. Its that spirit that makes Killarney such an attraction to locals and tourists alike.



PLC COURSES OPEN THE DOOR TO 3RD LEVEL AND TO THE JOBS MARKET



Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses in the Further Education and Training (FET) system are an attractive alternative to higher education and provide a link between 2nd level and 3rd level. The CAO route doesn't suit everybody. Some may not feel ready for 3rd level, while others may not have secured a CAO offer or may be unhappy with the offer received. Colleges of Further Education throughout the country offer PLC courses leading to awards at QQI FET Levels 5 & 6 from Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI).

A PLC course is ideal for a person who has completed the Leaving Cert and requires further vocational education and training to enhance her/his employment prospects. A PLC course provides students with the opportunity to try out a course before committing to a 3rd level course. It's also tailor made for a student who has completed the Leaving Cert Applied (LCA) or equivalent. A PLC course is perfect for a mature student, who is returning to education. PLC courses are full time, mainly one year, offering a blend of academic work, practical work and work experience. Many PLC courses lead directly to employment. Increasingly, PLC's are used to access 3rd level education. Last year, about 15,750 applications to the CAO offered a PLC qualification. This is a very healthy development as it provides an alternative route into 3rd level. PLC courses are available nationwide at nominal cost in Colleges of Further Education. There are a number of colleges in Kerry providing an extensive range of PLC courses, including Kerry College of Further Education (KCFE Tralee), North Kerry College of Further Education (NKC Listowel), St. Joseph's Secondary School (Ballybunion), Killarney Community College and O Connell Centre (Caherciveen).

Kevin Smith of the National Learning Network (NLN), Clash Road, Tralee has informed us that NLN is accepting applicants for the excellent 'Sporting Chance Course' (Levels 4 &5). The course is for those needing additional supports, especially those with learning or mental health difficulties, intellectual or physical disabilities, general health or illness difficulties, who are interested in pursuing a career in the sport, fitness and leisure industry. The course differs from other mainstream courses as it allows two years to complete the modules. It has smaller class sizes with greater one to one support. Students don't need to take assignments home as they are completed within the training hours. The NLN course also provides support in other areas such as stress management, confidence building and job seeking skills as well as providing a large amount of practical coaching and teaching experience in the local community. All participants receive a training allowance of up to €198 per week and may also be entitle to a travel allowance. Contact NLN, Tralee at 066 7122533/ 086 0404270 or Kevin. smith@nln.ie for further information.

Through the higher education links scheme (HELS), the PLC courses, which accommodate over 30,000 students annually, provide an alternative route into CAO courses other than Leaving Cert exam results. Over forty higher education institutions offer a variety of courses to PLC graduates. A PLC course normally involves completing eight modules in the academic year. Students' entry to CAO colleges is then based on a scoring system for PLC awards achieved at Level 5 and/or Level 6 on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ). Full details about the scoring system are available on the QQI website, www.qqi.ie.

There isn't a centralised application system for

PLC courses. Each PLC college looks after its own application process. Entry requirements normally consist of Leaving Cert standard and satisfactory performance at interview. Mature applicants are assessed on their life's experiences. PLC colleges are now accepting applications so apply early as places on the most popular courses fill up quickly. Contact your local PLC course provider, check the PLC colleges' websites or access all the relevant information on www.qualifax.ie or the FET course hub, www.fetchcourses.ie.



1 in 83 Irish people at risk of developing Haemochromatosis

Mr Paudie Herlihy is a native of Castleisland and is a retired secondary school teacher. In 2004, Paudie was suffering from severe low back pain and was feeling extremely tired.

Paudie's GP referred him to the Bon Secours Hospital Tralee where he was diagnosed with Haemochromatosis.

I had never heard of this and was stunned to hear that unless treated immediately, it could lead to serious liver damage"

Haemochromatosis, also known as iron overload, is an inherited condition which results in the body absorbing too much iron from food and storing this iron in organs, which can result in organ damage or failure.

There's currently no cure for Haemochromatosis, but a highly effective treatment for genetic Haemochromatosis consists of regular removal of blood known as venesection therapy. This can help relieve some of the symptoms and reduce the risk of damage to organs such as the heart, liver and pancreas.

Since his diagnosis, Paudie has been attending the hospital every month for venesections.

I am not exaggerating when I say that I was very anxious in the beginning but I now treat my visits as a social outing. From the moment I walk through the door of the Bon Secours and meet the staff at Reception, Admissions, the Day Ward and the Laboratory, I am instantly made to feel at ease".

People often feel under pressure when they enter a hospital but Paudie has always felt a sense of welcome.

The way the staff are so friendly and people focused is a credit to the Hospital. I couldn't say enough about them" says Paudie.

Paudie has a fantastic outlook on life, he is feeling great and enjoys a swim most mornings. If you are worried, a simple blood test taken when you are fasting, is the best way to confirm if you have too much iron in your blood.



A GUIDE TO SCREEN USE

Many people worry that viewing a screen can damage their eyes. There is no evidence of this. In fact, because you can alter the size, brightness and contrast of the display, it can easier and more comfortable to see on a screen compared with looking at things on paper. However, some people find that looking at a screen for a long time is tiring, and may find wearing glasses for computer use helpful. Special protective coatings can be put on glasses lenses to help against eye fatigue from digital screens. These can help reduces glare for more comfortable and relaxed vision. Create better contrast perception, offering a more natural colour experience

Here are some ways to look after your eyes while using your screen:

- Apply the 20-20-20 rule every 20 minutes look at something 20 feet away for 20 seconds. That will give your eye muscles a rest.
- Try to blink regularly. Focusing



on a screen may make you blink less, which may make your eyes dry and uncomfortable.

- Position your computer screen so that: •it is between 40 and 76 centimetres (16 to 30 inches) from your eyes
- the top is level with, or slightly below, your eyes
- it is tilted away from you at a 10to 20-degree angle
- there are no distracting reflections, e.g. from a window.
- Once you have adjusted your screen, adjust the font size so it's easy to read.
- Use document holders for reading or reference materials. Place them close to the screen at the same distance from your eyes. This will enable your eyes to remain focused as they move between the screen and the documents.
- Use a character size that is easy to see. The character size is an important factor since it determines the distance at which you prefer to view the monitor



"THEY HAVE REALLY CAPTURED THE IMAGINATION"

Fionn Fitzgerald ahead of the AIB All-Ireland Semi-Final.

Pionn Fitzgerald admits that Mullinalaghta's story has really captured the public's imagination.

The Longford champions had won a hat-trick of county titles but only truly announced themselves to the nation by winning the 2018 AIB Leinster SFC title.

Their provincial final win over Dublin superclub, Kilmacud Crokes, was in some ways seen as a victory for small parishes across the country — showing what can be done in an area of just 450 people.

A look at some winners of recent AIB AII-Ireland titles shows an abundance of sides from more heavily-populated areas: Corofin, Ballyboden St Enda's and St Vincent's — highlighting the size of their next task.

Dr Croke's won the AIB All-Ireland title in 2017 with victory over Slaughtneil.

The Kerry men are hoping to be party-poopers at Semple Stadium in this club semi-final, but are certainly not underestimating the underdogs. County stars James McGivney, Patrick Fox, John Keegan and Donal McElliggott ensure that the Longford men have quality across the field, not to mention new Cavan boss Mickey Graham patrolling the sidelines.

"They have really captured the imagination," Fitzgerald says at the AIB All-Ireland semi-final media day

"Their run has taken on a life of its own. They're a bit like the Slaughtneil story, but they've also

been knocking on the door for a while.

"They've won Longford three times and been in Leinster where they gave St Vincent's a rattle, but beating a Dublin team was the thing because Dublin have been so successful. They also beat Rhode and Eire Og so they have form. "They're from a small area but they have been genuine kingpins in their county, and I was always tracking them."

Fitzgerald has an exceptional medal haul with both club and county — he lifted the Sam Maguire Cup as co-captain of Kerry in 2014, and was a key man on the Croke's team that hoisted the Andy Merrigan Cup in 2017.

"It's been incredible," says Fitzgerald. "It was a lifetime goal to win an All-Ireland with Kerry and, being honest, you grow up thinking you've more of a higher chance of doing it with the county than the club.

"It's been a dream to do it with Croke's. We lost to Nemo (in the Munster final) last season and it whetted our appetite to get back and win the county title, and maybe think of an All-Ireland run then in the distance. There's great excitement about it back home.

"It's unique too because you win your province and then there's a very long break either side of Christmas, and you don't know where you're at. All-Ireland semi-finals are always very close and we lost three of them before we finally won one. We didn't perform and the opposition did, and they were the better teams on the day.

"There are no favourites in this one, I don't buy that tag. You trust the work you have done and hope it's good enough on the day."



Disappointment for Killarney in Limerick

INCOME TAX CREDITS FOR INDIVIDUALS OVER 65 AND INDIVIDUALS CARING FOR THOSE OVER 65

AGE TAX CREDIT

Section 464 Taxes Consolidation Act 1997 provides for an additional tax credit known as the Age Tax Credit for individuals aged 65 or over. The credit is due in the year that an individual reaches the age of 65 and the credit is granted for the

In the case of an individual entitled to the basic personal tax credit, he or she will receive an additional tax credit of €245 in the year of assessment he or she is 65. For jointly assessed married couples or civil partners, the tax credit is €490 and is available when the older spouse or civil partner reaches the age of 65.

The tax credit will be automatically granted where the individual has advised Revenue of their date of birth.

DEPENDENT RELATIVE TAX CREDIT

The Dependent Relative tax credit is available to an individual who maintains at his or her own expense:

A son or daughter of the individual or his or her spouse/civil partner who resides with the individual and upon whose services the individual is compelled to depend on due to old age or infirmity.

HOME CARER TAX CREDIT

The Home Carer tax credit may be available to jointly assessed couples where one spouse or civil partner cares for one or more dependent persons. A dependent for the purposes of this credit includes a person aged 65 years or over.

The credit is not available where the dependent is the carer's spouse or civil



Tip-off in Killarney Sports Centre this Saturday night is at 7.30 P.M.



How do you view your relationship with this planet? Do you feel as if you "own" something, simply because you were born human? In mid August the South Walton Turtle Watch uploaded a harrowing post to Facebook. The sad pictures and caption revealed that a critically endangered Kemp's ridley sea turtle — the rarest of all sea turtles — had perished. The reason why? It had been trapped in a bar stool on a beach in Florida and had died a slow and torturous death.

*If you're strolling along the beach at any time and you see any kind of rubbish, please pick it up. You — and every human — have a responsibility to keep the planet clean for all species to thrive. HANDY HINTS

INTERNATIONAL SQUABBLES HAVE STOPPED A ONCE-MIGHTY CHICKEN FOOT TRADE

Korea, the Philippines, Vietnam, and many other countries all have their own classic preparations of chicken feet (the part of the



leg the chicken stands on) and in China chicken feet are eaten everywhere from formal banquet halls to hole-in-the-wall lunch counters.

About 400,000 metric tons per year of China's chicken feet once came from the world's biggest chicken producer: the United States. But despite the massive demand, fraught international trade politics means that the epic flow of chicken feet to China has slowed to a trickle.

Most recipes combine two or more cooking methods to fully tenderize the tough skin and tendons. They can be served hot or cold, spicy or mild, in soups and stews or on their own are often shrink-wrapped in plastic for convenience.

Chinese people are also eat chicken feet for their health benefits. The collagen-rich snack is said to be good for the skin. Since they're often served cold, the demand rises sharply in the warmer months of the year, between April and October. Chicken feet are eaten so frequently that they're often more expensive than actual chicken meat and the domestic poultry industry can't keep up with demand.




