

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
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This One's for Jamie Always in Our Hearts


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COFFEE MORNING IN MEMORY OF KEVIN

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
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Killarney Recognised in Ireland's Greenest Places Awards as Dingle is crowned Overall Winner

The Dingle Peninsula has been crowned the overall winner of Ireland's Greenest Places 2025, with judges praising the community's commitment to protecting and improving their unique environment for future generations.

Kerry was strongly represented in the competition, with Killarney named as one of three finalists in the Greenest Town category, alongside Ballina, Co. Mayo, and Skerries, Co. Dublin. The title ultimately went to Skerries, but Killarney's inclusion highlighted the town's ongoing efforts in sustainability and community-led green initiatives.

Over 120 nominations were received nationwide, with a shortlist of 14 projects assessed by a judging panel that included environmental leaders and journalists.

Other winners included Inagh, Co. Clare (Ireland's Greenest Village), Dún Laoghaire (Ireland's Greenest Suburb), and the Dysart River Project, Co. Westmeath (Ireland's Greenest Community).

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Irish Women Bring Home 20 Gold Medals

from World Masters Regatta

Irish women's masters rowers have returned from the 2025 World Rowing Masters Regatta in Banyoles, Spain, with an extraordinary 20 gold medals.

The regatta, held from 10–14 September, was the largest masters rowing event in the world this year, attracting over 5,000 athletes from 55 countries, with 5,428 entries across 745 clubs worldwide. Against this backdrop of fierce international competition, the Irish women's crews delivered a dominant performance.

A squad of 25 women, aged between 32 and 74, raced in 24 events and emerged victorious in 20 of them. Many athletes competed in multiple races across the four-day regatta, underlining the depth of experience, endurance, and teamwork within the group.


Irish clubs represented included St. Michael's RC, Commercial RC, Killorglin RC, Old Collegians BC, Clonmel RC, Belfast RC, Lee BC, Tralee RC, Tribesmen RC, Skibbereen RC, Cork Boat Club, Belfast RC, and Shandon BC.

Highlights included:

Sheila Clavin (St. Michael's) and Vanessa Lawrenson (St. Michael's) each winning nine gold medals – the most ever by an Irish female rower at the World Masters Regatta, and the highest tally of any female athlete at this year's event.

Standout performances from Fiola Foley (Killorglin RC, 6 wins), Kate Rooney (OCBC, 5 wins), Naomi Fearon (OCBC, 5 wins), Eimear Moran (Commercial RC, 5 wins), Sally Cudmore (Cork Boat Club, 5 wins), Breanna Larsen (OCBC, 4 wins), and Sophie Connolly (Commercial RC, 4 wins).

After the event, these students are a little more prepared for whatever life throws at them, stronger, more connected, and ready to step forward with confidence.



THE CATHEDRAL CAR PARK - WHAT IS THE STORY?

A motion before the council from Cllr John O'Donoghue elicited precious little other than negotiations are ongoing with regard to the free Cathedral Car Park.

That car park may be free for all in more ways than one. Was it counted in the numbers of spaces sent to the OPR recently? And how much is being paid by the council if the car park is being bought off St Brendan's Trust. It's like the third secret of Fatima at this stage.

We highlighted the confusion 18 months ago. Councillor John O'Donoghue asked for an update on plans to tar and line it "as the current situation is chaotic at busy times", he said.

John was told "there has been engagement on this proposal at this location and the matter currently rests with St. Brendan's Trust." New Killarney manager Martin O'Donoghue said "negotiations are ongoing."

There is some suggestion locally the council were offered it thirty years ago with conditions attached.

One thing stands out to me whether it is Green Lawn or the Cathedral and that is a lack of transparency when it comes to car parks in this town.

Either the councillors are not seeking precise information. Perhaps because they are too deferential. Or management are not disclosing it as a matter of course, because they get away with it.

The council is a public body, answerable to the people. It might be argued the Cathedral too was built with public money. But the church is a private institution. It is the elected body that is maintaining the silence of the confessional. For instance at the public Green Lawn vote in August, Councillor Niall Kelleher said he spoke to the landowner who had offered the site to the local authority "to resolve a problem for the town"; this property owner was a very



"conscious" landowner and was "full and frank", Niall said. No one named or even asked who the conscientious property owner was.

FINIAN'S OR FINAN'S - IT'S NOT ALL DARK HISTORY.

St Finan's Hospital - the history is not all dark, I was reminded by a reader last week. At long last, the Land Development Agency which is tasked with using public property has St Finian's on its radar.

The good news relayed by the new town manager Martin O'Donoghue is the council, not the owners the HSE, is liaising with the LDA and Martin is the council representative. This is important news for Killarney.

Since 2012 and its closure there have been calls to turn it into apartments, or a hotel and to have houses built on the 29 acres of lands surrounding the looming limestone building. The crux is the listed building and the

enormous costs attached. To do anything with it will cost a minimum of Euro 100 million. Councillor Brendan Cronin nailed the issue.

Finan's was finally "on the radar" of the LDA. The costs were huge but it was worthwhile.

"The difficulty is in two places," Brendan said. First there had been the HSE.Now it would be a case of "persuading the LDA to act".

A briefing report from Cork City Council on St Kevin's Hospital where 290 units are built on a 14-acre-site must be produced to the Killarney council he urged.

The agency wanted the land but not the building; whereas the HSE wanted to be relieved of both land and building either to the LDA or on the open market, said Councillor Niall O'Callaghan. In fifty years time the building would be falling down, he feared.

"The worry would be the building is left to rack and ruin surrounded by houses," he said.

Niall also said there were a lot of bad memories inside that building and "I wouldn't have a problem if it wasn't there".

But there are grounds for Killarney to be grateful to that institution too. The hospital provided a lot of employment and families were raised on the wages. Staff had very happy memories of their work relations. People were helped through various issues and noone outside was ever the wiser. Most of the employment - around 1,000 at one stage -is now gone to Tralee, remember. This county is being "Dublified" with everything centralised in the biggest town whether its the psychiatric hospital or the Torc hotel college.

Meanwhile, is it Finian's or Finan's? I grew up saying "Finian's". I suppose we can be grateful it's not the original "Killarney and District Lunatic Asylum".

By the way, this column wishes the new Killarney manager well and also wishes Angela McAllen success in her new post. She was a welcoming and an able representative in Killarney.

HOUSING FEARS IN KILLARNEY

Not a single affordable house is on the radar in Killarney, I am sad to have to confirm. Cllr Maura Healy-Rae sought the information. Maura has been lobbying non-stop for infill sites - unused parts of estates - to be surveyed and identified for affordable houses and apartments. She had a further question on Monday at the main council meeting regarding affordable housing. The news is there is a site for affordable housing in Tralee but none yet in Killarney. Plus ca change...

Another issue looms in Killarney: Fears that development will be stymied over the town's waste water system This column has been writing about it ad nauseam.

Now failure to upgrade may put a stop to housing and other development in Killarney both Councillor Niall Kelleher and the Department of Housing in Dublin have each warned town management.

Pollution in the lake and the Laune is exacerbated when it rains by overflow discharges from the plant in the Demesne because of the

shared storm water and foul sewage network going into it.

The Department of Housing is recommending new developments restrict connections of surface water to the sewer network - or find a way offsetting the discharges elsewhere in the network.


Niall Kelleher said 80 per cent of the storm water was coming off roads and estates which the council had taken in charge.

"It is our stormwater. I want a reasonable vision for reducing this," he said. Niall also wanted the run off into the foul network to be quantified.

Anglers had already objected to one development because of the threat to the lakes by storm water overloading the plant, he reminded Martin O'Donoghue. New large-scale developments would be challenged, "unless we take this on," he said.

"It will stop development in this town with zoned land. And that's the issue," Councillor Kelleher said.

The council cannot leave it all to Uisce Eireann.







It is with surprise, delight and great humility that Spa GAA club have been nominated as a finalist in the Kerry PPN Community Awards 2025. Spa GAA is a community based organization that has never lacked determination or vision. From it's humble origins in 1948, that community spirit has prevailed over the decades resulting in a strong, vibrant and expanding club. In the early 50's players togged out amidst the ferns and under the bushes, around the field perimeter. By 1969 we had dressing rooms of sort, a structure made from plywood shipping cases, re-cycled from the Ford Motor factory in Cork. In 1975 the football field was purchased from Denis O Keefe, following a door to door community funding drive. The first club house and dressing rooms were opened in May 1979 following a huge

community effort in the provision of voluntary labour and services. In the early noughties, in response to growing numbers and increased female participation, the need for new facilities became evident. A multi purpose sports hall was developed in 2003. The original clubhouse was demolished in 2004 and replaced with a new sports complex incorporating 4 dressing rooms, reception, meeting rooms, kitchen and dancehall. The facilities were officially opened by then Minister John O Donoghue and Sean Kelly, then President of Cumann Luthchleas Gael on 26th March 2006. Further playing ground was purchased in 2008 and this resulted in the development of Senior and Juvenile playing pitches in 2010. In 2016 a new first floor gymnasium was constructed and commissioned and in 2017 a new handball wall was installed in the main Sports hall. In November 2018 a state of the art floodlighting system was provided for the upper playing field. 2021 saw the development of a fully illuminated 1 km walking track along the perimeter of club grounds. Early 2025 saw the installation of a state of the art Solar Energy micro generation system. These developments are the product of club investment of €1.5 million over a 10 year period, and a proud symbol of the sense of spirit and pride that exists within our community.

Lenders when assessing your application need to take this risk into account. Lenders will put emphasis on the cost of construction of your property. If you are making your application through a mortgage broker they should spend time discussing the cost of the construction and loan amounts with you to make sure they are realistic and affordable. If these figures are incorrect and especially if they are too low then your mortgage application could be declined and more importantly you may not have enough money to finish the property. A big plus at the moment for people who are first time buyers and are building or buying a new property that is their family home is that there is a Help To Buy Scheme that you can apply for through the Revenue. Thankfully this was extended recently in the budget. There is up to €30,000 available through this scheme, there are terms and conditions attached to this Help To Buy Scheme. Obviously this is very beneficial in terms of reducing your overall cost and reducing your mortgage amount also. Each lenders criteria for self build mortgages is different & you need to know this before choosing a lender that suits your needs best. A mortgage broker who has access to many lenders and has a lot of experience with self build mortgages should be very helpful to you.

Good planning and a good work ethic are vital for exam success

KEY

September heralds a return to school or college for young people throughout the country. It's also the beginning of an important year for those facing into state or college exams. So, whether you have a public or an in-house exam at the end of the academic year, the key to success is good planning and a consistent approach to study. Set realistic target grades in each subject or module. A clear aim will focus and motive you. Achieve your goals by efficiently managing your time, your study and your personal fitness.

TIME

Time management means establishing a regular and disciplined study routine. Commit to a number of hours study each night. At the end of a short period, such as a week, review the quality of your work. Medium term planning involves the completion of a certain amount of work over a longer period, such as a school term. The long-term plan is to be totally prepared for the end of year exam.

REVIEW

Review your progress regularly. The first term is primarily devoted to completing course work. Your immediate objective is doing nightly homework of a high standard. Develop the habit of revision as early in the year as possible. Start organising your copies of past exam papers. Begin to consider how the exam is structured. Become familiar with the format and layout of each paper, the style of question asked and the topics examined. Know how the marks are allocated and how much time should be spent on each question.

DIARY

Use a conventional or electronic homework diary to record assignments. Develop your own study plan but prioritise with deadlines in mind. An efficient system is to follow the subject timetable for the following day's classes, which will give you variety each night, keep you working to deadlines, will provide a safeguard against beginning with your favourite subject each night and relegating a less favoured subject until last. Commit yourself to about four hours work each night, to include homework and a little revision, if time permits. Work in two-hour sessions and take a half hour break between the two sittings. In an exam year, Friday night must be included in the study schedule. Do six or seven hours study over Saturday and Sunday, mainly consisting of review and revision.

REVISION

Revise only when you have completed your homework assignments. Try to include all your subjects in your weekly revision plan. Revise in small manageable self-contained units. Revision is effective only if you understand and can write down what you have revised.

REWARD

Study and revision can become tedious. So, stay focussed by establishing a reward system to reinforce your progress and to maintain your momentum. Exam success is your greatest motivator, but short-term rewards give you an immediate sense of purpose. Identify the 'time thieves' - that is, where time is being wasted early in the year and eliminate them by efficient time management.

ENVIRONMENT

Good working conditions are vital aids to effective study. A comfortable private study environment at home is essential. Study on your own, if possible, in a room which is peaceful and quiet. A table and a hardback chair are basic requirements. Make sure the heating and the lighting in the room is satisfactory. Don't distract yourself by playing music in the background or by wearing earphones. Organise your books and materials before you begin each study session to avoid having to leave the room.

PARTICIPATE

At school, listen actively in class. Participate in class by asking questions, by showing enthusiasm and by helping to create a studious class atmosphere. It goes without saying that the best information is available at school. So, attend all your classes punctually and be determined to learn.

MATERIALS

Organise your practical materials, such as calculator, books, writing pads, etc. Clear, comprehensible and well-documented notes are an invaluable organisational aid. Ensure that your handwriting is legible, that your diagrams are detailed and intelligible and that your presentation is neat. If you are filing material on your desktop or laptop computer organise it carefully for easy access.

CONCENTRATION

Concentration is a by-product of routine and organisation. By arranging it for a set time each day you reinforce your commitment to your study. The more focussed you are on your study and the more determined you are to do well, the more your concentration will improve. To aid your concentration during study, develop the habit of doing mild forms of exercise perhaps a short breathing exercise, or simply close your eyes to allow your mind and body to relax for a few moments.

POSITIVE

Concentration is considerably aided by a positive attitude, so have confidence in your ability to perform well in your exam. Always keep a good thought about yourself and be success orientated. Self-confidence and positive thinking lead to success. Be single minded about your objectives. Keep an eye on your personal targets and avoid mental fatigue by sensible use of recreation and leisure. With an organised and disciplined approach to your study you will do very well in your exam. Have a good and successful year.

















LETTING GO: TAKING STOCK AS AUTUMN NEARS

HOW MUCH PROTEIN DO I NEED?

This is a question we are asked at B Well all the time. It does depends on your **age, weight, activity level, and goals** (like maintaining health, building muscle, or losing weight). Here's a breakdown:

- General health (sedentary adults): About 0.8 g of protein per kilogram of body weight per day (≈0.36 g per pound).
- Active adults / regular exercise: 1.2–2.0 g per kg body weight (≈0.55–0.9 g per pound).
- Strength training / muscle gain: 1.6–2.2 g per kg (≈0.7–1.0 g per pound).
- Fat loss (while maintaining muscle):

Often **2.0–2.5 g per kg** (≈0.9–1.1 g per pound).

For example:

- If you weigh 70 kg (154 lbs) and are moderately active, you'd aim for \sim 100–140 g protein per day.
- If you're trying to build muscle or lose fat, you'd push closer to 130-160 g/day.

Not sure what food are good sources of protein? Then here a list of high-protein foods per 100g, with protein content and calorie context. I'll split into animal-based, plant-based, and convenient options:

Animal-Based (highest protein per 100 g)

- Chicken breast (cooked, skinless): ~31 g protein | ~165 kcal
- •Turkey breast: ~29 g protein | ~135 kcal
- Tuna (canned in water): ~26 g protein | ~120 kcal
- Cod: ~24 g protein | ~105 kcal
- Salmon: ~20 g protein | ~208 kcal (higher fat but healthy omega-3s)
- Lean beef (5% fat mince): ~26 g protein | ~170 kcal
- Eggs (whole): ~13 g protein | ~143 kcal
- Egg whites: ~11 g protein | ~52 kcal (continued next week)

WHAT IS MEIBOMIAN GLAND **DYSFUNCTION (MGD)?**

The normal tears of the eye are made up of three layers – an oily (lipid) layer, a watery (aqueous) layer, and a sticky (mucous) layer. MGD is when the glands that make the oily layer of the tears are not working properly and this allows the watery layer of the tears to dry out.

The Meibomian glands are inside the eyelids, and the openings are on the edge of the eyelids. The outer oily layer stops the watery layer of the tears from drying out. When the glands become blocked, the oily part of the tears cannot be released. This causes the watery tears to dry up more quickly which results in the eye becoming dry and can make it feel sore. It is not usually a serious condition, but can cause discomfort and sometimes blurry vision. If it is not treated, the glands may stop working permanently.

MGD can cause dry eye. It is common to have a combination of MGD, dry eye and blepharitis.

Risk factors

MGD is a common condition and can affect anyone. However, it is more likely to happen after the age of 50, if you have diabetes or oily skin conditions and it is also more common in women.

Symptoms

The eyelids can become sore

and swollen as the glands become blocked. As the eyes become dry, they can feel itchy or gritty, as if there's something in the eye. The eyes may be red, and if they're sore, may be watery, which can cause vision to become blurry.

TREATMENT

Treatment involves releasing the oily tears from the glands using hot compresses. You need to get a face cloth, or cotton pads, soak them in hot (not boiling) water, close your eyes, and hold the hot cloth onto your eyelids. Wet the cloth again with hot water and keep applying the compress for at least five minutes. Repeat every day until the condition gets better. You can also use products known as 'heat bags' that are specifically designed for this condition. These bags make it easier to direct the heat and are much more effective than a hot cloth. To help stop the glands from blocking up again continue the treatment every day for a few minutes. Massaging your eyelids can also help to release tears.

If the hot compresses or heat bags don't work, referral for further treatment may be required.

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, Calls for Increased Investment in Primary and Special Education Ahead of Budget 2026

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Michael Cahill, has pledged his strong support for calls to make primary and special education a priority in Budget 2026. Responding to recent appeals from concerned parents, Deputy Cahill has committed to advocating for significant reforms that will ensure all children, regardless of location or background, receive the quality education they deserve.

Deputy Cahill was contacted by parents urging the government to address the urgent challenges facing schools, with particular emphasis on the four key proposals put forward by the Irish National Teachers' Organisation (INTO) in its pre-budget submission. These proposals are:

Smaller Class Sizes: Ireland's primary schools have the largest class sizes in the EU, with an average of 22.5 pupils per class. Reducing this by just two pupils would enhance learning outcomes and allow teachers to provide more individualised support for each child.

Fairer School Funding: The current allocation

of €224 per pupil is inadequate for schools to meet rising operational costs. INTO has called for a €75 increase per pupil, which would help reduce the reliance on constant fundraising and enable schools to provide a higher standard of education.

Support for Special Education: The INTO is advocating for the introduction of Special Educational Needs Coordinators (SENCOs) to ensure children with additional needs receive the necessary support and resources to thrive. Stronger Rural Schools: Rural schools are the heart of many communities, but they often face unique challenges. The successful Small Schools Pilot Project should be rolled out nationwide to reduce the administrative burden on principals and ensure these schools receive the resources they need to flourish.

Deputy Cahill stated, "Our schools are the foundation of our society, and it is vital that we provide our teachers and students with the resources they need to succeed. These proposals from the INTO are practical, costed,

and achievable. I believe that investing in education is an investment in the future of our children, and I will work tirelessly to ensure that Budget 2026 addresses these crucial issues."

Cahill continued, "I strongly support the call for smaller class sizes, fairer school funding, greater support for special education, and the expansion of the Small Schools Pilot Project. Our rural schools, in particular, need more support to remain viable and provide an equal standard of education to children across the country. I will be lobbying my colleagues in government to ensure that these proposals are prioritised in the upcoming budget."

The Fianna Fáil TD has also called on fellow parliamentarians to listen to the concerns of parents, teachers, and students, and to support the INTO's campaign to ensure that Budget 2026 provides the necessary funding to build a better, fairer education system for all.

Tralee. This is an iconic, much treasured building in my home town of Tralee. The funding will provide for new innovations like a community rooftop garden, an expansion of Kerry county museum and accessibility measures such as a 'changing places' toilet with shower facilities for disabled people.

This is a transformative project for Tralee and will secure the future







Kerry FC Celebrate historic comeback victory

On Friday evening, Kerry FC played in what was surely their biggest game in their short three-year history at senior level when they hosted SSE Airtricity Premier Division side Sligo Rovers at Mounthawk Park in the Quarter Final of the Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup.

There was a huge build-up to the game the entire week leading up to the occasion, with flags and bunting visible all across Kerry and even beyond. It was the first time Mounthawk Park saw a sell-out crowd since last season's cup game against Bohemian FC, which saw the Dublin side narrowly go through on penalties.

Kerry FC have seen themselves play with a different freedom in the cup this season, as midfielder Oran Crowe pointed out during the week, "The Cup brings a clean slate. League form and position, no matter the league you're in, goes out the window; it's all about who wants it more on the night."

Kerry FC manager Colin Healy was under no illusions of the test his side would face, but he said it was a game his players were looking forward to and would be excited for. Kerry FC had always given a good account of themselves in the cup since year one, so the Mounthawk faithful hoped nothing would change in that regard.

The contest kicked off in front of a raucous crowd at Mounthawk Park, with chants of "Kerry FC!" ringing out across the ground. The early stages of the match were tentative, with Sligo Rovers enjoying the majority of possession but Kerry showing flashes of confidence on the ball. Both sides probed cautiously, neither willing to overcommit, as the supporters settled in for what would be a tense cup tie.

The game shifted decisively in Sligo's favour after just fourteen minutes. James McManus whipped in a precise cross from deep, and striker Owen Elding rose at the back post to power home a header past Matthew Connor. The finish was clinical, and the travelling fans erupted in celebration as Rovers seized control.

Barely two minutes later, Elding struck again in devastating fashion. A loose, bobbling ball fell to him inside the penalty area, and though the position of the ball was awkward, he improvised brilliantly, volleying into the top-right corner. In the blink of an eye, Kerry found themselves two goals down, and the atmosphere in Tralee turned anxious. Manager Colin Healy responded swiftly to the setback, introducing Cian Brosnan for Daniel O'Connor after twenty-six minutes. Brosnan's energy was immediately evident as he drove down the left flank and won a throw-in deep in Sligo territory. Despite his best efforts, Kerry continued to struggle in the final third

Their frustrations grew when Sean O'Connell received a yellow card in the 37th minute, a reflection of the team's growing desperation. Sligo, meanwhile, kept possession comfortably and dictated the tempo, starving Kerry of chances and quietening the home crowd.

Just before half-time, Kerry carved out their first genuine opportunity when Brosnan worked space on the right and swung in a cross. However, the ball was cleared by the Sligo defence, and the referee's whistle soon confirmed that Kerry trailed 2–0 at the break.

The Kingdom emerged from the interval with renewed intent. A dangerous free kick from Joe Adams in the fifty-first minute looked promising, but his delivery from the right side floated harmlessly into the arms of Sligo goalkeeper Sam Sargeant.

Moments later came Kerry's best chance up to that point. Kevin Williams unleashed a shot from distance that deflected just over the bar. The resulting corner came to nothing, but the attempt signalled Kerry's determination to fight their way back into the match.

Any momentum Kerry had built seemed to vanish in the sixty-first minute when Elding completed his hat-trick. A cross from the left deflected slightly and wrong-footed the defence, allowing Elding to bundle the ball home for his third of the night. At 3–0, the tie looked dead and buried.

Yet Kerry refused to surrender. Substitute Daniel Okwute immediately made his presence felt, latching onto a ball inside the box and fired a shot from a tight angle. Sargeant stood tall to block, but Kerry's persistence hinted that the night was far from over.

In the sixty-fifth minute, Mounthawk Park erupted. Brosnan, who had been lively since his introduction, picked up possession just inside the box. From a difficult angle, he opened up his body and curled a superb finish into the far corner. Kerry had a lifeline, and the belief rippled back through the stands.

The atmosphere grew increasingly heated, with Sean Stewart booked three minutes later and Matthew Connor pulling off a crucial save to deny Elding his fourth. Kerry, emboldened by Brosnan's strike, pressed forward with renewed aggression.

The turning point arrived in the seventy-fifth minute. Kerry were awarded a penalty after sustained pressure from Daniel Okwute, and the home crowd collectively held its breath. Joe Adams stepped up with ice-cold composure and thumped his spot-kick into the top-right corner. At 3–2, the game was suddenly alive.

Okwute, relentless in his energy, nearly levelled the tie just minutes later, forcing a superb save from Sargeant at a tight angle. The momentum was all Kerry's, and the crowd sensed that history was in the making.

As the clock ticked towards full-time, Kerry threw everything forward. Okwute drove at the Sligo defence in the 89th minute but dragged his shot narrowly wide. With four minutes of stoppage time announced, the home supporters urged their side on with every ounce of energy.

Then, in the ninetieth minute, came the moment of pure magic. A low cross fizzed across the penalty area and found Brosnan arriving at the far post. His shot wasn't the cleanest, but it trickled agonisingly over the line. The eruption inside Mounthawk Park was deafening. Kerry had clawed back from the brink to level the tie at 3–3.

As the whistle confirmed extra time, the ground shook under the roar of the supporters. Kerry carried their momentum into the additional period, with Adams firing a free kick just over the bar in the ninety-second minute. Both sides probed cautiously thereafter, the physical toll of the evening beginning to show.

Half-time in extra time arrived with the scores still locked, but the energy in the stands remained electric. Kerry fans sensed the impossible might yet be achieved.

The decisive moment came in the one hundred and sixteenth minute. A flowing move involving Adams, Sean McGrath, and Okwute created chaos in the Sligo penalty area. The ball ricocheted between players before falling to Okwute, who adjusted superbly to lash a half-volley into the net.



The celebrations were euphoric. Players sprinted towards the stands, fans spilt forward in jubilation, which echoed long into the night. After trailing 3–0, Kerry had completed an astonishing turnaround to lead 4–3.

The remaining minutes were played amid feverish anticipation, with Kerry throwing bodies behind the ball to preserve their slender lead. When the referee finally blew for full-time, the stadium exploded once again. Players collapsed to the turf, drained but ecstatic, as supporters hailed a night that would be remembered forever in Kerry FC footballing folklore. The players remained on the pitch long after the full-time whistle and were serenaded by the Kerry support from all 4 corners of Mounthawk Park.

Kerry FC showed on the night that anything can happen on a football pitch. We have seen some remarkable comebacks in years gone by in football, but for Kerry FC and the Mounthawk faithful, it will be hard to see how this night could ever be topped. It was a night for everyone involved in the club, players, staff, and supporters, all with one common goal, putting Kerry FC on the map. Well, on Friday night, Mounthawk Park did just that. A semi-final berth secured and we await to find out our opponents on Sunday evening


MASTERGEEHA AND CASTLEISLAND HIT SIX TO RECORD OPENING 15'S DIVISION 1 WINS

Instead it was young Aodhna Ó Beaglaíoch who followed Paudie (Fossa, and Kerry's, main pivot was clearly hampered by injury) and wasn't far off a man of the match performance in his own right. Ask any teacher what it's like to teach a crowded classroom. Aodhna has put himself on the radar, no more than that just yet.

BOXINGRicky Hatton RIP



He was the most beloved British boxer of his generation, so much so that the nickname 'The People's Champion' accrued to him naturally, rather than being imposed by any marketing guru. Ricky Hatton was English to the core and, to his credit, never even tried to shed his past or change his accent. Yes, he played to the gallery. I suspect – and I suppose I am drawing conclusions from the known public information about a man I never met – but he I think perhaps he loved that lifestyle, not wisely, but too well. Mind you, from working class Britain to world boxing icon and multi-millionaire in his twenties.....would I handle such temptation better? Quite possibly not.

Read about him now and it's all about the power i his punch. That's true, but what most people forget is that he was a really good technical boxer and really aggressive in the

ring. In 2005 he was practically unbeatable. After a short but successful underage career he turned pro as an 18 year old and was soon boxing on the undercard of fighters like Naseem Hamed (incredible talent, incredible showman, but concentrated too much on the spectacular rather than the bread and butter stuff) and Chris Eubank (he played to the gallery too, but for their wallets rather than their applause; I admire it. He may have occasionally looked the fool, but don't judge him by his PR appearances).

Hatton was good. Very good. In 1999 he was Britain's Young Boxer of the Year. Few opponents were lasting beyond the early rounds. He won the WBA belt, then the WSO belt. In March 2001 he won the WBU title.

On June 5th, 2005, The 'Hitman' beat Australian Kostya Tszyu to win the IBF and Ring titles. That was worth more than all the rest put the together. Hatton, a massive underdog, had just been one of the best pound for pounders in the world and done it cleanly. That year he won almost everything that there was to win and ended up as Ring Magazine Boxer of the Year (that's a much bigger thing than it sounds).

In 2007, Hatton faced Floyd Mayweather Jnr. Mayweather had finally beaten Oscar de la Hoya (I'll just say it, I firmly believe Mayweather ducked de la Hoya at his peak – and that's the nature of the boxing game. The Age of Chivalry is not merely dead – it was always entirely mythological).

Hatton started very well, but in fairness, Mayweather grew into the fight. There was some talk after about the referee unfairly docking Hatton a point....look, Mayweather was just better.

Hatton came back to win several more titles. In 2009, he fought Manny Pacquiao, but Pacquiao was much superior and a third knockdown by the second round was enough for the referee to wave it off.

In 2012 Hatton had one last fight at welterweight, but, despite having put in a huge effort in training (Hatton's diet outside of fights famously included pints of Guinness and English fry-ups – and, most unfortunately, a number of more illicit substances), just didn't have the power of old and was stopped in the ninth.

There was some talk about making a comeback in Dubai this year. I'm sorry now, but there is too many tik tok heroes and former greats making a bit of a farce of boxing (leaving the door open to MMA). I'm thinking of Jake Paul versus Mike Tyson or that embarrassing nonsense between Mayweather and Conor McGregor. For a lot of former heroes, I suspect that it's the loss of fame and celebrity status over time rather than the actual money that is the lure, but I'm only quessing.

When I remember Ricky Hatton, I remember the bright-eyed redhead with the infectious grin and the fast hands who had the world at his feet in the early 2000s. There are worse legacies. May he rest in peace.

SOCCERFAI CUP QUARTER-FINAL Kerry FC 4 Sligo Rovers 3

I've always had a bit of a soft spot for the Bit o'Red. Dublin was the capital of Irish soccer even before the split with Belfast. Cork always had a couple of teams, especially with the Ford Factory. Galway and Limerick....arrah look, they jump at any sporting opportunity. Dundalk fitted the template. Longford Town was a stretch but they made it work.

But Sligo? Sligo has been a strong soccer town down the decades as much by force of will as anything else. There was almost a stubbornness about it at first. But somewhere along the way, The Showgrounds became a part of their cultural identity.

Ballina and the McHale brothers did something

similar for basketball in Mayo in the nineties; I can see a lot of similarities.

It didn't hurt Sligo Rovers that one of Ireland's better sportswriters in recent years is a lifelong supporter. I certainly don't always agree with Eamonn Sweeney on everything – some of the digs at losing teams, for example, are clearly showboating to evoke attention rather than consideration – but he can write. The first book of his that I ever read I picked up second hand in The Dungeon. "There's Only One Red Army". I did and do read about politics and I knew the slogan, but applying it to Sligo Rovers? Bit of a reach, no?

No. Not for a genuinely passionate supporter. "There's Only One Red Army" was by my generation, referencing songs and nightclubs and sporting grounds that I knew. It's no morality tale, very raw and honest. My favourite story is about Sligo winning the FAI Cup in the 1993/94 season. Eamonn and his brother were celebrating the win in Dublin when the brother (all good Irish stories involve 'the brother' as a main character) decided they were going to Sligo to celebrate. This is maybe 3.00am on a Saturday night, for context.

Eamonn sat them into the first cab in the queue on O'Connell street, quietly told the taxi driver just to drive to the back of the queue and wait until they got back to the front. The brother slept through the 'drive back to Sligo'. He even slept through the drive back to Dublin. In fact, he didn't wake up until Eamonn nudged him to tell him that they were back after a fine celebration in Sligo town, at which point the brother was content for the pair of them to make their way home to their sleeping quarters. I think that a lot of Irish people, from all generations bar the youngest (Gen Z is the term, I believe, though I am open to correction by anyone who differs from me by actually caring about such terminology) can identify with the characters in that story.

Kerry FC playing Sligo Rovers in an FAI Cup semifinal. In business terms it requires pragmatism. In sporting terms it's practically a foregone conclusion (the 'practically in that sentence is the essence of sport). But for the little bit of Dreamers that actually founded soccer clubs in places like Sligo or Kerry, there was definitely magic in the air.

1-0 to Sligo. That first goal was just awful. Lads, how can ye have so many players back defending, but nobody is able to put pressure n the ball in or pick up Elding at the back post? Look, it's obviously not the day to be churlish, but ye just can't give away goals like that. 15 minutes in and ye have to score two against a Premiership side to go through.

It didn't take long for Sligo to double their advantage. In fairness, the second goal was a lot better. You can argue that Kerry should have done better with the defensive header, but there's a reason why Sligo were sending in that kind of ball. And once it fell loose....a left leg volley by Owen Elding to give the keeper no chance. You won't see many finishes like that in the League of Ireland. 18 minutes gone, 2-0 down. Sin sin, gan amhras.

Kerry were a little more adventurous early in the second half, but to very little effect. In fact, after some nice tiki taka football by Sligo by the corner flag, a backheel turn opened a bit of space for Elding. There wasn't a lot of danger until a defensive deflection caried it past the hapless goalkeeper. 3-0 and a hat-trick for Eldina.

Kerry pulled one back in the 66th minute. Look, I was critical of the defending for the first goal for Sligo. The defending for the first goal for Kerry was as bad. Nicely measured ball in by McQueen, but how the defender let it flow past him to Cian Brosnan's feet....that defender will not have enjoyed the post mortem. Mind you, Cian Brosnan had plenty left to do and did it perfectly. 3-1. 24 minutes of normal time left; almost certainly a consolation prize.

That was the bit I really liked. Kerry have folded in a few games like tis in the past when they cough up bad goals - and the hard truth s that they do cough up too many bad goals, goals



that are more about bad defending than good offensive play. But they have character and a bit of steel and they started to show it. It's a cliché to say that most causes only become truly hopeless only when you give up hope, that clichés are born out of kernels of truth.

Elding had a chance to wrap it up, but Matthew O'Connor dived to make a great save.

If I was Sligo, I wouldn't be happy with Sligo's second concession either. Yes, Daniel Okwute was in their square with the ball at his feet, but his angle was too narrow. Where could he really go? But with a tackle that was....how will I put it? More reminiscent of an elephant in heat than a ballerina....he was always going to ground. Clear and obvious penalty, and an unnecessary one from a defensive point of view. We'll take it, and gladly, as Joe Adams fired home with precision. 3-2 and 15 minutes remaining.

Lovely flick on by Brosnan and a good effort by Okwute, but the keeper saved. Brosnan on again for Okwute and a good run, but the final shot was wide. Time was running out now.

Okwute with a good ball into the box. Joe Adams controlled it but played it back out (a great bit of composure – another player might have tried a hit and hope that just wasn't on). Ball came to Okwute again, good control, cut in towards the byline to send a low ball across into the area of maximum danger....and there was Cian Brosnan to slide it home from close range. Third minute of injury time.

Kerry rampant now. In the 118th minute, a good ball from Joe Adams to Seán McGrath. Shot half blocked, but only as far as Okwute. Maybe it wasn't as spectacular looking a left leg volley as Elding's second goal....but it was far more significant.

Kerry into the last four of the FAI Cup. The last time there was a comeback like this in a soccer match, Pele, Bobby Moore, Ossie Ardiles, Michael Caine, and Sylvester Stallone (he saved a late penalty to salvage a 4-4 draw) were playing.

When Del Boy was the master, of smart TV one-liners, Roy Keane was the General, of Manchester United. Both were entertainers, in their different ways, Earning bags of moola, way back in the day. Roy was an enforcer, who took no prisoners, While Del Boy was a chancer, flogging dodgy wares, But nothing lasts for ever, and in time both moved on, For Roy became a TV pundit, with a caustic tongue. Never one to pull back, he shoots from the hip, With his Cork rebel accent, and Brit punters love it. While other pundits hum and haw, Roy puts the boot in, When he sees incompetence, and Man U fail to win. He was a winner warrior, who never compromised, As Mick McCarthy found out, when his Saipan dream died. Characters like Keano, are few and far between, And now he's starring in Sky ads, on our TV screens. He's cast as a curmudgeon, but he's just being himself, Relishing the different roles, without any help. His trade mark is the steely stare, showing his displeasure, Over ice cream ninety-nines, and bird-brain coffee servers!



KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.




A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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
