BRAVE ADVENTURERS CHALLENGE THE HIGH PEAKS

Participants in last Saturday's Ultimate High Peaks Challenge braved the elements and battled and toiled their way around Ireland's premier mountain range, the MacGillycuddy's Reeks in hugely challenging conditions.

Organised by KerryClimbing.ie, this already hugely tough and challenging quest was made all the more difficult by last Saturdays monsoon rains and ferocious winds but despite this, all the exhausted, dripping wet and battered souls returned safe and well through the finishing line in Cronin's Yard beaming now from ear to ear after their testing adventure and many with a new found respect for the wild and extreme mountains of the Kingdom.

During the course of this memorable day participants trekked up to 25km of wild and rugged mountain terrain ticking off the majority of the very highest summits in the country and with a total height gain of almost 2500 metres.

This was the Ultimate test of personal navigational skills, fitness, determination and

stamina and the grand finale to this spectacular day culminated with the medal presentation and then a vibrant and well deserved after party and barbeque out of the rain in the Marquee in Cronin's Yard.

Most had no energy left by this time and couldn't be blamed for not taking to the floor to dance a jig or two as after such a long tiring day on their feet and most preferred to just chill, relax and soak in the electric atmosphere and sounds of the exciting local traditional Irish music trio – "Lonradh". The craic was mighty as the crowd enjoyed a well earned beer on the house from the bar provided by Kate Kearneys Cottage.

GLEESON QUERIES COUNCIL

" At the most recent Municipal area meeting, Councillor Michael Gleeson asked if money has been made available for the development of a public sewer for the 26 houses in Dennehy's Road, Killarney".

Makes about 30 bites

- 2 cups of almonds
- 2 cups of medjool dates
- 2 over-ripe bananas
- 1/2 a cup of ground flaxseed
 3 tablespoons of maca
- 3 tablespoons of chia seeds

First place the almonds in your food processor and blend for a minute or two until they break up and start to form a flour like mix. Then gradually add the pitted dates, peeled bananas, flax, maca and chia as the mix continues to blend. After a few minutes the mixture should be smooth and sticky, at which point the balls are ready to be rolled. Simply use a teaspoon to scoop up a batch of the dough, then roll it in your hands to form a ball. Place the ball on a plate and continue doing the exact same thing until you've used all the mixture. If you want to add goji berries or chia seeds to the outside then roll the balls in either before placing the plate of bites in the freezer for a couple of hours to set before enjoying. Store them either in the fridge or freezer.

SAFE CAR PARKING TIPS FOR DRIVERS - STAY SAFE WHEN PARKING ALONE

Have you ever felt nervous returning to your car in an enclosed car park when no one else is around? Most drivers would probably answer yes to this question. Underground or multi-storey car parks can be dimly lit with plenty of shadowy pillars and dark corners to hide behind so it's natural for drivers to feel nervous when alone in a car park. Not all car parks are sinister or dangerous places, in fact far from it, however we do advise motorists to err on the side of

caution when it comes to their personal safety

SAFE CAR PARKING TIPS TO DRIVERS:

Drivers should choose their car parks carefully - Opt for ones that are well lit, have plenty of traffic and are monitored by CCTV or security personnel.

Drivers shouldn't leave anything on the back seat of the car while parked in a car park that might attract unwanted attention. Female motorists in particular, should inspect their car for tell tales signs that their car is driven by a woman. Any giveaway items should be placed in the car boot.

During winter time, drivers should keep a can of de-icer and a scraper in their car to minimize time spent clearing the vehicle's windows.

Drivers should consider parking their car as close as possible to the car park lift area as there'll be more people circulating in this area of the car park.

Drivers should also where possible, choose a well lit car parking space.

Drivers should take note of where they park their vehicle to avoid needlessly wandering around the car park when they return.

Drivers returning to their car should keep both hands free amalgamating everything into a shoulder bag if possible before entering the car park. Drivers juggling bags are an easier target for attackers.

Drivers should always have their car keys to hand before entering the car park.

Drivers who feel unsafe should ask the car park security guard to walk them to their vehicle.

Drivers should check around and under their car followed by the vehicle's back seats before getting in.

If feeling intimidated drivers should get into their car as quickly as possible, lock the car doors and exit the car park without delay.

If a transit van with side sliding door parked on the driver's side of their vehicle, drivers should consider entering their car from the passenger side just in case.

Drivers should think twice before responding to another motorist who is looking for assistance in a car park. If you have any reservations refer them to the car park security guard.

Drivers who find you have a flat tyre or your vehicle won't start in a car park shouldn't hang around the car park. Go to a public place and call for breakdown assistance or a local garage. Drivers who find their vehicle has been broken into should immediately go to the car park security guard for help, call the Gardaí and inform the car park management. Don't hang around the car park alone waiting for them to arrive.

TOP CAUSES OF CAR BREAKDOWN IN IRELAND

Many breakdowns can be fixed at the roadside, but most can be avoided by regular car maintenance and following of the recommended car servicing schedule.

FLAT OR FAULTY BATTERY

Most common car battery problems viewed by our Patrols are caused by terminals and clamp connections or by a loss of voltage, often caused by constant use on short journeys without regular recharging.

At every car service, check that terminals have been cleaned and protected from corrosion with a layer of petroleum jelly or grease. Clamps and connections must be secure.

If you seldom make a long journey, a fortnightly overnight charge prolongs car battery life.

Modern maintenance-free batteries need no top-up.

Most battery related breakdown call outs are as a result of faulty or old car batteries that are overdue for replacement.

Punctures

Punctures are the second most common breakdown cause and whilst seemingly a simple breakdown job, machine tightened wheel nuts mean that motorists often struggle to get them off with the wheel change tools available to them.

THE MOST COMMON CAUSES OF A FLAT TYRE ARE:

Puncturing of the tyre by a sharp object Failure of or damage to the valve stem through which the tyre is inflated Vandalism, such as deliberating letting air out of the tyre valve Collision with another car

Collision with a deep pothole

Excessive wear of the tyre tread to the point where even blunt stones or imperfections in the road may tear a hole Lost car keys

Many modern cars have a 'transponder' key to prevent theft.

If you lose the key, recovery to an authorised dealer is usually the only answer.

Even a car dealer may take several days to obtain a replacement, so always carry a spare set of car keys.

ALTERNATOR FAULTS

Persistent car battery problems and dim headlights when the vehicle's engine is idling can indicate alternator/generator faults.

Belts driving the vehicle's alternator may also operate the car's radiator fan and water pump. A red ignition warning light on the vehicle's dash plus a rapid rise in the vehicle's engine temperature could indicate a broken belt. Stop the car immediately.

STARTER MOTOR

Though usually robust, starter motors can fail.

Good, regular car servicing by qualified mechanics garage maintenance should highlight potential faults.

DISTRIBUTOR CAP

Moisture and dirt are the chief enemies of this vital ignition-system component.

A crack in the cap's insulation in your car may be almost invisible but can be sufficient to allow high ignition voltage to leak away, especially in damp weather, so there may be no ignition spark in your car.

Replace the cap at the car manufacturer's recommended intervals.

If the weather protection covering the cap splits, replace it.

FUEL PROBLEMS

Fill up your vehicle's at the start of your journey.

Every year more than 100,000 motorists put the wrong fuel in their car – petrol in diesel engines or vice versa.

Clutch cables

The clutch cable in your car is under high stress. Abrasion can weaken the wire strands until they break.

KERRY AND CORK SET FOR ROUND TWO

Saturday July 18th Fitzgerald Stadium 7pm Kerry and Cork renew rivalries this Saturday evening when the sides clash again in their Munster Senior Football Championship Final replay.

Many people have questioned the late evening throw-in time but both Eamonn Fitzmaurice and Brian Cuthbert will not be unduly worried about this. Indeed, many Cork fans will not be happy at the thought of returning to Fitzgerald Stadium as they feel that you do not give sides like Kerry a second chance.

There will be much speculation in the lead-up to this replay as to the make-up of the Kerry starting 15. Fitzmaurice proved when naming his side for the drawn game that he is not afraid to make sweeping changes.

Ahead of the replay, there have been strong calls from the Kerry GAA faithful for the restoration of the David Moran/Anthony Maher midfield partnership, which pundits have described as the best midfield partnership in the country. Kerry really missed the presence of David Moran once blackcarded, around the middle in the drawn game, as Cork clearly dominated the midfield exchanges.

If Anthony Maher makes it back to the starting fifteen, Bryan Sheehan can be moved to the half-forward line.

Sheehan is vital for his scoring accuracy and success from frees in particular long range frees. The Cahersiveen man is rightly recognised as

one of the best dead ball kickers in the modern game.

Barry John Keane proved his worth too in the drawn game and deserves to hold his starting place. Kieran Donaghy's role will be vital. Will Eamonn Fitzmaurice leave Donaghy as an orthodox full-forward or will he give his captain licence to roam?

The Kerry defensive formation which was badly caught out at times in the drawn game will make for interesting reading. Will Fitzmaurice keep faith with Brendan Kealy in goal or will he turn to Brian Kelly? Kealy's performance against Cork in the drawn game came in for criticism from many Kerry fans but in his defence, the Kilcummin man did make at least two terrific saves during the game.

Time alone will answer these questions. What

of Cork? The Rebels will travel in confident mood and will be hopeful of ending Kerry's long unbeaten record in Killarney.

Cork's performance in the drawn game came as no surprise to Eamonn Fitzmaurice. The unfancied Rebels certainly laid down a marker and will feel they should have won the tie. Cork danger men Colm O'Neill and veteran Donncha O'Connor who scored 2-9 between them in the drawn game, with O'Neill accounting for 1-6.

Another matter of grave concern for Kerry fans is how to curb Barry O'Driscoll. The Cork wingback turned in a man of the match performance in the drawn game.

His electrifying pace hurt Kerry on more than one occasion and he will certainly have to be curbed as he loves to attack from defence. Much was made in the build-up to the drawn game about the power of the Kerry substitute's bench. With so much emphasis now being placed on impact substitutions the modern game is a 20-man contest and Kerry fans will want more from their bench contingent. The drawn game was rightly described as one of the best games for some time. One wonders will the sequel be just as good, as replays all too often fail to live up to the drawn encounter. It is expected that Saturday's game will again attract a bumper attendance to Fitzgerald Stadium. The Munster Council request that those with tickets should be at the venue at least an hour before the 7pm throw in

"WE NEED TO WORK A LOT HARDER": FITZMAURICE

At this stage, Eamon Fitzmaurice is an old pro at press conferences. They are a thing that must be ticked off the list of any inter county manager prior to a big day game. Just like on the field of play, a careful strategy is needed so no ball is dropped, no plan revealed and yet the performance must be good enough to send the hacks off with little nuggets to shine into possible valuable gold rocks.

Ahead of the next Saturdays replay against Cork, the Kerry manager stepped into the field to answer some of the hot topics.

On the Injury Front?

"We're good on the injury front, we have a few knocks but we would be hopeful again that everyone would be available, other than Kieran O'Leary."

On the lads who missed the match day 26?

"There was five lads who did not make the squad, Paul Galvin, Pa Kilkenny, Alan Fitzgerald, Philip O'Connor and Podge O'Connor. All of them very very close, Its very hard for fellows who don't made the 26, you have someone like Alan Fitzgerald, who is teaching in Dublin for the whole year and he is coming up and down the road, once and twice a week and doesn't make the 26, so it is very tough.

There is a great squad mentality there and the lads know that there is 32 of us there and including Kieran O'Leary and any given day that could change and may well do next weekend."

On Provincial finals questions, GPA questions, changing the championship, down grading provincial systems?

I'd didn't have any look, it's a busy week I had other things on my mind

On getting out of jail against Cork?

"The lads knew, you'd be a fool not to, we knew that we were lucky. Cork were probably a bit disappointed, that, they did not deservedly win the game the last day. I looked at it afterwards and I would be very proud of the lads that they stuck at it and even though it was far from a vintage performance, we still managed to grind a draw out at the end. So I would have been proud of the character that the players showed, they kept going and that has been the hallmark of the team in the last couple of years but we definitely need to improve performance wise."

Any one area that needs to improve?

"No, a lot of areas, I think we were second best in a lot of areas. I think Cork got it right on a lot of fronts both on the sideline and on the field. Cork were better on the day and we all have to improve.

Did you have a bad day at the office?

It doenst take a genius to know we did not have a great day on the side line, we did not adapt; I think sometimes you need the plans that are in place to go well. Sometimes when the plans you have in place go well, you're a genius and when they don't you look like you don't have a clue."

Was there a little bit of complacency?

"It can seem seep in, there is no doubt about it, The general mood in Kerry last week was one of confidence and over confidence and regardless of what you are doing inside of camp, it's not like a professional sports, all the lads are out in the communities, all the lads are working. If that is the vibe that is out there, that soaks in. Last year we were protecting against the overly negative vibe against Cork so that would not seep in. It was the reverse last week. If you are hearing this mantra constantly that Cork are not up to it of course it will seep in."

How disappointed were you at the goals that were conceded?

"All the goals were preventable; it is something that we are working on. If you want to win championships and you are conceding three goals every day, you are not going to win championships it's as simple as that. It is a cause

for concern of course and it is something that we have to work on and get right for Saturday week. This time last week we were unbeatable this time this week we're useless"

The Pat Flanagan Factor for Cork?

Cork really upped the ante, which is a feature of Pat Flanagan teams, when he was with us as well. He targets third quarters with the way he prepares teams. So it was no shock to us but we did not deal with it well and its one of those things that we have to work on.

Did we fail to track back at times to counter Cork attacks?

We did not work hard enough as a group. When you do not work hard enough against a team who are going to come at you in droves you are going to be in trouble.

Anything up your sleeve for the next day?

We just have to react better and more quickly to what they throw at us the next day.

Will Alan O'Connor performance have an influence in picking a midfield partnership for the replay? Yes, definitely.

Will the replay be a different game, will there be more passion?

The fact that it is an evening game will create a great atmosphere. Similar to the Kerry/Tyrone game in 2012, there was an incredible atmosphere in Killarney that evening. I thought there was a brilliant atmosphere there last week. There is no other place in the world you would rather be. Really looking forward to the replay.

Kerry simply blew league and All Ireland champions Cork away last Saturday evening in Mallow to claim their second Munster title in three years.

A strong opening half set the tone for the encounter with Kerry showing far superior fitness and plenty of desire for the contest and despite the concession of two first half goals to Cork, the result never seemed in doubt.

Kerry were full value for it, they bossed every sector, they played exciting football, scored 2-11 from play and subdued Cork in a way that had Eamon Ryan admitting the "It was the worst Cork performance ever while I have been in charge".

Kerry certainly did not suffer any awe from last years Team of the Year and from the off with Bernie Breen, Cait Lynch and Caroline Kelly set the tone with thumping challenges.

Kerry's pace in the forward line and their sidelines ability to get their match up right aligned with the intelligence of Lorraine Scanlon's perfectly timed kick passes gave the inside forward line a real advantage.

Kerry won the toss and played with the wind in the opening half, it was to be an advantage as the Kerry forwards in particular Sarah Houlihan and Louise Ni Mhuircheartaigh taking shots from distance almost on the run.

They opened brightly and were ahead 0-3 to 0-0 after just 6 minutes but Cork had edged back ahead by the close of the first quarter 1-2 to 0-3 as an unfortunate Maria Quirke ended up putting the ball passed her own keeper in a crowded goalmouth. It was a minor setback, as they would go on to score the next six points unanswered. Cork ended their 15th minute drought without

Ni Mhuircheartaigh rounded off a player of the game performance when she latched on to Bernie Breen's wild shot across the goal and fired to the net. From there on Kerry closed down the game "Cork Style" and cantered to the tape in a style befitting of champions. ROWING TO RIO

The Monika Dukarska Blog. The story of a Professional Athlete



The World Cup III in Lucerne, Switzerland is now over. This venue is well known for its clear waters, beautiful weather, striking architecture, efficient transport network and very often heartbreaking rowing stories. This weekend saw the best of rowers to battle it out for medals with more than a few battling also injuries, badly executed racing strategies that has cost places in the finals and hot weather that has played its toll on recovery and racing.

It was my first time in Lucerne and I loved it. The place was breathtaking. We have arrived quite late and had a day to acclimatise to what I have considered to be extremely hot weather. Although my race was the first race of the day and it was scheduled at 9:30am, it was already over 20 degrees. The rowing course was lovely, the water was warm, flat surrounded by fields, tram tracks and cows sounding the cowbells. It was nostalgic.

The purpose of this weekend was to learn and we have done just that. The area that we have to particularly improve on is the midrace pace. The transition between the start and the wind in at the finish is not good enough. It has to be steadier, relaxed and more efficient as well as more powerful on the legs. The difference between rowing a competitive race and being left at the final leg of the battle is getting this part right. This means we have to do a more lengthy race pieces at a higher rates and dig deep to sustain the length and power during the middle 1000meters of the race.

We have come up with a race strategy prior to our race but did not deliver the desired result. We planned to have a check points during the race to assess the situation and make a move however the field was moving too quick for us to make a sufficient gain. The final ranking is 5th in Final C so not what I have excepted and what I have worked for so hard. The next 7 weeks before the World Rowing Championships calls for major changes.

Also, big thanks for all of your votes in the Nissan Generation Next competition. Thanks to you I have secured a 152 Nissan Pulsar for a year. I love it and I greatly appreciate your help!

A quote which will be my focus point for the next 7 weeks is one of Elbert Hubbard: "A little more persistence, a little more effort, and what seemed hopeless failure may turn to glorious success".

Several weeks ago, Colm McCarthy wrote about our planned renewable energy plant in Mayo.

My recollection of his figures were that the cost to consumers per megawatt of electricity produced is projected to be four times that of conventional fossil fuel produced energy. Its purpose however is to help us to meet our renewable energy targets. At first glance that may give the exercise some credibility, until you examine it a little more closely. The most extraordinary aspect of this story is that all the wood pellets used to power the plant will be imported from the US. Last week, by chance, while reading a US environmental/ agricultural publication, I came across an article very critical of the practice. North Carolina forests were being sacrificed to satisfy British power plants.

The trees in guestion were harvested from swamp woodland by bulldozer, the logs were then transported to a pelleting plant, dried, cut and pelleted, transported to port, loaded on a ship, transported to the UK , finally onto trains to be transported to their final destination. The energy expended on this process, to point of use, amounted to half of the potential energy produced by these pellets at their final destination.

The plant operators in Mayo guarantee that all miscanthus and willow produced by local farmers will be purchased to supplement its US supplies but its principal supply is to be imported US timber. Local timber need not apply! There are no local supplies of anything in the pipeline at this time. So if 50% of the benefit of this renewable product is already lost in getting it to the plant, how effective is it at producing electricity. The figure quoted on the efficiency of utility size biomass burning boilers is only 24%. I assume pellets are better than other forms of biomass, but I have to wonder, will the energy expended in sourcing the product and all the energy lost in the process of burning it, be greater than the energy which finally reaches the electricity grid. I can't see how this process could possibly be looked on as sustainable or renewable. Certainly when looking at costs in a tough year, it is difficult to see any logic in this initiative, just more smoke and mirrors, but Paddy is paying for the the privilege of being seen to be green.

The more I think about it the more annoyed I get, the US are bringinging down the cost

of their own energy bills by fracking. Despite all the screaming and wailing by the usual suspects, there is no evidence to suggest that it is harmful to the environment. We, on the other hand, are

building costs into our energybillbyimportingtheir timber, seriously degrading their environment in the process and for absolutely no logical reason. In a global market where we

have to compete with our American cousins accepting this sort of development is just nuts.

KILLARNEY SOCCER

KILLARNEY ATHLETIC HISTORY 1975 – 1980

The mid to late '70s was a significant period not just in the club's history but also in the development of soccer in Killarney and Kerry. James Gleeson RIP followed in the steps of his brother Donagh and served the club as chairman and team manager for a number of seasons while also serving on the KDL board. Peter Gilhooley RIP and Tom 'Sossy' Mullins RIP shared the secretarial role within the club during this period.

Although there were competing teams in many parts of the county, the KDL and affiliated soccer clubs were still only 'finding their feet' to the extent that nearly all the clubs were just comprised of 1 junior (adult) team with only 6 clubs fielding a youth team in the 1st youth league of the KDL in the 1974/75 season. Athletic finished runners-up to a strong Cahersiveen team who had the great Jack O' Shea in their line-up that season. Cahersiveen were also the top junior side in the KDL league in the first years of its formation.

In many ways at the time the key person in a club was the team manager and for many of the clubs the player/manager role was quite common. Denny Hayes took over from James as player/manager in 1976 and was also to make an outstanding contribution to the club over the following decades at all levels within the club and the Kerry Schoolboys League. **Woodlawn Rovers Join Killarney Athletic**

Many people involved with soccer in Kerry would associate the name of Billy Doyle with Killarney Athletic but Billy had his own team in the KDL and they were named Woodlawn Rovers and played in division 2 of the league for two seasons—1973/74 and '74/'75. However they joined Killarney Athletic ahead of the '75/'76 season. The club was to benefit enormously as a result of this decision because not only did Billy attach himself to Athletic but he also brought with him some very good players. One in particular to stand out above all others was Donie Murphy and the rest as they say 'is history'. As many people would know Donie has been involved with the club in every decade since and presently coaches & manages with the under 10s and 12s. Gerard

The 1975/'76 season was also a landmark year for the club as it became the 1st Kerry league club to field a second junior team that

players to come from the 'Rovers' and wear the

competed in the 2nd division of the league. This decision was made to cater for the ever increasing numbers coming into the club, and it also marked Billy's first time managing a Killarney Athletic side.

Also that season Killarney Rangers were founded and entered into the 2nd division of the KDL with Athletic 'B'. Outside of Liebherr there were now two distinctive soccer clubs in town. The 'Rangers' changed their club name in the 1977/'78 season when a young Killarney Albion 7-a-side team joined them, and the renamed club became Killarney Celtic.

There is no doubt that local sporting rivalry is one of the healthiest things in sport, as it inspires clubs and teams to be at their best to compete against each other. It is also true to say that the Killarney 'derbies' between the 2 clubs have been a highlight in many of the soccer seasons over the decades.

For the record it was a Tony Fleming goal that separated the sides in the clubs' 1st competitive meeting in a Munster Junior Cup game played in the St. Finans pitch in the 1978 season. The aforementioned Tony along with Donal Hayes were 2 prolific goal scorers for Athletic in the '70s while Tony also made a significant contribution as an administrator of the club.

Start of the 7-A-Side in 1977

As mentioned in a previous article there were competitive 7-asides held in the Half Moon and in the 'Áras' pitch in the early 70s but in 1977 the club organised and held the first 7-a-side tournament that has run in every consecutive year since then. Next year, in 2016, the club will mark and celebrate the 40th year of organising and running this most popular tournament and there will be a lot of interest in recalling the past 39 years of 7-a-side memories. The organising committee of the 1977 tournament under the chairmanship of Billy Doyle deserve great credit for giving the 7-a-side the organisational level that has endured the past 39 years.

The goal of this 1st 7-a-side was to further promote the game in the area and also to raise funds for a local charity. Securing exclusive use of the 'Aras' pitch to run the tournament was a must and again the Franciscan community through Fr. Vivian RIP gave their full support to the club. The next important requirement was a main sponsor, as the committee proposed prize funds to the winners and runners-up as well as trophies. Hence, without hesitation, Con O'Leary of the Laurels Bar committed to sponsoring the tournament for a 3 year period. From an organisation and rules point of view teams were only allowed to have 2 registered players with the KDL in their squads, there were no walkovers or late arrivals allowed and all teams had to be properly kitted out. The players, managers and their sponsors all bought into the organisation and spirit of the tournament and the 1977 event proved to be an outstanding success, setting the trend for future tournaments – Brian McCarthy refereed most of the matches that year. There were 19 competing teams with a Laurels-sponsored team—The Bounty Boys—winning the spoils against a Killarney Albion side that had 'Poggs' Looney and Pa Moynihan in the team. Pa had moved from Fossa (formerly Liebherr) to join Athletic that same year and he later managed many Athletic teams at senior and under age level.

The one downside of the tournament for the club was it also proved to be an ideal recruiting base for many of the new emerging clubs that were joining the KDL at the time and the club were not as persuasive as others in enticing the more 'sought after players' into the club.

Start of Underage 7-A-Side in 1978

Since its formation the promotion of the game at underage level was always a core principle of the club and it was a natural development that the club organised the 1st underage 7-a-side in 1978 also in the 'Áras' pitch. John J Murphy deserves great credit for organising the earlier tournaments and also for his commitment to the club over many years as an administrator and team manager.

The Late '70s

Most Kerry people would know that the late 70s was a 'golden era' for the Kerry football team under Mick O' Dwyer and although the KDL was still popular during the winter months, many of clubs, Killarney Athletic included, had a lot dual players in the make-up of their teams. This had the effect of not fielding the same 11 consistently enough to compete against the better sides in the division 1 league. This was also allied to the fact that many of the keen soccer players that played with the club in the early 70s had retired, and of course the rivalry between the local clubs meant that players were been pursued to join different clubs. Peter McGrath, who was an outstanding

goalkeeper with Athletic, took over as player/ manager for the 1979/'80 season. He made a bold attempt to improve the fortunes of the club's 1st team by attracting some good quality players into the fold and the side did well and won the Kerry area final of the Munster Junior Cup. The club were well also represented in the Kerry Oscar Traynor team in every year throughout the '70s. Next article: 1980-'85

Know Your Rights: APPLYING FOR A STUDENT GRANT

JULY 2015

QUESTION

I've just finished my Leaving Certificate and am hoping to go to college in the autumn. How do I apply for a student grant?

ANSWER

SUSI is Ireland's single national awarding authority for all higher and further education grants. It began to process grants in 2012, replacing the 66 local awarding authorities who had previously processed student grant applications.

You make an application to SUSI by completing and submitting an application form online. You must have an online account with SUSI before you can make your grant application. The closing date for applications is **1 August 2015.**

You can use SUSI's eligibility reckoner to see whether you meet the standard criteria to be considered eligible for student grant funding. You must meet the conditions of the student grant scheme. You must be an Irish, EU, EEA or Swiss national or have specific leave to remain in the State. You must also have been ordinarily resident in Ireland or the EU for three of the last five years). Your family's means (in the previous tax year – 2014) are assessed. You must also be attending an approved course in an approved institution.

You must make sure that you provide complete and accurate information (date of birth, Personal Public Service Numbers (PPSNs) and bank details in particular) to avoid any delay to the processing of your application. You need to send hard copies of any supporting documentation to SUSI.

If you are refused a grant or are approved a grant at a rate you don't think applies to your situation, you can appeal the decision in writing to SUSI. You must appeal within 30 days of getting your decision.

Student grants are reviewed each year. If you had a grant in one academic year and are continuing your studies on the course in the following year, SUSI will be in contact with you in order to renew or re-assess your student grant for that next year.

LAUGHTER MEDICINE

Are you feeling rundown and in need of a gentle boost? Then laughing may be just the medicine for you. The use of laughter as a form of therapy is increasing in popularity. A study at Loma Linda University indicates that laughter produces an abundance of gamma brain waves. Interestingly these gamma waves are also found in the brains of people who meditate often and have reached a state of contentment and happiness.

Researchers are still exploring the potential health benefits from laughter. Perhaps it's the physical act of laughing that contributes to this, or maybe it's having a good sense of humour and a positive attitude. But one for sure we know, that it certainly doesn't hurt to laugh.

Laughing can be compared to a 'gentle body workout' as many physiological changes are taking place when we laugh. The muscles on our face and body stretch, our blood pressure increases and we breathe faster sending more oxygen throughout our body. But not only does it boost our heart rate – one study showed that laughing for 10-15 minutes can burn up to 50 calories! Increased laughter can also help to boost our immune cells and increase the levels of disease-fighting antibodies in the body. Laughter can also help us to relax and sleep better.

When we laugh we release 'feel good' hormones and naturally occurring anti-depressant (e.g serotonin). Laughter can also be a great way to deal with life's unexpected events and help get us through difficult times. Responding to the trials of life with some laughter, can help to protect our body mind and spirit – and may be a bleak situation doesn't seem as insurmountable when we can find some humour.

Laughter can also help us to bond, connect and communicate with others. Humour helps lubricate the channels of communication and can make people feel more comfortable.

Think about what makes you laugh and be sure to do more of it. This may be watching your favourite comedy, sharing a good joke, going to a comedy club or watching a funny U tube clip. Why not try now – just turn the corners of your mouth up into a smile and give a little laugh out loud. It may feel a bit contrived, but notice how you feel. Whatever gets you chuckling be sure to factor in more laughter to your life on a daily basis and increase those happy gamma waves.

Breast Cancer 4

TREATMENT CONTINUED:

CHEMOTHERAPY: Chemotherapy is a treatment of cancer by using anti-cancer medicines which kill cancer cells, or stop them from multiplying. When chemotherapy is used in addition to surgery it is known as adjuvant chemotherapy.

Chemotherapy is sometimes given before surgery to shrink a tumour so that surgery may have a better chance of success and also a smaller operation may be performed. This is known as neoadjuvant chemotherapy.

Chemotherapy may also be used for some women to treat breast cancer which has spread to other areas of the body.

TRASTUZUMAB (HERCEPTIN®): Trastuzumab (also known as Herceptin®) is a treatment that may be given to women who have a large number of HER2 receptors in their cancer. It is a type of medicine called a monoclonal antibody. It works by attaching to HER2 receptors on the surface of breast cancer cells, thereby stopping the cancer cells from dividing and growing.

SCREENING FOR BREAST CANCER

In Ireland Breast screening is carried out through the BreastCheck Programme. BreastCheck is a Governmentfunded programme providing breast screening and invites women aged 50 to 64 for a free mammogram on an areaby-area basis every two years. The aim of BreastCheck is to reduce deaths from breast cancer by finding and treating the disease at an early stage. Mammography is a special X-ray test and aims to detect breast cancer at an early stage when treatment is most likely to be curative.

Genetic testing and mammography screening (and preventive treatments in some cases) may also be offered to younger women with a strong family history of breast cancer. See your doctor if you feel this applies to you.

All women of every age should be breast aware. That is, get to know how your breasts and nipples normally look and feel. Try to recognise any changes that occur before and after your periods. See your GP if you notice any changes, lumps, or other abnormalities in your breasts or nipples. Don't wait until your next scheduled screening appointment.

THISISTHEINTERNATIONAL YEAR OF BIODIVERSITY

Just as there is a "micro climate" in your back garden, there is "micro biodiversity" there also. Increasingly scientists are acknowledging the importance of urban/suburban garden space as it relates to biodiversity in the big picture: Lawns, gardens and open green spaces have an impact on the issue.

Birds play an important role in creating and maintaining the biodiversity that we aim for. To attract birds to your property it is fundamental to provide a secure environment for nesting, lots to eat (including many garden-variety bugs) and water. Our gardens can provide all of this and more. Therein lies the opportunity for each of us who loves to garden.

• What can you do?

First, consider the plant material that you have in your garden. Most gardens are best served by a combination of native and non-native plants. The criteria for choosing plants for your garden should be providing accessible pollen or nectar. Double-flowered plants are a poor choice as their reproductive parts are not accessible (or they do not exist at all) to pollinators like bees.

Butterflies require broad flowerheads that are pollen rich.

Attracting pollinators

Encouraging the active pollinators to your garden is only the beginning. The larvae of butterflies are also important to the biodiversity of your garden and outdoor space. Encouraging butterflies and moths in your garden is a process that includes secure space where they can lay eggs and provide a food source for their young. Not only will the creepy crawly young of the butterflies need some plants to munch on, the local songbird population will delight in picking off many or most of them. As the caterpillars eat your lilies for lunch, the birds eat the caterpillars for dinner.

Nature changes/We change

Slowly it will dawn on us — and not so slowly for the emerging generation of gardeners — that we need pollinators in order to survive. 35% of our diet relies on them. These invertebrates form part of the food chain and without them, animals higher up the chain go hungry.

Is it important to consider how your garden can impact on the local biodiversity? You bet it is. Keep the following in mind as you contemplate your role:

 Flowers in sun attract the most pollinators. Consider choosing plants for the sunny spots in your garden (or balcony) that attract bees and butterflies.

• Use your vertical space. This is smart for

at least two reasons: in the town you are limited to the space that you can plant and many types of ivy grow and bloom in part shade.

• Plants in containers work, too. Crocus, chives, violets, marigolds, sweet william, dahlias and all of the mints (which need to be contained anyway) all provide blossoms and nectar.

WHY CAN'T ALL PEOPLE WORSHIP AS THEY PLEASE?

Since the racist shooting in Charleston, South Carolina, at least eight predominantly

"black" churches - a core institution of the African American community - have gone up in flames. Three have been confirmed arson. If worshippers aren't safe at church, then where are they safe? Black families are twice as likely to be denied a mortgage. Job seekers with "white" names are 50% more likely to be called back than those with "black" names and the list goes on.

But the U.S. is not alone in denying Civil Rights, we all know that if you live in certain addresses in towns or cities here in Ireland you are unlikely to be called for an interview and on religious discrimination, we see it all over the world from beheadings, floggings and jail time for belief in Christianity in the middle east to attacks on our Christian Emblems here in Ireland. Why not live and let live? There is surely room in our country and the world for people of different faiths and for non-believers. Now RTE's Head of Broadcast Compliance has written to Atheist Ireland in response to its complaints about the Angelus saying they "have given careful consideration to your argument about the term "Angelus" and will take further soundings to determine whether that title remains the best one for today's Ireland."

A number of religious faiths outside Catholicism, including the Church of Ireland and the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, have called for the continuation of the broadcast of the Angelus and together with Catholics this is surely a majority of the people in Ireland.

If the sound of the bell on the national airwaves upsets non-Christians so much – why can't THEY just switch it off?

*Lutine was a frigate which served in both the French Navy and the Royal Navy. She was launched by the French in 1779. The ship passed to British control in 1793 and was taken into service as HMS Lutine. She sank among the West Frisian Islands during a storm in 1799, whilst carrying a large shipment of gold. Shifting sandbanks disrupted salvage attempts, and the majority of the cargo has never been recovered.

The ship's bell (engraved "ST. JEAN - 1779") was recovered on 17 July 1858. The bell was found entangled in the chains originally running from the ship's wheel to the rudder, and was originally left in this state before being separated and re-hung from the rostrum of the Underwriting Room at Lloyd's. It weighs 48 kilograms (106 lb) and is 46 centimetres (18 in) in diameter. It remains a mystery why the name on the bell does not correspond with that of the ship. The bell was traditionally struck when news of an overdue ship arrived - once for the loss of a ship (i.e. bad news), and twice for her return (i.e. good news). The bell was sounded to ensure that all brokers and underwriters were made aware of the news simultaneously. The bell has developed a crack and the traditional practice of ringing news has ended: the last time it was rung to tell of a lost ship was in 1979 and the last time it was rung to herald the return of an overdue ship was in 1989.

FIFA'S GENDER PAY DISCRIMINATION

The U.S. Women's soccer team made history after winning the World Cup for the third time. Their prize? \$2 million.

Not bad until you learn that the U.S. Men's team earned \$8 million--for losing in the first round. Why? Because according to FIFA's leadership, equal pay for women is "nonsense." The women's final match, watched by millions of fans, was one for the record books: The U.S. scored four goals in the first 16 minutes, winning the game - and the cup -with the most goals of any final in Women's World Cup History. Yet FIFA officials continue to mock female players' demands for fair pay and other discriminatory treatment. Last year, FIFA's secretary general said that "we are still another 23 World Cups before potentially women should receive the same amount as men." That's 92 more years of pay discrimination.

THE 'GODFATHER' OF BMX' BIKE RACING HAS DIED

Scot Breithaupt helped transform BMX bike racing from a backyard game into a worldclass international sport, winning several international competitions. After Scot retired from competing, he founded SE Racing, which created several novel bike frame designs. Mr. Breithaupt also started LM Productions, and produced racing and extreme-sport shows for networks like ESPN and Fox.

He was also one of the first racers in what was then called motocross in the 1970s, and took the sport from an unknown game to international success.

Craig Barrette, spokesman for USA BMX said "Scot was one of the key figures in making the industry become what it is today. He was involved in every aspect."

The Sports Hall of Fame released a statement saying - "As one of the sport's first track operators and founder of SE Bikes — and so many other contributions to the sport of BMX, this is a huge loss... He was a founding track operator, a star racer since he was a teenager in Long Beach, a creator of a major bicycling company and major promoter."

A shrine to Scot Breithaupt stands in the sport's Hall of Fame, and his loss is felt throughout the industry.

If you want to do a bull run properly, you need the most ferocious bulls you can find. In Pamplona, they're found at the Jandilla ranch in rural western Spain. Clearly, the six picked to dash through the city's picturesque streets this year were perfect — they gored 3 people

in only two minutes in one day.

The two Americans and one Briton are fine, despite being stabbed with a horn.

The Americans are reportedly 38 and 27, one was hurt in the armpit, the other in the back. The Briton is a the 30-year-old.

Three more Americans were bruised and battered and seven more slightly injured during the run, which covers an 850-meter stretch for a terrifying couple minutes, while daredevils in red scarves sprint like mad through Pamplona's narrow streets.

The race starts at a holding pen and ends at the bull ring, where the animals are killed in bullfights by pro matadors. The Pamplona festivities are part of the nine-day San Fermin festival, but runs like this one are common all across Spain.

Injuries are a common feature of the Spanish bull run and since 1924, 15 people have been gored to death at such events.
