### Chamber supports Ireland's Tourism & Hospitality Industry

Killarney Chamber is backing the Irish Tourism Industry Confederation (ITIC) campaign in highlighting the deteriorating situation facing tourism businesses and employees and setting out the urgent measures urgently required to secure our industry's future.

In a letter to all members from President Paul Sherry, members are being asked to get involved and sign their online petition.

In a "Call to Action" document circulated to all members the chamber has stated that COVID-19 has had shattering financial consequences onireland's tourism and hospitality industry which has been the country's hardest hit economic sector and is set to have one of the slowest recoveries.

The closure of tourism and hospitality businesses for long periods, the reductio in capacity due to social distancing rules and the effective restriction to the

country of international tourists has caused massive damage to Ireland's largest indigenous industry and biggest regional employer.

The Department of Business Enterprise and Innovation has projected that tourism revenue will fall by €5 billion this year and there will be up to 200,000 industry job losses. However, it need not be like this. 50% of these jobs can be saved with the right Government intervention and the industry can resume a growth path out to 2025.

Irish tourism can, and will, recover from this existential crisis. However, if Ireland's world-class tourism and hospitality industry is to be secured, Government need to take five key decisions urgently to enable businesses to begi the process of recovery, create employment, provide regional economic balance, and enable productive enterprise and innovation.

THE FIVE KEY POLICIES NEDED TO SECURE IRISH TOURISM:

1: Comprehensive Covid-19 rapid testing regime to replace quarantine rule and green list and enable internatinoal travel to recommence safely.

2: Revision of the Employment Wage Subsidy Scheme, so that it is in line with terms of the Temporary Wage Subsidy Scheme

3. Business Continuity Grants for tourism and hospitality industry of €500 million to provide Enterprise and Brexit supports.

4. VAT to be reduced to 9% for all tourism and hospitality businesses, and waiving of commercial rates to April 2021

5. Doubling of International marketing funds and tourism budgets.

waited patiently with the McCarthy family outside Ruby Tuesday as Erica's work station was being sanitised by hairdresser Triona O'Shea. Erica McCarthy, aged 8, 2nd Class at the Two Mile School was waiting to have her beautiful blonde hair (with highlights to die for) chopped up into a cute bob.

With the help of Erica's Mum Sharon, Erica was infact helping not one but two charities today.

I complemented this brave little girl and asked her why she was donating her beautiful hair? "I am doing it to be kind Marie" Erica smiled. Be still my beating heart, what a treasure of a girl. €1,500 and counting for Temple Street AND a brand new hair piece for a child in need.

"My brother attends the renal department at Temple Street in Dublin so I got lots of sponsorship through Mums Facebook page 'Sharon's fundraiser for Temple Street Children's Hospital'. Imagine Marie, we have over €1,500 already raised. I want to say a big thank you to everyone who donated but especially to Firies Ladies Football team who donated €100" Erica smiled. Most impressive from one brave little 8 year old

girl. "The best news is that someone will be able to wear my hair who doesn't have hair of their own. We are sending my hair to Rapunzel Ponytails in Wexford, where they will make it into a hair piece for a child without hair" Erica explained.

Before Triona invited us in for Erica's appointment, popular local lady Marie Keogh O'Sullivan passed and asked was she skipping the queue at Ruby Tuesdays? I knew Marie well enough to introduce Erica and her story. "Erica you are a very brave girl. I had cancer and I lost all my hair so I know first hand how very special and happy you will make one child feel" Marie said. Gulp!! Words with powerful impact. I knew Marie would give words of encouragement to a little girl about to have 12 inches of her golden locks removed. Thank you Marie!

"I will be like my big sister Hayley who did the exact same thing" Erica beamed. We had a few minutes to kill so I asked Erica what it was like being back at school and what was her favourite part of lockdown. "I'm delighted to be back at school with all my friends again. I will miss my pony Jazz though as I was so lucky to have him in my neighbours field beside my house the whole time I was off school. That's another good thing about getting my hair cut Marie... it will be way easier to manage for school and horse riding too" Erica laughed.

In the salon I think I was just as excited/ nervous as little Erica. Her Dad Mike, brother Noah and sister Freya watched from the window as the deed was done and they gave a little cheer of support as Mum Sharon & I snapped away. Erica didn't flinch once, she simply smiled.

I later spoke to Triona who has given long term support to Rapunzel Ponytails and the different charities affiliated with hair donation over her 20+ years in business. "I think that it's very brave of Erica or any child to part with their hair for somebody else. It takes a special someone to do that. Her hair is in fabulous condition so we are delighted to be donating two 13 inch plaits of blonde highlights to Rapunzel today" Triona told me. I was interested to know how many plaits it would take to create an entire hair piece. "It really depends Marie. I would say definitely a minimum of 12 plaits".

When I got home I did a little google search on that and Triona was right. Online the answers varied between 5-30 plaits so I guess that depends on the age of the recipient for the size of the hair piece.

## Seamus O'Brien is inspirational and exceptional, he is a realest

## He sees what has to be done and gives it his all

If you live in the Listry/Faha/Milltown area or even beyond, you might well have noticed Seamus O'Brien on his bike, pictured with his two dogs Cooper (left) & Luna (right) who sometimes accompany him.

"I'm sure people get a bit of a shock when they pass me and see me pedalling with just one leg"! It absolutely baffled me how this was possible or more so the sheer determination that went into making it possible.

In February 2018 Seamus O'Brien was involved in an accident and was crushed between and dumper and the bucket of a JCB. "I should have been killed stone dead Marie or paralysed". The visual of Seamus is that he has lost his leg but the reality was a double pelvic fracture, a broken left leg, skin grafts to the right leg and a severed urethra which is on going. After many surgeries which needed to be explored Seamus had his leg amputated in November 2019. "The procedure was to try and save my leg first so I had to go through many surgeries to explore the option of saving the leg first" Seamus told me. With just one incoming wage, Seamus's wife Ruth is a nurse at the Bons Secour Hospital and has opted to work night shifts as standard to

Ruth is a nurse at the Bons Secour Hospital and has opted to work night shifts as standard to accommodate her family - Ciaran (18), Oisin (16), Cara (15) & Aideen (14). "Seamus has missed so many family events, the most being memorable being Aideen confirmation or our trip to Florida. Oisin & Cara were competing with the Scorchers a couple of years ago. Seamus couldn't go because of appointments & surgeries and he was wheelchair bound. We were gutted as it was our dream family holiday" Ruth told me.

I could see that Seamus was a physically active man and wasn't surprised to hear that he is the Development Officer for the Kerry Ladies team and has recently studied GAA Sport & Coaching Development through the ETB in Tralee. He has that 'get up and go' look about him and he later told me how he used to go for long walks with the dogs on his crutches prior to his amputation!!!! In 1991 Seamus played with The Kingdom GAA club until they joined forces with Kerry Gaels. Seamus played for the Kingdom Kerry Gaels (KKG) until 2000 and played in the team which were beaten in the 2000 London Senior championship final. He has passed on his love for the GAA to his kids who are currently playing underage with Milltown/Listry and Seamus is helping train the Keel/Listry U14s.

With such a life changing injury I imagined that it came with a heavy price financially as well as mentally?? "Like anything Marie, you'd have a good day and a bad day. The dynamics of our family is not the same. We've had to change a lot. We had to replace our car to automatic and we will have to adapt our home too. For



the moment the priority is a new prosthetic leg which will cost between €100,000-€120,000" Seamus told me. I didn't spit out my tea but I nearly did. Where would this money come from. On one wage a remortgage would be impossible!! "My prosthesis is a little different to others Marie. My amputation was above the knee so my prosthesis is through the knee" Seamus explained. "The existing prosthetic leg I have is far too dangerous to cycle with so that's why I go solo". When Seamus begins cycling from his home he cannot stop pedalling until he returns home.

On 18th Sept, Chairperson of the Kingdom Kerry Gaels in London, Dermot O'Grady, has organised a golf outing to help Seamus and his family to finance his new prosthesis, at Aldenham Country Club Watford. The beauty of the competition is you can take part virtually between 18th-25th Sept at Dooks & Ballybunnion Golf Clubs who are on board to help Seamus & his family. As I tried to make Luna & Cooper look at the camera, Ruth, Seamus & I chatted and I asked if there was such a thing as a customised bicycle. Seamus told me about a programme on RTE

called The Big Life Fix where a group of people came together and custom made such items as bicycles and general mobility enhancement devices which I found interesting. It is a thing and it can be done. You just have to know the right people.

Seamus & Ruth asked me to thank the Kingdom Kerry Gaels, The Scorchers, Killarney Vintage Club for all that they have helped with so far.

Seamus O'Brien is inspirational & exceptional. He is a realest. He sees what has to be done and gives it his all. Seamus has three new goals going forward. I wasn't one bit surprised at that. "I look forward to getting back to work and perhaps doing safety talks in the work place or in schools. I would love to qualify for the Paralympics in the future and to someday kick a football again". I have no doubt Seamus will accomplish all of the above.

Thank you for having me at your home in Listry Seamus & Ruth (who was far too shy to be in the paper!).

### DEPUTY RAISES LEAVING CERT CONCERNS IN THE DAIL

In the Dáil this week, Danny Healy-Rae, TD raised the concerns of the many leaving Cert students who have contacted him in the last week.

"I was disappointed with The Taoiseach Micheál Martin's response and that he is not prepared to accept that many young students are dispairing because they could not get the college place they wanted", Deputy Healy-Rae told Killarney Outlook.

"The cornerstone of the predictive grade system was that the professional judgement of the teacher would be key. Teachers gave their professional opinion on what would be the fairest grade that an individual student would achieve if they sat the exam, however, this professional opinion seems to have been questioned by the state examinations commission. 17% of all estimated grades were reduced and at higher level, in subjects 1 in 5 estimated grades were lowered. How many grades if any were upgraded? How was it


acceptable for the State examinations commission in some cases to refer to a students junior certificate results to determine their placing at Leaving Cert? This disregards 3 more school years of development.

The appeals process is a farce. Many parents and students are distraught to find that all that will be checked for under the appeals process is to check if there has been an administration error. This will not address the concern over widespread downgrading. Some students had up to 4 or 5 of their subjects downgraded – How can this happen? As the grades this year are up by 4.4% on last year, those who did the leaving cert last year and took a year out and applied for a place in college this year are at a disadvantage as the points have increased."

laine Cronin is an SNA at Fossa NS assisting

Elaine lives with a rare condition called Jobs Syndrome, a condition that suppresses the immune system affecting the lungs. "30 years ago I was given 3 days to live and here I am about to head out for my 30th Birthday dinner with my family, Covid style!". Wow what an amazing celebration given circumstances for Elaine & especially for her parents Eileen & Donal. It made me think how frustrating.... what a big celebration but only six allowed to celebrate.

I wanted to know a little more about Elaine's restrictions during an ongoing pandemic with an immunity disorder and what it was like to be back at school?? "I absolutely adore the children Marie. At work yes, of course I am nervous but I am careful and I make the best choices I can to avoid picking up any infection. I'm used to that. I did however cocoon for 10 weeks in the initial stages including lockdown. That was hard. I try not to let it get me down though and just be wise with my decisions. You cannot wrap yourself in cotton wool either and I am a lucky girl to have the best family & friends a girl could ask for.

Elaine now attends St James's Hospital in Dublin for ongoing check ups but was christened at Crumlin Hospital for fear of the worst. For 20

years of Elaine's 30 she has attended the care of Crumlin Hospital. She has also had spinal fusion surgery at Crumlin to straighten the curve of her spine in 2005, a complicated task to undertake given Elaine's existing condition. "Ronald McDonald House was a home away from home for my parents Marie so I want to give back to the organisation that cared for me at Crumlin Hospital. I had great plans to host a party as a fundraiser for Crumlin but Covid19 had other ideas. I decided I wasn't going to give up. Crumlin Hospital never gave up on me!! We are living in a time when funding is needed more so than ever especially when families of sick children may have less disposable income than before. I have started a birthday fundraiser on Facebook page and have already raised €825 so far. I would dearly love to tip over the €1,000 to give back and would be most grateful if anyone would like to make a donation through me".

As I left Elaine's home in Aghadoe, she was off to Victoria House with her Mum Eileen & Dad Donal and two brothers Adrian & Darren. Thanks so much for having me. Happy Birthday Elaine and many more of them!


In keeping with their new format, KIFF will be presenting the Maureen O' Hara award to Jessie Buckley via an

## MINISTER WELCOMES FUNDING

Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley Welcomes Government Funding of Additional €115,000 for Kerry Projects Under Second Round of The Town and Village Renewal

Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley today welcomes the approval of grant funding totalling €115,000 for four Kerry based projects under the second tranche of funding announced by the Department of Community and Rural Development for the Town and Village Renewal Scheme.

The focus of the funding is on measures and interventions that help towns and villages to adapt to social distancing requirements and to provide safe environments that encourage people into towns and villages to shop and socialise.

Eight Kerry projects have now benefited from the Town and Village Renewal Scheme since July 2020. Kerry received €114,690 for four other projects in Dingle, Castleisland, Fenit and Kenmare under the first tranche of funding announcements which means Kerry in total has received €229,690 to date with another round of applications currently being considered. The projects approved will assist businesses/communities in towns and villages to adapt to the specific challenges posed by COVID-19 (e.g. social distancing) and to increase footfall and generate economic activity in the short-term. These projects have been identified by local community groups and businesses, in conjunction with Kerry County Council.

The Kerry projects which have been allocated funding in the latest round are as follows:

• Killorglin – For the upgrading of the surrounds of Killorglin Community Sports

Centre - €25,000

- Kilcummin For the upgrading of areas of the Biodiversity Park and the purchase and installation of bicycle stands - €25,000
   Kerry Countywide BCP's (Broadband Connection Points) – Funding to equip 9 Broadband Connection Points to enhance service provision - €25,000
- Kerry Countywide Marketing Initiative –
   To develop an All-Kerry marketing initiative
   €40,000



### FUNDING FOR SOCIAL HOUSING WELCOMED

Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley Welcomes Government Funding of €991,600 for Kerry County Council for the refurbishing of 50 social housing units

Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley today welcomes the approval of grant funding totalling €991,600 under the 2020 Voids Stimulus Programme to enable the refurbishing of 50 social housing units for the purpose of re-letting them to individuals and families.

As part of the July Stimulus Programme, the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage announced over €40 million for the refurbishment of voids, the largest single amount ever announced under the voids programme. All Local Authorities made applications which were categorised into three funding streams; standard voids at an average cost of approximately €11,500, homeless voids at an average cost of €17,300 and long-term voids at an average cost of €47,000.

Kerry County Council received an allocation of €424,550 for the refurbishing of 36 standard voids and a further €567,050 for the refurbishing of long-term voids.

# KELLY HITS OUT AT JOHNSON'S FOOD BLOCKADES CLAIM

Seán Kelly MEP has rubbished claims by the: British Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, suggesting the EU will stop the transport of food products from Great Britain to Northern Ireland as "a deliberate attempt to misinterpret mutually designed provisions in the Protocol on Northern Ireland" and nothing more than "an audacious act to justify the breaking of international law". The Ireland South MEP and Leader of Fine Gael in the EU Parliament said "the Protocol itself was specifically designed to protect the Good Friday Agreement, including avoiding a hard border on the island of Ireland. However, the comments of the Prime Minister bring to the frontline once again concerns all across Ireland from the agriculture sector, and the access of Irish products to the GB market, particularly that of beef".

"The economic integration on the island of Ireland has resulted in the development of a

highly intertwined agri-food sector. The GB market is of utmost importance for Irish farmers, and we must do everything we can to maintain competitive access.

"With such exposure to any change in market access, the Irish agricultural sector needs to be front and centre of the EU's farmers €5bn Brexit compensation fund", Kelly insisted.


"This is not a zero sum game and it has significant real life implications not just for Irish producers, but also for British consumers who will experience higher prices in their supermarkets on a wide variety of products", he warned.

"I would strongly urge the British Prime Minister to change his tact and return to building trust with the EU so that a mutually beneficial and fair deal can be made. The first step of which is simply to honour previous agreement", Kelly concluded.

A light bulb moment was had for Enda Walshe after he and friends Jimmy Reen & Jerome O'Regan put many months of thought into an appropriate way to honour the local legend Weeshie Fogarty, who passed on 18th November 2018, aged 77 years.

Weeshie wore many caps in our community and county. A familiar Kerry voice on many platforms. A figure synonymous with Kerry GAA, having represented the county footballers at senior level before embarking on a refereeing career, and later as a radio commentator and broadcaster and a columnist at the Kerryman Newspaper. Friends Jimmy & Jerome had worked with Weeshie at St Finian's Hospital (which you can see in the distance) and Enda was Chairperson at Legion GAA when Weeshie was President & his daughter Denise as Secretary.

Creator of the hugely successful Facebook page Killarney Down Memory Lane, I wasn't surprised that Enda came up with the idea to name 'The Fitzgerald Stadium roundabout' after Weeshie, and how fitting too.

"Since Christmas 2019 Jerome, Jimmy & I explored many avenues on how we would remember Weeshie. Nothing seemed to fit just right. It needed to be something of fairly low maintenance but the most important thing to all three of us was that it had meaning" Enda said. A familiar face to many at Quills Menswear, Main Street but a more familiar face to me in my 2 & 5K lockdown on his bike or out walking with his girls Enda explained how he came up with such a great idea to honour Weeshie. "Passing through St Brendan's Terrace on my cycle home to Bridgefield, I stopped and noticed the unnamed roundabout with both Fitzgerald Stadium & St Finian's Hospital in the back ground. Weeshie & his family lived just 100 yards down the road.

How commemorative I thought, for the roundabout to be named after Weeshie, off the grounds of the principal GAA stadium in Killarney, Fitzgerald Stadium. He'd have liked that I thought" Enda smiled. "The roundabout is here to stay and so are the fantastic

memories of Weeshie and the excitement he delivered through is commentary so vivid and vibrantly over the airwaves".

Jerome, Jimmy & Enda were great given encouragement by the Killarney County Council, Radio Kerry, Legion GAA & the Fogarty family.

I had the opportunity to chat with Fergal Moynihan, Chairperson for Legion GAA at the photo op. "It's a great honour for Weeshie to be remembered. I think it's such a fitting tribute close to his family, Fitzgerald Stadium and St Finian's Hospital. He was a fantastic player, coach, club officer and had phenomenal influence on the club" Fergal told me.

Fiona Stack the General Manger at Kerry Radio was also present so I took a few minutes for some words with her too "My colleagues & I at Radio Kerry are delighted to see Weeshie honour in such an appropriate way. He was a very special person and a very proud Kerry man" Fiona said.

My own tuppence on the legendary Weeshie Fogarty is nothing at all to do with GAA of any sort. My friend Elaine and I had fund-raised for Cystic Fibrosis for 10 years following the death of our friend Michelle O'Connor (24) from 2005-2015.

There was no year that Weeshie did not feature the Michelle O'Connor 10K Walk on Terrace Talk complete with interview. So kind that he agreed to host Miss Cafe du Parc, another fundraiser for CF.

His charm and humour engaged the crowd equally as enthralling as the running commentary with minutes to go at an All Ireland final. Weeshie epitomised everything that's great about Kerry, even 'lovely girl competitions'. His passion for sport was heard far and wide. What a fitting way to remember the legend that is Weeshie Fogarty.

## ALL IN KERRY CAN DEFEAT COVID

## BY WORKING TOGETHER - Griffin

Plan for living with pandemic over next 7 months published

veryone living and working in Kerry can defeat Covid-19 by working together and following public health advice, Deputy Government Chief Whip Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin said, "The Government's initiative - Resilience & Recovery 2020-2021: Plan for Living with Covid-19 – will guide Ireland's response to saving lives and managing the pandemic over the next seven months.

"We can overcome this. We can beat Covid-19 but it will take hard work and a commitment from all. We have already shown this year how we can work together," Deputy Griffin said.

The Government's plan sets how all in Kerry can manage the disease in their communities over the coming months.

The plan sets out five levels of response, each with a number of measures designed to help lower Covid-19 transmission, and also sets out what is permitted at that moment in time. At the moment, Kerry is on level two.

"The plan, if followed by all, aims to allow society and businesses to be able to operate as normally as possible, while continuing to suppress the virus. In particular, keeping schools, early learning and childcare services open are a top priority. We want to keep people in work and businesses operating, as we need a functioning economy to maintain our public services.

"Each level outlines what is permitted for social or family gatherings, work and public transport, bars, hotels and restaurants, exercise activities and religious services.

"Our country is soon entering the Winter months and we need to make every possible effort to make life easier for all.

"Please obey the advice of the public health professionals. We are all working for the same goal here – to defeat this pandemic and get our lives back to normal. It will take time but, working together, we can achieve this," Deputy Griffin concluded.

Cabinet also agreed this week to allocate a record €600 million for the 2020 Winter Initiative, to ensure that our health service has the capacity and resources needed to deal with what is forecast to be a particularly challenging few months.

Fine Gael leader and Tánaiste Leo Varadkar said, "From the beginning, we knew we were in this together, now we need to know how we can get through this together aswell.

"Unfortunately, nothing is certain about Covid-19, it cares little for our plans, however we have reasons to be hopeful as a country. We're guided by all we've learned about the virus in the past few months and we have confidence that we can do this because of what we have learned about each other.

"We've changed the way we live, the way we work, and today's plan sets out the steps to keep the virus under control, how we can anticipate and understand how to live our lives for the next six to nine months, and where setbacks occur, the steps that will be taken to reduce the risk of Covid-19 spreading out of control.

"This is a plan to protect you, your family and friends, our community, our jobs and businesses," the Tánaiste said.

### **REVISED VISITING ARRANGEMENTS ANNOUNCED AT UHK**

University Hospital has temporarily revised visiting arrangements for the hospital.

In a statement this week University Hospital Kerry said "we recognise the importance of visiting for patients and their families. COVID -19, unfortunately, has severely limited our ability to facilitate visiting over the last few months, however, as we move to the next stage of managing this disease, we are re-instating visiting (on a limited timetable) in a safe and structured manner - This will be rolled out on a pilot basis initially.

We ask you to please note that it does not guarantee visits to all patients as the rolling schedule limits days /times of visits, however, it does seek to prioritise visits to those in patients with the longest durations of stay at UHK". Some key points to note are:

- Partial reinstatement of Visiting (ITU, Emly,

Cashel, Maternity excepted).

-Visiting times are split by floor and allocated per ward on a rotational basis. Thus the timetable is limited, wards will have one allocated visit day per week, with a specific time frame for same.

- During the admission process, patients identify two visitors/ family members & their contact numbers.
- The UHK Visitor co-ordinator will contact visitors to allocate visiting day/time. Only one named visitor will be allowed to attend the hospital at the allocated time.
- As we seek to facilitate visiting for as many patients as possible, unfortunately, any adjustment to allocated visiting times is not feasible.
- Open visiting is not permitted. Only those Visitors who are contacted with a time slot will be permitted to visit. These will be required to

sign in and out at security.

- Those visitors who have been given date/time slot will be questioned at security as per the COVID checklist \*
- Visiting will be for a period of 15 minutes in line with National Guidance



# Kerry's CAO applicants do very well in Round One offers despite upward spiral in points' requirements



This year's very generous calculated grades caused a dramatic increase in points requirements for many third level courses.

The points went up for almost 70% of courses at Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) and about 60% at Level7/Level6 (Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates). While the majority of the 47,719 applicants to the CAO from the Leaving Cert class of 2020 had the points to meet the course requirements, it left many candidates who presented previous years' Leaving Cert results struggling to secure a college place.

Unless the Minister for Higher Education, Simon Harris intervenes, many of these applicants, who are innocent casualties of the calculated grades process, will find themselves out in the cold. My opinion from the outset has been that candidates presenting Leaving Cert results from previous years should be assessed on the 2019 CAO points. They had little or no chance of competing with this year's calculated grades' inflation.

Kerry's 1,725 Leaving Cert candidates achieved the outstanding Leaving Cert results that paved the path to college. They swept up a copious supply of offers in Friday's CAO Round One offers. Any remaining self-doubt turned to unconfined joy as a large majority of CAO applicants received a college offer. On a pro rata population basis, Kerry's CAO applicants will be close to the top of the class in securing college places. More than 70% of Kerry's 2020 Leaving Cert cohort are likely to progress to higher education.

53,815 CAO applicants received at least one of the 78,950 courses on offer on Friday afternoon. The offers consisted of 47,162 at Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) where demand is strong and 31,788 at Level7/Level 6 (Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates) where interest continues to decline. CAO always issues more offers than there are places available in anticipation of a level of refusal by applicants. Offers are issued independently in respect of the two lists (Level 8 and Level 7/Level 6), so that 25,135 applicants received two offers, one from each list.

80% of the 47,162 applicants, who were offered a Level 8 course, received one of their top three

preferences. A phenomenal 98% of the 31,788, who were offered a Level 7/Level 6 course also received one of their top three preferences. About 60,500 can expect to receive at least one offer of a college place before the end of the offers' season.

Taking all the various Government announcements into account, there could be as many as 3,500 extra CAO college places available this year. The Government tried hard to provide as many extra places as possible in order to keep points requirements down, However, the effort wasn't an overwhelming success as there were some spectacular increases in points for many courses.

The overriding conclusion from the points' trends is that CAO applicants were totally focussed on the jobs market. They applied in large numbers for courses with strong employment growth, especially STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) courses, which are regarded as job friendly. UCC's flagship Biological and Chemical Sciences degree hit the heady heights of 510\*points, up 12 points while UL's Physical Education Degree has seen a massive jump from 498\* last year to 532\* this year.

There was strong demand for Business, Psychology and Environmental Science with UCC's Biological & Earth Science Degree jumping from 412 to 467. A number of courses crashed the 600 points' barrier including UCD's Economics and Finance degree. Courses in the build environment, construction and architecture are in strong demand. Points' requirements for teaching, nursing and law showed a noticeable increase.

HASS (Humanities, Arts, Social Science) courses continue to be offered at modest point's levels as applicants have lost total confidence in the employment value of the liberal and creative arts. The Arts Degrees at UCC, MICE Limerick and NUIG were each offered at a comfortable 300 points.

As expected, the contribution of frontline workers during the Coronavirus pandemic inspired a massive swing to health science courses which rocketed out of reach of most CAO applicants. Dentistry at UCC, for example,

requires a staggering 613\* points this year – almost a perfect Leaving Cert exam result! Pharmacy, Physiotherapy, Medicine, Veterinary, Occupational Therapy and related health sciences were beyond the reach of most applicants.

School leavers continue to rush to college in unprecedented numbers. Because of an unexpected economic recession, applications for college remain high. The steady flow also of mature and non-traditional applications is a very healthy development as everybody deserves a second chance. A quota of places was reserved by CAO for the 8,573 mature applicants and the 12,619 applicants from the QQI/PLC sector.

## KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL NOTICE TO OWNERS AND OCCUPIERS ROADS ACT 1993

## ROADSIDE TREES, DITCHES & HEDGES

Kerry County Council wishes to give notice that under the terms of the Roads Act, 1993, landowners and occupiers of land are obliged to take all reasonable care to ensure that the trees, ditches, hedges and other vegetation growing on their land are not or could not become a danger to people using or working on a public road.

Examples of hazards might be dead or dying trees, ditches or hedges interfering with traffic, blocking footpaths, obscuring road signs or obscuring a view of the road ahead.

You are required to fell, cut, log, trim or remove such trees, ditches and hedges. Adequate signposting should be provided and the Council and Gardaí notified before works commence.

Hedgecutting operations, as far as possible, should only be undertaken outside the critical nesting period of 1st March to 31st August.

## LIABILITY FOR DAMAGE OR INJURY RESULTING FROM SUCH HAZARDS WILL REST WITH THE LANDOWNWER/OCCUPIER

#### JAPANESE KNOTWEED

When cutting your hedges this year, please be aware of the invasive species Japanese Knotweed (JK) Fallopia Japonica.

If you do find Japanese Knotweed on your property, the most important thing that you can do is prevent any further spread of the species. **Do not strim, cut, flair or chip the plants.** Tiny fragments can regenerate new plants and cause the Japanese Knotweed to spread. It is also advised not to dig, move or dump soil which may contain plant material as this will contribute to its spread.

Report it! The location and extent of the infestation should be reported to your local Municipal District Office/Area Office.

#### DUTY TO FACILITATE DRAINAGE OF WATER FROM PUBLIC ROADS

Landowners/occupiers are also reminded of their duty under the Roads Act, 1993 to facilitate the drainage of water from public roads and also to prevent water, soil or other matter from flowing or falling onto public roads especially at entrances to fields and farmyards.

#### FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH THESE OBLIGATIONS IS AN OFFENCE LIABLE TO PROSECUTION

#### **UNAUTHORISED ADVERTISING ON PUBLIC ROADS**

Please take notice that it is an offence under Section 71 of the Roads Act, 1993 to erect, place or retain on a public road, a sign, vehicle including a vehicle with 'For Sale' signs, or other structure or thing used for the purposes of advertising, the sale of goods, the provision of services or other similar purpose without lawful authority or the consent of the Roads Authority.

## THIS INCLUDES PLACING VARIABLE MESSAGE SIGNS ON PUBLIC ROADS, FOOTPATHS OR HARD SHOULDERS FOR THE PURPOSE OF ADVERTISING EVENTS

Kerry County Council may without notice arrange for the removal and storage of any such unauthorised signs, vehicles or other structures or things and may recoup the removal and storage costs from the person claiming the unauthorised item. In certain circumstances, following a period of storage, the Council may arrange for the disposal of the unauthorised item.

The person who erects, places or retains the sign or advertisement and the person on whose behalf the sign or advertisement is exhibited shall be guilty of an offence and is liable to prosecution.

#### **UPDATE FROM CROKE PARK**

The GAA's Ard Chomhairle held a meeting on-line on Saturday where it was decided to formally proceed with plans to stage the All-Ireland senior, under-20 and minor intercounty football and hurling championships for 2020. The decision was made following positive interaction with the Government and an understanding that specific financial supports will be made available. Due to the reduced level of funding available as a result of the pandemic, a series of strict financial controls will be put in place by the Association which will govern the costs and preparation of teams. In addition to this a plan and series of protocols produced by the Association's Covid Advisory Group and which will facilitate the safe staging of intercounty games will be circulated to counties. Following consultation with the counties it was agreed that London, Warwickshire and Lancashire will not be involved in the 2020 championships. The special emergency powers for the administration of the Association have been reapproved and extended until December 4.

- Q. Can I claim back a refund for new or seasonally employed employees who did not qualify for the TWSS?
- A. Yes, Employers who are eligible and registered for the Employment Wage Subsidy Scheme (EWSS) can backdate a claim under the scheme to the 01st July 2020 in respect of newly or seasonally hired employees. A 'sweepback' template is available from 15th September - payment after the 16th September.
- · Q. Is it true that employees who are still on lay off cannot make a redundancy application?
- A. The emergency hold on employees applying for Redundancy was due to expire on the 17th of September. This has now been extended by government for the fourth time to 30th November 2020.
- Q. Has there been another change to Parental leave entitlements?
- A. Yes, Parental leave entitlements have increased from 22 weeks to 26 weeks since September 01st.
- Q. Is it true that I have to wait longer for the EWSS refund after switching out of the TWSS?
- A. Yes, refunds will be on a monthly basis regardless of payroll frequency. At the end of every month, Revenue will process the payroll submitted and post a statement into the ROS inbox of employers by the 5th of the following month. Payment thereafter pending tax clearance.

Well, we're not back to normal, and there is a general acceptance that 'normal' won't mean what it did for quite some time to come, but at least we are finding a pathway forward.

The English Premiership is back, and with more of a bang than a whimper. It may have as much to do with soap opera as sport underneath it all, but you can't complain when you see Leeds looking more like themselves under Don Revie and with John Giles in midfield than the latter days of David O'Leary's ambitious but ultimately enormously costly tenure. They may have lost to the reigning champions, but they served notice in that 4-3 thriller of real intention. Shane Duffy's debut goal for Glasgow Celtic has also buoyed hopes of plenty more to come – let's not get too carried away there; he's a centre half, not Cristiano Ronaldo.

The Government have stepped in to ensure that there will be All Ireland Championships in hurling and football. Good, people need something positive to focus on and the biggest and most popular sports competitions in this country are the right place to start. The GAA tend to be good at playing the poor mouth rightly so in this case. Without ticket sales (and at least that ridiculous rule is being relaxed), the GAA have gone on record as stating that it would lose approximately E19.5 million in hosting the competitions without Government assistance. Not even the country's richest sports body (FAI fantasy accounting notwithstanding, and this week has seen yet more revelations in that regard - Mark Tighe and Paul Rowan's book 'Champagne Football' looks like being very popular but uncomfortable reading) can afford that kind of money, so the Government stepping in is the right thing to do and an important step in the right direction.

#### Ladies County Final: Rathmore 5-12 Southern Gaels 2-9

It was 1993 when Nora O'Connor of Rathmore and Paud O'Leary of Gneeveguilla put their heads together to found a Ladies GAA club. It has been a long, slow climb, not always easy, but the club have not looked back since. Last Sunday in sunny Fossa (itself one of the oldest and strongest clubs in Kerry thanks to one of Kerry's first trainers of Ladies GAA, Alex Rintoul) Rathmore finally and deservedly scaled the mountain top as County Champions. They had worked all the way up from Junior C champions, winning club of the year in 2012, dozens of volunteers in the background matching the huge effort on the field of play.

Southern Gaels, who were the pacesetters in ladies football in the county were the formidable opposition. Southern Gaels are a great team – most of them were part of a Coláiste na Sceilge outfit who were denied a colleges final that was abruptly – and I maintain unnecessarily – curtailed. They actually made the better start, Rachel O'Dwyer opening the scoring and Shannon O'Donnell doubling the lead. Eileen Murphy pulled one back but Rachel made it 0-3 to 0-1. Kerry minor Danielle O'Leary replied and Caroline Reen levelled before Siofra O'Shea and Caroline exchanged points before Siofra nudged Gaels back in front after more good work by Rachel.

Rathmore's first goal arrived after the water break, Aoife O'Callaghan smoothly drilling home a penalty. Rachel pulled one back, but Danielle O'Leary burst through on a trademark slalom run for an unstoppable goal. Aoife O'Callaghan, Caroline Reen (2), and Noreen Murphy stretched the advantage to 2-9 to 0-6.

The multi-talented Siofra hit a beautiful penalty to give Southern Gaels hope but Eileen Murphy

picked off a point and Danielle O'Leary fisted home her second goal. Ellie O'Connell, tireless in midfield, and Siofra O'Shea pointed to make it 3-10 to 1-8, with Shannon O'Donnell hitting the post. Noreen Murphy stretched the lead before Siofra O'Shea pointed and Sadbh O'Shea scored a great goal. At 3-12 to 2-9 they still had a lot of hope, but Rathmore had come too far to falter now and Katie Buckley set up Danielle O'Leary for her hat-trick before finding the net herself.

Sarah Murphy was one of the girls from a football family (her brother Paul is pretty handy as well!) who came along in 1993 to try the game. Last Sunday she received the Caroline Broderick Cup from Chairman Seán Walsh and sponsor Dave Randles.

## DR. CROKES IN INTERMEDIATE HURLING FINAL

They have a fully deserved reputation as the dominant club in Kerry football for many years now, but Dr. Crokes are rarely listed among the powerhouses of Kerry hurling. For that matter neither are Tralee Parnells, but these two sides meet next Sunday in Austin Stack Park in the County Intermediate Final, having beaten Kilmoyley and Kilgarvan respectively.

Crokes have put in trojan work over the years and the likes of John Lenihan and Timmy Hourigan fully deserve this. An infusion of youth in recent years has paid rich dividends. Crokes have serious pace through the likes of Tm Doyle and the Lenihan brothers, allied to the canny experience of the likes of Kevin Landers, Mike Milner, and Richie Farrissey. Make no mistake; Parnells are a very serious outfit in their own right. Make no mistake, Gearóid O'Doherty lit up the semi-final with a whopping 18 points, while the likes of Darragh Reen, Luke Barrett, and Andrew Morrissey are deadly dangerous. I'm hoping that Crokes' better spread of scorers pays dividends for them next Sunday, but this should be a thriller all the way.

Crokes last captured this title in 2001. Timmy Hourigan, now a selector, was an outstanding wingback. Kevin Landers was very young on the bench; his brothers Pa and Gary were mainstays of the side. Crokes were very much underdogs against Kilgarvan that day, but a whirlwind start with 1-1 by Johnny Dunphy gave them a great start. Pinpoint free-taker Errol Tuohy slotted a

second goal to give them a six point lead at halftime. Brian O'Sullivan Darcy was gone off injured from midfield at that stage but returned for the second half, and I think it isn't bias that makes me say he was very good. He certainly wasn't alone in that, the likes of Gene Doherty and Sean O'Shea were magnificent in battling a terrific rally by Kilgarvan in a colossal second half. None other than the legendary Cormac Bonner (team trainer) played a huge role off the bench as well. The likes of Hugh Francis Twomey, Connie Cremin, John Foley, and Donal O'Sullivan, all great hurlers, pushed them all the way but in the end, Crokes were champions on a 2-10 to 0-11 scoreline. Will history repeat itself? I can but hope. Either way, it's one to look forward to.

#### COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

Look, I'd say I wasn't the only one fully expecting one cracker of a game full of thrills and spills and another that would be respectable, but relatively comfortable for the victors at the final whistle. That's exactly what I got – in reverse order. I thought St. Brendans would push East Kerry all the way to the wire and I thought that Mid Kerry would succumb in the last quarter to Crokes' speed and accuracy, even with the absence of the likes of Daithi Casey, Jordan Kiely, and of course Tony Brosnan. Instead it was St. Brendans who fell by the wayside tamely by their own high standards, while as Mid Kerry – well, Kerry has always had impressive ornithology, but that's the first time I've seen a phoenix flying over the county! Fair play to them.

#### East Kerry 1-11 St. Brendans 0-8

St. Brendans showed a tactical masterclass in their last outing against Legion, but Jerry O'Sullivan had their number here. Brendans were dangerous initially, and probably would have been in front at half-time if they had taken their chances, but East Kerry simply kept improving all through the game. Dara Moynihan picked off two great points in the opening half, but actually his best work alongside Brendan

O'Keeffe was dropping back and completely closing that hole in front of midfield so beloved of Jack Barry and Diarmuid O'Connor. Ivan Parker was isolated and struggled against Jack Sherwood, whose excellence is almost taken for granted by now - one of my players of the championship. Man of the match, though, has to go yet again to the whirlwind that is Paudie Clifford. Evan Cronin scored 1-2 in that opening half and on a free for Dara Roche, while another Spa man, Michael Foley, opened the scoring. 1-6 to 0-5 at half-time, with East Kerry winning all the breaks in midfield despite trojan effort from Barry in particular. The second half was simply a procession. Brendans tried putting Diarmuid O'Connor into full forward but that's not a role he is accustomed to - he tried hard and kicked two points, while Andrew Barry scored an absolute beauty, but there was never any doubt about who was winning this one.

#### Mid Kerry 3-20 Dr. Crokes 3-19

I won't lie (some might say that's an unusual approach for me) – I was deeply unimpressed with the €10 price charged by the County Board for streaming this game. Had the games been in reverse order, I'm pretty sure it would be a big talking point, especially with the Ladies County Final (fair play to Kerry Sports Hub and Sideline Eye) and Cork's County Championships being broadcast for free. I'll pay a tenner to go into a match, but to watch it at home? A lot of clubs are able to provide perfect streams of great games cheaply for their supporters – it makes this price tag very steep indeed, and it again raises the question about those who purchased County Bard or Croke Park passes.

However, it would be churlish in the extreme to allow that to detract from one of the best games in my lifetime watching Kerry GAA. It's easy to talk about the closeness and frequency of the scores but it was more than that. It was the positivity and fearlessness of two sides confident in their skills and perfectly happy to show them. Micheál Burns has been stamping his impressive credentials all over this Championship and he was at his very best here. Micheál has always been a great solo footballer but now he has added vision and direct purpose to his pace and power and it really shows. He was in the thick of it here. Brian Looney has arguably been Crokes' most consistent performer for the bones of two decades; that's as true now as it ever was. That said, no-one could possibly quibble if Gavan O'Grady was awarded the man of the match a predator this natural should be starring in a Michael Bay movie. And when it came to the climactic moment of this epic struggle.....do any of you remember Mikey Sheehy's goal for an aging Kerry to equalise against Cork in the 1987 Munster Final? I think of it as the 'ghost goal'. This one was even better, in a game that deserved such crowning glory. And who better to apply the coup de grace than Jack O'Connor, who looks more and more like another polished diamond straight off Kerry's juvenile assembly line? Crokes, the unquestioned kingpins of Kerry football (they have played in 10 finals in 15 years and won 7 as well as an All Ireland) were as magnanimous in defeat as they have always been gracious in victory. That says just as much about their character as their football.

#### Senior Club Final: Austin Stacks 1-17 Kenmare Shamrocks 1-14 (AET)

Maybe it wasn't quite up to the standard of the Crokes v Mid Kerry game (that was a once in a lifetime crescendo) but it wasn't far away. Kenmare Shamrocks, whose never-say-die attitude has lit up this year, could and should have won it but a late goal by Corn Uí Mhuirí captain Seán Quilter saw the rockies of Austin Stacks retain their title.

#### Relegation Final: Templenoe 3-18 Kilcummin 0-14

Time and injuries finally caught up with Kilcummin, the 2018 Intermediate All Ireland champions, who drop down to that grade after a sparkling Templenoe sealed a second year in the top flight of Kerry football. Hard on Kilcummin, a club who have always battled above their weight, but they will rise again just as they always do.

It leaves the County Board with a problem that has been flagged for guite a while now - Peter Twiss raised it as an issue at last year's County Convention. There are simply too many good players not getting a chance to play County Championship in East Kerry because of the strength of the panel. Divisional sides are, by their nature, fluid. East Kerry are unbeaten at minor or U21/U21 for several years now and back in a County Final for a second year, with Kilcummin now likely to rejoin their ranks as things stand. With Kenmare Shamrocks and Templenoe at senior grade, Kenmare District no longer looks viable as a County Championship team, leaving Kilgarvan and Tuosist (who already play their juvenile football in East Kerry) in limbo.

#### WEESHIE FOGARTY ROUNDABOUT

Weeshie Fogarty was to the GAA in Kerry what Micheal Ó Muircheartaigh is nationally. Passion and with are only two of the traits they always had in common. Weeshie's beloved Killarney

Fittingly, it would be situated just outside the Fitzgerald Stadium – I'm sure I'm not the only one who thinks of Weeshie when I approach that ground. I'm not going to go into Weeshie's sporting or broadcasting career or even list all his many kindnesses to me since I first entered the press box as an extremely raw and callow reporter. Suffice to say that I love this idea and I believe that he would have as well. We'd have laughed together at the 'roundabout', though – Weeshie was always direct and to the point when it came to his beloved Kerry football!

#### ST. PAULS BASKETBALL

St. Pauls have been busy finalising preparations for the new season and the announcement

of two talented signings have only increased the anticipation. Ben Miller, a former Canadian international, will make his debut with the Scotts Lakers senior team against Team Kerry on October 17th in the Killarney Sports and Leisure Complex.

Maryland native Jenna Kaufman, meanwhile, a WBCA All American nominee during her studies at Seton Hill in Pennsylvania, joins St. Pauls from Ulster Elks and will make her debut against Tipperary Knights in what should be a cracking double header on October 17th.
