



Killarney Soprano Megan O'Neill Performs At Áras an Uachtaráin

Soprano Megan O'Neill delivered a captivating performance at Áras an Uachtaráin last week, singing for Uachtarán na hÉireann, President Michael D. Higgins, and President of South Africa, H.E. Cyril Ramaphosa, during his official Visit to Ireland.

Representing Irish National Opera, Megan, the daughter of Billy and Patricia O'Neill from Kilcummin, performed a selection of beloved opera classics alongside a stirring rendition of "Mo Ghile Mear", celebrating Ireland's rich musical heritage in front of the two Heads of State.

"It was an absolute honour to sing for the President," Megan told Killarney Outlook, following the event. "This has been a lifelong goal for me and I feel really grateful for this opportunity. It was even more special to sing as Gaeilge at Áras an Uachtaráin."

Following her wedding to Robert Shaw in January, Megan graduated with a Doctor in Music Performance Degree from the Royal Irish Academy of Music and Trinity College Dublin in April 2025, marking a significant milestone in her career.

Earlier this year, she covered the role of Adele in Strauss's Die Fledermaus with Irish National Opera, stepping in for four performances to strong acclaim. Her UK debut followed at



Longborough Festival Opera in July 2025, where she performed the roles of Belinda and ensemble in Dido and Aeneas.

Going forward, Megan, a past pupil of St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary school in Killarney, will continue her collaboration with Irish National Opera, taking on the role of Esmeralda in The Bartered Bride this November. In April 2026, she will headline Patrick Zimmerli's Lucia Joyce at New Music Dublin, performing the titular role in the contemporary work inspired by James Joyce's daughter.

REST IN PEACE PAUDIE

KILLARNEY HAS LOST A LEGEND

The town of Killarney awoke on Saturday morning last to the heartbreaking news that one of its own, Paudie O'Callaghan, had passed away at the young age of 58. A devoted husband and father, Paudie met the newest member of his family only the day before his passing, his beautiful granddaughter, Rubie. Married to his childhood sweetheart Valerie O'Keeffe, their beloved daughter Megan was always the apple of his eye. In the week before his passing, Megan and her partner Killian Spillane welcomed baby Rubie, bringing immense joy to her adoring grandparents. In a bittersweet moment, Paudie met granddaughter just hours before he passed away.

A familiar face to all in Killarney, Paudie was known for his warmth, generosity, and his ever-present smile. The Fáilte Hotel, the family business, shared the sad news in a heartfelt tribute: "It is with a very heavy heart that we say goodbye to our Paudie. On Saturday morning, Killarney awoke to the news of his passing. Paudie will make his way back to

The Fáilte Hotel, his home, his heart, and the place where so many memories were made." As per O'Callaghan family tradition, Paudie was waked in The Fáilte Bar on Monday from 4pm to 7pm. The hotel remained closed as a mark of respect until Monday evening. His funeral cortège arrived at St. Mary's Cathedral on Tuesday morning at 10.20am for Requiem Mass at 10.30am, followed by burial at Aghadoe Lawn Cemetery.

At his funeral, at which An Taoiseach Micheal Martin was represented by his aide-de-camp Commdt Joe Glennon, Minister Michael Healy-Rae, a lifelong friend, delivered a moving eulogy: "The passing of my great friend Paudie O'Callaghan of The Fáilte Hotel is devastating. He was one of life's true gentlemen, full of laughter, loyalty, and heart. Paudie would do anything for a friend, and I was blessed to count him among my very best. Every Saturday before my weekly clinic, Paudie and I would walk the town together, meeting people, chatting, and setting the world to rights. They were simple moments, but they meant the world to me. In recent times, he was so proud to become a granddad. That joy never left his face. People like Paudie don't come around often. He made life better just by being part of it. I'll miss him dearly. Rest easy, my dear friend and thank you for a lifetime of loyalty, laughter, and friendship."

The community of Killarney Celtic was once again rocked to its core by the loss of a true club legend and trustee. "Paudie was an integral part of the essence of Killarney Celtic," the club said. "An outstanding player and force to be reckoned with on the field, he earned the utmost respect of teammates and opponents alike. Later, as a club official and trustee, he was fair, wise, and deeply committed. Much more than a club man, Paudie was a loving husband, father, grandfather, son, brother, uncle, cousin, and friend. His loss is beyond measure. Our sincere condolences to Valerie, Megan, baby Rubie, Killian, his mother Mrs. O'Callaghan, brothers Colm, Michael, and Niall, and all who loved him. Rest in peace, Paudie, gone far too soon, but forever part of the Killarney Celtic story."

St. Paul's Basketball Club also expressed deep sadness at the loss of a former player, sponsor, and lifelong supporter: "Paudie O'Callaghan was a talented basketball player, lining out on St. Paul's first senior men's team in 1985 and starring for the U-19 side that same season. Though his soccer

commitments with Killarney Celtic eventually took priority, Paudie's passion for basketball never faded. Through the generosity of The Fáilte Hotel and the O'Callaghan family, he remained a steadfast supporter and sponsor of the club for nearly 40 years. Paudie's warmth, knowledge, and enthusiasm enriched our community, and his presence will be deeply missed."

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce also expressed their condolences to the extended O'Callaghan family of The Fáilte Hotel on the sad passing of Paudie O'Callaghan.

He played a very active and progressive role in the business life of Killarney right through his life and he was always willing to lend a hand and to contribute positively to whatever positive projects the town was engaged with.

Paudie, of course, spearheaded the Killarney Vintners Association for many years and he was a very able and influential representative for that sector.

His enormous contribution to the sporting life of the town is already well documented and it is clear that he contributed hugely to the town he loved in so many ways.

May he rest peacefully and may his family take comfort from the great contribution he made throughout his all too short life.

Paudie is deeply mourned by his loving wife Valerie, daughter Megan, his granddaughter Rubie, his mother Eileen, Megan's partner Killian, brothers Michael, Colm and Niall, brothers-in-law Ziggy and Giovanni, sisters-in-law Noreen, Eliza, Carol and Kathy, Colm's partner Kat, Dermot's partner Carla, Derry, Neil, Donal, Kathleen, Geraldine and Deirdre, nephews, nieces, relatives, neighbours and many friends.

Killarney has truly lost one of its legends, a man of heart, humour, and humanity whose spirit will live on in the stories, friendships, and memories he leaves behind.



Killarney Woman Honoured with SETU Doctorate for Human Rights Work

Killarney native Elizabeth Riordan-Coppin is to receive an honorary doctorate from South East Technological University (SETU) this month in recognition of her courage and lifelong dedication to human rights and social justice. Born in Killarney, Elizabeth spent part of her childhood in Ireland's industrial school and Magdalene Laundry system. Now based in England, she has become a prominent advocate for survivors, sharing her story publicly and campaigning for justice for over 25 years.

In 2020, her landmark case before the UN Committee Against Torture marked the first brought by a Magdalene survivor, urging Ireland to confront the legacy of institutional abuse.

SETU described her as a woman of "extraordinary courage and integrity," recognising her profound contribution to human rights and social history. Elizabeth will receive the honour alongside athlete John Treacy at SETU's conferring ceremonies later this month.

DEPUTY DANNY HEALY RAE RAISES LOCAL ISSUES IN DAIL EIREANN

Deputy Danny Healy Rae TD had a busy week in Dail Eireann this week, raising topics relevant to his constituents.

Among the topics the deputy raised was:

The extra costs involved for any person who has a disability just to survive and carry on each day. He spoke on the shortage of respite for people with serious disabilities and the need to provide additional respite beds in Kerry. Hel also asked again that the Minister look at Mary of the Angels in Beaufort, which is being closed by stealth and that consideration is given to using this wonderful place and the grounds to expand it for the much-needed respite and residential care beds. He also asked that the Government get the local authorities building again and spread the people out around the different parishes and get back building rural cottages which are not being built at all now. He also asked that something be done for the working people who are trying to build or buy a home for themselves, they are facing issues with planning even if they have a site and are over the threshold to get on the housing list as a couple's income must be below €37,000 this needs to be increased.

He highlighted the issue with housing developments in Kenmare where planning is being refused as there is a shortage of water supply and asked that the Government deal with this urgently as people are leaving the area as they cannot buy a house anywhere.

Deputy Healy Rae also raised the issue of eviction saying that it is clear that, the residential tenancies amendment, with the intention of stabilising rent and protect tenants is creating a bigger problem as many landlords are getting out of the market. He again raised the 14 families in Killarney Loreto Chapel estate who have received notice as the company who owns the 14 properties is selling them.

Lidl Granted Permission for New Store in Killarney

Lidl Ireland GmbH has received conditional planning permission from Kerry County Council for the redevelopment of its existing foodstore at Tralee Road (N22) / Bóthar Hans Liebherr (N72) in the townland of Derreen, Killarney.

The project involves the demolition of the current single-storey Lidl store, which has a gross floor area of 1,787.6 square metres, and the construction of a larger, modern monopitched foodstore with a total gross floor space of 2,631.5 square metres.

The new development will include 1,670 square metres of net retail space, featuring an ancillary off-licence, in-store bakery, and enhanced customer and staff facilities. Plans also provide for a rooftop solar panel array



covering 840 square metres, reflecting Lidl's ongoing sustainability commitments. Externally, the proposal includes 92 surface car parking

spaces (including dedicated spaces for disabled users, parents with children, and electric vehicle charging), as well as 28 bicycle parking spaces. A new ESB substation and switch room building is also planned as part of the site infrastructure. Access to the new store will be via an upgraded entrance from Bóthar Hans Liebherr, with landscaping, boundary treatments, and site drainage works forming part of the overall redevelopment.

The application was submitted on 18 December 2024, with Kerry County Council issuing a conditional grant of permission on 23 September 2025.

Randles Hotel Killarney hits the road in Canada

Randles Hotel Killarney joined 11 other Irish tourism companies this week to promote Ireland to around 300 Canadian tour operators and travel agents.

The roadshow visited London, Hamilton, Oshawa, and Toronto in Ontario, organised by Tourism Ireland and leading Canadian tour operator Royal Irish Tours to celebrate 25 years of collaboration.

THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION: IS THE IRISH LANGUAGE BEING WEAPONISED?

Early opinion polls show a clear divide - half of those under thirty will vote for Connolly whereas older groups are more likely to swing towards Humphreys.

Connolly is doing a good job. It is almost a repeal the 8th in energising youth with t-shirts and all the bells and whistles. She claims it is ground up - despite the fact she has the backing of five political parties including Sinn Fein, the richest party in the State.

The campaign is lively if you have just five seconds of attention and are not that bothered by history. Or facts. There is a "pus" on Catherine and her followers when asked any reasonable question.

Followed by the usual crowding against journalists on line we expect from Sinn Fein's and the Far Left's keyboard warriors.

There is a generation gap in this country that the polls underline. The negotiated hardwon Peace in the North is not really huge for the under-thirties. Younger people have no memory of living in an Ireland blighted by division and tribalism and daily reports of bombings and killings, post offices robbed, tourism crashing and young men "dying for Ireland".

So they won't notice the slide backwards in the weaponsing of language. And it is not just Connolly.

The last time I recall the Irish language being weaponized was during the Hunger Strike marches and rallies when I was a student in UCC. There were marches and people carrying coffins and black balaclavas in Killarney. Flags and tricolors- and the speeches in the Market Cross in Killarney and Patrick Street in Cork would brandish the cúpla focal. Tiocfaidh our lá and the our Father in Irish - which most people couldn't say. To dog whistle the tribe. To mark the division. Dark unsettling times.

Once more the language is being used to "other" opponents, to use Catherine Connolly's

psycho babble and no-one is talking about it. Taoiseach Micheal Martin who graduated in Irish alongside me and who like myself came through the trauma we felt at the hunger strikes to manage to seek unity not division, should call out this backward slide, this abuse of our native language.

But then again some in Fianna Fail are every bit as guilty. I was deeply uncomfortable at the "oral Irish examination" of prospective independent candidates in Aras an Chontae Tralee a few weeks ago by two Fianna Fail councillors. FF in Kerry were never going to vote to allow anyone other than their own Jim Gavin to join the contest. So what was the narrow Irisheenism about? Dev Óg, Eamon O Cúiv is at the same racket now - even the Leaving Cert Irish Heather has is not enough for him, I hear.

Is it any wonder serious minded people are beginning to think the candidate from the Orange side of our flag better represents the Green of Wolfe Tone, Robert Emmet and Daniel O'Connell.

EVICTIONS IN OUR TIME

The Irish language might be on the way back - but so are evictions. 14 families are being evicted in our own Loreto Road.

The evictions of 14 families by a management company for a Cypriot investment company who picked the property up for a relative



song is appalling. But the lack of an outcry to date by our politicians and TDs is also worrying. The media are speaking out and so is the school principal of Loreto's Scoil Bhríde, Brian O'Sullivan.

However I haven't heard too much from our TDs, Government or opposition. Perhaps because the evictions are entirely legal in this State we have created.

It is TDs in the national parliament who decide on legislation. Perhaps they may not be too keen. As we know most TDs in this country have a keen interest in owning houses and see property as wealth rather than as a basic right. One of the few politicians to speak out is local county councillor John O'Donoghue, a neighbour of Loreto. He is putting his finger on the button: rules about multiple ownership are needed.

John told Radio Kerry the practice of allowing single entities or individuals to bulk buy swathes of housing stock should be outlawed.

It was a short-sighted policy to sell off housing stock to companies and his heart goes out to the families in Loreto who are now facing the brunt of the policy.

There is a truth that needs saying and it was put to me when I called up there during the week. Killarney is bringing in much needed workers, many on visas. The town's reputation depends on these people.

I spoke to those facing homelessness. Hard-working people, in Liebherr, hotels, Fexco and other enterprises. They reflect the mix of nationalities we now enjoy in Killarney - Polish, English, Irish, Malaysian, Croatian, Srilankan. One Irish man, a software engineer remarked about the lack of understanding in Killarney. Not everyone is lucky enough to be given a plot, or 50,000 euros by parents, he said.

"There is a lack of understanding in Killarney. Killarney wouldn't be much without chefs and people to work in its service industry. There would be nothing to come for."

HALLOWEEN MEETS CHRISTMAS IN KERRY

The big department stores have gone too far this year. The Christmas decorations and food are on display too early.

I was in one shop in Tralee, last week, The Range. At the entrance I had to duck through a Halloween witches tent with skeletons and bats only to find Christmas baubles on the other side. I mean really? I am not singling out the Range. It is a fine shop and the staff are excellent. Most of the big stores are following the same trend and no one is "batting" an eyelid, excuse the pun.

There is a reason we have seasons and there is a rhythm to the seasons. It is tied to the agricultural year. The moon as well as the sun. The moon waxes and changes in autumn and Halloween marks the moon's ascendancy as it were. The moon is closer to us than the sun this time of year. And it is bigger and nearer the earth. So we have the end of the sun year in Ireland and across the northern hemisphere and the beginning of the moon "year". It takes another number of weeks to get to Christmas when the days are shortest and the sun farthest away.

Festivals Christian or pagan, help us to mark these things.

If you had no religion, and were human in this part of the world, you would understand this. However the big department stores don't seem to get it at all.

I don't want to see Christmas baubles before Halloween is past. I need to see Christmas things in shops to give me a lift in the dark evenings after the light diminishes and the time changes.

Meanwhile there is some light at the end of the tunnel: Killarney's MEP Seán Kelly who has been at the forefront of the battle against the change of time has again put it top of the European Parliament agenda. The seasonal clock is an outdated and unnecessary practice that serves no real benefit. Sean has told the Danish Presidentcy.

In fact, there is scientific evidence there are health effects like heart attacks becasue of the twice yearly switch in time, Seán said. In the meantime, I am already bored with the display in the big shops - not to mention confused.

There should be a Presidential movement for the seasons.

Killarney coffee cup project pushes ahead despite setbacks

The team behind Killarney's pioneering reusable coffee cup initiative has vowed to keep the project alive despite recent challenges and a Government U-turn on the long-promised latte levy.

Two articles published in The Irish Times last week highlighted both the difficulties and the determination surrounding the scheme. The first piece, "Kerry town that banned disposable coffee cups sees project falter amid Government U-turn," detailed the struggles faced by local cafés as some businesses withdrew from the initiative due to pressures from large retailers, non-participating outlets, and the lack of legislative backing.

However, a follow-up article, "Killarney group vows to keep coffee cup ban despite Government U-turn," painted a more hopeful picture. It reported that hotels, coffee shops, schools, and community groups remain committed to making Killarney Ireland's first town free of single-use coffee cups.

Project leads Louise Byrne and Ciara Treacy confirmed this week that they have secured a meeting with the CEO of Kerry County Council and are in contact with Fáilte Ireland and the Department of the Environment to explore further support for small businesses and the wider community effort. In partnership with Voice Ireland, the Killarney group is also



encouraging other towns nationwide to contact their local TDs and push for the introduction of the long-awaited latte levy, legislation that would place a small charge on disposable coffee cups to encourage reusable alternatives. There is a call now for residents and visitors to continue supporting the project and to recognise the environmental and community benefits it has already delivered. "We need you now more than ever to keep this going," said Louise and Ciara. "This project started in Killarney, but it's about creating change across Ireland."

Tributes Paid to the late Dick Henggeler

Kingdom Warrior Crowned Irish Light Heavyweight Champion

Kerry boxer Kevin "The Kingdom Warrior" Cronin captured the Irish Light Heavyweight title on Friday night after a hard-fought victory over Cork's Cathal Crowley at Dublin's National Stadium.

Kevin, from Milltown produced one of the best performances of his career to claim the vacant title by majority decision, with judges scoring the contest 95–94, 97–93, and 95–95.

The bout lived up to expectations, with Crowley starting strongly behind sharp combinations and accurate counterpunching in the early rounds. Cronin, however, applied steady pressure as the fight progressed, landing telling body shots and working his way inside.

Backed by a strong Kerry support, Cronin's persistence paid off in the later rounds as he forced the pace



and took control of the exchanges.

Despite a late rally from Crowley,
Cronin's consistent aggression and

composure earned him the decision, and the Irish title he had long been chasing.

Speaking after the fight, Kevin said: "It means everything. We've had ups and downs, but nights like this make it all worth it. This one's for Kerry, for everyone back home who's believed in me since day one."

The win improves Cronin's professional record to 11–3–1, while Crowley, now 7–1, remains a highly regarded prospect at just 25 years old

Kevin was welcomed home to Killarney over the weekend by supporters, including Jim O'Brien's Bar, one of his sponsors, and Mayor of Killarney Martin Grady.

After years of dedication to the sport, Kevin Cronin now stands proudly as Ireland's Light Heavyweight Champion a well-earned milestone for "The Kingdom Warrior."

New bus routes and afterschool service make school life easier for Killarney families

Killarney Community National School (CNS) has expanded its transport and afterschool options to make school life easier for families across the Killarney area.

Two dedicated school bus routes now serve pupils from Beaufort Bridge, Fossa, Innisfallen, Millwood, Muckross, Ballycasheen, and the Reeks Roundabout, as well as from Firies, Rockfield, Faha, Ballyhar, and Fossa.

The school also operates an afterschool programme until 6pm, providing a flexible and affordable option for parents. Principal Catherine Barry said the new services reflect the school's commitment to inclusion and community connection.

"We know that practical supports can make all the difference for parents. Having reliable transport and afterschool care means families can plan their days with confidence, knowing their children are happy and cared for," she said.

Killarney CNS, under the patronage of Kerry Education and Training Board (Kerry ETB), is a multi-denominational school, meaning it welcomes children of all faiths and none, and teaches the Goodness Me, Goodness You! (GMGY) curriculum instead of single-faith religious instruction. This approach gives children the opportunity to learn about their own beliefs and those of others in an age-appropriate, inclusive way.

The school's ethos also emphasises hands-on learning and environmental awareness. Pupils take part in activities in the school's polytunnel, where they learn about growing food, biodiversity, and sustainability, connecting classroom learning to real-life experiences.

An Open Day will take place on Saturday, October 18th, from 2pm-4pm, where parents can meet teachers, explore the facilities, and learn more about enrolment for Junior Infants 2025 and beyond.

Dear Editor,

With National Brain Tumour Awareness Week coming up from October 20-26, I'd like to draw the attention of your readers to a new awareness campaign being mounted by Brain Tumour Ireland.

As a paediatric oncologist, I hear too often that parents have presented their child multiple times with symptoms and signs before a diagnosis of a brain or spinal tumour is made.

While this doesn't necessarily mean that the outcome is worse, it can be, and a child or young person may have, unfortunately, lost vital functions by the time the diagnosis is made.

Against this backdrop, Brain Tumour Ireland has developed a new Heads Up guide to draw attention to the different types of symptoms in babies, children and teenagers.

We want to remind GPs, doctors and Emergency Department staff, that children can get brain tumours and, while it is rare, brain and central nervous system tumours are the most common childhood cancer, alongside leukaemia, and to keep this in mind when reviewing symptoms.

It's also worth parents considering asking the question of a doctor "can you reassure me that this isn't a brain tumour?"

Brain tumour symptoms can include persistent vomiting, recurring headache, problems with balance and co-ordination, behaviour change, fits or seizures, abnormal eye movements, blurred or double vision/loss of vision, and a wry or stiff neck/head tilt. In babies, there may be increasing head circumference, while other children may experience early, delayed or arrested puberty.

The guide is being published to coincide with a

webinar, "Heads Up: supporting children with a brain tumour" focusing on how to approach conversations with a newly-diagnosed child and their siblings, as well as navigating going back to school following treatment. The webinar will take place on Monday October 20 from 6-7.30pm.

PLANS ANNOUNCED FOR AN ORAL HISTORY ARCHIVE FOR MILLTOWN





All you need to know about the NFQ - the 10 steps up the ladder of Irish Education

SEASON

With the 2025 CAO offer season just ended and the 2026 CAO third level online application facility opening on the 5th November, the college application season will soon be officially up and running for new applicants. Therefore, it's important for those progressing to further and higher education to have a clear understanding of the qualifications, for which they can apply.

AGENCY

Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) is the state agency responsible for further and higher-level qualifications in Ireland. QQI takes responsibility for quality control and standards in further and higher education. It ensures that students achieve qualifications that are valued nationally and internationally. It provides reliable information on the qualifications included in the National Framework of Qualifications (NFO).

FRAMEWORK

The National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ) is a ten-level framework used to describe qualifications in the Irish education and training system. It lists the main qualifications awarded at each level and the pathways from one NFQ level to the next. The NFQ classifies the level, class of award and type of qualifications in Ireland from Level 1 right up to Level 10

BASIC NFQ AWARDS

Level 1 & Level 2 Awards: These awards cover basic literacy and numeracy. They are used for a wide range of people, including the young, the old, and people with intellectual or other disabilities. Adults returning to training or learners with few or no previous qualifications may also study for Level 1 and Level 2 awards.

SECOND LEVEL NFQ AWARDS

Level 3 Award: This is awarded to students who successfully complete the three-year Junior Cycle. It's a prestigious award as a public exam of the State Examinations Commission (SEC), the statutory body with responsibility for the operation of the state certificate exams. Very few students now leave school at the end of Junior Cycle, with the vast majority progressing on to study for the Leaving Cert exam. This year's Junior Cycle results were released last week and were excellent. As always, Junior Cycle exam results in Kerry were superb and well ahead of the last year's very high achievement due to the expansion of top grade bands. 73,336 candidates

nationwide, including 2,193 from Kerry, sat the Junior Cycle exam in 2025 compared to 72,833, including 2,186 from Kerry, in 2024.

Level 4 Award: The Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA), a Level 4 Award, is a distinct, self-contained two-year Leaving Certificate programme, which is strongly vocational. The subject areas are more practical than academic. It's a public exam of the SEC.

Level 5 Award: Both the traditional Leaving Certificate and the Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme (LCVP) are a Level 5 Award. Both awards are a pathway to the world of work but more commonly used for entry to further and higher education. They are public exams of the

THIRD LEVEL NFQ AWARDS

Level 6 Award: This a two-year Higher Certificate at third level education. It can be applied for through the Central Applications Office (CAO). Level 7 Award: This is an Ordinary Bachelor Degree at third level. It's available as a three-year ab initio option through the CAO or may be added on to a Higher Certificate.

Level 8 Award: This is an Honours Bachelor Degree at third level. Its available as an ab initio option of four years duration – some Honours Degrees last for 3 or 5 years – through the CAO or can be built up from Level 6 and/or Level 7, usually known as the 'ladder system.'

Levels 9 and Level 10 Awards: Having obtained an Honours Bachelor Degree (Level 8), some graduates progress to postgraduate studies for a Master Degree (Level 9) or a Doctoral Degree (Level 10), but that is a matter for a few years hence.

FURTHER EDUCATION NFQ AWARDS

Level 5 & Level 6 Awards: Colleges of Further Education & Training (FET) throughout the country offer Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses leading to awards at Certificate (Level 5) & Advanced Certificate (Level 6). PLC courses in the Further Education and Training (FET) system provide a connection between 2nd level education and 3rd level education. Each year, a quota of places is reserved by CAO for applicants from the PLC sector. CAO provides a link to FET options available to post-second level applicants on the "Further Education and Training & Apprenticeship" hub on the CAO website.

THE TERTIARY DEGREE

The National Tertiary Office (NTO) was established to coordinate further and higher education progression pathways from Further Education & Training (FET) courses to Higher Education Institutions (HEI). Tertiary Degrees are co-designed and co-delivered by the Education and Training Boards (ETB) and HEIs and they offer guaranteed pathways from further education to higher education, which are driven by an applicant's career interests rather than points achieved in the Leaving Cert exam. Tertiary Degrees look beyond grades and points. They provide a definite path to a third level qualification. Students can start studying in a local ETB and graduate from a Higher Education Institution with the dual benefits of both campuses throughout.

Killarney Ladies claim Inaugural Kingdom Cup Victory



BLURRED VISION

When you have blurred : were looking through an oily vision, your eyesight is less sharp and objects, images and words seem to be out of focus.

Who is affected by blurred vision?

Anyone can be affected by blurred vision. It could be a sign of getting older and/ or needing new glasses, tiredness, or too much sun. But there are many other causes, and it could be one of the symptoms of a range of conditions including:

• Short-sightedness (myopia), long-sightedness

(hyperopia),

astigmatism and presbyopia

 An eye injury which may have

scratched the cornea

- Foreign object in the eye
- Eye drops
- Drv eve
- Cataracts
- Age-related macular degeneration
- A migraine

Blurred vision can also be a symptom of non-optical conditions such as a diabetes, a stroke and preeclampsia (a condition caused by high blood pressure in pregnancy).

What are the symptoms of blurred vision?

Blurred vision is hazy and unfocussed, as though you

film and you feel you need to rub your eyes to get things back into focus.

It can affect your entire field of vision or your peripheral vision (the edges of your vision), and can occur in one eye or both. You may not realise that you have blurred vision in one eye until you do something that requires shutting your other eye – for example, doing your make up. This is because your brain provides compensation.

How do you treat blurred vision?

As blurred vision has many possible causes, the treatment will depend on the condition. If the blurring is recurring or ongoing, you should book an eye examination. This will investigate the cause recommend suitable treatment or refer you to an appropriate specialist.

If you think it may be one of the symptoms of a serious medical condition such as stroke or pre-eclampsia, you should seek urgent medical

"63-Year-Old Reality Check" campaign urges early action on heart health

As the average age of patients presenting to Rapid Cardiac Care is just 63, Blackrock Health is encouraging people to take be 'Heart Smart' in midlife*

New data from Blackrock Health has shown that the average age of patients attending its Rapid Cardiac Care service is just 63, a stark reminder that heart problems can often emerge earlier than many people expect and are not solely an "older person's" issue.

Cardiovascular disease (CVD) remains the leading cause of death worldwide. The most recent data shows that nearly 9,000 people in Ireland die from CVD each year, despite evidence that up to 80% of premature cases are preventable.

On the back of this data, Blackrock Health has launched the "63-Year-Old Reality Check" to encourage people to be 'Heart Smart' and give their heart health the attention it deserves earlier in life.

Dr Daniel O'Hare, Consultant Cardiologist at Blackrock Health outlines some of the most common cardiovascular conditions, how to look after your heart and what to do if you experience cardiac symptoms.

Q&A with Dr Daniel O'Hare, Consultant Cardiologist at Blackrock Health

Dr Daniel O'Hare, Consultant Cardiologist at Blackrock Health says: "Heart disease and cardiac issues are not just an issue for older people. We are increasingly seeing risk factors and diagnoses in patients in their 40s and 50s. Stress, high blood pressure, raised cholesterol and a sedentary lifestyle can all have serious consequences if left unaddressed. Recognising the signs early and taking proactive steps can save lives."

What are the most common cardiovascular conditions, and what causes them?

"The most frequent reasons that people present to our Rapid Cardiac Care service include chest pain, arrhythmias and heart failure. Cardiovascular problems are often linked to risk factors including inactivity, smoking, obesity and family history. They may also develop silently over time due to atherosclerosis, which is the gradual build-up of fatty deposits in the arteries."

When do things start to change, and at what age should heart health become a real priority?

"From your 40s onwards, the long-term impact of lifestyle habits often starts to surface. For those who are sedentary, smoke, or have an unbalanced diet, this may translate into high blood pressure, raised



cholesterol or even diabetes. At the same time, many people in their 40s are juggling demanding, stressful routines, and stress-related symptoms can sometimes disguise an underlying cardiac issue. It's a stage of life when paying closer attention to your heart becomes essential."

Which symptoms should never be ignored, regardless of age?

Dr O'Hare explains: "Many assume it is 'normal' to feel breathless when climbing stairs, struggle with housework, or tire easily during exercise, but this is not always the case. Chest pain, shortness of breath, dizziness and unusual fatigue should never be dismissed as signs of ageing. These symptoms may signal an underlying heart problem and warrant immediate medical attention."

How important is early diagnosis in cardiovascular disease?

"Early detection can change the course of a patient's life. Identifying heart issues before a cardiac event such a heart attack, for example, allowing us to intervene with medication and, importantly, support people to make lifestyle changes that can reduce risk or manage the condition."

If symptoms are silent, how can people seek help early?

"From the age of 40, a cardiac check-up should form part of routine health screening with your GP. For people with additional risk factors such as high blood pressure, high cholesterol, obesity, diabetes, smoking, a sedentary lifestyle or a family history of heart

disease, regular monitoring is especially important. Agreeing the right frequency of consultations and tests with your healthcare provider depending on your history is essential for prevention."

Is it ever "too late" to change lifestyle habits?

"Never. It is always the right time to introduce regular physical activity, adopt a balanced diet, stop smoking, and reduce or eliminate alcohol. The benefits go far beyond test results, people report improved energy, better sleep, and an overall sense of wellbeing. Both physical and mental health improve significantly."

If someone is worried about their heart health or experiencing concerning symptoms, what should they do?

"If you notice chest pain, shortness of breath, dizziness or an irregular heartbeat, it's vital not to ignore these warning signs. The earlier you are assessed, the better the outcomes", reinforces the Dr O'Hare.

DAIL VISIT FOR KERRY SOCIAL FARMING

Representatives from Kerry Social Farming (KSF) appeared before the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Agriculture and Food on 8th of October 2025. Following an invitation from the Committee, facilitated by Danny Healy-Rae TD, KSF Working Group Chairman Éamon Horgan, Joseph McCrohan KSF Manager and KSF participant Brendan O'Sullivan addressed the Committee, with host farmers Bernadette O'Donoghue (Valentia) and Berend Vroom (Glencar) together with Ellen O'Donoghue (Valentia) social farming participant, also present on the day. They outlined the origins and development of social farming in Kerry and the vital difference which it is making to the lives of so many.

The group urged the Committee to press the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine for additional funding for Kerry Social Farming, in advance of end of the current funding cycle in 2026. They answered detailed questions from Committee members on the operation of the voluntary model and how it is proving successful to a level where 40 farms, together with 3 community allotments and gardens across Kerry are currently taking 60 participants each week. These farms achieved over 1,800 social farming days in 2024 the highest in any county.

Additional funding is needed to allow for further expansion so that existing participants and host farms can be supported and new farms recruited to meet demand from over 80 people with disabilities looking to go social

Households ripped off by price gouging energy companies - Pa Daly TD

Sinn Féin spokesperson on Climate, the Environment and Energy, Pa Daly TD, has slammed the government for failing to hold energy companies to account as households are crippled by sky-high energy costs. His comments come has new International Energy Agency (IEA) figures confirm that the gap between Irish retail prices and wholesale costs is the largest in Europe.

Deputy Daly called on the government to implement Sinn Féin's proposals to rein in profit hungry energy companies.

Commenting on a report published by the IEA, Teachta Daly said:

"The IEA's analysis confirms what Sinn Féin has been saying for some time. Consumers are being ripped off and the government refuses to do anything to stop it.

"Not only are Irish households paying some of the highest electricity prices in Europe, we also have the largest gap between the cost of power and what people are paying.

"The retail price is a staggering three times higher than the average wholesale price. On average, Irish households pay around \$0.45 according to the IEA. \$0.33 goes towards the energy component. Alarmingly, this means the gap between market costs and retail bills far exceeds the European average.

"Sinn Féin has been pointing for years now that there is something deeply wrong with how Ireland's energy market operates.

"For example, the cost of energy has fallen much slower here to reflect wholesale price decreases during 2023 and 2024.

"Unlike other European energy companies, Irish suppliers chose to keep prices high. And over recent weeks, there has been a spate of increases across the board.

"This is yet another body blow to Irish households who are barely making ends meet. "I have argued time and time again that it doesn't have to be this way.

"The structural failures in our energy market can be fixed.

"However, the desire and the political will must be there. Fianna Fáil, Fine Gael and the Lowryled Regional Independents however, are more concerned with the corporate balance sheet than with the needs of ordinary workers and families. "Successive governments have ignored Sinn Féin's proposals to hold energy companies to account and put a stop to such rampant price gouging.

"Sinn Féin has several proposal, including legislation to strengthen the energy regulator's power to do its job properly and hold energy companies to account. Fairness and affordability should be the heart of Ireland's energy market, rather than profiteering.

"Until such meaningful structural reforms are implemented to bring down prices for good, the government should have continued to provide electricity credits. Emergency supports should not have been withdrawn precisely as Ireland's energy crisis deepens. Ripping away supports while prices are skyrocketing is not only cruel, it also proves yet again just how cynical many of the commitments made by the government parties during the election were.

"I am calling on Fianna Fáil, Fine Gael and the Regional Independents to keep their election promises to their constituents to tackle Ireland's exorbitant energy costs. They must adopt Sinn Féin's proposals to hold energy companies to account."

Although Kerry FC needed a result, it could be argued that Harps needed it just as much, which set up what promised to be an exciting encounter in the north west on a Monday night.

Monday night.
The game kicked off under the coo.
Donegal evening sky in Ballybofey,
as Colin Healy's men looked the sharper
and more composed of the two sides,
quickly asserting their rhythm and tempo
on proceedings. The visitors moved the ball
confidently through midfield, showing real intent
to take control of the match from the opening

whistle. In the twelfth minute, Kerry FC appealed for a penalty when a potential handball occurred inside the Finn Harps box. The incident caused a moment of tension among the home supporters, but referee Darragh White waved away the appeals, deciding there had been no infringement. It was an early sign that Kerry FC were looking dangerous whenever

they pressed forward.

By the twenty-minute mark, Kerry FC's dominance in possession was evident. They dictated play, moving the ball with purpose and keeping Finn Harps largely pinned in their own half. The visitors' midfield trio worked tirelessly to maintain control, and it appeared only a matter of time before their pressure yielded a breakthrough. However, as the first half progressed, the game began to settle into a cagier rhythm.

Approaching the half-hour mark, the intensity began to shift slightly, with both sides becoming more cautious in their approach. The earlier fluency in Kerry's play was met by increased defensive organisation from Finn Harps, who were gradually finding their footing in the match. It became a tactical battle, with neither team willing to take unnecessary risks.

In the thirty-fourth minute, Kerry FC had a promising opportunity from a free kick after Oran Crowe was fouled just outside the area. Crowe himself stepped up to take it, but his effort sailed narrowly over the crossbar, drawing a sigh from the Kerry faithful who had made the long trip north. It was another reminder of Kerry's growing threat around the box. Moments later, a scramble inside the Finn Harps

area in the thirty-seventh minute had hearts in mouths for the home supporters. The ball bobbled dangerously around the six-yard box, but the Harps defenders reacted quickest to clear their lines, denying Kerry what would have been a deserved opener. Kerry continued to probe, maintaining composure and recycling possession intelligently, while the hosts relied on counter-attacks that rarely tested the visiting defence. Four minutes before the break, Finn Harps carved out a decent chance when

Then came the turning point. In the forty-second minute, Kerry FC were awarded a penalty after Oran Crowe was brought Jown inside the area. A tangle of legs in the box left referee Darragh White with little hesitation as he pointed straight to the spot. It was a deserved opportunity for the

visitors after sustained pressure throughout the half.

Up stepped Luke Palmer, showing composure beyond his years. Palmer sent Barbosa the wrong way, calmly slotting the ball into the bottom left corner. The away end erupted in celebration as Kerry FC finally took the lead their performance merited. It was Palmer's assuredness from twelve yards that separated the two sides as the first half drew to a close.

The second half began at a blistering pace, with both sides determined to seize the initiative. Kerry FC continued where they had left off, moving the ball crisply and maintaining possession, while Finn Harps emerged with renewed energy after the break. It quickly became an open, end-to-end contest as both teams sought to make an early impact.

In the fifty-fourth minute, the visitors again found themselves in control, with their midfield trio dictating the tempo. Despite this, Finn Harps looked more dangerous in transition, hinting at their potential to exploit any lapse in Kerry's concentration. Manager Colin Healy made his first change of the night in the fifty-eighth minute, introducing Cian Brosnan in place of Ryan Perez, a move designed to inject pace and fresh legs into Kerry's attacking play.

Just two minutes later, Kerry came close to doubling their advantage. A deflected shot from Finn Barrett looped over the bar, forcing a corner. The resulting delivery caused chaos inside the Harps' box, with several Kerry players trying to bundle the ball home, but the hosts eventually managed to clear the danger. It was another near-miss for Healy's men.

Kerry continued to threaten, particularly down the left flank where Ronan Teahan was proving a handful. In the sixty-fourth minute, Teahan whipped in an excellent cross that found Sam Aladesanusi in space. The centre half met it with a strong header, but unfortunately, his effort flew over the crossbar. It was a gilt-edged chance that could have sealed the game for the visitors.

Colin Healy made another substitution in the sixty-seventh minute, replacing goal scorer Luke Palmer with Daniel Okwute. The change aimed to maintain energy up front and ensure Kerry retained their pressing intensity. However, just when Kerry appeared comfortable, the game was turned on its head.

Finn Harps found an equaliser. After what Kerry players, staff and supporters alike felt was a harshly awarded free kick, the ball was delivered to the back post, where Shaun Bradley managed to bundle it over the line following a scramble. It was a scrappy goal, but it brought the hosts level at 1–1 and reignited the contest. Kerry was left frustrated, feeling that the initial foul had been soft, yet they now faced the challenge of restoring their advantage.

The equaliser injected fresh tension into the game. The atmosphere at Finn Park grew more electric as both sets of supporters sensed there might still be a twist to come. Kerry FC continued to press forward in search of a winner, while Finn Harps looked to hit on the counter.

In the seventy-ninth minute, the tension was palpable as the game edged into its final stages. Kerry's defence remained alert, but the midfield battle intensified. Tony McNamee went close for Finn Harps in the eighty-second minute, rising to meet a cross with a powerful header that forced Kerry goalkeeper Darragh Foley into an excellent save.

Kerry responded almost immediately. In the eightythird minute, Daniel Okwute, who had been lively since his introduction, whipped in a teasing cross that narrowly missed the outstretched Cian Brosnan at the far post. Just two minutes later, Okwute again delivered dangerously into the box, and this time his cross nearly caught out goalkeeper Barbosa, who reacted just in time to palm the ball clear. Kerry was pushing hard for a late winner, showing tremendous spirit and determination.

As the clock ticked toward full-time, Colin Healy made his final change in the eighty-seventh minute, sending on Luke Doolan to replace Finn Barrett, a move designed to bring fresh energy for the closing moments.

When the fourth official indicated six minutes of additional time, both teams threw everything forward. Kerry sought to restore their lead with direct, purposeful play, while Finn Harps dug deep to hold their ground. Despite Kerry's best efforts, with Okwute again instrumental in several attacking moves, they were unable to find the decisive goal. When the final whistle blew, the game ended Finn

Harps 1–1 Kerry FC. It was a hard-fought contest that saw Kerry FC dominate large spells but ultimately share the spoils after a moment of misfortune.

Kerry FC now look ahead to their season finale on Friday night when they take on Bray Wanderers in the Carlisle Grounds to bid farewell the 2025 season.

It was pretty much point for point for a lot of the first half, Stacks leading by 0-6 to 0-5 with ten minutes to go in the half. Kenmare were struggling around the middle, where Joe O'Connor showed why he is a nominee for Footballer of the Year and Ben Murphy....look, there are two players in Ulster I'll be watching out for in the next couple of years, but the last player I saw that showed the potential of Ben Murphy was a lad named David Clifford. I'm not exaggerating in the slightest; this guy has been a phenomenon. I'm normally very careful when talking about young players, I think hype is generally very unfair on them in terms of expectation, but ye all know about him already. The rumour mill says that he will be signing for Brisbane shortly; I have no idea whether that's true. But if he and O'Connor keep playing like this, he could have a County Championship medal by then anyway.

Stacks probably should have been more than a point ahead. As it was, Cian Purcell nipped on after Kenmare failed to clear their lines and struck for a goal (Cian has been doing that all year as well, a very under-rated forward) and they added three points, while Daniel Kirby crashed a shot off the crossbar. Seán O'Shea did send over a two pointer to leave Kenmare trailing by 1-10 to 0-9.

Kenmare did dominate the third quarter and, very much to their credit, actually battled their way back level, with Seán O'Shea and young Jack 'Atlantic' O'Sullivan leading the charge. That set up the idea of an exciting finish, but an unperturbed Austin Stacks coolly and calmly found another gear. Joey Nagle's introduction was key, as was Paddy Lane notching three points to take his personal tally to 0-6 s well as forcing a superb save. I took absolutely nothing away from the Milltown game, but Kenmare were a different proposition. It took a very good team to beat them. I've said consistently that it was a year of injury that took Stacks down to Intermediate, and they are back with a bang. Fair enough, Dylan Casey is away travelling, and of course he's a loss, but Tansley, Jack and Ben Murphy, Paddy Lane, Ronan Carroll, Conor Horan, Daniel Kirby, Armin Heinrich, along with proven campaigners like Ronan Shanahan, Joe O'Connor, Cian Purcell....

Fair enough.. But the obvious rejoinder is that Rathmore have Fionn Murphy, Fionn Holohan, Cathal Ryan, Andrew and Pádraig Moynihan, Ciarán Collins (who has been in superb form) to go with the likes of Shane and Mark Ryan, the Dineens, experienced campaigners like Brendan O'Keeffe, Brian Friel, Mark Reen, and John Moynihan. SOCCER WORLD CUP OUALIFIER: PORTUGAL 1 IRELAND 0

I didn't actually get around to watching it until Monday, as there was so much going on in so many sporting codes over the weekend. But if I'm being truthful, it just wasn't a high enough priority. I could get over the Irish soccer team being fairly limited if Irish soccer was well run, and I do sympathise with the managers and players, given that supporters' expectations so often exceed ability. Credit to the big Irish support in Lisbon. To me, there was a certain inevitability about proceedings.

I think in a way that the Armenia defeat did us a bit of a favour in exposing the myth that Ireland are as good as we were a generation ago but successive managers (a lot of them) have someow failed to capitalise. It's just not true; it hasn't been for a long time. We aren't going to the World Cup. And from the sounds of it, we might actually be better off, given the political as well as actual climate in the USA right now. Ireland played fine. Yes, ultra-defensively - what were you expecting? We had zero corners all game. Portugal had two in the opening minutes. They battered us all night. And still, a doggedly stubborn Ireland, outclassed but unvielding, hung on. Caoimhín Kelliher's penalty save lads, Cristiano Ronaldo is apparently soccer's first billionaire, he's only playing for his place in the history books and he wanted goals against Ireland. That's twice we have denied him from the penalty spot. But, just like the last time, Portugal came up with a winner in injury time. Fair enough. We weren't good enough, but we were as good as we can be, and right now I'll happily take that.

WORLD CUP QUALIFIERS IRELAND 1 ARMENIA 0

Ireland lined out in a 5-2-3 formation and looked lively at the start. Seamus Coleman won an early free turned behind for an early corner. It's a real chance, Smallbone sending it across and Nathan Collins rising high to meet it, but he can't direct the header on target. An early goal would have given Ireland a huge confidence boost.

Confidence, for obvious reasons, is clearly an issue. Ireland's front three soon get sucked into midfield and even behind that. Long ball to Evan Ferguson is just another way of saying that Ireland are persistently giving the ball back to Armenia and it feels like a bit of a siege. In fact, Ferguson's few touches are in Ireland's half; that's a serious sign of a team being totally outplayed. The only thing is that for all their possession, Armenia aren't really creating any danger, one tame effort comfortably gathered by Kelliher is all they have to show.

Festy Ebosele is the one player who looks willing to take Armenia on down the wing. He sets up a chance for Ryan Manning – the shot is way off but at least Armenia are on the back foot.

With five minutes left in the half, Nathan Collins and Caoimhín Kelliher each wait for the other to deal with the ball and Armenia very nearly nip in for a giveaway goal, but Kelliher recovers just in time. Look, that's just silly stuff, you'd call that a fairly basic error at KDL standard. A minute later Spertsyan is unmarked at the back post and

shoots wide – that was also bad defending, but that was a chronic attempt at a finish. Any World Cup team needs to be burying the like of that in the net.

Half-time. That was a really, really poor half for Ireland. One of these team is ranked 105th in the world; it looks very much like the rankings have got it the wrong way around.

Early in the second half, Ireland get a huge boost, and it's not of their own making. Barseghyan with a headbutt on Finn Azaz, and he's gone. That's just bizarre, absolutely no need for it, and it's likely to cost Armenia hugely. Or so I hope.

Great cross, and Nathan Collins heads it well, only to be denied by the crossbar. That was unlucky, in fairness. Collins is looking like the Shnae Duffy of old, our main threat through route one ball. Grand, I'll gladly take it if he can nod a hit-and-hope home.

Good corner by Ryan Manning and Dara O'Shea heads it well, but the keeper lunged to scrape it out. Good attack, great save. Ireland, with the extra man, are actually starting to play a bit of soccer. Haven't seen that in a while!

Coleman out, Ogbene in. Ebosele out, Troy Parrott in. Good calls by Hallgrimmson, it's time to get more ambitious in Armenia's half. We need to win, spare me any nonsense about a draw.

70 minutes gone, Finn Azaz to Eva Ferguson for his first goal chance of the night. The keeper saves it, but Ireland are asking the right questions.

And get the right answer just one minute later. Will Smallbone gathers, sends in a beautiful cross, and Ferguson's instincts kick in as he darts ahead of his marker and heads home. 1-0.

The crowd in the Aviva have been relatively subdued for most of the night, quite understandably, but they are rocking now.

Another Irish corner, and another headed effort by Nathan Collins, but it loops away from goal. That's fine, as long as the play stays up at that end, I don't really care.

Idah is just on the pitch and fires a great shot, but the keeper saves it. He's good, in fairness, there wasn't a lot he could have done about the one that got past him and that's his second great save.

Idah is hungry and does find the net after Troy Parrottput him through, but it was offside.

Six minutes added time. Six? Jaysus, lads, do not let this one get away.

And they don't.

Look, after four games, we are just behind Hungary in the table. We're not catching Portugal and I don't think anybody thought we really would. But Hungary? They are playing really well, having just drawn 2-2 with Portugal, but we have a chance. KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

Ith the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.




This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

AUTUMN PLANTING

We are entering a great time of the year for planting bare rooted trees, hedging, fruit bushes, roses and root balled conifers.

The bare rooted planting season lasts from November until March. The reason for this is that the trees and hedging are dormant at this time of year, so you can't really do any damage when you are lifting or planting. When planting bare rooted, as a general rule, plant about three plants per meter, roses can also be purchased and planted bare rooted as can fruit trees and fruit bushes. The main thing when planting bare rooted trees and hedging is that when you purchase them and if you are not going to plant them straight away, you will have to heel them into the ground. By this I mean you will have to dig a hole, place the plant in and cover the roots with earth to stop them drying out.

When hedging plants, roses and fruit bushes, they will usually come in bundles and will be tied together, so you don't have to separate them, just put the whole bundle

But this deal is long from it, but it is worth trying.


I would love to see it working, but I have my doubts,

Ireland's 2026 Oscar Contender Sanatorium, a Powerful Story of Modern Ukraine, Comes to KIFF

Director Gar O'Rourke's documentary Sanatorium will be screened at the Kerry International Film Festival (KIFF) with the support of local development company NEWKD.

The screening will take place on October 19 at the Killarney Cinema. The event will be opened by the Ambassador of Ukraine, H.E. Larysa Gerasko. The screening is made possible through the efforts of the SICAP program, supported by NEWKD, and will be offered free of charge to the entire community.

"It is important for us to build bridges between communities in Kerry. This film will bring the Irish and Ukrainian communities closer together, giving them a deeper understanding of what life is like in Ukraine during the war. It is particularly meaningful that free tickets were distributed equally between Ukrainians and the local community, this is a real integration event. We are grateful to KIFF for such a wonderful collaboration and are delighted to welcome the Ambassador of Ukraine to our joint event," said Robert Carey, Programme Manager of SICAP at NEWKD.



"We're honoured to partner with NEWKD and to have the opportunity to bring Sanatorium to Kerry audiences. Incredibly moving and often very funny, it's an absolute treat to watch. It's a tale of friendship, healing, and hope, showcasing moments of comfort amidst ongoing destruction, as we bear witness to a cast of unique individuals and the ways in which they aspire to move forward in the face of such adversity. We cannot wait to screen it on the big screen in Killarney," said Amy Louise O'Callaghan, Festival Programming Director. Sanatorium is a 2025 Irish documentary film directed by Gar O'Rourke.

The film tells the story of the visitors and staff of the Ukrainian sanatorium Kuyalnik, who, despite the war, continue to seek healing, love, and hope for a normal life. It portrays how people find resilience and humanity in difficult circumstances, adapting to the war and preserving their culture.

Filmed in 2022, Sanatorium premiered at the Docudays UA Festival and was released in the UK and Ireland in 2025, where it is also a contender for a 2026 Oscar nomination.

Respite in Kerry



St Mary of the Angels and St Francis Special School in Beaufort, in the heart of County Kerry is a very special place, with lands generously donated by the Doyle family, specifically for children with profound disabilities and special needs and the Doyles should have their wishes followed through. There are services there, empty buildings, 30 acres of prime land that can be developed without land purchase costs being a negative factor, according to Kerry TD Michael Cahill. "The special needs community in Kerry has

a major respite crises and families don't have time to wait and the grounds at St Mary of the Angel's should be made accessible now. Families need help, they are not asking for full time residential care but respite care, a break, a helping hand" said Deputy Cahill.

"The Doyle family, who so generously donated these lands for children with profound disabilities and special needs, should have their wishes followed through. There are services there, empty buildings and 30 acres of prime land" stated the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People and Tourism.

"A bespoke approach has to be used in considering the individual needs of many of the children that attend St. Francis Special School and many of the children in the county with profound needs need a safe haven where they can roam the grounds freely and St Mary of the Angels offers this" said Deputy Cahill.

"I have accompanied a number of Ministers on visits to the Campus in recent times, to show them the valuable asset that is at the disposal of our Disability Health Service providers, in an effort to ensure the present service and additional respite capacity will operate there. A working group has been formed with St. John of Gods, the HSE, representatives of the residents of St Mary of the Angels, representatives of St Francis Special School and I implore them to see the logic in what we propose in Beaufort" stated Deputy Cahill.

"Parents are worn out and at the end of their tether and this needs to be dealt with expeditiously and in an environment of co-operation between the relevant Government Departments of Health, Disability, Education etc., We need to get this across the line very urgently and put permanently in place" said Deputy Cahill.

"As of now Cunamh Iveragh respite in Cahersiveen is only Fri -Sun , running at half capacity, 2 adults only per night instead of 4. The issue is staffing and the HSE will not release funding to open full time. The St Mary of the Angels and St Francis Special School campus is available and should be utilised as parents are crying out for overnight respite. Co-operation and compassion could see this done and quickly "added Michael Cahill TD.

Currow Rural Development, in association with Killeentierna Parish Church are organising a "Clean-Up" at St Michael's Cemetery, Currow on Saturday, 25th October. This will be an all day event. Everyone is invited to attend to help maintain and tidy up around their own family graves and adjacent pathways. We want to prioritise this event prior to the blessing of graves for the Holy Souls on Sunday, 2nd November at 11am by Fr. Gerard O'Leary. This new initiative was first held last May and was a huge success. We will continue to look after those who looked after us. Looking forward to your support on the day.



POWERFUL NOVENA TO THE SACRED HEART


0 my Jesus, you have said:

"Do not withhold good from those who deserve it when it's in your power to help them. If you can help your neighbour now, don't say 'come back tomorrow and then I'll help you'. Don't plot harm against your neighbour for those who live nearby trust you. Don't pick a fight without reason when no one has done you harm" (Proverbs 3:27-30 NLT).

Welcome back dear student as the song says...everybody needs good neighbours. To have good neighbours, one must be a good neighbour. But in God's eyes it's not just those you live close to; the Word is quite clear - God closely watches our treatment of others. And others watch too. How we do anything, is how we do everything. "Owe nothing to anyone-except for your obligation to Love one another. If you love your neighbour, you will fulfil the requirements of God's Law. For the Commandments say, You must not commit adultery. You must not murder. You must not steal. You must not covet.' These - and other such commandments, are summed up in this one commandment: 'Love your neighbour AS yourself.' Love does no wrong to others, so love fulfils the requirements of God's Law. This is all the more urgent, for you know how late it is; time is running out. Wake up, for our Salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. The night is almost gone; the Day of Salvation will soon be here. So, remove your dark deeds like dirty clothes, and put on the shining armour of right living" (Romans 13:8-12 NLT). That's a great picture - removing dark deeds like dirty clothes. When our dothes get dirty from working or eating, one cannot wait to get out of them and get washed — it's a great sensation; putting on fresh clean clothes and feeling spotless. It gives you clear headspace and renewed vigour and outlook. This is what leaving behind old sinful patterns and mindsets will do when we replace them with the ways of God. Two weeks ago, we studied how God's prophet Isaiah, became distressed in the Presence of God at his filthiness. And how a burning coal from the Mercy Seat that touched his lips made him clean (Isaiah 6:1-7). It's interesting that it was Isaiah's lips that were touched, as it's most often by the words of our mouths that we are contaminated with Satan's muck, and that we defile others - with poisonous words. Jesus warned 'but I tell you that men will give an account on the Day of Judgment for every careless word they have spoken. For by your words, you will be acquitted, and by your words you will be condemned" (Matthew 12:36-37).

Sure, some folks are not easy to be around and may have a bad attitude - but that shouldn't dictate ours! All through the Word, God specifically calls out strife, unforgiveness and bitterness because it's against His nature and character (Leviticus 19:16-18). Even while dying on the Cross having been rejected, mocked, hated, cursed, and frankly, butchered - Jesus cried to God on behalf of those who had done this — "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34). They knew well they were killing Him: they had eyes - but spiritually they didn't recognise their depravity because they were under demonic control. All of us have sinned and fallen short of God's Glory" (Romans 3:23). Strife is a subtle and dangerous trap (Proverbs 10:12). Forgiveness is there for everyone, and we need it! God desires that we Repent, and release Mercy (James 2:13; Mark 11:25). Jesus was once asked.. 'who is my neighbour?' by a man wanting to justify himself with his own good works (Luke 10:29). Lord, help us to not make that mistake.
