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GREEN LAWN CAR PARK GETS THE GREEN LIGHT

ouncillors in Killarney have voted in favour of developing a car park in the Green Lawn despite objections from the residents and concerns from An Gardai Siochana.

It is hoped that the 139 space car park will help with traffic problems in the town.

A number of conditions, including fencing the car park and the guarantee that no event would take place in the new car park have been attached to the development.

Councillors who voted for the development:

Niall Kelleher, Brendan Cronin, Maura Healy Rae, Marie Moloney Councillors who voted against the development: Martin Grady, John O'Donoghue, Niall O'Callaghan.

Speaking to Killarney Outlook, Cllr. Martin Grady, Cathaoirleach of Killarney Municipal District and one of the three Councillors who voted against the development said that undoubtedly Killarney needs additional parking.

However I want to make my views and reasons clear to the people of Killarney regarding Green Lawn and why I voted against the Car Park at this location.

As a Cllr its my duty that I listen to the peoples views and full-fill my role as a public representative as I was elected to do for the people of Killarney Municipal District, the Part 8 submission process is vital and serves a purpose, I want to admire Kerry County Council for taking the Submission process seriously, as we saw with

the Aras Padraig when valuable Council assists were retained for the people of Killarney Municipal District and visitors alike as a result of the online submissions not brought before the Cllrs, the Part 8 was brought back a second time before the council giving Cllr's a chance to vote again, which changed minds during that time, resulting in the council and the people of the District rightfully holding onto prime land in the Heart of Killarney for the people as intended by the Friars who sold the land in December 2019 for 225,000euros a token payment at the time, to meet legalities regarding the charity regulator.

Of the 45 submissions made 38 were objections with majority of those being residents living within close proximity of the Car Park. Their views must be taken into consideration.

The Council Executive not Cllrs allowed on street dining throughout the Town, which resulted in the loss of a massive amount of on street parking in the Town which I don't agree with, any area not utilised should be returned to car parking.

One of the 7 submissions made in favour of the Green Lawn Car Park was from the TII

(submission No. 2) where a company was hired named MHL Consultancy, To carried out a survey where it states within their submission "a Traffic and Transport Assessment was carried out on the Mission Road Junction and it will operate below capacity for all design years up to 2043" how this projection was made is beyond me as traffic is worsening in Killarney on a weekly basis particularly in the Mission Road and Beech Road Area

This is private land rented the project has a current projected costing of 1.6 million euro as of August 2025.


I don't believe this is the right location for additional parking



as it will only worsen the existing traffic congestion in this area, and become a rat run through a car park which will be unsafe for pedestrians, I don't believe it's fair on the residents that live within metres of the Green Lawn site, which will soon become Black Lawn. It will provide Parking for those using the National Park no doubt which we are extremely privileged to have.

I fear the lengthy 15 year lease of the Private land will reduce the appetite for a permanent solution to the parking issue we have within the Town. There is unused Council owned ground between the Aras Padraig and the existing Car Park on Lewis Road that would accommodate 30 additional car parking spaces rent free.





Tragic Accident Claims Life of Young Man in Killarney

Tragedy struck in Killarney on Tuesday afternoon when emergency services were called to the River Flesk near the Killarney Athletic pitch following reports of a person in difficulty in the

Padraig O'Rahilly, from Calfmount in Headford, was recovered from the river at approximately 3:30pm but was sadly pronounced dead at the scene despite the efforts of emergency responders.

Gardaí are treating the incident as a tragic accident. A post-mortem examination has been

carried out, and a file is being prepared for the Coroner's Court.

Paudie, was the much-loved son of Margaret and Liam. He will be deeply missed by his sisters Valerie and Maureen, his brother Nathan, his godson Fionn and nephew Aaron, as well as his aunts, uncles, extended family, and many friends. The local community has been left shocked and saddened by the sudden loss of a young life, and tributes have poured in remembering Padraig's warm personality and kind heart.

Racing continues throughout the day with plenty offun and entertainment on the sidelines, including; Tug O' War competition, sack race, potato race, Irish music entertainment.


The launch of Killarney Regatta Festival will take place on Tuesday 2nd, September 2025, at Killarney Avenue at 8.30pm.

Today, there are five active clubs in the hinterland of Killarney, training from various boat houses along the shoreline. The older rowing clubs date back to the 1800's, and were aligned to the estates and business people. The type of boat raced is unique to the Lakes of Killarney and known as 'The Killarney Sixes' - wooden in structure, wooden oar, fixed seat, the boats were originally designed and built by Salters in Oxford.

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Tour de Munster Marks 25th Year with Warm Welcome in Killarney and a Powerful Finish in Cork



he 25th edition of the Tour de Munster charity cycle wrapped up in thrilling fashion on Sunday, August 10th, as a wave of determined cyclists powered up Cork City's iconic St. Patrick's Hill, cheered on by enthusiastic supporters lining the steep route.

The four-day, 600-kilometre journey through the six counties of Munster Cork, Waterford, Tipperary, Limerick, Clare, and Kerry, brought together 130 amateur cyclists and longtime Tour supporter and cycling legend, Sean Kelly, who has ridden alongside participants for nearly two decades.

Among the many heartfelt moments along the route was a particularly warm and memorable welcome at Deenagh Lodge in Killarney, where cyclists were greeted by members of Down Syndrome Kerry. The meeting offered a chance for cyclists to connect personally with some of the individuals and families who directly benefit from the funds raised, a powerful reminder of the Tour's purpose and impact.

Since its inception in 2001, the Tour de Munster has raised over €5 million for the Munster branches of Down Syndrome Ireland (DSI), supporting critical services including occupational therapy, speech and language therapy, educational supports, and employment preparation for children and adults with Down syndrome.

This year's milestone event served as a celebration of resilience, community, and commitment. "It's not just a cycle it's a movement that has changed lives," said Tour founder Paul Sheridan. "Meeting the families and individuals at stops like Deenagh Lodge is what keeps us going, year after year."

Every euro raised stays within the province, ensuring local DSI branches can continue offering life-enhancing supports. As cyclists crossed the finish line in Cork, the emotion was palpable each pedal stroke a tribute to 25 years of unwavering support, friendship, and hope.

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White-Tailed Eagle Reintroduction Programme Concludes Successfully at Killarney National Park

The final release of four white-tailed eagle chicks at Killarney National Park marks the successful completion of the National Parks and Wildlife Service's (NPWS) White-Tailed Eagle Reintroduction Programme. Since its launch in 2007, the project has seen 245 eagle chicks released across Ireland, with strong support from Norwegian partners, local communities, and landowners.

Once extinct in Ireland, the white-tailed eagle has now re-established a breeding population across multiple counties, from Cork to Donegal, thanks to nearly two decades of conservation efforts. The final 26 chicks released this year complete the current phase of the programme. Minister of State for Nature, Christopher O'Sullivan TD, praised the project as a vital part of Ireland's biodiversity restoration, while Norwegian Ambassador Aslak Brun highlighted the success of Irish-Norwegian collaboration. NPWS officials noted that Killarney National Park, with its rich habitats and food sources,

continues to play a central role in the eagles' return.

All released chicks are fitted with satellite tags for monitoring, as they face threats such as avian flu, poisoning, and extreme weather. Despite these challenges, the reintroduction leaves a lasting legacy for one of Ireland's most iconic birds of prey.

White-tailed Eagles feed on a wide variety of prey, including fish, waterbirds and carrion. They settle on territories around the coast and large freshwater lakes to breed. White-

tailed Eagles are a protected species under the Wildlife Act. These magnificent birds, once a striking element of Ireland's natural landscape, were driven to extinction on the island in the 19th Century because of human persecution. Restoring this lost flagship species to Irish skies is a significant step in restoring Ireland's natural heritage and will bring great benefit to Irish biodiversity. It also has the potential to contribute significantly to local rural economies through eco-tourism opportunities.

TARMAC HAS WON THE DAY IN THE GREEN LAWN



The vote on the Green Lawn loomed as we went to press. As I have said before, the plan is to take the green out of this lower New Street part of town. New Street is a misnomer. This area is the oldest part of town and one of the oldest residential areas too.

The proposal to introduce a car park into a quiet walled area albeit on privately owned ground will have a direct impact on nearby residents. And unlike the Aras/Lewis Road, it is very difficult to see how it will not impact the car going public slowing them down even further on the Mission Road. The exit and entry onto the clogged Mission Road voted down two weeks ago is now to go ahead - against the wishes of Gardai and others.

Apparently, according to Cllrs Cronin and Healy Rae both of whom strongly backed the proposal, the problem on Mission Road is really only in one direction. I had a suspicion the Green Lawn car park would be supported - when and maybe even because the Aras was shot down. The council couldn't be seen to shoot every plan down, I suppose.

Mayor of Killarney Martin Grady was strongly against it and retained his position. One of Mayor Martin's most persuasive arguments was how the car park which is merely being leased would undermine arguments longer term for a multistorey. He also pointed out how the vast majority - 38 of 45 - of the submissions opposed the project. Brendan Cronin however questioned the provenance of some of the submissions. 12 could not be found on the electoral register for the area,

he said.

I wonder why the same forensic scrutiny was not put forward in the case of the 47 million euro Lewis road and Aras project. Or even an acknowledgement about car parks bringing extra traffic! I could see how a new theatre - given a few tweaks here and a few tweaks there - and a much needed health centre (children in Killarney are attending the same building I was brought to as a child and I brought my own children to) would suit the public good. Though some people might not like the look of it. One might expect that because the council voted down a project on the strength of the clear majority of submissions two weeks ago, they would act in accordance for the Green Lawn which is only a few hundred metres away!

The Mission Road is clogged already. The submissions said the public won't benefit and the local residents won't benefit; and traffic flow will not benefit. So who will benefit was the key question.

According to Cllr Cronin, the businesses in lower New Street will benefit; businesses all over Killarney were losing out because of the lack of parking, Cllr Marie Moloney said.

WELCOME TO THE NEW BUS LINK BUT IT NEEDS BETTER OLD-STYLECOMMUNICATION

Record numbers are using public transport, rail, dart, Luas and rural buses, according to figures last week. We have to thank the Greens for making new public bus link routes as well as extra rail services a priority. Indeed even before the Greens, Killarney owed its economic life to the railway which brought Queen Victoria.

There was a combined effort all through the 1840s/50s with Protestant and Catholic, merchant, hotelier and cleric, landlord and tenant farmer in

Killarney to bring the line from Mallow. They are not thanked or remembered enough. We should have some kind of rail awareness day in Killarney and mark the men and women who achieved such a milestone. Alas, no such combined effort as of the 1840s takes place today. It seems that people unite mainly to oppose something. Which is a great pity.

The mayor of Killarney Martin Grady has made public transport and less clogged transport his priority and the new pilot Anseo local bus link around Killarney is getting a good showing thanks to him. But I found it difficult to get details and I was not the only one. Even local representatives were confusing it with the existing services.

TFI Anseo is very smart tech and there is a lot of jargon attached to the press release and very little concrete detail.

It took a good deal of effort to uncover the "designated Killarney zone" in the new scheme is the old urban Killarney town area; the times at the moment are 7 am to 7 pm which may be extended to 6 am to 11 pm. Basically it goes from Lackabane to Cahernane and Tralee Road to Ballycasheen. There are three buses.

The idea is for people who want to do one or two miles within and around Killarney to leave the car at home.

A good deal of IT savviness is required and not everyone will have smartphones. (Some people are even getting rid of theirs as they are too invasive.) But Local Link manager Alan O'Connell says the service can be booked over the phone to the office in Castleisland.

I sometimes feel we over rely on technology. Tried and tested, simple press releases with basic facts leaving aside the jargon and laying out who, what, where, when and how would get the message across far quicker. Old style bus stops would be a good idea too.

Meanwhile, we need more trains between Killarney and Tralee. Tralee people are socialising in Killarney and vice versa. A later train, say at 11 pm to return to Tralee at 11.30 pm should not be beyond the capability of Irish Rail.

WHEN KILLARNEY DARED, EAGLES SOARED

One project that managed to get off the ground and soar in Killarney is the white-tailed sea eagle reintroduction. Two decades ago, the town and its representatives stood up against fairly strong opposition, including heavyweight political.

Up to 150 white-tailed sea eagles now take to the skies here, as the final year of a reintroduction programme kicks to touch.

It is a huge turnaround from the rain soaked June day

in Farranfore airport in 2007 when the Air France plane from Trondheim in Norway touched down.

After an absence from Ireland of 100 years, the first white-tailed sea eagles had arrived.

More than 100 farmers protested outside the airport because they had not been consulted about the birds, which could prey on their stock.

The yellow beaked 15 eaglets were between four to nine weeks and project co-ordinator Dr Allan Mee accompanied them from Norway along with National Parks and Wildlife Service district conservation officer Frank McMahon.

Mayor of Killarney Sheila Casey greeted the arrivals, along with Killarney

town clerk Michael O'Leary and several tourism representatives and representatives of the NPWS.

The town council and local tourism bodies had heavily sponsored the project, staking their necks on the delivery for wildlife as well as tourism.

Chairman of the White-tailed Eagle Support Group Jerry O'Grady, had to battle for the project on several fronts including against fairly vocal and united opposition by the Healy-Rae dynasty.

Eamon Meskell who was manager of Killarney National Park and was also on tarmac in Farranfore in 2007. The then town council support was pivotal and vital as

the NPWS was not at all as strong a force back then. I covered a number of packed meetings where there was open antagonism in Killarney and Tralee. The late Jackie Healy-Rae TD was very much against it. He arrived into the Earl of Desmond of an evening waving a paper cutting about a baby stolen by an eagle near Glenflesk. The story was 100 years old.

Then a councillor, Michael Healy-Rae, weighed in strongly at county council meetings warning about eagles stealing lambs and saying Killarney Town Council for delivering 10,000 euro to the project was "away with the birds". Now that Killarney's success with the eagles is the envy of Europe, might it be said the birds have come home to roost?

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Endangered Natterjack Toads released into the Wild in Kerry

Minister of State for Nature, Heritage and Biodiversity, Christopher O'Sullivan, took part in the release of over 2,000 endangered Natterjack Toadlets into the wild in Castlegregory, Co. Kerry, marking another milestone in a long-running conservation project to save Ireland's rarest amphibian.

Unique to the Castlemaine Harbour and Castlegregory coastal region, the Natterjack Toad has faced population decline due to habitat loss and changing agricultural practices. Since 2016, the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) has partnered with Fota Wildlife Park and Oceanworld Dingle to combat this decline through a conservation technique known as "headstarting."

Headstarting involves collecting spawn from the wild, rearing the toads in controlled conditions at Fota Wildlife Park, and releasing them back into their natural habitat postmetamorphosis. This method dramatically improves survival rates, lowering mortality to just 25%. Over 13,000 toadlets have now been released since the project began.

Minister O'Sullivan praised the collaborative efforts, said, "this headstarting programme provides a much-needed boost to its small population... NPWS, Fota Wildlife Park, and local conservation groups like the Maharees Conservation Association are working together to steer the species towards recovery."

Danny O'Keefe, Regional Manager, NPWS said: "The Natterjack is a species unique to this area and the annual release of toadlets always generates huge enthusiasm among communities here around the coast of Kerry. The quality of the habitat is an important factor in the survival of the species long term. I would like to pay tribute to the Maharees Conservation Association, Oceanworld Dingle and other local groups for their efforts in conservation of the beautiful dunes and local biodiversity here in Kerry."

Kevin Flannery, Director of Oceanworld, Dingle, said:"I am delighted to be involved with this important conservation project. My colleagues and I at Oceanworld Dingle have a long association with NPWS and this vital conservation initiative and we look forward to that collaboration continuing. Its importance for the species and the local habitat cannot be overstated."

Oisín Lynch Finishes 5th in European U20 Semi-Final

Irish international middle-distance runner Oisín Lynch, representing Killarney Valley AC, delivered another strong performance at the European U20 Athletics Championships, in Tampere, Finland finishing 5th in his semi-final of the 800m on Thursday. Clocking 1:50.88, Oisin demonstrated consistency and class on the continental stage. Though just shy of qualifying for the final, the experience adds another valuable milestone in his international career while wearing the Irish vest.

This season, the talented Kerry native has already clocked a personal best

of 1:48.00 over 800m, underlining his potential as he continues his progression toward senior competition.

Oisín is currently on an athletics scholarship at Adams State College in Colorado, where he will return following the championships. Looking ahead, he has set his sights on a major goal for the 2026 indoor and outdoor seasons - breaking the prestigious 4-minute barrier for the mile.

Oisín Lynch is certainly one to watch on Ireland's middle-distance scene.

PARISH MISSION PLANNED FOR SEPTEMBER



"An idea was put forward at a parish council meeting, that we as the Killarney community, should undertake a Redemptorist Mission. The council unanimously ran with this idea and have been busy putting plans in place to host this big event." said Fr. O' Brien "It is time for us to come together as a Killarney people, to pray, to reflect, to unite and to take time out to revive our own spiritual journeys".

The mission, which will be led by the Redemptorist team, headed up by Fr. Laurence Gallagher, will have a little something for everyone. "There will be time to remember our faithful departed, to celebrate the sacrament of Baptism, to reflect and heal from our own hurts and worries, and much more" said Fr. Kieran.

All of the schools in the parish will play a big part in the Mission, and in fact all of the local primary schools began some preparatory art work in June! All of the schools will have a Mass celebrated during the Mission, and pupils from St. Bridgid's and St. Brendan's will act as ushers at the nightly service. Sheila Goulding, who was

commissioned as a lay Pastoral leader at the beginning of the year reflected. "How uplifting it will be to have such involvement from our youth. The school staff and the pupils have all been so welcoming of any idea we put forward. The willingness to participate, the joy of the youth at the prospect of the Mission has been positively heart warming to say the least."

A full schedule of events will be distributed to each home in the Parish over the coming weeks, and there will be lots of information on the Killarney Parosh Facebook page - so keep your eyes peeled! The cathedral will have Mass at 7am and 10am, an evening session at 7pm and the Church of the Resurrection will have daily Mass at 9.30am. There will be a host of other special events - something for everyone! One of the highlights of the Mission is expected to by the final night, where the parish council is hoping that groups from all over the parish will be represented. "We are looking from groups from all walks of life" says Fr. Kieran . " We are calling you to action! If you are a group in our parish, perhaps it's a sporting club, a charitable organisation, a school, a music group, a volunteer group - we want you to get in touch! The final night will be centred on the theme 'Celebrating Community'. If your group would like to be included please email killarney@ dioceseofkerry.ie before Tuesday August 19th, with community groups in subject title, and include the name of your group and what the



nature of the group is, and some one will be in touch from the parish team."

Fr. Kieran finishes with a little glint of mischief in his eye saying "Don't be shy! Come forward! Your community needs you! Like the Kerry people flocked to the homecoming of the Kerry team two weeks ago, I hope our community comes out united in a sense of pride and prayer. I am sure like always, our parish and our parishioners will rise to the occasion and make it a very special week - one to remember!"

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL HONOURS DESCENDANTS OF DANIEL O'CONNELL WITH CIVIC RECEPTION

Kerry County Council has honoured the descendants and family of Daniel O'Connell with a Civic Reception, marking the 250th anniversary of the Liberator's birth in his hometown of Caherriyeen.

The ceremony took place on Wednesday afternoon at The Old Abbey, following a State-led commemoration earlier in the day at Derrynane House. The event served as a poignant moment of remembrance and reflection, celebrating O'Connell's enduring legacy as one of Ireland's foremost political leaders.

The Civic Reception, the highest honour that Kerry County Council can bestow, was symbolised through the presentation of official scrolls. Michael O'Connell, representing the custodians of the O'Connell family home at Cahran, and Daniel O'Connell, representing the wider family and descendants, each received the honour in recognition of their ongoing connection to O'Connell's heritage.

Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr. Michael Foley, led the ceremony alongside Cllr. Norma Moriarty, Cathaoirleach of the Kenmare Municipal District. Also addressing the gathering were Minister for Culture, Communications and Sport, Patrick O'Donovan, and Taoiseach Micheál Martin. The event drew a significant presence of dignitaries and public figures, including Members of Kerry County Council, Minister Norma Foley, Ministers of State Kevin Moran and Michael Healy-Rae, Chief Executive of Kerry County Council Fearghal Reidy, members of the Council Executive, and Bishop of Kerry Ray Browne.

Earlier in the day, Taoiseach Micheál Martin and Minister O'Donovan laid wreaths at the O'Connell grave, followed by the unveiling of a commemorative Blue Plaque at the 18th-century Penal Chapel where Daniel O'Connell was baptised. The Civic Reception was a central highlight of O'Connell 250, a three-day programme of events commemorating the life and legacy of Daniel O'Connell, born on August 6, 1775. Known as "The Liberator," O'Connell played a pivotal role in Catholic Emancipation and the advancement of democratic ideals in Ireland.



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






Making a difference...

Caoimhe Sets Up Project to Help the Ballymun Community



Killarney School teacher Caoimhe Lynch never rests on her laurels! If she isn't conducting the Kingdom Choir, she is involved in faith camp, but in recent years, Caoimhe who is based in Ballymun in Dublin has made an enormous impact on the community in which she now lives. In this week's Killarney Outlook, Caoimhe shares the story of The Light House Project in Ballymun, an organisation which she founded and which is becoming a lifeline for many residents in the northside community.

In 2022 I was placed in a secondary school in Ballymun for my teaching placement, teaching English and Religion. While Ballymun is such a beautiful, vibrant community with people with the biggest hearts, there is also so much trauma, poverty, addiction, and crime in the area, you can't teach in the community and not notice it. And for a lot of my students, that's their reality - that's their life. Some of those kids come into school to feel loved, to feel safe and to feel seen. When I was younger, music, singing and stageschool were my outlet. I went from activity to activity after school and I made so many friends and got to nurture my talents and what I was good at, in a safe and happy environment. These activities kept me busy and gave me so much joy, and a real sense of belonging. So I decided to bring that to Ballymun - to run activities to give people in the community a sense of purpose, in a space that they can come as they are and feel seen and valued. The main thing was that all the activities would be free of charge, so that fees would never be a barrier for anyone. So I set up an organisation called "The Light House Project". I didn't know what I was going to do with it, but I knew my mission was to love, and I knew anything ran by love would flourish. LIGHT stood for - Lead, Inspire, Grow, Help, Transform. And that is our mission!

The Light House Project is a place where we get to serve people in the community of Ballymun. The aim of the project is to show love to those



we encounter. We might not always know what people are going through, but I wanted everyone who comes, to feel seen, valued and loved. While we run many activities and events, these activities are only a tool that we use to fulfil our mission - our real mission is building relationships and connections with people. That is what is most important. We are here to be "one good person" in people's lives whether it is to the children, the teens, or the adults in the community and to remind each person of their worth.

I started off by setting up a teens "ballad group", then that led to setting up one for adults. Both ballad groups were so committed, and so talented, and we were asked to sing at so many local events and the name of the "Light House Project" began to be known in the community.

Then I wanted to bring music to the young kids in the area, so I asked friends to help me and I set up a children's gospel choir that runs on a Friday after school.

In school, I teach English and religion, and in my English classes I do journaling and poetry writing with the teenagers. Where I give them a prompt and they journal based on the prompt, or write a poem about a certain theme or topic. I could see how much the kids were getting out of it- it was a space for them to express their feelings on paper and the feedback from the teenagers was telling me, this is something special. So I started a journaling club and a poetry group after school in IKEA restaurant. Then we saw interest by adults, so we started running journaling classes for adults.

People began to show interest in the mission of the project, and wanted to get involved. Fast forward two years, and I now have an amazing team of Volunteers who help me run activities and events in the community. We organise mental health workshops, an annual "Darkness Into Light" walk, and retreats for both teenagers and adults. We run 2 pilgrimages to Medjugorje each year - one for adults, and one for young

people aged 16-19. We run our adults trip at Easter, and the young people go as a part of Fr. Jim Linehan's group during the summer, with local Killarney people who show such love and kindness to the young people for the week. We are just back from our third summer pilgrimage, and the teenagers absolutely loved it, they always get so much from it - it really is such an amazing week led by two amazing priests - Fr. Jim Linehan and Fr Mark Moriarty, and it is extra special for me, as it links the two communities I am part of. September 2025 will be a busy month as we have a teens book club, a youth choir, a rainbows group for people experiencing grief and family breakdown, and a volunteering programme all starting up. Our volunteering programme will be a 12 week programme getting teens to volunteer at 12 different charities and they will have to do a project on their volunteer work which they will present at their graduation at the end of the 12 weeks.

The most important part of The Light House Project isn't the activities we run - it's the connection and relationships we foster. I always smile when I see the kids, the teens, and the adults faces light up when they arrive to whatever we organise - because our whole mission is based on relationships. It really is magic , and it's magic that could not happen without the amazing and dedicated people I have around me that help me organise the events and activities in Light House Project.

So many people have so many stresses and upsets in their lives, and The Light House Project is something that brings a beacon of hope to people, a Lighthouse, where we empower people to believe in themselves and know their worth.

Killarney's Phoenix Powerlifting team spent the last number of months preparing for this competition. And it paid off. The club can boast a very successful campaign, with all lifters placing in the top 3 in each of their respective categories.

In the men's section of the competition, Andrew Riordan fought hard to secure a 2nd place finish in his category. Meanwhile, in the woman's sections, there were category wins for Shari Murphy and Leen Qasim, while Brid Horgan finished a close 2nd behind Leen. HOMAGE TO TOMMY 'MULLACH' O'SULLIVAN – The Grotto Builder of Cruach Mhór

quiet and poignant commemoration was held recently at Cronin's Yard, nestled at the base of Corrán Tuathail, honouring the memory of Tommy 'Mullach' O'Sullivan, known locally and affectionately as the Grotto Builder.

In 1975, Tommy singlehandedly built two mountain Grottos , one on Glubba Hill in Ballyledder and another high on Cruach Mhór as a tribute to his late mother. Hauling sand, cement, and water up steep, rugged paths after long days working with local farmers, Tommy's devotion was legendary.

Fifty years on, the people of Tuogh parish, a place rich in the dialect of "bog, hay and sheep," gathered to remember a man as "good as two men," whose work has become part of the mountain's quiet spirituality. The idea to honour Tommy came from Davy Leane, who knew him and the mountain well. During the commemoration, a rare photo of Tommy was unveiled by John Cronin, and poetry and song filled the air including, 'Tommy the Grotto Builder', a new poem recited by Thomas O'Sullivan, Coomapéiste, a haunting original song by Gail O'Donoghue,

Blessings and reflections from Michael O'Sullivan and a special mention for another Michael O'Sullivan of Ballyledder, who still tends the whitewashed Grotto on Glubba Hill.

As dusk fell and fog wrapped the mountain, guests were welcomed into Cronin's Yard for blúiríní blasta, tasty morsels rounding off a night steeped in memory and meaning.





EXERCISE FOR HEALTHY AGEING -FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQ)

Q4: How often should I exercise?

Ideally, older adults should aim to be active most days of the week, building up to about 150 minutes of moderate activity each week. That might look like 30 minutes a day, five days a week. Adding two days of muscle-strengthening activity is also beneficial. But even short sessions of 10 to 15 minutes can add up and make a real difference.

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SCRATCHED CORNEA

A scratched cornea is one of . A feeling that there is the most common types of eye injury

What is the cornea?

The cornea is the clear front part of the eye. This part of the eye is packed with nerves - it has many more nerve endings than your fingertips. This is why a scratched cornea can be very uncomfortable. However, this discomfort will only last a short time while the eye heals.

What should I do if I scratch my cornea?

A corneal abrasion is a common eye injury.

If you are experiencing any eye pain or discomfort, or you suspect vou have a corneal abrasion, you should always consult your optometrist for advice.

What causes a corneal abrasion?

A corneal abrasion normally happens after an accident or injury to the front of the eye. They are often caused by fingernails, or an accident in the home or while gardening. Sometimes, if a small piece of grit gets trapped in your eye, rubbing the eye or blinking may cause a corneal abrasion.

What are the symptoms of a corneal abrasion?

There are several symptoms associated with corneal abrasion, and you may only experience a few, but they can include:

· Pain, which may feel worse when you open or close your

- something in your eye or
- · Your eyes watering far more than usual
- Redness
- Sensitivity to light
- Blurred vision or loss of vision

How long does it take to heal?

Corneal abrasions will normally heal completely within 48 hours. If the abrasion is in the centre of the cornea, your vision may be slightly blurred. It is also normal that your eye will be a little red and you may find bright lights uncomfortable until the abrasion has healed.

Treatment

You may be given lubricating drops (artificial tear drops, gel or ointment) to make your eye feel more comfortable and help to keep it moist.

You may be given antibiotic drops or ointment to stop the abrasion becoming infected. These aren't always needed.

The following may also help:

- Over-the-counter painkillers such as paracetamol will help with the pain
- Avoid rubbing or touching your eye as this may make the abrasion worse or slow down the rate of healing
- Wearing sunglasses may help if you are sensitive to light

If your vision starts to become more blurred, or if the pain and redness increase, you should get advice from your optometrist. If they are not available, go to A&F.







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VODAFONE BILLS

The announcement of the withdrawal of payment facilities for i human beings" stated Deputy Cahill. Vodafone customer bills from the nationwide An Post network has been condemned by Kerry Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill, as another snub to the residents of rural Ireland.

Deputy Cahill is a long time campaigner for the retention of services in country areas, particularly Post Offices, shops and pubs, which he believes to be a vital part of a living community and part of our social

"People living in country areas need to meet up with neighbours and friends and our Post Offices, shop and pub are where this now happens. The less services that are being carried by An Post network, the more likely quieter outlets will close down, leaving already isolated people in a near state of quarantine. We are a social animal and our health both physical and mental requires us to be out and about meeting other

"I am somewhat taken aback that such a large company as Vodafone, which has an enormous customer base countrywide, would pull out of An Post, leaving many of their clientele in the lurch and putting the future of our Post Offices in jeopardy" said Deputy Cahill, Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People and Tourism.

"I am aware of a number of Post Offices that have sadly closed in recent times. Our Post Offices need to be and must be supported. I have attended many meetings with An Post in recent months and this is a hammer blow" stated a very annoyed Deputy Cahill.

"I will be pleading with Vodafone management to rescind this decision and I will also be in contact with the Communications Regulator to clarify the legality of the move" added Michael Cahill TD.

GOVERNMENT **OWNED PROPERTY**

A Kerry Fianna Fáil TD has submitted a number of Parliamentary Questions to the Taoiseach and all of his Ministers, requesting a list of all properties in the county, owned or in the control of each Government Department, which are unoccupied/unused at present. Deputy Michael Cahill seeks to unearth any sites or buildings that could reasonably be brought in to play for building or converting to badly needed homes for the people of County Kerry.

"I am aware and indeed I suspect there are a large number of sites and buildings that are available to Government Departments, that are quietly under the radar and would be more than suitable to facilitate an awful lot of badly needed affordable and social housing units, along with low cost sites in Kerry" stated Deputy Cahill, Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People and Tourism.

"Every additional house that can be provided efficiently and affordably, would be a bonus and I believe we should leave no stone unturned to do so. Lands and properties around our towns and villages are at a premium and if we find there are a quantity of them already in Government ownership, that would allow a relatively smooth path to the construction of homes for the people of Kerry" said the Rossbeigh Teachta

"I believe this list could be a source of a good number of new builds for Kerry, all over the county and will bring homes and happiness to many people on our waiting lists" added Michael Cahill TD.

Minister Foley confirms €25,000 in additional funding for Kerry Recreation and Sports **Partnership**

Minister Foley said Kerry Recreation and Sports Partnership would now get a further €25,000 in funding from the Dormant Accounts Fund to help boost disabled people's involvement in sport.

"This funding for sports inclusion disability projects will help Kerry Recreation and Sports Partnership to continue the great work it is doing throughout Kerry."

Uisce Éireann's Leakage Reduction Programme continues as Crohane, Dromkerry set to benefit

Uisce Éireann has recently commenced works in Crohane, Dromkerry to reduce high levels of leakage in the area and improve the resilience of the network, enabling the local community to thrive. The works will take place from the junction of the N72 at Crohane along the L-11012



Gortacollopa, Fossa and involve the replacement of 1.8 kilometres of aged water mains prone to bursts with new pipes.

Commenting on the project, Programme Manager at Uisce Éireann, Jack Cronin said: "The section of water mains in Crohane, Dromkerry was prioritised for investment and replacement by Uisce Éireann due to its age and deteriorating condition. These improvements to the water network are critical and we are delighted to progress these upgrades for the local community, providing them with a more secure and reliable water supply that will also reduce leakage and strengthen the water network for generations to come." "We would like to thank customers in advance for their support and patience while we complete these essential works," said Mr Cronin.

The project is being carried out by Ward and Burke Construction Ltd on behalf of Uisce Éireann and works are expected to be completed by the end of August 2025. The works may involve some shortterm water interruptions, and the project team will ensure that customers are given a minimum of 48 hours' notice prior to any planned disruption. This project will be delivered as part of Uisce Éireann's national Leakage Reduction Programme which continues to deliver significant benefits to communities across Ireland, including improved water quality, provision of a more resilient and sustainable water supply for customers, and considerable water savings.

Mandatory cardiac screening could save young people's lives – Kennelly

The National Screening Advisory Committee (NSAC) should seek the introduction of mandatory cardiac screening for young athletes aged 14 to 18, a Fine Gael Senator and Councillor have said.

Senator Mike Kennelly and Councillor Aoife Kennelly said early detection using ECG testing could prevent sudden adult death syndrome (SADS) and identify conditions in young people before they become fatal.

"In Ireland, about 100 young people die every year from SADS", said Senator Kennelly.

"Shockingly, heart conditions are among the leading causes of sudden death among young athletes.

"Many conditions remain undiagnosed in young people due to their silent nature. We don't expect young athletes to have hidden conditions and there are no symptoms or warnings, yet the consequences can be devastating.

"We need to see mandatory screening introduced through schools and sports clubs to ensure we catch any issues as early as possible. "NSAC must look into how a screening programme like this could potentially be carried out. If we can get local schools and sports clubs to arrange screening, we could save many young lives.

"We've seen the incredible work the Dillon Quirke Foundation has done in memory of Dillon who died from SADS. They have already screened more than 10,000 young people, identifying 243 who required further cardiac evaluation. But we can't leave all the work up to them, we need to play our part.

"The cost of inaction is measured in lost lives, grief-stricken families and communities devastated by preventable tragedies. We owe it to the families who have lost loved ones and to those who could be spared the heartbreak to act now before another young life is lost.

"Proactive measures save lives, we need to see this introduced to ensure we give our young athletes a chance at a long and active life", said Senator Kennelly.

Councillor Aoife Kennelly said: "It is absolutely essential that we see a national cardiac screening programme for children aged 14 to 18. Screening our young athletes should be a right, not a privilege.

"Early detection can be the difference between life and death. We need to see everyone, the NSAC, sports clubs, and schools get on board to ensure this happens.

"Cardiac screening is quick and easy and I encourage all young people who have concerns to get checked out", concluded Councillor Kennelly.

Welcome for Funding and Contract Extension for Social Farming Initiatives in Kerry

"These organisations have been pioneers in delivering social farming in rural communities, offering meaningful and therapeutic farming experiences to individuals from a wide variety of backgrounds, including those with disabilities, mental health challenges, and other support needs."

Deputy Cahill has worked closely with Noel Spillane and Joe McCrohan of SKDP in progressing the Social Farming initiative and has seen first-hand the positive impact this model has had in rural Kerry. "We were proud to host Minister of State Micheál Moynihan in South Kerry to witness the transformative work being done through social farming," Cahill continued. "The evidence speaks for itself, this model changes lives and strengthens communities."

Councillor Tommy Cahill "This is a prime example of a community-based project that delivers tangible social and mental health benefits while supporting the sustainability of rural life and family farms," he said. "Both I and my father will continue to lobby and work with all the relevant stakeholders to ensure that this model not only continues but receives the increased investment it deserves."

Deputy Cahill concluded by stating, "This is a good day for Kerry, a good day for rural Ireland, and a good day for all those who benefit from the Social Farming model. I will continue to champion this initiative and ensure its future growth and sustainability."

Councillor Cahill Welcomes LIS Funding But Says It's Only a Fraction of What Kerry Needs


Fianna Fáil Kerry County Councillor Tommy Cahill has today welcomed the announcement of over €2.2 million in funding for local roads and laneways in County Kerry under the 2025 Local Improvement Scheme (LIS) but warned that the allocation falls well short of what's needed to address the growing backlog of rural roads across the county. The announcement includes an additional €1,202,000 in funding for Kerry, confirmed by Minister Dara Calleary, bringing this year's total to €2,225,479.

Councillor Cahill said that while the extra funding is positive, it only scratches the surface of the problem. "This funding is welcome, any investment in our rural road network is progress, but let's be honest - this is only a fraction of what we need to clear the long list of applications here in Kerry," he said. "There are still over 600 local roads and laneways across the county waiting for upgrade works. At the current rate, we're barely making a dent."

"My father has made this a top priority in the Programme for Government, and continues to press for greater investment in rural infrastructure like this," he said. "He knows, as do I, just how vital access is for people living and working in rural parts of Kerry.








Kerry FC were back at home for the second Friday of four weeks as they took on Finn Harps of Ballybofey in Mounthawk Park. Kerry FC looked like they were turning a corner in form with four points in the Bank Holiday weekend, with a win against Athlone and a draw against Treaty United on Monday evening. They started the same eleven in both games, so a few changes were expected for Friday evening to prevent burnout. For Finn Harps, they had managed just the one win since late June and see themselves slipping down the pecking order in the league table as of late. Both Kerry FC and Finn Harps were level on points going into the game, with seventh place up for grabs; it could be a tough battle in store. The first opportunity of the game came to the

visitors from Donegal after nine minutes. A loose pass from Idir Yacine Zerrouck came all the way out to Oran Brogan, who took the shot on first time, but his fine effort was thankfully stopped by Matthew Connor.

The first chance for Kerry FC would come just

eight minutes later, a free kick by the halfway line from Oran Crowe was delivered on top of Harps keeper Lorenzo Piaia Barbosa, who made a meal of his collection. The ball was eventually cleared, and a stop to play was made due to a head clash, taking the sting out of the attack for Kerry.

A moment of surprise came a minute later as Robbie Cleary was judged to have fouled a Harps player with the possibility of a break on. The moment that referee Daryl Carolan blew his whistle, the moans could be heard from downtown Tralee. Had he not blown a big chance could have been on for the hosts.

Kerry FC's biggest chance of the half came in the twenty-sixth minute. A great delivery from the left wing from Ronan Teahan found the head of Robbie Cleary inside the six-yard box, but Barbosa saved it. His header was aimed at the ground and took away most of the challenge for Barbosa to save.

Just a couple of minutes after Cleary's effort, Conor Tourish was denied at the other end by Matthew Connor, who was putting in a fantastic performance inside the opening half an hour. Tourish was in on goal from close range, but Connor was on hand to keep the score level.

On the half-hour mark, Sean McGrath went off injured due to a tackle from Shaunie Bradley, who was very lucky to escape with just a yellow card. Referee Daryl Carola and his linesman did some deliberating but thought the yellow was the correct decision to the bemusement of the Mounthawk Park crowd.

Most of the action in the first half was in the opening half an hour, with the final fifteen minutes of the half being quite scrappy, with very

little going on for either side


Daniel Okwute replaced Kennedy Amechi at halftime and nearly made an instant impact just three minutes into the second half. A great piece of skill from Okwute opened up space for a shot for himself, but it unfortunately went over the crossbar.

Kerry FC would soon regret not capitalising at that stage because just five minutes into the second half, Finn Harps would take the lead. A corner whipped in from the left side found Kieran Cooney, who rose highest to head Harps into an early second-half lead.

The chances for Kerry FC for the majority of the second half were few and far between. The possession stat was the only one they were covering for the majority of the second half, to the dismay of the home crowd.

Deep into injury time, Daniel Okwute received a straight red card for a high foot. The decision was instant, as it had been all night for the visitors. Kerry FC tried late on to get back into the game, but nothing was working, and after six minutes of added time, the whistle blew with Harps taking the three points back to Donegal.

Kerry FC now look ahead to the next round of the Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup, where they take on Cobh Ramblers back home once again in Mounthawk Park next Friday night in what is sure to be a fantastic occasion, as it coincides with the Rose of Tralee festivities in the town.

EAST KERRY BOARD CENTENARY

Let's take a trip down memory lane. Well, not quite living memory, I expect. Let's scan through a few faded old photos and dusty records and try to draw a living, breathing picture of East Kerry back in 1925.

I know that vague image in your head. Indoor plumbing and electricity....yeah, the townies had some chance but God be with the culchies. Far more farming than commerce anyway, but Killarney was a busy town for the times Mind you, plenty of townies kept pigs, I heard a story one time of people living in the cottages in Glebe Lane who kept cows and would walk it to eat grass on the road verges during the day – I don't know if that's true, but it's quite believable for the time.

There was a higher rate of literacy than you think. Secondary school was unaffordable for most, but the primary schools were genuinely excellent. Mind you, the history curriculum relied a bit too heavily on hoary celtic myths, there was a rush to revisionism in a fledgeling nation. Killarney was still dominated benevolently by the Earls of Kenmare, the Grosnevors. People devoured newspapers. Political allegiances were mostly inherited, but people were very much politically aware. De Valera, loved by many but despised by many more, had his famous idea of comely maidens dancing at the crossroads (he actually made that speech in 1941, even as dancehalls were beginning to take over). He got many, many things right, but his insular vision for Ireland would stifle us economically. Frankly, the vast majority of Ireland was poor, and support for the poor was woefully inadequate. The celtic revival had not really influenced popular music and dancing all that much, but East Kerry has always been blessed in that regard through Sliabh Luachra. The likes of Pádraig O'Keeffe, Denis Murphy, his sister Julia Clifford, Johnny O'Leary....music and laughter were more common staples than you think. For that matter, for those young people who could afford it, there was a new dance craze imported from the US that was all the rage. You think punk or hip hop had cultural ramifications when they emerged? Jazz was a riot of sound and colour that infuriated conservative elders - which, of course, made young people adore it all the more.

Killarney didn't have a cinema just yet, but local councillor Tom Cooper was thinking about it. He would open the Casino Cinema in 1930 before going on to produce and direct 'The Dawn'.

The topic of that movie was one fictional family's

involvement in the Fenian Uprising. Given the subject matter, he wasn't making that movie in 1925! Kerry and Cork had been enormously active during the War of Independence and the Civil War....it remains truly astonishing that the justified bitterness on both sides (awful things have been documented by far better people than me; I'll not narrate any of those stories just now, although I believe it's important that the history be remembered so that hopefully it will never be repeated) did not linger far longer. The GAA was a big reason why - the organisation was strongly pro-nationalist, but staunchly resisted IRA dominance despite several attempts to take it over – with the active participation of some prominent republicans in Kerry. They never succeeded, and Free Staters and Republicans in Kerry could (and did) discuss the Kerry team amicably. Sounds like a small thing? It really wasn't, not in that climate.

The GAA was beginning to really thrive in Kerry, having been in dire straits at the turn of the century. A lot of the credit has to go to the County Secretary, Din Joe Bailey. More has to go to John Joe Sheehy, arguably Kerry"s most prominent republican, and Free State captain Con Brosnan. Both of them saw atrocities during the Civil War, but put their differences aside on the field of play.

In 1924 Kerry had invited a medical officer with St. Finans Mental Hospital, himself a noted athlete and son of one of Kerry's greatest, to train the Kerry team. Dr. Eamonn O'Sullivan wouldn't actually graduate until 1925, but he already knew his stuff. John Joe Sheehy famously emerged from the crowd, despite being on the run. Brosnan, who never allowed politics into the dressing room (a wise choice, most of the Kerry team were IRA supporters) had brokered a truce. Kerry beat Tipperary,

Cork, Clare, Mayo, and finally Dublin (that game actually took place in April, Kerry having lost the 1923 All Ireland Final to Dublin the previous September).

Which brings us to the 1925 All Ireland. Lads, I'd say fasten seatbelts for this one!

I'd argue that was as good a team as Kerry ever produced. Jack Sheehy in goal. Joe Barrett full back, Phil the Master in the corner. A half back line of Paul Russell, Jack Walsh, and Pluggy Moriarty. Brosnan and Stack in midfield. Up front Mundy Prendiville, only just ordained (he was expelled from All Hallows, allegedly for sneaking out to play in an All Ireland - All Hallows have a different version only to complete his studies in St. Peters and eventually become Archbishop of Perth), with Tom Moriarty and John Joe Sheehy on either side. Jackie Ryan, the Baileys, the eldest of the Landers brothers....every one of them had football, and Dr. Eamonn knew how to bring it out

Fine start. Goals from the Bailey brothers James and John and Bill 'Lang' Landers saw off Tipperary. Cork up next. That was a serious Cork team, but 2-4 from John Joe Sheehy and 1-2 from Tom O'Mahony gave Kerry a surprisingly comfortable victory. We need not say too much about an unfortunate Clare in the Munster Final – Kerry scored five goals and Clare couldn't raise a single flag.

On to the business end. This is where things get....interesting! Cavan were a serious power at the time – Jim Smith is almost definitely the greatest footballer that you have never heard of - and had real ambitions. They lorded Ulster and would win three All Irelands in the 1930s. Kerry eventually prevailed in a great contest by a single point, 1-7 to 2-3.

At which point, Cavan lodged an objection, stating that Phil 'The Master' O'Sullivan was illegal, having already played twice that year with Dublin clubs. It was true, of course, but it was true of half the players in Ireland. Kerry were unhappy about the objection. Central Council upheld the objection. Kerry decided the same sauce would do for goose as gander and pointed out that two Cavan players were illegal. It was a heated meeting, to say the least. Historian Dr. Richard McElligott notes that the Munster Secretary was supposed to have called Cavan 'a bunch of beggarmen' and that Dick Fitzgerald supposedly remarked that "Craig (Prime Minister of Northern Ireland) was not rubbing it in hard enough on us". Not so much oil on troubled waters as napalm!

Right, said Central Council, ye're both expelled. Mayo had beaten Wexford in the other semifinal, so Mayo were declared to be champions. Hold your horses, it gets even better. You see, gaelic football was not quite in tune with the calendars in those days, so Mayo had been representing Connaught as the 1924 provincial winners. The 1925 Connaught Final was yet to be played, and when it was, Galway defeated Mayo. Galway and Mayo were invited to a Central Council meeting. Mayo were anxious to make the train home that night; Galway had booked a hotel. Mayo left, probably assuming that President Paddy Breen would impose some semblance of common sense. Good luck

with that – Mayo's delegates found out the next day that Galway were All Ireland champions by default. The first Connaught county to 'win' an All Ireland. Embarrassing all round. Poor Paddy Breen, a decent man and early opponent of the ban on foreign games, only lasted two years as GAA President. People in Kerry, Mayo, and Wexford (Breen had won All Irelands with both Dublin and Wexford) will say it was two years too long.

The Kerry Juniors, including Dicko Clifford and future Olympian Eamonn Fitzgerald, lost out to Cork in the Munster semi-final.

After a five year lapse, the Senior County Championship was started again. Only five teams entered, Tralee, Killarney, Cahirsiveen, Dingle, and Listowel. The Tralee Mitchels, unsurprisingly, beat Listowel in the final – Mitchels would dominate Kerry GAA so much that in three years time, they would be split into three strong clubs. I should say that the 1925 County Final took place in April 1927.

It was at local level that Kerry GAA was beginning a change that would prove seismic. I will quote the Laune Rangers website on the history of the matter. The Laune Rangers website, by the by, is quite possibly the most comprehensive history of Kerry football year by year that I have ever come across. It is more comprehensive - not equal to, more than a search through the library records of newspapers at the time. A truly astonishing work. There is sme talk that one of the club's most prominent stalwarts has been asked by the County Board to help compile a history of Kerry football - said individual is one of the giants of Kerry GAA in my honest opinion and I certainly hope it is true.

The Terrace Talk website of Alan Groarke, originally set up to archive Weeshie Fogarty's TerraceTalk radio programme, is another brilliant resource and contains Austin Stacks' man Tim Slattery's stats on Kerry teams.

"The Annual Convention of the Kerry Co. Board was held in the Courthouse, Tralee on Sat. 28th March. A Listowel motion to divide the county into four divisions (North, South, East and West), each area to form a Divisional

Board and be responsible for the running of championships, etc. was passed. It was decided to have sub-boards in Tralee, Killarney, Dingle, Cahersiveen and Listowel and that the selection committee for the Co. Senior Football team would be composed of a representative from each of those areas together with a chairman appointed by the Co. Board (Tom Costello)."

The inaugural meeting of the East-Kerry Divisional League was held in the Central Club, Killarney on Sun. 17th May. There were delegates from Killarney, Currow, Farranfore, Firies, Kenmare, Headford, Kilcummin and Killorglin. The following officers were elected: Chairman – Dick Fitzgerald (Dr. Crokes), Vice-Chairman – Humphrey Murphy (Currow), Hon. Secretaries – Paul Russell (Dr. Crokes) and Michael O Leary (do.), Treasurers – Con Healy, Killarney and Pat O Mahony (do.). Draws were made for the League/Championship.

Kilcummin would go on to win that first ever East Kerry Senior League. The whole reason why Listowel had proposed the motion was because they had established the first Town League in Kerry football and it had attracted a huge amount of people to keenly contested games. Realistically, with only five County Championship teams at the time and no county leagues, how many games could an ordinary enough footballer get? With the Town Leagues, plenty. Tralee - and to be fair, Tralee was both the crucible and heartbeat of Kerry GAA at the time – had adopted the Town League system and it had a remarkable, almost transformative effect. Tralee people absolutely loved the game - remember, Kerry had actually worn Mitchels' jerseys (green with a red trim) for their first All Ireland. Now a lot of people had to chance to play it for the sake of pride in their native place. Jerome O'Shea used to say that the dividing line used to be the water pump in the street between 'up the town' and 'down the town'. He was one of the great footballers to learn his craft through those games.

With the founding of the East Kerry Board and a keenly contested East Kerry League, it had the same transformative effect around Killarney. Kerry football was about to enter into a golden

age. Kerry had just played in three All Ireland finals, losing two of them. They were about to play in a lot more, and East Kerry were going to play a big part.

Last Wednesday Uchtaráin CLG Jarlath Burns and an East Kerry delegation were led by a piper along College St. (so named because it was the original location of the Pres. Monastery) to Lana Thai Asian Street Food restaurant to erect a plaque in commemoration. A hundred years ago it was the Central Club, and it was there that the East Kerry Board was formally founded. Little acorns....

Just think about today. Not the Sam Maguire, although it's great to have it back. Not the County Championships, even if East Kerry (4) or Dr. Crokes (4) have won eight of the last ten County Championships. That isn't the point of the East Kerry Board. It's about getting games in a good environment for kids, nurturing skills, fostering community spirit and celebrating community spirit. They have been doing it for a hundred years. I hope they keep doing it over the coming millenia.

OFFALY HOLD OUT TO SEE OFF KERRY CHALLENGE

Camogie Intermediate All Ireland Offaly 0-14 Kerry 0-11

Offaly were a senior side and regularly contesting in the latter stages of the championship a decade ago, and only finally made the drop down to Intermediate in 2023. In fairness, they have blooded a lot of young players both last year and this year, but that core of experience counts when you get to Croke Park and it was no surprise to see the Faithful County make a blistering start. Clodagh Leahy made a deft pick-up and calmly fired the opening score on the turn before adding two frees in as many minutes. Patrice Diggin did open Kerry's account after Amy O'Sullivan was fouled, but Maireád Teehan was on hand at the end of a superb Offaly move to make it 0-4 to 0-1.

Good work by Jackie Horgan allowed Patrice Diggin to double her own and Kerry's tally. Kerry's front players were showing plenty of industry, but with Kerry's half forward line being forced to bail water in an enthralling midfield battle, it meant that they were too isolated for the most part.

Cleary, Leahy, and a roving Grace Tehan were giving Offaly the edge in that midfield battle, despite genuinely heroic work by Patrice Diggin and an outstanding Caoimhe Spillane. Offaly weren't putting it on the scoreboard, though, with four wides on the trot, largely a result of Kerry getting pressure on the shooters. In fact, just on the quarter hour mark another foul on Jackie Horgan that left her limping saw Patrice level matters from a tricky enough angle. 0-4 apiece – it wasn't a fair reflection of the balance of play.

Rachel McCarthy brilliantly managed to flick

the ball away from Codagh Leahy as she started to cut in goal. It came at the expense of a '45 converted by Leahy, but it was well worth it.

Grace Teehan had already had a narrow wide for Offaly, but she made no mistake with her second attempt and they nudged two clear, 0-6 to 0-4.

Kerry had definitely found their feet after those initial nerves and were growing into the game now. Jackie Horgan laid off to Kate Lynch for a superb point from distance before winning another free for Patrice Diggin.

Offaly were stringing some superb passes together, though, and one such move helped Grace Teehan notch her second score. Aoife Liffey split the posts from distance and there were two points between them again. Kerry had the final word, though, with Patrice Diggin pointing from play just before the break.

Half-time Offaly 0-8 Kerry 0-7

There was some great defending on both sides early on the resumption, with the first score taking almost ten minutes to arrive. Great pressure by Jackie Horgan saw Offaly cough up a '45 converted by Patrice and Kerry were back on level terms. The irrepressible Grace Teehan soon hit back, though, and a foul on Mairead Teehan saw Clodagh Leahy make it 0-10 to 0-8 in Offaly's favour.

The pivotal moment arrived as we neared the 45 minute mark. Patrice Diggin's long ball in was cleverly batted down to Jackie Horgan who rounded the last defender and shot to her left, only for a well-positioned goalkeeper Emer Reynolds to parry. Shannon Collins swooped in to try and force the loose ball into an empty net but just couldn't connect cleanly and a defender got back to scoop it out. This time Ellen O'Donoghue won the rebound but with the goalmouth now well guarded, she wisely settled for a point. A good score, and an important score, but it could have been and so very nearly was so much more. As the saving goes, some days you'd have no luck at all if it wasn't for bad luck!

There was still just one point between them, 0-10 to 0-9. Clodagh Leahy soon turned that into two. Kerry's defence, especially Michelle Costello, Sara Murphy, and Rachel McCarthy in the full back line were doing trojan work to keep Offaly at bay.

Patrice Diggin, an absolute dynamo now for Kerry, won and converted another free. Caoimhe Spillane won another, but this time the distance was that little bit too much.

Grace Teehan found a fraction of space to split the posts for a crucial score, and then won a free for Cllodagh Leahy. A goal between them

Kerry absolutely had to get the next score....but it was Grace Teehan again who drew the foul and tapped it over herself. Four points between them, and the last few grains of sand falling down the hourglass....

Patrice Diggin did pick off one last free for Kerry, but that was as good as it got, with Offaly celebrating the Jack McGrath Cup and with it their promotion back to senior ranks. A tough one for a Kerry side who have given it absolutely everything. It will sound like cold enough comfort at a time like this to say that

not only have they done themselves and their county proud, but that they aren't far away from the very top tier in their own right.

ELECTRIC IRELAND MINOR TEAM OF THE YEAR

It's always interesting. I wouldn't say it is always significant or meaningful – I honestly don't know who selected the Minor Team of the Year back in 2018, but literally anyone who had attended the games would have been better. Overall winners Kerry, understandably, had the most players named on that team, and even one or two in the right positions; that was as good as it got. But since then, there has definitely been more thought put into it. In any given year, you could quibble about one or two positions (we can quibble about anything; we are Irish) but the selections tend to be fair and merited.

Are they too heavily balanced in favour of the finalists? Ah, yes, absolutely. This year 13 of the 15 players played in the All Ireland Final. The losing semi-finalists have a player each. It was a more even distribution last year. Finalists Derry and Armagh had 9 players between them, semifinalists Kerry (3 - Kacper Robak, Ben Murphy, and Gearóid White) and Mayo (3) made up the rest. In 2023? Winners Derry had 6 places, losing finalists Mayo had 5. Semi-finalists Kerry had 2 (Ben Murphy and Paddy Lane) and Dublin had 1. Lo and behold, quarter-finalists Mayo had a representative, Eoin McGreal at wing back. Fully deserved, too. But in three years, only one person selected played on a team that didn't reach a semi-final. It feels a little bit unbalanced to me. Players from a county with a strong 'tradition' (as in a populous playing population with a cultural emphasis on the sport, an ongoing commitment to development models, and strong club and school bases) are starting with a huge advantage. To say that there is an unconscious bias in their favour is an understatement.

And I get it, I really do. First of all, a player produces the goods in 7 or 8 games in a row

is going to get more recognition than one and done. Second, absolutely no player gets to feature in the latter stages without being good. If nothing else, there's a deep queue behind them right from the start, whereas for some counties they are mending and making do with what they have got. I'm not being critical, but in five Munster counties, if you are told you could make the hurling panel or the football one, but only one (as is the norm since Tipperary's dual losses in All Ireland minor finals in 2015), almost all players will be bringing their camán to training. That's just how it is.

The thing about it that irks me a bit is that it makes it that little bit harder for the special talents in weaker counties to blossom, and I just think in principle that the sport should be about equal opportunity at the starting level. Think about the Declan Brownes, the Mattie Fordes, the John Galvins....they had to come harder roads in football than any Kerry footballer with less chances of success or recognition. The converse, of course, is true for Kerry hurlers. I'd say few enough people reading this realise how good Michael and Brendan Hennessy or Christy Walsh were.

I'm digressing a bit, but that inclination towards the high profile teams and players continues at higher grades. On rare occasions, media reporters are asked as a collective to select the man of the match recipient (I won't lie; the impact of the ego boost in the press box is like scattering sweets among toddlers, God love us). Now, I always try to do it honestly and I try to select the most influential player over the course of the game. Not the most prolific scorer. Not the producer of the greatest highlight, no matter how spectacular. It can be a man marking job, a playmaker, a sheer dynamic worker that doesn't stop. It can be some-one from the losing side, absolutely. I don't understand why not.

But I want to paint you a possible scenario. I'll be covering club championship games over the next while (obviously; it's going to be all hands on deck. In fact, with so many games going on, we are dependent on PROs to do it justice). So I am likely to be watching county players in club games. Imagine watching Fossa, say, and David Clifford isn't man of the match (I wrote that bit before Fossa's game against Mitchels)? Ballydonoghue and Jason Foley? I could go on. The players themselves wouldn't mind, they really wouldn't.

Another factor is that high profile players make for high profile sports stories. If the likes of David Clifford or Jason Foley stand out in a club game, the national media outlets will buy that story (to be honest, a lot of the online sites that you see just copy them without paying) because their audiences will pay attention. So there's both incentive and pressure to pick the high profile player.

Look, I digress. I should probably have kept these thought to myself until the Senior All Star selection. And in the All Stars, by the way, there used to be a strong pattern of at least one wild card selection that would be highly criticised. Almost foment public fury, if you were to believe the media reports (mmmm.... don't). See, it's always been about attention; that's why there are awards ceremonies in sport besides the medals. Criticism is still attention, and clickbait existed long before you 'clicked' on anything.

Ah, look, this is nothing to do with the players selected here. They did themselves and their counties proud and deserve that acknowledgement.

Incidentally - and this is just a statistical observation, I wouldn't draw any conclusions -Kerry have had three two-time winners in the past three years, Gearóid White ('24, '25), Ben Murphy ('23, '24) and Paddy Lane ('22, '23). All three play with Austin Stacks.

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Group One, Austin Stacks 1-18 Templenoe 1-5

Austin Stacks are right back among the top of the pile in Kerry, making the transition from Intermediate to senior look seamless. They were missing a good few bodies, with the likes of Joe O'Connor and Daniel Kirby only playing a half or less, and they were still in control here throughout. Armin Heinrich burst forward for five points, while Paddy Lane had 1-4 from a roving role. Adrian Spillane got Templenoe's goal early in the second half, but they trailed by seven points at half-time and it always looked too steep a hill to climb.

Group Two, Kenmare Shamrocks

2-20 Dingle 0-13

Dingle were hugely depleted but 0-6 from Conor Geaney had them in the driving seat, leading 0-10 to 0-5 at half-time. However, Kenmare brought on Paul O'Conor at half-time, allowing both Seán O'Shea and Donal Down O'Sullivan to drop a little deeper and Kenmare totally dominated after that, winning the second half by 2-15 to 0-3.

Group Three, Dr. Crokes 2-14 Spa 0-13

Tony Brosnan teed up Gavin O'Shea for an early goal but Spa took control to open up a 0-7 to 1-0 lead, with Dan O'Donoghue, Dara Moynihan and Evan Cronin leading the way. Dr. Crokes didn't get their first point until the 21st minute, but scorer Tony Brosnan had no less than six to his name by half-time. The third quarter was a cracker, Niall McCarthy making some superb catches for Spa. They trailed by 1-8 to 0-10 at that point, but Crokes put on the afterburners at that point, Cian McMahon goaling after more good work by Brosnan, while Spa couldn't deal with Gavin White's pace. There may have been a little bit of rust about their slow start, but the champions clearly aren't going anywhere, while Spa will take a lot of encouragement from a good overall display.

INTERMEDIATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Group One, Fossa 2-19 John Mitchels 1-11

One particular Fossa forward caught the eye. Ted O'Gorman played Corn uí Mhuirí for St. Brendans last year and has really blossomed as a football, ending up with five points to his name. Oh veah, a certain David Clifford did alright as well, kicking 1-6 from play in the first half alone. Look, practically every national newspaper had a photo of David on Monday morning. He finished with 1-8. Mitchels did what they could, they really did, but what can you actually do? Mitchels' Cian Holden gave

them hope in the first half with a slightly lucky goal. Minutes later David was slicing in to drill to the net. He set up Matt Rennie for another one in the second half. I repeat, what can you actually do? I'd be amazed if Fossa don't qualify from here, and Kilcumin are obviously in pole position to join them.

Group Two, Laune Rangers 2-15 Killarney Legion 1-13

A tough one for Legion; a great win for Laune Rangers. Legion made a very strong start with Denis Sheahan's goal and Ryan O'Grady's accuracy giving them a 1-3 to 0-0 lead. However, Laune Rangers soon drew level, Gearóid Hassett outstanding and Ciarán O'Sullivan with the goal. John Tyther's penalty helped Laune Rangers into a 2-8 to 1-6 half-time lead and, with Eoin Clifford enhancing a growing reputation with every game, Laune Rangers were always able to pick off the crucial scores. They will rattle the doors again.

Group Two, Listowel Emmets 1-15 Ballydonoghue 1-15

A right tough North Kerry game by all accounts, and very good football. Jason Foley was the prime mover for Ballydonoghue and landed a great two pointer, while Joe Joe Grimes and Cormac Mulvihill stood out for Listowel. Ballydonoghue were down a lot of players, and only led by one at the break before turning to face a strong wind. With Jason Foley pointing and then setting up Kieran Lynch for a goal, Ballydonoghue led by four but were caught late on by points from Sam Tarrant and Joe Joe Grimes. One that got away, and it could prove costly for Ballydonoghue later on.

Group Three, Glenflesk 0-16 St. Marys 0-15

Talk about down to the wire! It was pretty much point for point in the first half, with Dylan Roche denied a goal by a superb save from Bryan Sheehan. The veteran's long kick-outs and frees were a key weapon for St. Marys and he also rove forward to score from play. He landed a great two pointer free late on as Marys pushed three points in front, but Darragh Roche slotted

two frees. With virtually the last play of the game, Marc Kelliher came forward to land a monster kick of his own for two points and a very precious win.

Group Three, An Ghaeltacht 0-13 Castleisland Desmonds 0-13

An Ghaeltacht stormed into a 0-6 to 0-0 lead thanks to Eanna Ó Chonchúir and Ruaidhrí Ó Beaglaíoch. It would have been more but for a great save by Stephen Bartlett from Ó Chonchúir. A brilliant two pointer from former Cork star Aidan Walsh made it 0-8 to 0-4. However, Luka Brosnan, Brian Leonard, and Ruairí Burke helped Desmonds back into it. The second half was a real role reversal. Adam Donoghue absolutely took over midfield, Thomas Hickey came on as a playmaker, and now it was Listowel who looked likely winners. Tomás O Sé (Pádraig's son) excelled for An Ghaelatcht in that second half, and in the end a draw was a fair result.

Group Four, Kerins O'Rahilly's 1-17 Glenbeigh-Glencar 1-15

Glenbeigh/Glencar trailed by 0-5 to 0-1 early on but were unlucky when Rahillys Rob O'Connor made a brilliant double save. Caolim Teahan brought Glenbeigh/Glencar back into it but free-taker Darragh O'Connor ensured that Rahillys led by 0-8 to 0-4 at the break. A brace from Barry John Keane and a goal by Darragh O'Connor put Rahillys ten points clear early in the second half. Glenbeigh/Glencar deserve credit for a brilliant fightback that saw them whittle that lead all the way back down to two, but Rahillys held on for the win.

Group Four, Beaufort 0-20 Gneeveguilla 0-11

Fergal Hallissey's accuracy and a Darragh O'Connor two pointer propelled Beaufort into a 0-5 to 0-1 lead. Gneeveguilla got back to level, but Beaufort kicked the next three points and they led at half-time by 0-9 to 0-7. With Hallissey and the O'Connor brothers looking dangerous, Beaufort led by three heading into the last quarter and they finished very strongly to wrap up an important opening win.

IUNIOR PREMIER

Group One, Ballyduff 2-13 Waterville Frank Caseys 0-7

A two pointer free for Kevin O'Connor pushed Ballyduff into a 0-7 to 0-3 lead after a closely contested opening twenty minutes. Staefáin Carrig's goal gave them a 1-9 to 0-3 half-time lead and Kerry hurler Dylan Moriarty's green flag in the second half wrapped it up. Cillian O'Shea at the back, Evan Boyle also impressed. Oran Clifford and Jack Curran tried very hard for Waterville.

Group Two, Listry 1-18 Churchill 2-13

That's a huge win for Listry in a cracking game of football. Churchill had an early goal from Jack Dolan but Cathal O'Donoghue cancelled it out midway through the first half to give his side a 1-6 to 1-4 lead. He already had a two pointer and Aaron O'Shea added another one to help his side into a 1-11 to 1-5 lead. Churchill closed out the half with a two pointer.

Listry, with the Murphy brothers and Pádraig O'Donoghue impressing, hit the opening two points of the second half but Churchll replied with 1-4 on the trot, including a goal from Ivan Parker. 2-10 to 1-13, game on! Listry got the next three points, but Churchill replied from play and a two pointer free. Padraig O'Donoghue nudged Listry in front and a last free closed out a great win.

Group Two, St. Senans 1-20 Currow 0-23

Yeah, okay, I'm sure you have all heard about this one. Basically, St. Senans kicked a long range free to go ahead by one – according to the umpire's white flag. Currow came down the field and kicked an equaliser.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder &45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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"Jesus healed every kind of disease and illness when He saw the crowds He was moved with compassion for them because they were harassed, confused, and helpless like sheep without a shepherd" (Matthew 9:35).

Welcome back dear student the humanity of Jesus in this verse is beautiful. He understood that people were suffering, and His compassion did something about it. He is the Good Shepherd Who laid down His life for the sheep (John 10:11). Sickness, disease, and heartache are works of darkness. Last week we saw how Jesus, the Light of the World exposes and extinguishes darkness when He is brought into a situation and when we consult and obey His Word His Light makes everything clear (John 1:4-5; John 8:12; Psalm 119:130). "From my earliest youth my enemies have persecuted me, but they have never defeated me. My back is covered with cuts, as if a farmer had ploughed long furrows. But the Lord is Good, He has cut me free from the ropes of the ungodly" (Psalm 129:2-4). I think many can identify with this verse for often it seem like one's life has been targeting practice for the devil. Going from one crisis to another constantly putting out fires, feeling vulnerable and weak. There's a root cause though many get lured by medication and addictions to help them cope but have never considered that there is a spiritual answer. One of the ways the enemy gets in to harass and torment God's people is through fear, the other way is through unforgiveness. Trauma and wounds affect people more than we realise. The emotional fall out can give the devil a landing strip to bring all types of problems. These manifest as health difficulties, relationship problems, dependency upon substances, lack and failure problems which can seem overwhelming and for which there is no answer. But the Word of God proclaims that we are not to fear for there are more with us than against us (2 Kings 6:16).

Torment and harassment are weapons the enemy uses to keep people imprisoned. Two things create torment — fear of punishment and unforgiveness. It's interesting fear of punishment is for sin and wrongdoing. Sin separates man from our Holy God for sin cannot enter His Presence. So, Father God sent Jesus His Son to die in my place and yours to pay for our sins, so that we could be forgiven and washed clean. It was a price or ransom we could never pay. God has given us the gift of His Mercy and His Love so that we could receive the Righteousness of His Son (Romans chapters 5 + 6). We did not deserve this — He has freely given it to us — that's what Grace is. To believe that our sins have been forgiven and paid for and that we have each been reconciled to God through the life, death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus is all one needs to do to receive. As we have been forgiven God expects us to forgive. People don't like to hear this. It's much easier to focus on the negative going over and over what they did/what they said/how they hurt us. But friend it is imperative for your freedom. And Jesus will help you. As you learn to know Him through His Word — how much He loves you, how He cares for you, and what a future He has planned for you, you will walk in the Light and in His Love. This gives you the grace to release others because He loves them too (1) John chapter 4). Even though they may have done bad things He desires that they be saved from hell too. Forgiveness frees minds and hearts from bondage and torment. Release all offence today and receive His Peace.

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
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
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THE LAUGHING LADS


