

NEW KILLARNEY CYCLEWAY OPENS UP

A BEAUTIFUL ROUTE FOR WALKERS AND CYCLISTS

The Muckross Road to Ross Road Cycleway, adding a key link to the town's cycling and pedestrian pathways was officially opened by Cathaoirleach of Killarney Municipal District, Cllr Brendan Cronin.

The scheme, which was constructed by Daniel Canty, under the supervision of Killarney Municipal District Engineers John Ahern and Stephen Sheehan, started in November 2020 and despite stoppages due to COVID, has finished in time for the summer season.

The 750m cycleway joins the Ross Road and Muckross Road, in an off-road, safe route, funded by the Department of Transport, Tourism & Sport and the National Transport Authority under their Active Travel Measures scheme.

The Cathaoirleach, Cllr Cronin welcomed the development of the route, praising all those who had been involved in driving this project to completion. "It is a project that has been on the agenda for quite some time, and significant work has been carried out by the Elected Members, Council officials and local

communities in making it a reality," he said. "I want to pay tribute to everyone involved in bringing it from the drawing board to today's official opening. Councillor Cronin acknowledged the input of former Councillor Michael Gleeson who was in attendance at the opening.

"Over the past 18 months, with the various restrictions due to COVID, the ability for people to be able to go out for a cycle or a walk has been critical for their wellbeing. The development of

such a key outdoor recreation project is crucial for the town and we look forward to being able to further continue the development of such dedicated cycleways and pathways."

Municipal District Manager, Angela McAllen also praised all those who have been involved in the project, and pointed to the importance of having such projects shovel-ready in terms of design and planning, to be able to take advantage when national funding for projects such as these become available.

"This a key link between the Muckross and Kenmare estates, and with fantastic views along the river, it is something that young and old can enjoy in a safe, vehicle-free setting", she said. "We are committed to improving the cycling and walking provision for residents and visitors to this county, in keeping with the objectives of the County Development Plan and the desire for greater access for all ages." Fr Niall Howard finished with a blessing as part of the opening and acknowledged the importance of a quiet space for walking and cycling.



here was an air of sadness in the town of Killarney this week when news of the passing of Klaus Nölke was announced. Both the Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and Killarney Golf & Fishing Club have paid tribute to the man who was an integeral part of the community.

Mr. Nölke a native of Hanover, qualified as a mechanical engineer after completing his national army service. He had the advantage of substantial practical experience, gained from periods working as a fitter/welder and turner. Later, he qualified as a welding engineer. He worked in management positions for various German companies before securing the position of Assistant to the Technical Director at the Liebherr plant in Biberach. He came to Killarney in 1968 to fill the position of Technical Director, vacated by Heinz Schiller's departure. He was appointed Sales Director in 1973, and Manufacturing Director in 1985. He held the latter position until his retirement in 2002. He was appointed Honorary German Consul in 1986, one of only three such consuls in Ireland. It was a role he relished, and he applied himself to it with great enthusiasm.

Klaus and his wife Christal raised their three sons, Lars, Kjell and the late Sven at their home in Crohane in Fossa before the couple moved to Countess Road.

The couple lived in Killarney since 1968 where Klaus was a very dedicated, enterprising and long-serving member of Chamber and served as its President from 1982 to 1984.

The Chamber expressed its condolences to his wife, Christal, sons Lars and Kiell, daughtersin-law Norma and Yvonne, grandchildren Max, Ben, Lara, Ewan and Katie and his extended family and friends.

President Niall Kelleher said Klaus Nölke played a major role in the industrial, commercial and business life in Killarnev through his work as a director with the Liebherr Container Cranes company from 1968 to 2002.


"Everybody realises and appreciates the enormous role Liebherr has played and still plays in the everyday life of Killarney and Klaus Nölke was a central figure in the remarkable progress made by the company down through the years," the Chamber President said.

"His wonderful vision and his technical and commercial prowess ensured that Liebherr remained at the cutting edge and, in that regard, his contribution to the commercial life of Killarney was enormous," Mr Kelleher added. Born in 1939, Klaus Nölke was a very enterprising Chamber of Commerce President for a twoyear term and he helped establish the Killarney Working Group which led to the setting up of the hugely successful Killarney Looking Good Competition.

A long-time member of Killarney Golf and Fishing Club, Mr Nölke was also the voluntary project leader in the painstaking project to restore the ornate iron railings which surround the Church of the Sloes opposite the town hall in Killarney. Klaus's second home was Killarney Golf and Fishing Club where he spent many hours playing the courses and chatting with

fellow members. This week the Club President Marguerita Mulcahy, Captain Harry O'Neill, Lady Captain Anne Looney, and all our Members and Staff, passed on their sincere condolences to his wife, Christal, his sons, Lars, and Kjell, and the extended Nölke family.

Klaus'association with Killarney Golf & Fishing Club began in the mid-1980s when he became actively involved in Club affairs as a Team Manager, then Member Director, and then Project Manager for the re-construction of many of our Clubhouse areas that were undertaken in the 2000s.

In 2010, Klaus was granted Honorary Life Membership of our Club in recognition of his tireless hard work and commitment to the club over many years. In that same year, Klaus was responsible, at his own personal expense, for creating a bursary for juvenile golf at the Club.

"Klaus' generosity, commitment, and involvement in improving our Club will always be appreciated by all of us here at Killarney Golf & Fishing Club", a statement from the club said.

Following a private funeral in St. Mary's Church of Ireland on Wednesday at which a guard of honour were formed by members of the Killarney Chamber of Tourism & Commerce, the funeral cortege took the route past Liebherr where staff members lined the road. Klaus Nölke was laid to rest at Aghadoe Cemetery in Killarney.

Beloved husband of Christal and loving father of Lars, Kjell and the late Sven, Klaus will be sadly missed and dearly loved by his family, daughtersin-law Norma and Yvonne, grandchildren Max, Ben, Lara, Ewan and Katie, brother-in-law Hansjorg and sister-in-law Gudrun, nieces, nephews, relatives, his many friends, his former work colleagues in Liebherr, Killarney and his golf buddies in Killarney Golf and Fishing Club.

Broad welcome for Government commitment

to ensure restoration of Kerry/Dublin PSO routes as a priority



Education Minister and Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry Norma Foley has welcomed the Cabinet commitment to make the Kerry Dublin PSO route a priority.

The Department of Transport is currently examining the implications of the weekend announcement by Stobart Air and the

cancellation of the Government-funded PSO routes which operate between Kerry and Dublin.

Transport Minister Eamon Ryan confirmed his intention to seek a replacement to the PSO service linking Dublin and Kerry on an emergency basis as provided in EU law, subject to a maximum term of seven months.

Department of Transport officials will also shortly launch a procurement process for a maximum of four years that will continue the provision of the service after the temporary contract has expired.

There has already been significant interest from potential carriers in the route and these options will be fully examined.

Every effort will be made to ensure a new operator can be selected and in place by midend July.

Minister Foley said: "The restoration of our regional connectivity is of critical importance to the people of Kerry. Transport Minister Eamon Ryan confirmed to me his intentions to seek an expedited tendering process which aims to have a replacement carrier in place by mid-end of July.

"I am confident Government will continue to engage as a priority with relevant stakeholders until a suitable resolution is reached for the benefit of Kerry and the south-west region."

Firies Sports Facility is a community based sport and recreation facility, offering an inclusive programme of sport to all ages and ability levels. "We work in collaboration with Firies N.S., Farranfore Maine Valley Athletic Club and Kerry Parents and Friends (group which represents/supports and provides community based services in Kerry for people with intellectual and physical disabilities and their families) and we aim to encourage enjoyment, maximise participation and help people achieve their personal best", Eve Spillane from Firies National School told Killarney Outlook. By building this much needed all weather pitch, many clubs and community groups in Firies and beyond will benefit hugely, Regardless of age, social disadvantages, gender or !

disability, every person will be able to access Firies Sports Facility. This facility will not only benefit people's physical health but also their emotional and psychological well-being.

"Firies N.S. endeavours to be a very active school and we have a very extensive Physical Education programme that includes athletics, football, hurling, basketball, rugby, soccer, yoga, dance, orienteering, gymnastics and swimming to mention a few. Unfortunately, our school field is water logged for many months during the school year and many of the activities that we endeavour to have our children participate in are cancelled. As a result our children are disappointed and not in a position to receive the basic physical activity that they are entitled to", Eve added,

This much needed facility will help create a positive, active environment in our community and as Active School Ambassadors we appreciate the importance of physical education. We want people to be active and

healthy members of society.

The state of the art pitch will measure 60m x 40m and will contain a high density prefabricated shock pad system. It will be surrounded by rebound fencing. A 1.8m concrete footpath will hug the perimeter of the pitch. Floodlights will be installed to ensure the facility can be used in the evenings. Retractable goal posts will also be included. Furthermore, we plan on installing a cabin with two wheelchair accessible toilets and a storage area for sports equipment.

"We are sincerely grateful for all donations received to date. However, we still need your help in order to make this dream a reality. We hope to reach our goal with the help of our fantastic community, those near and far, who may be in a position to donate", Eve said.

The plan is for construction to be finished in time for the reopening of our school in September so our community can enjoy the facility it so richly deserves.



THERE IS STILL A LOT TO PLAY FOR AS THE LEAVING CERT EXAM REACHES THE HALF WAY MARK



As the Leaving Cert exam approaches the end of the second week, many candidates have reached or are nearing the end of the road. The optional subjects now take centre stage. As the number of candidates taking these subjects is considerably less than the number taking the compulsory subjects, exam centres will have less candidates The number of candidates in the school environment will also continue to decrease, so it's important for candidates who still have a job of work to do, not to feel left behind or become impatient to get over the finish line.

Normally in the final seven days, candidates will have one or two subjects from a standard seven left to do. However, it's not unknown for students to take an eight or even a ninth subject to complete a particular vocational grouping such as Business, Economics and Accounting. So, there is still a lot to play for. There are grades and points to be earned.

Candidates must guard against exam fatigue in the final days. The buzz of the early days is gone. There is less foot fall around the exam centres. Your remaining subjects are likely to be spaced out. These subjects have to be faced. They must be given priority between now and Tuesday week. Keep a lid on your impatience and stay in exam mode. You need to be as motivated, focussed and energetic for your remaining exams as you were on day one.

Eight of the fifteen exam days will have passed by Friday evening. There are fourteen more subject sessions in the remaining seven days. The number of candidates taking these final days' subjects will be much less than in the earlier days of the exam. However, candidates concerned must defer any post exam celebrations. In sporting parlance, the game ends only with the final whistle. How right he is! Defeat has often been snatched from the jaws of victory by one untimely lapse in concentration. The weekend provides an opportunity to recharge the batteries and to plan for next week. Enjoy some exercise and fresh air to prepare for the week beginning on 21st June. A good work out will help you to sleep soundly, to build up stamina and endurance and to maintain your concentration for the last lap. Enjoy a few good nights' rest so that your mind and body are fully alert for the remaining papers. Organise your revision sessions for daylight hours. Don't burn the mid-night oil but go to bed early. Go over the tips and predictions for your remaining subjects. Resist the temptation to spend endless hours cramming course material. Scan your notes on the eve of any remaining paper so that the key concepts are fresh in your mind.

Maintain your disciplined and organised approach over the remaining days. Avoid late night socialising with those who have finished the exam. Keep your distance from alcohol as you'll need a clear head and lots of energy for the task ahead. Eat well as good nutrition is important in week three to avoid energy loss. Keep your fluid levels high to avoid dehydration. Candidates have performed very well during the past fortnight. Keep up the good work and bring your exam to a successful conclusion next week. Use your free days wisely. Stay positive and be confident in your ability to do well in next week's papers. Take it subject by subject and bring the curtain down on a stellar performance.

After the Leaving Cert exam, applicants to the Central Applications Office (CAO) must turn their attention to the CAO "Change of Mind" Form, which must be submitted by Thursday, 1st July. Next week, I'll explain how to use that facility to your best advantage.



MACKEREL HOOK AND LINE QUOTA

Kerry County Councillor says he had to check that the date was not April 1st, when he read the announcement by the Department of the Marine that hook and line caught Irish Mackerel fishing is to be banned from the 12th June 2021.

"Large foreign commercial trawlers, with the capability of taking hundreds of thousands of tonnes from our oceans, can continue to operate it appears, while the small operator with a boat less than 15 metres in length, must cease" stated Councillor Michael Cahill.

"To be told that we can't go on a fishing trip if we have a hook and line but every day lorries pass through our country with tonnes of fish landed by foreign fishing vessels beggars belief" stated the Fianna Fail Councillor.

"The logic of this decision escapes me completely and we need to know how the small to medium sized fisherman is expected to make a living without his usual Mackerel catch" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Hook and line fishing can only be a small percentage of the total national catch and still these fisherman are being singled out for a penalty" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"There are fishermen up and down the coast who make a small living from hook and line fishing and many more who operate to catch a few fish for the household and they are



being picked on. We cannot police the large international operators who illegally fish our waters, but we are going to put an effort into policing the small local fisherman, who makes very little difference to our quotas. It has to be a joke" added Councillor Cahill.

"The Dept of the Marine has announced that the hook & line caught Irish Mackerel fishery is to cease on tomorrow 12th June at 14:40pm The seasonal fishery which has a 400 tonne annual quota is a mainstay for many Irish inshore vessels around the coast and the closure will cause increased effort on other stocks. The Mackerel Hook and Line Fishery Quota Management Closure Notice 2021 (Fisheries Management Notice No 25 of 2021) states:

"The master of an Irish sea-fishing boat less than 15 meters in length overall fishing for mackerel by means of hooks and lines shall not engage in or cause or permit any person on board to engage in fishing activity for Mackerel in the specified area (All Areas) with effect from 14:40 hours on 12th June 2021."

GOVERNMENT'S NEW REGIONAL EMPLOYMENT SERVICE A BAD DEAL FOR JOBLESS IN SOUTH KERRY

South Kerry Development Partnership a member of the Irish Local Development Network(ILDN) have criticised the Government's proposal to replace the employment service delivered by Local Employment Services (LES). The new Regional Employment Service which seeks to replace existing Jobs Clubs and Local Employment Services which have been assisting those out of work in Communities for 25 years is being initiated in four Regions across the Country ahead of a national rollout. Outlining their concerns, Noel Spillane, CEO of South Kerry Development Partnership said; "The new Regional Employment Service the Department of Social Protection are tendering for will instantly close Jobs Club in these areas and later in 2021 will inevitably lead to the closure of vital Local Employment Services and Jobs Clubs across the remainder of the Country. The timing of this could not be worse as Communities face into a post pandemic unemployment crisis. This move will deprive those unemployed due to COVID, the long-term unemployed, carers, women and other cohorts removed from the jobs market of access to a




walk-in, person centred, community-based employment services and all the supports that such services provides. Instead, jobseekers will be faced with a centralised profit-driven, results-based process which will not be accessible to all jobseekers."

Commenting on the success of existing South Kerry Local Employment Services, Noel Spillane continued; "The community-based South Kerry Local Employment Services have supported those without work in a comprehensive, person-centred way for the past 25 years. Research commissioned by the Department of Social Protection and carried out independently by Indecon indicated that attendance with a Local Employment Service had been beneficial to those who used the service. Local Employment Services have also been endorsed by employers who engage with the service."

Concluding, Noel Spillane commented; "It beggars' belief that the Department would move to dismantle such important services for those without work at such a critical time. ILDN have proposed the extension of the current LES model across its 49 members in order to provide a nationwide service. Such a model would give an efficient accessible service to jobseekers as well as transparency and value for money for the taxpayer. The Minister and the Department must revisit this decision."

he Reeks District will host the 'longest day in the Irish running calendar' on Saturday (June 19) with the inaugural Killorglin 12 to 12 race - an ultraendurance running challenge set in the gorgeous countryside around the town and against the backdrop of Carrauntoohil, Ireland's highest mountain.

The inaugural Killorglin 12 to 12 Endurance Run will be a rare opportunity for ultrarunners from around the country to take part in a 12-hour race in Ireland. Organised by the team behind the highly popular Kerry Way Ultra, the ultrarun takes its 'longest day' subtitle thanks to it being held on June 19, the nearest Saturday to the Summer Solstice on Monday June 21.

The race will be held around a 6.5km loop which sets off from Killorglin town centre and takes in Sunhill, which sits between Castlemaine Harbour and Carrauntoohil. To be in with a chance of first place, runners will need to complete as many laps as possible during the 12-hour race time from midday to midnight. A relay version for teams of up to four people and a shorter six-hour race starting at 6pm also form part of the programme.

The Reeks District is steeped in ancient Irish myths and legends and the race is redolent of age- old rounding rituals, a key part of pagan and religious pilgrimages where believers would pray while walking sunwise around the features of a mountain. The practice was thought to unburden stress, ego, worries, negative thoughts and negative energies, and to mirror this, the race will follow the direction of the sun as it travels around the route.

Chair of the Reeks District Jens Bachem said: The Reeks is a region of extremes, from our beautiful Blue Flag beaches to the summit of Carrauntoohil. The Killorglin 12 to 12 certainly fits into that category as runners will need to be on the top of their game both physically and mentally to be in with a chance of winning. We welcome it's arrival to Killorglin and are proud to support this and any other initiatives that increase visitation to the region in a sustainable manner."

Race Director Eileen Daly of the Kerry Way Ultra said: "Loop races, where the objective is to complete as many laps as possible in a certain timeframe, are increasingly popular in the ultramarathon world, yet they are few and far between in Ireland. We look forward to hosting this new-for-us format and seeing just how far the runners can push themselves in an effort to claim first place."

Runners travelling from outside the immediate locale will be able to take full advantage of the many facilities for visitors in Killorglin and its surrounds. A full list of accommodation options, from bunkhouses to luxury lakeside hotels can be found on ReeksDistrict.com, while Killorglin is home to a number of cafés, pubs and fine restaurants. As the town is expected to be busy for race day weekend, pre-booking is recommended. Covid-19 regulations will be in place throughout and visitors are asked to respect these.

€1 million in funding announced *for live music in Kerry*

The Gleneagle Hotel Killarney/INEC Arena is among the venues that will benefit from a €1 million grant for live music in Kerry.

The Live Performance Support Scheme (LPSS) provides financial support of over €1 million to support 12 live music venues across the County this summer. The scheme aims to support live performances particularly where capacity for live attendance is restricted due to Covid-19, and where funding will make live performances viable or alternatively make them available online if audiences cannot attend due to restrictions.

Other Killarney venues and funding include:

- Courtney's Bar receives €10,570 for a number of gigs featuring all local musicians
- Celtic Steps The Show receives €84,627 to livestream performances from Killarney Racecourse Theatre.
- Scott's Hotel, receive €84,627 for live performances for tourists across the Summer.



- 2. In a large bowl beat together the butter, sugar and vanilla until mixed...Add in the sifted flour and salt and mix until it looks like big bread crumbs, do not over mix it, tip it out onto a work surface and lightly knead the mixture and pat down into a circle.
- 3. Dust the work surface with a flour and roll out the dough evenly about 3-4 mm turning it around often to stop it from sticking to the work surface.
- 4. Using a cutters or a plastic cup cut out your biscuits., prick each of them with a fork and place them on a baking tray with parchment paper leave space between them and bake them for 10 - 11 minutes until golden brown
- 5. When baked sprinkle a little Caster sugar while still warm and leave to cool for 5 minutes until transferring to a wire rack to cool
- 6. To assembly gently whip the cream., sugar and vanilla until it holds soft peaks. Pipe or spoon a layer of cream over the cookie and then place some strawberries. Top with a second cookie and pipe or spoon some more cream and add more strawberries sprinkle some icing sugar on

Ingredients

2 tbsp oil

1 small onion chopped

2 cloves garlic crushed

1 bay leaf

1 tablespoon grated fresh ginger

2 tablespoons curry powder

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon sugar

½ a head of broccoli (cut into bite size pieces)

280g tofu cut into small cubes

1 tablespoon tomato puree

1 cup Alpro natural yogurt

1 cup coconut milk

Handful fresh coriander chopped to garnish

Method

Heat the oil in a pan and add onion fry for 2-3 minutes. Add the crushed garlic, fresh ginger, all the spices, bay leaf and the sugar and stir for 2-3 minutes. 





GRAVITY YOGA

A TARGETED APPROACH TO INCREASING YOUR FLEXIBILITY

For most of us it is true to say that we lose flexibility as the years pass us by. Movements that most children can do easily, become more of a struggle as we get older. Simple everyday things like squatting down, or bending forward from our hips become more difficult as we lose our flexibility. Unfortunately, for most of us the loss of flexibility can lead to pain and discomfort, back pain, stiffness in the back or hips and even upper back and shoulder pain can often be attributed to a loss of flexibility. Loss of flexibility in muscles then has a direct impact on the joints that those muscles cross. Over time reduced range of movement in joints will lead to poor movement patterns, our body is clever enough to be able to adapt to tight muscles but sometimes the body's work around is where the problems begin. How many mornings when getting dressed do you struggle to bend down to put on socks or tie your shoe laces?

So, what can gravity yoga do for someone who has such flexibility problems?

The Gravity Yoga uses a combination of specific breathing techniques, coupled with long pose or stretch holds, usually a minimum of 2 minutes and up to maximum of 5 mins. The key to improving flexibility is understanding that muscles stretch best when they are relaxed. The breathing technique used helps get our nervous system into "rest & digest", also known as our parasympathetic nervous system.

It is when the body is in the rest & digest state that we can improve muscle flexibility using the long hold times. Much of our flexibility gains come from our nervous system. We work on switching off the stretch reflex and coupled with the hold times is where the magic happens of course the magic doesn't happen over-night.

The benefits of gravity yoga include increase range of motion, reduces pain in back, shoulders & hips. It's important to note though that it has nothing in common with warm-up stretches you might have learned to do before a workout. It is an intense form of stretching and for some can cause some discomfort initially. The good thing is though that once your body starts to adapt then the benefits certainly outweigh the initial discomfort.

One final thing - if you think it's not for you but you still want to improve your flexibility and are happy to stick with what you have always done, then ask yourself one question – Why haven't I improved my flexibility doing what I currently do? If that hasn't helped you up to now, then why will that change if you stay with it? Maybe it's time to try a new approach, maybe it's time to try Gravity Yoga.

ALLERGIC CONJUCTIVITIS

Allergic conjunctivitis is commonly caused by sensitivity to grass and tree pollen, dust mites or animals. It is far more common in those with a history of allergies or those who have a family history of allergies.

SYMPTOMS

Allergic conjunctivitis usually causes pink or red itchy eyes. The eyes are normally watery and other allergy symptoms such as sneezing and a runny nose may be present.

The seasonal type of allergic conjunctivitis will vary with the time of year and weather conditions. Those with more general allergies, such as an allergy to dust mites, will most likely have symptoms throughout the year.

TRFATMFNT

You can treat allergic conjunctivitis by:

- Avoiding the cause of the allergy (if possible)
- Using cold compresses (such as clean cotton wool balls soaked in cold water) to soothe the eyes

Avoiding rubbing your eyes as this will make the symptoms worse

There is also a range of medicines that may help. Some are available over the counter at the pharmacy and other stronger medicines need a prescription. Mast-cell stabiliser eye drops such as sodium cromoglicate (Opticrom) do not work straight away. Instead, they take a few days to start to work. These drops are good if you know when you are likely to develop an allergy and so you can use them to prevent symptoms

Antihistamine eye drops such as antazoline sulphate (Otrivine-Antistin) provide a more immediate effect. They won't prevent an allergic reaction, but instead treat the symptoms once the allergy has started.

Antihistamine tablets work in the same way as the eye drops, but will also treat other allergy symptoms such as a runny nose and sneezing that is caused by the allergy.

You should not wear contact lenses if your symptoms are severe or if you have been told that your cornea is affected. Do not put drops in your eyes while wearing contact lenses.

Remember:

- MAvoid rubbing your eyes, as this may make your symptoms worse
- Use a cold compress to soothe your eyes
- Wearing glasses or sunglasses may help to shield your eyes from pollen




CLUB SPRINTS

As is their modern wont, Kerry forwards drifted out. At one stage Tyrone goalkeeper Niall Morgan was just short of the halfway line. There was just one player behind him.....Kerry's Sean O'Shea. In all fairness, you are going to leave that kind of space open for lads like Gavin White, Adrian Spillane, Diarmuid O'Connor, Sean O'Shea, Stephen O'Brien, and most especially the Clifford brothers and Dara Moynihan to run into? What exactly were you hoping was going to happen? Frankly, it's tantamount to insanity.

Kerry did this tactic against Cork last year. And Cork

had their gameplan well ready. Their defenders left their men off away out the field and when the likes of Gavin White and Tom O'Sullivan went on their lung-bursting trademark runs, defenders were fresh and ready waiting for them.

Against Tyrone it was empty space and defenders were twisting backwards trying to rebut the waves of potent Kerry forwards.

Adrian Spillane nearly fisted an early goal before Sean O'Shea gathered from Mike Breen to open the scoring. Breen was outstanding here as were his half back colleagues. Gavin White was my man of the match (Dara Moynihan was very close, with Paudie Clifford and Jason Foley also outstanding). Imagine that Paul Murphy, of all people, will have to fight to get his jersey back? It says something. Jason Foley's late point, in a game that was already over in real terms, received a warm round of applause. He deserved it (he was the TG4 Man of

applause. He deserved it (he was the TG4 Man of the Match). He always had the style and technique, now he has the necessary power to bring it into play and completely shut down a dangerous player in Conor McKenna – that individual duel was the best of the game, and Foley won it hands down.

Tyrone went in front with a point from Kieran McGeary, who also set up Darren McCurry for their second. Then their roof basically started to cave in. I can't put it nicer than that. Dara Moynihan was the link man in a breaking line of Kerry attackers and he laid it off to David Clifford, who was tackled

just as he was pulling the trigger. Niall Morgan made a great save, but referee Conor Lane spread his arms to indicate a penalty – a very harsh call, to be honest. Morgan actually made a great effort at the penalty, but David's shot had power and precision. Kieran McGeary added his second point for Tyrone, but Kerry sliced through again, this time Padie Clifford's superb run left him in on goal, but he delayed his shot for a fraction too long.

Kerry were pressing the kick-out (something I love to see) and it was really paying dividends. Tyrone were struggling to deal with it.

Gavin White's goal.....look, you have a few hardy enough oul' cynics in the press area, but every last one of us had our mouths hanging open at that one. He read the kick-out perfectly – his feet were moving just as Morgan kicked the ball. Dived forward to catch it, looked up....a measuring glance. I knew what he was trying and I honestly thought "no way". Ummm.....way.

An absolutely brilliant, perfectly weighted precision kick over the hapless keeper and into the net. I'm telling you, we have seen the Goal of the Year even before the championship starts.

Straight from the kick-out, Dara Moynihan was coolly finishing goal number three. Tyrone were already re-jigging their defence but there were too many leaks to plug. If nothing else, Kerry's conditioning work is really starting to pay dividends. I've seen Kerry players lose out to their stronger Dublin opponents in those contests in



recent years, especially in the last ten minutes of games. That's something that might - please note that I am just saying 'might' – be different this year. Kerry were picking off points at will, no hit-andhope shots, but a couple of real beauties. A superb steal by Jason Foley led to another synchronised forward wave , Stephen O'Brien and Sean O'Shea setting up Paul Geaney for an expert finish for goal number four. O'Shea nearly added his name to the growing list of goalscorers, he did everything right except keep his shot down. It was Geaney, instead, who added our fifth goal. Geaney, who looks about as comfortable in the half forward line as I do at the dentist (frankly, either play him as an inside forward, at which he's a proven expert, or don't play him at all) seemed to have taken confidence and his blistering shot from distance had too much power for Morgan to stop.

Half-time Kerry 5-6 Tyrone 0-7.

David Clifford opened the second half with another great goal effort but Morgan (he's actually a very good keeper) made a good save and it was McGeary who opened the second half scoring.

But Kerry was like a machine. Eight shots and seven scores. Micheál Burns and Killian Spillane off the bench were highly effective – Peter Keane and co. are going to have some selection headaches this year, and that's a good thing. The likes of Joe O'Connor and Jack Sherwood did themselves no harm either. There was plenty of off the ball rough and tumble – and Kerry were as happy

to be involved as Tyrone. Good – I can name an archbishop with an All Ireland medal, but I never heard of any saint with one.

Tyrone did pick off a couple of well-worked points, scores that any team would find hard to stop. But Kerry were picking them off at will – Burns in particular kicked an angled beauty. The final goal was yet again a sweeping Kerry move that ended with Niall Morgan coming out of goal to fist clear.... but only as far as Jack, who immediately finished confidently.

Look, I'm always cautious about league games. We were the worst team in the world after the Cork game last year. After our league opener against Galway, we were suddenly the best team in the worl;d. And then the Dublin game.....the cycle continues. And it is a cycle. The slow hard ascent to the top is done by the people inside, the people doing the work.

I'm not getting too excited by this one. Kerry did look absolutely great, but they were allowed to do so by as poor a Tyrone display as I have seen in years. After a generation of being on top, they look like they may be regressing to the mean, not least with Donegal on the rise. But again, it's one game. It's a swallow, not a summer.

As for this weird half of a league title? That whole thing is a bit embarrassing all round. I'd say let the two teams toss a coin for it.

ook, it's absolutely fantastic to have the county leagues back. There's a lot of auld guff spouted on a regular basis at a national level about "clubs are the bedrock of the GAA". Yeah, I think that more money flows up from the clubs than down on those particular canals! What clubs really are is the bedrock of local communities, and in Ireland, the GAA clubs particularly fill that role, but they all, literally everyone, are important. So it is great to have them back, not just for the players, but for the supporters as well. Of course I am delighted that games are back. The development of facilities such as the Killarney Valley Athletics Club Arena and the huge improvements at Murt Scott Park by Ballyhar Dynamos are a huge boost to East Kerry.

I completely supported the restrictions. The effect of the restrictions on mental health and the economic impact of closure on so many businesses at a micro and level has been devastating, but most of us were able to weigh the risks to life against the risk of economic loss properly and support the Government's measures. Part of the return to play plan is to have the Ladies' National Finals in Croke Park. Great to have a Kerry team back in action on that much-beloved sod in just one week's time, even though I'll probably have to watch Kerry take on Meath on the livestream provided for free by Lidl.

I'm not going to comment on the first two rounds of the County League for Kerry teams, even though Round 1 was a particularly good one for most East Kerry clubs. I just think that teams deserve a couple of games to really get up and running; it's been a long time without collective training and especially competitive games. My only worry is the possibility of injury. A glance at the amount of injuries to Kerry's senior footballers and hurlers over the past while is indicative of the potential risks. No amount of training can really replicate the intensity and physical requirements of a competitive game.



Kerry Pitch & Putt has had a lot of great days throughout its near 50 year history and last Saturday's performances by players from the Tralee, Listowel and Castleisland clubs will certainly enter the conversation when time comes to discuss the greatest ever.

Four of the eight prizes on offer for Men in the delayed 2020 National Strokeplay Championships were won by Kerry players as the Junior event in St Annes saw an unprecedented 1-2-3 finish for the county. Listowel's Jake Shine topped the podium with a seven under par winning score as rounds of four and three under par saw him claim a major singles win only two years after being a part of the 2019 Kerry U16 National Inter-County winning team. A great second round of five under par saw Tralee's Brian Moynihan claim second meanwhile as he finished a shot behind Jake on six under par.

Castleisland's Paudie Looney had rounds of two and three under par to claim the bronze medal with five under as the county stood atop the national Pitch & Putt scene on Saturday. Both Brian and Paudie followed their children Ella and Padraic respectively in winning National Singles medals. Ella Moynihan was a runner-up in both the National Girls Matchplay and Strokeplay last year while Padraic Looney was a bronze medallist in the 2016 National U16 Boys Strokeplay Championships.

Over at St Stephens at the Intermediate event, Tralee's Michael Conway was finding a 'hole-inone' in his second round very helpful in gaining victory on countback with 11 under par. He had started with a four under par total for his first 18 but his challenge really came to life in the second round as he ended up tied with ESB's Michael Herlihy on 11 under par at the end of his 36 holes. Due to the alterations to the event caused by the pandemic, countback as opposed to a playoff would be the deciding factor in determining the winner as Conway's seven under par second round saw him get the title on countback from Herlihy's four under second round to complete Kerry's incredible day across the county bounds. Damien Fleming was four shots off making it a treble the following day in the Senior event and winning it for a second time for himself. Rounds of seven and five under par saw him finish on 12 under, a score that gave him third for most of the day until he was piped for an official prize late on. However, as fourth placed finisher Damien is now automatic for the 2021 renewal in Navan this September and will not need to qualify to participate in the finals. The other Kerry players in the senior event all finished with respectable scores, Jason Cregan of Tralee shooting nine under, County Board chairman James Dignan of Castleisland shooting eight while another Tralee player, Alan Hobbart, had a score of seven under. The U16 event will take place on Saturday the 10th in Tralee while the adult competitions will be in Newmarket the following day.







Or, 2) those who do know the Lord - who have received Salvation through His Son Jesus and have had their hearts and minds transformed by the Holy Spirit, understanding that the blood that the Lord Jesus shed brought them rightstanding with God. Empowered by this righteousness they can face any circumstance with the assurance - 'if God be with us who can be against us?' And, 'with God on our side whom shall we fear?' (Romans 8:31; Psalm 27:1). This freedom from fear allows one to live differently to everyone else. Through study of God's Word you learn that you are never alone, because 'Emmanuel' (which means 'God with us') will never leave you or forsake you, and therefore you can have confidence to face your enemies, and overcome them through His divine power. The new birth which Jesus spoke about in John chapter three brings peace with God by trusting in Jesus' finished work of Calvary for Salvation and victory.

God's people were regularly being plundered and bullied by their enemies and God called the most unlikely man to bring an end to it (Judges Chapters' 6-7). He called Gideon who was fearfully hiding underground from the enemy. God had a plan to bring glory to Himself and Gideon was it! But first, Gideon had to un-learn all his misconceptions about his identity, and see who he was in God's eyes - a 'mighty man of valour'. It's no different for us friend.

God has good plans for you, to bring you hope, and a future that's blessed not cursed (Jeremiah 29:11-15). But you need to get right with God first, by repenting for your sins and receiving forgiveness for them through the blood that Jesus shed when He was nailed to the Cross (1st Peter 2:24). This is God's plan of Salvation for us — that we would believe that His Son's blood paid for our freedom from the penalty of sin. When we understand that we are made right with God - not by any good works that we have done, but because of His love and mercy demonstrated to us in Jesus, it removes us out of the devil's dominion, and brings us into God's family. There, just like He did with Gideon, God can use us to bring His plans to pass. And instead of the old fearful wimps that we once were, now with God's hand upon us, we are transformed into overcomers because of Who's side we're on. "For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love, and of a sound mind" (2nd Timothy 1:7)
