Stakeholders and members of the public are encouraged to have their say across a range of topics including biodiversity conservation, education, visitor management and legislation.


The Minister also launched a new framework for management planning in Ireland's National Parks

The initiative – titled 'Your Parks, Your Say' – will give members of the public and stakeholder organisations the opportunity to express their views on Ireland's National Parks across a range of topics, from biodiversity conservation and restoration to visitor amenities, education, community engagement and legislation. Definitions of what a National Park is will also be sought.

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ERRY HOMECOMING FESTIVAL IS A : COUNTY-WIDE INITIATIVE PRESENTED BY KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL AS PART OF THE GLOBAL IRISH FESTIVAL SERIES, WHICH IS A JOINT INITIATIVE BETWEEN FÁILTE IRELAND AND THE DEPARTMENT OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS, TARGETING THE DIASPORA.

Kerry Homecoming Festival at Halloween opens this Friday, October 18th with the 2 day Global Gaelic Games Social Festival, in Fitzgerald Stadium, Killarney - a gathering of 1000 Gaelic Football enthusiasts from far and wide taking part in non-competitive 9-a-side Gaelic games that emphasize inclusiveness and integration.

The festival programme features close to fifty free events and activities such as Samhain spectacles, storytelling, Jack-o-Lantern carving, genealogy workshops and heritage talks, stargazing, an American Wake at Kerry Writers Museum and much, much more.

The legendary Cailleach (Hag / Witch), will be the centrepiece of a thrilling Samhain spectacle in Listowel, Dingle, Kenmare and Tralee. The Cailleach is the goddess of the winter months. Her season begins on Samhain, October 31st, when the Goddess Brigid hands her staff over.

The Cailleach is associated with many locations across the Celtic lands. Her ability to form the landscape and mountains means that many prominent mountain landmarks are attributed to her. In Kerry she has given her name to the Hag's Glen in the MacGilliycuddy Reeks mountains where the Hag of Corrán Tuathail (Carrauntoohill) plunged to her death in the lake known as Hag's Lake.

The Samhain Spectacles will be supported by a series of workshops in 16 towns and villages, in the run up, led by Juli Ní Mhaoileoin, the Dingle Druid, in which people of all ages will learn how to make traditional Samhain masks and Jack-o-Lanterns and they in turn can take part in the spectacles wearing their masks or bearing their lanterns.

Genealogy and family research feature heavily

in the programme with talks and workshops being presented by experts in the Killarney and Tralee libraries and in Castleisland and Killorglin.

Kerry's tradition of storytelling, particularly of the otherworldly kind at Halloween is also honoured through a number of storytelling sessions from Niall de Búrca and Tom Dillon throughout the county.

All of the existing seasonal Kerry festivals and some new ones, including an Féile Eile in Killorglin will also be joining in the fun -Kenmare Halloween Howl, the Patrick O'Keeffe Music Festival in Castleisland, the Skellig Coast Archaeology Festival, the Kerry International Film Festival celebrating its 25th anniversary and Oireachtas na Samhna, both taking place in Killarney, as well as Tralee's annual National Circus Festival and The Tralee Half Marathon.

The Homecoming Festival provides unique opportunity to deepen our linkages with the Kerry Diaspora, Mayor of Kerry, Cllr Breandán MacGearailt stated. "Despite being a small country on the edge of Europe, on the edge of the Atlantic, we have, over many generations developed a global network of Irish-diaspora, are embedded into business, culture and society across the world. This is our way of welcoming our first, second, third and fourth generation of Irish back home, and showcasing our culture and history".

"Festivals and events play a crucial role in showcasing the rich cultural tapestry of Ireland, attracting visitors from around the world to come and discover Ireland. By bringing together diverse activities and traditions, we not only boost tourism but also strengthen the bonds within our communities. 

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TRIBUTE TO THE LATE FR. SEAN MYRES

Fossa GAA Club have led the tributesto Fr. Sean Myers who passed away in Brazil.

"Fr. Sean Myers born in Barleymount West on 18.08.1930. He went to Cahooreigh National School and then on to St. Brendan's College Killarney. After his Leaving Cert, he joined the Redemptorists and was ordained on 22.10.1957, afterwards was sent to Rome for further studies. In the Spring of 1960 Fr. Sean started his missionary work in Brazil. Over the next 64 years he worked in many different parishes in very remote parts of Brazil, with some of his parishes the size of Munster. On occasion Fr. Sean would travel back home on holiday and would tell the people of Fossa about his mission, the spiritual Christian people of his parishes, their extreme poverty and the rough and tough conditions he dealt with. He was much loved by the Brazilian people who he described as "very like the Irish people".

He will be remembered for the differences he made in so many lives in his parishes in Brazil through his work and also by the people of Fossa on how



dedicated he was to his missionary work.

He is survived by his brother Daniel Myers (Barleymount West) and many nieces and nephews.

Older Drivers are safer drivers, conference told

The older drivers' conference in Tralee last week had some useful tips on road safety. But it also heard how other drivers - middle aged and younger - should be taught to respect older drivers.

By the way, an older driver is anyone over the age of 55.

Lack of manners on the road and levels of aggression and road rage have soared since the pandemic, the conference was told.

This will come as no surprise. Most of us will have experienced pent up behaviour like tail-gaiting and abuse in the past two years.

Many older drivers have long records of safe driving. Statistics show that they are least likely to be involved in a collision.

The roads are very different these days with more cars and trucks and vans all being driving faster and more aggressively. New road layouts such as multi-lane junctions and even roundabouts are much more complicated. Some people find it all confusing, the well attended conference at Tralee's lovely Rose Hotel heard.

Attendees were from Killarney, Cahersiveen and elsewhere in a highly successful event coordinated by the council and with help from other authorities like the Gardaí

It's sometimes easy to knock the council, and expose failings, but this is one event that was invaluable. It brought people together from all ends of the county. Hopefully it will be a template.

Among the take-aways were:

Road rage is a reportable offence.

But don't get involved. Simply take the car registration number and report to Garda Be clever about driving - don't go when the roads are particularly busy such as school times. And take breaks on long journeys.

Older people tended to have more money to spend on cars and many would consider electric cars. Electric cars have dashboards "out of Star Trek" and before buying one, people should make sure they are comfortable with operating from the bridge of a spaceship!

Consider an automatic car as you get older if for jams and even spells at Halloween.

as the driving is less demanding, and probably safer, was also advised.

Have ears as well as eyes tested - hearing is important for driving if only to hear the sirens behind you trying to arrest you for speeding!

Try to reverse into a car park space rather than having to reverse out was another useful tip

Medicals have been pushed forward to 75 but everyone should also know their limits and the possible effects of medication on driving.

There are provisions in licences for restrictions such as staying local and off motorways and not driving at night - a more challenging time to drive - to enable people to continue driving for as long as possible.

Former Kerry footballer Donnchadh Walsh, a physiotherapist with the Bon Secours hospitals said research found people who drove were "more confident, more connected with their communities and have a better quality of life".

Fear of driving is a real factor for older people and they should try to overcome it with taking a refresher lesson, was the advice. Even one lesson can instill confidence.

Anna May McHugh age 90 sounded the keynote - Keep going as long as you can and never doubt yourself! she advised. Wise words.

Wild produce part of the new plan for national parks?

It's not just the deer rutting in autumn that is remarkable - the red-orange rowan berry is also out as are the sloes. The holly which is merely decorative is out too early.

A present from Prague reminded me this week that much of our native wild produce goes unused. Rowan berry shower gel smells great and is widely used in Central Europe for jams and even spells at Halloween.



Similarly our sloe can be used for gin and wine and our elderberries for tonics and cosmetics. As for arbutus, of course there is lemonade to be named from this. New research programme for Killarney might echoe the Killarney furniture school and housewifery schools - if ever Simon Harris much-pledged college for Killarney comes to fruition, pardon the pun.

In the meantime, we are told of a consultation plan, finally, for all eight national parks including this country's first national park, Killarney.

With sloe and other trees plenitful where they are not hacked to bits outside the park I think this offers an ideal opportunity for people to have their say. I am thinking of suggesting that alongside histoirc craft workshops, we would look at setting up food, herbal and cosmetic businesses from the natural produce in the park itself.

Besides the potential, any such garden produce workshop would be a nice throwback and echo the once famous kitchen gardens of Muckross in the 1950s whch produced tomatoes..

A consultation process will ask people what they want from their national parks given the competing demands for them to provide refuge for biodiversity, recreation for walkers, amenities for tourists and land for farming.

The 'Your Parks, Your Say' consultation will run until the end of the year. The first phase is an online questionnaire. Your Parks, Your Say - the future of Ireland's National Parks.

Give all counties a bite of the Apple

The 13 billion euro Apple windfall: Why don't we do what JP McManus did with the GAA when it came to gifts for clubs and give every county 500 million euro? What that would do for Kerry would be miraculous. There is good news this week that after decades planning is finally being sought for the New Street Multi-storey car park and the Aras Phádraig primary care and theatre projects.

The full cost may well be in excess of 50 million euro for both projects. As far I can see, less than half of that is actually on the table, courtesy of the Urban Regeneration Development Fund

Were we to get our hands on the Apple money, these and other

projects stalled with almost thirty years in Killarney could advance. There is the Fitzgerald Stadium - I was at the Ballymac v Abbeydorney Ladies game in Tralee Mitchels recently and the pitch and club house on the foothills of Slieve Mish have to be seen to be believed. The Legion v Kilcummin followed. Apple's 500 million Euro would allow Cllr Niall O'Callaghan realise his 40 million dream for Fitzgerald's, one of the most scenic stadia in the whole country, let alone county. Then of course there is the cycle loop around the lakes, not to mention the N22 bypass the existing Killarney leg of which has been revealed as one of the busiest roads in the country. Jammed packed. We could do with the 500m in Killarney alone.



"Subsea Cable Security and Resilience Symposium"

alentia Transatlantic Cable Station foundation, announced inaugural "Subsea Cable Security and Resilience Symposium" taking place at the historic Valentia Island Transatlantic Cable Station in Valentia, Co. Kerry on Oct 10th - 12th.

Joined by Tánaiste, Minister for Foreign Affairs and Minister for Defence, Micheál Martin TD, as well as 85 representatives from 10 countries, who will review 15 presentations and discuss a range of topics in 7 panels.

Growing digital dependencies as well as recent geopolitical tensions and the concurrent climate crisis have placed the topic of critical infrastructure protection at the top of policy, industry and research agendas. This includes subsea telecommunications cables, across which over 99 percent of transcontinental data traffic transits and upon which countries across the globe increasingly rely as they continue to digitally transform their economies and societies

Delegates will discuss papers ranging from history to geopolitics to technology to security and resilience, with topics such as;

- · Cable Protection in Cold War Strategic Thinking,
- · Responding to threats to undersea cables
- · Subsea Cable Resilience in the Caribbean
- · Operating in a Heightened **Geopolitical Context**
- · Subsea cable incidents: data collection, reporting and response

The Valentia Transatlantic Cable Foundation is proud to host this not-for-profit event at the place from where the first transatlantic cable was laid over 150 years ago. The event is run in collaboration with a team of Irish and international researchers as well as global industry actors, and with the generous support of AquaComms, Ireland's Departments of Foreign Affairs and Defence, the IDA, Aurora, Philip Lee, Analysys Mason and the European Subsea Cables Association (ESCA).

Killarney Coffee
Cup project – a

over 23,000 disposable coffee
cups a week from the townhas been named the overall
winner of this year's Killarney
Looking Good Competition.

Killarney became the first town in the country and set a nationwide example when declaring war against disposable cups that were from bins, littering roads and blighting the national park.

The end result of the project – which has had wonderful buy-in from local businesses and the community is that more than a million cups a year have been removed, eliminating 18.5 tonnes of waste.

In addition to winning the Green Hospitality category, the project was named the overall winner of the prestigious competition at a ceremony in the Great Southern Hotel, Killarney on Monday night.

The special guest, who presented all the awards, was GAA superstar Louise Ní Mhuircheartaigh who was a big hit with the packed attendance for her achievements in the GAA and her charm off the field of play. The other big winners on the night were Paud Murphy from Ross Road who was awarded the Yvonne Quill Memorial Volunteer of the Year Award – presented by the late Yvonne's husband

John and Pinewood Estate which won the Fr Michael Murphy Memorial Pride of Place Award presented by Fr Michael's brother, Bishop Emeritus Bill Murphy.

Keynote speakers on the night were Mayor of Killarney Cllr Maura Healy-Rae and Killarney Municipal District Manager Angela McAllen and the master of ceremonies was Killarney Tidy Towns Committee Chairman Michael Gleeson.

Over three decades after it was first initiated, the Killarney Looking Good Competition was revived last year with a new committee, new categories, new sponsors and a great sense of purpose. KENYA KEEPS CALLING

While the focus of attention in : our world continues to highlight the terrible situation caused by war in Ukraine, Middle East and Sudan, people continue to struggle in many other areas of the world including Kenya which is often highlighted by the work of The Kenya Education Project. Three volunteers from the project recently spent time working in Edmund Rice School and in projects in the village of Embulbul which help to alleviate the harsh living conditions experienced by many families on a daily basis.

Recent budget changes introduced by the government of Kenya pose new challenges for all families living in the slum village. Price hikes for basic food items, petrol, transport and health services have resulted in on-going hardship for an increasing number of families. Large amounts of clothes donated locally in Killarney were snapped up by needy families for new born babies and young children. 70 families received a gift of food which contained essential food items such as Rice, Ugali, Cooking Oil, Flour to help relieve the strain of providing one healthy meal a day for needy families.

School fees are set to increase in Edmund Rice School where 80 students currently attending are sponsored by funding provided by the Kenya Education Project. This sponsorship ensures a year's schooling, free text books and a hot meal each school day. Any increase in fees will cause hardship and challenges for many. The project hopes to increase its number of sponsored students in 2025. Presently 6 students are being sponsored to obtain skills training as a Mechanic, Tailor, Hairdresser and Beautician. The hope is that these qualified students will help ease the challenges and burdens on their families when they gain employment.

Each day the volunteers Miriam Malone, Michelle Griffin and Eddie Sheehy witnessed the terrible conditions many families face when they visited homes as part of the work of the St. Vincent De Paul leader Regina. Cramped living conditions, overcrowding, absence of electricity and running water, dreadfully poor or absent sanitation make life a constant struggle for many who are often unemployed or limited to poorly paid casual work to support families. Supplying beds, mattresses and blankets from the project helps in a small way to ease the burden of slum dwellers. 60 children from the village receive a hot meal five evenings per week, which is organised by the parish and funded by the Kenya Education Project. This may be the only guaranteed meal some children receive as those attending government-run schools do not receive any food during the school day.

There was a noticeable increase this year in the number of requests for help from individuals in the village for support with medical needs such as buying medicines, attending clinics and health issues requiring surgery. Likewise families struggle to pay for shoes, uniforms and additional school costs. All requests were listened to and efforts made to respond to as many as possible if funds are available. Many families struggle and survive day to day but when an emergency arises such as arrears in rent or a health issue people are often left helpless and unable to access the services they require resulting in eviction from their homes or on-going illness and poor health.

All involved in the work of The Kenya Education Project value the wonderful support received each year locally in Fossa and in Killarney through the donation of clothes, footwear, medical supplies, sports gear and support of fundraising activities such as our Table Quiz and Coffee morning. Without the financial donations none of the above named activities would be possible year after year. This support is heart-warming and ensures our work continues to help people who have so few worldly possessions.

Dogs Trust Shares Helpful Hints for a Happy Halloween as One-Third of Dogs Struggle with Firework Fear

Dogs Trust Ireland is highlighting that Halloween may not be a happy time for our furry friends. A recent study of dog owners revealed that 37% of dogs struggle to stay calm when fireworks can be heard. With dog's hearing being approximately four times more sensitive than humans*, it's no wonder they find the whizz, pop and bang of fireworks disturbing. Almost half of respondents also noted that their dog struggles to stay quiet when someone is at the door or there is noise coming from outside, which is a likely occurrence with trick-or-treaters on Halloween night.

In a poll on social media run by Dogs Trust, 68% of respondents said that fireworks had started in their area in September, with a shocking 11% stating they started as early as August. Worryingly, 54% also noted that the fireworks weren't only being let off at nighttime but during daylight hours too.

In a bid to help dogs and their owners, Dogs Trust has compiled top tips to help hounds have a spook-free season. The charity advises keeping dogs indoors if fireworks are going off, and if owners must bring their dog out, they should be kept on a lead. For almost 5 years, Joshua O'Sullivan from Ballydaly near Rathmore, has been growing his hair, and on the 2nd of November he will be donating over 13 inches of to make wigs for children.





KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



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

It is understood the preferred route will be revealed on these dates. This is a positive development, however, firm funding commitments are needed to ensure the scheme can progress thereafter.



Support must be given to farmers when availing of farming schemes - Gordon Kelleher

Local Fianna Fáil General Election Candidate for Kerry, Linda Gordon Kelleher has called on more support to be given to farmers when they are trying to apply and avail of farming

Gordon Kelleher, who comes from a farming background herself, has said that even though



there is a huge number of schemes available to farmers and acknowledges some are very good, issues still remain.

"The issue with some schemes is the administration side of applying and actually drawing down the grants. It can be quite cumbersome on farmers, and they are often left to front the load in terms of financing the work done."

"The worst thing of all is that farmers may spend a significant amount of time doing their paperwork to then not receive the full grant amount or there may be claw backs. This is a huge burden on farmers alongside doing their farming work.

Farmers in Kerry have experienced issues with the ACRES scheme and have had issues with the TAMS scheme. The issues surrounding the ACRES Scheme has caused a lot of stress for farmers and Gordon Kelleher has said we need to really listen to the word on the ground and implement a support network to counter that. "I know my party colleague and Minister; Norma Foley attended a meeting here in Kerry last month. She aswell as others heard

the issues facing farmers here on the ground. The stress the ACRES scheme claw backs due to overpayments of the interim payment has caused is unacceptable.

"Farmers may have spent that payment on the expenses of running a farm. Similarly, the TAMs grants has had issues in that there is large capital expenditure required by the farmer in the hope of getting the grant drawn down, but then they aren't getting grants or aren't getting the full amount.

The general election hopeful stated that support must be given to farmers now, and that we cannot have farmers left in limbo on whether there will be claw back on the payments they receive, or if they will even receive the full grant.

"Farmers are the backbone of local communities, and one of the most important industries in our country. We must do everything we can to support farmers, and I will be engaging with my party colleague and Minister for Agriculture Charlie McConalogue on this."





Minister Foley welcomes funding for a new neurology consultant for University Hospital Kerry

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed the confirmation of funding for a new neurology consultant for University Hospital Kerry.

Neurology is the branch of medicine dealing with the diagnosis and treatment of all categories of conditions and disease involving the nervous system

Around €2 million in funding is being provided for the expansion of neurology services next year in University Hospital Kerry, Midlands Regional Hospital Portlaoise, Wexford General Hospital, Mayo University Hospital and Letterkenny University Hospital.

Minister Foley said:

"I welcome confirmation from my cabinet colleague, Stephen Donnelly, that additional funding has been provided to recruit a new consultant neurologist for University Hospital Kerry.

"In Ireland around one-in-six people have a neurological condition. This can vary from diseases such as Parkinson's, Alzheimer's and Multiple Sclerosis to back pain, headaches, pinched nerves and stroke. This will improve the provision of neurological treatment for the people of Kerry and the surrounding region."

Funding is also being confirmed today for 2025 for further expansion of Health Service Executive Community Neuro-Rehabilitation Teams across the country, to help people after serious neurological illness or injury to improve health outcomes, reduce disability and improve quality of life. These



physios, occupational therapists and health care assistants are providing more care in an integrated way closer to people's homes. A total of 25 additional posts for these teams are being funded for 2025.

LYME DISEASE



Wild deer wandering freely on the roads of Kerry, pose a significant threat to the safety of all road users and that combined with the added danger of contracting Lime disease from their ticks, makes it imperative that deer numbers are culled to manageable numbers, according to Councillor Michael Cahill, a candidate in the next General Election.

"We need a combined approach to the twin dangers posed by the deer roaming around Kerry. I believe the first piece has been put in place by Minister for Agriculture, Charlie McConalogue with the setting up of the Deer Management Strategy Group. I expect that they will arrange for deer numbers to be returned to manageable levels" stated the Fianna Fáil Councillor.

"The threat of contracting Lime disease is ever present with large numbers of deer on our doorsteps and I continue to believe that a specific department should be set up in University Hospital Kerry, for detection, treatment and research of this debilitating condition" said Cahill.

"UHK would be the perfect location for a Lime Department, given the proximity to such large deer herds in Killarney National Park and beyond. At present, even if Lime is diagnosed, patients often need to travel to Germany for treatment and this is a major imposition on people who are ill and stressed enough already. A Lime specific diagnostic and treatment section in University Hospital Kerry, makes a load of sense" added the South Kerry Councillor.

Plans to Debelop Áras Padraig Welcomed

Plans to finally develop the Áras Padraig drama venue on Lewis Toad, Killarney, have been welcomed by Fianna Fáil's Michael Cahill. The project is set to include a 300 seat theatre space, with rehearsal, exhibition and gallery space, along with an educational space and room for office facilities and Councillor Michael Cahill, a candidate in the upcoming General Election has said that Killarney town centre has been crying out for a drama venue for some time now and Áras Padraig is in a fabulous location.

"Given the long time interest in drama locally and also the number of visitors to Killarney annually, a drama venue in Áras Padraig will become a vital attraction for the town. It will provide, not alone entertainment for visitors and residents, but it will provide employment for actors and playwrights and will require staff to

run the venue" stated Councillor Cahill.

"My campaign manager who lived in Killarney in his youth, recalls fond memories of the 'Áras'. It once hosted school 'hops' and then became a cinema for a time. Many shows were staged there and for a time it was home to Dóchas Drama Group and Killarney Judo Club. Killarney is the premier tourist destination in Ireland and the development of Áras Padraig can be the icing on the cake of its attractions for theatre goers" added the South Kerry Councillor.



BEAUFORT TRAFFIC CALMING MEASURES

Fianna Fáil, General Election Candidate Councillor Michael Cahill call for the introduction of Traffic Calming measures in Beaufort Village is to go before the next meeting of Kerry County Council. Councillor Cahill said he has received numerous complaints from residents of Beaufort about the dangers of walking in the village, cycling and indeed driving through the village.

"People walk through the village, to and from their homes to the local GAA pitch, the Community Centre, to the shop/post office or to the bus stop and it can be quite a challenge. 


0-4 to 0-1.

And thus do empires fall. Not with a bang, but with more of a tired whisper. East Kerry have won four of the last five titles, and their only blip, falling to Austin Stacks in 2021, was a one-off impacted by covid restrictions. From the very start all eyes were on them – yes, it gave breathing space to the likes of Crokes and Dingle, but it can hardly be considered unfair in the circumstances and with the numbers and quality of players available to them.



Ireland 2 Finland 1

Ireland desperately. desperately needed this win. Finland would be considered minnows of the European game, to be honest, but so would we, regardless of how much some supporters like to pretend

otherwise. Lose to Finland, and we are facing a very real possibility of relegation to the third tier.

And it looked very likely that we would lose this one for long periods. We were tentative enough at the start. There was no caution being thrown to the winds here. Finland actually looked slightly the more ambitious side - I suppose hme ground in Helsinki would do that - but frankly, a goal for either side was going to require a defensive mistake because neither team had anything like the creativity to open up one.

That mistake happened in the 18th minute,

and it really felt like a disaster. I actually rate Nathan Collins. No, he's not a Paul McGrath or Denis Irwin or even a gruff and game Mick McCarthy, but he's as good as we have got and would pretty much always be making my first eleven for Ireland these days. But sometimes mistakes happen and he more or less gifted Finland's Joel Pohjanpalo an open goal. A first touch that heavy should only be happening on a planet like Jupiter. Kelliher did his best but one on one at international level, no player is missing that one. 1-0 down, and like I say, I never felt like Ireland were going to score two goals. Certainly not the way they were playing.

Ireland did at least respond well in terms of hunting the ball. Evan Ferguson did manage to hit the net, but it was very obvious that it was going to be ruled out for offside. Finland still actually look more dangerous, despite Ireland probably beginning to dominate possession. Pohjanpalo had another go at goal, but it wasn't a great effort.

Robbie Brady had a set piece but couldn't beat the wall. Finn Azaz - sorry, now, but he looked very ordinary to me over the course of the game - had a tame effort easily gathered. Nothing that would get you to rise out of your seat (or couch, in my case). Robbie Brady as a set piece specialist? Sure, he's not world class, but he's better at it than anyone else we have got. Robbie Brady as a full back? Stop. Wing back? Worse. He's the fifth man in a five man midfield when you have that luxury and we don't have that luxury. I'm not sure of Ebosele's ability to defend under pressure, but like how he breaks at speed and stretches the play; I'd have been starting him. Mind you, Liam Scales was really, really surprising me. I'd kind of made up my mind that he's game but limited – he forced me to reconsider. He just played with composure and with a measure of healthy confidence. Overall, though, that was a brutally poor first half by Ireland, and I can understand (certainly never agree with) some fans booing Ireland at half-time.

Shay Given tries hard to make the argument that Evan Ferguson's goal should have stood. Ah. Shav. I always respected you, but Eamonn Dunphy or Joe Brolly would give up on that one fast. You'd be as well off lighting a fire with wet turf as try to ignite a controversy with that.

Ireland have to chase the game in the second half and, strangely enough, I think that seems to take the shackles off. Damn all left to lose, lads, may as well go for it. And they do. Smozdics does well to open a chance, even if he inish is easy enough for the keeper. Ogbene is much more adventurous and it suits him. He tears into the danger zone and Finland, caught in the no mans' land of trying to protect a lead rather than attack, are forced to foul him. Up steps Robbie Brady whom I would have taken off at this point) to send a lovely free kick into the box for Liam Scales to power home the header.

It's all Ireland now. And Ireland - let us whisper it - actually look capable of scoring a goal. It's a wonderfully nostalgic feeling. Finland need a leader to just step up, slow the ball down, start controlling the tempo. But they have as many players capable of that as we do, which is to say none at all. They actually have a great chance to go back in front straight after Ireland's goal (another heavy touch by an Irish player), but just can't produce the finish. In fact, we gift them yet another chance that again should be in the

just ten minutes left, Heimir With Hallgrimmson rolls the dice and decides to go looking for a winner. Good – a draw here will still leave relegation as the elephant in the room. I'm guessing Ogbene had just run out of steam. His touch may lack finesse, but in fairness he ran his legs off and I thought he was the one player who Finland feared. Ferguson is already well gone at this stage, and rightly so. He has yet to hit the heights for club or country after that long injury layoff and Troy Parrott's club form has earned him a chance here.

Ireland with a winner! And there's a sentence I thought I would never again get to write. Nice by Ebosele to carve open space for himself - few enough Irish players will actually take players on from near the corner - and a nice ball to the back post. Finland have left that back door shockingly wide open. Lovely first touch by Robbie Brady (see? I'm not all negative!) and a great finish from what was actually a tight enough angle. Awful defending, but you still have to put

Ireland with the win. It wasn't great when you factor in the quality of the opposition and the chances that Finland missed, but a win is a win and Ireland badly needed it. I honestly feel that coming out of that window with nothing would have seen calls for Hallgrimmson to go, and I couldn't face another year of Marc Canham pretending that negotiations with Pep Guardiola were almost wrapped up.

Greece 2 Ireland 0

It really isn't that long ago that Ireland fans were supremely confident. We are the mighty and much beloved Ireland supporters. We beat an Italian B team at the Euros once. We beat Germany once (and only once) upon a time. We beat Italy in New York. Ray Houghton put the ballin the English net. Etc. What had Greece done for the world? Ah yeah, lay down all the principles of modern philosophy, literature, architecture, art, and democracy for the Western world (granted, the Eastern world had them for at least a thousand years before that, but we don't talk about that). But we had this perception that Ireland were a major European soccer power and Greece were also-rans. I genuinely never understood it. Greece absolutely took us to school back then - that game in Greece may have been the worst Irish performance I have seen, and it's not like that's a short list. I always knew that Stephen Kenny just didn't have much quality to work with, but that was the game that made me think the players aren't the only problem here.

That was then. No Irish fan, no matter how blinkered, can really pretend that we are on a par with Greece nowadays. Especially after they beat England - tough window for Lee carsley. It's an old English failing, trying to squeeze too many similar word class players into too few positions. Remember Paul Scholes as a left winger because you had to play Lampard and Gerrard? I did rate Lampard and Gerrard better than Scholes - he was deadly accurate with the ball but lost if his team weren't dictating the play, the other two could stand in the trenches. Carsley gambled on a lot of attacking players rather than playing an actual striker. Kane is nearing the end of his team at the top level and the likes of Foden et al can't do that particular role. Playmaking and finishing are different art forms.

Ireland actually played fine against Greece. We looked lively at the start, Ferguson off target while shooting under pressure and Robbie Brady's attempted volley closed down fast. Greece should have done better with a shot blazed over and Caoimhin Kelliher makes a good save, but Ireland are actually looking up for a battle here. Relatively cautious, okay, but willing to go out and

play at the same time. Greece do look more dangerous, as you'd expect, but Kelliher makes another good save. A very good save, to be honest, and he catches the rebound as well. It looks more like a matter of how long we can hold out rather than whether we can, but Ireland are playing every bit as well as I had hoped. Kelliher with another great save on the half hour mark — that should really have been a goal.

I don't normally pay too much attention to half-time stats – too many of the metrics are too irrelevant. 'Pass completion' – were they completed in our half or theirs? But Greece had 65% possession and 14 efforts on goal (5 blocked, five wide, and four saved) to our two (one blocked and one wide). Yeah, that's a fair enough reflection of the play, but I'm actually quite happy with Ireland's display. Greece are playing really well but we just about deserve to be level at the break, and that's actually a fair achievement.

Not that it lasts long. Bakasetas has a tame effort gathered by Kelliher at the start of the half but then hits a better effort a minute later. I doubt if it would have beaten Kelliher, who was in top form, but for a deflection of Scales as he dived to attempt to block and instead diverted past his goalkeeper's outstretched fingers. An unlucky one to give away, but no need to blame anyone for that one; it happens.

Ferguson departs the game soon afterwards.

Great talent, but he has barely looked a shadow of himself in this window. Lack of match practice is the best case scenario; I'd worry that he still isn't physically right.

Greece actually should have had a second one almost ten minutes later, but it skews off the boot.

Ireland rang the changes and did pick up the tempo a bit. Jack Taylor looked lively - I had expected him to be way out of his depth — and his header forced a good save out of the Greek keeper on 70 minutes. That's about as good as it got for Ireland, though.

Just as the game reached injury time, Caoimhín Kelliher, after giving a superb exhibition all through the game, tried to slide a ball out right to a team-mate.....but it was easily read and intercepted, with Mantalos having the easiest of finishes to make it 2-0. Arrah, 1-0 was much the same as 2-0 at that stage and Greece were two goals better than Ireland on the night. Let's face it, Irish soccer has much bigger problems than coughing up a soft goal late in an inevitable defeat.

A shaky and unconvincing enough win, followed by what I consider a very creditable defeat to good opposition. No bad window at all overall. I do think all the talk of green shoots sprouting up is a bit of an exaggeration, but at least it feels like we have stopped scorching our own earth.


SYMPATHY



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




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

PRUNING APPLE TREES

Apple trees should be pruned every winter if you want a good crop of fruit the following season. If you don't prune your apple trees every year, they can become congested with a lot of old branches and don't produce as much fruit as it would when pruned.

It is not a very difficult job to prune an apple tree. All you need to remember is that you want to create an open centre with about half a dozen main branches. You should prune your apple trees when they are dormant, that is between November and early March.

When you start pruning your apple trees always use a sharp pair of secoteurs, loppers or pruning saw.

The point branches to start are those that are diseased, dead or damaged, then start by pruning those that are crossing each other.

Try to remember to keep the centre of the tree open even if you have to remove large branches.

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


