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
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EDITOR'S NOTE

Marie meets the oldest man in Ireland



was thrilled to have made my appointment to return to the home of Centenarian Mr Michael J O'Connor, the day after his 107th birthday when the excitement & media attention had subsided.

I was delighted to see Mr O'Connor is such great form and overjoyed that he remembered me from my last visit and had the picture I last took of him and his dog Fitzy framed in his home.

"Are you still on the Red Breast Whiskey & Milk Mr O'Connor"? I asked. "It's a life saver Marie" Mr O'Connor joked. We began with a laugh and we were off. The conversation was free flowing and I hung on every word. Mr O'Connor and his next door neighbour Jerry O'Grady, of over 20 years, are as popular as each locally, and enjoy a good 'Home Improvements' style debate over the garden wall in the summer months. "In 2014, Storm Darwin really enhanced our friendship Marie" Jerry told me. "Before that there were large trees which are now replaced with a lower fence. I am a privileged neighbour to live along side Mr O'Connor, affectionately known since as Michael Schumacher in his Ferrari style ride on lawn mower" Jerry laughed. "We'd have some heated honest to God debates, so much so that my wife Marie advised me to ring Mr O'Connor's daughter Maureen as she thought I may have offended him. Typical Mr. O'Connor "Tell him to have his answers ready for round two" was Mr O'Connor's response. There were so many things I wanted to ask Mr O'Connor so I began with "What was your favourite decade Mr. O'Connor"? He didn't hesitate. "The year I married my wife Joan so that'd be the 50's Marie. I have five children that I know about - Maureen, Michael, Meredith, Avril & Terecina" Mr O'Connor told me. Like my last visit, I was chuckling away whilst writing. His wit most entertaining and he is sharp as a tack. I commented on the less traditional and beautiful names they had chosen for some of their children. "Yes Marie, the first two were inherited names, hand me down names you might say and for the last 3, my wife Joan took over naming my children" Mr O'Connor added.

I threw the same question at Jerry O'Grady earlier. He gave a different decade but similar reasoning "The mid 60's to the mid 70's. I married my wife Marie in 1976 and I adored the music of this era also. It was an important time for Ireland also in pulling our dependancy away from the UK, lead by Sean Le Mass & Ken Whittaker. Outstanding men who drove the maturing of industries in Ireland" Jerry said.

Back to Mr O'Connor. "So would you have any advise for our younger people growing up Mr O'Connor"? I asked. "Yes. Behave yourself and have good morals. That goes for most of us doesn't it Marie? Mr O'Connor replied. I

soon discovered that while Mr O'Connor wouldn't consider himself a very religious man, he does have great faith which he feels is lacking in younger people. "Like many people Marie I've had rough patches. I spent three years in the 2nd world war which were harrowing times but by and large, I have no real complaints. I have good faith so I was guided out well during these times" Mr O'Connor said.

I then asked a question that many people do. "Mr O'Connor, is there anything in your life that you might have done differently?". "I've been asked this a few times now Marie but this is not an option. Life is like a deck of cards and your hand is constantly changing. Take your cards and play them to your best ability. That's it. It's simple". Mr O'Connor replied. Wise words Mr O'Connor. "And is there anyone in your life that has influenced or inspired you greatly Mr O'Connor" I asked. "Now let me tell you a story Marie" Mr O'Connor said. I was all ears. I might have listened to him and his stories all day. "I worked for a company called Marconi International who supplied the ships with staff & radio communications equipment. In the late 1930's my first appointment was 2nd Radio Officer on a ship from London to the West Indies. You can imagine my excitement. What my company forgot to tell me was that in the tropics a white linen uniform is the only colour worn. My regular uniform was navy, complete with my prefects yellow arm band, which I was very proud of. It was worthless for this once in a life time trip. If I didn't have a white uniform, I simply couldn't sail. My Uncle Hugh Finnegan had financed me to date with my education but I just couldn't ask him again. I had little money to my name so my Chief Radio Officer, Mr Cook, took me to two draper shops who refused payment upon my return to London. My dreams of working on the SS Inanda were fading until Mr Turnbull, a mobile uniform sales man, arrived and decked me out with half a dozen uniforms in advance of payment on my return to London. It was the best act of kindness of my life and I hope the good Lord rewards him. Of course I paid him in full upon my return. Those are the people I remember Marie. An experience that has inspired and influenced my life greatly". From the photo of Mr O'Connor, have you noticed what I have about Michael J O'Connor?? I'm not talking about the Red Breast whiskey in milk or that beaming smile. Just look at Mr O'Connor's agility at 107 years of age with his ankle resting on his knee. I watched how comfortable he was throughout our conversation changing in and out of this pose. Mr O'Connor always impresses me with his mind and his ability to remember names, places, times, dates but his flexibility really blew me away. On mentioning this Mr O'Connor smiled at me "Usually I'd exercise outside Marie but I've taken to 1,000 steps a day going up and down the hallway". I then stupidly asked if he has a fit bit to which he replied "I count the steps Marie for one lap and multiply it". Mr O'Connor continued "Elementary my dear Watson". We laughed at the good of it.

Michael J O'Connor, born 13th October 1913, has survived World War I, World War II, The Spanish Flu & the War of Independence. On Tuesday Mr O'Connor received his 7th medal from the state for his 107th birthday. He has also received a letter and birthday card from Daniel & Majella O'Donnell. "I had planned on attending his concert on 27th Sept at the INEC as I have done since he began performing in Killarney but they tickets will have to hold now til next year please God" Mr O'Connor told me. "He's a lovely man and makes a point in having a chat with me at each concert".

Jerry O'Grady & his wife Marie are privileged visitors at the home of Michael J O'Connor. "I have the confidence & trust that the O'Grady's are always careful during the pandemic and I enjoy their weekly visits to my home". To adhere to Level 3 of Covid 19 restrictions my photos and interviews were conducted separately. Thank you for having me at your homes in Muckross, Centenarian Michael J O'Connor & Jerry O'Grady and I look forward to visiting you next year on your 108th Birthday Mr O'Connor.

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

Killarney Town comes 3rd out of 40 towns / cities surveyed. Cleaner than European Norms

he first nationwide litter survey by business group Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) since the Covid-19 crisis shows a dramatic fall in the number of towns and cities deemed to be 'clean', to its lowest level since 2007 however Killarney was in the top three of the rankings.

The report stated that in such a difficult year for the town, Killarney has maintained its exemplary cleanliness. All the approach roads got the top litter grade and this high standard was sustained for well over the majority of the remaining sites surveyed. Among many top ranking sites, some deserve special mention – the Jarvey Parking & Environs was spotless throughout and beautifully presented and maintained; Killarney National Park is a wonderful natural resource which has been lovingly tended and very well respected. Main Street was another site which wasn't just good with regard to litter but a very freshly presented environment.

Main Street: Grade A. An exceptionally freshly presented main shopping street with the paving, substantial planting, bicycle parking, bollards, street bins, sculpture etc. in excellent order. It was spotless throughout. It was great to see the decommissioned P&T telephone box was being used to house the defibrillator.

Killarney Train Station: Grade A. An exceptionally fresh and welcoming environment for any visitors arriving to

Killarney by train – it was excellent with regard to litter. The Waiting Room, entrance and car park area were very well presented.

Jarvey Parking & Environs: Grade A. The 'Tourist Information' notice was freshly presented and in good order, with the adjoining grass / shrubbery areas excellently maintained. The built environment, including the very fresh looking paving, looked very well. It was absolutely spotless throughout.

Aldi: Grade B. There was a distinct litter presence at the entrance / trolley bay, in an otherwise very freshly presented car park environment. The car park surface / markings / signage were in very good condition.

Bring Centre at New Street Car Park: Grade A. The overall impression created at this facility was a positive one. Signage indicates that if the recycle bins are full, there is the option to bring recyclables to the bins at High Street Car Park.

N71 Approach from Killarney National Park: Grade A. A very clean and tidy impression was created along this route – there were no litter issues to report. Road surface, markings and signage were in very good order.

Approach from Fossa: Grade A. All aspects along this road were in very good order – there were no visible litter issues and the overall impression was a welcoming one.

Innishfallen Shopping Centre / Mall: Grade A. This facility appears to be operating as a pedestrian link between New Street Car Park and the Main Street – there were no shops

open within the facility. Clearly a very close eye is kept on this site as it was clear of litter, despite the empty premises throughout.

Killarney National Park: Grade A. A very extensive natural resort which has been lovingly tended and very well respected, as evidenced by the lack of casually discarded litter. Killarney National Park wasn't immune to Covid-19 litter as there were a couple of disposable face masks, the only items to be seen throughout the entirety of a large area surveyed.

Connecting Road from Tralee to Killarney: Grade B. A mixed route in terms of litter with some parts cleaner than others. Farranfore to Killarney was very good but Farranfore to Tralee was somewhat littered – fast food wrappers, plastic bags, plastic bottles and coffee cups.

Cathaoirleach Councillor Brendan Cronin welcomes the announcement from the Irish Business Against Litter of Killarney's standing in third position "Cleaner than European Norms" in the latest survey.

The last six months has been challenging for everybody but it is good to see Killarney maintain such a high standing. I would like to congratulate our Municipal District staff and the volunteers who work tirelessly to keep our town looking so well.

There is a great sense of community in Killarney and it is thanks to the co-operation and the coming together of so many different groups that the town has achieved this result.

We have been faced with new challenges with face masks and gloves being an all too common sight on our streets and roads but we must continue to strive to keep our town and surrounding areas litter free.

This week is National Road Safety week. I had made many attempts to gently coax Garda Diane Collins to Gogglevox with me. "I'm a blender Marie" was the usual response.

Our paths crossed again this week at Clearway Montessori as Garda Collins arrived to do a Road Safety talk with the children. This time she finally agreed to have the chats with me. I wouldn't be one to look a gift horse in the mouth so ironically it was me whipping out the pen and pad and began to write at speed. Here's how it went.

Garda Diane Collins, one of Killarney's Community Gardaí, is originally from Limerick and arrived in Killarney fresh out of Templemore training college in 2006 with Garda Siobhan Barry. A familiar face that I meet lots when on camera duty but she is a far cry from a media worshiper and tends to remove herself to the background always.

"We are all community guards in Killarney Marie, just in different aspects but I am lucky enough to work as a Community Garda full time". I wondered was the instinct to become a guard always there or was it something that grew on you over time. "I love my job and I've always wanted to work with the Gardaí. I remember as a child going to see Santa and I always hoped for a blue bag which usually contained a sheriffs badge and handcuffs. I don't think my parents were too keen on the idea so after my Leaving Cert I studied Business Computing at L.I.T and Product Management at U.L. The grá for the Gardaí never left me Marie, so I made the trip to Tipp and onto the Kingdom where I there met my husband, Garda Paudie Twohig and the rest is history".

Garda Diane Collins hosts the AXA Road Safety Show as MC at the INEC annually with Garda Peter McCarthy where many guest speakers are doctors from A&E departments around the country telling real stories. "It's a national event that comes with great effort & organisation but I thoroughly enjoy it every year". Garda Collins duties include working closely with the asylum centres, St John of Gods with their Streetwise Programme, KDYS, Garda Diverson Programmes, South Kerry Development Partnership & The No Name Club.

"Operation Paisti, is a five year programme by my colleague, Sergeant Dermot O'Connell. It's an awareness campaign around Car Seat Safety. The aim of the campaign is to address the serious lack of awareness among motorists about how to restrain children correctly and safely in vehicles. The interactive road safety campaign involves working with local schools and the media, in order to get safety



information to as many as possible and to make it easier for parents and children to understand the safest way to restrain children in cars. We do pop ups at school 'home time' and measure the children raising awareness" Garda Collins explained.

"I believe early intervention to anything is the key Marie. It is important to be friendly and approachable and that the community see me as a person, not just a garda uniform equally important to have a positive interaction with children from an early age and not someone they are in fear of" Diane continued. Now that I could relate to. How man times was I told as a kid that I would end up below in the barracks in the 'big black hole' if my behaviour didn't improve. Thankfully I made it and survived without that adventure! I congratulated Garda Collins on her ten year stint with Killarney No Name Club which is run by Anne Nagle (previous Gogglevox). "The No Name Club is a fantastic organisation Marie. An alternative pastime for young people avoiding the route to alcohol & drugs. Anne Nagle is like a mother to me and the No Name Club are like my family. I call Anne my Killarney Mammy. I have sat at her kitchen table with her family for Christmas dinners and if I didn't make it to the table she would land to the Garda Station on Christmas Day with food for us. I've even introduced Anne to my real Mammy in Limerick".

"I love working in Killarney. My bicycle is my main means of transport throughout the community. I cycle everywhere. I sometimes cycle through the National Park on a sunny day and have to pinch myself at how lucky I

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

It is with the greatest sadness that the members of Muckross Rowing Club learned on Monday of the passing of our Club President, Seamus Guiney.

His long involvement with the club goes back to the Killarney Regatta season of 1984. With his arrival in Muckross at that time came a storied past in the intensely competitive world of Killarney rowing.

Seamus had rowed primarily in the bow of various Workmen crews including at the last regattas held at Cahernane in 1954 and 1955. With his shrewd eye, sharp intellect and love of the lake, he migrated from the bow to the cox seat and there a legend was born, whether with Workmen to his involvement with the Commercial Senior Six bid in 1980, to his eventual decision to commit to the mid-1980s effort by Muckross to regain the Mens Senior Six

The 'holy grail' of a Mens Senior Six title continued to elude him throughout the late 1980s but he finally crossed that line in 1993 with Muckross closing a 20-year wait for the club by bringing home the Bourn Vincent trophy. Since that win, Muckross crews have gone on to largely dominate proceedings at Killarney Regatta – by dint of hard work by many but always with the knowledge that Seamus would take each 'A' crew in the weeks before the regatta, produce his unique stopwatch, bring them up to speed and ultimately predict the likelihood of victory on the first Sunday of July. A gentleman to his fingertips on dry land - with a steer rope in his hand and a crew at his bidding, he became a different creature. Driven, sharp and a technical genius in the Killarney Six, Seamus had a unique ability to make a crew gel together. Many rowers past and present will

hold the memory of Seamus guiding a crew in training from a standing position with only his steer rope for balance.

Seamus undoubtedly remains the most decorated cox and trainer in the 234-year history of Killarney Regatta. In casting an eye over the record books, it remains close to impossible to state with accuracy just how many crews Seamus saw across the line to victory. His win tally with Muckross became simply countless across four decades from the 1980s through to 2018. Between 1993 and 2013, Seamus coxed 11 Muckross crews to victory in the Men's Senior Six. Between 1994 and 2014. 16 Senior Ladies Sixes titles were won by Muckross, with Seamus thought to have coxed almost all. In the Four Oar races, 10 Senior Mens titles (between 1990 and 2013) and 17 Senior Womens titles (1994-2014) involved Seamus at least in training, if not on race day. At all grades, Seamus set and broke records time and again. Whether it was Junior or Juvenile, Minor or Veteran, Seamus brought a boundless energy and commitment to the rowers of Muckross both young and old, with silverware resulting more often than not. His rowing prowess was not only confined to the lakes of Killarney and extended to regattas and time trials around Ireland. Among the memorable trips with the club was the Great River Race in London, where Seamus skilfully navigated the 22-mile Thames river course - manoeuvring the Killarney Six with aplomb underneath the Tower Bridge and past the Houses of Parliament.

Lough Leane was a truly special environment for Seamus, who spent many happy hours fishing when he wasn't cycling to and from the Muckross boathouse. He is one of the last anglers to have fished from the traditional whalers, used on the Killarney lakes for centuries. Away from the lake shore, Seamus worked for many years in the former Hilliard's Factory-Tuf Shoes off High Street making many friends throughout his working life. He was also well known for his musical skills playing the guitar and trumpet. In his younger days, Seamus featured in local bands including the Keynotes and the Billy Williams Band, among others.

He was most proud of having an Olympic style sweep Four named in his honour – a much loved man made immortal on the bow of a race boat. After the passing of James Mulligan, Seamus was unanimously chosen as Club President of Muckross RC. He took great pride in the success of the club, watching Muckross crews compete at various regattas, Head of the River events and the Irish Championships. Much of this success made possible due to Seamus' tireless efforts in coaching and developing crews.

He coxed his final winning crew, fittingly a Mens Veteran Six, at the age of 85 in 2018. Once more Seamus brought his crew out in time, hit the start, made the calls and brought his boat home straight and safe in a manner which belied his years.

Seamus poured his heart and soul into Muckross Rowing Club and was central to a golden era of rowing in Muckross and Killarney. He gave his all to the improvement of whatever six men, women or teenagers he happened to have out on the lake. We feel the loss of our Club President like the loss of a family member and will greatly miss his enthusiasm, kindness, good humour and friendship.

Seamus' spirit will always remain with us at the Muckross shore, on the lake and wherever the yellow oars of Muckross may row. Ní bheidh a leithéid arís ann.

As the country moved into Level 3 of Covid 19 restrictions, closing many of our restaurants, coffee shops & bars, it also limited travelling outside county bounds and ceased visitors to Killarney, Co. Kerry, one of Irelands most popular tourist destinations.

Many of our beautiful hotels have closed indefinitely this week so I decided to catch up with Dora Browne, a hospitality worker for the past 45 years in our town Killarney. I know right, she hardly looks 45 years old!!!!

Wife to Denis and mother of two to Denise & Daniel & grandmother of four to Georgie Mai, Adam, Aideen & Hollie, Dora Browne has never once in her 45 years on the payroll, used one sick day or has been off work outside of Covid19. I've seen her in action. If ever there was a smooth operating grafter within the hospitality sector, it is Dora Browne.

Our paths crossed over my 3 years of her service at the Great Southern Hotel in the noughties as a receptionist. During this period I had the pleasure of attending a friends wedding at the GSH. Top of her game she was amazing to watch. The waiting staff patiently eagle eyed Dora from all angles of the huge function room. Soon, Dora elegantly raised her hand and remained in situe. With that, a swoop of waiting staff worked simultaneously to clear the tables as if their lives depended on it. That was the orderly fashion Dora prided herself on and the respect she had gained over her lengthy service. "So where did your career begin Dora" I asked. Dora passed me a postcard that dated back to 1977 complete with a 7p stamp. With permission I read the postcard which offered Dora a job at the Gleneagle Hotel as a waitress. An open postcard for all and sundry to read. Clearly GDPR wasn't a issued in 1977. The whole parish knew Dora got the job ever before she did!

"My friend Joan & I saw the advert and went for the interview with Mrs. O'Donoghue at just 16 years of age. Joan was from a family of 9 and I was the eldest of 8. We wanted our own independence. Well I did anyway as Joan didn't follow through and remained at home in Castleisland. I was delighted with the opportunity. I took up board & lodgings at 'The Flesk House', the staff quarters for the lady workers at the Gleneagle Hotel, which is now the Brehon Hotel. The O'Donoghue's were great to their staff. Times were different though Marie. Our accommodation & meals were paid for so we had no expenses but we worked 6 out of 7 days with no real set hours.

My goal was to have electricity installed in our home in Castleisland. The problem was for every 9 houses a transformer was needed so at a very young age I footed the bill of £1,200 and there was light for my parents & siblings in Castlisland" Dora told me. Can you see now what I mean by grafter??!

The majority of Dora's career was at the Great Southern Hotel/The Malton. "I spent 5 years at the Gleneagle before moving to the Hotel Europe for one season and in 1984 I began a 33 year roller coaster of the best memories at the Great Southern Hotel/The Malton before moving to my current place of work, The Killarney Park Hotel in 2017" Dora surmised.

The Great Southern Hotel was a top class destination in 1984 Marie. Complete with silver service as standard and a menu of flambes, steak tartare & crepes suzettes it really was an elite establishment" Dora said. I asked Dora to make a comparison of conditions from then to now. "There were no computers, it was all docket books. It was all cash and no credit cards. We had full time silver polishers employed and before you were allowed to progress to serving in the main dining room, you had to prove yourself first, by serving the management staff table which included Ms Chapman, Ms Harte or Ms Fitzgerald. That was the real test" Dora laughed. Dora Browne became the first female Restaurant Manageress at the GSH a midst the change of name from the Great Southern Hotel to the Malton in 2006. "I have met many celebrities, mainly Irish ones, down through the years Marie and my favourite event at the hotel was the Christmas package which welcomed many regular guests annually. Judge Kinlen was a regular and used to dress up as Santa every year. I thoroughly enjoyed the Roaring 20's festival too and the fabulous St Patrick's Day float the hotel submitted every year for the parade. The IMI Conference (Irish Management Institution) housed up to 800 Irish delegates. A huge undertaking every year but I loved it" Dora explained. The celebrities Dora, the celebrities, tell me about the celebrities!! "My favourite was Sarah Ferguson. She was lovely. We had US actor Kojak, Johnny Briggs (Mike Baldwin from Coronation Street), and many many Irish Politicians such as Charles Haughie & Liam Cogsgrave" Dora said. I personally remember checking in Westlife with the Manger at the time, Emer Corridan.

I recalled working one Christmas day at the GSH during my stint. I couldn't grasp it. Why would you just not want to be at home??? I soon realised that Christmas is different to everyone. Dora Browne has spent 32 years out of her 33 years of service at the GSH/Malton working throughout Christmas. "I worked every year for Christmas Marie, except for one. I was in labour with Daniel on Christmas Day 1988 so I couldn't work that year" Dora explained. I take it at this point you're getting the whole meaning of the word 'grafter'... Beyond Belief!!!

I was running out of time but had to ask Dora what were her thoughts on Covid19. "I think its so hard on the business's in town who put so much time and effort into training and making the effort to adapt their establishments to covid standards only to be closed again. They embraced the changes that needed to be made and we all adapted. It's very sad and very hard for employers & employees. I am lucky to have had my health throughout my life. I honestly wait to return to work at the beautiful Killarney Park Hotel whenever that might be. I'm not one for sitting around Marie and Covid19 is the only thing that has ever stopped me heading out the door to work!" Dora concluded. Wild horses couldn't stop Dora. That I am sure of!!

Thank you for having me to your beautiful home in Whitebridge Manor Dora. I could have stayed chatting for another hour but I'm not sure if Dora would have been able to sit still!!!

30 West Kerry farms to address climate change solutions through technology

Dingle Creativity and Innovation Hub has been awarded €220,000 EU Horizon 2020 funding to enable West Kerry to participate as a Sustainable Innovation Pilot (SIP) for the next three years. This will see the roll-out of sensor technology to thirty farms to achieve greater carbon, cost and labour efficiency. Increased

carbon efficiency will be achieved by extending the grazing season.

Starting this October, the Dingle Hub will collaborate with Teagasc, IFA, local Dingle hub-based technology provider Net Feasa and Kerry Agribusiness to roll-out the sensor technology currently being piloted through

the Farm Ambassador Project to a further thirty farms on the peninsula. The 'real-time' data collected describes current and predicted weather and soil conditions, grass growth rates and key environmental indicators. This data will be analysed and used to develop models and effective decision-support tools for farmers and to add value to a range of products and services.

This SIP will integrate farming enterprises with related value chains, such as agri-tourism and/ or food tourism, through enabling farmers to work with technology providers, data analysts and marketing teams. It is hoped that facilitating collaborations across the value chain will support and enable co-created, innovative solutions to both address climate change and support the financial viability of farms.

The Covid 19 pandemic has seen a 30% increase in the reported incidence of domestic abuse in Ireland. That is the bad news, but there is hope. Research shows that men can change with the right support and challenge, when willing to look inside honestly and take responsibility for what they say, think and do.

The "Better Than This" campaign, launched this week in Kerry by MOVE Ireland, aims to engage men who are worried about their behaviour towards their partners or children. MOVE Ireland provides a structured programme called "Choices", where men are challenged to take responsibility for their abuse and to change their attitudes and behaviour and develop respectful, nonabusive relationships.

Unfortunately, many men who are concerned about their behaviour are not aware that this service exists. This campaign aims to reach these men using posters, newspaper and radio ads and online material, with the clear message that life can become "better than this" if they seek help to change.

Speaking at the "Better Than This" campaign

launch, MOVE Ireland Chief Executive, Owen O'Neill asked all members of the public do their bit to make homes happier and safer by spreading the word about this service via friends, family and social media.

"The past cannot be changed, but the future does not have to be more of the same. Change isn't easy, but it is not impossible. Our programme combines targeted one-to-one interventions and group work and is run by trained facilitators. It has been up and running in Kerry for the last two years and we are currently accepting new participants."

"We understand that it can be difficult to reach out and ask for help. But your family deserves Better Than This. You can be a better parent and a better partner. If your behaviour is causing problems at home, we can help things to get

"Have you ever threatened your partner, scared them or put them down? Does the pressure you are under have an impact on your family? Are you concerned that your behaviour is impacting your kids? If you want to be Better Than This, contact us today and you will be treated with respect and without judgement".

"Our ultimate goal is to promote the safety and

wellbeing of women and children who have experienced violence and abuse in their intimate relationships. As part of our programme the partners or ex-partners of the men are also

offered support."

Over the month of the campaign MOVE Ireland will maintain a sustained media presence to invite men who need this service to pick up the phone and make the first move. The "Choices" group run by MOVE Ireland in Kerry is not currently running group sessions but will resume them when it is safe to do so. However, one to one support is still available and that is a key message of this "Better Than This" campaign.

The campaign also aims to raise awareness among professionals who may encounters these men in the course of their work.

As part of this campaign, MOVE Ireland will be offering free training - a mini webinar and two short online training workshops for frontline professionals on October 16th and 29th from . 10.30 -12.30.





Diocese to host webinar

Diocese of Kerry Webinar for Mission Month will be held on Thursday 22nd October 7.30pm -8.20pm

The webinar offers the opportunity to meet different people involved in mission here at home and abroad. During the webinar there will be short inputs from 3 modern missionaries followed by the opportunity to ask questions and share ideas about how "Together We Can Do More".

The Speakers on the night include Martina O' Donoghue, Eddie Sheehy and Dr. Peter Hughes, the coordinator of human human rights and territorial rights for REPAM, a Catholic Church network that promotes the lives and dignity of people living in the Amazon.

Originally from Barraduff outside Killarney, Martina has a BA in History and Politics and a MA in International Relations. Martina has worked for Trócaire and her sister agencies CRS, CAFOD, SCIAF for almost 20 years. She has worked in Angola, Kenya, Ethiopia, and Uganda and returned to Ireland in 2020. Currently she is the Global Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability and Learning Advisor for Trócaire. Martina is married to Wubeshet and they have 2 children, Tadgh (13) and Seán (11).

Eddie Sheehy first travelled to Kenya in 2003 and stayed in the village of Embulbul, outside the capital, Nairobi. The parish there was run by SMA society and was a new vibrant parish which contained a slum village where approx 5,000 lived in very challenging circumstances. A school was opened for the young children of the area, which wasn't a government school so obtaining funds to run the school was always an issue. A year later a secondary school was opened which depended on donors and sponsorships to provide an education for the children of the slum. The Kenya Education project began fundraising to help sponsor children each year to attend school. It also helped with purchase of equipment for science,

sports and school library. At present the project is sponsoring between 80-100 students each year. They also support the local branch of SVDP who work with the poorest of the poor in the slum, providing funding for medicines, food, hospital visits and home improvements. In recent years they also fund a weekly feeding programme in the parish, 80 students receive a hot meal each weekday evening. For many it is their only hot meal of the day. Each year we also fund the further education of a few students who are determined to pursue further education. An annual summer camp is also organised each August for approx 30 students, a week of fun, games, activities and outings for kids who live in tough conditions in the village. Due to Covid, the schools are closed so the Kenya Education Project are funding monthly food parcels for 50 families who are struggling to put food on the table for their families. They hope to resume their core work in 2021.

This conversation is being organised by the Returned Missionary/Volunteer group in conjunction with the Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) Committee (Diocese of Kerry)

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BROAD WELCOME FOR BUDGET 2021

In the first budget since the onset of COVID19
Finance Minister Paschal Donohoe this week
unveiled a €17.7bn budget package in the Dáil.

The budget is framed on the basis of no bilateral trade deal between the EU and the UK for Brexit, as well as the continued presence of COVID-19 with no vaccine.

HERE IS A SUMMERY OF SOME OF THE MAIN POINTS OF BUDGET 2021

There will be a \in 3.4bn recovery fund aimed at increasing employment and the fund will be targeted to boost domestic demand.

Welcomed by hoteliers in Killarney, as part of the stimulus package, the VAT rate for hospitality will be reduced to 9% from November 1st.

The Temporary Wage Subsidy Scheme (TWSS) or a similar scheme will remain in place to the end of 2021.

The Minister also announced changes to the Vehicle Registration Tax to encourage people to buy low emission cars.

Carbon tax increased by €7.50 a tonne from midnight on Tuesday - but there will be no broad changes to tax credits or tax bands.

Cigarettes increased by 50 cent per packet, -bringing the average cost of a packet of 20 to €14. **FINANCE: MAIN POINTS**

- The total budget package will be €17.75bn €17bn in expenditure and €270m in taxation
- A deficit of €21.5bn is to be recorded this year
- Some €8.5bn will be spent on public services including €2.1bn on contingency funding with capital spending to increase by €1.6bn
- There will be a €3.4bn Recovery Fund be aimed at increasing employment
- A pack of 20 cigarettes will increase by 50c, with a pro-rata increase on other tobacco products

- The Section 481 Scheme for the film industry will run until December 31st 2023 at its highest rate of
- The Knowledge Development Box Relief on intellectual property is being extended until end of December 2022
- Work is to begin on a tax credit for the digital gaming sector from January 2022
- The Accelerated Capital Allowances Scheme for energy efficient equipment is being extended for a further three years
- No broad changes to income tax credits or bands
- Stamp Duty Scheme, which refunds a portion of stamp duty paid on acquisition of non-residential land where it is then developed, will be extended until end of December 2022
- Changes to the motor tax regime: Rates unchanged for those before 2008. Most pollutant cars impacted
- Changes to VRT based on emissions, which is aimed at incentivising people to buy low emission cars
- An extension of Stamp Duty Relief for the transfer of agricultural land to family members until December 2023
- No change to the 12.5% of Corporation Tax
- Change to Capital Gains Tax Entrepreneur Relief so that anyone who has owned at least 5% of the shares for continuous three years will qualify for relief Expenditure: Main points
- An extra €4bn is being allocated to the health service: This will see an extra 1,146 actue beds, an increase in critical care beds to 321 by end of the year
- There will also be five million extra homecare hours
- \bullet €5m for the development of community based dementia supports
- €50m for new drugs and €25m for Healthy Ireland and National Drugs Strategy

- •€38m is being allocated for mental health services
- There will be €100m available for new disability services
- There will be €500m in additional expenditure for businesses, in addition to other tax measures
- A commercial rates waiver is being extended for final quarter of this year
- An additional €44m is being invested into Irish Water for infrastructure
- €80m extra is being made available for the School Building Programme, ICT and minor works scheme for the Department of Education
- €270m is being made available for higher education building projects
- An extra €20m is being made available for disability services through the Transforming Lives programme
- •€10m in funding for voluntary hospices this year
- •€340m of voted expenditure will be spent on Brexit supports in 2021 including money for ports and airports and 500 staff for customs
- Capital spending is to get another €600m total capital expenditure will rise to over €10bn for the first time ever
- Ireland has signed up to EU advance purchase agreements for potential COVID-19 vaccines
- The Government is to purchase 41 additional InterCity railcar carriages and sign contract with potential for up to 600 electric carriages as part as
- €131m is to made available for Defence Forces capital expenditure

The Department of Finance is forecasting a total loss of 320,000 jobs in 2020, with a recovery of 155,000 jobs next year.

How will this affect me?

There are a few areas where people will notice a direct impact from Budget 2021.

Firstly, income tax rates are not going changing either up or down in this budget.

But there are a number of areas that will hit your pocket, namely around motoring.

A \in 7.50 a tonne increase in carbon tax will hike the cost of fuel. Filling a tank of diesel will cost about \in 1.50 more,

a tank of petrol will add on €1.30.

There will be 90c extra on a bag of coal, 20c on a

bale of briquettes and home heating oil is set to increase.

This will be offset for the most vulnerable by increases in the Living Alone Allowance and the Fuel Allowance.

Changes to VRT will make buying a polluting car more expensive - and changes to motor tax means those with older or more polluting cars will end up paying somewhere between €10 and €50 more a year.

Though 90% of people will not be impacted by the motor tax changes.

Full-time, third level students will all be given a €250 cash sum by the Government to help them this year.

And the cost of a pack of cigarettes is going up 50c, but alcohol is being left unchanged.



VERY LOW TAKE UP FOR NOVEMBER STATE WRITTEN EXAMS



nly 2,820 candidates registered for November's Leaving Cert written exams by closing date of Wed., 7th October.

Entry to the traditional Leaving Cert exam and the Leaving Cert applied exam was confined to candidates who had signed up for the 2020 Leaving Cert exams, which were postponed last June. As far as is practicable, candidates will sit their exams in the school where they had been entered to sit them in June 2020.

The November exams are being run by the State Examinations Commission (SEC), which surprisingly washed its hand of the Leaving Cert calculated grades for fear of legal reprisals. The State Examinations Commission (SEC) is responsible for the development, assessment, accreditation and certification of the second-level exams of the Irish Republic.

The Leaving Certificate written exams begins on Monday, 16th November and concludes on Friday, 11th December. There will be one exam session on weekday evenings and two exam sessions at weekends, on both Saturdays and Sundays. The exams will start at 5.30pm each weekday evening, and at 9.30am and 2pm on both days at weekends. Full timetables for the exams are now available on the State Examinations Commission (SEC) website, www. examinations.ie.

The written exams will be based on the standard question paper format as in previous years. Candidates taking the November exams will be graded on the basis of their written papers. There won't be any oral or practical component in the November exams. However, in the case of five Leaving Certificate subjects, the State Examinations Commission (SEC) will also mark coursework which was

completed prior to school closures last March and these marks will be included in the grading of these subjects. The subjects are Home Economics practical coursework, LCVP Portfolio, Design and Communication Graphics practical coursework, Physical Education (PE) Physical Activity Project, Engineering practical coursework. In all other subjects, candidates will be awarded grades solely on the written papers.

Junior Cycle written exams for adult learners who had been registered to take these exams in June will also take place in November 2020. These exams are also being provided for early school leavers, who left school at the end of Junior Cycle 2020 and who are not continuing in an educational pathway that would lead to formal certification. The Junior Cycle exam will also commence on 16th November and run until 30th November.

Leaving Certificate, Leaving Cert Applied and Junior Cycle results from the November exams will be released in February 2021. Leaving Certificate candidates sitting the written exams in November who also opted to receive calculated grades will be credited with the higher subject grade achieved between the calculated grade and the written exam.

Candidates who opt to sit the November Leaving Certificate 2020 exam and who receive an improved CAO offer on foot of these results, will also receive a deferred college offer to start their course in the 2021/22 academic year. If a candidate who has started first year of a course becomes entitled to a higher CAO offer and chooses to accept that offer in the following academic year, attendance for the first year on the new course would remain eligible for free fees and SUSI funding, as appropriate.

The results of the November Leaving Cert exams can be appealed in the same manner as previous years. That means that the actual results achieved by a candidate can be appealed. In the case of the calculated grades results which were released on the 7th September, only a recheck of the paper trail leading to the awarded grade was allowed in any appeal. The calculated grade itself could not be appealed. This break from due process proved very controversial and disappointed, in particular, candidates whose grades were downgraded from the grades submitted by their teachers. Details of the November exams' appeals process will be issued by the State Examinations Commission (SEC) in due course.

INTER-COUNTY ACTION TO RECOMMENCE!

Earlier in the week, Peter Keane was quoted as saying that the Championship was hanging by a thread. However at the time of writing, plans were in place for the championship to run as expected and for the Allianz League to reach a conclusion.

This weekend, Kerry has five inter-county teams in action. The Kerry Senior Hurlers are against Antrim in the 2A National League Final, the U20 and Minor Hurlers are in the Munster Championship against Cork and Tipperary respectively, the Kerry U20 Footballers face Galway in the All Ireland semi final (live on TG4) and the Kerry Senior Footballers are playing Monaghan in Round 6 of the Allianz League.

As it stands in Division 1 of the League, Kerry are on 7 points and are in second place behind Galway who are on 8 points. After 5 games, Mayo are on 3 points and Meath are on 0 points. All five teams will be announced on the Kerry GAA website on Friday at 8pm. We wish all teams the very best of luck. Updates from all games will be available on our Twitter page! Streaming of Inter-County Games

Munster GAA has confirmed that all games in the upcoming Electric Ireland Munster Minor Hurling and Football Championships will be streamed live beginning this weekend as Cork play Clare (Saturday) and Kerry play Tipperary (Sunday) in the Minor Hurling Quarter-Finals. Supporters can sign-up to these games in advance via the Munster GAA web site (www. munster.gaa.ie) with all Quarter-Finals over the next two weekends available for 5 euro each. Munster GAA in association with Nemeton and Stream Sport will provide the streaming coverage throughout the upcoming Munster Minor Championships.

GAAGO will exclusively stream up to 23 games from the upcoming return of Allianz League action, it has been announced. Previously available outside of Ireland only, the service will for the first time allow GAA fans at home to stream inter-county GAA games live or on demand in 1080p HD. Sign-up is via the GAAGO. ie website or the GAAGO iOS and Android apps. The move is a boost for supporters unable to attend matches due to Covid-19 restrictions, and ensures that they will still be able to see their teams in action. Games from every division of the Allianz Football League will be available on the platform, including the Division 1 clash of Monaghan and Kerry on Saturday 17 October. The finals of the Allianz Hurling League Divisions 2A, 2B and 3B are also among the games being streamed on GAAGO. Pay-per game access will be priced at €5, with county boards facilitating a free access scheme for hospitals and care homes. Coverage will be produced by RTÉ Sport and Nemeton TV, with Marty Morrissey, Ger Canning and John Kenny among the commentators.

KERRY GAA GOLF CLASSIC 2020

This year's golf classic attracted over 40 teams and was played on the Mahony's Point course at Killarney Golf and Fishing Club. Annually this fundraising event takes place the Thursday/ Friday of the All Ireland Football Final weekend but with the All Ireland Final scheduled for December this year the decision was taken to run it in over two Friday's, October 2nd and 9th. Being aware that crowd restrictions attending games may well be a factor in the immediate future due to Covid-19, a 'Flexible Ticket Package' was introduced to meet this challenge. This is a big week in sporting terms. A very big week. Sport is obviously going to be an abstract pleasure for the vast majority of us for the foreseeable future.

But watching in absentia is a lot better than not having any to watch at all. I think the benefits of having elite sports happening (it is only the top level games) needs to be weighed very carefully against the risks involved - the less travel and overnight stays the better for everyone (look, Kerry having to travel to high-risk Monaghan for what is essentially a warm-up game....I'm honestly unimpressed at the notion). It must be done carefully and it must be done right. The Government have made it clear that at the moment, even in the event of a full lockdown, these games will be going ahead. Everyone accepts that there are positive benefits in terms of mental health in having topics other than the all-pervading pandemic to discuss; I hope that the balance of risk versus reward has been weighed very carefully.

That said, the rewards are very real. There is a host of sporting action involving Kerry teams next weekend. To be honest, I've never eaten in a really high class restaurant (sure, none of them could compare to mammy's cooking anyway, says I diplomatically), but I imagine this is what perusing one of their menus is like. Less the multiplicity of forks and other such complications. It's not something I or too many other people have said in recent months, but I really cannot wait for this weekend.

GAA

Kerry's long delayed game against Monaghan in the 2020 National League is scheduled for this weekend. Kerry (7 points) are in second place behind Galway (8 points) in the table , Tyrone and Dulin are each a point behind. Monaghan are in 6th place, two ahead of Mayo in seventh place. Meath are pointless and look like relegation certainties (they are a hugely improving side, though, I'd have been interested in watching their Leinster Championship. They wouldn't have beaten Dessie Farrell's Dublin, but I actually think they could have rattled them. Alas, it's all just speculation now!).

Allow me to be candid. I have very little interest in the conclusion of the National League as an end in itself. These are warm-up games for the Championship, no more, and I don't think anyone is pretending anything else. Kerry are completely safe from relegation and can't be promoted higher than the top ivision. We might sneak some medals, I suppose, with table-toppers Galway facing tricky last games against Dublin and relegation-threatened Mayo (some truths are eternal; Galway would love to consign their neighbours to the drop!). I sympathise with Ryan McMenamin's

Fermanagh, for whom relegation is on the line, but his request for a postponement simply isn't viable in the time-frame.

At the very least, I would have thought it was obvious that the 'home and away' game format be forfeited and games like this be played in neutral venues - reachable within one days journey - for both teams. It would reduce risk and expense considerably.

Peter Keane attended a zoom press conference last Friday. Many people are familiar with zoom meetings in recent times. Not me. I still think some unholy practises are involved; I may have watched too many horror movies. I am comfortable with the concept of phone technology – I can text message, and even use their 'instant fax' ability called email, but that's my outer limits. I can log in to a zoom call, just about, but there's no way I'm speaking aloud during the ceremony. What if my soul gets trapped on the internet? Braver, or possibly more gullible people than me, did venture over the cosmic rays to relay questions to Peter, and these are his replies regarding the game.

PETER KEANE

"In terms of training, this week it's been fine. Prior to that, it's been dribs and drabs. We had Couny Championship up to the previous weekend. Since we started back training, we've only had three or four training sessions with everybody available to us in that period of time, it's been limited enough. The lads seem in good form. I have been touring around and watching the games, the ones that I could get to in that period of time. I think Kerry did a wonderful job in getting the games played and getting the County Championship finished. I'd

have to compliment Peter Twiss, he got a lot of football played for club players. I think the lads benefited from that and I think that they are coming back to us fairly healthy and relatively ready to go."

Kerry have brought in three players to the panel – Joe O'Connor (Austin Stacks), Kevin O'Sullivan (Kenmare Shamrocks), and Mike Breen (Beaufort and Mid Kerry).

"It's logical to think that there isn't much room for experimentation in these games (given the time frame) but if you get a fella who is hot, you will run with him. If I had a closed mentality to say that we will only go with the tried and trusted, there would be no point in bringing any fella in. Sure I might as well only keep twenty and send the rest of them home. Look, we are going to have knocks, you have next weekend, then you are coming down the road and you have Donegal, they are two tough games, then you have a week free to get ready for Cork. It's fast and furious."

"Peter Crowley did his cruciate in the club month last year in April – it's almost two years now when you think of the calendar – he did that. We were confident enough that he would be back before the end of the League, that didn't happen because of covid but here we are, I suppose in way he is back for the end of the league anyway! Jack Barry has taken a crack, but he's working towards recovery. He won't be ready for Monaghan, but he's on the mend."

I'm not going to make any predictions; I simply don't know enough about Monaghan. I know that they have always battled well above their weight when it comes to Kerry. I know that their minors gave Kerry an awful rattle in the 2018 minor semi-final, and I maintain that they would have won an All Ireland that year if the occasion hadn't overwhelmed them for the first twenty minutes of that game. Dangerous players, but probably too young for this level yet. Nor can I speculate much about Kerry selection. Jack Barry joining Liam Kearney on the injured list means that I will be watching midfield closely - David Moran to re-stamp his credentials as the second-best midfielder of the last decade (Fenton, who has never lost a championshp match, wears that crown very lightly), Adrian Spillane to nail down a berth (personally, I wouldn't mind seeing his cousin thrown into the mix; Kevin O'Sullivan has comfortably proven recently that he can mix it with the big guns), Diarmuid O'Connor? I'd like Burns, an attacking player rather than a pseudo-defender, wearing number ten. I'd prefer Sherwood over Morley against Conor McManus - horses for courses in this case. I'd prefer.... But sure, my main preference would be for champagne and oysters being served at half-time. And in my house, I'm pretty sure that won't be happening.

CORK WOES

It isn't good news, and I know that Peter Keane and any of the Kerry panel would agree with me. The news that Cork's Ciarán Sheehan, Tomás Clancy, and Kevin Crowley will be absent from the championship clash with Kerry because of injury might increase our chances of winning it, but it would be vastly preferable to have them on the field. Great players enhance any game and I can only wish them the absolute best in recovery, knowing that Kerry supporters will fully agree the sentiment and it would be reciprocated in Cork were the position reversed.

MCGUINNESS TO JOIN GALWAY

It was briefly a filler for the sports headlines in a time when they were scarce enough. Jimmy McGuinness, who was famously winning matches with Donegal with a duvet defence (not pretty, but effective) was photographed leaving a Galway training session. Cue loads of rampant and wild speculation. It has since been revealed, and really should have been obvious from the start, that his ITT team-mate (back when it was the less pretentious-sounding Tralee RTC) Padraig Joyce (whose managerial tenure has been phenomenal so far) had him invited to do a session. This is common practise, bringing in outside coaches and speakers for perspective. Being the greatest amateur association in the world, no money would ever be exchanged, of course. It certainly didn't deserve the headlines it received.

KERRY U20S IN ALL IRELAND SEMI-FINAL

The Kerry U20s are also out this weekend, and that one has a lot more meat on the bones. John Sugrue was also kind enough to participate in one of those magic 'zoom' conversations. Like Peter, he detailed the precautions being taken all along in regards to covid, and they are both thorough and impressive. Fingers crossed.

This is a big one, much bigger than the senior game. Kerry have laboured at U21/U20 level for a long time now. We did reach a final under Jack O'Connor, but didn't perform on the day and the enforced absence of the likes of Sean O'Shea, David Clifford, and Diarmuid O'Connor from the grade in recent years because of their rapid progression into senior ranks remains a short-term gain, long-term pain strategy that has cost Kerry immeasurably. Dublin left their better players playing at the grade, won All Irelands, and reaped player harvests after. We didn't. It is that simple and that obvious to me. I don't like the age change (I consider it hugely detrimental to players at minor as well; I think the drop-out rate at U18 is going to double as a result) but impressive manager John Sugrue can only play the hand he is dealt, and is doing so admirably. These are some of his observations before the game.

The Gaelic Grounds as Opposed to Croke Park: "I think the pitch is irrelevant. Both teams would lay in Banna Beach if they got the chance if that was the only option available to them.

It doesn't make any difference whatsoever for the guys at this age. I'm sure the Galway lads are chomping at the bit also. The pitch and location is irrelevant, it's a great occasion for these players."

Galway's Form: "This year has no form guide. They are a good Galway side; they disposed of Mayo, a very good Mayo side. Then in the Connaught Final, in rough conditions, they made light work of Roscommon, so we are under no illusions as to where we are going to sit when it comes to these guys.

Everyone is on a level playing field here. I just think that we have to take this as Kerry versus Galway, both teams going at it as hard as we can, and let's see what happens. There's no advantage either way. I'm pretty sure it's a level playing field and let's just play them."

Much has been made of Kerry's unprecedented five in a row of minor success. But Cork, whom we beat twice last year at minor, are the reigning minor champions and gave us an awful rattle in the first half of the Munster U20 Final (Ruaidhrí Ó Beaglaíoch was incandescent and Darragh Lyne close behind him in the second half).

Over that five year spell, Galway were always right up there at minor and they lost last year's final. They won three of the last four Connaught titles and beat us well in our last meeting at the grade. The corresponding minor team (to this year's U20s) gave us an awful battle in the All Ireland Minor Final I honestly thought we were gone at half-time, but Kerry held their nerve). Let's forget all the surround sound and the circumstances. This one should be an absolute cracker between two great teams and I am hugely looking forward to it.

HURLING

Fintan O'Connor's Kerry face Antrim in the Division Two decider this weekend, and that's a big one. The truth is that we are lucky enough to be there – Offaly slipped up, conceding two late goals to Antrim to allow Kerry to slip past them. Ironically, Antrim would probably have preferred to be facing Offaly in the decider!

Let's face it, though, Antrim were always going to be favourites regardless, having always looked the best team in Division two. They beat us by 2-20 to 2-14, and the truth is that it was a little bit flattering to us. Kerry will be without the Boyle brothers, and they are huge losses. I remember being sceptical when Mikey Boyle was switched to centre back from the forwards – which shows you how little I know. His long, raking deliveries have been a key part of Kerry"s game ever since, while Padraig when he gets going is a deadly shooter from range and goalscorer inside.

I know hurling isn't exactly a huge thing around Killarney – the hard truth is that Crokes had to battle outside ennui among other things to win that Intermediate title – but I know a few lads with Division Two medals, I had the privilege of chatting to one recently, and this is a big one for me. And win, lose, or draw, it'll set up the Joe McDonagh Cup nicely.

Incidentally, the news that yellow sliotars will be used in this year's championship is a very welcome one for me. The fact is that white is a colour that can easily get lost in natural backgrounds, as well as obscured by the white goalposts. Yellow (I'd actually go for lurid pink, but I'm not sure the GAA is ready for that!) should be much easier for the eye to follow.

ROWING

Killorglin RC made all the headlines at the National Coastal Rowing Championships in Portmagee recently. They've kept up that momentum and are welcoming a European medal back to the club this week. Monika Dukarska's former doubles partner Sanita Purspure was the headliner, successfully defending her 500m single schull title to become a double Euopean and World winner. Killorglin's Aileen Crowley, a gold medallist in Portmagee, came home with bronze in the women's fours alongside Aifric Keogh, Eimear Lambe, and Fiona Murtagh.

We're big into celtic crosses in these parts, in all fairness, and nothing wrong with that. But

there aren't a lot of European medals lying around here, and it's a stronger currency to me. After all, rowing on Killarney's lakes, as the late and great John Kelly (himself a giant in Kerry GAA circles) used to tell me, predates gaelic football by just a handful of centuries!

BASKETBALL

As an indoor game, it was the one I was most afraid would be dead in the water. As it is, it's going to be a bit strange – basketball games in front of spectators have a closeness about them that generates my favourite sporting atmosphere. It isn't afraid to bring razzmatazz - it's probably the best local sport to bring kids to, including big ones like me. I and mine wll be watching them streamed rather than in person (let's get real here, I wouldn't be attending an indoor game as a spectator these days even if it all the same.

I'm not twisting the knife. We are where we are. FAI

maladministration has left our development system exposed and the decline is clearly showing. In fairness, lack Charlton's exploits were an outlier, given our relative population,

of proper investment in national league pathways or coaching over years, and the presence of young talent. But any claims that we have turned the corner or that Stephen Kenny's positive attacking approach will transform everything are obvious nonsense. Not because he doesn't have the know-how or willingness (he does), but because he simply doesn't have the players. Be honest, Jeff Hendrick is a decent hardworking midfielder; playing him at number 10 was like asking a house painter to do the Sistine Chapel. That fish out of water did his best but there was never going to be goals created on that canvas. Alan Browne actually fitted the role much better later on and it gave Doherty a chance to push into Slovakia's very, very tame midfield and McGoldrick to show some limited attempt at creativity. None of them were going to trouble even limited Slovakia, whose midfield endeavours looked as convincing as Donald Trump's tax returns. Brady from set-pieces or a cross was still our best chance of a goal, and Brady isn't an international winger by any means.

Ignore the guff about how this was a great performance by Ireland and they deserved more; it's absolute nonsense. We lorded possession by a whopping 46%; Slovakia could only muster up a mere 54%. We committed 22 fouls, they committed 13. They completed 610 passes; we completed 489. 960 touches to 824. Again, our complete and utter lack of a goalscorer was shown up against Spain. Granted, we have been unlucky with enforced absentees, but this is not a new problem or recent circumstance. The simple fact is that since Robbie Keane retired, we don't have a real scorer. McClean's late red card could have real implications for us – by the time you read this, we may well be consigned to pot three in the World Cup draw. That would have worse implications than missing the European Championships for me; that 's a hard morass to climb out of. Kenny isn't to blame here for creating any of this mess, and I hope supporters will remember that. Managers are mortal and the problems lie far deeper.

All that glitters might not usually be gold but the silverware currently on display at Celtic Park in Ballydribeen certainly reflects a truly golden season in the proud 44-year history of Killarney Celtic Football Club.

In terms of dream achievements, it just couldn't have got any bigger or better for the club at all levels with a haul of trophies and successes that was totally unprecedented in Kerry soccer. Leading by example, the senior team won the Premier A Championship and the Greyhound Bar KO Cup double for an incredible third year in a row, once again proving absolutely invincible under the direction of astute manager Brian Spillane.

In addition to that remarkable achievement, Celtic clinched the Munster Champions League – having competed against some of the top sides in the province – and in a novel all-Celtic final, the club's A team overcame the challenge of the B team in the Celsius Menswear Cup decider.

And it didn't end there.

Having won the Jimmy Falvey Memorial Cup and the keenly contested Denny Youths League in convincing fashion, the club's swashbuckling youths team created their own wonderful chapter in the annals of Kerry and Irish soccer when they registered a dramatic FAI Youth Cup final victory over fancied Cork side Douglas Hall in a tension-filled penalty shootout.

The season that has just ended will be remembered as the greatest ever in the history of Killarney Celtic with so many triumphs to celebrate, so many cups to hold aloft and so many achievements to be proud of.

Progressive club chairman, Paul Sherry, said the success story is due mainly to the priority given to the underage policy over the years with several hundred players, in all age groups, turning up for training.

"There is great dedication shown by everybody involved in the club, from the officials, the coaches, the backroom teams, the parents and, of course, the players and the enthusiasm

with the Franciscan Youth Club and we decided over a few pints that we'd form a club," Mikey, later recalled.

A common belief that the fledging club took its name and its colours from Glasgow Celtic are well wide of the mark, however.

"Killarney already had an Athletic and a Rangers so Celtic was the first name that came to mind," Mikey said.


The first set of jerseys weren't green and white hoops either, rather a fetching shade of yellow. "We bought them in Jimmy O'Brien's sports shop for 33 punts. We went for yellow simply because it was all he had," Mikey said.

Renting playing space in local fields for years, Celtic eventually acquired its own base and Celtic Park is now one of the finest grounds in the south west, befitting of the most successful club in Kerry soccer.

And such is the progress that is being made, it's safe to assume that the best has yet to come.





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
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WORKPLACE BULLYING

Workplace bullying can be quite common and difficult to deal with. Bullying at work can take the form of physical, social or psychological intimidation. Examples include threatening behaviour, sexual harassment, verbal abuse, exclusion, psychological harassment, being given pointless or impossible tasks, deliberately making work difficult for you and withholding information necessary to get your work done properly. This type of bullying can be difficult to identify as it isn't always obvious, but it can have a serious effect on one over time. Workplace bullying can lead to a drop in productivity, lowered confidence and self-esteem, increased anxiety, stress and depression. It can also lead to physical symptoms such as tiredness, headaches and backache.

Workplace bullying can have a serious impact on family life. and put stress on relationships. The target of the bullying may feel unable to share what is happening at work because they should feel grateful to have a job and may not want to worry a partner or spouse. It may put extraordinary pressure on the victim to the extent that they can take it out on others, even to the extent of engaging in abusive or aggressive behaviour at home. If you are experiencing workplace bullying it is vital that you seek some much needed support. This support may be from a Human Resource Manager, a supervisor or your employer. If the situation continues or is serious, you may need to make a written complaint. It can be very helpful to keep a diary documenting everything that happens, including what you've done to try stopping it. Make sure you are informed - find out what the organisation's policies and procedures are for preventing and handling bullying. All employers have a duty to ensure the health and safety of their employees. Section 8 of the Safety, Health and Welfare at Work Act 2005 states that the employer is required to "prevent any improper conduct or behaviour likely to put the safety, health and welfare of employees at risk". As employees, we are duty bound not to engage in behaviour that would endanger the health, safety and welfare of ourselves and others.

It is also wise to get external information and advice from bodies such as the union representing your industry, the Health and Safety Authority or the Equality Tribunal. These organisations work to ensure that workplace bullying in not tolerated and can give you advice on your options and your rights. Other helpful websites include

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


