

Disbelief, Sadness and Shock

as Killarney comes to terms with the LOSS OF MIRIAM BURNS

Known to everyone in Killarney for her glamorous looks, her radiant smile and her great friendliness, the town of Killarney is united in grief at the shocking passing of the much loved Miriam Burns.

Miriam was a familiar sight in Killarney, always dressed to the nines and with a smile and a wave for everyone as she went about her business on her bicycle.

The 75 year old mother and grandmother was found dead at her home in Ardshanavooly, a place where she lived for almost 50 years.

At lunchtime on Monday neighbours were contacted by Miriam's son Shane who lives in Australia and who was concerned that he hadn't heard from his mother. He asked the neighbours to check on his mother and when they did so they found her body in the living room in her home.

It was at this point that Gardai and Emergency Services were called and the area was cordoned

Mrs. Burns body remained at the scene until the Assistant State Pathologist Dr. Margot Bolster attended and from then the body of late Killarney native was removed to University Hospital Kerry.

In a statement Gardaí said: 'A post-mortem examination was conducted on Tuesday at University Hospital Kerry (UHK) by State Pathologist Dr. Margot Bolster, the results of which are not being released for operational

spokesperson said.

'An incident room has been established at Killarney garda station and a murder investigation has commenced under the direction of a senior investigating officer.

'A family liaison officer has been appointed

and continues to keep the family informed of the investigation.

Local councillor Donal Grady paid tribute to Mrs Burns who was a friend and neighbour saying the community is shocked over the tragedy.

"I knew her very well and spoke with her regularly. She comes from a highly respected family and she herself is highly respected here in Ardshanavooly. She was a much loved neighbour, always smiling and so kind to all," he said,.

"She has lived here since the 1970s and she has brothers and sisters who live here in Killarnev and are well-known. She was a familiar sight on her bike, always cycling around", he added.

Gardaí launched a murder investigation on Tuesday evening into the death of the kindhearted grandmother hailed as "Killarney's smiling lady."

The Dip will happen at dawn on September 3, and it is a lovely social event. It is fun, exciting, empowering, daunting, exhilarating, peaceful and mindful according to participants of previous events. Everyone is on their own

journey and participating for their own reasons. This year's chosen charities are delighted to be part of this fun event and are urging women to sign up.

Breda Dyland from the Kerry Cancer Support Group said that they are very thankful to be chosen by Wild Water Adventures as a beneficiary for this year's Dip.

"We are really looking forward to what will be a unique and personal event. I want to thank Michaela, John and their volunteers for their hard work in organising the event and I hope that the ladies of Kerry and beyond come along and join us on the 3rd," she said.

Recovery Haven too is delighted to once again be part of a hugely successful event.

"Having seen the success of last year's event and the pure emotion and sense of solidarity experienced by all the women who took part, we are thrilled and honoured to once again be involved in such a wonderful event. We would encourage all women to give it a go, because it is something very special and something they will not regret. As the phrase goes: 'Feel the fear and do it anyway," said Marisa Reidy.

Dip in the Nip is open to all women (18+) – including those who have experienced cancer themselves, those who are supporting a friend or family member on their cancer journey or those who want to remember and honour a loved one who they lost to the disease.

Registration, priced at €40 (+ booking fee), is now open through Eventbrite and everyone who signs up will receive a custom swimming cap, a medal to mark their participation and will be automatically entered into a draw for some great prizes. Pre-registration is vital, however, as entries cannot be processed on the morning of the event. Participants are also asked, if possible, to bring tea and cakes and make this a fun social event too.



PUCK FAIR: NOT THE END OF THE (AF)FAIR

t might be the silly season, but there was no kidding around with the intensity of the debate over the putting up of this year's Puck Goat.

This year's fair was a cracking affair. Wonderful sunshine and a great atmosphere day and night on the streets.

Prompted by the heat, committed



A similar question was posed in poetry by Killarney's Nicky Barry from Woodlawn

"The goat was famous! They were talking to Joe!

He might even be called by The Late Late Show! Joe's callers were all concerned for his health, But no one thought to ask him how he felt!" It was a great question. The country was

speaking for the goat. There was a whiff of religious fervour about some of the contributions.

Angry callers said the whole thing was "primitive" and "barbaric".

Has Killorglin ever pretended to be a suburb of London, or Dublin, I asked myself? Puck is not Kensington, and neither is it Howth.

There seems to be a presumption that what takes place in Killorglin is old, and therefore cruel, and should be discarded.

But did anyone ask the goat? I have had the rare privilege some years ago of flying over the goat in a helicopter. He was chewing away lying down in his cage, not a bother on him.

I thought there was an interesting cultural shift going on this week: previously the strongest concerns I heard about Puck is how the goat is the symbol of the devil and raising him above the human to be king for three days and three nights so the people could act the goat was a dangerous un Christian thing.

Nothing provokes fury these days like animal welfare. Anthropomorphism - attributing human traits to animals - is as old as Aesop, and these days holds as much sway as Christian belief, it seems.

Part of me does wonder however if we may have all read too much Winnie the Pooh and Peter Rabbit!

I admired Danny Healy-Rae's contribution. He was the only Kerry TD to be brave enough to nail his colours. What had hurt people more than anything and made them angry was that the goat in Killorglin would be neglected, he said. In the history of Puck, this had never happened. If only because of the old belief in south Kerry that hurting an animal would rebound on the perpetrator.

HOUSING AND ST FINAN'S

A recent council meeting heard how 18 council owned houses are vacant in Killarney, and most of them are vacant for more than two years. This was in response to a question from Cllr Maura Healy-Rae. Some 13 of the houses are vacant over two years, she was told, and three are empty for up to two years.

This seems like a ridiculous situation in any era. But in an era where the country is coming down with pleas to house yet more Ukrainian refugees, it is farcical. The council along with other public bodies and even the GAA has been asked to identify properties suitable for refugees. While the situation with individual houses is a bit blurred, it does seem strange that so many houses in Killarney can lie empty when there is such demand. The TD Pa Daly said on Radio Kerry last week three families a week in Kerry were being made homeless, with one family in Tralee having to vacate their home of 12 years. They have ended up in one bedroom in a hostel. I am sure they would not say no to a house in Killarney.

Meanwhile, somewhat astonishingly, St Finan's once home to 1,000 patients and as many staff lies empty.

"The HSE were requested to issue details of available vacant properties/sites under its ownership to the Dept. of Housing, Local Government and Heritage for potential sources of accommodation and housing and St. Finan's was included within this list for their consideration.

To confirm, we have not been informed that the International Protection Accommodation Services (IPAS) were taking it over," a spokeswoman said.

WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE AND NOT A DROP TO DRINK!

or the third time in just over a year a catastrophic water mains burst in Muckross has left thousands in Killarney, East Kerry and Tralee without water.

In July of '21 high temperatures along with an ageing infrastructure were blamed for two bursts within days between Lough Guitane and Sheharee. This time round, same location, Irish Water say they are not sure what caused it. But I would put money on heat again.

Last week in the heat and the high crowds there was the strong possibility Killorglin would run out of water during Puck Fair . To offset that Irish Water/Kerry County Council had to shut off supply at night to homes from Aghadoe to Milltown. It is crystal clear to me that we need more reservoirs. Yet I have seen no one calling for more reservoirs. Everyone is engaged in pipe laying! Imagine we live in a county that rains for around 360 days of the year. Some of the rain is torrential. Killarney and South Kerry gets more rain than most areas and is often swamped. But gve us five days of heat and there are water shortages! It is not enough to blame the council and Irish Water.

Where are our engineers?

They need to speak up and be listened to. Around a decade ago, covering a conference of Engineers Ireland at the Great Southern Hotel, I read a great booklet called Engineering Ireland where the society outlined the kind of infrastructure problems we were facing and how to tackle them.

I doubt if anyone in local authorities or in Government bothered too much to read it. Engineers are about solutions. The most successful countries - Germany and France - are strong engineering bases and are driven by engineers.

We badly need to promote engineers to the ranks of the accountants and the lawyers, and the business graduates, and to give them at least equal status in managing our infrastructure. Or we'll be running out of water after two days of sunshine.

Their latest social enterprise, the community garden, has proven to be the most fruitful ground for migrant community integration into wider society through shared gardening experiences.

New Wave Wild Project, located in Tralee, delivers professional adventure therapy programmes with young people, adults, and families in natural blue and green spaces. They take an integrative psychotherapeutic approach (supported by backgrounds in social work, education, psychology, psychotherapy and CBT) and provide unique experiences that focus on engagement, and meeting the participant as an individual, where they are at.



t's all about health at Beaufort GAA Club as they launch their Healthy Club Project, Phase 5

The proactive club will taking part in the GAA Healthy Club Project, Phase 5, which was launched recently in the Club. They have taken part in all the Healthy Club Project phases since it began in 2013 when only sixteen Clubs in Ireland took part. 440 Clubs are taking part in Healthy Club 5 which will run until the third quarter of 2023.

The aim of the project to assist Clubs in taking a holistic approach to health promotion in all aspects of their activities including their governance, the programmes they run, the partnerships they engage in, and the environment within which they operate.

Healthy Club awards at the end of this phase will be divided into three types, foundation, silver and gold. Clubs who wish to attain the foundation award must complete three initiatives in the eighteen months. Those

who wish to attain silver must complete five initiative, those who wish to attain a gold award must complete seven.

The initiatives cover a broad spectrum of health related issues from physical activity, healthy eating, mental fitness and wellbeing, suicide prevention and response, social initiatives, health and safety,

It is being rolled out in partnership with the Irish health sector and Irish Life insurance; Agencies include Healthy Ireland, the HSE, and the National Office for Suicide Prevention, G.A.A. Croke Park and Kerry. The Clubs involved greatly benefit from the assistance of the Agencies in the programmes they organise.

Irish Cancer Society offering FREE HEALTH CHECKS in Manor West shopping centre

The Irish Cancer Society has announced that it will be offering free health checks in Manor West Shopping Centre, Tralee this week. As part of the 'Your Health Matters' Early Detection Roadshow, nurses will administer health checks to the public from 9am – 6pm on Friday 19 August, free of charge.

The health check is a free walk-in service. It will include a blood pressure check, body mass index (BMI) and carbon monoxide (CO) reading and information on cancer prevention, screening and ways to help spot the early signs of cancer.

Each health check will take approximately 15 minutes and nurses will also be on hand to discuss any changes in health or concerns about cancer a person may have. A referral for a GP will also be arranged where further help is required.

Early detection and diagnosis of cancer is essential to improve health outcomes. The Covid-19 pandemic has resulted in a growing backlog of patients with cancer symptoms who have not presented or are waiting for urgent time-critical diagnostic services. As this disruption could lead to later stage presentation and increased cancer mortality in the coming years, the Irish Cancer Society will continue to deliver Early Detection Roadshow events across Ireland throughout 2022. This initiative seeks to promote positive lifestyle changes, increase awareness of cancer symptoms, and improve medical care-seeking behaviour for the early signs of cancer.

This year the roadshow has been to 10 different shopping centres in Dublin, Cork, Waterford and Limerick. To date, over 13,000 people have engaged with the information and over 900



people have received health checks in 2022. The roadshow will move to Louth, Sligo, Carlow, Donegal and other parts of the Midlands later in the year.


KILLARNEY ESCAPES THE WORST OF THE ORANGE ALERT

A new life for Michael thanks to the

KENYA EDUCATION PROJECT

EDDIE SHEEHY SHARES HIS JOURNEY BACK TO NAIROBI AFTER A HIATUS OF TWO YEARS

After a break of two years it was heartwarming to return to the village of Embulbul, Nairobi, and to visit Bro. Beausang Centre of Education again and to renew acquaintances with staff and key volunteers. In the aftermath of the Covid pandemic the school is back fully functioning and catering for students from the village and surrounding hinterland. Many families continue to struggle due to loss of jobs or reduced income as the local economy tries to get back on its feet again. Many young people lost jobs during the pandemic and with no state support are depending on family for food and other essentials. Many people in the public service had their pay cut by 25% or 50%. The parish celebrated it's 25 year serving the people so it was an occasion of great celebration which lasted all day. At present the country is in the grip of election fever with everybody hoping that it will lead to a peaceful outcome and that the result of the vote for a new president will be accepted by all.

One of the highlights of the visit was partaking in the school's annual mass and awards ceremony. Many students and staff were honoured for academic, sporting and social contributions to the life of the school. One award in particular was memorable: Michael Lokati, year 3 student received an award for top marks in History. We first met Michael in 2013 when he was not at school due to his mother's struggles to educate her children.. After speaking to his mother, Michael was enrolled in the primary school that Autumn followed later by his sister and brother with support from the Kenya Education Project. Due to the sudden death of his father the family faced many challenges, living in a cramped one roomed timber home. So it was great to see a young boy make such great progress when given the opportunity of a sponsorship and seeing how proud his mother and siblings were.

During the visit we witnessed gifts of clothes, which were donated by the project being distributed to needy families, in particular lots of baby clothing and footwear to young mothers and babies. The local SVDP group continue to provide an amazing service to the slum village residents, often relying on a limited weekly budget meeting so many different demands, mainly food and medical. We visited the school's new hostel on the grounds of the school which caters for 10 girls, who for a variety of reasons do not live with a parent. It is a comfortable building with a kitchenette, showers, toilet and spacious sleeping area managed by a matron, who is a past pupil of the school. The Project provided funding for the initial building and for furnishing the hostel.

The Project continues to support the parish feeding programme which provides a hot meal to 80 young people from the village each school day evening. Due to many factors the costs of running the programme continues to be a challenge as the cost of basic foodstuffs and fuel increase due to the economic situation worldwide. It is costing 650 euro per month to fund the programme so the Project would welcome any further financial help to sustain the service.

In spite of the challenges posed by covid the Project is grateful for all the support, help and contributions it receives which hopefully will continue to provide sponsorships, support the feeding program and the many other challenges which the people of Embulbul face. Asante Sana.







Costs escalate but vital charity work continues

Dedicated volunteers with a charity initiated in Killarney close on 20 years ago are actively reengaging with their vital humanitarian work following the hardships and travel restrictions imposed during the Covid-19 pandemic.

The Kenya Education Project, established by retired Killarney schoolteacher and Fossa resident Eddie Sheehy, in 2003, is again providing crucial, life-enhancing support to the people of the slum village of Embulbul, 25km south of Nairobi, and the students of the Edmund Rice Catholic Education Centre.

Life is still very difficult for the people of Embulbul, however, and that highlights the importance of the Kenya Education Project's feeding programme with children receiving food packages to enable them to have one nourishing meal a day when, otherwise, they would have to go without.

The programme is run by the parish and it helps to provide food for the children of the village, from Monday to Friday, with up to 80 school pupils receiving meat, vegetables and rice.

"The facility where the meals are prepared and cooked has been fitted with an upgraded kitchen with modern wood-burning stoves and two people have been employed to prepare the meals each day and maintain and clean the kitchen. Their pay amounts to €200 per month," Eddie explained.

"Other significant ongoing overheads include the outlay on vegetables, rice, meat, maize flour and firewood and that requires a spend of €600 per month. This has resulted in our overall monthly costs rising from €650 to €800 per month," he added.

Additionally, the Kenya Education Project continues to support the school fees that need to be paid for students attending the local school as well as providing washing points and water stations and organising extra-curricular activities, including sports, for the children to enjoy.

To help meet the escalating costs involved, the registered charity always welcomes financial support from the public which can make such a difference to the children and make their lives a little more tolerable and any donations from the people of Kerry are always particularly welcome.

BRYAN RUNS RINGS AROUND CANCER

A Firies man has remembered his father in a very unique way while raising money for the Irish Cancer Society.

Bryan Mulchinock originally from Longfield, Firies ran around the Ring of Kerry over 4 days starting the 25th of May. Bryan's motivation was the care his father Richard (Richie) Mulchinock before he passed away in May'21 due to melanoma.

"In his final weeks Dad and all our family received outstanding care, compassion and empathy from everyone at Kerry Palliative Care at University Hospital Kerry (UHK)", Bryan told Killarney Outlook.

"Dad wanted to spend a night at home from palliative care, this provided comfort to him and all the family and that could only have happened with the support of the Night Nurse from the Irish Cancer Society. Both of these brilliant organizations rely heavily on fundraising and we want to raise money for both so that other families in similar circumstances can receive the amazing support we did", he added

"I wanted the fundraising to be a challenge, connected to Kerry and reflective of the level of resilience these organisations represent", he added.

With 1500km of running training under his belt since the beginning of the year, Bryan started on the 25th of May running 49km from Killarney House to Kells, Day 2 was 42km from Kells to Caherdaniel, Day 3 was a tough day covering 47km from Caherdaniel to Kenmare. The final day was Kenmare back to Killarney House over Moll's Gap.

The final total from the fundraising was €20,200 with €6,600 donated to the Irish Cancer Society and €13,600 to the Palliative Care Unit in Tralee.

"This was a challenge that I really enjoyed, I was only successful because of the great support crew I had over the 4 days and I was really motivated by the really generous donations. I know that this money will make a real difference to families who have a loved one with cancer", Bryan said.

The certified training courses, which offer nationally recognised qualifications including QQI, ICDL, and City and Guilds, have impacted significantly on the progression of people with a disability and/or health



People attending National Learning Network include people claiming any form of disability benefit, those recovering from an accident or injury, or living with mental health challenges, autism or learning disabilities.

In the past five years the organisation has also supported a further 3,700 people to transition to a broad range of further training opportunities with 50% progressing onto third level colleges and universities.

Each year National Learning Network (NLN) also supports hundreds of people with complex and enduring mental health issues through a new programme launched in 2019 called Individual Placement and Support (IPS). IPS helps people, who would otherwise have been met with barriers to the employment market, to find work in mainstream competitive jobs. Under this initiative 616 people who participated in the IPS programme with NLN since 2019 have secured employment.

The figures were released today as National Learning Network launched its inaugural National Open Day, which will be held on Wednesday, August 24th 2022, at 11am and will see more than 30 centres across the country open their doors to the public, including NLN Tralee.

People who were supported to find employment through NLN, and who may otherwise have remained reliant on social welfare payments, have contributed in the region of over €750,000 to the State as a result of securing employment. Additionally, the Exchequer has saved conservatively in the region €100,000 annually in reduced expenditure on social welfare benefits, not including savings on secondary benefits.





AN EYE EXAMINATION SHOULD MAKE THE BACK TO SCHOOL CHECKLIST

A comprehensive eye examination is as essential for back-to-school success as supplies for learning. Studies have consistently linked school performance to poor vision

and visual disorders. More than one in 10 children in every classroom is estimated to have an undiagnosed common

vision problem that affects their

learning and development. Some eye conditions do not display any signs or symptoms, so the only way to know for sure is to take your child for a sight test.

Signs which may show there is a problem with a child's sight include:

- an eye appearing to drift inwards or outwards;




biggest and most explosive Links in Ireland.



CRONIN TAKES CRUCIAL WIN IN SCOTLAND

Keith Cronin and Mikie Galvin have won Grampian Forest Rally in their Volkswagen Polo GTi, to further extend their lead of the 2022 British Rally Championship. The Ballylickey driver and his Killarney co-driver were fastest on five of the Aberdeenshire event's six stages, and eventually finished with a winning margin of 21 seconds. Their nearest championship rivals, Osian Pryce and Noel O'Sullivan, also in a Polo GTi, snatched second on the final stage from Ruari Bell and Max Freeman, who were fortunate to finish after an off-road excursion in their Skoda Fabia over the final few miles. James Williams and Dai Roberts survived late brake problems to take fourth in a Hyundai i20, with Jason Pritchard and Phil Clarke (Polo) rounding out the top five. The Grampian marks Cronin's second BRC victory of the season, having also won the Jim Clark Rally on the series' previous visit to Scotland in May. With Pryce also taking two wins so far, Cronin recognised the importance of today's result, ahead of the next two rounds taking place on Pryce's home territory: "It's great to get the win, as I said at the start of the rally, we really did need it, especially when we're going into Wales next, it'll be tough to beat Osian in Wales. We had a good start and we were able to manage it from there. It's our first win on gravel in a while, so that was really good. We are leading the championship, but we need the wins in order to win the championship, it's all to play for. Everything worked really well for us today. We had made a few changes to the car between this and the last rally, and they obviously worked".

The day started well for Cronin and Galvin, the Killarney & District Motor Club crew taking an early lead of three seconds over Bell and Freeman on the opening test. Pryce and O'Sullivan, running first on the road, were a further second back, with Pryce reporting that his Polo was cleaning the roads of loose gravel. Cronin and Galvin extended their margin at the head of the field over the next two tests, adding six and four seconds to their advantage. The battling Bell/Freeman and Pryce/O'Sullivan shared equal fastest time on stage four, taking three seconds back from the leaders, but Cronin and Galvin were quickest again on the remaining two stages to

cement the victory.
The British Rally Championship resumes with the tarmacsurface Rali Bae Ceredigion, based in Aberystwyth, on September 3rd and 4th.





SENIOR CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

Group One Spa 0-16 Kenmare Shamrocks 1-13

Spa may well see this as an opportunity lost, considering that they led by 0-8 to 0-6 at half-time and looked in command of proceedings after Stephen O'Brien got a second yellow, but the reality is that Kenmare were well worth a draw in the finish, not least for a stunning exhibition by Seán O'Shea. Spa are at least safe, and in with a great chance of a semi-final if they can take anything out of Na Gaeil – the eponymous 'if'!

Dingle 1-10 Na Gaeil 2-6

Dingle needed a win after their opening round defeat and got it, just about winning a very close encounter that blows the group wide open. They will be travelling to Kenmare next week with their fate in their own hands – Kenmare probably have the best player in the competition but with just one point on board, could very well end up in relegation trouble yet. Spa, with three points, are the only team certain of safety so far but wins for Dingle and Na Gaeil would see them miss out on qualification. All to play for yet!

Group Two Templenoe 0-10 Dr. Crokes 1-6

Templenoe, with Gavin Crowley outstanding, took control early on and, although Crokes did draw level, they were always chasing the game to a certain extent. Both teams had young players standing out. The likes of the excellent Neil O'Shea, Evan Looney, and Cian McMahon, who picked off a poacher's 1-2, stepped up for Dr. Crokes. Has any club produced such a seamless line of corner sharpshooters? Paddy 'Bomber' O'Shea, Jackie Looney, Pat O'Shea, Kieran O'Leary, Colm Cooper, Tony Brosnan nowadays....McMahon already looks a natural, while Neil O'Shea gave a seamless display at the back. Kenmare had Gavin Crowley as man of the match, just about pipping a dynamic Micheál Burns and O'Shea, but they had young tyros too in Tommy O'Sullivan and Aidan Crowley, In fact, Crowley was the unlikely hero, his third dead ball conversion from long range took the win. Crokes had chances to equalize, but just couldn't quite convert, and absolutely must beat Austin Stacks in Lewis Rd. next week. I never saw a bad game between those two great rivals yet – this one should be a cracker. But you'd have gotten fair odds on Templenoe beating the both of them earlier on!

Kerins O'Rahillys 1-14 Austin Stacks 1-15 It went right down to the wire, as it so often does in the Tralee derby. Stacks have looked a bit rudderless in the absence of Kieran Donaghy, but this time they had players hunting responsibility and an impressive spread of nine scorers. Jack O'Shea is worth special mention, kicking 0-3 from centre back - certainly the outstanding form of all the returning Kerry footballers confirms the quality of their selection and coaching - but sure, the jangling celtic crosses are confirmatory enough! Rahillys were just as impressive as Stacks in open play in a fantastic game of positive flowing football, but more reliant on Jack Savage for their cutting edge, especially in the absence of Conor Hayes. In the end Stacks just about deserved to win it. Templenoe will be playing in a semi-final – any of the other three could join them or be in a relegation battle yet!

INTERMEDIATE

Group One Gneeveguilla, Ballydonoghue, Beaufort, Currow

Gneeveguilla were always expected to beat Currow, who have been in a few relegation battles in recent years and unfortunately look headed in that direction again. Beaufort have been just inches away from winning the competition in the last couple of years, but Ballydonoghue have been turning into a real powerhouse – the Foley brothers are part of an exceptionally talented team that represented Kerry at Féile and those players are now at their peak. I had Beaufort among the favourites,

but last weekend's result reminds me that Ballydonoghue are one of those teams that are often under-estimated.

Group Two Killarney Legion, Laune Rangers, John Mitchels, Dromid Pearses

Killarney Legion were the obvious favourites to go straight back up (early days yet, of course!) and look well on course with two very convincing wins. Graham O'Sullivan excelled for Dromid, but they haven't the power to contain a hungry Legion. Dromid have the quality – two South Kerry titles in recent years proves that – but they just don't have the numbers – it's becoming an all-too-familiar problem. Laune Rangers have been sleeping giants for a long time but have put in the hard yards. Mitchels, kingpins of the early sixties, have been slumbering longer but could still grab a quarter-final berth.

Group Three Gaeltacht, Kilcummin, Castleisland Desmonds, Glenbeigh/Glencar

Yeah, this is the group that every neutral is watching! All four are talents, and the fact that all four have one win each after two games says everything. Gaeltacht's win over Kilcummin would be the biggest surprise, but Gaeltacht are always capable of that – their county league travails were due to a bad habit of leaking goals, not any overall weakness or lack of talent. You'd still back Kilcummin, even without Kevin McCarthy, to come through. One thing's certain, whatever teams come out of this group will have been soldered in a hot fire!

Group Four Rathmore, St. Marys, Glenflesk, Milltown/ Castlemaine

Rathmore's victory over Glenflesk wouldn't be a huge shock – Rathmore would be among the overall favourites – but that's a much bigger margin than I had expected. St. Marys win over Milltown/Castlemaine must count as a bit of a surprise, though – Marys had their travails in the league but Bryan Sheehan has been the best club player in Kerry for nigh on 20 years and Marys are always dangerous. Milltown's

increasing population will have a long term effect, but that will take time. This group could go any which way yet! One thing is certain, the relegation battles will be as entertaining as the promotion finales in this grade!

JUNIOR PREMIER

Group One Skellig Rangers, St. Senans, Churchill, St. Pats Blennerville

Skellig went all the way to the final last year and are on course for the knockout stages again the 'Lovey'O'Sullivans are some foundation to build success! St. Senans look on course to join them, but St. Pats on their home ground will have something to say about that. St. Pats have to win, as do Churchill - they drew the head to head and there's just a single point in scoring difference between them - I'd expect mobile phones to be busy at the two games next weekend!

Group Two Annascaul, St. Michaels/Foilmore, Brosna, Ballyduff

To be honest, I expected Ballyduff to be in line for qualification - the North Kerry League might be holding their hurlers' attention. Annascaul have been doing well at underage so they are no surprise. I must admit that I am delighted for St. Michaels/Foilmore, who were struggling badly for numbers a few years ago but have brought good minors in. Brosna are another club with great heart but a small playing population - their journey to Croke Park is the most epic club journey I ever saw - but I can't see them beating Annascaul this weekend.

Group Three Ballymac, Ardfert, Keel, Waterville

At last, a group that is panning out more or less as I expected! Ballymac played in Division One this year and lost a good few close games - they are still my overall favourites. Ardfert are more used to relegation battles in recent years than being contenders - I think it's still too early for them but they've had great minor teams over the past three years - keep a weather eye. Waterville are not the force of old, but absolutely need to beat Ardfert - that one could be interesting.

Group Four Fossa, Listry, Listowel Emmets, Castlegregory

They tell me that there was over €5000 taken at the gate in Castlegregory for their game against Fossa. All eyes, of course, were on one player - he really is a phenomenon, and his presence alone has seen a lot of attention on their chances. Fossa are good, very good, and the brothers are generational talents, but I'd be watching out for last year's semi-finalists. Ruairi Murphy may be Listry's headliner, but they still have the likes of Jimmy O'Leary, Billy O'Brien, Gary O'Sullivan - you'll fight for any ball you win in that mix! I could see Listry in the final shake-up. Listowel are solid - I don't see them leapfrogging the top two, but I think they

should have enough at home for a surprisingly off-form Castlegregory, especially with Davy Keane and Coprmac Mulvihill in current form.

Group One

Reenard, Scartaglin, Cromane, Moyvane

This one is fairly decided. Reenard and Scartaglin are through to the quarter-finals. Cromane host Moyvane this weekend with the losers going into relegation – I'd fancy Moyvane to just about have enough to get over the line

Another group where none of the teams will have celebrating when it was drawn. Cordal won all three games - Cordal were unlucky in recent years in this competition; they'll knock on the door but last four would be an achievement. Sneem/Derrynane join them, while Ballylongford are another team struggling badly for playing numbers and facing relegation.

Their first one was a trifle lucky, especially for their opening score after 25 long minutes (the rain made scoring very difficult, to be fair) with a point effort dropping short and Jack McGrath flicking home. It was a great game from then on, but Dara Hogan's second half goal sealed a hard-fought victory.

North Kerry 2-13 Kenmare Shamrocks 0-6

North Kerry is a powerful amalgamation, and it was always a huge ask for Kenmare to end their run. As it was, North Kerry's sharpshooters Cormac Dillon (0-7, 5f) and Oisín Healy (2-2) had them with a commanding lead all through and they had plenty to spare in the finish. Mid Kerry are a fine side who have been knocking on the door for a while, but North Kerry will go in as strong favourites into the final next Monday.

MANAGERIAL MERRY-GO-ROUND

The ones we are all waiting for is Declan Bonnar's replacement in Donegal and James Horan's in Mayo. I always rated Bonnar after their minors pushed a great Kerry team all the way in 2014, but the hard truth is that Donegal have underperformed badly in recent years - regression to the mean after McGuinness revolutionised football by doubling down on the blanket? I expected Donegal to win Ulster and rattle an All Ireland Final last year with the talent there - but I really do hate seeing a phenomenal scoring talent like Michael Murphy dropping behind midfield.

I thought Horan did everything he possibly could in Mayo - including unearthing fantastic young talent - I'll fear Mayo this year again. Injuries will tell a lot. The new format will be cruel to recovery time for every county, including us - counties will need very deep

Colm O'Rourke in Meath. Gary Neville tried the switch from soccer commentator to Valencia manager and it was a disaster, but Neville is no Colm O'Rourke. I'd have appointed him with Meath underage teams long ago - O'Rourke is a great reader of the game. I saw him often with St. Pats of Navan in Hogan Cup games -O'Rourke is as canny as they come, has just the right touch of ruthlessness, and is much more au fait with modern tactics than people give him credit for. I'll say now that I'd be bringing Pat Spillane into Kerry underage teams - Pat attends a huge amount of underage games and keeps his powder drier than people think. Cork did their business quick and quiet (the best way), in appointing caretaker John Cleary to take over from Keith Ricken. I'll be keeping a very wary eye on Cork this year, and that's not playing the poor mouth or being Kerry cute an injury-free run and they can hurt any team, including us. I expect them to have a very real rattle in Division Two and their confidence to grow.

John Kearns, the Austin Stacks man, is a proven pair of hands as he takes the helm in Offaly, but I just don't think they have enough players of top quality. I'd be dampening expectations as much as possible.

Hurling is more settled and more interesting. The big one is Davy Fitz to Waterford love or dislike the headline magnet, he's unquestionably a brilliant manager and knows the Waterford scene from his last stint. I still think that Waterford have all the talent they needed to win an All Ireland; last year was a

big disappointment for them. There was talk of Waterford native Stephen Molomphy being drawn back from Kerry - I'd say he'll end up there, but after more experience. To be honest, my jury is still not fully convinced - Kerry's late comebacks in games were great, but we shouldn't have been that far behind in the first place. I think we should be beating the likes of Down, respectfully. And I don't like our overreliance on one scorer - imagine Boyle and Conway on fire together!).

Liam Cahill's departure from Waterford, of course, was surely the lure of his own county, but I think Tipperary are still a distance away from the days of yore - "Cork bate and the hay saved, the thousands wildly sing" went the old song. My sweet garsoons, ye still sing soon, though there's no modern Christy Ring! I don't think Colm Bonnar did much wrong with what he had available.

Derek Lyng was always one of the quietest and most reliable of that great Kilkenny hurling team, but my word does Brian Cody leave massive boots to fill! Kilkenny need to look to their underage supply lines - God be with the days when that great underage mentor Fr. Tommy Maher parsed every penny but always ensured there were plenty of hurleys!

Pat Ryan takes the helm in Cork – a promotion from within, but that's a job I wouldn't touch. Cork are two years away on a good s & c programme, they have all the skill needed but their supporters' expectations are unreasonable

Dublin's hurlers still await their new manager. I'm honestly amazed that they didn't try and get Joe Fortune, who has done an excellent job with Westmeath - Fortune managed Ballyboden, and the Dublin minors and U21s. He's good, very good – we know it to our cost in recent encounters! Eddie Brennan is surely the favourite for the job at this stage – Brennan has cut his teeth well in management.

BOXING

Internationally, boxing has been by far Ireland's most successful sport. The Caseys of Sneem were outliers in rowing – the strong domestic tradition didn't translate into regular international success until recent years. A lot is owed to the O'Donovan brothers as they pulled like dogs! We can politely dismiss both soccer and basketball. King Kelly and Stephen Roche put Irish cycling on the world map, however much we ourselves were devoted to the Rás. Ronnie Delaney in 1956 transformed athletics; the Chairman of the Boards and Sonia built on that foundation. You'd think rugby would have been our top sport, but actually Jackie Kyle and the 1948 team were on their own on that mountain top for a long time. We never won as many triple crowns as you might think either - despite the mythology, that famous 1982

game was not about the fight at the end and had a much bigger impact than Munster's defeat of the All Blacks in 1978 - that one only turned into an legend in the nineties, it made no great ripple at the time.

Irish boxing is obviously not in a good place, and the public resignations of the CEO and Chairman of the IABA after losing a vote to implement governance in line with Sport Ireland requirements and the independent McNeice report, which has also led to a 15% decrease in funding. I don't know the ins and outs, but there's something wrong somewhere when an organization loses the likes of Billy Walsh (a colossal mistake), Nicholas Cruz, and Bernard Dunne in a short space of time. Hopefully common sense will prevail before too long. Kerry has a particularly proud history of boxing, thanks to the likes of Joe Christie,

Paddy Fitzmaurice, and locally the great John 'Killer' O'Callaghan. I noticed that Garry O'Brien managed Ballyduff's hurlers to this year's County Final – Garry was the Irish heavyweight champion in his day. Mick Finucane, that great Kerry footballer of the 1940s, was a champion boxer in his time and may well have been the toughest man to ever pull on the Kerry jersey - his wife was a great Kerry camogie player as well. Hopefully wise heads will prevail and the sport will continue its growth of recent years. Boxing, unfortunately, is a sport that has always had a murky underbelly (especially so internationally in recent years) and one that has lent itself to bluff, bluster, and....nonsense. Tyson Fury retired recently amid what he fondly imagined as a furore. To even less fanfare, he is now announcing his possible un-retirement, if only he can possibly be coaxed by a gullible public forking over millions to see it. I'd say

good luck with that, lad - I follow boxing, and even I don't care.

I've never been a fan of Jake Paul, to be honest. Not because he came through a nontraditional route into professional boxing, some of the more traditional routes aren't exactly classy! Not because he seems more about notoriety than anything else - read a history of Muhammad Ali some time, that lad could work a media room! But Jake Paul, like his brother, picks his opponents very carefully - too much showman, not enough boxer Jake Paul's latest attempt is offering €2m to Katie Taylor to drop down a weight for a rematch against Amanda Serrano. Taylor, always politespoken, dismissed this utter nonsense in politer terms that I would have. Everybody wants to see that rematch, but if you think your fighter can't handle it, just put your money away, lad. There's some talk of the rematch being in Croke Park (assuming they can once again get over the restriction to three public non-GAA events that they signed up to). Despite Jake Paul's initial posturing (and I expect we'll hear more attention-seeking nonsense from him), I think Serrano and Taylor both want this fight. I hope so - that first one was brilliant.

The biggest news this week is that Kevin Cronin, aka 'The Kingdom Warrior' will have his fifth professional fight on September 24th in Manchester.

At the time of writing, Jamsie Casey beaten Romanian Raul Benia Antonio at the European Schools Championships. He progressed to the Quarter Finals against Moldova a where he won a bronze medal. He was scheduled to fight for a Silver at 5pm yesterday.

TENNIS

Serena Williams Retires

There have been unseemly debates about her place in history and the pantheon of all-time greats since her replacement. It's be nice if pundits could pause for a moment to thank a player who, along with her big sister, defined a sport for a generation. I'm not sure I like the idea of a father coaching his two little girls daily from a very young age - in fact, I think it's very unhealthy (incidentally, my sympathies, though certainly my full approval, are a lot more with Will Smith at the Oscar ceremony and his award for the hagiographic portrayal of Richard Williams than the obnoxious Chris Rock). But there can be no doubt that Venus and Serena were the best players of their generation - I don't put Clijsters or Sharapova in anything like the same bracket. The Williams changed the game, bringing the same revolution that Sampras and Lendl wrought in the mens' game - precise power rather than athletic rallies. Serena whacked aces like a machine, and it wasn't as entertaining as rallies, but it was incredibly effective. And she could rally when she had to. Also, like Billie Jean and Martina, her influence extended far beyond the court -Serena was black, beautiful, proud, an unrepentantly trenchant and awful loser – good for her. It was often described as



'petulance' – funny enough, the term was never applied to similar male counterparts. She didn't suffer fools and she didn't compromise for any pandering pundit - womens' tennis had a few players more famous for their looks than their talent when the Williams' came along - they forced the conversation in another direction, and all of sport is better for it. That said, she isn't retiring from the sport; she's 'evolving away from it'. That's actually what 'retiring' means,

PROHIBIBITION OF BUYING **DIESEL AND PETROL CARS** FROM 2030 IS UNREALISTIC

Danny Healy-Rae TD

he prohibition of purchasing diesel and petrol cars from 2030 is totally unfair and unrealistic in the context of the cost, durability, and reliability. Electric cars are in no way as durable as petrol and diesel cars and the infrastructure is simply not in place for charging electric cars. - Danny Healy Rae The Rural Independents

Speaking today (Thursday, 11th August), Deputy Danny Healy Rae said:

There should be no notion of compelling people to buy or use electric cars. If electric cars were competitive and were a real option people would not have to be forced to purchase them. People always buy what is value for money and durable.

If they were really competitive, I would have no problem with them but it's clear that they are not at the present time. Until the proper technology is developed, and these cars are comparable in every way there should be no need to stop people buying diesel and petrol cars. It's very clear that by going down this route that the Government know that electric cars are not currently a competitive option.

The government's targets for Electric Vehicles are completely unrealistic. There is an initial 750,000 in 2026-2030. The Government are not taking into consideration the ongoing financial difficulties already facing families due to the ever -worsening cost-of-living crisis. People simply cannot afford the added cost of an Electric Car.

It is ludicrous to continue with this policy when at present there are amber alerts every day to say we don't have electricity to run our homes or businesses not to mind talking about operating additional cars by electricity. We don't have the infrastructure in place to deal with more electric cars. The Government are not prepared to consider other options which would reduce emissions such as adding biofuels to the diesel and convert petrol cars to gas. They are aware of these options but are trying to bully their ways to buy expensive electric cars.

People simply cannot afford the cost of an electric car which cost approximately €38,000 when a good second-hand petrol or diesel car could be bought for a fraction of the cost. Also considering the batteries of electric cars need to be replaced after 5 years and actually would cost the same as a good second-hand car. It also costs a lot to dispose of the batteries.

The Fianna Fail, Fine Gael, and Green Party figure of 195,000 by 2025, followed by a further target is pressuring ordinary people to have



one million electric cars on Irish roads by 2030. This is not practical as people cannot afford a new electric car and there is no secondhand market for these vehicles. This policy places enormous financial pressures on families."

There are many constituents, who already own electric cars, are telling me that they are going back to diesel and petrol cars, due to a lack of charging points or poor battery range when travelling long journeys with the electric

The banning of diesel and petol cars impacts people in rural areas in particular. While there are public transport options in urban areas there is a lack of public transport options in many rural areas and people have no option but to drive in particular in rural areas. This is yet another example of the Governments anti Rural agenda.

I am appealing on the government to consider all options before forcing people to buy expensive electric cars. It's a downright disgrace what is happening with good petrol and diesel cars being sent for scrapping. This is wilful waste, and I was always told that "wilful waste makes woeful want." concluded Deputy **Healy Rae**







"Once more, in a little while, I am going to shake the heavens and the earth, the sea and the dry land. I will shake all the nations and they will come and I will fill this house with Glory" says the Lord of Hosts (Haggai 2:6-7). Many people are reading the Scriptures and seeking God because they know deep down that there is something going on.
