



# WALK WITH DAVID TO TOKYO

arranfore Maine Valley athlete David Kenny is celebrating a silver medal in the 20km Walk at the European Under 23 Championships which were held in Tallinn in Estonia.

Kenny who is a member of Farranfore / Maine Valley AC is coached by the Rob Heffernan and is the only Irish athlete to win a medal at the Championships. He is alos the first Kerry athlete to win since Gillian O'Sullivan won Silver in 2003 in the 20KM walk, while his coach Robert Heffernan won Bronze in the 50km walk in the 2012 Olympic Games.

David's home club Farranfore Maine Valley Athletic Club is getting behind David's forthcoming trip to Tokyo as he represents Ireland in the Olympic Games and have organised a GoFundMe.

They are asking people to "Walk With David to Tokyo" and are hoping to raise €9,797 which is the distance from Firies Village to Tokyo in Kilometres.

The son of Noel and Mary Kenny from Ballyhar, David was just 8 years old when he was first introduced to Athletics. Like many of his contemporaries at that age, he was also playing Gaelic with Firies and soccer with Ballyhar Dynamos.

Athletics eventually won out, when David tried 'Race Walking' for the Community Games in 2011. Competing for his native parish, Firies, he won a Bronze medal in the National Community Games Race Walk event and was hooked.

A pupil of The Monastery in Killarney David then went on to study at St. Brendan's College Killarney where he trained almost every Wednesday evening with veteran race walker Michael O'Connor. Winning second level titles at both Provincial and National levels he came to the attention of Athletics National Race Walking coach Michael Lane of Mullingar Harriers. David is currently studying Munster Technological University (formerly CIT) and is being coached by Rob Heffernan, a man who needs no introduction to athletic followers. Under Rob's guidance he has moved to an elite level.

"To get to this level is not cheap!! And requires a lot of funding and personal sacrifices", a spokesperson

for Farranfore Maine Valley AC said.

For the past three years David has virtually been a full time athlete. While limited financial aid is provided by Athletics Ireland he is largely self-funded, relying on financial support from his family. David has had to give up his part time job, and is immersed in a vigorous training schedule. Racing competitions and training have kept him traveling to the UK, Sweden, Isle of Man, Spain, Estonia and the Czech Republic among others.


The times and placing in these races have won him sufficient qualifying points for this summer's Tokyo Olympics.

With the Silver Medal that David just won on the 9th July in Estonia, he now has his sights set on Tokyo where he will represent Ireland at the games in the 20KM Walk.

David Kenny is an extraordinarily dedicated athlete. Rob Heffernan has said, "he is better than I was at that age", high praise indeed from Ireland's Gold medal winner in the 50K Moscow walk 2012.














As the search for the 'Best Place to Live in Ireland' 2021 continues apace, its emerged that the tourist town has received 22 nominations, one of the highest in the country.

While Kerry has received 38 nominations in total, the county which has received the most nominations is Monaghan with 136. Ninetyseven of the Monaghan nominations are for the village of Glaslough which is situated in the north of the county and is home of the luxury hotel Castle Leslie.

Dublin is in second place with 126 nominations. The most nominated place in the capital is the suburb of Malahide, with 36 entries but other

locations to receive multiple nominations in Dublin include Dún Laoghaire (12), Blackrock (9) and Skerries (7). Bray in Co Wicklow has received 30 nominations and other places with multiple nominations include: Carlingford Co Louth (9); Clonakilty in Co Cork (7); Tullamore, Co Offaly (7); Clonbur (13) and Portumna (11) in Co Galway; Donegal's Inishowen peninsula (6); and Dungarvan (9) and Tramore (7) in Co Waterford. There have been almost 750 entries so far for the

32-county competition which is organised by the Irish Times. Ten counties - Armagh, Carlow, Derry, Fermanagh, Leitrim, Longford, Meath, Roscommon, Tyrone and Westmeath - have fewer than five nominations. There has been just one each from Roscommon (for Lough Key) and Longford (for Lanesboro). The Irish Times launched its search for the Best Place to Live in Ireland last month and invited people from all over the island to nominate their favourites. Each nominated location will be judged on specific criteria, including community spirit, local services and amenities, diversity, transport links, vibrancy of the local economy, cost of living, safety and of course the unique X factor.

During the summer, the nominated places will be researched and put before a panel of judges, who will choose an eventual winner in September.

Westport emerged as the overall winner when the competition was held for the first time in 2012. To be in with a chance to claim the title for your homeplace, all you have to do is to write a short submission of 300 words explaining what makes it so special. 
But you'll have to move quickly as the closing date for this year's competition, which is supported by Randox Health, is July 25th.

# **NEW MOBILE UNIT LAUNCHED**FOR CORK AND KERRY

In a landmark partnership for the Cork and Kerry region, the Sexual Health Centre has launched a joint community initiative with Cork Local and Southern Regional Drug & Alcohol Task Forces. The organisations are leading out on a unique mobile health service which travels to any and every part of Cork and Kerry - making support, information and interventions available to all.

The 'DASH' (Drugs, Alcohol & Sexual Health) unit was launched at St. Finbarr's Campus in Cork city today (Friday). The project is the first of its kind in Ireland, providing community-wide mobile services such as rapid HIV testing, condom provision, drug and alcohol assessments and support from trained health promotion professionals.

Executive Director of the Sexual Health Centre, Dr. Martin Davoren, noted that DASH will provide an important link to support for communities across Cork and Kerry:

"The aim of the project is to ensure equity of access. We want to break down the barriers that people face in accessing services - be it time, location or cost. DASH is available to all sectors of the community, and is free of charge."

Emily Barrett, DASH Project Worker noted that "DASH will bring opportunities for informal interventions in every village and town across Cork and Kerry. People deserve to get information and support around their health and wellbeing in a friendly and welcoming environment, and DASH will bridge that gap for a lot of people."

The cross-sectoral approach of the project is central to its development and delivery,



as highlighted by Joe Kirby, Co-ordinator of Cork Local Drug & Alcohol Task Force: "Drugs, alcohol and sexual health impact everyone at some point in their lives. The client groups of each of our organisations can all benefit from the ease of access and diverse expertise at the helm of the DASH project. Importantly, DASH will be available to members of the wider community, who may not have the opportunity or encouragement to consider their own needs around drugs, alcohol and sexual health until the DASH van arrives in their local area."

The HSE's Head of Service for Primary Care for Cork and Kerry, Priscilla Lynch commented:

"Drugs, alcohol and sexual health services have operated exclusively, even though there is a lot of overlap in the issues that can come up for service users. The arrival of DASH marks a turning point in how we think about service provision in these areas across the region. It pools our expertise and brings services to people so that comprehensive, accessible supports are truly available to all."

Following a horrific accident in the early hours of Wednesday morning July 7th on Ross Road, Thomas lost his life while his friend is recovering in hospital following numerous surgeries. At his funeral Mass on Saturday morning, Thomas' brother popular entertainer Jack Patrick Healy led the musical tribute to his brother.

In one of the hymns Jack Patrick changed the lines of "Let it Be" adding on "Young Healy".

The mass heard that Thomas was the life and soul of the family, a 40th birthday present for mum Julie and dad Jer and that the house was run on "Thomas Time". Involved in everything in the parish and beyond, Thomas was a talented athlete, playing with Killarney Athletic and Beaufort GAA Club and the family discovered

on the week of his passing that he was in line to wear a Kerry jersey. The music of Jack Patrick filled the air of St. Mary's Church in Beaufort and his rendition of Never Grow Old by Jim Reeves rang out as the cortege left the church. Thomas' older brother Danny paid tribute to his young brother who was always referred to as a nice and polite young man. With a passion for vintage tractors Thomas was regularly found helping his dad Jer who resotred them for charity fundraisers.

Symbols on the alter included a football, his Killarney Athletic Jersey and a vintage tractor. "Like all the Healy boys, Thomas has a mischiveous glint in his eye and he was always

in the centre of our lives, with Julie and Jer always on the sidelines of the matches he was involved in.

This year he started golf and athletics and had inherited the families musical talent appearing in many productions with his brother Jack Patrick. Guards of Honour were performed outside St. Mary's Church in Beaufort by his class mates in the Intermediate School Killorglin and his team mates in Killarney Athletic and Beaufort GAA Club as the funeral cortege passed, led by a Blue Tractor because As Thomas would say....

Walk-in testing without appointment or referral will still be available at the following times:

# **Education** opportunity **FOR KERRY FARMERS**

Kerry Social Farming is collaborating with extensively with UCC and Skellig CRI (Cahirsiveen) in devising and planning the NQF Level 6 'Certificate in Practice Support in Social Farming'. The course is aimed at expanding training opportunities for both new and existing host farmers as part of the Kerry Social Farming initiative. The 'Certificate in Practice Support in Social Farming' was completed by 13 Kerry host farmers in 2020 and a further 15 (a mixture of existing and new host farmers) in 2021. The feedback about the course from farmers is very positive, both in terms of how it has helped their social farming practice and also how returning to education, many after a long break, has benefitted their own personal development and self-confidence.

SKDP's Joseph McCrohan said that this course supports all those engaged to understand the history and components of social farming and disability services. "It supports farmers with communication styles and an opportunity to share and develop suitable activities on their farms that will benefit social farming participants" he said. "Both the host farmers



and their participants enjoy the benefits of the course and it helps support and strengthen the Social Farming initiative" Joseph added. The use of the online virtual world of study over the past academic year has pushed students to further develop their IT skills, along with their learning specific to the course content around Social

The 'Certificate in Practice Support in Social Farming' is taught by experienced teachers, many of whom have direct experience of working in social farming. The course examines a variety of topics, including learning how social farming operates both in Ireland and across Europe, the communities it serves and the outcomes it provides. The role of the environment, the farm setting and well-being and how they link to social farming practice are explored. The course features modules on law and the legal position around disability and equality, which provide a practical insight into the issues involved. Communication is a key topic, with students learning about a variety of communications styles and how to build on their own existing strengths in a way which can improve the social farming experience. There is also a module on social inclusion, which focuses on how groups and individuals may be excluded from society, and how social farming can provide opportunities leading to meaningful and sustainable social inclusion. The course is now established as part of UCC's Adult and Continuing Education (ACE) programme, see link: https://www.ucc.ie/en/ace-cpssf.

Kerry Social Farming (KSF) was established in 2013 to innovatively target both an increasingly marginalised farming community in the county, as well as to include participants, i.e. people with a range of disabilities, in the everyday life of their own community. KSF (www.kerrysocialfarming. ie) offers choice to people with disabilities to engage with farm families and the farming community, in tandem with meeting their personal life choices and exploring new options within a rural community setting.

An information event on the 2021/2022 course, containing feedback from the successful students (farmers), will be held via zoom on 27th July 2021 at 8.00pm. # **2 NEW TECH APPRENTICESHIPS**

### **FOR COUNTY KERRY**



ERRY COLLEGE have announced that 2 new Tech Apprenticeships will start this September in County Kerry - one in Software Development, another in Cybersecurity.

These QQI Level 6 Apprenticeships are 2 years in duration are delivered in partnership with FIT (FastTrack Into IT) who have a track record of running a range of apprenticeships for the tech and IT sectors.

FIT work with over 100 employers across Ireland and is currently collaborating with partner organisations and employers in County Kerry including Kerry SciTech to provide opportunities for tech apprentices from the

county and the wider region.

Apprenticeships use an earn while you learn model where a participating employer hires a tech apprentice who undertakes phases of on-the-job and off-the-job training before fully qualifying.

The first 6 months of the programme will be run online from the Kerry College Tech Apprenticeship Hub in Tralee, with the last 18 months split between Kerry College and the host employer. There are only 14 places on each apprenticeship.

Assistant Manager at Kerry College John Herlihy:

"We are delighted to partner with FIT to bring these 2 superb tech apprenticeships to County Kerry. This provides a fantastic option for school leavers and career changers to move into this growth sector and to earn as they learn. 

# UNCERTAINTY SURROUNDS THE RYANAIR KERRY-DUBLIN ROUTE



With politicians welcoming the return of the twice daily air service between Dublin and Kerry and with Ryanair confirming on Wednesday that they will begin operating the Dublin-Kerry air route, John Mulhern, CEO Kerry Airport has released the following statement.

While Ryanair has announced its intention to operate a service on the Dublin-Kerry route and commenced the sale of seats, there has been no formal discussion yet with Kerry Airport.

The Airport has received no notification in any form from Ryanair and thus the airline's statement of yesterday, Wednesday July 14th, is both premature and inaccurate. Kerry Airport has not been informed of the details relating to any such schedule and, at present, cannot confirm or

otherwise whether these flights will in fact operate.

Earlier in the week, the Department of Transport released a timeline of events in a statement in response to Ryanair stating that no agreement had been concluded.

Statement in response to Ryanair Timeline of events:

The Department of Transport issued a Request for Quotes to operate the Kerry Dublin and Donegal Dublin routes on 21 June 2021.

Ryanair wrote to the Department on 28 June where they indicated that they were making a formal application to operate a double daily Dublin Kerry scheduled service for the next seven months without any public funding.

As the Department were in the middle of the procurement process, the letter was only acknowledged at that stage.

A substantial letter of response from the Minister issued on 6 July after the tender bids had been evaluated. In the letter of 6 July, the Minister asked Ryanair to declare its commitment in writing to meeting a number of requirements.

Ryanair responded on the 8 July confirming that it would operate on a commercial basis (i.e. zero subsidy) a twice daily service between Dublin and Kerry Airports from 19 July 2021 on a Boeing 737-800 which has a capacity of 189 seats. Ryanair asked that the Department accept Ryanair's offer

before close of business on Friday 9 July so that Ryanair could launch and start marketing these flights (see attached correspondence).

The Department engaged with the CEO of Ryanair at approximately 1230 to advise that a letter would issue from the Minister confirming acceptance of the Ryanair offer to operate the Kerry service and that an announcement would be made in the afternoon.

A letter issued from the Minister to Ryanair in writing at 14.55 accepting Ryanair's offer to operate the service. In the letter the Minister advised that respondents to the Request for Quotes (RfQ) issued by the Department on 21 June would be advised that the Minister did not now intend to proceed with the process to provide for subsidised services on the Kerry -Dublin route as per the RfQ. The letter also advised that the Department would engage with Rvanair with regard to coordinating media statements regarding announcements (see attached correspondence). The Department subsequently engaged with Ryanair who had a preference to make the announcement on Monday. The Department reiterated that the Minister's preference was to make an announcement that afternoon and to inform those that participated in the tender process, and that a press statement would issue. The Department agreed to share the Press Statement with Ryanair which it did.

#### SITUATION NOW CRITICAL AT BEAUFORT BURIAL GROUND

A Kerry County Councillor has claimed that the Burial Ground situation in Beaufort is now critical. Fianna Fail Councillor, Michael Cahill raised the matter at a recent Municipal District meeting where he stated that Community Groups in Beaufort, including Beaufort Community Council and the Graveyard Committee are extremely concerned. "The fact that Churchtown Burial Ground, Beaufort is almost at capacity is cause for great concern locally as families now fear that they may not be buried alongside loved ones and may indeed have to be buried outside the Parish" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor. "I have been highlighting this problem for some time now, the matter is at crisis point and it's time for action" stated Councillor Cahill. "This matter is now a top priority for the residents of Beaufort and Kerry County Council must act now by intensifying their efforts to secure a suitable site for a Burial Ground in the Parish" added Councillor Cahill. The Fianna Fail Councillor also called on the Council to address the serious flooding issue at Churchtown as a matter of priority. "Part of the Burial Ground was flooded earlier this

year which led to an embarrassing situation whereby water had to be pumped out during funerals," stated Councillor Cahill. "This was very upsetting for family and relatives of the deceased" stated Mr Cahill.

Responding to Councillor Cahill, Colm Mangan, Senior Executive Engineer of the Water Services Department said:

"Kerry County Council have installed gullies and a soakaway system in Churchtown Burial Ground. This has been effective for most of the year, however as the Winter of 2020/ Spring 2021 was exceptionally wet, there was flooding within the graveyard. This will be closely monitored during this coming winter to see what appropriate additional remedial works are necessary."

"Kerry County Council have been seeking land both for an extension to the existing burial ground or to construct a new one in Beaufort for some time. Our investigations and discussions to date have proven unsuccessful but will continue. This will include discussions with local landowners and community representatives."

# AS IRISH WATER TO REPLACE PIPES



Residents in the Beaufort, Listry and Faha areas are welcoming the announcement that Irish Water, working in partnership with Kerry County Council, is replacing a further 1.2 kms of problematic water mains along the Board of Works Road, to improve reliability of water supply in the areas. For years, residents of these areas have experiened water outages, sometime two or three times a week.

These works will commence in mid-July and are part of Irish Water's national Leakage Reduction Programme. The works will be carried out by Kerry County Council on behalf of Irish Water and this phase of the works is expected to be complete by early September.

The works will take place on the Board of Works Road, Beaufort for approximately 1.2kms on a section between the Gap Cross and Kissane's shop.

Old, damaged pipes will be replaced with modern, polyethylene (plastic) and ductile iron pipes. The works will also involve laying new water service connections from the public water main in the road to customers' property boundaries and connecting it to the customers' water supply. Where the existing service connections on the public side are lead, these will be replaced as part of this improvement

work. This work is being carried out as part of Irish Water's Leakage Reduction Programme, which will see €500m invested nationally to tackle problematic pipes and leakage in Ireland's ageing water network.

"Irish Water acknowledges the significant disruption caused by ongoing breaks to the watermains in the Beaufort, Listry and Faha areas. We would like to thank the local community, businesses, homeowners and commuters for their patience and cooperation while we deliver this vital water network improvement project." said Paul Moroney,

Leakage Reduction Programme Manager, Irish Water.

"Replacing the old, damaged pipes will safeguard water supply along the Board of Works Road and surrounding areas. The new water mains and service connections will reduce the instances of bursts and water outages. These improvements to the water network are essential in providing a safe, secure and reliable water supply, now and into the future."

The works may involve some short-term water shut offs and the project team will ensure that customers are given a minimum of 48 hours' notice prior to any planned water shut offs. Where water mains are being constructed, traffic management will be in place to ensure the works are carried out safely. In order to complete this work safely and efficiently a temporary road closure from Kissane's shop to the Gap of Dunloe cross is required. Recommended diversions will be signposted on approach. Local access will be maintained throughout the works. Local and emergency traffic will be maintained at all times.

"We understand that this type of work can be disruptive, but we are committed to working with the local community to minimise disruption," added Paul Moroney.

Cllr. Michael Cahill, a long time campaigner for the upgrade has welcomed the news.

Speaking to Killarney Outlook this week he said "The residents, young and old, of Beaufort, Listry and Faha, have not receiving a proper service from Irish Water. "The water service throughout Kerry is far from perfect, but what the people of Beaufort, Listry and Faha have had to endure in 2021 is difficult to believe. I have called time and time again for funding to be put in place to replace the entire pipe network in this area as it is not fit for purpose and families, young and old, are suffering daily because of it" he said.

The health and well-being of these people has been and continues to be put at risk and that is not acceptable in this day and age" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I still believe that all the pipes will have to be replaced", not just 1.2km", the councillor added.

### INVESTMENT FOR RURAL ROADS AND LANEWAYS

Minister Foley welcomes double investment for upgrade works on rural roads and laneways Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley has today welcomed an increased investment to €21 million for upgrade works on non-public roads in rural communities.

The announcement doubles the original €10.5m budget which had been allocated for investment under the 2021 Local Improvement Scheme

(LIS). This will improve access to rural homes and farms, as well as outdoor amenities such as lakes, rivers, mountains and beaches. The focus of the scheme is to support the continued improvement of rural roads and laneways that are not normally maintained by local authorities but which represent a vital piece of infrastructure for rural residents. The Scheme was relaunched in 2017 and over 10,000 landowners and residents

in rural Ireland have benefitted to date.

Commenting on the announcement, Minister Foley said: "I welcome this funding which will provide vital investment in rural communities across Kerry. This funding will provide upgrade works and improvements to rural homes and farms as well as our world class outdoor amenities such as lakes, rivers, mountains and beaches."



# It went off by mistake

# Killarney waitress hit by stray bullet a few minutes before the Truce



final victim Ireland's War Independence was a 48 year-old waitress who had stepped onto the street outside the Killarney hotel in which she worked and was fatally wounded by a stray bullet fired by an unidentified RIC officer. Hannah Carey died when the policeman accidentally discharged his revolver as he drove through the streets of the town and shortly after an IRA attack on two British soldiers near the town centre.

Hannah was standing at the door of the Imperial Hotel on College Street when she sustained a bullet wound to the neck just a few minutes before noon on Monday, 11 July 1921, when the agreed cessation of hostilities was to come into effect. The centenary of her death occurs on Sunday next.

According to research by Kerry historian, Owen O'Shea, Carey lay dying for two hours on the floor of the hotel on College Street, where she worked as a waitress, before succumbing to her injury and despite the intervention of two local doctors. As she stumbled off the street after being shot, she mumbled to her employer, 'I am done' before collapsing to the ground.

The unmarried native of Killarney died a short time after the shooting of two British soldiers at High Street and as the Crown Forces and the IRA continued to exchange fire as the clock ticked down to the official ceasefire at noon on 11 July.

'Hannah Carey has been a minor footnote in the history of the War of Independence for so long that I felt her story deserved more attention,' said O'Shea, who has examined the report of the official enquiry into her death. 'Behind all of the military casualties on both sides of the conflict are so many ordinary civilians who were caught in the crossfire and Hannah Carey - described as a "most harmless woman" - tragically holds the unenviable honour of being the last person to die during the War of Independence.'



Just minutes before Carey was shot, the local IRA launched their final attack on the Crown Forces in Kerry. Sergeants Edward Mears and FG Clarke of the 1st Battalion of the Royal Fusiliers were attacked on High Street on the orders of IRA leaders, John Joe Rice and Humphrey Murphy. Mears later died of his injuries.

'Official reports and several newspapers suggested Hannah died during the attack on Mears and Clarke but this was not true,' said Owen O'Shea. 'Instead she met her fate as an RIC lorry travelled along College Street in the aftermath of that incident. The unidentified driver of the Crossley Tender lorry later told the inquest that he was driving the truck with his loaded revolver in his hand. As he "gripped the wheel tighter," the revolver went off. He didn't realise anyone had been shot, telling a fellow officer, "it went off by mistake."

In her statement to the Court of Inquiry which followed three days later, 45 year-old hotel proprietor, Marie Slattery, recounted how Hannah Carey ran in from the door and collapsed into her arms. 'I saw a bullet fall on the floor ... the deceased spoke a few words and said "I am done." The hotel cook described how he loosened Hannah's clothes to discover the

bullet wound in her neck. Two doctors administered aid but she died two hours later and was buried the following day.

The inquiry concluded that Hannah Carey died of asphyxia, following [a] gun shot wound in [the] thorax, and that she died about two hours after. The only rebuke from the Court of Inquiry for the unnamed RIC officer who killed her was that he had 'contravened all instructions on the subject of handling and using arms.'

At its meeting the following week, the members of Killarney Urban District Council passed a vote of sympathy to the family of 'Miss Hannah Carey of Killarney.'

There is no known photograph of Hannah Carey nor has Owen O'Shea been able to trace any descendants. "I would love to hear from anyone who might be descended from Hannah Carey or who might have a photograph of her", Owen told Killarney Outlook. His email is owen@owenoshea.ie In his book on the Truce, Pádraig Óg Ó Ruairc refers to Carey as being the last person killed in the war as does T Ryle Dwyer in 'Tans, Terror and Troubles' and she is also listed in the recently published 'Dead of the Irish Revolution' by Dáithí Ó Corráin and Eunan O'Halpin.

ore than half of all new houses built in Kerry in the past five years were one off houses in the countryside. A large proportion of these house will have been built using direct labour. Below I will outline the insurance implications when building your own house.

#### **FIRE COVER**

If you are applying for a mortgage on the house your bank will request their interest to be noted on a "Fire Policy". If you are using a building contractor you will be able to obtain a "Fire in the course of construction policy". This type of policy is usually only accepted prior to the commencement of any construction works. In the situation where you are using a contractor you should request copies of their combined liability policy and contact works policy for your own protection.

#### **SELF BUILD**

If you are using direct labour and individually appointed sub-contractors then you will need a self-build policy. This type of policy covers Employers Liability for your legal liability for accidental death or injury of an employee and Public liability to protect you as the property owner for your legal liability for accidental death, injury or third party property damage This type of policy will also cover the contract works in progress against for example fire, storm, flood, and malicious damage to name a few. The policy can extend to cover materials for use in the project, plant tools and equipment

including temporary site huts. Your Mortgage Banks interest can be noted on this policy for your mortgage application.

Self-build policies will include cover for professional fees such as architects, surveyors and engineers fees, demolition and removal of debris costs and hire charges in the event of an insured loss for hired in plant. The policy period options can range from 12 months to 24 months in duration.

Just to note that cover for building your own house should be in place before work has commenced. I would also advise that you ensure your architect, engineer, surveyor etc all have current professional indemnity and liability insurance in place and request copies for your records.

# Former Kerry footballer Killian Young BACKS RNLI SUMMER WATER SAFETY CAMPAIGN



ormer Kerry footballer and Renard player Killian Young has joined a host of wellknown GAA people who have given their backing to the RNLI's summer water safety campaign by producing their own home video messages with important water safety advice. The videos are part of the partnership between the RNLI and the GAA to prevent drowning and save lives.

Killian is joined by former Kilkenny hurler Jackie Tyrrell, Cork footballer Brian Hurley, Galway camogie player Shauna Healy, Antrim hurler Neil McManus and Dublin footballer Lyndsey Davey, as well as GAA commentator Marty Morrissey. Each video features a water safety message and includes the charity's 'Float to Live' message, how to raise the alarm if you see someone in trouble, carrying a means of calling for help, leaving inflatables at home and always telling someone where you are going. The RNLI and the GAA will be sharing the videos online and hope that people will in turn share them among their own friends and family. This summer is already looking to be one of the busiest for lifeboat crews and the charity is asking people to be aware of the potential dangers involved in their chosen water activities.

Commenting on the campaign RNLI Head of Water Safety Gareth Morrison said, 'In working with well-known people from the GAA we have been able to share life-saving advice with the people we know need to hear it the most. Through this partnership RNLI volunteers have been working with GAA communities locally to share water safety advice. Sharing this advice and information during a busy summer could save a life. We are grateful to our ambassadors who made these videos for us and while we haven't been able to come together in person, we have still been able to work together to help save lives.' Killian filmed his video overlooking Fenit harbour where the RNLI has a lifeboat



station, one of two in the Kingdom, along with Valentia RNLI. His video message is about the danger of inflatables. The footballer advises to keep them at home, the charity has already seen a sharp rise in the number of callouts involving inflatables which can be easily blown out to sea with offshore winds. The message also advises to avoid mixing alcohol with any water-based activity and to know how to raise the alarm if you see someone in trouble on the water by dialling 999 or 112 and asking for the Coast Guard.

Commenting on his involvement in the video Killian said 'I am delighted to be involved with the RNLI on their GAA partnership. As a proud Kerry man I know all too well the attraction of the sea and the dangers of it too if you are not prepared for it. Living on an island with such a beautiful coastline, we should all know basic water safety advice and what to do when we head to the beach or out on the water. The RNLI/GAA partnership is working to share this advice with people in their local communities. These small videos only take a second to share but they could be the second that saves life.'

### FUNDING ANNOUNCED FOR VOLUNTARY GROUPS

Two Killarney organisations hae benefited from funding this week.

K.A.S.I. Company an NGO - Non-Governmental Organisation which offers services for Ethnic Minority, Traveller and Roma Communities will receive €19,011 while Killarney Water Rescue Community/Voluntary Organisation which provides Emergency Relief Services will receive €4,000. Minister Norma Foley has welcomed over €149,000 in support payments for Kerry community and voluntary groups.

Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley welcomes €149,415 in Covid-19 Stability funding for community and voluntary groups in Kerry. The primary aim of the fund is to support organisations suffering financially due to a reduction in their fundraising and/or traded income due to the

cash flow issues as a result of the Pandemic. Minster Foley says: "This money will provide vital services for so many excellent voluntary organisations around the county. It is a wonderful endorsement of outstanding contribution they make to local communities."







# TRUCE IN THE WAR OF INDEPENDENCE

# MARKED IN KILLARNEY



n the Commemoration of the 100th Anniversary of the Truce in the War of Independence, politicians and locals gathered at the Ceremony at Gardens of Remembrance in Killarney last Saturday.

Speaking at the ceremony, Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Marie Moloney said:

"Even though we are restricted by public health guidelines, it is important, as public representatives, that we gather to commemorate the end of the War of Independence a century ago while adhering to health

guidelines by social distancing.

It is also appropriate that we gather here at the 1916 Garden of Remembrance which was opened during the commemorations of the centenary of the Easter Rising five years ago.

The War of Independence represented a continuation of what began at Easter 1916 and which ultimately led to independence and the foundation of our Free State.

The war was a traumatic and turbulent time for County Kerry and for Killarney. And I am thinking this weekend of all those who lost their lives in that conflict, be they combatant or civilian. Kerry, more than most counties, experienced the hardship and brutality of the conflict and it impacted on every parish and every corner of the county.

And I am also thinking of one of those civilians who died just minutes before the Truce came into effect, and who was killed just a short distance from here on College Street. 100 years ago tomorrow, Hannah Carey, waitress at the Imperial Hotel was killed when an RIC officer fired his weapon from a passing vehicle. Hannah was hit by the stray bullet She is, tragically, the last person to die in Ireland's War of Independence. To make her death as the last person in Ireland to die during the war of Independence, I have asked Kerry County Council to erect a plaque in her memory.

I hope that this weekend that everyone in our county and in our country can take a moment to reflect and remember the events of 100 years ago.

This was a difficult and traumatic time in our community and today, we hope and pray that all those who died are resting in peace.

# €750,000 ALLOCATED TO COMMUNITY GROUPS AND PROJECTS

#### ACROSS KERRY UNDER COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUND



GROUPS in Killarney have received funding from Kerry County Council as part of the allocation of €750,000 in support for community groups and projects across the county under the Community Support Fund for 2021.

A total of 123 groups and projects are receiving grant aid worth €475,000 this year while a proportion of the fund, totalling €275,000, is being retained to leverage funding from other funding streams for strategic projects at Municipal District level.

Over the past two years, over €10 million was leveraged from other national grant sources as a result of the strategic allocation of resources under the Community Support Fund.

The fund, which is in its seventh year, has now supported 1,623 projects since 2015 to the value of €5.25m since its establishment. As occurred in previous years, some of the Community Support Fund will be used this year to target strategic projects in the five municipal districts and to cofund projects which are in receipt of grants from other sources. Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr. Jimmy Moloney, said: 'Over the last 12 months, in addition to the Community Support Fund, significant funding has already been  $allocated\,across\,the\,County\,to\,support\,community$ and voluntary groups impacted by the COVID 19 pandemic. Now more than ever, community and voluntary groups need the support from Kerry County Council to reconnect communities and rebuild our local economies as we recover from the impact of COVID 19. The retention of part of the fund to help to leverage funding from National funding schemes to co-fund projects has proven to be an enormous success and is critical for the long-term regeneration of our towns and villages.' Councillors in the five Municipal Districts met on Wednesday 14 July to decide on the allocations and unanimously welcomed the provision of support to the recipients. Councillors congratulated all the community groups and acknowledged the tremendous voluntary work that these groups do. In 2021, a review of the Community Support Fund (CSF) was undertaken where the categories of support were re-purposed to help communities and rural economies across the County to recover from the impact of the COVID 19 pandemic and to provide confidence to communities as we work together to rebuild and reconnect communities. For 2021, the fund will target funding under four categories of support: Rebuilding and Reconnecting Communities Community Tidy Town Initiatives and Amenity Projects

### SUMMER EYES

As the weather gets warmer and the days grow longer, we often think about improving our health and getting into better shape. As you prepare to enjoy the outdoors this summer, don't forget a plan for keeping your eyes happy as well.

#### Avoid getting"sunburn of the eye"

When sunlight shines off water, sand or other highly reflective surfaces into your eyes, it can cause a very painful condition called photokeratitis. This is when the sun's ultraviolet rays burn the surface of your eye. Pain, redness, blurriness and even temporary vision loss are symptoms of this condition. Prevent photokeratitis by wearing sunglasses that are marked "100% UV protection." Also, wear a broadbrimmed hat for added eye protection.

#### Prevent "swimmer's eye" in the pool

Pools can be tough on the eyes. Chemicals used to keep the water clean, such as chlorine, can affect the natural tear film that keeps our eyes moist and healthy. Nobody really expected a humdinger here. It is an inevitability In fact, almost all the games at this stage of the season were pretty one-sided and lacked entertainment. It is an inevitability at this stage. Everyone blames the format, but what I see is a paucity of quality teams, and no structure change can really fix that. Tipperary were a comet last year, but all that remains of that glory is cold ashes after a poor league and six of last year's team unavailable.

This kind of game is horrible for the favourites. If you struggle, it's taken as a major sign of weakness, whereas if you win comfortably, it counts for nothing and, in fact, can dull your sharpness. The harsh reality was that this was a game to get out of the way.

Kerry were not perfect. Once again a few kickouts had us scrambling, though we did very well pressing forward on Tipperary's own restarts. The defence are still very jittery when players run at us. David Moran was excellent in midfield, and while Diarmuid O'Connor was a bit quieter than usual, that's still a very high standard. Up front Paudie Clifford was yet again a whirlwind of activity and Seán O'Shea is now our most important player. Some supporters were a bit disappointed at David Clifford's scoring return – it was only a mere 1-2! My own opinion, and it is just opinion, is that Kerry never really pushed out of first gear, but had an awful lot more in the tank if it was required.

Sean O'Shea opened the scoring before Conor Sweeney replied – Tipperary's captain was very good. Sean added a free and then a great run by Gavin White saw David Clifford almost break the net from close range. Game over already, I was fairly sure, and to be honest I wasn't wrong in that. Paul Geaney added a point and a free from Seán O'Shea left the score at 1-4 to 0-1.

Kevin Fahey got Tipperary's first point from play in the 20th minute. Sean O'Shea and Conal Kennedy swapped scores. Tom O'Sullivan's man had dropped back as a sweeper, but that only brought the Gaeltacht man up the field and he showed what a mistake that is with two fine points.

Jack Kennedy ran past defenders far, far too easily and won a penalty slotted home by Conor Sweeney. Very sloppy defending, and it's been an achilles heel for Kerry for a long time now. God be with the days of Seamus Moynihan or Mike McCarthy, you weren't getting that kind of opening!


Sean O'Shea rapidly reeled that in with three points and Diarmuid O'Connor added another

Conor Sweeney (f) and David Clifford traded early second half scores. Jack Kennedy pulled another one back but they needed Evan Comerford to make a great save. It was completely immaterial; Kerry closed it out through David Moran and Killian Spillane to a lone free from Jack Kennedy closed out a relatively tame win.

No major lessons learned, I suppose (except for the defending!) and another hurdle comfortable in the rearguard mirror.

I watched the game in my brother's house with tea and biscuits (a coach once told me that nutrition is crucial on matchdays). I don't



have Sky; I'm not getting Sky. But I have to be fair and admit that their coverage and analysis, especially Kieran Donaghy's, really was excellent. Better than anything I have seen on RTE, to be truthful.

I also have to give Peter Keane credit for his interview afterwards, in particular. Peter paid tribute afterwards to Killorglin man Jimmy O'Connor, great gael Vincent Harty, and 14 year old Thomas Healy, all of whom sadly passed away recently. "This was a very difficult week and I hope, by our performance tonight, that we have brought some joy to the people of Kerry who didn't get the opportunity to come up here but were able to watch it on television, or listen to it on the radio, or were able to come up here. That ultimately is what's most important, that sense of community and of togetherness."

Very well said.

Be Responsible - Be Safe





Bhuel, níl sé ag teacht abhaile., It is a cliché, but also a truism, that the Irish are the most loved soccer supporters in all of Europe. It's a fact that we very often make too much of, to be honest. It certainly used to annoy one of our most talented, famous, and....um, notorious...players who felt that Irish supporters should be more demanding of their team.

You always missed the point there, Roy. Going to matches abroad was always about the party, not the result.

It was the European Championships in Poland that illustrated the point perfectly. Everyone who went out there supporting Ireland had an absolute whale of a time. And Europe looked on in total bemusement as the team produced shambolic displays. Ireland was the only team there that didn't have a single member playing in their domestic competitions. We lost all three games badly. And celebrated beside the confused but appreciative victors as if we had won. And you know what? Good for us. Dead right.

Understand something. In the seventies and eighties, plenty of Irish people went abroad. Most of them never got to come home. The truth is that this country really was a backward,

repressive place dominated by a clerical hegemony and corrupt politicians. Public service and bank jobs were coveted and you needed connections more than qualifications. Young people were frustrated. The traditional sense of being 'Irish' had failed us. Employment, never high in an empire-dominated, tourism and rural agriculture dependent country, was hitting record lows.

Two very different performers encapsulated the mood, Christy Moore and Bono. Their songs were relevant. They were 'us' and they were something to be proud of. Sean nós and trad (don't mistake me, I love them) were viewed as emblematic of a culture that felt like failure.

Bloody right that when we got to go to other countries, we partied (which mostly meant an unhealthy amount of drink). We would talk about those trips in the dole queues for years afterwards. Joxer went to Stuttgart and it was the most exotic thing Joxer would do in his life. England was completely different. Their grandparents had fought a war and their parents were part of the most affluent, progressive generation England has ever seen. But England's economy was starting to creak badly. The old industries of coal and iron from the Industrial Revolution were beginning to need more and more Government subsidies. A lot of us lived there. Racism was as endemic as in Ireland, but we had few enough to inflict it on. England, with so many immigrants from former colonies, had all the ingredients for terrace hooligans to thrive. It was their way of asserting themselves when the economy and class system kept them down.

English supporters viewed us as their own and always cheered for us in neutral games.

They couldn't understand why we don't, and won't, support them. Beating England in 1988 defined a generation.

We are very economically dependent on Britain. 42% of our agriculture is exported to Britain. We import more of their goods than China, India, or Brazil. We trade over £1 billion worth of goods and services every single week. Ireland is Britain's favourite holiday destination. 3.5 million British people visit this island on holiday every year. Brexit may be the most stupid thing England's sense of isolationism and anglo supermacy has ever done. Mind you, their thoughtless approach to covid runs it close.

So how come so many of us were happy to see England lose to Italy? Well, the jingoism of the English media doesn't help their cause. They encourage a sense of entitlement to victory. And the history... But I could get over all of that and remain neutral. I've been to England many times. I have close family and many relatives and friends from there. But one thing made me really want Italy to win. The hooligans. You can argue that the security at Wembley wasn't good enough, but it shouldn't have needed to be. The blatant racism. It's a minority, I do believe, but it's there and it's very real. Taking a knee matters. Marcus Rashford feeding children matters. The rioting, the fighting, the racism chants? They matter. Of course most English people aren't racist. Bigotry is unjustified selfexclusion, and that's stupid. But there was enough of them among English supporters to loathe their own team. Skin colour was their issue, not penalties, not even trophies.

People drew comparisons with the make-up and behaviour of Trump supporters. But it made me think of one moment in history far more, and I really did get a chill. Kristallnacht, Germany, 1938.







He who had no sin became sin for us. Jesus, who was without sin, took our place on the cross: we exchange our guilt for His innocence. (2 Corinthians 5:21)


From the moment we accept Jesus Christ as our saviour we are free!

Welcome back dear reader continuing on the Kingdom of God. Jesus prayed 'Your Kingdom come, Your will be done, on earth as it is in Heaven" (Matthew 6:10). Sharing the Passover meal Jesus revealed the New Covenant of mercy and peace with God because of His Body and His Blood which were about to be given in sacrifice for our Salvation. Then He went out to a garden called Gethsemane to pray. Gethsemane means 'oil press' in Hebrew. This is where they used to apply incredible pressure upon the olives in order to draw out the oil. Under intense pressure what is inside will come out, is the principle behind drawing oil from the olive, and that's so for us too. Interesting that this is the spot the Lamb of God chose to pray.

Jesus prayed alone as His friends had fallen asleep. He prayed "My Father if it is possible let this cup of suffering be taken from Me. Yet, I want Your will to be done, not Mine" (Matthew 26:39 NLT). Jesus said that His soul was crushed with grief because of what He was facing, and while He was praying His sweated out blood (Luke 22:44). This is a documented rare condition called 'hematohidrosis' where one is in such distress that blood vessels burst and leak into the sweat glands causing blood to come out with sweat. Absolute terror attacked the Lord as His death loomed. But - Jesus won the battle in prayer, so that all of humanity could receive Salvation through His sacrifice! He overcame fear for the joy that was beyond the cross so much so, that when He was arrested, beaten, falsely accused, spat upon, rejected by those He cherished, had His beard pulled out, deserted and condemned yet He maintained His peace, and 'opened not His mouth' as was prophesied about Him in Isaiah chapter 53.

Furthermore, He forgave those who had done this to Him and prayed the Father would not hold it against them as 'they do not know what they are doing' (Luke 23:34).

God is so merciful dear one - this is the reason He sent His Son Jesus. He knew we could never save ourselves or overcome sin by good works (Ephesians 2:8-9). So God came Himself as a human being and defeated sin, death and the forces of hell to free Satan's captives and bring us back into right relationship with Him in peace through the precious, perfect blood of the Lord Jesus. This is the Gospel - 'not My will, but Yours...' And the Father's will is that all men be saved and come to the knowledge of Him (1st Timothy 2:4). Listen friend, we must live a lifestyle of repentance in obedience to God's Word. Pray for those who have hurt you - forgive them, before it's too late (Mark 11:26). Jesus is coming back soon for those who believe in Him — a bride that's ready and waiting in faith, without spot or wrinkle from whom the devils foothold has been removed (Matthew 25:1-13).
