

KILLARNEY ACTOR CONFIRMS INVOLVEMENT

IN PROPOSED ACTING SCHOOL

Rillarney Outlook that the Fassbender family had submitted planning for an Acting School at their premises in the West End House in New Street in Killarney, it has been confirmed this week that local actor Donal Courtney will be involved in the running the school. Speaking to the Killarney Outlook, Donal said that as the application was still at the planning stages he wouldn't be able to comment further. "When we have news, you will be the first to know, Donal said. "Both Michael and I are very mindful of how Killarney and the local media have supported us always", he added.

Donal, the son of the late Cllr. Michael and Sheila Courtney from Ardshanavooly graduated from the Gaiety School of Acting in 1991 and since then has worked in theatre and television both in Ireland and abroad.

His one man show - God Has No Country - has toured the world. Donal portrays the life of Monsignor Hugh O'Flaherty, and his war time exploits in Rome. The play focuses on O'Flaherty's struggles as he and his colleagues set about the task of protecting those in need from the German occupancy of Rome.

Donal has vast experience in the world of theatre, television and film, having appeared in The Tudors (BBC) Maru (TG4) and Fair City (RTE) He has also appeared in the Irish short film Cutting Grass alongside John Hannah and Irish feature The Gift.

He has directed many plays including the works of Friel, Wilde, Shaw, Bolger and Sophocles.

His theatre work includes The Man from Clare (Gaiety), The Chastitute (Gaiety) The Importance of being Earnest (Siamsa Tire) The Crazy Wall (Siamsa Tire) Sive (Nationwide Tour) Romeo and Juliet (Nationwide Tour) In High Germany (Bewleys Café Theatre) Homefront (Andrews Lane) and Antigone which toured to ancient arenas in Greece and Austria.

Donal introduced Michael Fassbender to the world of acting when he set up a local theatre company called Bricruí and the now Hollywood actor was one of the first to sign up for a workshop at St. Brendan's College where he attended. They became firm friends from then. The Fossa man went onto star in films including 12 Years A Slave, Hunger, Steve Jobs, Assassin's Creed, Alien and X-Men to name a few.

In 2016, he was inducted to the Order of Innisfallen for his contribution to boosting Killarney's profile worldwide.

Killarney Author features in Cork World Book Fest



With a multibook deal under her belt with a major publisher, Killarney author Olivia Howe, writing under the name Olivia Hope, will be one of the writers on the popular Getting Published information day as part of Cork World Book Fest this April. This year Cork World Book Fest goes online and will virtually welcome Irish and international writers to Cork for an extravaganza of books, writers, readers and a guide to getting published.

Seven years ago, Killarney native Olivia Hope pitched her first children's book story at a Getting Published event in Cork City Library to literary scout Vanessa Fox O'Loughlin. Vanessa Fox O'Loughlin not only writes crime fiction as Sam Blake but is also the founder of The Inkwell Group publishing consultancy and the hugely popular national writing resources website Writing.ie.

Olivia credits this meeting with Vanessa as the turning point of her writing career and the most critical step to her becoming published author. Vanessa was so compelled by the story Olivia wrote that she took her book to the London Book Fair where she met the head of the Darley Andersen Literary Agency's Children's

Division, Clare Wallace, and Clare loved it. Clare now represents Olivia who has three books on the way with a major publisher and many more in the pipeline. You'll soon be seeing Olivia Hope's name everywhere! Olivia now works for The Inkwell Group critiquing picture books and teaches creative writing, as well as working for Siamsa Tíre as an associate artist and with the Irish Arts Council on the Creative Schools programme. At this year's Writing for Children event, Vanessa will find out what's happened on Olivia's journey and her tips for children's writers. This will be an hour packed with information with lots of time for your questions - and discussions will cover all areas of children's writing as Olivia has experience across the board.

As part of Cork World Book Fest, Vanessa will also be holding workshops with published authors and literary agents on how to get published, pitching to agents and perfecting the all-important first chapter.

The Getting Published day is part of a weeklong series of events run by Cork City Libraries with the aim of celebrating great writing and books from around the world.

SUMMER BOOKINGS

SHOW SLOW

levels of bookings being reported nationally are pointing to long road to recovery for hotels in Kerrv.


The latest industry survey from the Irish Hotels Federation shows early signs that hotels in certain parts of the country are beginning to see an uplift in bookings for July and August. This follows the Government's recent announcement that it will look at the reopening of hotels and questhouses in June. With booking levels nationally averaging 23% for July and 21% for August - the key summer months - Bernadette Randles, Chair of the Kerry branch of the Irish Hotels Federation, is encouraging people to plan their holidays and breaks early while there is plenty of choice and availability around.

Ms Randles says the positive developments around the vaccine roll-out coupled with the Taoiseach's announcement around reopening of hotels have allowed hotels in Kerry and across the country to start planning towards reopening. "However, as the latest IHF survey shows, there is still a long way to

go before hotel occupancy reaches even last summer's levels. Recovery will be a challenge for the hotel sector this year, requiring continued Government support through to 2022, when the tourism industry should start to recover in earnest."

"Staycations were a real positive last summer and we expect booking levels to continue to rise over the coming weeks. Not surprisingly, as indicated by our latest survey, we would expect to see stronger demand in coastal areas, popular tourism destinations and hotels offering packages and facilities for families. This is reflected in the South West, including Kerry, where occupancy levels at 35% for July are slightly ahead of the national average. There is excellent value available. Guests should contact hotels directly to find out what special offers are available and shop around."

While the extensive availability across the country may be good news for consumers, it highlights the ongoing challenges facing the hotel sector. "Tourism supported some 15,700 livelihoods in Kerry before Covid-19 restrictions, contributing



€592 million to the local economy. Hotels are focussed on restoring employment levels as quickly as possible. While employment and business supports to date have been very welcome, it is essential that the Government now provides greater clarity and certainty now around supports into 2022 and beyond.

Ms Randles said hotels also require a clear commitment from the Government to retain the 9% tourism VAT rate to assist recovery and secure a viable and sustainable future for the industry. "Wait and see is not a sustainable business strategy." Ms Randles added. The IHF survey was carried out on 6-8th April and the results are based on the response of 330 properties with 32,850 guest rooms spread across the country.

to boost Reeks plan

Deter Keane, businessman and Kerry football manager is among a number of people who have come together to help fund an ambitious marketing and promotional plan that aims to boost tourism and economic development in the Reeks District over the next three years.

Funds raised by the 20-plus member group alongside the subscriptions of the tourism organisation's members will lead to an investment of €500,000 by the end of 2024 to help fund activities that promote the region on both the domestic and international markets and sustainably increase visitor numbers to the Reeks District. Marketing of 'shoulder season' visits will be one particular focus of the campaigns.

Tourism is seen as a valuable area of growth for the Reeks District, which spans from Inch Beach to Glenbeigh and includes the Ireland's highest mountain Carrauntoohil. Like many other regions, it has suffered due to the effects of the Covid-19 crisis, and the cash injection is set to help build on the pre-pandemic success of the region following its 2018 re-brand from Mid Kerry.

Chair of the Reeks District Jens Bachem said: "We would like to thank the local business owners for their belief in the Reeks District project. We look forward to working with them, Kerry County Council, South Kerry Development Partnership and other groups to help us reach further successes. Every region has been hit hard by Covid-19 and the Reeks District is no

different, but if people pull together, a huge amount can be achieved. While our plans are ambitious, we believe we have a track record of producing strong results against the odds. It is no more ambitious than Reeks District being named one of Rough Guides' top six destinations in the world to visit in 2019, just 18 months from launch."

Local business owner and Kerry football manager of Peter Keane commented: "I am proud to join others in supporting this initiative. Before I moved to Killorglin, my parents were Cahersiveen hoteliers, so I have a keen appreciation of how tourism can be transformative for the local economy, helping grow jobs, improving infrastructure and attracting further investment. I look forward to seeing the Reeks District prosper as we battle back from the Covid crisis and beyond."

Moira Murrell, Chief Executive of Kerry County Council said: "Kerry County Council welcomes the preparation of the new Reeks District marketing plan which will complement our county plans and position the region at the forefront of activity and outdoor tourism once domestic and international travel resumes."

Thirteen year old Ryan has autism and has completed the 200km within 28 days for his school buddies in St. Francis Special School, where he is a student.

The money raised will go to the SFSS Parent's Autism Support Group and will be used for private therapies such as speech and language therapy carried out by Kerry Speech

and Language clinic. The children get 1:1 SLT sessions. "Ryan has been walking non stop all through his Easter Holidays, he has been walking over 10k a day and now has over 160k done. As his back in school now and his busy his doing the rest of the challenge in the evenings smaller walks", his mum Brigetta told Killarney Outlook.

Lions Club announce IT Access support for Killarney schools

unding to allow equal access to IT Students in the three Killarney secondary schools has been announced by Killarney Lions Club. St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary School, Killarney Community College and St. Brendan's College will each receive €750 to help meet increased IT needs arising from the Covid19 pandemic.

Principal at St. Brendan's Mr. Sean Coffey said the money would would assist the strategic support of a number of students in accessing the curriculum: "Appropriate devices have become key for engagement in education by all students. This assistance will allow targeted support to be delivered where it is most needed," Principal Coffey said.

"We are very aware of how young peoples' experience of school has changed, and it has put pressure on some families. We hope this support will enable second-level schools in Killarney to help students and families who may be disadvantaged by what has happened over the past year", President of Killarney Lions Club John Fuller said.

Highlighting the need for new technology, now more than every, Principal at Killarney Community College, Ms. Stella Loughnane, said "Schools now function in a very different space to that of only a few short years ago. ICT enhances all subject areas and provides schools

an opportunity to keep students engaged in their learning during these uncertain times".

Also welcoming the news, Ms. Róisín Moore, Principal at St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary School stating that the financial support offered by the Killarney Lions Club will further strengthen the school's ability to support students whose engagement with remote learning was compromised due to difficulty accessing devices. "The school provided in excess of 40 devices to students during the period of school closure. However, some of these devices are reaching end of life. The Lions funding will enable us to address this".

Despite lockdown, Catherine Young and her associates have been busy bringing dance into the homes of people of all ages across Kerry. As part of her Kerry County Council residency, co-funded by the Arts Council and Creative Ireland Kerry, Catherine Young, with Jade O'Connor, and assisted by Kristyn Fontanella, ran online dance classes "MOVE IT" for the over 50s, adults and children in February and March. With class sizes ranging from 15 to 60 participants, there were over 300 individual engagements with the classes, showing the great interest and enthusiasm for dance in the

county. Catherine and her associates also ran two rounds of FUNK & FOLK - multicultural dance weekends with Siamsa Tíre covering a wide range of funk and folk styles from all over the world with lead dancers from Riverdance and masters of House/Hip hop teaching from

The weekends were a huge success with over 600 people in total learning styles such as tap, flamenco, West African, Afro-Haitian, Afro-Brazilian, Sean Nos, Munnix Irish, Irish Step dance, House dance and Hip-Hop.

Catherine is going to focus on her own

professional work during April and May but will be back with opportunities for community involvement later in the year.

"I will be working on a documentary film as part of the research and development for my new show 'Floating on a Dead Sea', she explains. "This was due to premiere at Dublin Dance Festival in May but that is on hold due to Covid 19.

"I would love to get The Welcoming Project back live outdoors if regulations allow and I will be working with a group from that project as part of a new feature film called 'Provision' by Frank Berry. Frank saw my work in the Abbey back in 2018 and wants to open his film, about Direct Provision, with dance."

"Catherine Young is a fantastic asset to Kerry," says Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr Patrick Conor Scarteen. "She has built up a network of dance in Kerry across all ages, with a truly diverse mix of people, strengthening our county's social cohesion and resilience."

Prescription for a Brighter Future help for Alcohol Dependency

With the pandemic, problem drinking is causing huge difficulties in everyday family life. Home sales of alcohol have surged, and the problem is escalating.

A recent report from the Royal College of Psychiatrists suggests 19% of the adult population drink too much. We all know of someone who suffers from alcohol addiction, but available treatments have been ineffective, very expensive, or both. Public services have been hopelessly underfunded and under-provided. For decades, we have had to rely on outdated beliefs that demand immediate abstinence from the outset. Now that changes. The NalPlan Clinic, an Irish MedTech startup, has just launched their online service providing alcohol treatment. Programs commence with initial video consultations with NalPlan's Medical Director and one of their specialist cognitive behavioural therapists. Treatment does not require immediate abstinence. In fact, NalPlan advises patients to continue drinking moderately for the medication to ease the cravings and for the CBT counselling to train the body to thrive without drink. This process is known as 'pharmacological extinction'.


While patients continue life and work as normal their 12-week online treatment program is pursued discreetly on a secure system using video calls on their phone, tablet or laptop from the comfort of their own homes. The program does not demand detox or immediate abstinence, nor any consequent withdrawal symptoms. There is no life disruption and no public exposure. Residential rehab is not required, nor the consequent huge disruptions to family life, career and finances. The new online service provides proven treatment with a 78% success rate.

The Health Innovation Hub Ireland (HIHI) are enthusiastic in their support for The NalPlan Clinic and its introduction to support the HSE and the Irish health system. HIHI have concluded a study on the effectiveness of the NalPlan approach and have published their report. The opiate-blocker medication used is approved by the HPRA in Ireland and the MHRA and NICE in the UK for this application. How much should I insure my house for?

Your house is your most valuable asset and insuring it for the correct value is crucial in order that you are fully protected. Your property should be insured for the reinstatement cost and not the market value. In order words the cost of rebuilding the house excluding the site value.

It is very important to note that under insurance can have a serious effect on any future claims settlements. All policies include an "Average Clause" which means in the event of under insurance any claims settlement can be reduced in value in proportion to the degree of under insurance.

Where, for example, the Sum Insured is only 75% of the total reinstatement cost, you will receive 75% of the agreed cost of reinstatement, whether the claim is made for partial reinstatement or total loss.

For example, in the case of a house insured for €270,000, where the total reinstatement cost is €360,000, the insured party would receive only €270,000 to reinstate the house in the event of a total loss. The Insured would therefore be obliged to provide the balance of €90,000.



Similarly if there is a partial loss such as a water damage incident, which costs €60,000 to repair,

the insured party would only receive \in 45,000, and would have to provide the balance of \in 15,000.

The base rebuilding costs in the south west region are running at €160-€170 a square foot in the latest guide. These costs have increased steadily over the past few years and takes into account the most recent building regulations, professional fees, demolition costs and VAT.

The basic reinstatement costs issued by the Institute of Chartered Surveyors are average base costs on estate type houses built since the 1960s. You should make provision for better than average kitchen fittings, built in wardrobes, finishes and other above average items. Special finishes, fences, walls, or Garages would also need to be included. I would recommend that you review your reinstatement sum insured on an annual basis and in order to get a definitive individual reinstatement value on your house you should contact an independent qualified surveyor.

The Institute of Chartered surveyors review rebuilding costs nationally and issue an annual report along with a handy calculator, this can be found at www.scsi.ie

CALL FOR A CHANGE TO TAP HEADS

TO PREVENT SHEEBEEN SALES

A Killarney councillor and publican is calling on the VFI and the LVA to lobby the breweries to change the tap head on all barrels for licenced premises in an attempt to control draft beer sales and help the industry get back on track when restrictions lift

Speaking to the Killarney Outlook this week, Cllr. Niall Botty O'Callaghan who runs the family business, The Failte Hotel on College Street, said there are a lot of sheebeens being set up which are being run with no overheads.

"If the breweries were able to change the tap head on all the barrels for pubs only, this would go someway to stopping the illegal sale of alcohol in these premises", he said. "I have no problem with people enjoying a drink at home, but when people are charging for draft beer in their own homes it will have a devestating effect on our already damaged industry", he added.

"The overheads for publicans are very high, Niall said, "I pay €1,250 per month so my customers can enjoy Sky TV in the bar, whereas in the illegal sheebeens, are using their domestic satelitte TV which cost a lot less than that", so as you can imagine it is very difficult for publicans to hear about beer kegs being installed in private homes and sheds", he added.

"We want our customers back, enjoying the atmosphere of the pub, meeting up with their friends and the only way that this can happen is if we stop the illegal selling of alcohol in sheebeens", Cllr O'Callaghan said.

Minister Foley welcomes announcement of over €3 million in funding for Kerry under the LEADER programme

Minister Foley said: "I welcome this funding announcement which is very positive news for all LEADER groups across Kerry. This timely announcement of €3 million in funding will help and support invaluable community projects across the county."



Government and Oireachtas must urgently ratify EU Next Gen Recovery Fund - MEP Kelleher

- Ireland one of 10 countries yet to ratify Own Resources Decision -

Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher has written to An Taoiseach requesting that the Government urgently proceed with the ratification of the Own Resources Decision that is needed to enable the EU's Next Generation Recovery Fund to go to the private markets to raise capital.

Kelleher was commenting after the EU Budget Commissioner Johannes Hahn said that more urgency is needed from national governments if the June deadline for going to the markets and the deadline for issuing the first tranche of support to Member States are to be met.

"This is a €750 billion fund to help the EU's member states recovery from the current economic crisis. Comprised of both grants and loans, it will support countries to become more sustainable and digital.

"Ireland is one of 10 member states that have yet to ratify the Own Resources Decision through domestic legislation. I believe the Oireachtas should move quickly to ratify this important plank of Ireland's commitment to the Next Generation Recovery Fund.

"This fund was agreed in summer 2020; even if all countries ratify by June, they will only be able to start securing private funds on the bonds market in July - there is no time to lose.

"If the deadline is not met, the EU's plan of allocating €60 to €100 billion by the end of 2021 may not be possible.

"We need to bear in mind that the fund is a temporary instrument. The EU only has until 2026 to raise the money to support the Member States. Time is of the essence. Hopefully the Government can find the time at the earliest possible opportunity to scrutinise this proposal and then ratify it to ensure all EU citizens can receive the benefit of this historic investment commitment," concluded Kelleher.

Ongoing Water Bursts In Beaufort No Longer Acceptable: Cahill

A Kerry County Councillor has said that the ongoing Water Outages in the Beaufort area are no longer acceptable. Councillor Michael Cahill had recently stated that residents in the greater Beaufort area had been without Water for the fourth weekend in a row. This weekend again residents have to put up with being without water in Beaufort, while the Listry and Faha areas have also been affected.

"These ongoing leaks and bursts are happening in Carnahone, Dunloe, Ballagh and along the Board of Works road down to Kilcoolaght, to name but a few and it is unfair to expect families to put up with this loss of a basic human requirement" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"I met recently with both Kerry County Council and Irish Water to highlight this problem in Beaufort and I impressed upon them the need to fund and carry out a major pipe replacement project for all of Beaufort" stated Councillor Cahill. "I am now requesting an urgent meeting with the CEO of Irish Water, Cathal Marley and I will be demanding that funding be made available as a matter of priority to upgrade the entire water mains network in




Beaufort and that the necessary funding be made available to reinstate the road network following the carrying out of these works" stated the Fianna Fail Councillor. "This is a repeat of the nightmare experienced by residents in Beaufort a few years ago. This is particularly difficult on families in the area with very young children and the elderly, it is no longer acceptable and has to be addressed as a matter of extreme urgency" stated an angry Councillor Cahill.

87% OF LEAVING CERT STUDENTS OPT FOR BOTH WRITTEN EXAMS AND SEC-ACCREDITED GRADES

The vast majority of Leaving Cert students have signed up for the written exam in June as well as for SEC- accredited grades. This follows a Department of Education and Skills (DES) decision to give students a choice of a written exam, accredited grades or a hybrid mixture of both. Students who have opted into both methods of assessment will be awarded the highest grade achieved in each subject.

A provisional breakdown of the data released by the State Examinations Commission (SEC) on Monday confirms that 87% of candidates who initially registered for the Leaving Cert plan to take both options in one of more subjects. A total of 6% have opted for accredited grades only, while 2% have decided to sit the written exam only. 5% of candidates have not completed their application but they will have a final opportunity to do so when the Candidate Self Service Portal (CSSP) reopens in late April/early May. From the total of 63,127 who initially entered for Leaving Cert 2021, 60,089 (95%) - 57,082 Leaving Certs and 3,007 Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA) students have submitted assessment choices.

The SEC figures confirm that individual students have worked out their personal strategy for getting the best out of the hybrid system. The overall figures clearly indicate that many students are concentrating their studies in the remaining weeks on a select number of subjects, rather than sitting all the exams they originally intended to take.

Irish is the least popular written exam with only 58% of students signing up for the written exam. The take up of the written exam in French and German is also low at 69% in each subject. A very impressive 81% of candidates are opting to sit English. The most popular take up of written exams are in the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) subjects, with 84% signing up for Maths, 85% for Biology, 87% for Physics, 88% for Chemistry and a whopping 96% for Applied Maths.

The SEC will continue to engage with schools and students to ensure that it has accurate information for all students who wish to do the exams. However, it's very likely that as many as 3,038 students, or 5%, may have already decided to withdraw from the Leaving Cert. That is a worrying statistic as most of these young people are likely to be from disadvantaged backgrounds and may have lacked the necessary supports during a

fragmented school year. One hopes that the SEC will make every possible effort to convince this cohort to sign up for the exam when the CSSP reopens in a few weeks. It will also remain unclear, until the written exams are over, how many students will actually sit for all the subjects they have signed up for as some of them may revise their strategy as June draws nearer.


There are some concerns at third-level that the dual system will result in further grades inflation this year and cause CAO points to spiral upwards. However, if both systems are accurately standardised that may not happen as a great deal has been learned from last year's 'calculated grades' experience. Also, the steady hand of the SEC is back in control of running and assessing the exams this year. In addition, Minister for Further & Higher Education, Simon Harris, is promising to provide thousands of additional third-level places in high-demand courses this year in a bid to ease some of the pressure on points requirements.

It's all looking good for Leaving Cert exam students. They now have a great deal of clarity and certainty about the structure of the exam. At this stage, my overriding advice to all of them is to focus totally on good quality study during the remaining weeks. Stay grounded in the moment and try to avoid over thinking about what may happen with points and courses.


walk/run or cycle 3km in her memory", Kay's daughter Jenny told Killarney Outlook.

APPLE CAKE

Ingredients

- 337g plain flour
- 1 teaspoon of baking powder
- 150g butter
- 150g sugar
- 2 eggs
- 150ml milk
- 2 big cooking apples
- 1 teaspoon of cinnamon

Method

Preheat oven to 350°F. 180°C fan Butter a pie dish. Mix flour with baking powder. Rub in butter with your fingertips until texture resembles breadcrumbs. Add sugar, beaten eggs and the milk to form soft dough. Pat out half of dough in greased pie dish (don't worry — it is supposed to be very wet).

Peel, core, and chop apple 3/4-inch cubes. Arrange apples on dough and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon sugar and cinnamon. Gently spoon out remaining dough on top of apples to cover them completely. Sprinkle with remaining sugar and cut a slit through middle of top dough. Bake for 40–50 minutes, until golden and crunchy on outside (apples should be soft on the inside).

MONEY MATTERS

Is it more difficult to get a mortgage to build my home than a mortgage to buy my home?

Yes, it is more difficult. When you are building your family home there is more of a risk of things going wrong than purchasing your home. The most obvious and biggest risk is of course the risk of you going over your budget to build and finish your property. Lenders when assessing your application need to take this risk into account. Lenders will put emphasis on the cost of construction of your property to make sure the costs are realistic. 





TYRE CHECKS CRITICAL AS LOCKDOWNS EASE

As lockdown restrictions begin to setting out. ease, motorists are urged to complete essential safety checks before gaetting behind the wheel of cars that may have had very little use over the past number of months.

According to the Michelin tyre makers, being parked in one place for a significant period can affect handling, performance and safety, drivers may also have neglected tyre maintenance during lockdown.

Even if vehicles have not been used, tyres will have lost pressure, and driving on underinflated tyres increases fuel consumption at the same time as compromising handling, grip, braking and durability, it says.

In addition, prolonged storage can create flat patches on the tyre, while being parked in oil or water for long periods - or on an object such as a stone – can also damage tyres.

On top of that, minor existing damage to the tyre may have worsened during storage, and cracking and hardening may be an issue, Michelin adds.

As work and leisure mileage increases, the tyre maker has outlined four simple steps for drivers to follow before


Firstly, motorists are advised to set tyre pressures to the vehicle manufacturer's recommendations, then visually check all tyres for bulges, cuts, excessive cracking or other damage or unusual

Next, drivers should move the vehicle to expose the part of the tyre that has been in contact with the ground and carry out the same visual checks as flat patches can create internal weakness, which can lead to failure in use.

Finally, Michelin advises checking tread depth. The legal minimum tread depth is 1.6mm around the entire circumference of the tyre in a band making up 75 per cent of the tyre's

Motorists are also advised to remember that tyres which have been in use for five years or more should continue to be inspected by a specialist at least annually. Any tyres in service 10 years or more from the date of manufacture, including spare tyres, should be replaced as a precaution - even if they still appear serviceable and have not reached the legal wear limit.



AN EYE EXAMINATION SHOULD MAKE THE BACK TO SCHOOL CHECKLIST

A comprehensive eye examination is as essential for back-to-school success as supplies for learning.

Studies have consistently linked school performance to poor vision and visual disorders. More than one in 10 children in every classroom is estimated to have an undiagnosed common vision problem that affects their learning and development.

Some eye conditions do not display any signs or symptoms, so the only way to know for sure is to take your child for a sight test.

Signs which may show there is a problem with a child's sight include:

- · an eye appearing to drift inwards or outwards:
- difficulty concentrating;
- · headaches:
- sitting too close to the television; or
- rubbing their eyes a lot.

The condition 'lazy eye' can run in the family, so if someone in your family has either an eye turn ('squint') or suffers from reduced vision in one or both eyes ('amblyopia'), it's a good idea to take any related children for a sight test.

A sight test is a comprehensive check which can pick up many conditions, including colour vision defects, problems with the development of 3D vision and any need for glasses. Taking children for sight tests from an early age helps to build good eye health habits into adulthood.

What can I do if I don't want my child to wear

Some parents avoid taking their children for a sight test, because they do not want them to wear glasses

It's important to understand that some children do need visual correction so their vision can develop normally and to achieve their full potential. The good news is there is now a much wider range of attractive frames to choose from and less stigma attached to wearing glasses.

Many children are also suitable for contact

This is particularly helpful for children who take part in regular sports activities and they can be successfully worn from an earlier age than most parents expect.

>GAA UPDATE

The GAA has released an updated Master Fixtures Calendar for the 2021 season. The inter-county season will run from May 8th/9th with the start of the Allianz Hurling League, to the weekend of August 28/29 when the All-Ireland Football Final will be played. The Provincial Football and Hurling championships will commence on the weekend of June 26/27. The County and Provincial Club Championships will be played in the months of September, October, November, and December with the All-Ireland Club Finals scheduled for February 2022. The entire inter-county fixtures programme will be run off in a 20-week period and guarantees a minimum of five games for each Senior County Football and Hurling team with all bar three counties guaranteed six games in hurling.

The Allianz Football League will run from May 15/16 to the weekend of June 19/20 with Divisions split into North and South as originally planned in December. League finals will only be played on June 19/20 if counties involved are not playing in the championship the following weekend. If they are, then joint winners will be declared for Division 1 and joint winners and promotion for Divisions 2, 3, and 4.

Divisions 1 and 2 of the Allianz Hurling League will run May 8/9 to the weekend of June 12/13. Division 3 will run from May 15/16 to the weekend of June 19/20. There will be no Division 1 Hurling League quarter-finals, semi-finals, or Final played.

The 2021 All-Ireland Senior Football Championship will be played as a straight knock-out competition from the provincial series forward. There will be no Qualifiers and New York and London will not be involved.

2021 Liam McCarthy Cup: There will be a provincial knock-out championship with back-door qualifiers like there was in 2020, but now also with the introduction of relegation to the Joe McDonagh Cup.

There will be no semi-finals in the Joe McDonagh Cup which is the only change from what was proposed in December. The Joe McDonagh Cup winners are promoted in 2021 but do not have a back door into the Liam McCarthy Cup. The Joe McDonagh Cup will be played on Saturday July 17. 2021 Christy Ring, Nicky Rackard, and Lory Meagher Cups: The only change to what was announced in December is that British based teams will not be involved.

For the 2020 and 2021 Minor and 2021 U-20 Championships details will be finalised when there is clarity on a return to training/play date.

It is important to note that the GAA still does not have permission to return to club training or games with only training in pods of 14 allowed in the North. However, the calendar is set up in such a way that: Club competitions with county players can take place as County teams exit the Championships (in football, teams start exiting from the end of June; in Hurling July 10th). From August 1st, all Counties bar All Ireland Semi-Finalists in Football and Hurling, and the teams in the Div 1 Hurling Relegation play off, will be free to stage club competitions with county players. Additionally, the commencement of the Provincial Club Championships will be delayed until Mid-November.

2020 INJURY FUND EXTENSION

TO 31 MAY 2021

Given that no activity has been possible for January to March 2021 a further two-month extension of Injury Fund cover has been ratified by Coiste Bainistíochta. This will now take the 2020 cover term up until 31 May 2021.

This means that the GAA Injury Benefit Fund cover remains in place based on existing 2020 team registrations. Units do not need to register or pay for their 2021 teams until re-invited to do so. Details with regards to registering and payment for the 2021 GAA Injury Benefit Fund will issue once we have more clarity from Government as to what the coming months may look like. It is a condition of the extended 2020 Injury Fund cover to 31 May 2021 that in advance of any permitted return to train or play in either April or May, "All players will still be required to be individually registered for the 2021 season on the new "Foireann" membership system." 2020 player registrations will "NOT" carry over into 2021

and cover will be declined if a player is not fully registered for the 2021 season in advance of any return to train or play in 2021.

Pause on "Loss of Wages cover" from 1 January 202. Following discussion at a meeting of Central Council on Saturday 20th March last, it was agreed to review the following two options as alternatives to the current pause that has been applied to the loss of wages cover that forms part of the wider Player Injury Benefit Fund.

1. Offer all our playing members who may feel that loss of wages cover is a prerequisite for participation in GAA activities for 2021 to individually subscribe to a stand-alone GAA endorsed personal injury cover plan for 2021.

2. Review the 2021 Injury fund premium payable by each of the 1,500 units and potentially increase this premium by 25% to partly cover €1.3m of the forecasted €3m fund deficit to May 2022 if loss of wages cover is to be reinstated during this term. The funds ongoing deficit is primarily due to the absence of gate receipts during this term which ordinarily sub-vents the shortfall in the fund annually. General In a general context, while there are undoubtedly some challenges ahead for the Association, there is also plenty of hope that with the availability of vaccines and the roll out of the inoculation programmes North and South of the border, a summer filled with Gaelic Games activity lies ahead. In the meantime, we await the upcoming government announcements and will continue to communicate regularly with all units. We also request that you keep yourself updated with all communications given the fluid situation that we now find ourselves operating in. Finally, we want to remind you all of the importance of personal responsibility for our actions in relation to Covid-19 as we work together to ensure the safety of everyone in our community.

CUL CAMP

This document is aimed to assist clubs when deciding on whether to apply to host a Cul Camp. However it is important to note that the final decision will be made by the County Games Development Committee having assessed the clubs ability to meet all of the requirements as per the GAA's Cul Camp Planning Document.

1. Responsibility: The Cul Camps are a National Programme with guidelines and policies set by the National Coaching and Games Committee in Croke Park who are responsible for overseeing the programme. At local level the County Games Development Committee run the Cul Camp Programme in each county. From a Health and Safety perspective the only responsibility resting with the County Committee is to ensure there is strict adherence to all of the guidelines as outlined in the GAA's Safe return to Gaelic Games Document. In the return to play and the Cul Camp policy document there are steps and procedures to follow, if an individual contracts Covid-19, and

certain steps need to be implemented in keeping with healthcare guidelines.

2. Cap on Numbers: This will be set by the County Games Development Committee with reference to the recommended numbers based on facilities as per the Cúl Camp Planning Document. There will be a limit placed on numbers attending each

3. Camp Booking: All booking will be on line. However in order to give club members first call the club coordinator can decide the date and time when booking goes live and can inform all club members in advance.

4. Facilities: Club facilities must comply with requirements as per the GAA's Cúl Camp Planning Document. As dressing rooms and club indoor facilities are more than likely not going to be open, then it is our recommendation that any club wishing to host a Cul Camp must have a covered outdoor area (eg .Stand etc). The camp day is four hours and we need to make sure that the children have some cover from weather conditions.

5. Toilet Facilities: Toilet facilities and handwashing facilities must be available. Under the GAA Return to Play document clubs are allowed to open toilet facilities.

6. Gear: The Gear that the Cul Camps participants receive this year is the same as the gear in 2020 as advertised on the G.A.A Cul Camp website.

7. Signage: Signs are the responsibility of the club and should be placed at the entrance, in car parks, entrance to toilets and pitch side. Pitch side signs to contain signage on social distancing, personal contact, spitting sneezing, coughing etc as per GAA's Safe Return for Gaelic Games

8. Drop of Collection: The Head Coach/Coordinator and the local club will devise a drop of collection system for each camp as per the GAA's Safe Return for Gaelic Games Document.

9. Covid Officer: The Head Coach/Coordinator will liaise with the Club's Covid Officer in advance of and during the camp to ensure that all of the necessary safety requirements are in place.

10. Daily Health Questionnaire: Parents and staff must complete the daily Health Questionnaire as per the GAA's Safe Return for Gaelic Games Document. We have requested that parents would only have to fill in one form for the camp and are currently waiting on confirmation. • • • • • 11. Underlying Health Conditions: Children with

11. Underlying Health Conditions: Children with underlying health conditions must be advised to seek medical advice before attending a camp

12. Wet Days: In cases where coaching activities are suspended due to adverse weather conditions then camp days may be called off. It will then be the responsibility of parents/guardians to make arrangements to collect their children from the Camp.

13. Club Camps: Clubs who do not commit to running a Cúl Camp will not receive permission to run a camp of their own as per GAA policy.

Three rounds of group fixtures will be played on consecutive weekends, with the semi-finals scheduled for June 13.

There will then follow a two-week break before the Lidl National League Finals are played on June 27. Confirmation of initial details for the 2021 Lidl National Leagues follow the recent Government announcement that intercounty training can resume from April 19, for 'sanctioned and organised adult inter-county National Gaelic Games Leagues.'

GAA

The new GAA inter-county season will get underway with the first round of the Allianz National Hurling League on May 8th and 9th with the Football Leagues starting a week later. The Association are also to seek clarity from the government in the coming days as to whether teams will be able to play challenge games in advance of the commencement of the National Leagues. Unfortunately, I imagine it's unlikely -the fact of a fourth county, Monaghan, being investigated for breaching restrictions certainly doesn't help.

NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The Allianz Football League will from the weekend of May 15/16 to the weekend of June 19/20 with Divisions split into North and South as originally planned in December.

Four teams will be in each group based on geography with three Round Robin games per team. The top two in each divisional group will advance to the league semi-finals followed by a league final.

The bottom two in each divisional group will play relegation semi-finals with the two losers of those matches relegated. The bottom teams in Division 4 will play a Shield semi-final and final. League finals will only be played on June 19/20 if counties involved are not playing in the championship the following weekend. If they are, then joint winners will be declared for Division 1 and joint winners and promotion for Divisions 2, 3, and 4.

Kerry will be at home to Galway on May 15th, play Dublin at a neutral venue on May 23rd, and be away to Roscommon on May 30th to conclude our group games.

Provincial Draws

The draw for the Munster Football and Hurling Championships will take place live on Radio 1's Morning Ireland Show next Monday, April 19th, at 7.30am and 8.30am

NATIONAL HURLING LEAGUE

Divisions 1 and 2 of the Allianz Hurling League will run from the weekend of May 8/9 to the weekend of June 12/13. Division 3 of the Allianz Hurling League will run from the weekend of May 15/16 to the weekend of June 19/20.

There will be no Division 1 Hurling League quarter-finals, semi-finals, or Final played. There will either be joint winners for 2021, or if the teams that win Div 1A and Div 1B meet in the Championship, this will double as a League

The Division 1 Hurling League Relegation Playoff will be played as curtain raiser to Senior Hurling Semi Final in August.

Divisions 2 and 3 will not have League Finals either. The top team in each Division will be crowned champions. The bottom team in Divisions 2A, 2B, and 3A will be relegated.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

The inter-county season has necessarily been reduced from 27 weeks to 20, and as a consequence the championships will be knockout. I know how tough that can be, to have a year's effort ended in an abrupt 70 minutes (effectively, just one horrible late minute for Kerry against Cork last year) but the truth is that I prefer knock-out. There also won't be a Taillteann Cup. I'm in favour of the long-term changes to the championship structure and the playing season that the GAA have been working to implement in recent years, but guite rightly and understandably right now the priority is to get games going again.

This year's All-Ireland Senior Football final will be played on the weekend of August 28th and 29th, with club championships of last year concluding and this year's commencing at that stage. Kerry are tentatively examining the possibility of playing county league games prior to that without county players. That's a hard one for me - I've never liked the way that players are held from their own club games (no-one ever tells us that 'the county team is the bedrock of the association' - but the sooner that club players can get back in action the better. The All-Ireland Senior Hurling Championship remains unchanged from December's original calendar and the All-Ireland final has been fixed for the weekend of the 21st and 22nd of August.

PACKIE MCGARTY RIP

A little late, but I couldn't let the great man pass without mention. There's often debate about Kerry's greatest midfield pairing. Most people go for Mick O'Connell and Paddy Kennedy, the pairing on the Millenium Team, but I have always thought that the pair brought style, while Jack O'Shea provided raw power - I'd blaspheme by starting O'Connell on the forty.

No-one, ever, debated who was Leitrim's best footballer. In fact, the wonder is that Packie McGarty's name isn't mentioned more often as the greatest footballer ever. McGarty never won an All Ireland medal – coming from Leitrim, it was never likely to happen. But he was a Railway Cup star at a time when those players were household. He was man of the match in the county U14 Final in 1949 - at 10 years of age. He made his debut for the Leitrim seniors at just 16 years of age (I believe that teenagers were simply much more active in those days - no playstation, motor car, television, and more manual labour). He would keep his place on the starting fifteen until 1971, 23 years altogether. At 19 he made his Railway Cup debut - and promptly roasted no less a player than Jas. Murphy, scoring 1-4. In the end he would win



three Railway Cups with Connaught. He reached his first (and only) All Ireland Final with Leitrim in the 1952 All Ireland Junior Final, which they lost to Meath. In the end he would lose six Connaught Finals to Galway's great three in a row team of the sixties, four of them in a row.

It's a subject that regularly crops up and invariably leads to interesting debates. Who were the best players never to win an All Ireland? I actually remember a time in the early nineties when we all knew the answer to that question - it was "Maurice Fitzgerald". And everyone would agree and raise their glass to you (often a subtle hint to refill). I think everyone would agree on certain names in the category, but only a very select few. For me, a selection without the likes of Tommy Murphy, Mickey Kearns, and Declan Browne would not be credible. Oh....and a certain Packie McGarty.

Before anyone else says it, yes, I have certainly left off some very redoubtable names. Jobber McGrath of Westmeath, Jim Wall of Waterford, Barry Owens of Fermanagh, Frank McGuigan from Tyrone, Kevin Kehilly of Cork, Dublin's Paddy Christie and Ciaran Whelan, Dessie Mone from Monaghan, Gerry O'Reilly from Meath, Conor McManus of Monaghan (a very tough call!), Glen Ryan and Johnny Doyle from Kildare, our own Jack Hussey (the Ballymac man was Kerry's first great, back when the Association was founded), John Pius O'Sullivan (the 'Champion' of Laune Rangers), or Denis O'Sullivan of Rahillys. Look, you could write out a list of a thousand names, and the first person to see it would remind you of a name you had forgotten - and they would be right. Some conversations will never grow old.....

ROWING

Monika Dukarska and Aileen Crowley finished sixth last Sunday in the Womens' Pair Final at the 2021 European Rowing Championships in Varese, Italy. They had qualified by finishing second in their heat, losing out to Romania but coming in ahead of the Czech and Danish crews. They made a strong start in the final and were in third place, but couldn't quite maintain that intensity, finishing in 7.11.83 as the sixth boat past the line. Great Britain were the eventual winners, with the redoubtable Romanians in third.

KERRY LADIES GAA

Kerry, having unfortunately been denied promotion purely by the circumstances of the pandemic rather than anything on the pitch (they were unbeaten), will be trying to repeat their superb feats of last year in Division 2A of the Ladies National League.

They are pitched against Meath, Wexford, and Clare. The proposed dates for the games are Round 1 – May 23rd, Round 2 – May 30th, Round 3 – June 6th. Anton O'Toole RIP

He didn't so much saunter out of his Synge Street club (he later managed them to an Intermediate title) and onto the Dublin team as saunter. Among the intensity of the famous hut in Parnell Park when the Dublin players gathered to thresh things out, O'Toole was usually the quietest man in the hut, and Kevin Heffernan didn't mind that. Normally Heffernan forced those lads out of themselves,





but he knew there was no need here. O'Toole, like David Hickey and the irrepressible Mick Holden, brought quiet laughter into that room - he had that knack all his life - and Heffernan was willing to forego his usual demand for raw passion. You couldn't ruffle O'Toole - but Heffernan never needed to. O'Toole was big, rangy, and amazingly fast. Dublin supporters and remember, in the early seventies a Dublin supporter was a rarity, and a Dublin win even more so – watched the tidal wave that saw them dethrone Cork as 1974 All Ireland champions. The long haired lad at the back with the speed guickly attracted the moniker 'The Blue Panther' and lived up to it. O'Toole was tireless on the field, but he also had silky skill. He could solo run with the ball under perfect control as fast as most players could sprint and he was deadly for goals - when that Dublin team were finding their feet, it was Anton O'Toole who got the crucial goals to snuff off the challenge of two strong Meath teams - without him, the juggernaut would have been derailed before it could build momentum. He was one of the few to be there from the start all the way to the finish, joining Brian Mullins with four celtic crosses. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam uasal.

RUGBY

Ladies Six Nations Ireland 45 Wales 0

All too easy, to be quite honest. This was not a great game, an unfortunate Welsh side looked well out of their depth. That said, Ireland looked very strong and fit, carried well, and I liked the speed of their passing at times. But when you factor in the quality of the opposition....no, Ciara Griffin's team will be asked much harder

questions by France next week (they beat Wales 53-0). Still, it's great to see some bit of action again, and it must be wonderful for a team (the Irish players look to me like they have worked hard during lockdown) to actually get back playing on the field.

Eimear Considine scored what I've seen described as a stunning individual try to open the scoring. I'm not a fan of patronisingly allowing lowered standards because it's the 'womens game', that was chronic defending and needs to be called out as such. Considine took the easy gap well, though. Wales weren't just on the back foot; they were already reeling, unable to handle Ireland's speed both of foot and in passing. Béibhinn Parsons (that's a real name talent0 evaded a fairly poor attempt at a tackle and showed a clean pair of heels - that kind of pace is hard to stop with a bit of space. Her second one was a real beauty, though, catching an absolutely superb kick across by Hannah Tyrell and going over. After just 17 minutes, Eimear Conidine broke through the Wales line far too easily for a fourth. Wales had good players and were hugely willing - they just clearly had no idea how to link the defence and, worse, never seemed to commit in those tackles. In the second half, Ireland could afford to lower the intensity and still score tries through Sene Naupo, Dorothy Wall (in fairness, Wales defended that one well, it needed to be and was a good finish) and Hannah Tyrell, whose outstanding play most certainly deserved it.

CHAMPIONS CUP

Leinster 34 Exeter 22

There's only one Irish team still standing as we go into the final four, and there's a good reason that they are still standing. Mind you, it didn't look that way early on - Tom O'Flaherty absolutely sliced through the defense with embarrassing ease for Exeter's opening try. Then he did it again, albeit after more width by Exeter. 14-0. Good response, though, Keenan doing well to offload to James Lowe for the try. I know Lowe's defence can be worrying, but I always believe that he brings an invaluable dimension to attacking play. It was Keenan again (the Lions might have an embarrassment of riches in his position, but he's the most rounded of them and I'd have him on the plane) who offloaded to Jordan Larmour for their second try. In fairness, this was hugely entertaining rugby, both teams willing to attack. Johnny Sexton was gone for a Head Injury Assessment. It's happening to him a lot in games this year, I really would worry about long term implications, given what we now know about long-term concussive effects. A lion-hearted warrior has taken too many bangs. Ross Byrne took over the conversion duties comfortably and added a penalty won by the outstanding Ronan Kelliher. Exeter probably had more of the attacking play, but Leinster's defence, especially the aforementioned Kelliher, were pulsatingly brilliant. They pretty much won all the contests. Just before the break, Ross Byrne nailed his second penalty and Leinster had effected a 34 point turnaround, from 14-0 down to 20-14 ahead.

The Exeter pack powered over to get back within one point on the restart (power play lacks entertainment value for me but I appreciate the enormous skill in that cohesive push). Simmonds missed the conversion but he got a penalty to nudge them in front. Ross Byrne replied in kind, though - he must be moving up in Andy Farrell's thinking.

Leinster put some precious daylight between the teams on sixty minutes, Jordan Larmour showing great composure to finish after good team play. Byrne missed a difficult conversion, but won a penalty that he nailed - mistakes on either side were being ruthlessly punished - and Leinster were 31-22 ahead. Leinster's defence again had to be their rock as Exeter pushed relentlessly, but to no avail.

We'll only whisper it yet. The best club rugby in the world is in France (with commensurate salaries) but the best club in Europe might yet prove not to be French. There'll always be a little bit of grudging famers' sons of Munster versus the upper class D4 accents of Leinster cankered within my soul, but it would be great for Irish rugby. It depends on whether they can play like they did for seventy minutes against Exeter for the full eighty against La Rochelle, who are of course coached by none other than their old arch-rival, one Ronan O'Gara!

Because if they repeat that opening ten minutes....ouch! It really wasn't pretty....



GOLF | US Masters



Well, that got entertaining pretty quickly! I'll be honest with ye, I couldn't sit down and watch the Masters; that's a huge commitment of time. I put it on in the background and keep an eye on it during the day....it gives me a kind of rolling narrative of what is happening, with an occasional blank to fill in. I was there for that crucial 16th, though...that drama was well heralded by the hole before it!

A surprising amount of big guns fell by the wayside very quickly. Rory McIlroy is still waiting to complete the Grand Slam and join a tiny elite, and he'll wait a while yet going by this performance. His biggest moment came when he hit his father with a wayward shot – the pair laughed it off, which was good to see. Dustin Johnson was one of my favourites for the tournament, but the slow greens killed



his game early (six three putts in two rounds?) and his main function this year was to pass the famous green jacket to his successor. Matt Kuchar, always a dark horse, stumbled over the early fences and was gone. Brooks Koepka, another name you wouldn't be surprised to see riding high on the leaderboard, rode off into the sunset instead. World number 10 Patrick Cantlay? Bye bye. Fred Couples, Sergio Garcia, Bernhard Langer, ditto. I know it's cruel, this is their livelihood, but it's entertaining, and all of the aforementioned are multi-millionaires.

Jordan Spieth had a triple bogey (that's my standard, not his) in his opening round, with practically every golfer clearly disliking the brutally unforgiving greens and I assumed it was the end of him. No, fair play, Spieth kept his head down and calmly worked his way back into it, it showed a lot of character and resilience. But when all the dust settled, everybody was talking about just one golfer. Hideki Matsuyama made his move after the cut, an immaculate 65 giving him a four shot lead going into the last day. I'd say it was all over bar the shouting, except that there was

plenty of shouting to be done yet. Matsuyama stumbled early on but kept going and actually stretched his lead into a whopping six shots after 11 holes. No Japanese man has ever won the Masters, and that's a nation that really buy into the game - maybe a few of them were starting to relax a bit. Then the pressure came on. Spieth was coming well back into contention, but it was Xander Schauffele's four birdies in a row that loaded the shoulders. Don't ask me why, but I was keeping a closer eye on Spieth and, to a much lesser extent, Will Zalatoris. I guess Spieth is such a big name I got blinded by it instead of focussing on what they were doing. The big drama came at the fifteenth. Matsuyama's approach skidded over the surface instead of slowing, and it ended in an ominous splash. He took the drop and held his nerve to get out of it with a bogey. Only now his lead was down to two, with Schauffele breathing closely down his neck....only for Schauffele to find water on the 16th, just when he needed to tighten the screw.

Call it sentiment, but I'm glad. Hideki comes across as a nice guy, and losing it at that stage is something that could have haunted him forever. When people think about the Great White Shark Greg Norman, all many of them remember is that famous 1996 collapse of a six shot lead Nick Faldo at this same venue.

Believe it or not, Phil Mickleson was playing that day, and not only did he play last weekend, but he actually acquitted himself quite respectably!

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

EVICTION DURING COVID-19 LEVEL 5 RESTRICTIONS

Question:: My landlord has asked me to leave my rented accommodation. Can I be evicted during COVID-19?

Answer: Under COVID-19 restrictions, an eviction ban restricted to 5 kilometres from their home. This means that you cannot be evicted at the moment while Ireland is at Level 5, and for a ten-day grace period after this.

are lifted. This means the date you are due to be evicted is extended by 10 days, plus the amount of time Ireland

- Anti-social behaviour
- Acting in a way that would invalidate a house insurance
- Acting in a way that would cause substantial damage to the accommodation
- non-residential purposes

If the eviction notice is for one of these reasons, the eviction can go ahead once the appropriate notice







When we try to make contact with another we must take into consideration how we make contact with the self:

What is our intra-personal relationship like prior to making contact with the other, the inter-personal.

The relationship with the self is crucial and it is important to be cognisant of who we are, what influences our make-up, what we invite into our lives (our world) and to question how we endeavour to preserve it. Self-care can be achieved in many ways and it is unique to every individual; taking ownership and responsibility for this is key and enables us to have empathy for others. Being kinder to ourselves and our loved ones, instead of criticising ourselves and loved ones, will go further to enhance our quality of life on an emotional level and improve our relational skills. As Carl Jung once said "The most terrifying thing is to accept oneself completely". Why not give it a go!




