

Killarney students celebrate excellent results

Hundreds of students across Kerry received their Leaving Certificate results this week and students at schools in Killarney were among

Speaking to Killarney Outlook this week, deputy principal of St. Brigid's Secondary School Mairead Lucey said the tradition of academic excellence at St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary School was continued yesterday morning when almost 80 students collected their Leaving Certificate results from school Principal, Ms. Róisín Moore.

"The girls were in great form as they gathered in the school from 9am and there were lots of cheers when students opened their results with many surpassing their own expectations. 21% of students achieved over 500 points and 44% of students got in excess of 450 points. In the

Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA) the excellent standard of previous years was upheld with almost 60% of students getting over 94% which is an outstanding result" Ms Lucey said. "Although the current debate around compulsory Irish remains divisive, the Pres girls who chose to study higher level Irish reaped huge rewards when they opened their results yesterday as the Irish results were exceptional despite its reputation as one of the toughest subjects. Four Novices Professed at The Friary



Killarney welcomed cyclists on the Tour de Munster on Saturday afternoon much to delight of the management and staff at Deenagh Lodge.

Since Thursday, August 8th, cyclists have been tackling the roads of Munster as part of the 600km, four-day Tour de Munster charity cycle, raising vital funds and awareness for the Munster branches of Down Syndrome Ireland (DSI) and individual beneficiaries.

Long term supporter of the tour, cycling legend Sean Kelly once again cycled the 600km trip, leading the tour through the beautiful towns and villages of Munster. The tour started in Cork City on Thursday morning and covered an average of 150km per day as cyclists and support teams made their way

through Waterford, Tipperary, Limerick, Clare, Kerry, and then back to Cork on the final day where the cycle came to a thrilling end in Cork City, as over 100 amateur cyclists tackled the notoriously steep St. Patricks Hill to the sounds and cheers of supporters.

Since its inception in 2001, Tour de Munster has raised over €2.78 million for its beneficiaries, with almost €2.3 million for DSI alone. This year's tour was a special year as it celebrated the tenth year with Down Syndrome Ireland Munster branches as the main beneficiary of the tour.

Commenting at the top of St. Patrick's Hill, Paul Sheridan founder of Tour de Munster was very appreciative for everyone's support. "We have had a fantastic four days and I would like to

thank everyone involved who got behind the tour. Huge thanks and admiration goes to all of this year's cyclists, without them none of this would be possible. What they have done over the past four-days, travelling 150km each day and putting every ounce of effort in must be applauded. We were delighted to welcome back the many cyclists who support the tour, year after year, as well the new faces who were completing their first tour."

Paul continued, "The tour received such a warm welcome throughout Munster's six counties which meant a lot, it really motivated everyone and spurred us on. When you see the families who benefit from the funds raised, cheering you on, you remember exactly why you are doing this."

Nature Music which has taken place in Killarney during July and August will take place on Friday August 23rd and Sunday August 25th at the Garden Room in Killarney House.

NATURE MUSIC is led by the composer and sound artist Seán Ó Dálaigh incollaboration with the Scotia Ensemble of Tralee and will feature music by Vivaldi and a brand new composition by Seán, which will be focusing on the theme of nature and the environment. The Randles family has installed a defibrillator on an exterior wall of the popular Dromhall Hotel on the Muckross Road.

The device will be available round the clock to the guests of the Hotel and its sister property, Randles Hotel and also to the local community in the event of a cardiac emergency.

"The installation of a defibrillator is something my family always wanted to do" Bernadette Randles told the Killarney Outlook.

"The defibrillator is available outside the hotel 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The important message now is for the community and businesses especially on the Muckross Road side of town is to know the location of their newest and nearest defibrillator unit", she added.

Managing Director of Dromhall Hotel, Bernadette Randles is delighted to have the led the purchase and facilitated the installation of the unit and believes "Each unit will save lives and the provision of these life-saving pieces of equipment around the town and county increases the survival rate of a person in



cardiac arrest and the hotel will be a helpful place in times of emergency."

There will always be a trained first aider on duty and the defibrillator itself is designed to be usable by anyone, "Press the button on the machine and it will tell you what to do" Bernadette said.

Welcoming the news, Damien Baker from Heart of Ireland said "We are delighted to see business owners installing public accessible AEDs in their premises. We would urge anyone with an AED in their workplace to consider putting it on an outside wall to make them publicly accessible", he added.

The Muckross Road is a very busy part of Killarney and to have a defibrillator installed for public access in a central location but also for the surrounding businesses in the area can only be a positive addition to the area.

TD requests Housing Minister to raise income limits




Danny Healy-Rae TD has called on Minister for Housing Minister Eoghan Murphy to review of the income limit for family units applying for social housing and asking that the limit is raised. Several housing applicants are unfairly being thrown off the housing list due to the unfair income limits. As an example a couple with 3 children applying to Kerry County Council can only have an income of €33,750 or less which is only €2,750 more than a single person housing applicant. This is very unfair

and it discourages families from working as they end up worse off if they do so. I also ask for those families in receipt of Working Family Payment WFP (formerly known as FIS Family Income Supplement), that this payment not be taken into account as in many instances it puts families over the income limit when they need this payment to survive. FIS or any other social welfare payment for families should not be assessed as part of income for family housing applicants.

USING A PENSION TO PAY LESS TAX

Pension contributions provide a way of paying less income tax. Up to Revenue Limits, contributions to a pension qualify for relief from income tax. This effectively means that, where the higher rate of income tax is 40% and you are a higher rate taxpayer, a €100 contribution to a pension will only have a net cost to you of €60 (had you not made the contribution, the other €40 would have gone to the government as income tax).

Pensions carry another tax benefit: they grow free of tax, unlike deposit accounts in Banks etc (which are generally subject to tax on interest in the form of DIRT Tax) or investment in property or shares (where rent or dividends are liable to income tax and gains in value are subject to Capital Gains Tax).

When your pension benefits are drawn down, a Retirement Lump Sum of normally at least 25% of the value of your pension can usually be taken either completely free of tax. The rest of the benefit, is usually taken in the form of a retirement fund or a pension for life, is taxable. However many people will find themselves in paying much less tax in retirement than when they were working and making pension contributions, and so will often not pay a lot of tax on their pension income when they retire.



The programme takes place over a period of six weeks and is open to people aged 18 years and over. You can secure your place with a booking deposit of €30 (€10 for students, and those who are unemployed or over 65 years or who hold a medical card) - refundable at the end of the programme - by visiting www.aware.ie/

It is estimated that there are more than 450,000



people in Ireland who experience depression at any one time, while there are approximately 45,000 people diagnosed with bipolar disorder. Depression and bipolar disorder are mental health conditions that affect our thinking, energy, feelings and behaviour. While they can vary from mild to severe, and impact on our relationships, family and work lives, it is possible to find ways to manage the conditions, and to lead healthy and productive lives.

According to Bríd O'Meara, Aware's Director of Services, the new programme is designed to help people better cope with the challenges in their lives:

"The Life Skills Programme is designed to

give people insights into how we think and how this can influence our actions in both helpful and unhelpful ways. 

Puck Power Go-Fund-Me success for Ireland's oldest festival

Thousands gathered on Saturday last for the beginning of one of Ireland's most famous annual spectacles; Puck Fair. With mounting bills and significant financial strain on the cards, the Puck Fair committee made the decision to launch a GoFundMe campaign in July, appealing to the generosity of the general public to help them continue one of Ireland's longest-standing traditions.

The people came forward in their droves and dug deep, with the €10,000 target all but met within a matter of weeks. The campaign will run until the end of August, with committee members hopeful that those attending this year's festival will be encouraged to donate further after experiencing the fun of the fair first-hand.



APPEALING

If you wish to have any of your subject scripts re-marked through the appeal process, you may do so online on your CSSP. The subject appeal application will be available from 5pm tomorrow, Fri., 16th Aug and will close at 5pm, Thurs., 22nd Aug. The application is the same for all scripts whether marked manually or online. The fee is €40 per LC subject and €15.50 per LCA subject. The fee will be refunded if your result is upgraded. Appeal results will be available online only through the CSSP in the week ending Fri., 20th Sept. Last year, 9087 grades in individual subjects were appealed by 5197 candidates. 1453 of those grades were upgraded, which is about 16% of all grades appealed. Only five grades were downgraded. The SEC automatically informs the CAO of all changes of results. If you are entitled to a further offer from CAO as a result of the outcome of the appeal, the CAO will automatically issue that offer to you.

AVAILABLE PLACES

The CAO available places facility opens on Tues., 20th Aug. (noon) at www.cao.ie. This facility is free to those who have already made an application to CAO, whether placed or not, and at a €45 fee to those who have not applied to CAO.

Summer Gardening

Trees & Shrubs

In addition to being ornamental, trees and shrubs provide privacy and shade. They screen eyesores and provide habitats for wildlife. Long-lived, they need little attention once they are established. In terms of garden design, aim to have a combination of different shapes, contrasting colours of foliage and specimens that will provide interest at different times of the year. Evergreens keep their leaves, deciduous give a sense of the seasons: bare branched silhouettes in winter, buds and blossom in spring, green leaves in summer, autumn foliage, fruit and berries and interesting bark.

WHICH TREE?

For maximum health and growth, choose your tree or shrub to suit soil type, climate and available space. Soil testing kits are simple to use and available at all good gardening centres. Consider shape: the wide variety available includes columnar, conical, spreading and weeping. Bear in mind that many trees change their shape dramatically in maturity and different varieties of the same species can have different shapes; Carpinus columnaris (Hornbeam) is narrowly compact, Carpinus pendula is mushroom-headed. Size is probably the most important consideration. Never underestimate the potential size of your tree in maturity. Ideal for a small garden is a specimen that will reach no more than six metres in ten years. Suitable deciduous specimens include the crab apple (Malus), medlar (Mespilus germanica), mountain ash (Sorbus aucuparia 'Fastigata'), flowering cherry (Prunus), hornbeam (Carpinus betulus), hawthorn (crataegus) and ornamental sycamore (Acer pseudoplatanus 'Brilliantissimum'); evergreens include columnar yew (Taxus baccata 'Fastigiata Aureomarginata'), colorado spruce (Picea pungens), blue spruce (Picea pungens 'Koster') and the dwarf spruce Picea glauca var. albertiana 'Conica', perfect for the rockery. For a sheltered town garden, consider Paulownia tomentosa. In an Irish climate it is unlikely to produce the flowers that give it its nickname, the foxglove tree, but if the tree is pollarded (head pruned), the result is spectacularly large, bright green leaves.

HOW TO PLANT

Trees and shrubs bought bare-rooted can be planted between November and March provided the ground is neither frozen or water-logged. When you order the tree, order a sturdy stake which should be planted first and a designed-for-the-job rubber tie to secure the tree to the stake.

The secret of good planting is thorough preparation. In a hole wide enough to take the spread of the roots and deep enough to bring the soil up to the same level as it was in the nursery (or container), dig in leaf mould, wellrotted compost or manure. This helps moisture retention and provides nutrients. Container-grown specimens can be planted year round. Give them a good soaking for 40 minutes before planting and fi rm the earth around the tree to ensure there are no air pockets. To give it the best start in life the area around any newly planted tree must be kept weed-free, either by regular hoeing or covering with ornamental mulch, such as chipped bark, to help suppress weeds. To give added interest, spring and autumn flowering bulbs can be planted in the eye of the tree Cats can destroy a sapling by using it as a scratching post. Protect the bark either with wire mesh fencing, or with a spiral tree guard that wraps round the trunk.




SHRUBS

Shrubs should form the framework of any planting plan. Used in varying heights, widths and shapes, evergreen and deciduous, they provide structure and perspective, creating focal points that direct the eye round the garden. With the right shrubs in the right situation, a garden will look good year-round. Unlike herbaceous plants, once established, shrubs are relatively low maintenance. They need no annual division and many require little or no pruning. They can be used for every purpose, as ground cover and to clothe walls and clamber over unsightly objects. Many make splendid architectural specimens. There are fragrant shrubs, flowering shrubs, dwarf shrubs for rockeries and shrubs with startlingly beautiful bark and stems. Carefully chosen shrubs can give an air of maturity to a virgin plot.

SHRUBS FOR COLOUR AND FRAGRANCE

There are flowering shrubs to give colour and fragrance throughout the year: Winter-flowering and deliciously scented Hamamelis mollis, evergreen Viburnum tinus and Jasminum nudifl orum, an excellent choice to clothe a north-facing wall. In spring, acid-loving azaleas, rhododendrons and camellias make a magnificent show. There are shrub roses in June, lavender in July and in sheltered districts in August, the huge fl owers of the hibiscus bring a touch of southern climes. Every garden should have room for a shrub with spectacular autumn foliage. Better still would be a pair in dramatically contrasting colours. Japanese Maples are grown both for their colour and the shape of their delicate leaves. For a small garden choose compact varieties, purpleleaved Acer palmatum and yellow-leaved Acer japonicum would be a good pairing. Winter brings flaming orange and red berries on a host of evergreen shrubs, pyracantha, cotoneaster, holly and skimmia. For pink berries, grow Pernettya mucronata, and for purple, calliparpa, aptly known as the Beauty Berry.





KERRY O SHEA REPORTS FROM KERRY'S WIN OVER TYRONE AT CROKE PARK TO SET UP AN ALL IRELAND FINAL AGAINST DUBLIN

Kerry qualified for their first All-Ireland final in four years thanks to a barn-storming secondhalf display against old rivals Tyrone at GAA headquarters on Sunday.

Kerry trailed at half-time after an indifferent first-half but more than made up for this in the second-half by outscoring their rivals 1-13 to 0-9

Shrewd tactical changes by Peter Keane which resulted in the introductions of Jack Sherwood, Gavin White and Tommy Walsh turned the tide in favour of the Kingdom. Mickey Harte's charges, led superbly by the flame-haired Cathal McShane, took the game to the Kingdom in the first-half and were full value for their 0-9 to 0-5 lead. Tyrone were very economical and made the most of every scoring opportunity while Kerry finished the first-half with a wides tally of 6.

However, it was a different Kerry that took to the field for the second half. Kerry started well in shooting eight under par for their two Scotch Foursomes pairings, Cillian and Robbie shooting six under while Eoin and Jake had two under. It was an nine under par round from Cillian that was the standout feature of the Singles however as two under par from Eoin and level and one over par respectively from Robbie and Jake brought their overall total to 18 under par as Cork 1 were their nearest challengers on seven under combined in second. The Kerry 2 team of Bobby McCarron, Ryan Neeson, Jack O'Sullivan and Ryan McCarthy finished outside the medals meanwhile in fourth on a combined score of 337, 15 shots behind Cork 2 who came third.



CHILDREN FROM THE US AND MEXICO ARE PLAYING TOGETHER ON SEESAWS BUILT THROUGH THE BORDER WALL

A set of shocking pink seesaws has sprang up right in the middle of the United States border wall with Mexico and have become an instant hit. Children (and adults!) flock to have fun on them despite the metal border wall that separates them.

The seesaws were installed right across the US-Mexico border between El Paso, Texas, and Ciudad Juárez in Mexico. The geniuses behind this brilliant idea were two professors, Ronald Rael, a professor of architecture at the University of California, Berkeley, and Virginia San Fratello, an associate professor of design at San José State University

Mr. Rael posted videos and photos of the seesaws in action on Instagram and everyone loved them, no matter their age! Mr. Rael's post went viral and got over 32,700 likes (and counting), as well as over 870 comments.

Talking about how today's pink seesaws were inspired by a project from 10 years ago Mr. Rael said "The wall became a literal fulcrum for US — Mexico relations and children and adults were connected in meaningful ways on both sides with the recognition that the actions that take place on one side have a direct consequence on the other side."

One of the things Donald Trump is best known and criticised for is his desire to continue to build a wall between the United States and Mexico, but he is far from the first American leader to start building the wall. Presidents George H. W. Bush, Bill Clinton, and George W. Bush all authorised projects to expand the border wall and now the US Supreme Court has ruled in Donald Trump's favour allowing the use of 2.5 billion dollars of Pentagon funds on four contracts to replace existing barriers with fencing.

ON THIS DATE

1878 - The Intermediate Education Act granted female students in Ireland the right to participate in public examinations and to enter into careers and professions.

1879 - National Land League of Mayo was founded.

1896 - While salmon fishing near the Klondike River in Canada's Yukon Territory, George Carmack spotted nuggets of gold in a creek bed.

1920 - Court-martial of Terence MacSwiney, Irish Volunteer and Lord Mayor of Cork. Sentenced to two years imprisonment in Brixton Prison, England, He died on October 25th after 74 days on hunger strike when efforts to forcibly feed him went wrong.

1921 - The first Dáil Éireann was dissolved.

1934 - The US ended its occupation of Haiti which began in 1915.

1936 - The Summer Olympic Games closed in Berlin.

DID YOU KNOW?

That from the early 1870s there had been a growing demand in Ireland for a competitive examinations system which would allow Catholics in particular to enter for the newly created jobs in the civil service and for careers in the professions. In response to this pressure, the Irish Intermediate Education Bill was introduced to the British parliament in 1878. It provided an Examining Board with an annual sum of £32,500 per annum which would cover money prizes for pupils and results fees for schools. Students with the highest marks could gain valuable exhibitions worth up to £50. But these provisions would apply only to boys.

The Bill was in its final stages in parliament, when Isabella Tod of the Ladies' Institute,

Belfast, arrived with a small delegation of women backed by a handful of Irish MPs, to demand that girls should also be included in the provisions of the Bill. Fortunately, attitudes among a majority of English MPs were favourable to the inclusion of girls in the Bill. The most influential of these MPs was Mr Gladstone (the leader of the Liberal Party) who thought that the proposal to admit women to the benefits of the Bill was reasonable and fair. Although not in favour of giving women the vote, he was prepared to admit that, 'we have on the whole done rather less than justice to women as compared to men' when it came to education.

Mr Meldon (MP for Kildare) was amongst the MP's that strongly objected to what he called 'the victory' which the inclusion of girls would give to the advocates of women's rights, 'whose object was not that there should be a limited measure dealing specially with the education of women, but that the same education should be given to girls as given to men.'

THIS IS WHAT SPORTSMANSHIP IS ALL ABOUT

The 2019 U19 Women's Lacrosse World Championship took place in Peterborough, Ontario earlier this month.

Israel went up against Kenya in a playoff game that Israel ended up winning, 13-4. During their match, the girls from Israel noticed that their opponents did not have the proper cleats to play. The very next day, they were back on the field with their most recent opponents and they came bearing gifts.

The very generous gesture was extremely appreciated by every single player on the team as they all ended up giving the girls big hugs and took photos with them after the surprise.

THIS REVOLUTIONARY BLAST FURNACE VAPORIZES RUBBISH AND TURNS IT INTO CLEAN ENERGY

A new startup in the US can make clean energy by vaporizing heaps of rubbish without any waste or emissions.

The Sierra Energy company is aiming to tackle all of the non-recyclable garbage that ends up in landfills—from hazardous wastes and plastics to everyday trash and tires.

The company's modified blast furnace uses FastOx gasification technology to heat all of the trash to 4,000 degrees Fahrenheit, which is about twice as hot as the heart of a volcano. The system is able to generate the heat simply by injecting pure oxygen into the furnace. The oxygen then reacts with the carbon emanating from the rotting rubbish in order to create carbon monoxide and hydrogen. The steam is then pumped back into the furnace to maintain the internal temperature.

The fuel that is made from the FastOx technology is reportedly 20 times cleaner than California fuel standards. And all of the gases that are generated by the chemical process are captured for reuse—for instance, to replace fossil fuels that power airplanes or for use as fertilizer, hydrogen, or ethanol.
