
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Star Trails at the Gap of Dunloe, Beaufort, taken on a cold January night. This amazing shot was captured by Denis Mangan.

Minister Foley was a member of the negotiating team that put together the document during weeks of talks with representatives of Fine Gael and the Regional Independent Group. She said that the 162-page programme contains many important commitments to provide the country and people of Kerry with more homes, better infrastructure,

KERRY TD, MICHAEL i high quality public services and a strong and stable economy. "I am very pleased that we have secured agreement on key measures which will help families to deal with the cost of living, including a cap of €200 per child per month on the cost of childcare."

> "I also know the enormous contribution that family carers make to Irish society, so we are committed to phasing out the means test for the carer's allowance during the lifetime of the Government."

> "We have committed to reducing the pupil teacher ratio from 23:1 to 19:1 at primary level, to continue investment in the school building programme and to roll out supports to protect the viability of small schools."

> There is a further commitment in the Programme for Government to increase the number of pupils on the school transport scheme by 100,000 pupils by 2030. This is a scheme which is of vital importance to Kerry. Minister Foley said she was particularly pleased that a specific reference had been included in the Programme for Government to "take all necessary action to ensure and protect Ireland's energy security."

> "This means all initiatives to protect and enhance energy security will be examined, up to and including an LNG facility. This is a hugely important reference in the Programme for Government for North Kerry."

> The draft Programme for Government contains a target to deliver more than 300,000 new homes by the end of 2030, which equates to an annual homebuilding target of 60,000 per year. There is a strong emphasis on balanced regional development and providing more housing in rural areas, including one-off rural housing.

> Specific provision is also made for the ramping up of investment and delivery of road infrastructure. There are new measures too across a variety of key sectors such as health, agriculture and the marine, tourism, business and hospitality. There is a specific commitment to examine the VAT rate for the retail and hospitality sectors, given the cost pressures they are experiencing.

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The story behind the shot

Our front page photo this week is a stunning shot captured by Denis Mangan at the Gap of Dunloe. Speaking to the Killarney Outlook this week Denis told us how he managed to get such an amazing photograph.

"I took a five minute long photograph to expose for the foreground. I was fortunate that a car drove into frame as I was taking the shot. The light trail along the road is the car driving along the road to Kate Kearneys over a five minute period", Denis said.

"I then took 250 shorter photographs of the night sky over a 90 minute period. Each of these photos shows the stars have moved slightly in their position. You then blend all of these together to give the impression of movement across the night sky.

So what you are actually seeing in effect is the earth's rotation through the solar system in a 90-110 minute period in relation to the stars.

Denis who is a Fire Fighter in Killarney is looking forward to capturing many more fantastic photos in 2025.





Major new development for St Francis special school

There has been a broad welcome for the news that initial project approval has been given for a major new development for St Francis Special School.

The school in Beaufort will get five new classrooms, a sensory room, a music room, a cookery room and a withdrawal room.

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D. Norma Foley said that "this exciting new development will support the excellent work that happens every single day in St Francis Special School. It is part of a programme of increased investment in special education that has included the approval of 16 new special schools and the doubling of special classes to more than 3,300 across the country. I look forward to seeing the works in St Francis Special School progressing in a timely fashion."

The existing buildings in St. Francis Special School are getting retrofitted and upgraded to a Building Energy Rating (BER) of B with renewable heating. This is a separate development under the Pathfinder school programme operated by the Department of Education and the Sustainable Energy



Authority of Ireland.

The news of the project approval has also been welcomed by Michael Cahill TD and Councillor Tommy Cahill of Fianna Fáil in Kerry.

Both Cahills admit to being strong admirers of the work carried out there and the provision of 5 new classrooms, a sensory room, a music room, a cookery room and a withdrawal room at St Francis Special School in Beaufort, will make a fantastic difference to all students and staff.

They have also welcomed the fact that all the existing buildings in St Francis Special School are being retrofitted and upgraded to a Building Energy Rating (BER) of B, with renewable heating.

This is a major vote of confidence in the future of St Francis Special School in Beaufort according to Michael and Tommy Cahill and relieves a lot of the stress that those involved had been under.

Deputy Michael Cahill commented that he feels that there will always be a need for a residential setting such as St Mary of the Angels, on lands there that were originally donated by the Doyle family for that specific purpose.

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KERRY FAMILY WIN TOP PRIZE IN BT YOUNG SCIENTIST

Three sisters from Tralee have won the 2025 BT Young Scientist & Technology Award.

The Murphy sisters, Ciara, age 17 in 5th year, Saoirse, age 15 in 3rd year, and Laoise, age 12 in 1st year, won the top prize with their project, ACT (Aid Care Treat): App-timising emergency response. The BTYSTE perpetual trophy was presented to the winner this evening at the RDS by Minister for Education, Norma Foley TD and Managing Director of BT Ireland, Shay Walsh.

ACT is a medical assistance app designed to support emergency healthcare responses. It integrates crucial features to provide swift and effective aid during critical situations. This is the second year this project has been recognised at the exhibition having previously been awarded Runner-Up Group in 2024.

The 2025 BTYSTE winners is / are the 61st person / group of people to win the overall prize, and as this year's winners, take home €7,500. This year, for the first time ever, the overall winner, along with one senior project from each of the four remaining categories, will be awarded a trip to the World Expo, in Osaka, Japan. Held every five years, World Expo brings the world together to explore the future of industry, technology, and progress. Inspired by Ireland's theme 'Creativity Connects People,' the winners will have the opportunity to create meaningful intercultural connections, experience cuttingedge science, and showcase their research on a global stage. The overall winner of BTYSTE 2025 will also represent Ireland at the European Union Contest for Young Scientists (EUCYS) in Riga, Latvia this September.

Minister Foley said: "I'm thrilled beyond measure that the three girls from my own school, Presentation Secondary School, and from my home town of Tralee, have won the top prize at the BT Young Scientist and Technology Exhibition.

I want to acknowledge the tremendous work ethic of the students and the great honour they have brought to their family, school and local community.

I also want to congratulate their teacher Helena Madigan for her sterling mentorship and support of the three girls."

Minister Foley also congratulated all the Kerry students involved in the 24 projects which were selected for this year's BT Young Scientist exhibition in the RDS, with many of them winning separate awards.

"I am also so pleased that there was such strong

representation and success by Kerry schools in the competition. A phenomenal achievement for the county."

Minister Foley paid tribute to the role of BT, which has been the organiser and sponsor of the exhibition for the past 25 years. She also thanked all the teachers and staff in all the schools in Kerry who had guided their students "every step of the way."

"It was a joy for me to meet some many really articulate and capable young people from our schools in Kerry and around the country at the exhibition in the RDS last week. Every single student I spoke to told me how much they've enjoyed it. So it combines great learning with great fun," she said.

There were 24 projects from schools in Kerry among the 550 projects in this year's BT Young Scientist exhibition. This included 11 projects from Mercy Secondary School Mounthawk, four from Pobalscoil Inbhear Scéine in Kenmare, three from Presentation Secondary School Listowel, two from Presentation Secondary School Tralee and CBS The Green and one each from Gaelcholaiste Chiarraí and Presentation Secondary Milltown.

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

Four legs good, two legs bad

Last week we highlighted the big projects in train for the national park but the small things matter too. More benches are needed, not least a reflective bench for the blue pool in Muckross to allow us sit and gaze. Other things are warranted too. Where is our Dog run for instance?

The National Park as an ideal location for a dog run was first put forward formally two years ago. The idea was proposed in January 2023 by Councillor John O'Donoghue. This would be in a secure area, without causing problems on walkways frequented by pedestrians.

Dog ownership has soared since the pandemic lockdown. And a growing number of businesses are advertising themselves to be dog friendly, John argued cogently. Because of the scarcity of other land around the town, the doggie park would of course be the national park alongside or somewhere near the cycle path and walkway, and the playground of Port Road. An ideal site would have been at the Ballydowney end, several people suggested.

There, dogs could be left off their leads to romp happily and to socialise - much like two legged people do on the nearby football pitch, or the gym. But where dogs could be left of their lead and romp happily is now earmarked for biodiversity, it appears. As if the 25,000 acres of Killarney National Park is not bio diverse already!

The dog park idea was backed strongly and the argument strengthened by other examples from Lucan to Westmeath. More recently Limerick has joined the canine romps. Alas, management of dog parks is an emerging issue, with the human owners not playing ball as much as their canine followers- allowing their mutts to lose control off the lead, as well as in terms of toilet facilities. "The four legged creatures are not the problem -it's the two legged owners!" John remarked to me.

He is not at all optimistic there will be a dog park for Killarney because of the experience elsewhere.

Trees in Snow

The big freeze of last week was not all about snow or humans either. Trees too have lessons for us and they cope very differently in snow. The big oaks and beech and ash have no leaves now, nor has the birch. These bare leaf structures stand out like ghost ships in snow. The most dramatic trees are those with what we loosely term pine trees - the needle leaves.

A walk, really a trudge, in the woods on the first day of the big snow brought home to me how our native "needle leaves" are the best. The silence of heavy snow is one of the big takeaways. Broken only by branches falling - some too close for comfort. If you read the books on trees, you will learn this is because of the weight of snow. But that is only part of the story.

Trees prepare for winter in these parts in the way we humans bring in the wood and put up the thermal curtains. They move their water around so their barks won't burst. And the needle pines produce scented antifreeze chemicals so their leaves won't burst. The native Scots Pine, the red bark pine that is not shaped like Christmas Trees, copes very well. It will let go a branch or two so the whole tree is not at risk. Many of the Scots on Mangerton are hundreds of years old, I reckon. The forest now is spattered with discarded Scots branches.

Up in Brosna and Mount Eagle the commercial forest which is densely packed with no breathing space behaved very differently. The quick growing shallow-rooted trees fell over entirely bringing with them whole ESB lines. Nothing new there.

There were 14 power cuts in Brosna last year even without the snow. Most were attributable to falling trees and branches from the over-crowded spruce.

Not just native trees coped well in the snow of last week. Exotic tree ferns survived with a bit of help in the form of a bag or two over them. The grass like bamboos and the eucalyptus righted themselves too - again cleverly bamboos bend right over and do not break.



Trolley numbers

Is it time we had a rethink about the way we talk about what is happening in our hospitals year in year out, from Limerick to Cork to Tralee? Munster has the worst figures. But nurses unions might need to sit up a bit when it comes to communicating the vital statistics. Trolley figures are not cutting through anymore. Over the past week or so I have come across reports from England and how they are coping with their ever worsening hospital situation. Management

in some acute hospitals are advertising for "corridor nurses." This is almost Florence Nightingale with the lantern in the Crimean War (the nineteenth century one, not the current one!) . There are so many people on trolleys in corridors now, specific skills are needed. Not least of these is improvisation. Most corridors will not have the number of plugs required for oxygen and other equipment and there will be very poor lighting for languishing patients - like here it can be days before a bed is found. Staff are being forced to deliver "compromised care". This is putting patients in danger and "out of sight of staff and out of the reach of emergency call bells" and represents "a serious deprivation of privacy and dignity," the nurses in the UK make clear.

To me the "corridor nurse" communicates far more effectively what is now necessary in modern war time situation medicine in the UK and in Ireland: making do.

Many of us will either have been on trolleys or visited loved ones on trolleys in the UHK in

Tralee and the situation is extraordinary. Bags of personal belongings piled up at the end of beds. Food, equipment and other trolleys wheeling by. No means of escaping the light or the noise. A babble of different languages everywhere. Airports don't come near it!

Corridor nursing is the new skill these days. It is a sad indictment of our society in 2025. Let's hope our new Government with their rural focus addresses it.



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LGFA 2025 LIDL NATIONAL LEAGUE LAUNCHED

idl Ireland shines spotlight on need for visibility of women's sport as new research reveals 42% of Irish public more likely to attend female games to watch a high-profile player.

Lidl Ireland and the Ladies Gaelic Football Association (LGFA) this week launched the 2025 Lidl National Football League season and unveiled striking new research spotlighting the importance of developing and elevating Irish female sporting role models for the positive impact they can have on individuals, society and their sport.

Continuing the momentum of Lidl and LGFA's hard-hitting 'Get Behind the Fight' campaign, new research conducted by Red C in November 2024 revealed the need for more high-profile female players in sport as 42% of the Irish public said they would be more likely to attend a women's sporting event in person if someone well-known was playing.

However, the challenge of player visibility and audience connection remains, with 43% believing that not knowing anyone who is playing is a barrier to attending a female sports event – an increase from 33% of respondents surveyed in Lidl's 2023 research study – illustrating the growing importance of raising the profile of female athletes to attract fans.

The unveiling of this new research comes with the 2025 Lidl National Leagues about to get underway. 

Through their collective effort, they've reached a milestone this week.

The staff were thrilled to announce that they were able to purchase a new defibrillator which is now situated at our store. While they hope it's never needed, in the event of an emergency, it could make all the difference and save a life. "I am so proud of the team here at Sheehan's Centra on Muckross Road for all the work they put into the purchase of a new defibrillator" Aisling Sheehan told Killarney Outlook.

"We have a few more exciting projects in the pipeline and are looking forward to revealing those in time to come", she added.

Well done to all involved in this fantastic initiative.



CAO application season is in full swing and with 85,000 plus applicants competing for about 52,000 college places, it's vital to submit a complete application form. Stay focussed and be aware of key dates and the important tasks to be done in the weeks ahead. The 2025 CAO online application remains open until 1st February. Open your CAO interactive online account via "Apply" on www.cao.ie, by 20th January to get a discount rate of €30. After that the fee increases to €45 until the 1st February. The closing date for online Change of Course Choices, which is free, is also 1st February.

You may use the online facility to amend course choices, fee €10, from 5th February to 1st March to add any restricted courses not already listed. Restricted category applicants may also use this facility. All other applicants should use the free Change of Mind option, between 6th May and 1st July, to make any course changes.



Killarney prices rose 9.7pc in 2024 to €395,000, while prices in Tralee rose by 26.5pc to €310,000.


"There is still no new stock coming online," said Donal Culloty of REA Coyne and Culloty, Killarney.

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

WINTER EYE HEALTH

Driving in winter

In winter you may have more difficulty seeing clearly because of darker evenings .When it is dark your pupils become larger to let in more light. However this can results in your vision becoming more blurred. This is why you may be more reliant on your glasses at night.

The glare of a low-lying sun can also make it more difficult to see, so make sure your windscreen is clean, both inside and out. It is useful to have a pair of polarised sunglasses in the car to help with the glare from the sun, even in winter.

Dry eyes

If you already have dry eyes, central heating may make them worse. Here are some simple steps you can take to minimise the discomfort caused by dry eyes in winter:

• Lower the temperature in rooms when possible.

• Blink more often.

• Use a humidifier. Opening windows for a few minutes on cold days will also help.

• Lubricants. Certain lubricating eye drops may be helpful for you.

Increased screen time

People tend to stay in and watch more television and spend more

time using computers during the winter. Using a screen will not damage your eyes but prolonged use can make your eyes tired and dry.

Remember to take breaks and operate the 20:20:20 rule; every 20 minutes, take a 20-second break and focus your eyes on something at least 20 feet away.

Watery eyes

In cold and windy conditions, many people complain that their eyes water more than normal. Wearing glasses will provide protection against the wind, even if you don't usually wear them outdoors. Winter sun

Snow and ice are reflective, so the sun's damaging UV rays can reach your eyes from below as well as above. UV exposure is cumulative, so although you may not feel any immediate effects, you could be putting yourself at risk of long-term damage and risk cataracts and age-related macular degeneration (AMD) if you don't wear good quality sunglasses or goggles.

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NEW GOVT MUST USE OPPORTUNITY TO RADICALLY ALTER PLANNING PROCESS TO ACHIEVE HOUSING TARGETS

- GOLD PLATING OF EU REGULATIONS MUST END TO ALLOW US TO HOUSE ALL OF OUR PEOPLE -

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said the next Government must use the opportunity of a change in administration to radically alter the planning and permitting processes in Ireland's housing system.

Kelleher, an MEP for Ireland South, was commenting after meeting with and engaging with homebuilders and developers over recent weeks who outlined that, on average, it takes longer for a new housing development to go through the planning process than it does for the physical homes to be actually built.

"Progress has been made and it is clear that we will hit 40,000 homes in 2025. However, I do not believe the current system will ever be capable of reaching the 60,000 plus homes that we need to stabilise our housing system and address the housing crisis.

"The reform of the Planning Act helped in recent years, but we need to go further. I worry that the planned investment in water infrastructure will not deliver tangible results due to delays in permitting and planning. This is an essential component of delivering homes in regional and rural Ireland.

"I have repeatedly called for Ireland's lethargic

planning and permitting system to be overhauled. It is holding us back as a society. Now is the time to do it; a new government with a new, stronger mandate must grasp this issue, and finally address it.

"There are many in Ireland who would lay the blame on the EU for the slow and lethargic systems we deal with in Ireland. This is far from reality.

"The gold-plating of regulation in Ireland is a

decision of Irish authorities. Over the last five years, I've seen how other Member States apply European regulations, and they are not as onerous as they are in Ireland.

"We have a generational chance, with a new government, to change how we build in Ireland. We owe it to our people to use this opportunity to secure their housing future," concluded Kelleher.

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SMALL BUSINESS OWNERS WANT ACTION NOW

Small business owners from Carlow to Kerry tell Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú that they want to see a dramatic change in the new Programme for Government to help the ailing SME sector

Ireland South MEP Cynthia Ní Mhurchú has said, that small businesses that she has met throughout her Ireland South constituency, have told her that they are at breaking point because of a rise in both state inflicted regulations and a rising cost base.

The MEP called on her colleagues in Fianna Fail to heed their warnings and lead an ambitious and comprehensive plan as part of the new Programme for Government to roll back red tape for Irish SMEs and reduce their operating cost base

One large pub owner in Limerick told Ní Mhurchú that he is unfairly hit with excessive regulations regarding food safety.

"While public health is a priority, the sheer volume of paperwork, inspections, and

.

frequently changing regulations can be overwhelming, especially for small, family-run pubs that have limited staff. Standardising food and hygiene regulations or simplifying reporting requirements could ease this burden without compromising safety"

A retailer in Carlow told Ní Mhurchú,

"A new licensing fee for retailers who sell Vapes and Tobacco products means that they must now pay a new €1,800 annual license fee to sell those products. Whilst retailers are not guestioning the rationale behind a regulatory regime for selling tobacco related products. they do feel that an additional €1,800 annual licence fee is a kick in the teeth to small shops that are the heart of the community"

One small engineering firm in the South East of the country told Ní Mhurchú that it couldn't find any general operatives locally and was looking to the Philippines to bring in operatives to keep the business going. That business owner described "lengthy waiting periods at

each stage of the visa application process", and "extremely slow processing times" by our government agencies.

Ní Mhurchú said it is time to wake up to the regulatory burden that has been allowed to develop for SMEs. She said it is impeding local businesses that provide vital jobs in rural Ireland. According to the CSO, 7 in every 10 workers in Ireland are employed in SMEs in Ireland

She has called for an audit of the regulations that SMEs face and a comprehensive plan to reduce them and to bring down the operating costs of the sector.

According to Ní Mhurchú, "Our approach of giving grants to ailing SMEs is not sustainable. They want to be able to make profits, not depend on state grants to survive. And not have their valuable time trying to run businesses swallowed up by dealing with red tape."

CALL FOR MORE PARKING IN KILLARNEY

At Wednesdays Killarney Municipal District Meeting, Ind Cllr Martin Grady, called for Killarney Municipal District to source alternative suitable vacant land to provide additional parking for the town as we await the completion of the proposed high rise parking development.

"We saw drawings and plans of a multi-storey car park. Yet we are facing into another summer without an extra parking space. There's various lands within the town that could provide the people with additional parking while we wait for the multistorey to come to fruition, realistically I believe this will take time and don't want the locals or visitors to suffer another session, this will also help the traffic situation as motorists circle the town seeking a parking space", Cllr Grady said.

Time for Irish Govt to pick a side when it comes to the pharma sector and Intellectual Property rights - MEP Kelleher

"The new Government must pick a i "The Government position is known side urgently when it comes to the importance of Intellectual Property rights in the pharmaceutical sector," says Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher. Kelleher was commenting as negotiations in Brussels trundle on concerning the General Pharmaceutical Legislation, which will have a major impact on pharmaceutical companies in Ireland.

"At the heart of this issue is the question about how long a company can hold exclusive rights over the production and sale of a medicine. In 2023, the European Commission made a proposal to drastically reduce IP protection from 10 to 8 years.

"Thankfully MEPs agreed their position nearly 10 months ago with only a minor reduction of six months. While this wasn't my preferred option, it was the only option on the table.

"However. Member State governments are still currently negotiating their position at present. However, according to a variety of sources, Ireland hasn't picked a side and is seen as one of the last countries to make up its mind on this issue.

to be split with the Department of Health favouring a reduction in rights in the hope it will deliver cheaper medicines while the Enterprise and Finance departments favour keeping the status quo to ensure that pharma companies continue to see the benefit of investing in R&D and retaining jobs in Ireland.

"Ireland is the fifth largest exporter of pharmaceuticals globally. With 120 pharmaceutical companies based here in Ireland and over 60,000 people directly employed, it is a critical part of our industrial policy.

"There is a balance to be struck in terms of improving quicker access to the medicines but we cannot do it in such a way that undermines the EU's competitiveness and ultimately our economy.

"We need the next ministers for health and enterprise to get on the same page quickly, and to ensure that Ireland's voice is heard sooner rather than later in the discussions in the Council of Ministers," concluded Kelleher.

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


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Proactive vehicle maintenance is a year-round responsibility

NCT Is Not a Diagnostic Tool

The Road Safety Authority (RSA) has called on vehicle owners to embrace year-round responsibility for maintaining their cars, rather than relying on the National Car Test (NCT) to identify faults.

Customer satisfaction surveys have continuously highlighted the disappointing culture of vehicle owners using the NCT as a diagnostic tool, contributing to inefficiencies in the system and increasing risks to road safety. NCT: A Roadworthiness Test, Not a Diagnostic Service

The NCT is designed to ensure vehicles on the road are roadworthy and safe at a point in time when the test is undertaken. However, many vehicle owners are presenting their cars for testing without addressing known maintenance issues. The Service tested over 1.7 million vehicles in 2024 - an increase of 144,000 vehicles compared to 2023. To ensure that the growing demand is met, it is important that well-maintained vehicles are presented for testing.

"Maintaining your vehicle is a year-round responsibility. We use our vehicles for work and to transport our families, so ensuring our vehicles are maintained to a high standard should be a year-round focus not something



to focus on only before your NCT," said Brendan Walsh, Chief Operations Officer with the RSA. "Regular upkeep ensures your car is safe, roadworthy, and operating efficiently at all times. Proactively addressing known issues before your test improves your chances of passing and helps the NCT system operate more efficiently, freeing up capacity for others." Increase in "Fail Dangerous" Results: A Cause for Concern

In 2024, 7.4% of vehicles received a "Fail Dangerous" result following the NCT, up from 6.9% in 2023. This concerning increase poses a direct and immediate risk to road safety. It is an offence to drive a vehicle with dangerous defects on public roads.

Tyres are the leading cause of "Fail Dangerous" results, often due to tread depths below the legal limit of 1.6mm. Other significant causes include issues with the chassis/underbody and

brake lines/hoses. The RSA reminds vehicle owners of the critical importance of regularly checking and maintaining these components to avoid serious safety risks.

What Happens When a Vehicle receives a 'Fail Dangerous' test result?

Vehicles that receive a "Fail Dangerous" result are subject to the following actions:

 \cdot A "Failed Dangerous" sticker is affixed to the vehicle, with legal information provided on the reverse.

· Vehicle owners are advised verbally and in writing not to drive the vehicle until the defects are repaired.

• The vehicle's details are shared with the National Vehicle and Driver File (NDVF) and the Gardaí, who have direct access to this information for enforcement purposes.

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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take $\leq 20,000$ via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000. Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

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CRONIN CHOOSES CITROËN FOR TARMAC TITLE DEFENCE

Keith Cronin will defend his NAPA Auto Parts Irish Tarmac Rally Championship title in a Citroën C3 Rally 2. The West Cork driver, who will again be navigated by Killarney's Mikie Galvin, will line up in the French machine for the first time at the opening round of the Tarmac series, the Galway International Rally, which takes place on February 1st and 2nd.

For Cronin, the move sees him return to a marque with which he has enjoyed much success in the past. He won his third of four British Rally Championships in a DS3 R3T in 2012, and in the same model took a WRC3 win at Rally Finland the following year. In 2016, he and Galvin won their first Irish Tarmac Championship in a DS3 R5.

"We looked at various options, and the Citroën came up as the best overall package for us for 2025," said Cronin. "Their current Rally 2 car won over 130 rallies last year on every sort of surface, all over Europe, in Africa and in North and South America, and scored five WRC2 victories in the World Championship. C3 drivers won the French, Danish, Mexican and Ivory Coast Championships. Hopefully we can replicate that type of form with it in Ireland," he added.

The Citroën will be prepared and run by Tom Gahan Motorsport, as was the Ford Fiesta that brought Cronin to the 2024 Tarmac title, and the Volkswagen Polo he drove in 2022 and '23.

Continuing the Gallic flavour, Cronin and Galvin will run on Michelin tyres in 2025.


In addition to committing to their Tarmac Championship campaign, Cronin and Galvin have also entered the opening round of the Probite Brakes British Rally Championship, the East Riding Stages, which falls three weeks after Galway, but they are currently on the reserve list for the Yorkshire closed road event. "We'll have to wait and see firstly as to whether or not we get a start," remarked Cronin. "If we get going, we'll take the BRC on a round-by-round basis after that and see how things progress."

The Galway Rally will additionally see a second Citroën bearing the Cronin name amongst the line up, as Keith's brother Daniel will also be out in a C3 Rally 2, ahead of a tilt at the Motorsport Ireland National Rally Championship. He and co-driver, Donnchadh Burke, took third in the 2024 National standings, and they will be aiming to improve on that once this year's series gets under way with the Midland Rally in Longford, at the beginning of March.

Defeat can be a bitter pill, losing by the bare minimum making it worse. The big crowd in the Cathedral of Cork Basketball, the Neptune Stadium may have paid for their seats but they spent the majority of this blockbuster sitting on the edge of them. Not for the first time this season Utility Trust St Pauls went toe to toe with a heavyweight and gave as good as they got. The result was still in doubt as the clock ticked down to its final seconds but James Fleming's side just came up short and despite defeat they can still look themselves in the mirror and know that they gave it everything they had.

Killester are the reigning league champions, with a host of Irish Internationals and they were the first to admit that it took all that they had to edge past the Killarney side. Their talismanic figure Michelle Clarke said as much afterwards when she acknowledged that her side needed every morsel of grit. determination and experience to get them over the line. It really was that close.

St Pauls were outstanding especially in the first half where their game plan was perfectly executed. Alex Wittinger and Gracen Kerr were scoring freely, Mathilde Diop was finding her range while defensively they worked hard on shutting down the influence of Samantha Haiby. You could argue that they probably deserved more than a six point lead at half time and with a bit of temerity questioning a few of the refereeing decisions that saw the foul count at 8-2 at the end of the first quarter. But Killester roared back into the game in the third quarter and St Paul's grip on the game was never as strong thereafter. You'd have to factor in the absence of Rheanne O Shea and Leah McMahon also as when you take these teams on you need every tool in your armoury.

Straight from the tip off Gracen Kerr skipped in for a basket but Destiny Strother replied with a three . St Pauls were diligent on defence and that helped them run into a 13 - 8 lead. Kerr and Mathilde Diop were the architects of that advantage with accurate outside shooting and it was left to leva Bagdanaviciene to light the Killester fire. St Paul's intensity though was starting to get pockmarked by fouls , perhaps with some

in the debatable category. Lorraine Scanlon and Paris McCarthy ran into early trouble but the introduction of Lynn Jones, Siofra O Shea and Denise Dunlea didn't weaken the cause. Dunlea hit five points and Wittinger was heating up and at the end of a high quality first quarter it was St Pauls in front, at 27-25.

Wittinger struck early in the second followed by a Kerr three as Haiby was trying to pull the Killester strings. Hannah Thornton was starting to be a handful for the Pauls defence but the offence was really clicking into gear. Diop and Wittinger hit threes and Killester called a timeout trailing by 40-33. Paris McCarthy picked up her third foul but Lorraine Scanlon offset that blow with great work inside. With a 44-35 lead the game was about to enter a critical stage, either side of half time. Firstly Haiby finished the half with a three and exchanged free throws with Dunlea to close the gap to six.

But even crucially Killester emerged from the dressing room a different team and hit twelve points without reply. Strother, Haiby, Michelle Clarke and Bagdanaviciene were rampant and it necessitated a St Pauls timeout to clear the heads. It had the required effect as Wittinger and Kerr steadied the ship and even though Thornton netted again the recovery saw St Pauls 56-55 ahead, heading into the final period.

You could cut the tension with a knife as there was never more than the width of a cigarette paper between the two sides. It made for huge excitement as they traded blows with Wittinger, Diop and Scanlon answering the efforts of Haiby, Strother and Thornton. Both sides seemed thankful for the time out with 5.27 to go and Wittinger pounced to put her side one clear again, 64.63. In what looked like a decisive move Thornton and Haiby put the Metropolitans three clear but in the blink of an eye Kerr reeled them in with a three.

St Pauls were now on team fouls but a combination of solid defending and errant

Killester free throw shooting lessened the effect. Kerr was most unlucky when her three point shot bounced out but when Diop wriggled in to put her side 69-68 ahead you wondered was it going to be their night. But Haiby was fouled as Killester searched for redemption. She was nerveless from the charity stripe to give her side the lead. St Pauls tried in vain for a winner, their best moment when McCarthy weaved into the paint with seconds on the clock, only to see her effort blocked. With that went St Pauls hopes of a first National Cup final appearance but they certainly died with their boots on!!

Alex Wittinger netted 24, Gracen Kerr had 20, Mathilde Diop 13, Denise Dunlea 6, Lorraine Scanlon 6, Paris McCarthy, Lynn Jones, Siofra O Shea, Meabh Barry.

For the winners Samantha Haiby had 20, Hannah Thornton 13, leva Bagdanaviciene 12 and Destiny Strother shot 11.

DR. CROKES BOW OUT IN A THRILLER

ALL IRELAND SENIOR CLUB SEMI-FINAL:

Errigal Ciarán 2-18 Dr. Crokes 1-18

There's no softening some blows; I truly wish there was one. This is a game that just got away. There's a lot of easy analysts - and I'm using the term loosely -throwing around their small couple of cents worth, as always happens on occasions as these. I have no such feigned wisdom to offer. A grain of rice, as Páidí famously said many years ago before leading rank underdogs Westmeath into history. A single grain of rice can tip the scale. Especially when a game is as finely balanced as this one. The great man had other requirements to win a game, and Dr. Crokes produced every last bit of that at all stages along this journey. Both teams did. I'd almost say that it came down to a lottery, but in fairness that would be to detract from an Errigal Ciarán side who were themselves magnificent. Just grains of rice between ecstacy and heartbreak. Kipling famously described both as imposters; I wouldn't necessarily agree with him. Sport teaches you things about life and about yourself, but to suggest that it's all about the journey rather than the destination.....you never see a drop of sweat or blood or dirt on the people saying that kind of stuff. Last Saturday was not that kind of day, and all the better for it. Good work by Micheál Burns handed the first chance to Crokes, but it's just a fraction wide. No big deal, that's a good, purposeful start. As expected, Errigal Ciarán were already funnelling back. The question was how would Crokes line out? The answer? They are happily going one-on-one and going hunting. Whether they won or lost, this was going to be a football game.

Look, I was worried about what kind of game we were going to get here. It wasn't really going to matter to either side – of course, their only focus is winning the game – and frankly I have seen an awful lot of bad football games this year. One in an inclement early January that had already been postponed for a week because of the weather? I was not only fearful; I was more than half expecting a low-scoring refusal to engage snoozefest. This....was anything but that.

Crokes deserve the greater share of the credit for that aspect, but Errigal Ciarán soon showed that they have no fears of playing that kind of game either. They strung a really nice move together and Darragh Canavan – he's put on a fair bit of muscle since I saw him last - kicked over a composed beauty. Was Fionn Fitzgerald fouled in the buildup? I honestly thought it was late contact, but referee Brendan Cawley didn't bother consulting me. A minute late Errigal Ciarán were coming in again, with a lovely threaded ball inside, but Gavin O'Shea read it superbly to clear. Great piece of defending....and it needed to be.

Brian Looney was already doing serious damage with his penetration and positional sense, just always stretching Errigal Ciarán's rearguard, and he losted over from the wing. Did Cian McMahon get a fractional touch as it went in? I don't think so, but I'm not certain. Not that it matters, neither Brian nor Cian were going to care so long as the flag went up, and it did. Tony Brosnan converts a handy free after a careless Errigal Ciarán foul on David Shaw. In my eyes, that was a very bad score for any team to cough up so easily. It gave me hope; maybe Errigal Ciarán defenders weren't used to teams willing to press forward? 0-2 to 0-1. Low enough scoring, but very good football, it's just that the defending was as good as the attacking on both sides.

Brilliant. An absolutely spectacular steal by Tom Doyle – might look simple, but that was absolute craftsmanship. Good quick transfer as well. Micheál Burns and Brian Looney were probably the two best players on the pitch at this stage, and Burns obliged with a great finish. 0-3 to 0-1. Crokes' fearless approach is working.

Errigal Ciarán weren't exactly sitting back either, though. They were obviously happy to have the two Canavans as target-men inside. And once Ruairí Canavan gathered a good, quick ball in (Errigal Ciarán's transitions into attack were seriously impressive) and lost his marker with a great shimmy before calming slotting over, you could see why.

A trademark slalom run by Gavin White, who was deployed on Darragh Canavan for the most part saw Tony Brosnan win another careless enough free. Good work by Tony, who got very little change out of Cormac



Quinn but another one that the Tyrone outfit's management probably felt that they gave away too cheaply. Tony clipped it over and Crokes were two ahead again.

Not for long. Darragh Canavan found his younger brother and Ruairí twists before splitting the posts again. That pair were really starting to ignite.

Good play by Crokes as they worked it down the field and Tony cut along the end-line. He tried a piledriver – I didn't really think it was on myself, but I'd say it would be a small bit daft not to defer to the likes of Tony when it comes to making those judgement calls! Side-netting.

Darragh Canavan with another superb dummy and finish. A brace each now for the brothers. Surely this pace couldn't be maintained, though – this was very hard sprinting on both sides.

Errigal Ciaran pressure beginning to tell. Tiarnan Colhoun and Ciarán McGinley with decent chances, but both tail off wide. They weren't exactly bread and butter opportunities, but at this level, chances like that are going to be at a premium.

Ruairí Canavan again. Crokes had made a change at this stage, but, well, is a nickname like his fathers '...the Great' subject to inheritance tax? Ruairí brilliantly won a free after good work by Ciarán McGinley and calmly slotted it over himself.

Clever play by Gavin O'Shea won a free. Brian Looney took possession, looked over, and spotted Micheal Burns drifting into space....if there was one Crokes player the

opposition should have been watching like a hawk, it was Burns, and no surprise that it was Brian who spotted him, All of Crokes were playing their hearts out, but like the Canavans for Errigal Ciarán, it was clearly that duo plus midfield general Mark O'Shea who were leading the charge. 0-5 apiece.

Darragh Canavan again, happy to just fist it over the bar. The Tyrone outfit edged back in front. At times this is looking like a spectacular double act and, as if to prove the point, Ruairí lofts an absolutely fantastic score over from distance. Two points between them.

I'd be getting worried if it gets to three. It doesn't. Charlie Keating was fouled. The Errigal Ciarán supporters were furious at the decision but I'm a bit confused as to why, visibility was definitely declining at that stage, but there was clear contact. Not dangerous, not malicious, but ye have to actually know that's a free, yeah? I manfully resisted the urge to dispense benevolent wisdom as Micheál Burns sent it between the posts.

Ruairí Canavan fouled at the other end. Definitely no arguments about that one. First yellow card of the day, fair enough. Ruairí put it over himself. 0-8 to 0-6.

Mark O'Shea had been Crokes' main target for kick-outs and in the hard trenches all day. On this occasion he found himself in a bit of space and went for it himself. Great score. As the first half stretched into injury time, Brian Looney once more spotted a gap and sliced through it. Ruairí Canvan – credit to the lad, he isn't hesitating at the hard yards any more than spectacular scores – tackled him very, very late and picked up a yellow himself. Micheál put it over and there was just a point between the sides.

Crokes attacked but couldn't get a shot off and are turned over. Errigal Ciarán countered fast and hard, but were called for overcarrying. That didn't impress their huge support too much either. Again, it's genuinely a very clear call. He took four steps, realised as he was about to release the ball that the defender was closer than he had thought, and took two further steps to his left. Don't get me wrong in any way, there was no aggression, no nastiness. Actually, a nice atmosphere for a game.

Half-time Errigal Ciarán 0-8 Dr. Crokes 0-7

Crokes had the first chance of the second half, a good effort by a sparkling Micheal Burns, but the angle was too tight. It was only a harbinger, though, good work by Cian McMahon teed up David Shaw and he fired over confidently. Level pegging again.

Darragh Canavan. God, once they get their hands on the ball, you are already finished, you just don't realise it yet. Superb score.

Chance for Tony Brosnan after good work by Mark O'Shea, but it fades away. There was definitely a sense of both teams starting to feel their legs now; this is very tough going. Brilliant to watch, not that any of them will or should care.

A defensive lapse as two players went for one ball. It's a mistake, and you can't make mistakes like that with a player like Micheál Burns in the vicinity; he pounced instantly to fire it over.

Ruairí Canavan with a good effort off the post. It's a day for the fine margins. First substitution of the day, as Tom Doyle is called ashore and Kieran O'Leary steps onto the field.

Good run by Micheál Burns and Tony Brosnan finisheses off a good move. Crokes a point in front now and this is the kind of game where that actually feels like a fair-sized margin.

Disaster. Absolute disaster. A goal for Darragh Canavan, and one that will haunt Dr.Crokes. A brilliantly timed run and suddenly he had acres of space after a precision pass from his brother. This is the price you pay for not having a sweeper in there; I kow there's robbing Peter to pay Paul in that regard,but that one hurts. The form he is in, Darragh Canavan was always going to be tucking that one away. 1-19 to 0-10 and twenty minutes left.

Cometh the hour....not for the first time, it's the veteran of many a battle to step up when the need is most, with Brian Looney firing over to trim the gap back to a single point. A goal like that can kill you stone dead. Or it can drive you on. A big part of that is simply the mood in the camp, the trust in each other. It's an intangible thing; despite numerous attempts over various disciplines going back for generations, it's unquantifiable. it's either there or it isn't. And it's here right now. Crokes have it in spades.

Maidhcí Lynch won a free and Tony Brosnan

did what Tony does. Level pegging, 0-12 to 1-9.

A good run by Ben Mc Donnell saw the ball arrive to Ruairí Canavaan; you almost know what he's going to do even before he does it. Errifgal Ciarán in front.

Not for long. A foul on Micheál Burns sees Tony Brosnan level matters. Tony has had a very tough afternoon from a tight-marking Cormac Quinn – fair play to the Tyrone U20 player; that's exactly his job – but the Kerry sharpshooter is showing signs of growing confidence now.

Good play by Peter Harte. Crokes got pressure on him, but he had the presence of mind to find the pass to Pádraig McGirr, who fires oer. Part of me is thinking "oh look, an Errigal Ciarán scorer who isn't a Canavan". But a real part of me is also thinking "that's composure, and you just have to admire it". Good football is good football. You have to admire it; it's not like we see an awful lot of it these days". Errigal Ciarán back in font.

Tired legs now. God, are you kidding me? This is actually exhausting just to watch. Both teams are feeling it.

Tony with another free. All square again.

Five minutes left. A burst of pace from Darragh Canavan and he fists over. 1-12 to 0-14.







Tony Brosnan with a beauty from play.Into the dying minutes now, and all to play for. Literally.

Errigal Ciarán with a good chance. Ruairí Canavan – you'd put the house on him for that one with his display today, but it's a very uncharacteristic wide. They have another chance; they can't take that one either. WE are in injury time now.

Micheál Burns. Just stunning. As good a point as you will see. Crokes in front. Is it enough? The tank is virtually empty on both sides and we are measuring in seconds rather than minutes now, but.....

Peter Óg McCartan. God, Errigal Ciarán are dogged. Absolutely no give in them. That's a good score and yeah, I might not like admitting it, but that's a deserved equaliser. I actually didn't think he was going to take on the shot, let alone put it over. Shows what I know.

Extra-time. It's as much about endurance as ability now.

It opens with a fierce burst by Errigal Ciarán. A nerveless Shane Murphy does really well to deflect a Darragh Canavan rocket over the bar. I don't think Crokes could have come back from a goal at that stage – mind you, both of these teams have been defying all of the odds all day.

Crokes are labouring a bit. Once again it's Brian Looney who lifts the pressure with a fine score; could have been a goal on another day, but Darragh McAnenly did well. Joe Oguz has done well all game. Nothing spectacular, but rock solid, and there's a lot more to be said about that kind of thing than many people realise. I actually thought he was a hair's breadth away from being turned over; in fairness, he worked the chance and fisted a point. That's a big, big score.

Tony Brosnan with a free. I think it was Charlie Keating who won it; it's getting hard to tell with the declining visibility. Bread and butter by his standards. All square again.

Half-time of extra-time. 0-18 to 1-15.

It's attrition now. The sheer fact that these players can still hurl their bodies into action... jaysus, there is people in the crowd panting at the intensity, let alone the players. It's been years – genuinely, years – since I was at a game like this. I'd almost forgotten that just occasionally, played in the right spirit, this game of ours can be glorious. And today it is. Second half of extra-time. Cagey start, but suddenly Errigal Ciarán spark into life. Once again they find space up front and big Joe Oguz finds space. I thought he would take a point, but it's a bullet of a shot and Shane Murphy can't do anything about it. Goal.

There has been a trend of Northern teams outlasting the Kerry sides in the closing minutes of games. The game against Armagh last year, the Austin Stacks game....I'd actually argue that it isn't just Northern teams. Dublin did it to us a lot over the past decade as well. We don't close out too many games strongly; the All Ireland Final against Galway in 2022 was one of the few exceptions. That's just my own observation; I'm not speculating as to why or what to do about it (how would I know? This is a specialist area).

Ruairí Canavan wins and converts a free. Four points in it. Ben McDonnell fists another. Mark Kavanagh with a good score. No point in pretending; it very much feels like game over. Errigal Ciarán are powering towards the finish line.

Except....Crokes just refuse to die. Bloodied, battered, almost out on their feet...but 'almost' is a very big word in that sentence. Dying seconds. Crokes by the corner flag. A high ball across, and Charlie Keating is there to bury it. Just a goal between them now.

They give it everything. There is no possible way that anyone could have given any more. To say that they died the death of champions is a pallid comfort at a time like this. The final whistle sounds with just that goal between the sides and Errigal Ciarán marching into an All Ireland Final. No grudges; they earned it the hard way, and the very best of luck to them. But Dr. Crokes were applauded off the field too, and not just by the Kerry supporters. There are days where it transcends any tribal rivalries or loyalties. Days where magnificence deserves its own tribute and this was sheer raw magnificence.

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FOCUS ON TREES

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With these bare-rooted trees you will still have a few weeks left to plant them. If you plant beofre the end of March, it will give the tree a better chance of rooting into the ground that bit guicker. When planting your bare rooted tree, dig the hole big enough, that you can spread out the roots all around the hole. Then drive your stake into the hole roughly about 6 to 8 inches below the bottom of the hole, place your tree and spread the roots out well. If possible place your stake on the side of the prevailing winds as this will ensure that the tree is blown up against the stake when the wind is high. Fill in the soil mixed with compost around the roots and firm in with the heel of your foot. Lastly, place your tree ties on - one near the top and one at the bottom with a spacer in between to stop the bark being damaged by the stake.



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
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THE TRUMPY AND **MUSKY DUO**

"On the day when I called You answered me. You emboldened me and strengthened my soul... Though I am in the midst of trouble, You revive and protect me." (Psalm 138:3,7).

Welcome back dear student, the hymn "What a Friend we have in Jesus" asks, 'have we trials and temptations? Is there trouble anywhere? Jesus knows our every weakness take it to the Lord in prayer'. God promises He is . . . 'a very present Help in trouble' urging us to 'be still and know that I Am God' (Psalm 46). Being 'still' in a crisis is not easy. The flesh may respond in anxiety, racing thoughts, and tremors. Remaining stable, tranquil, and composed is both imparted and learned (Jeremiah 6:16). The study of God's Word delivers from fear through the Power of His Spirit in the Word (John 6:63; Hebrews 4:12). Unfortunately, if people don't know it, they don't avail of the Lord's help, often ending up in worse trouble trying to find solutions everywhere else. All this world has to offer is superficial, and feel-good effects always wear off, for it is false peace (Jeremiah 6:13). King David's relationship with God gives us Hope. David constantly writes of the times the Lord delivered him from every kind of trouble (1 Samuel 17:34-37; Psalm 34:4-8). Once, when David and his army were away from home, enemy raiders came and burned their town to the ground, abducting their wives, children, livestock, and possessions. 
