

FIRST VACCINE DOSE

FOR IRELAND'S OLDEST MAN

t was a red letter day on Wednesday of this week when Ireland's oldest man Michael J O'Connor received his first dose of the Pfizer vaccine to protect against Covid-19.

107 year old Michael was born on the 13th October 1913, he has survived World War I, World War II, The Spanish Flu & the War of Independence.

The Muckross man received his vaccine from Dr Ken Keohane at Deenagh Torc Medical Practice at the Reeks Gateway, Killarney on Wednesday.

Ballyhar couple James and Elizabeth Atkinson also received their first dose at Comirnaty Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine against Covid19 together at the Deenach Torc Medical Practice at the Reeks Gateway on Wednesday morning. The hale and hearty couple who have been married for 67 years were delighted to receive the vaccine under the rollout for people over the age of 85 years. The couple will receive their second dose of the vaccine on St Patrick's Day.

It was also a momentous day for Dr. Crokes stalwart Donie Sheehan who, at 94, also received his first vaccine on Thursday morning.

Minister for Health, This week, Stephen Donnelly TD, has today confirmed locations for 37 vaccination centres across Ireland for the COVID-19 Vaccination Programme including one at the Killarney Sports & Leisure Centre on Bypass Road.

The centre will support the vaccination of the general population in a safe

and efficient manner. While currently vaccines are being administered in healthcare settings and by GPs, many people will be offered their vaccination in these centres, having self-registered online. All of the centres vary in size and operating hours and have been selected based on population density, ease of access, transport and parking. The design and layout of the centres also incorporates learnings from the COVID-19 swabbing centres. It is important to note that the centres will be of different sizes and operating hours will be based on vaccine supply and catchment area need. Announcing the locations this week, Minister Donnelly said: "I would like to thank the HSE for their ongoing work in developing these vaccination centres across the country. These centres will be ready well in advance of vaccine supply when they will be used as part of our programme. People can expect to see these vaccination centres ready and waiting in their county.

"We have always said the vaccination programme would only be limited by the availability and reliability of supply in these early stages of the programme. In the coming months supply will increase substantially and we will see these centres operating to full capacity and administering vaccines to the general population, following the Government priority list." Kerry will have two centres, with the second one based at the Kerry Sports Academy at Dromtacker Tralee.



CALL FOR RIVER BANK CLEAN UP



At the February 2021 monthly meeting of Kerry County Council, Councillor Michael Gleeson proposed a costal, lake shore and where possible river bank Clean Up day / weekend during March or April thus ensuring the County's great beauty can be presented as pristine to the early year visitors and local people".

"I am aware that there is a National Costal Clean Up Day, usually in September, which achieves wonderful results", Cllr. Gleeson said.

Kerry County Council replied that they are willing to work with all relevant stake holders

i.e. Angling and Kayaking / Boating Clubs with a view to arranging such a Clean Up as suggested. It will not be possible to arrange such an event in the current circumstances but would be possible to do so in future years. A pilot area could be initially selected and if successful, this could then be expanded to other areas.

Councillor Gleeson said that how our County is presented from an aesthetic aspect and from health and safety perspectives is of enormous importance for the economic well-being of Kerry. Tourism is a very competitive business both nationally and internationally and unless

our product is of the highest quality, the tourist will go elsewhere.

It is so distressing to note the on-going level of littering on roadsides, lake shores, river banks and sea sides - particularly at this time of lockdown.

Many in Kerry work so hard to ensure highest standards. It is sad that a small percentage of the population persistently undo this good.

Councillor Gleeson welcomed the Council's positive response but asked that Kerry County Council would become the lead Agent at the appropriate time.

Council to unveil preliminary design for N72 road improvement scheme



Kerry County Council has developed a design for the proposed N72 Killorglin-Anglont Road Improvement Scheme, details of which will be announced on a public webinar on Friday, 19 February. Members of the public are invited to register for the online presentation at which details of the 2.6km scheme will be outlined by the project team. The project comprises the rehabilitation and upgrading of the existing

road surface and the provision of a new threemetre wide shared cycle and pedestrian facility on the north side of the road.

The N72 road is an important strategic access route between Killorglin and Killarney and has been identified in submissions to the National Development Plan by Kerry County Council as critical to the development of the Kerry Hub Knowledge Triangle and the improvement of

local infrastructure

The proposals, which are being developed in conjunction with TII, will improve safety for road users by upgrading both the road surface and sightlines and will promote Active Travel by encouraging a shift to greater use of sustainable modes of transport such as walking and cycling.

The preferred route option will be outlined during the webinar which will take place on Friday, 19th February at 4.00pm. Those wishing to participate must register in advance via the Kerry County Council website, www.kerrycoco. ie so they can be provided with a link to view the presentation. Questions or comments can also be submitted ahead of the webinar.

While the presentation is taking place online due to limitations on public consultation because of the current Covid-19 Level 5 restrictions, the project team based in the Kerry National Roads Office is keen to engage with people during the development of the scheme. 

NEW PUBLICATION LINKS OUR BUILT AND NATURAL HERITAGE



Zoologist and Killarney native Irene Sullivan is one of the co-authors in a new publication called 'Wildlife in Buildings: linking our built and natural heritage'.

It was produced by BirdWatch Ireland, Kerry County Council and Donegal County Council, with funding from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage through the National Biodiversity Action Plan Fund.

Irene, a former student at St. Brigid's Secondary School received a BSc. in Zoology in UCD and went onto attain a MSc. in Sustainable Environments.

Irene co-wrote the book with John Lusby, from Birdwatch Ireland and it highlights the importance of the built environment for wildlife and celebrates the species which have adapted to live alongside us and share our homes.

"When considering how to treat wildlife in buildings, we are forced to examine our relationship with wildlife. The Wildlife in Buildings booklet provides some answers to questions which may be asked by those dealing with wildlife in buildings, such as, what is the correct way to manage urbannesting Gulls? I hope that the booklet will be a valuable resource for those carrying out works on buildings which might support wildlife and will encourage its readers to view the built environment in a new light.", Irene said.

People live in buildings, and wildlife lives in "nature" - right? Well, not quite. Though the idea that man-made structures and civilisation is separate from nature persists, the built environment – from isolated, dilapidated ruins to busy urban townhouses – supports a huge variety of wildlife. To witness this all we need to do is look at the buildings which surround us and take the time to notice the wildlife which have also made them their homes.

The diversity of species which use buildings, and the ways in which they have adapted to use the built environment, is truly astonishing. Due to the loss and degradation of natural sites used for shelter and breeding, many vulnerable species (such as Swift, Barn Owl and the Lesser Horseshoe Bat) now rely on buildings for their survival. Chimneys, cracks, crevices, ledges and roof spaces now provide 'artificial' alternatives to similar opportunities formerly found in 'natural' habitats for many species.

From the diverse range of birds and mammals which have colonised abandoned ruins in remote rural landscapes, to wildlife which has moved into suburban and urban areas to live alongside us and even share our homes, buildings have become an integral component of the Irish landscape for biodiversity. Certain species are expected residents within our buildings, and for some the association with buildings is apparent even from their names, such as the 'House Martin' which builds its mud nest in the apex of the roof of occupied houses, and the 'Barn Swallow' which travels from Africa to nest in farmyards throughout the country. The vision of a Barn Owl floating silently from a ruined castle at dusk may seem familiar, but less expected occupants may be a pair of Kestrels nesting in a flower box outside a busy kitchen window, or a female Pine Marten raising her kits in the roof space of an occupied dwelling. Of course, much of the wildlife which use buildings go unnoticed, such as bats roosting in the attic of a house in which the inhabitants beneath remain blissfully unaware of their presence.

Given the importance of buildings for wildlife, changes to the built environment can affect wildlife associated with it. The loss of old stone structures due to demolition, dilapidation or renovation is linked to declines in species such as Barn Owl and Swift. Modern buildings do not provide the same opportunities for wildlife. Wildlife in buildings can often be harmed during works due to a lack of knowledge on the part of the developers on how different species use buildings. Being mindful of wildlife in buildings can give rise to questions such as, what do we do if we find wildlife? How do we ensure that building works are carried out in a responsible, legal way, which avoids disturbance?

BirdWatch Ireland, Kerry County Council and Donegal County Council, with funding from the National Biodiversity Action Plan, have produced a new publication entitled 'Wildlife in Buildings: linking our built and natural heritage,' in response to this gap in knowledge, and to provide answers to questions commonly asked regarding wildlife in buildings. Designed as a guide to be used by anyone carrying out works on a building which may support wildlife, the publication will be useful for homeowners, farmers. developers, contractors ecologists alike - as well as those who simply want to know more about how wildlife use buildings. It provides information not just on how disturbance to wildlife can be avoided, but also on how buildings can be improved to accommodate wildlife, to ensure that as the built environment constantly changes and expands, we continue to make space for nature.

John Lusby, BirdWatch Ireland, commented, 'We wanted to celebrate the importance of buildings for wildlife and to create a better link between our built heritage and our natural heritage – as the two are intertwined. We are very fortunate in Ireland that so many of our sites of cultural and historic importance remain intact in the landscape. These stone structures are a rich part of our cultural heritage, but they are also of significant ecological value. Some of these sites hold such a diversity of wildlife in such a small area that they should be considered as among our most important sites for biodiversity.'

Irish Wheelchair Association in Kerry calls on the Government to **prioritise people with disabilities in Covid vaccination plan**

Irish Wheelchair Association in Kerry has called on the Government to prioritise people with disabilities under its vaccination plan, as concerns grow over vaccine delays. The charity said that people with physical disabilities are at severe risk due to underlying conditions.

Terry O'Brien, from the Irish Wheelchair Association based in Kerry said: "Many people with physical disabilities are at severe risk of Covid due to health conditions that could cause complications and hospitalisation, yet they have not been recognised as a vulnerable group by the Government.

"The Government must also recognise that in the absence of regular day services, many people with disabilities have been confined at home since the virus took hold last March, adding additional stress. People we support are eager to get the vaccine and are highly concerned about how long they will wait with vaccine supplies lower than planned.

"At the current time, people over 65 in residential settings with disabilities are rightly getting vaccinated. Yet worryingly, those living



independently in the community and being assisted at home in Kerry and across the country are not

"This is a real issue. Our members have told us they are very keen to be vaccinated, but are concerned that they will be left waiting. With concerns about vaccination supplies, we urge the Minister for Health to urgently include people with disabilities on the priority list to ensure their protection." Irish Wheelchair Association is Ireland's largest organisation supporting people with physical disabilities to lead active and independent lives and has 20,000 members. The association currently has 1,500 staff across Ireland visiting 4,000 homes each month, caring for individuals with disabilities, in their own homes. According to Terry O'Brien: "In Kerry, we have a strong team of frontline workers, who have been visiting people at home every day since Covid arrived almost a year ago. We are helping people get out of bed, get dressed, preparing meals, helping around the home, making trips for shopping, the chemist and with personal care. "Our immediate priority is to protect people with disabilities and to ensure that the most vulnerable have all the support they need while they cannot be with their family and friends. Our members have added vulnerabilities to the Covid-19 virus. They must be included on the Government's vaccine priority list." CLARITY AT LAST

FOR LEAVING CERT STUDENTS

The announcement made on Wednesday evening was a welcome for the clarity it bestowed for all students, teachers and parents. Whether you agreed with the decisions made or not, everybody had reached a stage of frustration and torment just not knowing what situation we would find ourselves in at the end of the academic year and what type of work should have our undivided attention at this time of year in relation to orals and practical's, that could now be taking place over the Easter holidays and projects that we have been told by an Irish Second level Students Union (ISSU) statement are now "optional".

Being given the option to sit the exams or avail of the newly named "accredited grades" is a decision welcomed by most. However, many questions, which I hope will be answered in the coming days, have arisen with the decision to not factor in oral/practical results into the accredited grade system which we have been told will be overseen by the State Examinations Commission (SEC). My own initial reaction to hearing the news and reading

articles in the national newspapers was that we can sit the exams and then obtain whichever grade is higher between the accredited grades and the exams. This may sound like a positive but on reflection there is a good possibility that this will repeat the events of last year where we saw the highest achieved grades in the history of the state exams and with a state record of CAO applicants of nearly 80,000 this year, I am worried like my fellow students about the influx at entry level of points into third level college courses. Minister of Education Norma Foley also stated on the RTE Six One news Wednesday evening that with the unpredictability of the Covid-19 virus she cannot rule out further disruptions to the plans to sit written exams in June in a safe environment and I think I speak for all leaving cert students when I say that the last thing we want is to be sitting exams in July or like last year, having to wait until November. From my own perspective, the decision made on the leaving cert 2021 has been discussed publicly for quite some time now, it just has to be questioned why it took so long for the Department of Education to come to this



final decision which was the preferred choice of the vast majority and students and an idea put forward by the ISSU a number of weeks ago. My hope for the rest of the year is to return to a safe environment in schools rather than online learning if we are to complete written exams in little under 4 months.

Work underway to ensure Kerry homes and businesses are connected to


high speed broadband - Griffin

Work is underway to ensure Kerry homes and businesses will be connected under the Government's plan for high speed broadband, Deputy Government Chief Whip Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin said: "Homes and businesses in Kerry will be connected to high speed broadband under the Government's National Broadband Plan, for which survey work is underway despite the challenges of the pandemic.

The Broadband Connection Points (BCPs) initiative will see publicly accessible sites in rural and isolated parts of Kerry provided with a temporary high-speed broadband connection by National Broadband Ireland (NBI), the company contracted to deliver the NBP. Many points have been connected already.

As part of the work to connect homes and businesses to high speed broadband, surveying is underway or completed in Townlands around Killarney (including Muckross, Fossa, Kilcummin, Lissivigeen, Ballycasheen, Faha, Firiesand Ballyhar), Tralee, Curraheen, Abbeydorney, Kilflynn, Firies, Castlemaine, Ardfert, Rathmore, Knocknacopple, Mounthorgan, Kilquane Upper, Barraduff, Cloonteens, Gneevgullia, Tureenamult, Renasup, Castlegregory, Aughacasla, Camp, Knockbrack, Maum, Lougher, Inch, Annascaul, Derrygorman, Ballyglasheen, Brackluin, Ballintarmon, Drom, An Clochan, Kilshannig, Fahamore, Candeehy,



Breanainn, Ballyheigue, Glenderry, Ladywell, Banna, Lerrig, Ballymacandrew, Causeway, Foxfort, Ballymacaquinn, Ballincloher, Dromartin, Beenconeen.

oung people had little chance to celebrate St. Valentine's Day or any other significant milestone during the past year. Their education has been a bit like Lanigan's Ball - in school again, out again! They've had no social life, recreation nor sport worth mentioning. They spent their days in the attic struggling with remote learning for an undefined objective.

But the nerve-wracking uncertainty ended on Wednesday for 120,000 Leaving Cert and Junior Cycle exam candidates when it was announced that the Leaving Cert exam will go ahead in June and students will also have the option of applying for grades accredited by the State Examinations Commission (SEC), to be called SEC-Accredited Grades. These were known last year as 'calculated grades.' This means that the SEC has provided every Leaving Cert candidate with not one, but three methods of having their achievement measured at the end of their postprimary education - a traditional Leaving Cert, the SEC- Accredited Grades or a combination of both methods, whichever yields the best results. So, students have the best of all worlds. They can apply for the SEC-Accredited grades and also, if they wish, for the Leaving Cert exam in June. Students can opt into these processes on a subject-by-subject basis. Students will be awarded a SEC-Accredited grade in each subject they apply for, based on their previous work and teacher's assessment. In addition, they will achieve a grade in each subject they sit for in the traditional Leaving Cert exam. The icing on the cake is that the student will ultimately be awarded the higher grade in each subject across both options. The example below illustrates what may happen in a system which isn't perfect but is definitely the fairest for the students. The timetable for the June written exams, which begin on 9th June, is available on www.examinations.ie from Thursday, 18th February. As expected, the Junior Cycle exam was cancelled.

For those taking the Leaving Cert exams, oral exams will be held during the Easter holidays

or shortly after. Coursework will also proceed in the relevant subjects. Additional time will be provided by the SEC for completion of this work. In some subjects, the holding of practical exams won't be possible given public health considerations. Details of revised schedules will be issued to schools in the coming weeks. The oral and coursework components of the exams will not form part of the SEC-Accredited Grade

The Irish Second -Level Students Union (ISSU) has long held the view that students are entitled to a choice of traditional exam or calculated grades, now called SEC-Accredited grades. ISSU ran an effective campaign and emerged as clear

All aspects of staging the exams will be guided by public health advice and schools will be supported and given clear guidance on the staging of the exams. The results of the Leaving Cert process will be issued to students within the required timeframe for CAO and UCAS (British Colleges) college offers.

Students will get their SEC-Accredited grades at the same time as they get the results of the traditional Leaving Cert exam. That means students won't know their SEC-Accredited grades before deciding whether or not to sit the June exam. But it's a win-win situation for students. Any student, who is up for it, should sit a few or all of her/her subjects in the June exam because it gives you a second bite of the cherry. The exam papers might also be watered-down considering the amount of in-school time lost during the past few years. Nobody will guibble if students are offered more choice on an exam paper or a single exam paper in a subject where two is the norm. The June exams are very doable and may provide a student with the few extra points to secure that precious college course.



When Can You Access Your Pension & What Are Your Options When You Want to Retire?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Taxable Cash: You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash.

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.



GAA RECORD LARGE DEFICIT FOR 2020


The GAA's accounts for 2020 were released this week and unfortunately, they make for grim reading, with last year's E8 million surplus replaced with a whopping E34.1 million loss as a result of covid.

Central finances recorded a deficit of E15.6 million, county and provincial losses ran to E7 million, Croke Park recorded a E10.2 million loss, and miscellaneous costs ran to E1.3 million.

These accounts only go up to October 31st, when the GAA's tax year ended, so the costs and revenue of running the All Ireland championships behind closed doors has yet to be factored in. Revenue fell 57%, from E73.9 million to E31.4 million, with over half of that coming from State funding of E18.5 million.

Director General Tom Ryan acknowledged the vital contribution of the Government to keeping the organisation afloat "The GAA simply could not have navigated its way safely through 2020 without the significant support of governments both north and south" and noted that the GAA would almost certainly have to rely on Government funding again in 2021.

"There was provision made in last year's budget




I know for the sporting sector this year," he said. "We've already spoken to Sport Ireland and the Department just about the principles of that, highlighting to them that we're not out of the woods yet. We don't like having to rely on the public purse but we flagged with them already that this year is going to be challenging."

There are 37 motions on the clár for this year's GAA Congress, which will be held online next weekend, with a further 10 motions deferred until there is more clarity regarding returning to play protocols, including proposals for a new format for the All Ireland Football

Championship. Among the more significant motions up for debate are the introduction of a penalty and a sin bin for aggressive fouls that deny a clear goal-scoring opportunity, the elimination of maor foirne, allowing managers to make two challenges to a referee's decision calling for hawkeye, no entry by officials onto the field of play, no back pass from a kick out in football, and widening player eligibility for a club or county to include other relevant connection' – that one in particular could have big implications for Kerry's parish rule.

She cut her hair on December 22nd before the current lockdown restrictions were in place.





Because all GAA activities are discontinued at the moment any claim for injury is unlikely to be entertained by the Player Injury Fund Administrators if sustained during personal training activity or during other training before clubs are given the green light to resume activity by GAA Headquarters. Until then all players must understand that they participate in training activity at their own risk.

2. Heretofore the Player Injury Fund could pay injured players €300 per week for 26 weeks in respect of Loss of Wages. All clubs have now been notified by GAA Headquarters that for the moment and the immediate future Loss of Wages Claims WILL NOT be paid.

LEVEL 5 LOCKDOWN



OFFICIAL UPDATE FROM GAA (Feb 10th)

A chara, The GAA's Covid Advisory Group met this evening to consider the outcome of a meeting between the three Gaelic Games governing bodies (GAA, Ladies Gaelic Football Association and Camogie Association) and representatives of the Irish Government, including the Minister of State for Sport, which took place earlier this week. The meeting was held to brief the governing bodies on the short-term prospects for a return to training and playing of our games. The Government representatives clarified that intercounty Gaelic Games activity is not covered under the current Level 5 exemptions for elite sports.

As such a return to intercounty training or games is not permitted under the current restrictions. It was also clear that there will not be any change to this position post-March 5th when the restrictions currently in place are reviewed. It is the view of

the GAA's Covid Advisory group that no on field activity will be permitted - training or games - until Easter at the earliest.

In the interim, it is expected that the Government will publish an updated "Living with Covid" plan and we expect that this will provide clarity on when clubs and counties are likely to be allowed return to training and games in 2021.

It should also provide clarity on when other off-field club activities may be permitted to resume. It is clear that this extended delay to the planned return of the inter county season will have knock-on effects for both the inter county and club games programmes originally planned for 2027. As of now the GAA have made no firm decisions on what competitions may or may not be facilitated in any revised fixture programme - such decisions will be a factor of how much time is made available to us, both for an inter county season and for the broader participation levels that will be necessary for a meaningful club season.

While we will begin to look at contingency plans for the Master Fixtures programme, we will not be able to take definitive decisions in this context until we have a clear picture of what restrictions we are likely to be operating under at various points in the year ahead.

Rest assured however, that once clarity is provided by Government and Public Health Authorities on the likely road ahead for society generally and sport in particular, the GAA will follow with its own roadmap and plan for our own activities at both inter-county and club level, that will cover whatever time is available to us for the remainder

McDonagh Cup Team of the Year

After a year in which they lost just three games, two of them finals, Kerry have five players listed on the McDonagh Team of the Year. Tomas O'Connor is at right corner back, Jason Diggins on the wing outside him, Shane Nolan is in midfield, Shane Conway lines out at centre forward, and Daniel Collins, Kerry's incoming captain, is, perhaps surprisingly, named at left wing forward. Antrim, who beat Kerry in all three of our defeats (fair dues, that's a great team) have seven players named (I must admit that James McNaughton is a very surprising omission to me), with Carlow (2) and Westmeath (1) making up the remainder.

RUGBY

Irish Womens' Team of the Decade

Congratulations to Ciara Griffin on being voted in as blindside flanker, i.e. number 6, on the Irish Womens' Team of the Decade. Griffin's superb performances in last year's Six Nations Championship (this year's Championship, unfortunately, had to fall by the wayside), where Ireland went unbeaten at home, meant that she was always likely to top the vote for this team. Her fellow Kerryowman, Siobhán Fleming from Kerry, can't have been very far away though. Womens' rugby has come vast distances in the past decade (most sports have, although parity of pay or esteem or, most crucially in my opinion, facilities at ground level, are nowhere close to where they should be) – people like both Ciara and Siobh an have played a huge role in that.

England 41 Italy 18

Italy actually made a confident start, loane scooting over after three minutes. Owen Farrell with a penalty. Jonny Hill with a try, more power than guile really. Italy with a penalty, level after 20 minutes. I'd say a discomfited England were very glad these games are played behind closed doors! To be fair, they aren't getting rattled and are staying with the job in hand.

Italy actually started well against France, too, before performing a remarkable disappearing act. The same looks like it's about to happen here too, as Watson neatly slices through for atry and Farrell converts. Italy hold out well, though, until just on the stroke of half-time, Jonny May leapfrogs over the line. The commentators are in paroxysms of ecstacy. I'll make allowances; I'd say lockdown is getting to them lads. England 20 Italy 8 at half-time. Highly respectable.

Garbisi with another penalty. Fair play, Italy, ye have a lot more character than I gave ye credit for, and I'm delighted to see it! England respond, great interception and burst by Watson for a try. Nice play, and Farrell converts.

Jack Willis with another try before departing with a leg injury. Italy with a try, it was coughed up a little soft, but taken well. Eddie Jones won't be happy here; England are not convincing against a team they should be blowing out of the water. But I'm delighted for Italy. They were never going to win this, but they are showing a courage and a hunger I'm not used to from them. England respond with another try through Daly and a Farrell conversion; that closes out the scoring.

Unconvincing by England, but a win in the bag at least. They aren't great and it's not going to be a great Six Nations even if they win every game from here, but England have the knack of coming out of Six Nations stronger than when they went in. As for Italy? They aren't going to win any game, but if they can show me more of this, I'll applaud them to the skies.

Wales 25 Scotland 24

A little unpatriotic confession. This is the game I was most interested in this weekend, much more than our own. Wales had impressed me a lot against us - fair enough, they were a little slow at actually putting the hammer down after laying good groundwork and Ireland gave them a testing battle, but they deserved their win and showed flashes of a Wales that we hadn't seen in a long time. Scotland, however, were the real surprise package. They weren't neat or clinical against England, they were just....stubbornly determined and relentless. It wasn't always pretty, but it was exhilarating. So the rubber game between these two revitalised former giants of the game was always going to grab my attention.

Did it live up to the billing? In excitement definitely. In quality? Mmm, maybe not so much....

Wales looking a bit livelier early on, and Halfpenny opens the scoring with a penalty. Scotland with a penalty of their own; they opt to kick for the corner. I can admire the ambition, but I'm a very firm believer in going for the score unless time is up and you are chasing the game. They get another penalty; this time Finn Russell takes the three points. Good lad.

Wales have more possession, but can't penetrate. It's Scotland who take the first try in the 18th minute, and it's a lovely score, a clever chip by Ali Price sending Darcy Graham over. Russell converts and it's 10-3. Seven minutes later they get another one, Staurt Hogg chasing down his own kick and pouncing after Leigh Halfpenny fails to deal with it. A bad one to concede. Russell converts again. 17-3. This is a nightmare for Wales, made worse with Halfpenny departing for a HIA, and a dream for Scotland. Two minutes from halftime, Wales finally attack with a bit of purpose. Scotland pull down a driving maul but Wales don't hesitate and play advantage to go for the jugular. Remember the criticism of the Irish defence when Lou Rees-Zammit went over? Wales do the same thing again, stretching the line perfectly with quick and accurate passes; done right, it's almost impossible to defend. Half-time Scotland 17 Wales 8

Scotland are pounding at Wales and have a try overruled by TMO for obstruction; Wales got a bit lucky there because I don't think it was intentional. Correct call, though. Having just had a narrow escape, Wales suddenly go on the attack and snare a try of their own, very much against the run of play. The Weslh pack tie Scotland up, and that opens up room; once again Rees Zammit is involved, laying it off to Liam Williams for an easy finish. Sheedy converts. 17-15, Scotland should really have wrapped this up before now.

Then disaster strikes for them. I've rarely believed in games turning on a single moment (it's lazy journalism, to be honest, games tend to be flowing narratives), but this one did. Scotland were awarded a very scorable penalty when TMO called the play back to show Zander Fagerson going in recklessly with the shoulder and making contact with Wyn Jones' head. Not malicious, but way too clumsy. Red card, penalty reversal. A minute later Wales are powering over Scotland's line and in front, 20-17.

Scotland twice opt for scrums with a good chance of kicking three points (I reiterate my earlier point, give me pragmatic over pretty any day). Except that it works eventually, the scrum holding on a third occasion and Hogg getting inside a little bit too easily. 24 – 20 with

15 minutes left. But Wales still have that extra man....and when it comes down to it, that extra man turns out to be Rees-Zammit, who hares down the wing and gathers his own neat chip. A brilliant try and a match-winner. Delight for Wales, heartbreak for Scotland. And hugely entertaining rugby.

France Ireland

Oh well, sin deireadh an scéal. We're not winning the Six Nations. To be honest, we need to avoid the wooden spoon, and that's going to be tricky enough.

I didn't have high hopes for this one. I'll be honest; it came as a complete surprise to me to learn that France haven't beaten us in Dublin in a decade, I would never have guessed. We have a lot of guts and effort, but a real lack of flair or guile. We are far from the force we were. More troubling for me is that we don't look like a team who have settled on our best options; that needs to be sorted by the end of this Championship.

The story of the game is relatively simple. There was little enough between the sides. We actually started better, exerting good pressure. Jalibert misses a good penalty chance, Burns misses an even worse one (a real ouchie effort; I feel sorry for Burns, but that's bread and butter, to be honest). He nails the next one. 3-0 after twenty minutes; the scoreline tells a lot. Le Roux departs on a yellow, Ireland spread it well, James Lowe (not perhaps quite as adept as Larmour at defending the full width, but a much better overall option for me) tears down the flank and in....no! Dupin just managed to force the tip of his boot into touch. Great defending, as I did not say at the time.

14 man France get a try instead. And it's sublime. It's gorgeous rugby, actually, my favourite try of this Six Nations. Yes, Gibson Park made a slight mistake initially, but the punishment is so immediate and immaculate you have to admire it. Jalibert converts. France have limited possession compared to Ireland, but are just so much more clinical with it, especially with precision offloads. Jalibet with a penalty, 10-3 at half-time.

Roger O'Gara tells us that "Ireland were the better team," at half-time. I assume that he's watching the game on the radio. Burns, Healy, and Henderson all go off with knocks – big losses,, but I have to say that subs Ross Byrne (really impressed me, moved into pole position for the slot), Tralee's Ultan Dillane, and Ed Byrne all do very well on their introduction, in fact all of Ireland's subs throughout the game look impressive. But France are comfortably soaking up everything Ireland are throwing and after fifteen minutes, they again stretch our defence the full width before Penaud goes over. 15-3.

Ronan Kelliher pulls back a try for Ireland. Dillane knocks the line-out down, it takes the flukiest of bounces. Kelliher snatches it and sprints without a second's thought. Yes, it was pure opportunism, but he had a lot to do after the initial bit of luck. Byrnd converts and it's a one score game. Byrne slots another penalty. Ireland finish out the game exerting huge pressure.

No, sorry, I have to correct that. Ireland have loads of possession and go through loads

of phases, without once looking like really creating anything. We need France to make a mistake, and they simply don't. It's our biggest limitation. Plenty of bludgeons, no rapier.

Let's get realistic about this. I'm not expecting peak performance from any team in any sport at the moment, given the particular times we live in. And we were missing Johnny Sexton, Peter O'Mahony, Conor Murray, Caelan Doris, and James Ryan. That's a fair chunk out of any starting fifteen. I'm actually reasonably pleased with the battle we have put up in both our games so far.

McGeechan's Team of the Six Nations

You'll see a lot of these teams later, sure I might have a pop at one myself (I'll modestly exclude myself from selection), but Ian McGeechan has been the first to stick his head above the parapet and select his best team after just two games. Ireland, perhaps a trifle surprisingly, have six players selected on the fifteen, which is great going for a team that has lost both games (if you didn't realise that McGeechan is the Vodafone ambassador for Ireland). Garry Ringrose, Robbie Henshaw, Jamison Gibson Park, Iain Henderson, Tadhg Beirne, and Rhys Ruddock all make the cut. I won't lie; I am a little surprised at a couple of those. Keenan has probably been Ireland's best player for me (Beirne, in fairness, has been a real warrior in the deep trenches and Henshaw has been a dynamo) but Stuart Hogg was always getting the nod there, and quite rightly.

SOCCER

Jon Walters Applies to Head PFA

The Professional Football Association in England is the oldest professional sports union. While no-one would argue that it has always gotten things right - it certainly did not cover itself in glory during the players' revolt against the wage cap and since the introduction of the Premiership in 1992, that particular tail has invariably been wagging the dog. Nonetheless it is the PFA that has led the way in Community Schemes, in injury benefits, in anti-racism drives (still, sadly, very necessary). Their best work is often unseen in the background - the vast majority of professional soccer players are actually on low wages, with little longterm guarantees, and often at the whim of unscrupulous owners - until the PFA step in. It has an annual turnover of £34 million a year and net assets listed of £68 million

Gordon Taylor has been the CEO of the PFA since 1981, and overall I would certainly say that he has done a very good job. There has been very strong criticism of his salary, £2 million a year, and the PFA's handling of dementia issues among former players. To be fair, Taylor never had a say in setting that salary (which will be reduced to £500,000) and followed inadequate medical advice regarding dementia.

At first glance, Jon Walters might not seem an obvious candidate to be his replacement. Walters was a decent striker, but not elite in Premiership standards. There weren't too many kids with posters of him on their wall. The highlight of his career was playing in the 2011 FA Cup Final.

English born, he qualified for Ireland through his mother. He had played at U21 level, but didn't win his first senior cap until the age of 27 in 2010 under Giovanni Trappatoni. Ireland were already beginning to decline at that stage, even before more recent financial woes. Like many of the players, Walters had a brilliant attitude, tireless workrate, real loyalty....and limited ability for that level. The truth is that apart from record goal-scorer Robbie Keane, we had more bludgeons than sharpshooters, and our long ball tactics meant that Walters was never going to break any scoring records. His first goal arrived in his second cap, a crucial Euro 2012 qualifier against Estonia which Ireland won 4-0. 2015 was his greatest year for Ireland - Walters was absolutely immense. He scored five goals that year and was Ireland's Player of the Year. His best game was the legendary 1-0 victory over Germany. There are two schools of thought on that one, A: Ireland played absolutely brilliantly to down the World Champions, and B: reality. They executed Dick Turpin for lesser larcenies. But an outplayed Ireland hung in there and stymied a rampant Germany and absolutely no-one stood taller or harder in that battle than Jojn Walters. They gave Long man of the match for his goal (a long ball punt) but Walters, forced to drop back into midfield, was the mainstay of Ireland's resistance. Walters retired from international football in 2018, having scored 14 goals in 54 games, and from club football in 2019.

None of that is why I'd love to see Jon Walters

become head of the PFA. Nor is it any Irish loyalty; I don't want any parochialism in such an important role. I want him there because I think he would be genuine and great at it. He played in every professional league in England, lining out for Blackburn Rovers, Bolton wanderers, Hull City, Crewe Alexandria, Barnsley, Scunthorpe United, Wrexham,. Chester City, Ipswich, Stoke City, and Burnley. He captained most of them (and his country) and left them all on good terms. He knew the highs and lows as a player. He has fundraised, both publicly and privately, for charities throughout his whole career, most notably for Alzheimers. He was one of the first voices to challenge British Health Secretary Matt hancock when he called on footballers to take pay cuts - Hacoock, who was paid more than the vast majority of footballers, backled off very quickly. Walters is very much one of the good guys, but he isn't a pushover. One of those who found that out very quickly - twice - was a certain Roy Keane, who twice challenged Walters on his injury recovery with both Ipswich and Ireland. Roy, unquestionably

a better player (one of the greatest midfielders ever) had an enormous weakness in dealing with team-mates or players. On that occasion, to say the least, he bit off a lot more than he could chew; it badly tarnished his fading managerial reputation.

Walters, of course, isn't the only candidate. Dave Kitson effectively ruled himself out of the running almost as soon as he announced it by suggesting that black players inadvertently draw racism on themselves with social media posts, citing Raheem Sterling. Kitson isn't a racist; but he 's not very bright either. A more likely candidate is former Chairman Ben Purkiss, who lost a fairly bitter power struggle to Taylor. Purkiss had agreed previously along with the outgoing Management Committee (Walters was on the Board of Management) not to stand, but has since changed his mind.

There is a fairly dramatic wave of change sweeping through English football. Richard Scudamore has stepped down as Chief Executive of the Premier League, as has FA Chief Executive Martin Glenn and EFL Chief Executive Shaun Harvey.

With transfer fees and salaries likely to be put under severe pressure after covid (frankly, those astronomical numbers badly needed a reset; financial fair play has been a joke without a punchline in recent years, and that's without mentioning the FAI's self-inflicted problems), there are choppy waters ahead for whoever does get the role.

SFAI NATIONAL COMPETITIONS CANCELLED

While League of Ireland soccer is expected top resume fairly shortly, being deemed an elite sport under Government guidelines, the SFAI have announced that last year's Kennedy Cup competition and this year's National Cups have to fall by the wayside in the current circumstances. They are hoping that the 2021 Kennedy Cup competition will take place, but quite understandably that will depend on progress in regard to safety.



BOXING

Milltown heavyweight boxer Kevin Cronin, the Kingdom Warrior, has announced that his third professional fight will take place on March 20th in Luxembourg, a six round match against highly rated Dutch boxer Nick Postma. The Dutchman lost to Cork boxer Valdimir Belujsky (a real name to watch out for this year) and is a real test for 6'2" firefighter Cronin, who boxed as an amateur with Cashen Vale BC. This is a big step for Cronin, whose last couple of fights unfortunately fell by the wayside because of covid. If he can win this win against a boxer of Postma's experience, he will be moving up much higher on the radar.

The fight will be available on pay per view.

NO GAA UNTIL AT LEAST EASTER

The GAA confirmed that, following clarification on Government guidelines in regards to exemptions for elite sport, there will be no GAA activity until at least Easter (April 4th). It had been hoped to start the Allianz National Leagues in late March. Regulations had previously classed GAA as elite sport, similar to professional rugby and soccer (the League of Ireland will commence on March 19th). However, Junior Minister for Sport Jack Chambers confirmed that this does not apply to the GAA because of its amateur status and that the previous exemption under level 5 of inter-county GAA games was a concession that no longer applies because of the rise in the number of covid infections since then, pointing out that Ireland had more cases in January of this year than in all of 2020. Both the Minister and the Taoiseach praised the GAA for their co-operation and support during the pandemic.

The GAA issued the following statement:

"It is the view of the GAA's Covid Advisory group that no on field activity will be permitted - training or games - until Easter at the earliest. In the interim, it is expected that the Government will publish an updated "Living with Covid" plan and we expect that this will provide clarity on when clubs and counties are likely to be allowed return to training and games in 2021.

"It should also provide clarity on when other off-field club activities may be permitted to resume

"It is clear that this extended delay to the planned return of the inter-county season will have knock-on effects for both the inter county and club games programmes originally planned for 2021".

"Such decisions will be a factor of how much time is made available to us, both for an inter-county season and for the broader participation levels that will be necessary for a meaningful club season," the GAA note read.

"While we will begin to look at contingency plans for the Master Fixtures programme, we will not be able to take definitive decisions in this context until we have a clear picture of what restrictions we are likely to be operating under at various points in the year ahead.

"Rest assured however, that once clarity is provided by Government and Public Health Authorities on the likely road ahead for society generally and sport in particular, the GAA will follow with its own roadmap and plan for our own activities at both intercounty and club level, that will cover whatever time is available to us for the remainder of the year.

"We know these latest developments will come as a great disappointment to all those who are anxious to resume their Gaelic Games involvement, be it on or off the field. While we remain in the midst of a deadly pandemic, there is significant cause for optimism that much better days lie ahead. The manner in which we have endured and overcome thus far, both as individual members and as an Association generally, has been praised by many and is a cause of great pride to us all. With your help we are certain that we will eventually have a fulfilling season at both club and county level in 2021, just as we had in 2020."







Gardening
with Killarney Outlook

TREES

Trees are beautiful in any garden and their long life makes them a wonderful garden feature. A tree should be the first thing you plant in your garden after the hedging — they can be underplanted afterwards with bulbs and shrubs. Trees are interesting in all four seasons with attractive unfolding of leaves in spring, full foliage in summer, good Autumn colour followed by decorative bark in the Winter. The first and most important thing you need to know when buying a tree is what's the height and spread going to be when it is mature. There are many varieties of trees to choose from and there is a tree suitable for most areas. Trees can be planted all year round but as with hedging, trees can be planted when they are dormant between Novemeher and March.

With these bare-rooted trees you will still have a few weeks left to plant them. If you plant beofre the end of March, it will give the tree a better chance of rooting into the ground that bit quicker. When planting your bare rooted tree, dig the hole big enough, that you can spread out the roots all around the hole. Then drive your stake into the hole roughly about 6 to 8 inches below the bottom of the hole, place your tree and spread the roots out well. If possible place your stake on the side of the prevailing winds as this will ensure that the tree is blown up against the stake when the wind is high. Fill in the soil mixed with compost around the roots and firm in with the heel of your foot. Lastly, place your tree ties on — one near the top and one at the bottom with a spacer in between to stop the bark being damaged by the stake.

PLAN FOR SUCCESS

Planning ahead, in whatever task we do, can help smooth the way and prevent problems from arising later on. Confucius, the Chinese philosopher rightly said, "A man who does not plan long ahead will find trouble at his door," It is said that "Planning is bringing the future into the present so that you can do something about it now." Chances are, if you speak to anyone who has been successful they will tell you that planning ahead was a vital ingredient in their formula
