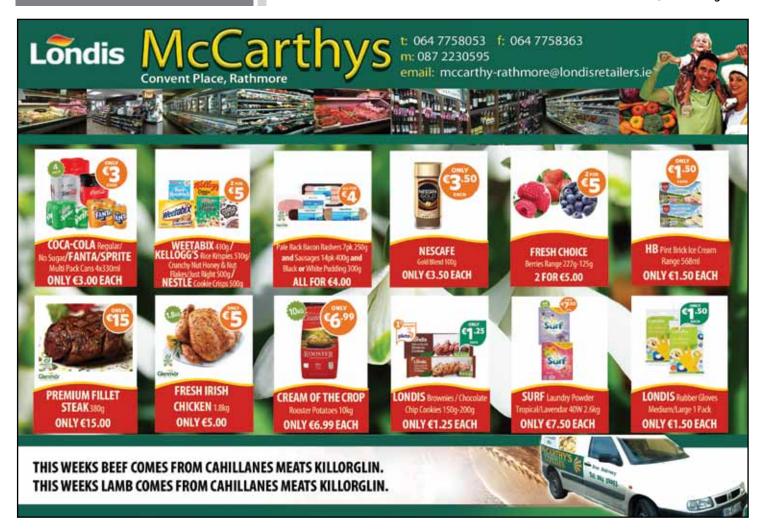




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EDITOR'S NOTE

Shannan Howe moved to Canada in February and while the country is in lockdown, she decided to paint to pass away the time.

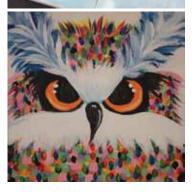

HOTELIERS CALL FOR URGENT SUPPORTS TO SAVE KERRY TOURISM AND ITS 15,700 JOBS

Hotel and guesthouse owners in Kerry and across the country are calling on Paschal Donohue TD, Minister for Finance, and the Government to introduce a series of urgent measures that are required to mitigate the impact of Covid-19 on the economy, including the tourism and hospitality industry. Over the past few weeks, the industry has been decimated with over 85% of hotels closed nationally and the majority of the 260,000 employees laid off or on short-time. Bernadette Randles, Chair of the Kerry branch of the Irish Hotels Federation stated

branch of the Irish Hotels Federation stated that hoteliers appreciated that the country is experiencing the greatest health crisis in living

memory and that significant resources are being committed to address the overriding issue of public health. However, she warned: "every day's delay in implementing the measures, results in greater risks to our tourism and hospitality industry.

Ms Randles noted the willingness of hotels to play their part in providing assistance to essential services where required by the HSE and other Government departments. She said that mitigating the impact of Covid-19 must go hand in hand with ensuring that Irish people have a viable economy to return to in the coming months. "The health and

wellbeing of all citizens is intertwined with the economy, and people will need livelihoods after the crisis is over. Tourism supports 11% of total employment nationally. It is important to note that 70% of these jobs are outside of Dublin which highlights its vital role in spreading employment opportunities and prosperity across the entire country. Here in Kerry tourism supported 15,700 jobs and generated €592m in local revenues before this crisis," she said.

Kerry hoteliers are calling for a range of measures including:

- 1. Local Authority rates and water charges: to be waived for a minimum period of 12 months.
- 2. Cash flow & finance: measures to assist with cash flow for businesses facing short term problems, including interest free loans and a minimum 12-month deferment on Senior debt (both Capital and Interest).
- 3. Taxation: tourism VAT rates to be reduced to zero for a minimum of 12 months and until the industry has recovered, then restored to 9% on a permanent basis. Employer's PRSI to be reduced to 0.5% for a minimum of 12 months and until the industry has recovered.
- 4. Government grants: business interruption grants to help businesses survive and reopen.
- 5. Seasonal employees: Supports for seasonal workers in tourism who do not currently qualify for Covid-19 related payments.

BOATING & FISHING RESTRICTIONS

AT KILLARNEY NATIONAL PARK

Gaeltacht has continued to keep National Parks and Nature Reserves accessible as a physical and mental health space where local pedestrians can exercise, get some fresh air, experience and connect with nature whilst adhering to physical distancing protocols within 2km of their homes.

While there has been compliance by all of the commercial boat operators, the rowing clubs and the resident angling clubs in relation to the current restrictions, and they are to be commended for their assistance in restricting their

movements at this particular time when most needed.

However, there have been a number of

incidents over the last week where both An Garda Síochaná and National Parks and Wildlife Service staff have had to devote valuable time and resources to dealing with a small number of individuals who have failed to adhere to the current restrictions

As a result of these isolated incidents, the Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, as owners of the Lakes of Killarney, would like to make it very clear that all access to the Lakes of Killarney, be it for boating, kayaking or fishing, is currently restricted. While acknowledging that fishing and boating are valuable pastimes, they are not an essential journey and do not fall under the category of brief physical exercise. Any further breaches will continue to be referred to An Garda Síochaná.

Please play your part in halting the spread of Covid-19 and stay at home.

CHARITY CYCLE CANCELLED DUE TO COVID-19

The annual Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle is the latest event to be cancelled due to COVID-19.

In a statement from the chairperson of the charity, Bridget McGuire said that after much deliberation by the Committee and due to the uncertainties surrounding Covid-19, it has been decided that for the first time in its 37 years, The Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle 2020 is cancelled.

"This decision was not taken lightly, and our chosen charities were at the fore of our decisions, along with the health and safety of all participants and volunteers", she said.

However, she added that The Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle 2021 will go ahead on Saturday 3rd of July 2021.

"It is a difficult time for many of the chosen charities and indeed most charities across Ireland which is why we remain committed to our charity partners. All the chosen charities have been informed of this year's cancellation and will remain the chosen charities for the 2021 event.

The Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle will be emailing all registered participants and providing them with a choice of what to do with their current registration. Recognising the difficult circumstances that cyclists, charities and our volunteers find themselves in at this challenging time, all registrants will be offered 3 choices:

- 1. Defer your registration to the cycle on Saturday 3rd July 2021.
- 2. Donate your 2020 registration monies to your chosen charity.
- 3. Refund of your €100 registration fee and associated merchandise / donation.

All registrants must submit their preference through www.ringofkerrycycle.ie on or before Sunday 31st May 2020 and their preference will be processed before the end of July 2020. Should they choose not to respond, their registration and associated merchandise and donation (if any) will be automatically carried over to the 2021 event.

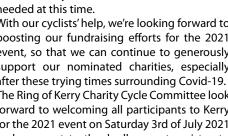

In more recent years, over €1 million has been raised per annum, and having to defer this year's cycle has deeply saddened us considering these funds are very much needed at this time.

With our cyclists' help, we're looking forward to boosting our fundraising efforts for the 2021 event, so that we can continue to generously support our nominated charities, especially after these trying times surrounding Covid-19. The Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle Committee look forward to welcoming all participants to Kerry for the 2021 event on Saturday 3rd of July 2021 and we want to thank all current registrants, volunteers and charities for their ongoing support. We will be issuing further notifications in due course as to when registrations will open for 2021.

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Support for impacted businesses welcomed

A major expansion of supports for business impacted by COVID-19 has been welcomed by the Kerry County Council Local Enterprise

The measures will include an expansion of the Trading Online Voucher Scheme and a reduction in the interest rate for Microfinance Ireland loans.

Among the provisions is the expansion of the €2,500 Trading Online Voucher Scheme through Local Enterprise Offices, for businesses employing up to 10 people. An additional €3.3m is being provided to the scheme bringing the total available nationally to €5.6m. Local businesses in Kerry that previously benefitted from the Trading Online Voucher Scheme can apply for a second voucher of up to €2,500, with co-funding of 10%.The voucher can be used to help add payment or booking systems to websites, along with subscriptions to low-cost online retailing platform solutions.

A substantial reduction in interest rates on Microfinance Ireland loans was also announced, bringing the rate down to 4.5%, where applications are made through Local Enterprise Office Kerry. COVID-19 Business Loans of up to €50,000 are available from Microfinance Ireland with no repayments and no interest charged in the first six months, for eligible businesses that

employ less than 10 people.

Head of the Kerry Local Enterprise Office, Tomás Hayes said: 'The measures will help to meet the varying needs of Irish enterprise and they are very specifically targeted by size, sector and need. The impact of COVID-19 presents unprecedented difficulties for businesses. Kerry Local Enterprise is available to advise and support local businesses during the months ahead.

'For many local businesses, the options for trading are very limited as a result of COVID-19. However, there are a lot of opportunities in online selling and by accessing this Trading Online Voucher scheme, small businesses can develop a sustainable strategy for increasing sales,' he said.

'If your business needs access to finance, applying for microfinance loans through Local Enterprise Office Kerry will secure the lowest available rate and you will get valuable assistance in the application process and free one-to-one mentoring along the way,' said Tomás.

Meanwhile, Local Enterprise Offices have also moved the majority of training programmes, workshops and networking online, making them as accessible as possible for those working remotely. These relate to supporting online

WEBINAR FOR KERRY RETAIL SECTOR ON NEW FUNDING FOR DIGITAL CAPACITY ENHANCEMENTS ENTERPRISE IRELAND ANNOUNCES CALL FOR FUNDING FOR THE RETAIL SECTOR

Kerry County Council's Local Enterprise Office is encouraging the retail sector in Kerry to participate in an Enterprise Ireland webinar on Friday which will help support retail companies to enhance their digital capability.

Enterprise Ireland has announced a call for funding for the retail sector

to support retail companies to enhance their digital capability.

The Department of Business, Enterprise and Innovation has proposed this scheme in response to the Covid-19 crisis. This is a competitive fund which will be administered by Enterprise Ireland with a total fund size of €2million.

Applicants must be an Irish-owned retail enterprise that had 10 or more employees on or before 29 February 2020, have a retail outlet and have an existing online presence. The Covid-19 Online Retail Scheme is complimentary to the Online Trading Voucher provided by Local Enterprise Offices for companies with less than 10 employees.

The maximum grant available is \leq 40,000. Successful applicants will be awarded funding to support a maximum of 80% of the project costs. The minimum grant amount payable is \leq 10,000.

Costs which successful companies will be eligible to claim for include salary costs and consultancy fees to develop a digital strategy, enhance the company's website or to provide training.

The final date for companies to submit an application is 3.00 pm on Wednesday 20th May 2020. Full

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Killarney shines a light

Killarney lights the way with 3,000 bulb display

In a remarkable display of community solidarity, the Kerry tourist town of Killarney responded to the national Shine Your Light campaign in spectacular fashion by lighting 3,000 sparkling bulbs on a giant 110ft tree at 9 o'clock on Saturday night.

Healthcare frontline staff, including a local doctor, Gardaí, Order of Malta and Civil Defence volunteers and firefighters, joined senior local authority officials and political and business leaders in a moving show of cross-community cooperation and, in doing so, they sent out a message of encouragement and goodwill to everybody.

The giant 100-year-old Californian Redwood tree, which is adjacent to a Famine era graveyard, is located on the grounds of the landmark St Mary's Cathedral.

It was previously lit at Christmas in a joint initiative between the Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and the priests of the parish.

A number of public buildings in Kerry were illuminated in response to the national Shine Your Light request to honour all the sick, those who have lost their lives, frontline staff and healthcare workers during the Covid-19 pandemic. Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Michael Gleeson, remarked: "Easter is the season of light and hope. Never in recent years have those virtues been as important as now."

"In our own restricted daily lives, and in our communications with others, we need to be a messenger personifying a better tomorrow.

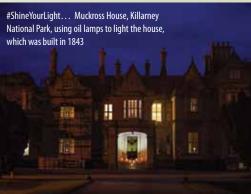
"When we shine our lights we tell our friends and neighbours that, together, we will overcome the present challenge and that there are brighter and better days ahead," the mayor said.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President, Paul Sherry, said lighting the landmark tree was a demonstration of the great spirit of togetherness that exists in the town and it sends out a message that even in very dark days, people can take hope that the light is never far away.

"Life won't get back to normal straight away but, when it does, we will be ready. Killarney will recover from the Covid-19 disaster but it will take time. In the meantime, we must stick together secure in the knowledge that the good days will return" said Mr Sherry.

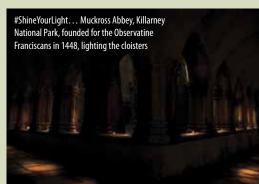

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EXAMS POSTPONED AND CANCELLED -

BUT WAS IT THE RIGHT DECISION?

A week after The Leaving Cert exams were postponed until late July or August and the Junior Cert will be replaced by school-based exams early in the next school year, Killarney Outlook followed up with Karis Koschan 6th Year student at Saint Brigid's Secondary School for her views on the news.

I'd be lying if I said I wasn't hesitant to write this follow up piece on my thoughts and feelings as a Leaving Certificate student during this pandemic. Minister McHugh's announcement of the postponement of State Examinations to now begin in the last week of July or early August has caused a battle of opinions between people of all ages. I would like to firstly remind you that I am not speaking on behalf of the 61,000 Leaving Certificate students who were also meant to sit their final exams in June, I can only voice my own opinion on this predicament. However, it has been challenging for Leaving Certs to express any sort of stress or anxiety around the changes to our State Exams without receiving backlash online from those who aren't due to sit their exams. I am well aware that there are more serious issues following Covid-19, there is not one student that would put the Leaving Certificate above our country's health but regardless of this, are we not entitled to be upset and frustrated with the outcome? I have seen comments

online telling Leaving Certs to "Stop complaining, people are dying", "sure you have more time to study now" and "you are at an advantage to other years" nothing about this pandemic has put any of us at an advantage and some certainly are suffering more than others, therefore comments such as "At least all Leaving Certs are in the same boat" are false and far from the reality. Even if my Wi-Fi is temperamental, I am lucky to have access to a good laptop and a quiet study space, however we must think of those who aren't as fortunate. What about the students in crowded conditions working from mobile phones with parents who are still required to work so they must look after their younger siblings? What about those students without access to Wi-Fi or those in need of extra learning support that can no longer receive it? Do they not deserve the same chance as the rest of us? School was where everyone had equal opportunities to succeed, everyone was given the same chances to follow whatever path they wanted to take in life. Covid-19 has taken that path away from some of us and the decision to continue with the State exams while students try to cope with not only the stress of the Leaving Cert but the emotional burden of friends and family members lost as a result of this virus is outrageous. This also has a knock-on effect on colleges, as first year students will now start courses in October due to the delay

of exams. Students will no longer be able to work as many hours as planned or even work at all with the weight of the Leaving Certificate still hanging over them all summer. How can we be expected to give our full attention to a piece of paper in a hall that is full of Covid-19 regulations and friends we haven't seen in months. This is

extremely difficult for Leaving Certificates all over Ireland and despite only 19% of students in the ISSU survey supporting the decision for exams to be deferred to late July early August our opinions were completely dismissed. The Department of Education and Skills would rather ensure we have the "traditional" Leaving Certificate than predicated results, however, It is fair to say that there is nothing traditional about the circumstances that the Leaving Certs of 2020 are facing, so no, we are not just being "dramatic".

Little did L think on March 12th when Leo Varadkar announced the closure of all schools that it would

last till May 5th at the earliest, and quite probably, much, much longer than that into the future. I find it hard to see the resumption of normal classroom teaching at all in the current school year with the ban on mass gatherings and the social distancing measures that are becoming part of the norm now. As I mentioned in my piece a few weeks ago, teachers are desperately trying to be all things to all students in the current climate - teachers, councillors, motivators, technical experts.....the list is endless. Obviously, our students wellbeing and education is our priority and so everything we do is driven by that goal.

However, with the cancellation of the Junior Cert exams and the postponement of the Leaving Cert exams till late July/ August, I don't think due consideration was given to the wellbeing of our Exam students by the Department of Education. I'm sure we can all think back to our own Leaving Cert and the huge levels of stress and anxiety that we all felt in the lead up to these hugely important exams that were going to 'dictate our life's course and career path'. Would you get all the course revised, would you revise the right sections, would you know which questions to choose, which question did the teacher think was going to come up this year? All these questions filled all our minds and consumed us at some stage in the weeks leading up to that 'Exam' your whole world revolved around. And these were in 'normal' times where students were carefully directed by teachers, had a routine school day that could be banked upon and who more importantly had the support of their peers who they could rely on to dispel most fears and offer motivational quotes of comfort to say that they were all felling the same. Unfortunately our Leaving Cert students of 2020 have been robbed of these certainties and necessities as they try to prepare for this all important exam and rite of passage for all teenagers entering adulthood. Since March 12th not only have they had to try and learn remotely, being bombarded with every app, revision course, online resource, and countless emails and directions from each of their 7 teachers, they've also had to do it alone and without the support of their friends. They've had to take self-motivated learning to an all new level as now no teacher was looking over their shoulder or they couldn't see for themselves if or how other students were working or engaging with these many new learning platforms. But the re-assurance of getting back to school, to normality at the end of the Easter holidays was the one focal point holding everything together. However, now not only is it unlikely that these students will sit in a classroom together with their classmates again, but they must maintain a focus and drive not up to June 3rd but for the entire summer up to July 29th.

Judging from the students I've heard from, this is the worst possible news as many fear being able to maintain focus and direction for this neverending timeframe and I genuinely fear for the many students who are living in cramped conditions with many family members all vying for the laptop! Where trying to find peace and quiet to study is a tall order and where stress, and anxiety have room to consume the mind as there is no one or no teacher or peer to dispel those fears that can creep up on anyone under huge levels of pressure. I would have much preferred for the exams to go ahead as normal on June 3rd, if at all possible and let the students complete it and be done with it. Otherwise I would have been in favour of a predictive grading system as I feel it's not fair to impose such levels of stress unduly on these young adults who're already stressed enough about Covid 19 and the health and wellbeing of their loved ones. Postponing it is only kicing the can down the road, delaying the inevitable and in doing so heaping lorry loads of stress on the poor students involved. Teachers are more than willing to stay engaged with their students for however long but not meeting them till 2 weeks before is just too late. We really would need to meet them before that to finish off whatever needs finishing and then allowing them the time to process and prepare in their own time, without the clock ticking over their shoulders. These young adults and their mental wellbeing deserve more of us and I feel they have been let down by the decision taken by the powers that be. As for the Junior Certs, they are in complete limbo! State Exams are cancelled but they will still have to sit exams in September set and corrected by the school and as far as I'm aware these won't be certified! I dread trying to keep these students motivated over the coming weeks!

All I can advise students is to hang in there. Keep doing your best to study - 'steady wins the race'. The exams are not the 'be all and end all'. Do your best. The exams will come and go and all will work out. There's a path and a road for everyone and Covid 19 won't dictate that for you! Always stay focused on the positive - your health, your family and a bright future that lies ahead when Covid 19 is just a distant memory.







Joe McHugh, Minister for Education announces the postponement of the Leaving Cert and the cancellation of the Junior Cert



It was somewhat symbolic that on Good Friday, long suffering State exam candidates were provided with as much certainty about the exams as these unprecedented times allow. The decisions taken by Education Minister Joe McHugh were based on advice from the National Public Health Emergency Team. Schools are to remain closed until further notice. As the restrictive measures have been extended to Tuesday, 5th May, schools will not reopen before that date.

The most significant announcement by Minister McHugh was the postponement of the Leaving Cert exam from June until late July or early August. Details of the new Leaving Cert timetable will be released by the State Examinations Commission (SEC) in June when the status of the coronavirus pandemic is clearer. Final arrangements, scheduling and related safety measures will be shaped by public health advice.

So about 60,000 Leaving Cert candidates have had their exam postponed by about seven weeks from 3rd June. No firm dates were provided in the current circumstances and candidates will still be mainly housebound. Students - those from disadvantaged backgrounds, in particular - will need a lot of support in view of the stress and anxiety being suffered by this year's candidates. Likewise, third level and further education colleges must be very generous in their allocation of college places.

At Leaving Cert level the practical exams timetabled for May have been postponed and will be rescheduled for late July or early August. The deadline for submitting Leaving Cert practical and project work has been deferred to an undecided date later in the summer.

The postponement of the Leaving Cert will give candidates more time to prepare for the exam and provides them with a degree of certainty about the future. It does mean however that Leaving Cert candidates are faced with an inordinately long and stressful academic year stretching into mid-August or possibly beyond. As was widely anticipated, the traditional Junior Certificate exam has been cancelled and will be replaced by school-based assessments and in-house school exams in the next academic year. Discussions about the logistics of holding a school based Junior Cert exam will be teased out by the Department of Education, The SEC, School Management Associations and the Teacher Unions. All parties are cognisant of the unusual circumstances and will bring a lot of goodwill and flexibility to the discussions.

The Minister is very keen for Leaving Cert candidates to have some class contact with their teachers before the exams begin. If the country has been restored to some kind of normality, candidates may get the benefit of a few weeks in school in May. It's also likely that teachers will be requested to be available for class teaching during the first fortnight in July. The Leaving Cert timetable for June is now null and void. The new changes may also affect the Central Applications Office (CAO) timeline. Already the third level colleges have indicated that they will be flexible and will work with the new Leaving Cert schedule. It remains to be seen if the CAO will alter the application dates, particular the online change of mind facility, which is due to close on 1st July. The published dates for the various rounds of college offers may have to be revised to tie in with the rescheduled Leaving Cert timetable. First year college entrants will have a much later start in the next academic year. That is the least of their concerns in the context of the disruption caused to their studies by the Covid-19 virus.

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How Covid-19 is affecting the population of Ireland

The National Public Health Emergency Team's modelling data has revealed that Ireland's effort to date has greatly reduced the transmission of the virus:

- · the growth rate has reduced from 33% daily in the early weeks of this outbreak, to 9% this week
- · the number of people, on average, that someone with COVID 19 is likely to infect was high at the beginning of the outbreak at 4.5. We now see this 'R' (reproduction) number reduced very significantly.

Dr. Cillian De Gascun, Chair of NPHET's Expert Advisory Group said: "Having come through a challenging few weeks, we have significantly strengthened testing capacity and will continue to do so over the coming week, to put us in a very strong position to identify and suppress the virus. "They released the following statistics on Tuesday April 14th.

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KILLARNEY OUTLOOK - Keeping everyone fit at home

Emir Coffey who owns and runs Muckross Pilates & Barre classes is this week passing her skills to enable everyone, inlcuding the elderly, to keep fit.

"One of my most popular classes is my chair based Pilates class where we do our exercises seated on the chair or standing using it for support. While the exercises are good for everyone, especially those working at desks, my main focus is for the over 70s who really need to keep moving and I would like to get word out to them that the videos are there.

With the current lockdown it is important for everyone's physical and mental wellbeing that they are exercising. For those of you that are 'cocooned' at home you are probably missing your daily routines. Below I have set out 4 exercises that you can do from the comfort of your chair. For all 4 exercises, sit up nice and tall towards the front of your seat. Start off with a few breaths, breathing in through the nose and out through the mouth. Engage your core muscles by gently pulling your belly button in and up.



1) Warm up with knee raises. Hold your hands out in front of you at a height that is comfortable. As if you were marching, lift one knee up to touch your hand, lower it back down. Then lift the other knee up and lower it down. Keep alternating one leg to the other. Do as many repetitions as is comfortable for you, start small and build them up over time, aiming for 1 minute.



2) An important group of muscles to keep strong are those in the thighs and we are able to work them from a seated position. Using two paper plates, if you don't have them you can use two dish cloths. Place a plate/cloth under each foot. (The plates/cloths will need to be able to slide on the floor). Sit tall. hands on your hips and slide one foot forward and the other foot back. Once you get comfortable with this movement you can add in the arms. So as the leg comes forward, you bring the same arm forward. Keep it up, sliding the legs forward and back. The movement resembles power walking. After a bit you should feel a nice burn in the front of your thighs. Again start small and build up the length of time you can keep up the movement.



3) We also need to keep our arms strong. If you don't have hand weights you can use a 500ml bottle of water or a tin of beans as an alternative. To do a bicep curl start by sitting tall, shouders relaxed with a weight in each hand. Keeping the elbows by your side, forearms extending straight out with the palms facing up. Bring the weights all the way up to your shoulders by bending the elbows. Return the arms back to the starting position. Repeat.



4) The seated hamstring stretch where you are stretching out the muscles on the back of the thigh. Sitting tall towards the front of the seat, straighten one leg out in front and point the toes towards you. Keeping your back straight, hinge forward until you feel a pull on the back of the outstretched leg. The lower you lean forward the tougher the stretch, so if you want to make it easier just sit up taller. Hold the stretch for 30 to 40 seconds. Repeat on the other leg.

Edele Daly from B-WELL FITNESS gives us some exercises that we can do at home. It is important to warm up first - so follow Edele's advice and use this time to increase your fitness levels.

Warmup:



Squats

Knee to elbow twist Jog on spot Jog and punch Heal kickbacks

Follow these resistance exercises with cardio fillers in between to help increase fitness levels

Squat & 3x pulses 12 reps



Push up to shoulder tap

Cardio jog on spot 30secs Lunge to side leg lift 12 reps each side

Cardio squat jacks 30secs Push up to shoulder tap 12 reps Cardio jump side to side with arms over head 30secs

Pulsing tricep press back 30reps Cardio bridge kicks 30secs



Lunge to side leg lift

Repeat 3-4 sets & stretch

An Unforgettable Trip: Iran v Republic of Ireland 2001:

As a lifelong soccer supporter I have followed the Boys in Green all over the world since my first away game in Euro 88 on the famous day we beat England 1-0.

There have been some memorable trips and on many Kerry and Killarney are well represented, including one to Estoina that some of your reader will remember but the stories are not for publication!!

There is no doubt that Iran in November 2001 was the most memorable for many reasons. We had won 2-0 in the first leg in Lansdowne Road (Ian Harte and Robbie Keane) and with around 300 Irish fans made the trip east full of confidence.

It was a dry trip -well the hotels were dry on the first night but like Irish fans everywhere we did manage to source beer on the second night. But it could only be drank in our hotel rooms and not in the lobbies!!

The days leading up to the game were great with a wonderful buzz in Tehran but that all changed on the day of the game. They became fanatical and were in the Azadi Stadium well before we were bussed in and that was two hours before kick-off.

hours before kick-off.
While Ireland lost that game to a late late goal we had done enough to qualify for the 2002 World Cup finals. Let's just say the home supporters were not happy and the road to the airport was covered in broken glass.

We all know what happened in Japan and South Korea but that trip to Iran for the play-off second leg is one that will never be forgotten.

Worst memories: As an aside the worst memories of my time following my country were the game v England in the old Lansdowne Road that was marred by the riots and the away game in Bursa in Turkey in 1999.

Local victories are often the best:

Being involved in soccer at an administrative level has meant I have witnessed some great Kerry soccer moments. From Killarney Celtic's



winning the Munster Youths Cup and the seniors taking the inaugural Champions Trophy back to Tralee Dynamos winning the FAI Youths Cup in the 97-98season. And while it hurt for us Celtic people the joy for Killarney Athletic when winning the KDL Denny Premier trophy at the end of the 2016/2017season made it a memorable day – for them.

However two local memories are make it onto my top 5 list. The winning by the Kerry Schoolboys team of the prestigious Kennedy Cup in 2015 is a day that all those present and involved in any way with the League will ever forget. The winning penalty in the semi-final was scored by an injured David Dineen while the only goal of the final defeat of the mighty DDSL (Dublin) was scored by Dylan Murphy.

The other moment is much more recent and it was the winning penalty in last season's FAI Senior Cup final scored for Shamrock Rovers by Tralee native Gary O'Neill. To have seen Gary progress from a schoolboy player to doing this in the Aviva Stadium was a very proud moment.

Gleneagle denied at the death in one of Kerry greatest basketball games:

When one looks back on sporting memories – something we are all doing more of at the moment – it is not always the victories that come to mind. For year Killarney and more recently Tralee have in their various guises

being topping the Irish basketball scene.

Of course it was in Killarney that the late and much missed Paudie O'Connor first introduced American players to the game in 1979. This was something that began a period that led to some of the halcyon days of basketball in the country. However it was the loss to Doncaster in the St Brendan's Gym that is remembered achingly by all basketball fans. The attendances of around 800 plus were normal those years with the team under the Gleneagle banner dominating Irish basketball.

And after winning the double the gym was packed for the Federation Cup game that looked like being another amazing night for the club. However a harsh call on the buzzer – to put it mildly – gave the visitors two free throws to snatch the win.

The starting 5 that night courtesy of Basketball Ireland records were Paudie O'Connor, Tim Regan, Tony Andre, Arnold Veasley and Andy Houlihan.

Armstrong rides into Killarney but is eclipsed by Mark Cavendish:

The 2009 Tour of Ireland had some of the

biggest names in the sport in the peloton and Stage 2 saw the riders start in Clonmel and finish on the Port Road in Killarney. This was one of my first big jobs for Radio Kerry Sport and it was certainly and eventful stage.

The stage saw a breakaway by Dennis Van Winden of Rabobank and Mark Cassidy of the An Post Sean Kelly team and these two were over 14 minutes ahead. The Danish rider pulled clear and I had the privilege of following Cassidy down the decent of Musheramore (Ballydaly to Rathmore) at close quarters in the Press Car. His hit speeds of over 75 km an hour in one of the most amazing sporting feats I have ever seen.

with 20km to go and in a bunch finish in from of the Old Mon Mark Cavendish took the stage victory from Micheal Van Staeyen (Belgium) and Austrian Saxo Bank rider Stuart O'Grady.

Lance Armstrong who was the huge draw tried to push the pace with his Astana team early in the stage but the weather conditions meant they didn't make the break and he ended in the bunch in 47th and went straight to his team's big RV and gave no media interviews.

Duggan deadly on the Gap:

In doing this look back I stuck to moments I have witnessed live and rallying is another hugely popular sport that I have the privilege of covering. Kerry is blessed with top class drivers, navigators and stages and has from the Circuit of Ireland to the present day Rally of the Lakes and Killarney Historic Rally continues to be the area where everyone wants to compete.

From a huge group of talented competitors I want to pick out Rob Duggan who for the last few years has been uncatchable over the Gap of Dunloe stage. This is one of the most iconic in the world and Duggan flies up here faster than anyone thrilling rally fans from far and wide.

Monitoring employees

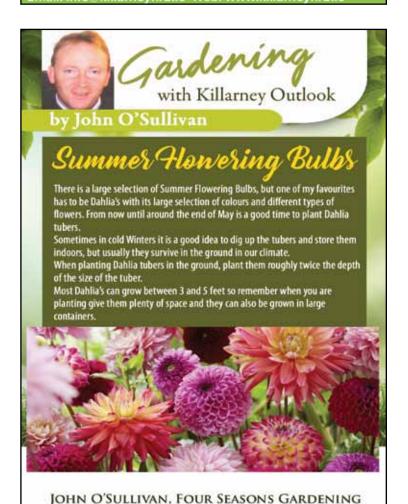
A Clear thought out policy should be developed containing all and more of the above.

Real Heroes of Today

Everyone is acknowledging the real heroes on the front-line right now in a world where perspective has robbed celebrity of its sheen. The doctors, nurses, and all the healthcare workers who are labouring tirelessly (at great risk, far greater than most of us, as the figures unfortunately prove) deserve every bit of praise that they get. More importantly, I hope that the respect and gratitude that they have hard-earned remains long after life returns to the abnormal 'normality' where people look up at vacuous celebrities and down on far too many hard-working people whose efforts go unappreciated. That would count for even more than the 'Shine a light' campaign, which while unquestionably lovely, made the country feel proud of solidarity. That was a great thing and the response is a wonderful and timely reminder that we can be proud of ourselves as well as them - but it does need to be stressed that you can actually do something far more positive and important for front-line staff right now – stay away from them and everybody else. Real solidarity is isolation right now

It's worth pointing out that a lot of 'celebrity' culture isn't any kind of real reflection of the actual people concerned. There is a huge selection of both commercial and social media that manufactures fame, deliberately imposing a false importance on people. 'Clickbait' is not journalism and never will be, but it's cheap, easy, and sensationalist. In short, it works. Successful actors, singers, tv hosts, fashion designers and models, and of course sports people are built up as paragons of virtue....and then ruthlessly exposed and humiliated for having the same feet of clay as I and every other human being on this planet. It's worth noting how fame places a huge and intolerable burden on perfectly normal people and leads far too often to unhappy lives for these people. I particularly loathe 'reality tv', which doesn't reflect reality in the slightest. Famous people are expected to always be beautiful, always be strong, always be a paragon of virtue. Everybody I know can occasionally say something silly or inappropriate (I myself could give lessons in that art!), can slip on a metaphorical banana, can get things wrong.

Granted, there are some fairly desperate and sad attempts by celebrities to stay relevant at this time. Celebrities putting up selfies of themselves in isolation without.... pause....any make-up on! Oh, the horror, the shock! Celebrities doing work-outs – on their own! The likes of Ellen Degeneres has commented on the difficulties of social isolation – in her vast, sprawling mansion. It's a little bit tougher where I live, ma'am, but I have a strong support network and I'm not whinging, because I know how lucky I am. Try it some time.

Actually, some celebrities are stepping up to the plate, and a lot of them might surprise you. Celebrities who have given donations to charities and to support people whose livelihoods are in jeopardy include U2 (€10m for PPE in Ireland), George and Amal Clooney (\$1m), Angelie Jolie (\$1m to No Kid Hungry), Rihanna (\$5m), Ryan Reynolds and Blake Lively (\$1m), Pink (\$1m), Bruno Mars (\$1m)....two big standouts are the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation (\$105m - the private donatiosn were only revealed after a journalist's specific request) and Taylor Swift (amount unknown, but a huge number of out-of-work Americans have posted thanks for \$3000 payments by the singer) and Ariana Grande (who has made individual payments to staff laid off and donations to several charities).

Look, it's a bit easier to be generous when you are rich – Jesus called it right in regard to the widow's mite - but these donations are as much about the heart as the wallet, and these people are stepping up the the plate. I'll be remembering in future that these are real people with real feelings as well as mere 'celebrities' – it won't mean anything from their perspective, but it has enhanced mine. Sports stars like Roger Federer (€1m in Swiss francs) is one of many sports heroes who has stepped up recently in response to events admirably. The communal influence and support network of the GAA in particular has been astonishing, but these are a few headliners that you may have missed and are worth taking note of at this time.

Sports Heroes

Conor McGregor. Let's be honest here, every time that I see the name Conor McGregor's name in the headlines, I think "Oh jaysus, exactly how has he shamed us this time?" The rags-to-riches Dubliner got well-used and abused long ago. So no, I've never been a fan or admirer of McGregor. And I am genuinely and rapidly re-thinking that. McGregor recently announced that eight houses he has paid for (as a private investor) are now ready for homeless families to move

into. He has donated €1m for PPE for frontline staff in Dublin hospitals. He has used social media platforms to encourage his fans to follow social distancing guidelines and called for airports to be at least monitored with restrictions if not closed down. He has recently donated €10,000 to Spa teenager lan O'Connell (himself a beacon and light and hope in his community) for the ICU in Kerry General. Yes, one of the celebrities I least admired or respected has stepped up to the plate big time. My kudos and apologies to the man.

Jordan Henderson. I was always impressed by his attitude, his eagerness to learn, his respect for both fans and peers. But I also thought him very, very limited in skill or ability to read a game. Frankly, when I saw him first play for Liverpool in 2011, I thought that this was very much a poor man's version of Man United's Bryan Robson – who I have always thought had more passion and workrate than actual ability to influence a game, anyway. When the talk went out even then about him being a potential captain, I though "Sure, he can be captain. Of a mid-table team whose aspirations outweigh their ability". I was wrong (don't feel bad for me; I'm well used to it). Henderson has grown as a player and become an understated but vital cog in a very impressively synchronised Liverpool team. Henderson doesn't do the heroics and will rarely make you gasp in amazement but he gets the job done.

He has done a lot more than his job when it comes to the fight against Covid19. Henderson has spearheaded a campaign that involves a huge number of Premiership players from a myriad of clubs donating 30% of their salaries directly to the NHS. Players Together includes Henderson (who set it up) Harry Kane, Harry Maguire, Fernandonho, Virgil Van Dyke, Marcus Rashford, David Luiz, Granit Xhaka, Hector Bellerin, Alex Lacazetta, Treveguet, Jay Rodriguez, Conor Wickham, Fabian Delph, Kasper Schmeichel, Jamie Vardy, James Milner, David Silva, Kevin de Bruyne, Leroy Sane, Tim Krul....

One of names mentioned is John Egan, Corkborn son of a Kerry hero and as class an act as his father. Egan is one of those singled out by new Ireland manager Stephen Kenny as one who has been overlooked a bit in the past. I completely agree, and not because of his Kerry connections. Egan is real quality and silky smooth in control of the ball.

James McClean His political beliefs are

none of my business or interest. McClean has attracted negative headlines in Britain for his refusal to wear a poppy. Nor will I. Ever. When there is a meaningful gesture of remembrance for all the victims of that awful war, I will support it. By the way, I'll never wear an Easter Lily either. But McClean posting a picture on twitter of him home-schooling his children while wearing a balaclava was not a political statement of any kind. It was an utter disgrace and an insult to the families of all the lives lost in 'paramilitary' i.e. terrorist campaigns in Northern Ireland on all sides. Thankfully, other people on all sides, including proud nationalists, have been quick to call out that nonsense for what it was. McClean let himself and everything he represents down very badly there.

But again, one appallingly stupid gesture is not the full measure of the man. James McClean, along with team-mate Joe Allen, have kept the Donna Luoise Children's Hospice in Stoke going with charitable donations. The Hospice gets less than 9%

of necessary funding from the Government and, with donations falling off dramatically as a result of coronavirus, was rapidly running out of the funds needed for sick children – until the intervention of McClean and Allen. McClean, by the way, has a long history of quietly making charitable donations as anonymously as he can. Did McClean make a fool of himself on one occasion? Yes, absolutely. Is McClean one of the good guys overall? Most definitely.

Jose Mourinho Yeah, this guy hasn't exactly covered himself in glory. The fact that Tottenham Hotspur were training instead of self-isolating is absolutely appalling. If the FA had any real guts, Spurs would and should be facing very serious sanctions for deliberating and wilfully breaching social distancing guidelines (the FA don't have any guts, so don't worry about it). I've never really liked Mourinho since his abuse of referee Anders Frisk, and his willingness to throw players and staff (including medical) under the bus is disgusting (Davy Fitzgerald,

despite his many good works for charity and undeniable passion, and Ger Loughnane, with his eagerness to deliberately and usually unfairly provoke hostility, always strike me as in the same mould).

Now, I'm not suggesting for one minute that it excuses his actions, but Mourinho does have another side to his character. He isn't a cartoon villain. Mourinho worked alongside Age UK and Love Your DoorStep in London to prepare food parcels and other items for delivery to vulnerable members of the community. Like I say, there's more credit than debit in his column for me (which, of course, he shouldn't care about; I am at least as flawed, if not much more so, than any of these people), but he is a better person than snap judgements or cheaply sensationalist headlines.

Who knows? Maybe we all are.

FAI EXTENDS CESSATION OF FOOTBALL UNDER ITS JURISDICTION TO MAY 5TH

The Football Association of Ireland has announced an extension to the cessation order for all football under its jurisdiction until May 5thinclusive, following directives from Government and the Department of Health. The decision to extend the deadline for the return to football has been taken in light of the COVID-19 pandemic and in the best interests of our players, coaches, volunteers, supporters and staff. This decision will continue to be monitored on an ongoing basis.

The FAI is in communication with the Department of Health and UEFA on COVID-19 and will continue to follow all government guidelines. The Association advises all members, volunteers and stakeholders to respect the HSE guidelines on social distancing during this pandemic. We also appeal to everyone involved with Irish football to stay at

home over the Easter weekend.

The Association remains committed to a June return for the SSE Airtricity League and Women's National League. Regular meetings are ongoing with representatives from the National League Executive Committee and the Professional Footballer's Association of Ireland to help our clubs and players through this difficult time.

FAI Medical Director Dr. Alan Byrne has again advised the FAI that in the current exceptional circumstances, clubs should not engage in collective training during the cessation period for all football activity under the FAI's jurisdiction.

This recommendation is based on the government's desire to avoid the spread of COVID-19 and Dr. Byrne strongly advises against clubs training during this cessation period which runs until May 5th inclusive.

Killarney bids farewell too soon to Damien Lyne

Enda Walshe, Killarney Legion GAA pays tribute to Damien Lyne

In these surreal times it must be very hard for any family to bury someone without the comfort of consoling words and stories over the course of the funeral. Churches can be eerie at the best of times so it's very difficult for what limited family members are able to attend in these times of social distancing. The one comfort they can find is tributes paid online and on social media by friends and neighbours alike.

In this sad week I found myself trawling over tributes to the late Damien Lyne and 2 very common threads ran through them. One was how he was such a competitor on the field and two was how friendly and sociable he was off it. Even in his brief time in Vietnam it looked as if he had made acquaintances with every Irish person who was there. This , of course, was made possible through the vehicle of the GAA.

Damien family, as you may or may not be aware, is steeped in the National games where the Lynes of Cleeney are thoroughbred blood in Kerry GAA. It was inevitable Damien would end up in Direen, following in the footsteps of his brother, sister, father, uncle, aunts, cousins, grandparents and many more. He played with the club at all grades and also donned the famed St Brendan's College jersey to great effect. He held his own at centre back in a Sem team including future Kerry players Kieran Murphy, Micheal Burns, Tony Brosnan and Conor Keane. Upon completing the Leaving Cert he moved onto UCC but without fail came down

from Cork on numerous midweek nights to line out with the club. He was always good to his word even if he may have been a little bit last minute in his arrival.

While the top level of the GAA is geared towards winning it was probably another ethos of the Association that Damien embraced more than most,the social side. Through it, he forged strong friendships and his dedication to the club was borne out of his commitment to his friends. And dressing rooms can sometimes be the scene of fire, venom and fist pumping inspirational team talks. But trust Damien to come out with a quip or a one liner to completely break the ice and send people into convulsions of side splitting laughter.

He was a key part of the clubs team that won the U21 County Club Championship in 2012 and with the club enjoying a fruitful few years at junior level in the following years Damien again was in the centre of the action.

He enjoyed travelling, and brother Jonathan in his excellent eulogy, remarked he had seen more of the world than most could ever imagine. His lust for travel sometimes meant Damien would take a "summer off" from Legion but inevitably he ended up playing gaelic football in his new destination,

most recently with the Saigon Gaels. But fear not, come the following January, he would be back in training again with the lads in Direen.

It will be a source of great solace for his family to hear and see all the warm tributes paid by



everyone that knew him.

And the greatest compliment you could Damien was that there always seemed to be ro for one more friend.

EMOTIONAL INTELLIGENCE

Emotional Intelligence (EI) refers to the way in which we manage, perceive, understand and control emotions and relationships - both our own and others. Research has shown that El is very important in our life - and for many people it is more important for success than general intelligence (IQ). Four different factors have been identified in El and these include:

- 1. The ability to perceive emotions.....in order to understand emotions, we have to first perceive them accurately. This might mean understanding non-verbal cues such as body language and/or facial expressions.
- 2. Reasoning with emotions..... Emotions help us to prioritise what we pay attention to and what we respond to.
- 3. Understanding emotions..... If someone is expressing emotion, we must interpret what it might mean - emotions can have a wide variety of meaning.
- 4. Managing emotions..... Being able to manage our emotions, regulate our emotions and respond to the emotions of others effectively is the key to El.

In order to recognise an emotion 'as it happens 'for us, it is important to develop self-awareness. This involves tuning into our feelings, recognising what they are and the effect they have on us. Self-regulation is also important in helping us to better understand, empathise and negotiate with other people. The ability to recognise how other people feel is important for success. Being able to read other's signals and respond appropriately is key. The better we are at discerning the feelings behind another person's behaviour, the more skilled we become at communicating with them.

The good news is that El can be learned and developed. Strategies to work on our El include:

- · Observe: How do you react to others....Do you rush in to judge before you know all the facts? Do you stereotype people? Take a closer look at how you are interacting with people and try putting yourself in their shoes.
- · Put the focus on others..... Give others a chance to shinewithout worrying about getting attention for your accomplish-
- Examine how you respond to stress......Do you get upset, blame others or get angry when in difficult situations. The ability to stay calm and in control when things go wrong is key to success.
- Take responsibility If you make a mistake, apologise.
- · Know how your actions will affect others.

Recently we have studied the protection that the blood of Jesus gives us as we abide in His Presence under the shelter of His wings (see our website wordofvictory.net for teachings and podcasts). Last week we learned that even though you may be isolated, you are not alone. Jesus is knocking at the door of your heart and He is waiting for you to open it so that He can come in and have REAL relationship with you (Revelation 3:14-22). In Matthew 11:28 Jesus promises that He will remove every yoke or burden from your shoulders and give you His light and peace instead, as you walk with Him. In Isaiah chapter 10:27 God speaks again of a yoke, likening it to the destruction the enemy caused His people. But He promises that He will remove that yoke by the power of His anointing. As you grow in your relationship with God through His Word, what happens is that like a little newborn calf who fattens on his mother's milk, you will be strengthened with God's power, and whatever yoke the enemy tied up or burdened your life with will be broken off by the anointing of the Holy Spirit in you. 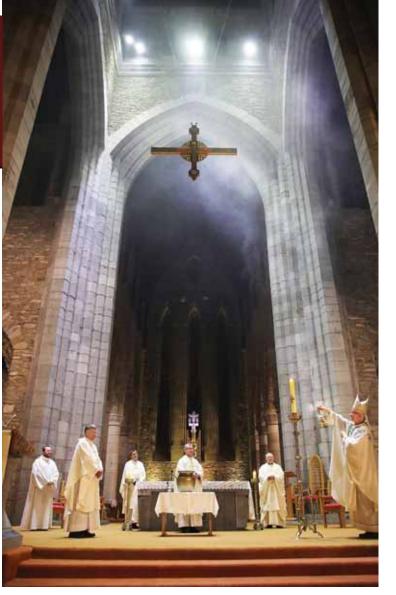
