

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'Game Changer' Initiative Highlighted at All-Ireland Semi-Final

The Game Changer initiative was prominently featured at Sunday's All-Ireland semi-final between Meath and Donegal in Croke Park.

The three-year project, a collaboration between Ruhama, White Ribbon Ireland, and the GAA, supported by the Ladies Gaelic Football and Camogie Associations and funded by Cuan, aims to tackle gender-based violence through the platform of Gaelic Games. It promotes gender equality, challenges sexual violence, and encourages men and boys to be active allies in ending abuse.

At half-time, Jason Poole, brother of Jennifer Poole, who was murdered in 2021, spoke to the crowd, urging society to do more to address domestic and sexual violence. His powerful message was part of a broader awareness effort that included videos, banners, and participation from volunteers and GAA clubs. Ambassadors for the project include Oisín Gallen, Louise Ní Mhuircheartaigh, and David Fitzgerald, all of whom are helping to amplify the campaign's message.

The Game Changer programme aims to: Challenge societal norms around sexual violence, including pornography sharing, intimate image abuse, and sexual exploitation; Promote gender equality, respect, and create safe spaces for women and girls in sport;



Encourage men and boys to become active allies in the fight against gender-based violence;

Support open conversations around abusive behaviours and help facilitate disclosures;

Raise awareness of the harms of human trafficking for sexual exploitation.

As awareness continues to grow, Sunday's

event marked a significant milestone in leveraging sport for social change. The GAA's support of Game Changer sends a strong message: that Gaelic Games can, and will, be a force for justice, equality, and respect.

Kerry Hoteliers Urge Government to Tackle Unsustainable Increases in the Cost of Doing Business

IHF event highlights urgent need for action ahead of Budget 2026



Hoteliers from across the country recently met with TDs and Senators to discuss the key challenges facing Irish tourism and the necessary measures the Irish Hotels Federation is calling for to ensure the successful long-term development of Ireland's largest indigenous industry, supporting over 270,000 livelihoods. Kerry hoteliers are urging the Government to take decisive action on spiralling business costs threatening the viability of Ireland's tourism and hospitality sector. At a recent Irish Hotels Federation (IHF) event with TDs and Senators, industry leaders warned that without targeted supports in Budget 2026, the country's largest indigenous employer could face long-term

damage. Tourism supports over 270,000 jobs nationwide, including 16,000 in Kerry, yet rising operating costs are pushing many businesses, particularly in regional areas, to the brink.

"Tourism businesses are grappling with soaring costs and tighter margins," said Bernadette Randles, owner of the Dromhall Hotel. "We need the Government to act now to protect jobs and

ensure long-term competitiveness."

The call comes amid growing concerns over declining revenues. Fáilte Ireland research shows that over half of tourism businesses have seen income fall so far in 2025, with 75% of food and drink businesses reporting a drop in overseas visitor spend, a vital revenue stream.

The IHF is calling for the following key measures in Budget 2026: Permanent restoration of the 9% VAT rate on hospitality food services. A reduction in Employers' PRSI for labour-intensive sectors. Action to reduce business costs, including insurance and energy. Greater investment in training via the National Training Fund. Support for enhanced air access, especially to regional airports. Increased funding for Fáilte Ireland and Tourism Ireland. Targeted support for sustainability initiatives aligned with climate goals.

Tourism contributes €10 billion annually to the Irish economy and generates over €2.9 billion in taxes. With 70% of tourism jobs located outside Dublin, the sector plays a vital role in regional development.

Hoteliers warn that without urgent support, the sector's ability to drive employment and economic activity, particularly in counties like Kerry, is at serious risk.

TWO STATE AGENCIES AND THE FRIARS IN THE MIDDLE



I don't share the fury about the location of the HSE primary care centre at the council owned Lewis Road Car Park.

I simply don't see a problem with one State agency buying land from another State body for the benefit of the community as a whole.

That said, an ideal world would be to build a six storey library and town hall and a theatre on Lewis Road. And move the primary care to the District Hospital. The library is the same as it was 45 years back. Despite huge demands for computing, lecture evenings, and film showings. And the town hall is too small for public meetings.

The council bought two properties from the Franciscan Order, paying one million for the soccer pitch that is now a park. A further one million euro was paid for the old building, I understand.

One thing intrigues me about the whole saga of the friars and the council is why no one, lay or cleric, bothered much about correcting the record that these sites were purchased, not gifted.

The Franciscan Friars otherwise known as the Order of Friars Minor is not an enclosed order and has a vow of poverty. The council is supposed to be answerable to the public. Yet the wild story about the gifting of the Aras building to the town was allowed to stand.

There remains the unexamined and unquestioned friars' "wishes". This seems to be embedded now in the local psyche. Perhaps it's time the Franciscans made a statement.

I don't altogether share the criticism of councillors in the saga.

Over the past decade and more a culture has developed where elected members are warned "use it, or lose it". Terrified councillors, terrified of losing big funding for their communities, vote in line whether it is the CPO for the south Kerry greenway or the plan for the Lewis Road. Some of this practice is local authority management style. But much of it has to do with the 2014 Local Government Act which has upset the balance of power.

Back in the day, the terror of going broke and losing money was also the case. I profoundly disagreed with the sale of the town hall ballroom in the late 1980s .

The old town hall was where votes were counted. It was where we went every Saturday night to dance to Horselips, Reform, Clannad and bigger.

It was where my mother and her generation went to see the Desert Song performed by local musicals whose stars remained famous for a generation. It was where we went to take part in Tops of the Towns. But council management argued there was good money on the table for a council that was broke - this was the 1980s.

The Áras Phádraig for me was only ever a poor second to the town hall ballroom.

So I don't much care where the primary care centre goes. Or even the theatre. I just care that this town gets a vital medical centre and an albeit unvital theatre. And Soon.

THIS YEAR'S JULY 4TH NO FUN FOR CHILDREN AND TOURISTS PASSING SHOUTING PROTESTORS

The 4th of July parade may have not been disrupted by the rain, as our august chamber of commerce and tourism put it - while at the

same time refusing to comment on the actual disruption.

This took place at the Market cross by a very vocal large group of Pro-Palestinian protestors. Waving banners about genocide and shouting down and chanting as children performers passed.

Gardai told me they had met with organisers beforehand and expected this year too would be silent and respectful as it was last year. They were very "disappointed" as children performers at one stage had to stop up.

Killarney is a moderate town. It is not extreme and it depends on tourism. American tourists were "shocked and disgusted" and asked one garda if the heckling could be stopped.

No one wants to make a big issue of this - giving raucous protesters buoyed up by their own righteousness more air. But the lid needs to be lifted on this kind of behaviour.

There is no doubt people gathered from across the region for the protest - outnumbering the stalwarts in Killarney who regularly turn out for Palestine. I contacted the representative from Killarney for Palestine who Gardaí met with beforehand but have had no response.

The mayor of Killarney has also expressed his disappointment.

Cllr Martin Grady said it was "an Ireland-American friendship parade. It celebrated the very long links between Killarney and America." "I'm not supporting any war. I'm anti-war. But when I saw children and families avoiding the Market Cross, that's a step too far," the mayor said.

Mayor Martin also said: "Killarney needs to start focusing on accommodating tourists again," and return refugee and asylum accommodation to tourism.

The mayor of Killarney believes they were mostly outsiders who had gathered at the Market Cross, from Macroom and elsewhere. Surely all children whether in Gaza or Killarney deserve our respect and protection. And surely all cultures deserve better than to be shouted

INCH AND DUNDAG - FLAGSHIP BEACHES, BUT NO FACILITIES

Almost fifty thousand euro has been spent by Kerry County Council on consultants for a plan to manage car parking and toilets for Inch And now "the goal posts have changed" - the more than 1,200 acres at

And now "the goal posts have changed" - the more than 1,200 acres at Inch have been purchased by the NPWS as part of the country's first marine national park. And the plan is sitting on a shelf.

Inch, like Dundag, faces a number of problems including showers, all year round toilets and inadequate chaotic parking. Both beaches are now under the control of the National Parks and Wildlife Service. Inch has drawn a world audience since the making of Ryan's Daughter half a century ago. The council in Kerry this weekend erected bollards and other traffic calming measures to avoid the chaotic scenes experienced in May and June.

Inch was used as the flagship for marketing Kerry tourism, yet the lack of year round facilities and pop-up parking for busy days was an ongoing issue, and a total embarrassment, a meeting was told last week.

Four years ago, almost 50,000 euro was allocated for a management plan with funding drawn down by the council under the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme for local authorities (ORIS); But the plan has yet to be published

down in a tourist town?

Cllr Tommy Griffin (FG) said what was taking place at Inch was "a farce". The Minister with Responsibility for the NPWS, Chris O'Sullivan, needed now to intervene, Tommy said, and he called for a meeting with the minister.

The delay in publishing the plan was because "the goal posts had changed" since the involvement by the NPWS, Christy O'Connor, manager of the Municipal District said.

A steering group comprised of the local community, the council and hopefully, the NPWS.

My question is could Minister Chris O'Sullivan be persuaded to visit Dundag too on a busy day? And could some council committee look at the possibility of applying for ORIS funding for showers, bins and other infrastructure for Dundag?

Dillon Quirke Foundation launches first screening for youth cyclists in Killarney

Last week the Dillon Quirke Foundation has today launched its first cardiac screening initiative with athletes from Cycling Ireland.

Every year, Sudden Adult Death Syndrome (SADS) takes 100 young lives in Ireland, deaths which could be prevented by early identification of heart conditions via cardiac screening.

Over the course of two days, the Dillon Quirke Foundation, founded by the family of the young Tipperary hurler who collapsed and died during a match in 2022, were screening young cycling athletes from the Munster region in Killarney, Co. Kerry for potential cardiac abnormalities.

Dan Quirke, father of Dillon Quirke and founder of the Foundation stated today:

"We're proud to be in Killarney to kick off cardiac screenings for young athletes from Cycling Ireland. Today, we're screening more than half of the eligible athletes in Munster, with 90 out of 168 cyclists aged 14 to 18 participating.

"Since starting the Foundation, we've seen remarkable progress in the level of cardiac screening across GAA, soccer, rugby, boxing and performing arts and sports clubs nationwide. We are committed to broadening our reach and expertise across more clubs and sporting bodies and expanding into the cycling community marks a crucial step in raising awareness of the prevalence of SADS and the serious heart conditions that often go undetected.

"It's vitally important for young people, regardless of their sporting and fitness abilities, to understand their heart health and screening is a simple, quick and painless way to protect yourself and your loved ones."

The screening is part of the Foundation's wider campaign to raise awareness of SADS and to increase the number of people getting themselves screened in Ireland. Many of the 100 young deaths a year attributed to SADS could be prevented by identifying heart conditions at an early stage through cardiac screening. Last year the Foundation caught cardiac abnormalities in 243 of the 10,128 young people it screened. These individuals were advised to undergo follow-up cardiology tests post-screening which can include

echocardiograms, cardiac electrophysiologist reviews, cardiology reviews and stress tests.

The effective screenings allow for early detection of potentially life-threatening conditions, which has led to timely interventions, including surgeries, which may have saved lives.

Cycling Ireland has 1,793 youth and junior members across the country, under the age of 18, with approximately 370 registered with Cycling Munster.

South Munster MABS warns of deepening crisis in Kerry as they report **10% increase in people seeking advice** due to crippling financial pressures

South Munster Money Advice and Budgeting Utility Bill Crisis:

Service (MABS) has called for urgent Government action in Budget 2026 to address spiralling debt and housing pressures for struggling families and individuals.

Reporting a 10% rise in caseloads across Kerry since the start of this year, their pre-Budget submission highlights a deepening crisis among low-income and vulnerable households, driven by unsustainable mortgage repayments, soaring rental costs, and crippling utility arrears.

Regional Manager of South Munster MABS Ursula Collins said: "We're now supporting an average of 190 new clients every month in the region. That's not just a number, it reflects hundreds of households facing choices between heating, rent, food or mortgage



payments.

"Too many people are falling through the cracks because supports are too slow, too limited, or simply don't reflect the cost of living on the ground," Ms Collins added.

Key issues for Kerry clients flagged by South Munster MABS:

Mortgage Distress Escalating:

Temporary arrangements for struggling mortgage holders are proving unsustainable as interest rate increases were passed on rapidly, while rate decreases have not been. Many mortgages, now held by non-bank entities,

carry higher interest and fewer protections.

MABS has seen a sharp rise in utility arrears, with some bills reaching up to €9,000.


"We cannot build sustainable repayment plans when providers are asking for lump sums that our clients simply don't have," Ms Collins said, adding that the winding down of Hardship Funds and the uncertainty around energy credits has also left many vulnerable households at serious risk of disconnection.

Rent Beyond Reach:

MABS Kerry has observed some of their clients being asked to pay rents that exceed their income, even when receiving support such as HAP. In one recent case, a household earning €1,200 per month was being asked to pay €1,300 in rent.



The Annual Aghadoe Graveyard Mass will take place this year on Tuesday, July 29th at 8.00pm.



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
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Family Syndicate in Shock

After Landing Historic €250 Million EuroMillions Jackpot but Vows Not to Let it Change Them

"It will still be Ham and Cheese sambos for lunch!"

A family syndicate from Ireland has officially claimed the largest EuroMillions jackpot prize in the nation's history, walking away with a cheque worth an astonishing €250,000,000. The winners, who have chosen to remain anonymous, described their journey to this life-changing windfall as "surreal".

It all began with a simple errand. One family member had an appointment in Cork and stopped into Clifford's Centra on Shandon Street to pick up a few messages.

"I saw the sign at the till that the EuroMillions jackpot was €250 million" said one family member. "Although I'm a regular player, I hadn't bought a ticket for the last two draws. I picked one up and honestly, didn't think much of it." That spontaneous decision would soon turn their world upside down.

"I was watching the Nine O'Clock News and saw that someone in Ireland had the winning EuroMillions ticket. So naturally, I got my ticket and scanned it on the National Lottery app, and a message popped up, 'You've won big, contact the National Lottery.' Obviously, this wasn't a message that I was used to seeing, so I must have checked it 4 more times, I just couldn't believe my eyes!" the ticketholder recalled.

"I ran upstairs to my wife who had just gone to bed and woke her up. We both checked the numbers multiple times on the website. We sat at the edge of the bed, saying 'Oh my god' over



and over – I reckon we said it about fifty times. We were in total shock, complete disbelief." He added, "As you can imagine, sleep was out

of the question that night"

Even still, they set an alarm early the following morning to call the National Lottery. Right on time, they got through to the Claims Team, and after a few tense minutes on hold, the confirmation finally came through - they were officially the winners of €250 million.

"Those few minutes felt like the longest of my life" the winner recalled. "When Ronan from the Claims Team confirmed we were the outright winner, needless to say, we were in total shock all over again."

Until the golden ticket could be handed over, the family kept it carefully hidden, tucked inside an A4 sheet beneath a pile of folded laundry in the bedroom. In the days that followed, they took their time to come to terms with the life-changing news. Determined not to let it overwhelm them, they carried on with their daily routines as normally as possible.

Once the winning ticket was safely in the hands of the National Lottery, they followed advice to seek independent legal and financial guidance and since then, they've been moving forward slowly but steadily, taking each step at their own pace as they adjust to their new reality. So, what's the first thing they plan to do with their fortune?

"We're absolutely going on a family holiday. We love to travel and there's so many amazing trips we've always dreamed of that we can now make a reality. We're already looking at holiday homes somewhere in the sun."

"We also feel incredibly fortunate now to be in a position where we can buy homes for our children too."

But the generosity doesn't stop there. The family plans to support their wider family members including children, grandchildren, close friends, and several charities that are close to their hearts.

When asked if they had any extravagant plans, they laughed and admitted they hadn't anything outrageous in mind just yet.

One member of the syndicate shared, "I always dreamed of owning a Rolex watch, knowing that I could never afford it. I went window shopping last week just to have a look and couldn't believe the price tag of some of the watches. When I phoned my wife to tell her, she said 'sure you can buy them now if you want'!"

"I don't think the news has really sunk in yet"
Despite the life-changing sum, the family insists
they're staying grounded. "We're planning to
remain in Ireland, and we promised ourselves
that we won't let this win change us.

Another added with a laugh, "I'll still be having my favourite ham and cheese sambo for lunch every day!"



Switch to a lightweight moisturiser which hydrates without clogging pores. Sunscreen with SPF 30 or higher and reapply every two hours, especially after swimming or sweating. Mineral sunscreens (zinc oxide or titanium dioxide) are great for sensitive skin. Exfoliate to help remove sweat, sunscreen build-up and dead skin cells. Use a gentle chemical exfoliant 1-2 times per week to keep skin smooth and clear. Hydration is key, increase your water intake and use hydrating serums for that dewy glow. Protect your lips and eyes these delicate areas need extra care. Use an SPF lip balm and wear sunglasses with UV protection to prevent fine lines and sunburn. Sweat and oil production spike in the heat so keep skin clean.



Use a gentle, foaming cleanser daily to avoid breakouts. Use lightweight makeup, tinted moisturiser with SPF, BB cream or mineral powder to give coverage without smothering your skin. If you get sunburnt, soothe your skin with aloe vera gel, green tea extract or a cool compress to help reduce heat, inflammation and promote healing.

WHY DO WE EXERCISE.....

Q3: What's a realistic weekly fitness goal for a busy adult?

A: The WHO recommends at least 150 minutes of moderate aerobic activity per week—think of it as five 30-minute sessions. But if your week is packed, break that into smaller chunks. Ten minutes of movement three times a day is just as effective and often more manageable.

Q4: I sit all day—how bad is that really?

A: Long periods of sitting can lead to stiffness, back pain, reduced circulation, and even long-term health issues. Try to stand or move for at least 5 minutes every hour. Stretch your shoulders, roll your neck, or walk around the room. These small breaks support both your physical and mental well-being.

$\ensuremath{\mathsf{Q5:I}}$ don't have time for meal prepping. How can I eat healthier without overhauling everything?

A: Start with simple swaps. Add vegetables to your pasta, choose whole grains over white bread, and keep healthy snacks like nuts or fruit nearby. Try prepping just a few items like overnight oats or a large salad base to make your week easier. Hydration also matters—drink plenty of water throughout the day!

Q6: Is stretching really that important?

A: Definitely. Stretching improves flexibility, reduces stress, and prevents injury. It's especially important if you sit a lot or exercise regularly. Just 5–10 minutes of stretching in the morning or evening can relieve tension and improve your range of motion over time.

Q7: How do I stay motivated when life gets in the way?

A: Motivation comes and goes—so build a routine that works even when you're not feeling inspired. Set small goals (like walking 10,000 steps a day or exercising 3 times a week), reward yourself when you hit them, and try to make movement fun. Music, fitness buddies, or apps that track progress can help keep things interesting.



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EYES IN THE SUN

Too much sun can damage the eyes. As with skin damage, it is the ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun which causes problems.

There are two types of UV rays: UV-A and UV-B.

Over time, the effects of UV rays may help cause several eye problems.

UV-A

can hurt your central vision. It can damage the macula, a part of the retina at the back of your eye.

UV-B

The front part of your eye (the cornea and the lens) absorbs most UV-B rays, but these rays may cause even more damage to your eyes than UV-A rays.

What Eye Problems Can UV Rays Cause?

UV rays may lead to macular degeneration, a leading cause of vision loss for older people.

Cataract

UV rays, especially UV-B rays, may also cause some kinds of cataracts. A cataract is a clouding of the eye's natural lens, the part of the eye that focuses the light we see.

Pterygium

Another UV-related problem is a growth called pterygium. This growth begins on the white of the eye and may involve the cornea. Eventually, the growth may block vision.

It is more common in people who work outside in the sun and wind.

Skin Cancer

Skin cancer around the eyelids is also linked to prolonged UV exposure.

Corneal Sunburn

Corneal sunburn, called photokeratitis, is the result of high short-term exposure to UV-B rays. Long hours at the beach or skiing without proper eye protection can cause this problem. It can be very painful and may cause temporary vision loss.

Protecting your eyes from the sun

If you are spending time outdoors, especially in the summer or on holidays abroad, make sure that you and your children have good quality, dark sunglasses with UV protection. Look for the British Standard (BS EN ISO 12312-1:2013) or the CE mark, which is the manufacturer's assurance that the sunglasses have been made to the appropriate safety standards. You can also protect your eyes by making sure to wear a hat with a brim or a sun visor in bright sunlight.

STUDENT FEES RAISED IN DAIL EIREANN


Dáil Éireann debate July 8th 2025 - Student Fees Motion

Speaking to the Dail, he said:


I am glad to have the opportunity to discuss the matter. I thank Sinn Féin for giving us the chance to speak on behalf of the students. I welcome the students who are in the Gallery and wish them well for the coming year.

There are a number of things at play here. Many families do not qualify for SUSI. As a result, parents and students have to work very hard to ensure they have funding to go to college. The costs of accommodation, food and travel are excessive. Can the Minister visualise leaving a place like Valentia Island and travelling all the way to Killarney? That is an almost two-hour drive and it takes another two hours to get to Limerick to go to college. That costs money and time and wears on the students who go through it. It is a fact; that is what they have to do. Last year many students from Killarney had to travel on a bus to Limerick every day because they could not get accommodation in Limerick. That is a fact. Students have contacted me about that. It is a very serious matter. It is also very difficult to get accommodation in Cork. I respectfully ask both Ministers here tonight to reconsider in favour of the students and allow them the €1,000. They thought the measure would be there and they would only pay €2,000. I know the Minister commented that the €1,000 reduction last year was as part of a cost-of-living package. He told us he would reduce student fees and we cannot understand or agree to them being raised. I appeal to the Minister on behalf of students throughout the country, especially those in County Kerry who have to travel long journeys to go to college, to do the right thing on this occasion.

'One in Ten Women Experience Suicidal Thoughts Due to Perimenopause'

Turn2Me launches Menopause Support Group

Turn2Me, a national mental health charity, has launched a free online Menopause support group. It will run on Wednesdays, the 23rd, at 6pm. All attendees are welcome, and no referral is required to attend.

"The menopause can bring significant physical and psychological changes," Fiona O'Malley, CEO of Turn2Me, said, "Hot flashes, mood swings, low libido, high libido, night sweats, itchy skin, brain fog, memory issues, exhaustion, anxiety, low mood and unusual periods or no periods can all be experiences of women going through the menopause. This free online support group will be an opportunity for women to talk about their experiences, whether they're peri-menopausal, menopausal or aren't quite sure, it will be a good platform for women to talk about the difficulties they're facing in a confidential safe space."

Research commissioned by Health and Her in 2019 found that nine in ten women going through the menopause experience mental health problems, and one in ten women experienced suicidal thoughts due to perimenopause. Not all women going through the menopause experience mental



health challenges. Turn2Me emphasised that menopausal symptoms can vary significantly from person to person.

"If you have any symptoms of the menopause and are wondering what's happening to your body, you're in the right place if you sign up to this free support group," Suzanne Ennis, Clinical Manager at Turn2Me, said, "Whether it's brain fog, low mood or you're just starting to wonder if something hormonal might be going on - come join the conversation. With temperatures of 29 degrees approaching kick-off, there was a real summer football feel in the air in Longford last night as the Kingdom made the long journey to the midlands to take on Longford Town in Bishopsgate.

First Half

The hosts couldn't have asked for a better start to the game and found themselves a goal to the good inside 3 minutes. A lapse in concentration at the back and an onrushing Longford Town attack allowed Stefan Ugbesia in on goal and slotted home past Mathyas Randriamamy in the Kerry goal. A gift of an opener for Longford. The Town were 2-0 up after 9 minutes, Dean O'Shea doubled the hosts' lead. A short back pass by Mujaguzi found Ugbesia. Niall Brookwell cut out his shot, but the rebounding

ball fell perfectly to O'Shea, who slotted home with ease and gave Kerry a huge uphill battle. Kerry stemmed the tide until the water break. Colin Healy turned to his bench and introduced Arran Healy to add some creativity to the midfield and switch to a back 4.

The game settled, and there was very little to note until the 41st minute when Ronan Teahan went on a good run but was fouled on the edge of the area. Sean O'Connell stepped up but had to go low, and his effort was dragged to the right and wide. Kerry were glad of the half-time break and could use the 15 minutes to regroup and refocus.

Second Half

Kerry did just that and were back in the game just 5 minutes after the restart. Some good build-up play from the back by Ronan Teahan and Kevin Williams, who pinged a lovely ball forward to new signing Robbie Cleary. He turned his man well and let fly from the edge of the box and buried the ball home to the bottom right corner. A great finish on his debut, and Kerry were back in the game.

It was a real purple patch for Kerry, and they should have found an equaliser just minutes later. It was Cleary again inside the box, his rifling shot rattled the crossbar and a huge let off for Longford. Another big chance came a couple of minutes later. Sean McGrath cut inside on the left, and his goal-bound shot was deflected off the post and behind for a corner. But with Kerry lumping everyone forward in the

search for a goal, it was the hosts who would restore their 2 goal cushion in the 57th minute. Another mix-up at the back and Ugbesia gathered a loose ball and slotted home into the net to score his second of the night and the hosts' third.

Robbie Cleary forced a big save from Harry Halwax in the Longford goal in the 64th minute. Arran Healy swung in the resulting corner, and there was a huge scramble on the line, but no Kerry player could knock the ball into the net. Mathyas was called into action again in the 70th minute, and he made a big save in a 1 v 1. Longford did have the ball in the net again 10 minutes from time, but the offside flag chalked that one off.

The game petered out from there, with the teams beginning to struggle in the heat after a high-intensity clash for 90+ minutes. So it is another disappointing defeat for the Kingdom on the road, but focus now shifts to next Friday night's Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup clash against Athlone Town in Mounthawk Park.






























Kerry hit the goal trail to capture first All-Ireland U16 A title since 2016

All-Ireland U16 A Championship final Kerry 4-17 Mayo 0-5

An unanswered scoring burst of 1-4 in the last five minutes of the first half created the perfect platform for Kerry to deservedly overcome Mayo in comprehensive style in the All-Ireland ladies football U-16 A football championship final at McDonagh Park in Nenagh.

Playing an entertaining fast and direct style, the Kingdom youngsters got off off to an absolutely dream start, winning the throw-in and putting a fine move together that resulted in full-forward Lily Riordan supplying a cool finish to the Mayo net after only 25 seconds.

Despite that hammer blow, the Connacht champions settled into the contest and, with wind assistance in the opening 30 minutes, they supplied three of the next four points – Katie Hughes, Emily Duffy and Aoibhinn McNamara all on the mark.

Kerry kept their noses in front, through the reliable free-taking of Jessie Lynch and an inspirational point from captain Leah Griffin. However, when accurate full-forward Hughes fired over in the 23rd minute, Mayo were within three of their opponents at 1-4 to 0-4.

Kick-started by a Julie O'Connor white flag, Kerry won the resultant Mayo kick-out and Kelsey Cummins found the net from the ensuing attack, despite the best efforts of Mayo netminder Meabh Lavin to keep the ball out.

That was a real kick in the teeth for Francis

Regan's charges, who then found themselves ten points adrift at the half-time break — 2-8 to 0-4 — as the Kingdom used their foot-passing skills to good effect with Riordan, Lynch (free) and Cummins all adding late first half points.

Realistically, there was no way back on the resumption, when facing into the elements. Indeed, they were restricted to just a single point in the entire second half, and they also had a late, late penalty kick by top scorer Hughes brilliantly saved by Kerry 'keeper Caoimhe O'Mahony.

All Ireland Championship State of Play

A riddle wrapped in an enigma wrapped in a mystery. Churchill wasn't actually talking about Kerry on that occasion - thankfully, I would think, that old warhorse was a bit more xenophobic than history books like to admit - but it would certainly seem to sum up their form this year. A league title that sometimes felt like nobody else was all that pushed about it, with eyes on provincial championship. Kerry were expected to blow Cork away in said provincial championship - instead, it was one of the best games of the entire championship. It's very simple; never, ever take your eye off Cork. We beat them a second time to win Munster and put ourselves up among the All Ireland favourites.

Beat Roscommon handily enough. No disrespect to Roscommon, but that wasn't any surprise either. Then came Meath..... and a grenade exploded in our laps. Meath had already caused the surprise of the championship by seeing off a lacklustre Dublin in the Leinster semi-final. I'd argue that their demolition of Kerry was even more surprising, and as much about Kerry malaise as Meath quality. Frankly, we were awful.

And, Páidi having been absolutely right about Kerry supporters on that trip to South Africa, there was much wailing and lamentation on the streets. Sackcloth and ashes and whispers behind hands and narrow eyes....

Some lads tried to sell the notion that Kerry 'redeemed' themselves by beating Cavan. I know that paper never refused ink, but by jaysus sometimes it should. Cavan were always going to be an easier proposition than a fired up Meath, and comparisons between the two were just embarrassing. It felt to me as if Kerry's confidence, both within and outside the camp, was brittle all of a sudden. We had looked good along the soft road, but had crumbled at the first sign of real opposition.

Of course, ongoing injuries were the framework for the narrative. We were decimated. Players who hadn't gotten many minutes during the league were suddenly thrust into starting jerseys. As it happened, they filled them brilliantly – but you were no more sure of that at the time than I was.

Look, this isn't any day for surliness, but just to put it out there – the artificial elongation of a sixteen team championship by the insertion of a group stage in a shorter calendar than before is giving lads no chance to recover. It's no wonder that niggles are developing

into injuries. It might be profitable for the GAA, but it's cat melodeon for players and supporters. You don't even have time to savour the victories; it's straight on to the next game. As for dual players....it's practically impossible even at club level now. Next year should be better; it'd want to be.

Ah, minor quibbles. Overall it's been a fantastic year for football. The new rules have opened up the game. No mass defence, less (but still too much) of hand passing ball retention. Ambitious play rewarded. Last year, frankly, skillful players were an optional luxury. Joe Keohane, never a man to mince his words, famously said in 1980 that "a bunch of professional basketball players could win the All-Ireland today." In the last couple of years a rugby league team would take you an awful lot of the way, and I genuinely believe that.

Armagh in the quarter-final. Straight up, I was very worried. A bit of mend and make do about Kerry's selection. And Armagh looked to me like the side with the deepest panel. They had six or seven subs who could come on seamlessly. Last year's All Ireland, without disputing that Armagh ran us into the ground and took some brilliant scores that day, felt like an endurance trial as much as anything. Frankly, for the All Ireland Final, I tought both teams looked exhausted even in the first half. It's a long slog. Would we be able to stay with Armagh in a tight finish?

Nostradamus may have been a bit of a spoofer (didn't exactly predict the shipwreck, did he?) but let's face it, he probably has a better record than me at this stage.

Kerry were transformed. There's been a lot of talk about the fifteen minutes in the second half, and with good reason. That was as close to gaelic football perfection as I have seen. Once we locked up Armagh's kickout, that was that. But even outside of that fifteen minutes, Kerry had a sense of purpose and confidence. Had Jack been quietly keeping a bit of dry powder hidden from us? I suspect so, and if so, fair play to him. For me, that was the day that the likes of Mark O'Shea, Seán O'Brien, and Dylan Geaney (he creates space brilliantly, even if his finishing isn't quite refined yet) nailed down jerseys. Evan Looney stepped seamlessly off the bench. Any lingering questions about Graham O'Sulivan as a wing forward were completely banished - I still say it was necessity that put him up there but it has turned out to be a masterstroke. Kerry's defence is rock solid - Dylan Casey has answered a few remaining questions for me as well. As for Micheál Burns....jaysus, but he tormented them. There's no marker could cope with those energy levels.

So Kerry were brilliant but untested for the early part of the year. A written-off shambles after the Meath game. Personally,I read nothing into that 'meh' game against Cavan; I wasn't afraid of them, but it wasn't dispelling the lingering clouds after Meath either. Then came Armagh, and all the previous doubters were suddenly true believers again. I'm a bit sceptical of the rollercoaster. Kerry football supporters and romantic teenagers....more hormones than common sense.

I was wary of Tyrone.I felt all along that Dublin were biding their time. No, they hadn't expected to lose in Leinster, but I didn't feel that they had thrown the kitchen sink at it either. And Tyrone beat Dublin fair and square. Two huge midfielders. Three sharpshooters in the Canavans and McCurry – one day all three will catch fire together. Hasn't happened yet, but the potential is obvious. Mattie Donnelly has been one of the most consistently solid

footballers in the country for the last number of years (I still feel that Tyrone never got the best use out of Cathal McShane,

whom I rated in that category as well). I didn't expect McElholm to start, but I was sure he would be there for the key minutes. The U20 FOTY and clear frontrunner for YFOTY for me (It'll go to a Donegal player, probably Ciarán Moore ahead of Finbarr Roarty and Conor Duke). No county out there has anything like the stream of talent Tyrone have coming up along the ranks.

We don't actually have the long history of rivalry with Tyrone that it can sometimes appear. Ulster was always a competitive province, and one where social and political considerations made gaelic games extra challenging. There were underage clashes, but as far as I can tell, our first actual meeting was in 1986. Tyrone were good, but that Kerry team had revolutionised the game and Tyrone could put it up to us (the penalty was crucial – underdogs need those breaks to go their way, and any team playing that Kerry side were underdogs) but not see it out.

Then came 2003. Another evolution in the game, albeit a negative one. It never deserved the term 'puke football' but it certainly emphasized athleticism over skill and defensive line breaks rather than attacking spectacle. Look, I'd have done the same thing, and it worked, and it dominated the game for twenty years. I'm having no cut at Tyrone – they had incredible forwards as well – but the game was stagnating. And I will still say that Kerry adopted as negative approach as anyone, we should be throwing no stones in the glasshouse.

They beat us again in 2005. It was singing. We had a certain arrogance about us, be honest about it. Outfield or outshoot us, fair enough, but tactically outmanouevre us? It didn't sit well.

The Tyrone supporters were always great company, win or lose. I can say that hand on heart. Ulster are a welcoming people always.

2008. It felt to me like we were caught by surprise in 2003. We were better prepared in 2005 and ran them close, but they were that honest but better. Taking off and restoring Peter Canavan was a masterstroke. But 2008? I thought we gave it a great shout, but Seán Cavanagh gave one of the all-time great displays. Credit where due.

There was a lot of emotion around the win in Killarney in 2012. Maybe a bit too much; even at the time, I thought neither side was at their best. Kerry supporters made more significance of that one than I thought it deserved. It was nice, but it didn't feel like any hoodoo laid to rest.

Then came Dublin's greatest era. And they were genuinely great. If you look at the personnel changes, that wasn't one great Dublin team, that was two of them in a row. Kerry and Tyrone were still dining at the top table, but we weren't making the toasts. We had a slight edge on them, but Dublin had both our numbers.

2021. No, I didn't like the background, the lack of vaccinations, etc. Were there games being played in the background? I'll just say it, there's





a bit of an asterisk over that one in my opinion. But it was fifteen against fifteen on the field. I actually thought David Moran lorded midfield, David Clifford was magnificent, but the goals that we coughed up....one that got away.

2023. We were comfortably better. David Clifford's pass...they'll show that on highlights reels for decades to come.

Right now, Ulster football is dominant in all grades. But Kerry.....l like Kerry's progression, and I'm not just talking about the senior team.

KERRY PART THE RED SEA

All Ireland Semi-Final: Kerry 1-20 Tyrone 0-17

God, it's roasting. Don't mind playing a physical game; I'm feeling energy sapping away just driving. There's a lot of Kerry cars on the road. There's been a feeling all week that this one is do or die for Kerry and support will be important – not exactly a usual strength of ours, to be honest.

The obligatory stop to admire Adare – beautiful town, but you know what would be even more beautiful? That's right, a bypass. Ah, well. When I first started driving, you were a conservative three hours just to get to Limerick. And to be fair, once I'm past that bottleneck, it's a clear

run along the motorway.

Nice buzz in a packed Croke Park. I have to say that both sets of supporters are mingling freely. It's nice, there's a lot of sports where that doesn't happen.

Mark O'Shea and Paudie Clifford starting instead of Micheál Burs and Conor Geaney. Nothing against either Micheál or Conor, but we need Mark's physicality to bulk midfield and we need Paudie's workrate. Tyrone have two changes as well. I had been hearing for a while that Michael McKernan will be fit to play, but it turns out just to be a rumour – they sprout everywhere for games like this. I can't complain, I've started one or two in my time!

Joe McQuillan throws up the ball in Croke Park, probably for the last time (he's retiring from refereeing). Picked a doozy to finish on!

Kerry on the attack. David Clifford impeded, that was a bit clumsy by Ben McDonnell. Seánie slots it over and Kerry are on the scoreboard.

Tyrone win the kick-out at their ease and McElholm attacks before laying off to Ciarán Daly. Level pegging. Tyrone win Kerry's kick-out through Conn Kilpatrick and Seánie O'Donnell races forward. Too easy, he's almost in the square when he's finally fouled, with Darragh Canavan pointing the free. Tyrone look that bit sharper so far.

Tyrone win the kick-out again. McCurry launches one from distance but Shane Ryan

rises high to bat it away.

Good stop by Shane, but lads, we desperately need some toehold in midfield. Kieran McGeary, who looks back to his 2020 form, kick a good point for Tyrone.

McCurry has a chance to add another but it curls away harmlessly; McCurry is a good player but he just hasn't clicked into form this year (not that I'm encouraging it!). Kerry feel vulnerable here. Mattie Donelly sets up Ciarán Daly from a tight angle, that's another good score. 0-4 to 0-1.

David Clifford with a good effort, but Niall Morgan makes the catch, raising a huge cheer from the Tyrone supporters. Kerry are getting a bit more pressure on the ball now, though, and Dylan Geaney steadies himself to finish off a Kerry move with a score. It was noticeable that Tyrone were concentrating on David Clifford even as he laid it off to Dylan. Great awareness by David to lure the defenders and time the pass – but I'm not sure if people give Dylan credit for his ability to find those nooks and crannies of space. It's an art form in itself.

Eoin McElholm with a Tyrone point. He's good, very good. Seán O'Shea is getting very little change off a tight Peter Teague, but he evades him to get in one on one with Niall Morgan. He opts to take the point – off the post. Kerry need to take something from chances like that.

Dylan Geaney with a shot – it looked over – but play is called back for a free. No bother to Seán O'Shea. David Clifford brushes past a hapless Pádraig Hampsey and takes his point. Could he have gone for goal? Arrah, I'm hardly going to be second-guessing this particular forward!

Darragh Canavan with another punt from long range. It's going over too, but Shane Ryan makes a salmon leap to intercept. There aren't too many keepers reaching that one.

At the other end Seánie O'Shea's two point effort is gathered easily by Morgan and the ball comes down the field, with Seánie O'Donnell popping over. 0-6 to 0-4. The deficit actually feels bigger, but Kerry are definitely growing into the game now.

Putting Pádraig Hampsey one on one with David Cifford was always going to be about damage limitation for Tyrone, and the big man shows why with a superb two-pointer. He almost has another one, but it comes back off the post.

Water break. Not for the players, for me. Seriously, it's physically draining even watching this.

Joe O'Connor is key to Kerry's resurgence around the middle, and the Stacks' man makes a trademark burst forward. He tries to pass across to Seán O'Brien but Niall Morgan judges it absolutely perfectly and cuts it out. Brilliant by the Tyrone keeper – but that has to go down as another wasted opportunity by Kerry. These could haunt us yet. Play is brought back for an earlier infringement, the free is meat and drink for David Clifford.

0-7 to 0-6, Kerry in front for the first time. Tyrone lorded the opening ten minutes, absolutely owned everything in the middle, and are

down a point? And that's with Kerry leaving a few chances behind them? If I was on Tyrone's sideline, I'd be looking at making changes, and certainly speeding up the ball into the Tyrone attack. That's what Kerry are doing, and it's working. Mind you, with the draining heat, substitutions will be needed later on; I don't think you could play any cards too early. Tough one to call. Seán O'Brien with a good effort, but it falls short into Morgan. Mattie Donnelly finds a gap at the other end. I'd say he thought about goal but took the simple point instead; I'd have done the same thing. All square again.

Dodgy enough kick-out and Eoin McElholm sends it back with interest...but not enough accuracy.

End to end stuff now, and Kerry are looking that little bit sharper to me. Jaysus, let's not be tempting fate. It could be an optical illusion. In this heat, it could be an actual mirage.

Kerry's no. 13 with a look at goal. Good chance, hardly Kerry's first, but once again they spurn the opportunity as he gets too much spin on it and it curls outside the goalpost. Who gave this lad a Kerry jersey? What's Jack O'Connor playing at?

Yes, of course I'm joking. Sarcasm may be the lowest form of humour, but I'd say it's still too highbrow for a couple of ye.

Darragh Canavan with a good score for Tyrone. 0-8 to 0-7. Either side could pull away yet, but I still think that we have weathered the bulk of the storm until half-time at least. Both sides will have to rejig at that point; this heat is stifling, and I'm only watching the game.

David Clifford again. It's an absolutely perfectly weighted pass by Mike Breen. Honestly, top drawer quality. Give David a ball like that and, well, he takes one loping stride to wrongfoot the defence and take him away from Morgan's reach. In fairness, that's one of the best shotstoppers in the game – but it's an even better finisher and David rolls it home. Huge moment. Kerry may have laboured in midfield early on, but Joe O'Connor is running absolutely

rampant now. Kilpatrick is still battling ferociously for Tyrone and Brian Kennedy isn't any shrinking violet either, but with the likes of Brian Ó Beaglaíoch, Gavin White, Graham O'Sullivan, and Mark O'Shea contesting everything, Joe O'Connor has the freedom, and more importantly, the ability to dominate.

Graham O'Sullivan points for Kerry. Kerry come again, Brian Ó Beaglaíoch with a nice carry and 1-2 with Mark O'Shea. He finds Seán O'Brien at the back post....Niall Morgan is on it like a flash to prevent the goal. Great goalkeeper credit where it's due.

Joe O'Connor with a shot off the post, but it's called back for a free and David Clifford kicks it over. 1-5 for the Fossa man, but this is no one-man show. Just before half-time Mattie Donnelly kicks a fine point for Tyrone, but Kerry would certainly be the happier side traipsing in for the break.

Look, just a tiny quibble. I don't want to be Mr. Cranky, but that hooter is just too loud. No need for it.

Darragh Canavan with the opening score of the second half. Himself and Donnelly are the only two Tyrone forwards with a bit of menace about them, but I still think that Tyrone are trying to carry it out from the back too much with support runners. With Kerry's full back line on top for the most part, it means that our half backs are set to attack the ball. I still think they should be kicking it in faster. Says me, mind you, who couldn't catch up with a runaway tortoise. Kerry are much faster to attack Tyrone's square and it actually takes frantic defending for them to clear their lines. Just with the hard work done, Kilpatrick coughs up a handy enough free with a careless push. He doesn't make too many mistakes like that. Could he be tiring after his storming first quarter? Arrah, whist. Don't be tempting fate. Handy point for David Clifford, though. Remember Dr. Eamonn O'Sullivan's famous mantra? 'Fear Fatal Fouling'. As true now as it ever was.

Oof! That's a great kick by Darragh Canavan, in fairness. Two pointer. Just one in it now. This is feeling like crunch time. Stick or twist. Whichever side gets a run on it now is going to be very hard to stop.

Speaking of hard to stop...well, that kind of sums up Paudie Cifford as a footballer. Takes his point. Was a goal on? Tight enough chance for me, with Niall Morgan ready for it. I'd be well happy with a point from that situation.

Darragh Canavan with a Tyrone point. We just can't pull away.

Maybe we can. David Clifford with another point. McElholm with a chance short after good work by Kilpatrick. I'm certainly not knocking a very talented young player, but those little things are actually huge moments.

Joe O'Connor with another burst of speed. Possibly thought about the goal but put it over instead. Again, I'm quite happy with a point. 1-13 to 0-13 now. Those points are adding up. Kerry seem to be taking over. It's Dylan Geaney's turn to bear down on goal. Morgan steadies himself, but the shot rolls wide. Tight angle. I suppose I'm conservative, maybe that should have been fisted over.

Joe again. Another half a goal chance if he could have sidestepped, but you are asking a lot of a player at top speed. Again he takes the point; again I think he is right to do so. Keep working the scoreboard while you are on top. It's not the one big moment that decides a game; it's a multiplicity of the small ones getting done right.

Tyrone look fairly shaky now. Michael McKernan comes on, but it feels more like desperation than strategy and the Tyrone supporters' cheer feels a bit half-hearted. No guarantees yet, of course, but it feels like this game is slipping away from them.

It's a Kerry sub who makes the immediate difference. Killian Spillane gathers, cuts back, and coolly fires over off his left. That's a heartbreaker point to put five between them. Paudie Clifford with his second point. McKernan and David Clifford are testing the cloth on each others' jerseys. Conn Kilpatric comes in to put in his two cents. McQuillan is having a fine game overall, maybe even leaning slightly towards us, but Clifford and McKernan are booked for that? Not the third man in? I know that Kilpatrick was already on a yellow - which is why I thought it was ridiculous of him to get involved in that. Great player, a genuine lionheart....but he was a lucky boy there.

He redeems himself fast with a great block on Killian Spillane. At the other end McKernan is wide. Tyrone need every score now; Kerry have all the leeway, and David Clifford knows it as he slots another one.

Darragh Canavan with a two pointer, but play is called back for an earlier foul on Kieran McGeary. Tyrone fans – who have been genuinely sound all afternoon - are furious at that one. Lads, the whistle had sounded long before he kicked it. There's no doubt about that at all.

Do you think I said it out loud? I did not, I agreed vigorously that the referee had wronged Tyrone there. There's warriors and there's diplomats...

Seán O'Shea at the other end. Straight over the bar. Everything is going over for Kerry. Tyrone are at sixes and sevens. It happens to teams; it's happened to us on plenty of occasions. Sometimes when you need it so badly, you end up trying to force it, whereas Kerry are playing with that big lead providing a cushion.

Killian Spillane on the other side. Once again he jinks and puts it over, this time off his right. David Cliffford takes his personal tally to 1-9 and Kerry's lead to 1-20 to 0-13.

Seánie O'Donnell looking for a goal shot but Kerry have the hatches battened down tight and he has to settle for a point. Their first score in twenty minutes. Darragh Canavan with a free. It doesn't matter; they need at least one goal. Ruairi Canavan kicks an excellent two pointer, but it's little more than a statistic. Mattie Donnelly has one last effort that curls away. All academic.

Tyrone are a coming team. Have no doubt about that. But Kerry - and I'll freely admit that I doubted it myself a few times as injuries mounted - are a right here, right now team.

One game away. Lads, it's going to be a long wait. As for the hunt for tickets and trying to book the train....You know those zen lads who





like to say that it's all about the journey, not the destination? It would be wrong to bate them lads around the ears, but more of a venial than a mortal sin, I'd say.

All Ireland Intermediate Semi-Final: Kerry 3-12 Down 0-16

Kerry beat Down by two points in a cracking group game to earn an extra week's rest and qualify directly for an Intermediate semi-final. Down came the long way around, having seen off a good Meath side in the interim and also winning the inaugural U23 C All Ireland. It didn't take them long to let Kerry know that they would be facing a different and more seasoned proposition on this occasion. Straight from the throw-in, Rachel McCarthy was bundled over her own end line with ball in hand and Paula O'Hagan confidently split the posts with a '45. She soon doubled her tally and Aimee

McAleenan made it 0-3 to 0-0 with a great score from play off her left.

There was no question but that Kerry were in trouble here, second to every ball, struggling to find each other, and completely outplayed by a much sharper, crisper Down side around the middle.

Jackie Horgan did get Kerry off the mark after a precise pass from Niamh Leen and Patrice Diggin brought Kerry back within a point with a lovely long range score. That scoreline definitely flattered an outplayed Kerry so far, though, and it didn't take a hungry Down side long to extend their tally, the outstanding O'Hagan punishing a foul on Saoirse Sands and joint captain Beth Fitzpatrick, looking much more comfortable after switching back to her more orthodox playmaker role at centre back from the forward line, firing over a beauty.

Kerry were living on scraps, but making good use of them, with a hardworking Kate Lynch notching a point. Just on the fifteen minute mark, Kerry caught a real stroke of luck. Amy O'Sullivan's speculative effort at a point dropped down on Cassie Fitzpatrick straight out of the blinding sun (I was surprised that water breaks weren't allowed, given the searing heat) and the unfortunate goalkeeper deflected it into her own net. Kerry, astonishingly, ahead by 1-3 to 0-5 after the first quarter.

In fairness, Kerry were beginning to handle Down's long balls onto the defence much better and starting to look more assured in general play. A foul on Jackie Horgan saw Patrice Diggin stretch our lead to two points, 1-4 to 0-5.

Back came Down. Paul O'Hagan neatly clipped over from a tight angle and added a free. Level pegging again, and the game really livening up. Sara Murphy denied Niamh McGrath with a brilliant flick, but it was only a temporary delay as Aimee McAleenan followed up for the point. Just before the break, Dearbhla McGee snapped over another one to give Down a deserved lead heading into the dressing room. *Half-time Down 0-9 Kerry 1-5*

Patrice Diggin gave Kerry the perfect start to the second half, booming over a magnificent free from the halfway line and then pointing from play. Back came Down, Paula O'Hagan notching another free and Niamh McGrath picking off a fine point from play.

On the balance of play, one would be inclined to give Down a slight nod at this stage, but this Kerry team are always capable of that little bit of magic that can completely turn the tide. There didn't look to be too much danger in the 37th minute as both sides tussled for a loose ball in the Down half back line, but Anne Marie Leen scooped it up and burst forward in one impeccably timed move. Caught on the hop, Down were forced to unceremoniously drag her down. Referee Patrick Murphy had no hesitation in awarding the penalty and Patrice Diggin hit a precision rocket that gave the keeper no chance. If there was more than a hint of luck about Kerry's first goal, there was no doubt whatsoever about the second!

It got better straight from the puck-out as a visibly pumped Kerry immediately hunted

down possession and Jackie Horgan, after a year somewhat interrupted by injury, reminded everyone what she can do at her best by cutting in along the endline and firing home from close range. Two goals in a minute, and the tide had completely changed. 3-7 to 0-11 and Kerry in the driving seat.

Down had a chance at the other end when Beth Fitzpatrick's long ball was deflected into the lurking Tara Monan, but she couldn't get power into her shot and an alert Aoife Fitzgerald cleared her lines. Paula O'Hagan did fire over a free but Patrice Diggin replied. Aimee McAleenan and Sarah Louise Graffin pointed for Down. Just a goal in it now, but Patrice split the posts again to give us that extra sliver of daylight.

With ten minutes to go, Tara Monan was in on goal again, but Aoife Fitzgerald made a superb save to deny her from close range. Paula O'Hagan pointed a free and a '45 as Down put the pressure on, but Kerry's defence held up well. Caoihe Spillane hit a brilliant point from long distance and Jackie Horgan stretched the gap back out to four before Patrice Diggin capped a magnificent Kerry performance with one last free to set up an All Ireland Intermediate Final with Offaly.





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
















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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.




A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.

This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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AUTUMN CONTAINERS

Containers filled with permanent and seasonal plants can be very versatile as they can be moved anywhere in the garden at any time to brighten any corner. It is usually annuals the are planted in containers, but you can also plant them with most shrubs, grasses, herbaceous perennials and even certain types of trees and conifers. Vegetables can also be grown in containers. If you have an area in ur garden that you would like to screen off but havean't got the earth to do it, you can plant most climbers in containers. A good type of containers for this is a quarter barrel as it can fit next to a wall or railing.

As with all plants in container, make sure that you water and feed regularly. When choosing a terracotta container, make sure that the label says frost proof rather than frost resistant as these can still crack in prolonged frost. There are also imitation terracotta pots made from plastic which are very practical to use in vour garden.

The Lord Jesus knows it all, and His Salvation Yeshua is the answer to it all (John 14:6). Our latest podcast on Spotify this week 'Building Security' is worth a listen for help.

The world's reasoning spews that faith in God has no relevance or meaning today because outward religious rituals versus intimate true fellowship with the Lord Jesus have been mixed up. As a result, many figure that they must not believe in God. Man has compromised the message of the Gospel. A few bad apples can spoil the basket.
