

MARATHON FUNDRAISER

The family of Linda Lucey Eviston who passed away last October have decided to raise money for the fight against cancer to honour her memory and are undertaking a very personal marathon route in her memory. "We're running a marathon to raise money for the fight against cancer on behalf of our brave and beautiful Linda who passed away last October", Patrick, Linda's husband told Killarney Outlook.

Linda was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2007 whereupon she underwent surgery, chemotherapy, radiotherapy and hormone treatment. Despite some serious setbacks, Linda returned to good health, but sadly the cancer returned in 2015 and the family were told that it was terminal. Linda continued to live a full life and care for her family until passing on the 10th of October 2020.

"As a way to honour Linda's memory and to help others, we are hoping to raise much-needed funds for the Irish Cancer Society. Specifically, the palliative care night nursing service for families, caring for their loved ones at home. The nurse's support and compassion is indispensable. Also, we want to support clinical trials for new cancer treatments. These trials offer hope for patients when all other treatments are exhausted", Patrtick added

Linda's husband Patrick and son Erik will run a marathon (42.2 kilometres) on the 9th October supported by daughter Alannah, family and friends.

The route will be based on landmarks that were an important part of Linda's life. Starting from the family home in Dromkerry, onto Killarney passing the Eviston House Hotel, Linda's grandmother's home at Park Road, Linda's childhood home and National School in Glenflesk, Loreto Convent where Linda attended Secondary School and back to Killarney and finishing at Linda's pride and joy - Brook Lodge Hotel.

From a tiny spark bursts a mighty flame...

BRÍD LAUNCHES HER INSPIRATIONAL BOOK

amily, friends and contributors gathered at The Rose Hotel on Friday night last to celebrate the launch of a new book by author Bríd O'Connor.

"Spark" is a collection of forty nine personal stories of challenging times in the lives of contributors to the book and how they managed to find their "Spark" again which Brid has curated.

As a cancer survivor Bríd shares that in her most challenging days of treatment she looked to the poem "Invictus" to inspire her and she hopes that "Spark" will now do that for others. Proceeds from the book will go to Comfort for Chemo, Kerry.

Bríd's cancer diagnosis came 15 months after her mother was diagnosed with terminal cancer. In addition, two of her siblings tested positive for the BRCA gene, suddenly this tight knit family were faced with grief and challenges that is unimaginable to most people.

Bríd's mother was a basketballer and coach and a phrase she regularly used to ignite the passion and drive in a team was to "turn and face it." This phrase always stayed with Bríd and no more so than when the family grieved the death of her mother, Bríd had lost her greatest champion.



As a history teacher Bríd fully appreciates the value of reflecting upon key events and milestones throughout the ages and how we can all learn from times past. During her own cancer journey, the poem "Invictus" became Bríd's lighthouse, where she would turn to time and time again for a form of safe harbour. It was famously featured by Nelson Mandela in his autobiography "Long Walk to Freedom," as he found solace and hope in those words during his incarceration on Robben Island.

But now Bríd turned her mind to the recent history, prompted by the loss of her mother and her own journey through cancer, she wanted to find stories that others can find comfort in, find thought provoking or a story that will give you hope in your lowest hour.

During this time Bríd shared she had lost her "spark" and that it took time for it to re-emerge, but when she found it again, she knew she could help others with her story. This became her core curiosity as she asked others "when did you realise your spark had dimmed and what contributed to it?"

"Spark" the book, is a beautiful collection of these conversations, with many familiar faces and others you will come to know. Featuring Billy Keane, Louise Galvin, and Don O'Neill amongst others. The incredible contributors to "Spark" share stories of grief, serious-illness, life altering events and challenges. Each contributor discloses what resets them, and the book is filled with messages of hope.

Proceeds from the book will go to Comfort for Chemo, Kerry, who are fundraising for €5 million to build a centre of excellence for the patients of Kerry. Due to increasing demand for chemotherapy treatments in Kerry, the unit in University Hospital Kerry is no longer fit for purpose and lacks sufficient space and facilities to ensure patients can continue to receive their chemotherapy in the hospital.

As a service user of UHK during her own cancer treatment, Bríd shares the medical, nursing and support staff are incredible, but the setting is unsuitable and there is an immediate requirement for a stand-alone chemotherapy unit in University Hospital Kerry that would provide much needed comfort and dignity to cancer patients.

erry's architectural heritage and the county's architectural landscape will be celebrated during the annual Architecture Kerry Festival between 24 and 26 September 2021. A wide range of events including free guided tours and exhibitions form part of the programme for the event which is now in its fourth year and which is part of the Creative Ireland Kerry Programme.

The aim of the festival is to highlight the wide diversity of the architectural landscape in Kerry and to make some of the best-known sites of architectural significance in the county accessible to all ages. Due to COVID-19, Architecture Kerry has adapted its programme to reflect the need to run many of its events online in addition to some physical events.

Architecture Kerry has reached out to the public, to bring the people of Kerry together to be part of the celebration. During August, Kerry County Council ran a public photography competition called Shapes of Kerry where people were asked to submit their favourite images of Kerry's built environment. The top 20 winning entrants will be showcased for Architecture Kerry 2021. Kerry County Museum Festival organiser Victoria McCarthy of Kerry Creative Ireland Coordinator in Kerry.

and Kerry County Library are also hosting exciting new events for Architecture Kerry exploring archaeology and the county's rich archives and heritage.

Kerrv County Council's Architectural Conservation Officer, Victoria McCarthy, said the programme of events has something for everyone, even those with a passing interest in architecture: 'Following the success of the event last year, we decided to arrange a series of events again this year to promote and highlight some of our unique and attractive architectural heritage in the county.

'Throughout Saturday 25 and Sunday 26 September, some festival favourites will be opening their doors for free guided tours. This year, Muckross Traditional Farms are partnering with Architecture to celebrate traditional crafts in Kerry with practical demonstrations showcasing Kerry's practitioners lined up for 24th and 25th September.

annonball, the action-packed supercar spectacle, will blast off with a mighty roar, once again on September 17th at 10.30 from Malahide Castle and blaze a trail from coast to coast with proceeds to the HOPE Foundation. ne of Jack & Jill's Specialist Liaison Nurses in Kerry, Siobhan Reen is urging people to sign up for this year's Jack & Jill Up the Hill fundraising challenge.

"To say that it has been a very tough 18 months for our Jack & Jill families is an understatement. As one of the vulnerable groups during the pandemic, our families have had to take refuge in order to keep themselves and, most importantly, their children safe. It has been really tough", Siobhan said,

"Throughout this time, we have continued to provide in-home support, across the garden wall support, and over the phone support. Last year, we provided over 2,100 hours of support to families in Kerry. COLLEGE STUDENTS FACE LONG DAILY COMMUTE OR A BLANKET ON THE COUCH IN ACCOMMODATION CRISIS

Very few college students set foot in college during the last academic year. Instead, they spent the year at home as lectures were delivered on-line. The sheer joy of returning to in-person lectures is tempered by a difficult search for accommodation, which is in short supply and very expensive.

The cost-of-living guide published recently by Technological University Dublin (TUD), reaffirms that 3rd level costs are prohibitive for many students. The guide confirms that the cost of maintaining a student in college this year will be a staggering €14,000. In addition, means testing of grant applications is so restrictive that thousands of students are ineligible for any financial aid. Capping the gross annual income levels for grant eligibility at €39,875 ignores spiralling living costs increasing again this year by 13.5% - and is financially crippling many families.

The failure to address the pressing issues of costs and accommodation failed to take the glow off the wonderful results achieved by Kerry's 2021 Leaving Cert cohort. 50% of higher education students get no funding from the grant authority, SUSI due to punitive means testing of household income. The maximum standard maintenance grant is only €3025. That amount might suffice for an academic year if the student is driving into UCD or TCD from Rathdown or Dun Laoghaire, while enjoying full board free gratis at home.

However, Kerry's high achieving students face a far different reality. Students from Kerry need an average of €14,000 annually to attend college away from home. The majority of Kerry applicants couldn't consider entering course choices in Dublin colleges on their 2021 CAO application form due to prohibitive costs. The average monthly cost of accommodation in Dublin has exceeded €1350, with costs increasing by 40% in the past five years.

There are many courses in Dublin that Kerry students would love to apply for. Unfortunately,

unless they come from wealthy backgrounds or have family accommodation in the city, rural students are restricted to courses nearer home. Nine in ten parents are helping to fund their children's education but are getting into considerable debt to do so. 60% of third level students are forced to live at home during term time. Many are forced to make a daily return commute from Kerry to Limerick or Cork because they can't afford the spiralling unregulated cost of student accommodation. Others are sleeping on a couch in the digs of college friends.

The supply of rental accommodation is at a critically low level and students are competing for the most basic accommodation with those who cannot afford to purchase a home or are awaiting social housing. Students, who normally live away from home during the academic year now face the prospect of missing out on college if they can't, firstly, find accommodation and secondly, if they don't have the means to pay for it. The alternative is a long daily commute to and from college which is costly in terms of time, fatigue and finance. In fact, application data reveals that the vast majority of college applicants from Kerry look no further than Tralee, Cork and Limerick as they now accept that Dublin is unaffordable. An increasing number of parents are cutting back on family clothing, household goods, food, groceries and a family holiday to cover the cost of third level education. Money issues

are borrowing from moneylenders. If the Government is serious about easing the financial burden on hard pressed families, it must abolish the €3000 student fee contribution. It must increase the standard maintenance grant from €3025 to €5000 and all other grants pro rata. It must increase the annual income level for standard grant

€5.3BN HIT TO IRISH HOTEL REVENUE DUE TO COVID

GOVERNMENT URGED TO GIVE FIRM COMMITMENT

Hotels and guesthouses in Kerry and across the country have faced another exceptionally challenging vear due to Covid. Average room occupancy levels for 2021 stand at 27% for the South-West including Kerry year to date according to the latest industry research from the Irish Hotels Federation (IHF). With the summer over, the sector is entering an uncertain nine months as bookina levels fall sharply in the absence of overseas visitors, meetings and events which would normally sustain the sector during the off-peak season. Padraig McGillicuddy, PRO of the Kerry branch of the IHF is urging the Government to give a firm commitment to continue business and employment supports until international tourism recovery begins in earnest in summer 2022.

"Government supports have been a i to the sector being shut until June. vital lifeline for tourism businesses. including hotels and questhouses in Kerry - many of these businesses would not have survived without the emergency measures put in place throughout this crisis. We now have a long road to recovery ahead of us, and this will require further targeted assistance for tourism and hospitality and the almost 270,000 livelihoods supported by tourism before Covid one in ten of all Irish jobs, including 15,700 here in Kerry.

Mr McGillicuddy notes that while the domestic tourism market performed well over the summer months with average room occupancy in the South West of 72%, business has been exceptionally poor year-to-date with occupancy levels averaging 27% for the first eight months due

The sector is still subject to a delay in the full lifting of restrictions on hospitality and indoor events until 22nd October as well as significant uncertainty around international travel, including travel advice from the US Government against travel to Ireland which is impacting on forward bookings.

"The thousands of livelihoods supported by tourism businesses in Kerry matter – not only to the people working within the industry but also to the wider economy, especially the many areas where tourism is the only show in town. A failure to support the tourism and hospitality industry now will have ramifications for the future of Ireland's tourism offering and for the economy.







APPLE CRUMBLE

Ingredients

1.5kg Apples about 8 large cooking apples150g golden caster sugar or brown sugar3 tablespoons of lemon juice50g cold butter100g plain flour

Method

- 1. Pre heat the oven at 180° fan
- 2. Peel the apples, then quarter them and remove the core, cut into chunks
- 3. Place them in a saucepan over a medium heat with the lemon juice, sugar and cook for 5 minutes until slightly soft.
- 4. In a large bowl rub the butter into the flour until it resembles breadcrumbs
- 5. Tip the apples mixture into a baking dish and then top with the crumble.
- 6. Bake for 25 30 minutes until golden brown, you can serve this with custard or whipped cream or muckross vanilla ice-cream

KADALA CURRY

Ingredients

2 tablespoons oil

1 onion diced

1 tsp crushed dried chilli

7 cloves of garlic crushed

1 tablespoon ground coriander

2 tablespoons ground cumin

1 tablespoon garam masala

2 tablespoons tomato puree

1 thumb size piece of grated ginger

1 400g tin chickpeas drained

1 400g tin chopped tomatoes

100g frozen spinach

100g creamed coconut

1 tablespoons frozen coriander

Salt to season

Method

In a large pan fry the oil, onion and dried chilli for about 8 minutes. In a blender put the garlic, ginger, spices, tomato puree, sprinkle of salt, 2 tablespoons water and finally the fried onion mix and blend to a smooth paste. Put the paste back I the same pan in which you fried the onions earlier and add the chickpeas and tomatoes and cook on a low heat for about 5 minutes. Add the frozen spinach and the coconut cream and a little water cook for another 6-7 minutes until the spinach is wilted. Add the frozen coriander and cook for another 2-3 minutes or so. I served with basmati rice.

SPA CROWNED 2020 INTERMEDIATE COUNTY CHAMPIONS

Played in Fitzgerald Stadium on Sunday afternoon, the difference at the end of the day was a hatrick from man-of-the-match Cian Tobin that gave the Spa side a comfortable cushion as the game progressed. Spa had no less than twelve different scorers on the day, and great teamwork across all sectors earned them a first Intermediate title since 2009. It is the third time in the club's history they have won the Intermediate County Championship title after suffering defeat in their last three final appearances (2012, 2014 and 2015).

Fergal Hallissey got Beaufort on the scoreboard within the first minute but Spa quickly replied at the other end, Mike Foley opening the Spa account with a well won free from a difficult angle, and Niall O'Mahony soon followed with a point from the same side. Dara Moynihan, who put in a superb performance on Sunday, made it 3 after slipping right through the Beaufort defence and landing the shot straight between the posts. Beaufort were soon attacking however, with Sean O Brien landing a long ball in towards the goalmouth and both Dan O'Donoghue and James Devane got right in front of the ball to block Padraig Doona's shot, and Fergal Hallissey making no mistake with the resulting '45. Mike Foley did well to set up the next attack, playing in to Evan Cronin who landed it straight between the posts. At the other end, a brilliant Liam Carey point was quickly followed by another from Mike Breen to level the game at 0-4 apiece just ten minutes in.

Corner forward Fergal Hallissey edged Beaufort in front again with a well-taken free from 35 yards out, but Shane Cronin responded, bursting through their defence and in the end fisting over the bar. Gary Vaughan was unlucky not to add a score as he kicked a high dropping ball that was cleared by Beaufort keeper Sean Coffey, but Niall McCarthy and Dara Moynihan added two for Spa before the first half water break to hold Spa at a narrow lead of 0-7 to 0-5.

Mike Foley did get a shot in to threaten the Beaufort goal but keeper Sean Coffey did well to knock the ball away from the danger zone. Liam Carey and Spa captain Evan Cronin swapped scores before a brilliant point from Beaufort corner forward Padraig Doona was followed by another from Liam Carey to level the game at 0-8 apiece. The first goal came in the 26th minute,

Evan Cronin with a great run but his effort came back off the upright into the waiting hands of Cian Tobin, who duly finished it to the back of the net. Ronan Murphy kicked the ninth score for Beaufort, before Ciaran Spillane collected a pass from Dara Moynihan and bore down on goal but in the finish opted to punch over the bar. Evan Cronin had another attack on the Beaufort goal but Sean Coffey did will to stop the shot with the Beaufort defence clearing the ball. At half time it was the goal that separated the sides, with Spa leading at 1-9 to 0-9.

Within a minute of the restart Padraig Doona added a point for Beaufort, before Dara Movnihan immediately replied in kind at the scoreboard end. Beaufort did well to deny a promising goal opportunity, Sean Coffey getting a touch as Niall McCarthy caught the end of a move between Dara Moynihan and Evan Cronin, and Gary Vaughan kicked over the '45. Fergal Hallissey added another point for Beaufort before a massive sprint from Shane Cronin was laid off to the waiting Cian Tobin who netted his second goal of the day in the 36th minute to make it 2-11 to 0-11. Padraig Doona and Tobin both added points to the scoresheet before Liam Carey dropped a dangerous shot near the Spa goalmouth, James Devane and Shane Cronin clearing the threat. Following on, a lovely Mike Foley free from 40 yards out increased the Spa advantage. Ciaran Spillane did well to intercept the next kick out and he passed it through to Cian Tobin whose shot ricocheted off the inside of the post and rattled the net once more, his hatrick complete on 43 minutes.

Nathan Breen got close on the Spa goal with a long high ball dropped into the square and he jumped high alongside Spa keeper James Devane, but his touch was just an inch or two too high and it landed just above the crossbar. They were threatening goal again soon after, with Sean O'Brien working the ball dangerously close but it was well blocked and cleared by full-back Eoin Fitzgerald. By the second half water break, Spa had gone eight points clear at 3-13 to Beaufort 0-14

Mike Breen kicked his second of the day, another Beaufort point that just scraped the top of the crossbar before a brilliant point at the other end, Shane Cronin's effort kicked up to the clouds, flying high and over the bar. Ciarán Kennedy and Dan O'Donoghue exchanged points before a great team play from the outstanding Liam Kearney to Evan to Mike McCarthy set David Spillane up for Spa's fourth and final goal in the 54th minute. Ciarán Kennedy, Jack O'Connor and Padraig Doona exchanged scores with Mike McCarthy and Dara Moynihan before Padraig Doona slotted past keeper James Devane in the 59th minute. As injury time began Beaufort were reduced to 14 men and shortly after Evan Cronin kicked the final Spa score, a fine point near the sideline. A late point from Liam Carey at the Lewis Rd end finished the game at Spa 4-18 Beaufort 1-19.

Spa captain Evan Cronin climbed the steps of the Fitzgerald Stadium to collect the Cup from Co Board Chairman Tim Murphy, with Cian Tobin announced as their man-of-the-match after scoring a highly impressive 3-1.

After claiming the 2020 Intermediate title, Spa now step up to compete in the 2021 Senior Club Championship and our first game out will be against neighbours Dr Crokes next Sunday September 19th at 2.30pm in Fitzgerald Stadium. It also means that Spa will compete on their own in the 2021 Co. Championship and will not be part of the East Kerry divisional side this year.



Damien needed to birdie the last to force an extra nine holes with Donnelly and he duly obliged in what became the first extra nine holes in a national senior final since 2010.

Damien went one ahead of Donnelly early in the second playoff and was still one stroke ahead with three to play. It all changed at the seventh hole however as Damien bogeyed and Donnelly birdied to put the Louth player in the ascendancy now. Both players matched each other on the eighth as another bogey on the ninth officially ended Damien's challenge with Donnelly paring his last hole to win the playoff by two. Had Damien won it

would have meant a Kerry player would have won a National Pitch & Putt title at every national event held by Pitch & Putt Ireland in 2021 including the delayed 2020 Strokeplay back in June.

All Ireland Final: Tyrone 2-14 Mayo 0-15 First Quarter

Good start for Mayo. Aidan O'Shea to Tommy Conroy and over. Niall Morgan misjudges the kick-out, hop ball. Good Mayo tackling forces a turnover, '45, Hennelly misses it. Diarmuid O'Connor almost catches the kickout. Great pressure. Frank Burns fouls McLoughlin, Ryan O'Donoghue slots. 0-2 to 0-0. Niall Morgan with a superb long range free. Great score. Tyrone are exerting the pressure now and Pádraig Hampsey sends over a beauty. Burns with a great interception and the whole move ends with Darren McCurry winning and slotting a free. In the 5th minute Mayo have a great goal chance, Bryan Walsh one on one but he takes a bit too much out of it, the rebound comes to Conor Loftus but Niall Sludden clears off the line. Very close to a goal. Ryan O'Donoghue takes a nice point but O hOra fouls McNamee and McCurry slots it. Was it a black card pull down? Not an actual pull down for me, but sure RTE need a bit of drama. God knows they can't produce any themselves. 0-5 to 0-4 in favour of Tyrone.

Second Quarter

Aidan O'Shea finds Tommy Conroy, fouled, and Ryan slots over. Kieran McGeary slots over in response. Both sides are opting for fast kickouts and it's working, but Tyrone are a bit more clinical. A good turnover by Lee Keegan ends with Paddy Durcan scoring. Both sides miss chances, but there is a definite pattern emerging. As I say, both sides are taking short kickouts and going forward fast. Both sides are flooding their defences - both have a kind of rotation where any player can bomb forward when there's space, but his position is never left unmanned. Mayo are trying for quick penetration, tyhough, and it's not working. Aidan O'Shea has always been a great footballer, but hes 'betwixt and between' at eleven. He isn't influencing midfield, and his presence inside is only a temptation to high and risky ball in, which is invariably turned over. I'd take him off, to be honest. Truly great player, but this isn't his kind of game and he's a bit lost. Mayo are a bit gung-ho and over-ambitious; Tyrone are patiently deadly. They are only going for what are called 'high percentage' chances. It shows as Sludden and McCurry slot over, the free won by Mattie Donnelly. Another Tyrone turnover ends with Niall Morgan gathering comfortably and a McCurry goal chance. Good save but Morgan slots the '45, 0-8 to 0-5, Aidan O'Shea wins a free for Ryan O'Donoghue but McCurry wins and slots another. Mayo show composure up front and Stephen Coen nails an absolute beauty before Ryan brings it back to a one point game. Credit to Mayo, they are being outclassed, but they are doggedly resolute.

You'll hear fools question the character of this team....but only fools. Sludden closes out the scoring, though, and Tyrone are definitely full value for their lead.

Half-Time: Tyrone 0-10 Mayo 0-8

Mayo's character is absolutely not open to question. Their ability to convert their chances? Oh, yeah. Everybody knows their Achilles heel, and Tyrone don't need any Greek goddesses pointing it out (there ye are, a high class metaphor!). Conroy goes for goal, should have taken the point, wide. Ryan O'Donoghue hits a free, it's short, scrambled....penalty! Burns picked it straight off the ground, that was a bit careless, to be honest. O'Donoghue goes for it....clips the woodwork and away. Good positioning and movement by Morgan, he made it very difficult. It wasn't a bad penalty effort, in fairness (maybe the half-step should be left to John Aldridge), but there's literally no margin of error in such moments. Some pundits do try to stir the pot subsequently about whether Tyrone players encroached the line or the keeper moved too early.....fair play to Mayo in a hard aftermath for shrugging off that sad nonsense. Joe McQuillan and his team were absolutely outstanding officials all through. Rob Hennelly nails a good free. Despite their misses, Mayo are within a point. McShane must have the highest score to playing time ratio of 2021. Great player. Ryan O'Donoghue takes a Mayo point but already it feels to me like defiance rather than real hope. SEÁN O'SHEA TOP SCORER

Congratulations to Seán O'Shea, top scorer of the 2021 Championship with 2-30 (36) over four games. Darren McCurry was just behind him on 1-30 (33) over five games and Ryan O'Donoghue is third with 2-27 (33) over five



games. Tied scoring is settled by the actual number of scores, i.e. three points is more impressive than a goal. I agree with that. None other than David Clifford with 2-27 (23 in four games). Note the ten point drop from the top three, by the way, being a team's main freetaker clearly makes a huge difference.

Team of the Year (Gavin White, David Moran) Look, RTE threw out their team, and fair play for that. The usual caveats apply, that was their opinion, this is mine, you are perfectly entitled to have yours. This is all subjective. I'm just giving my team.

Niall Morgan (Tyrone). I'm delighted for Hennelly's Croke Park redemption, great keeper, but I expect this to be unanimous.

Lee Keegan (Mayo). Again, I don't anticipate too many dissenters. You can argue about the positioning, but he played with a roving commission rather than guarding the square.

Pádraig Ó hÓra (Mayo). Rarely named there and certainly wasn't locked in one place, but he was the linchpin of Mayo for me while Keegan was a leading light in many areas. His display against Dublin is a highlight of the year.

Padraig Hampsey (Tyrone). Yup. Superstar all year as Tyrone's captain.

Paddy Durcan (Mayo). RTE gave their nod to Sludden and he was great, but I thought he was wayward on a few small occasions. It's a fine margin, but Durcan was consistent excellence all year.

Kieran McGeary (Tyrone). Again, an absolute lock. I would expect him to be Footballer of the Year; he typified Tyrone's never-say-die attitude.

Gavin White (Kerry). RTE went for Peter Harte, but I hope it isn't Kerry bias that makes me say that Gavin White is an absolute lock for me. He should (but won't) win Goal of the Year as well. This isn't personal; I honestly don't think I have ever spoken to Gavin.

David Moran (Kerry), Again, it'll be controversial. but I honestly think he was the most dominant midfielder this year. We won midfield well against Tyrone, our problems were in other areas. No offence to an efficient Conn Kilpatrick, but if we swapped both players, Tyrone would still have won the All Ireland and beaten Kerry more convincingly.

Mattie Ruane (Mayo). Brian Fenton lost his first ever Championship game and is an immortal already. But he wasn't as dynamic at any stage this year. Ruane fully deserves the nod.

Conor Meyler (Tyrone). I don't think he actually 'blotted out' the influential Paudie, that myth took wings fast, but he was superb in every

Ciarán Kilkenny (Dublin). Yes, he got caught up in that second half malaise against Mayo, but over the Championship he was still a revelation. Neither Aidan O'Shea nor Michael O'Neill are in the running for me. Eoin Cleary of Clare was, but I couldn't justify his inclusion on one showing.

Paudie Clifford (Kerry). A phenomenon. By the way, he wasn't a sudden surprise...Peter Keane mentioned monitoring his progress with an injury several times last year in interviews.

Darren McCurry (Tyrone). He absolutely blistered the Ulster Championship from Day One and did big damage in the latter stages. A reliable scoring forward is key to winning All Irelands, no matter what style you play.

David Clifford (Kerry). You can argue that he was quiet enough in Munster. But he was a genuine man of the match contender in our toughest game and his departure with injury was a genuine factor in Tyrone's fully merited victory.

Ryan O'Donoghue (Mayo). Everything I said about McCurry applies to O'Donoghue, and arguably even more so in the absence of Cillian O'Connor. Cormac Costello was in the conversation. Kerry never really played an actual fifteen, it was Paudie wearing the jersey in a different role. Given Paudie's effectiveness. the quote from 'Dirty Dancing' comes to mind -"Nobody puts Paudie in the corner!"

2021 COUNTY RANKINGS

The GAA doesn't have a formal ranking list - it wouldn't want to, given the harsh reality that there has always been a few counties well above the rest. But my list of favourites for Sam Maguire in descending order before the competition commenced would have been Dublin, Kerry, Donegal, Mayo, Tyrone.

It occurred to me when the dust settled that maybe I shouldn't be writing down my opinions at all! I think a fair assessment would have it in almost reverse order! In terms of expectation v reality, we did better than Dublin (they'll learn a hard lesson – despite all the furore over Mayo's victory, I don't think that Blue Tide (that phrase is a bit of a humorous blast from the past for some of us) has suddenly reversed. Also, I had thought Donegal would just about beat Tyrone. Granted, Tyrone were missing some top players on that occasion, but Michael Murphy missed most of that game as well. Donegal are right up there among next year's top contenders.

NEXT KERRY MANAGER

The appointment of Molomphy as Kerry hurling manager was quietly and calmly done, and from the little I know, it sounds very much like they got a superb former player with some great experience in management and ready for the step up. I think it's a great choice.

The appointment of a Kerry football manager, on the other hand, is always a forced drama. Frankly, myths, rumours, and speculation intertwine randomly, with a fair few people talking through their nether regions and people in the know keeping schtum (it's British gangster slang for staying silent).

Kerry have appointed a committee to propose (which actually means 'select'; most County Board Meetings on zoom are fairly anodyne affairs, to be honest) the next manager. That committee consists of Tim Murphy (County Chairman in his last year of tenure), Eamonn Whelan (Vice Chairman and likely to replace Murphy as chairman - although that vote hasn't been held yet), Peter Twiss (County Secretary), John O'Leary (Munster Council Delegate - and much more to Kerry GAA), and Donal Daly (Kerry Games Manager - you know

the great production line of underage talent coming through Kerry? Donal's too modest to take a bow, but he would be entitled to).

The options seem to be Jack O'Connor, who has stepped away from Kildare after a very successful stint and, like his sons, moved back to Kerry. For many of us, stepping back from Kildare after signing a new contract recently was an indication of throwing his hat in the ring. Jack has been a selector or manager for no less than 21 All Irelands at different grades with Kerry teams.

Seamus Moynihan along with Donie Buckley as coach. Seamus Moynihan would make anybody's team of all-time greats. He also has a better CV than many realise, having won two County Minor Championships with East Kerry and managed Glenflesk and Fossa, whom he helped to promotion. But the real powder in that gun barrel is Donie Buckley, recognised as one of the best technical coaches in the sport. Donie was involved in Peter Keane's management early on, but there are queries about how much access he had to players what is certain is that he stepped away without either party offering a real public explanation. Defensive tackling is a speciality of Donie's, and the one area that I feel has been costing us badlv.

Peter Keane, of course, has every right to reapply for the job, and his record is very strong. He took St. Marys to Croke Park, Killarney Legion to a County Final, and Kerry to three minor titles in a row. At senior, he lost by a point in a replay to the greatest team of all time (Kerry's golden years team and the almost forgotten team of the late twenties/early thirties were undeniably great, but statistics trump sentiment), fell to a late ambush on a wet day in the opening round last year (admittedly, with the wrong tactics

on the day) and by a point after losing his best player to injury to a battle-hardened, canny, and very skillful Tyrone who went on to win the All Ireland after beating Cavan, Donegal, Monaghan, Kerry, and Mayo. It's not exactly a bad record, is it? Three games, three points. I don't know the difference between fine margins and vagaries of fate.

Do I have a preference for Kerry's next manager? I know all three are great managers with their only intention being the best for Kerry.

I also know that it's a poisoned chalice and that I, personally, would not touch it with a barge pole. Kerry supporters do not exactly temper expectation with reality and the total blame always falls on the manager. It's ridiculous. Any sports manager is a facilitator for the team to achieve their best. Too many supporters don't appreciate that.

His great grandfather was none other than Paddy 'Carr' O'Carroll, star of Ballyduff and Kerry's first ever All Ireland win back in 1891. Corner forward Luke Rochford's great grandfather James Crowley was on that team. As were the grandfathers of both Kerry footballers Eamonn Fitzmaurice and Pat McCarthy, by the way.

Good luck to both Kilmoyley and St. Brendans in next Sunday's County Final. I think we all know that the holders are favourites, but St. Brendans will definitely take it all the way to the wire.

ROSES



Planting roses this time of the year will give you colour for years to come. Container grown roses can be planted any time of the year but the autumn and springtime are the best.



MINDFUL LIVING

In recent years we have been hearing much about the benefits of Mindfulness and living mindfully. Put simply mindfulness is "Bringing our attention to what is happening in the present moment". The goal of mindfulness is to live life more fully and to appreciate the moments of our lives that pass by all too easily. One author states that "Mindfulness helps us to weather the difficulties we encounter in our lives. It teaches us to steady ourselves in the present moment when we feel stressed". Ruminating about the past or worrying about the future can be exhausting and takes up a lot of energy.

Mindfulness allows us to put on the brakes and spend time just being with what is. It also teaches us to interact with ourselves in a less judgmental and more compassionate way. Research shows that Mindfulness is very helpful for problems such as anxiety, panic, stress and can help people who are prone to recurring depression and low mood. Studies in neuroscience using brain scans - demonstrate how practicing mindfulness meditation can impact on the brain thereby creating beneficial changes in health, mood and behaviour. Mindfulness helps us to explore ways of freeing ourselves from old habits and choosing a different way of being.

So what does it involve? There is a common perception that meditation involves sitting down and not doing anything. However, that is not the case. Meditation is an active training of the mind where awareness is increased. There is an emphasis on relaxation of the body and mind, and the acceptance of feeling and thoughts without judgment.

Mindfulness allows us to become master of our own mind instead of being slaves to our mind. It can be practiced in a regular 'formal' meditation setting - but the great news is, it can also be practice throughout the day - at work, whilst driving, while we are cooking dinner or doing the dishes. Al these situations and many others provide an opportunity for this simple exercise. One simple mindfulness exercise might be when you're stopped at a traffic light. Rather than wishing and hoping the light will change to green - just bring your attention to your body and your breathing. Take one breath in, one breath out. Breathe in to a count of seven and out to a count of eleven.

One of my favourite quotes "life is not measured by the number of breaths we take, but by the moments that take our breath away". Sometimes our lives are so busy or we are wrapped up in worry and thinking we don't recognize those moments. Being a little bit more mindful everyday can help us to attend to these breath-taking simple moments in life. 


