

Killarney students win national award at Final of SciFest

Success for study on how to reduce collisions between deer and vehicles

arragh Fleming, Ethan O'Neill and Colm Looney, 3rd year students from St. Brendan's College in Killarney competed among the top young minds at the SciFest 2018 National Final and were awarded won the SciFest STEM Outreach Award. for their project which looked to use science to reduce collisions between deer and vehicles. SciFest is funded primarily by Science Foundation Ireland, Intel Ireland and Boston Scientific.

SciFest is an all-island STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) initiative which fosters active, collaborative and inquiry-based learning among second level students. The final, held in Marino Conference Centre in Dublin on Friday, was attended by Richard Bruton T.D., Minister for Communications, Climate Action and Environment.

With their project, Darragh, Ethan and Colm identified locations of risk for collisions between deer and vehicles. They then investigated patterns that occurred in road crossing behaviours in deer living in the Killarney National Park. They created signage and a technological alarm system to ward off the deer and stop them from going out onto the roads. They also used other deterrents such as human hair and CDs to refract car lights into the deer's field of vision.

and CEO, presented Darragh, Ethan and Colm with their prize - SciFest STEM Outreach Award. Darragh, Ethan and Colm secured their place at the National Final after their success at the SciFest regional final in Institute of Technology, Tralee.

SciFest continues to grow year on year with over 10,000 students participating in local and regional SciFest STEM fairs across the country this year. Since its inception in 2008, over 60,000 students have participated in the competition. Darragh, Ethan and Colm were three of 63 students who went on to exhibit 37 STEM projects at the national final. Sheila Porter, SciFest Founder and CEO, said: "It is fantastic to see the level of talent, enthusiasm and determination on display today from the students. SciFest gives students of all abilities and backgrounds the opportunity to develop their research, problem solving, critical thinking and presentation skills. We take pride in creating the biggest, most inclusive student science event possible. This year we are excited to introduce the Broadcom MASTERS Award for junior cycle students where the winner will have the opportunity to attend the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair. This is a fantastic opportunity for young students with a budding interest in STFM.

Still in a state of disbelief, Jason originally from Glenflesk arrived in the Kerry GAA centre of Excellence with his father Tim last Monday afternoon to collect the winnings of €20,000 from Kerry GAA Treasurer Dermot Lynch.

"I won it earlier in the year and already spoke with them and told them I'd be back in November for my brother's wedding. It was a shock, very hard to believe for a while. I had to ring Tralee to speak to somebody. I thought it was a prank," Jason revealed

Jason had received the call from Kerry GAA PRO Leona Twiss after his winning in June and told her that he would be back in November.

Like many Kerry GAA, fans Jason emigrated to England in the 1980's and it is now home for him, his wife and two sons.

"I went over to London in 1987 and I now live in the Midlands in Staffordshire, the work keeps me there. I try to keep up with the football but it is very hard when you are not here (Kerry) but you try your best"

Admitting it was a longing to check on some scores that led him by "pure luck": to stumble on the Kerry GAA online Lotto

"I was looking up on the GAA online. The GAA came up with the lotto. It gave: me the option to play a couple weeks at a time but I took the yearly one" A few weeks later came the call.

"It is very hard to believe but we are: delighted, absolutely delighted. It will be spent on the family."

So with the cheque in the hands, Jason: had one last request. "A quick tour of: the newly opened Centre of Excellence" After all, it is the place, which benefits from the proceeds of the Kerry GAA: online Lotto and Jason is impressed.

"It is very professional. Brilliant: altogether. They have it all focused on: the player which is great. Maybe I'd: come back next year and watch them: training." Jason concludes, as he gets ready for his brother's wedding later in the week.



MINISTER: LOWER VAT RATE COULD RETURN

The nine per cent tourism VAT rate, introduced as an emergency recession measure in 2011 but scrapped in this year's Budget, could be introduced again if serious problems arise and the industry finds itself in difficulty.

That was the assurance given to over 200 hotel and hospitality sector leaders by Minister of State for Tourism and Sport, Brendan Griffin, at the National Tourism Forum in Killarney on Friday afternoon.

"The nine per cent is something that can be implemented again if the industry runs into problems just as it happened in 2011. I know it's scant consolation now but it happened before and it can happen again," he said

Conscious of the upset and worry the VAT hike to 13.5 per cent has caused, the Kerry TD stressed that he fought very hard to have the lower rate retained but he didn't get the result he wanted.

"It was introduced from 2011 to 2013 as a temporary measure and it was

extended from 2014-2017. In 2011 we had about 6.5 million to the Republic and it's close to 11 million this year so it did work.

"There has been huge success in tourism in recent years and to manage the increase in visitor numbers, we have to provide a funding stream to invest in infrastructure, product, overseas marketing and in people as well as those who are providing vital access," the minister told the Let's Talk Tourism forum.

He added that the Government also needed to find extra funding to tackle the "massive housing crisis" and the problems in the health service and it had to come from somewhere.

Minister Griffin acknowledged that smaller businesses in more rural areas might find it harder to cope with the hike to 13.5 per cent but the difficulty is when you're setting a VAT rate, you can't differentiate between Dublin city centre and rural Ballinskelligs, in south Kerry.


Nua Wellness raises over €630 for Pieta House

One in every five Kerry jobs in tourism

ne in every five people working in Kerry is employed in tourism-related enterprises, Kerry County Council research has revealed.

The tourism sector is a major driver of economic activity in the county and in 2017 the 2.2 million visitors to the county outnumbered the resident population by 15 to one.

Given the importance of the sector, the local authority has taken a number of actions to protect and enhance the industry including the formulation of a strategy and action plan which outlines the council's priorities for tourism up to and including 2022.

"The council has established a dedicated tourism unit to lead and implement tourism initiatives and it will work closely with tourism trade local development companies, government departments and state agencies," Kerry County Council Chief Executive, Moira Murrell, re-

Kerry has recorded tourism growth of 24 per cent over the past two years which is double the national figure and overseas visitor numbers in 2017 increased to 1.2 million.

Kerry County Council has acknowledged, however, that the issue of seasonality remains a challenge and even tourism hotspot Killarney experiences challenges over the winter months.

"Investment in key products and segments, like business, adventure and astro tourism, which will address the seasonality challenges faced by the county remains a top priority," the local authority stressed.

Four different counties four identical meals

A tour group visiting Ireland from France got the same starter, main course and dessert at four different hotels, in four different counties, on four successive nights, a tourism conference in Killarney was told.

On the menu each night was a Caesar salad to start with, a fillet of hake for mains and they finished their meal with a serving of profiteroles.

The experience was highlighted as an example of the need for product variety by Myléne Campalto, sales director for the French speaking markets with Abbey Group France, at the third annual Let's Talk Tourism conference in Killarney at the weekend.

It also highlighted a requirement for better advance planning for tour groups.

She said visitors from France expect good food when they travel abroad but it was important that there is greater variety in what they receive.

Simple treats like a French TV channel in their hotel room, Irish movies and books in the French language or a few words of welcome in French would make all the difference. "Don't defrost a baguette for breakfast if there's Irish brown bread available. When they are here they don't want what they have at home. Variety with food is very important but they want to discover the real Ireland," Ms Campalto added.

She told the gathering of over 220 tourism professionals that the French market is really price sensitive and they are always seeking out that personal touch that could make a holiday memorable.

"They are looking for more intimate group experiences and they want to go on scenic trips, rent a bicycle for half a day, go on boat trips, see sheep dogs and enjoy scones and bread baking demonstrations," the France holiday market specialist said.

WE MUST NOT KILL THE GOLDEN GOOSE

Those charged with protecting and supervising Ireland's most popular tourist attractions – including the Cliffs of Moher and the Wild Atlantic Way – must take particular care to ensure that visitor numbers are managed in a sustainable way to prevent any damage being caused, the Let's Talk Tourism forum heard.

Fáilte Ireland's Head of the Wild Atlantic Way, Miriam Kennedy, said sustainability was key and a responsible approach has to be taken with rigorous environmental monitoring on a constant basis.

"We must not kill the golden goose that lays the eggs. We must manage it in a proper way," she told over 220 delegates in Killarney.

Ms Kennedy stressed that with attractions like the Wild Atlantic Way there was a great balance required and, for example, if a proper walkway is not developed, people would trample all over the area.

"Visitor numbers might be high but you have to keep marketing it. If nobody knows it's there then nobody is going to buy it. We must look at the opportunities as opposed to the challenges," she added.

ON BUYING YOUR FIRST CAR

Centre on Saturday night. It was a match that lacked excitement and intensity and while the young Waterford team battled bravely at times, they were no match for a far superior Killarney side.



Welcome back dear reader last week we spoke about faith and believing in God and His Son Jesus, our Saviour. An extended version of this and all of our weekly articles are available on www.wordofvictory.net. So faith is our belief and trust in God, but did you know that God believes in you friend? Isolation, Ioneliness and rejection are becoming more and more the norm in society even though people have more 'friends' than ever. Someone may have two hundred or even six hundred 'friends' on social media, but that doesn't mean that anyone cares or has a meaningful relationship with them. But Isaiah 53:3-5 tells us that Jesus was rejected and despised and acquainted with deepest grief and pain. He took that on Himself so that we could be set free from the turmoil of rejection, isolation and sorrow and be called His friends (John 15:15). When they drove the crown of thorns into His head, and stripped Him naked, brutally beat Him, mocked Him and whipped Him, Jesus suffered such rejection, and humiliation but He went through it for our healing and wholeness. If you are going through loneliness, pain or rejection know this - you have a friend in Jesus. He gave His life, His dignity and His relationship with the Father at the Cross, so that you and I could be redeemed from sin and reconciled back to God. When the Father turned away the Lord cried out from His broken heart - "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?" (Mathew 27:46) This was Jesus in utter despair, but He was bearing our sins and iniquities so the Father had to turn away. Jesus had already endured the shame and humiliation of the brutality at the hands of the soldiers, and the rejection of His friends and followers - the people He had healed and loved, and now the Father left Him, and He was completely alone. But Isaiah 53:10 says it pleased the Father to crush Jesus because His sacrifice would bring many sons to glory (Hebrews 2:10). Thus when one believes in their heart that Jesus is the Son of God, and confesses Him as Lord and Saviour they are saved (Romans 10:9). That word "saved" is the word "sozo" in Greek and it means to be healed, delivered, protected, provided for, and preserved from danger, disease and suffering and from perishing eternally. So when Jesus was rejected He made the way for us to be accepted by God as His children, restored and made completely whole. You are loved by God dear friend, reach out to Him and receive His Love....

Workplace bullying can be quite common and difficult to deal with. Bullying at work can take the form of physical, social or psychological intimidation. Examples include threatening behaviour, sexual harassment, verbal abuse, exclusion, psychological harassment, being given pointless or impossible tasks, deliberately making work difficult for you and withholding information necessary to get your work done properly. This type of bullying can be difficult to identify as it isn't always obvious, but it can have a serious effect on one over time. Workplace bullying can lead to a drop in productivity, lowered confidence and selfesteem, increased anxiety, stress and depression. It can also lead to physical symptoms such as tiredness, headaches and

Workplace bullying can have a serious impact on family life and put stress on relationships. The target of the bullying may feel unable to share what is happening at work because they should feel grateful to have a job and may not want to worry a partner or spouse. It may put extraordinary pressure on the victim to the extent that they can take it out on others, even to the extent of engaging in abusive or aggressive behaviour at home. If you are experiencing workplace bullying it is vital that you seek some much needed support. This support may be from a Human Resource Manager, a supervisor or your employer. If the situation continues or is serious, you may need to make a written complaint. It can be very helpful to keep a diary documenting everything that happens, including what you've done to try stopping it. Make sure you are informed - find out what the organisation's policies and procedures are for preventing and handling bullying. All employers have a duty to ensure the health and safety of their employees. Section 8 of the Safety, Health and Welfare at Work Act 2005 states that the employer is required to "prevent any improper conduct or behaviour likely to put the safety, health and welfare of employees at risk". As employees, we are duty bound not to engage in behaviour that would endanger the health, safety and welfare of ourselves and others.

It is also wise to get external information and advice from bodies such as the union representing your industry, the Health and Safety Authority or the Equality Tribunal. These organisations work to ensure that workplace bullying in not tolerated and can give you advice on your options and your rights.
