



### KILLARNEY STILL HAS THE

### **GOLDEN TOUCH**

Only three points behind the overall winner, Ennis, Killarney's gold medal winning performance in this year's tidy towns competition has been described as a wonderful boost.

That's the view of Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President, Niall Kelleher, who described the town's 352 points tally in the keenly contested Category F as hugely impressive.

He said to finish just three marks behind Ennis was a marvellous achievement for Team Killarney, particularly considering the town's disappointing showing in the recent IBAL awards.

"This result is a fairer reflection of the outstanding ongoing work led by the dedicated management and outdoor staff of Kerry County Council. Without their input, our town would not maintain such a high ranking," Mr Kelleher said.

"The input from residents, tidy towns volunteers and the commercial interests was well reflected and highly commended in the adjudication," he added.

The tidy towns judge said: "Killarney is a busy place and your group is very active in developing and promoting projects that enhance the townscape. Well done on progressing with these, especially during the past two years of the Covid pandemic".

He added: "It has been a difficult two years so it's great to be back out and on the ground experiencing, in person, the excellent work that has been taking place for tidy towns".

Business premises that especially caught the eye of the adjudicator and mentioned in the report were The Laurels, the Royal Hotel, the Ross Hotel and the Town Hall.

Killarney House and Gardens also came in for great praise from the judge who found it was maintained to an exceptionally high standard, as was Muckross House and Gardens.

"Killarney's gold medal brought the county's tally to four this year and we

were delighted too that Kenmare, Listowel and Tralee all received gold medals," the chamber president said.

"No other county in Ireland has managed to achieve so much success at county level and it reflects the commitment by council management and staff and the 35 different tidy towns committees within the county," he added.

Killarney won the prestigious overall award in 2011 and, following this year's performance, confidence is growing that a second is not far away.

### End of an Era at presentation convent killarney

The last two remaining Sisters have departed the Presentation Convent in Killarney to join other communities in Kerry.

While there is sadness with the Sisters departing, it also heralds an exciting time for St Brigid's as land which was part of the Convent grounds, has been gifted for a proposed new school, as the demand for places at the school has outgrown its current accommodation. It is hoped that this generous gift will ensure that the legacy of Nano Nagle and the Presentation ethos will live on into the future in Killarney and

For nearly 230 years, since the first two Sisters arrived in 1793 to establish a convent and school, the Presentation Sisters have played an important role, educating, and supporting those in need in Killarney. It was the first community of Presentation Sisters outside of the founding community in Cork, and their mission was to expand and continue the work of their founder Nano Nagle, which was to provide education to Catholic children, which was forbidden at the time by the Penal

In 1800 a Primary School was established and by 1826 over 350 pupils were enrolled. In 1875 the current Presentation Convent was built. The Convent, which is a three-storey building and includes a six-bay double height Gothic Revival style chapel is of significant historical importance and is a listed building, with many of the original features of the building both internally and externally still intact and protected.

In 1948 a Secondary School was founded, with the

current St Brigid's Presentation Secondary School building commencing construction two years later. This building is still in use with a further extension added to the school in 1984.

The two remaining Sisters have departed the Presentation Convent in Killarney for the last time, joining other communities in Kerry.

As the focus now is on the development of this new school, there are no immediate plans for the future of the Convent building and the remaining grounds.





### KILLARNEY SUCCESSFUL IN WINNING HIGH-PROFILE EVENT

ermany's largest tour operator, DERTOUR, is bound for Ireland in 2022 after it was announced that Killarney has been successful in its bid to host the prestigious German DER Touristik Academy in the INEC, between 3-6 April, 2022. The Academy is an educational and incentive event run by one of the largest tour operators in Mainland Europe and will be attended by 200 travel agents and influential travel journalists next year. This is the first overseas event by DER Touristik, Germany, since COVID-19 and is being supported by Fáilte Ireland, Tourism Ireland and Limerick Travel.

The esteemed awards shine a light on the remarkable achievements of volunteers around the country by honouring them at a national level.

Noreen was selected for her selfless commitment to the charity for the past 10 years, not only as a key member of the gardening group and valued volunteer listener, but as a trained programme facilitator.

In recent years, Noreen trained as a programme facilitator for the 'Thrive and Survive' programme, undertaking training and subsequently delivering 10 six-week programmes to Recovery Haven clients. She also undertook training to deliver the 'Building Better Caregivers' programme in 2020, aimed at supporting those caring for a loved one with cancer. All this is done on a voluntary basis, in addition to Noreen's hands-on work in the charity's garden and in the house itself.

The second nomination is for the charity's entire team of volunteers, who are an integral cog in the Recovery Haven Kerry wheel. This includes



the charity's volunteer listeners, therapists, gardeners, fundraisers and board members. At the height of Covid19 restrictions, the charity's volunteer listeners came together to provide a phone support service for clients who could not visit Recovery Haven due to lockdown, making over 2,000 phone calls since March 2020.

Commenting on the award nominations, Recovery Haven Kerry manager Siobhan MacSweeney described the volunteers as the lifeblood of the organisation who, she said, keeps Recovery Haven's heart pumping and full of vitality.

"For the past decade, I have had the pleasure of spending time on a daily basis with members of our volunteering groups. The simple truth is that we would not be able to deliver our services without them. We depend on them, we need them and they give us so much more that we can ever give them. They say volunteers aren't paid because they are priceless, and we could not afford all that they give. Each volunteer, their skills and time make up a large part of Recovery Haven, so I am delighted with this acknowledgement for all our volunteers."



"Killarney Behind the Mask has been a pure labour of love. What began with visits to people in the community for a snap-chat, within my travel limits, was overwhelmingly embraced and it took on a life of its own," Marie said.

"With all of my encounters on file, I really felt it was my duty to Killarney and its wonderful people to document this in a time capsule for future generations, a history book so to speak.

"As lockdowns go, Killarney was one of the best places in the world in which to be confined and this book highlights that fact in no uncertain terms," she added.

"Thank you to everyone who humoured me by smiling down my lens, keeping the bright side out, even in hard times, and for allowing me to share their stories".

The book, edited by John O'Mahony of O'Mahony Media and designed by Sinead Collins of Design by Sinead, features hundreds of interviews and photographs with local personalities, business interests, families, employers and employees, sports stars and everyday people trying to get on with their lives as best they could.

Third level education isn't always the best option after Leaving Cert. With the country recovering from the pandemic. A rapidly expanding economy needs a plentiful supply of skilled craftspeople. To become an apprentice, you must be hired by an employer approved by SOLAS. Apprentice jobs come up all year round and many apprenticeship jobs are advertised on the website www.apprenticeships.ie/careerseekers/jobs. Apprentices learn work ready skills on the job with the employer and off the job in a training facility. At least 50% of apprenticeship learning is completed in the workplace.

Apprenticeships lead to nationally recognised qualifications. Apprentices 'earn while they learn' – they have an employment contract and are paid a salary during their apprenticeship training. The salary varies depending on the apprenticeship programme. Your employer will provide details of the salary. You can also check the payment details on the website.

All national apprenticeships lead to a qualification on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ) from Levels 5 to 10. Apprenticeship is a fantastic way to get started in a career, gaining practical on-the-job experience and skills, along with a qualification which is recognised internationally.

Apprenticeships are 2 to 4 years in duration, depending on the programme. You can find out more about the wide range of exciting apprenticeship opportunities available on www.apprenticeships.ie/career-seekers/ get-started/discover. Browse through the Apprenticeship directory to find your area of interest. View the apprenticeship details to see if you would like to pursue an apprenticeship in that area. Then follow the directions on the detail page in order to become an apprentice. The educational qualifications needed to become an apprentice depend on the apprenticeship but are usually Grade D in 5 subjects in the Junior Cert. You will find the qualifications needed in the detailed programme information for each apprenticeship.

If you haven't the required qualifications, you may be eligible for recognition of prior learning (RPL) where work and other experience is taken into consideration. Alternatively, you may be able to do a preparatory 'pre-apprenticeship' course. To find out more, contact the team looking after the apprenticeship in which you are interested. You will find this information in each programme description. The minimum age to become an apprentice varies from 16-18 years but there is no upper age limit.

As well as apprenticeships, SOLAS provides traineeships which are a combination of formal training and workplace coaching with an employer. These traineeships, which range from 6 to 20 months are designed for flexible delivery – online, face-to-face, blended learning. Over 75 programmes are available nationwide. They include professions such as Greenkeeping, Fashion and Beauty, Hairdressing, Wind Turbine Maintenance Technician and Tour Guiding. Traineeships

are aimed at unemployed people and new entrants to the labour market. The ETB's also run these courses. The full list of traineeships can be found on www.solas.ie/programmes/traineeships.

The comprehensive range of apprenticeships and traineeships now available in ETB's nationwide provide a very attractive option for both males and females who prefer an 'earn while you learn' approach to further education. The training provided is of a very high standard, the skills acquired are very marketable and the qualification awarded is prestigious and can be further enhanced on the NFQ.



"I would encourage all interested groups to get in touch with their Local Community Development Committee (LCDC) that administers the

#### 1000 CALLS A WEEK FOR HELP MADE TO SVP SOUTH-WEST

IN OCTOBER AS FAMILIES STRUGGLE TO PAY UTILITY BILLS

#### SVP South-West reveals unprecedented pressure on core services of food, shelter and education

p to 1000 people across Cork and Kerry made calls to St Vincent De Paul (SVP) South-West every week during the month of October seeking assistance from the charity in the run-up to Christmas.

The charity says that families have reported struggling with paying essential utility bills such as gas, electricity and fuel due to price increases in recent months.

SVP South-West have said callers also reported being in significant arrears with utility suppliers after an embargo that was imposed to prevent people from being cut off during the pandemic was lifted by the Government.

The Society has also revealed that the staggering number of calls from people seeking assistance has come at a time when they are facing unprecedented pressure across all of their core services as COVID-19 once again led to the cancellation of the majority of fundraising events for this year.

80% of SVP's core fundraising is now conducted during the October to December period, with traditional church collections only permitted to resume recently.

### KILLARNEY WINS GOLD MEDAL IN



The Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr Jimmy Moloney has congratulated all of the Kerry winners and participants in this year's Tidy Towns Competition.

Speaking from the Awards Ceremony in Dublin, Cllr Moloney said that every Tidy Towns Committee in Kerry can take great pride in their results.

'I want to extend warmest congratulations to all of those who did so well today, particularly to Tralee, Kenmare, Listowel and Killarney on being awarded a Gold Medal for 2021.

Killarney excelled again this year gaining a Gold Medal for 2021 and here are the judges key points following their adjudication.

#### **Total Mark 352**

### Community – Your Planning and Involvement / An Pobal - Pleanáil agus Rannpháirtíocht:

- With a population of 14,219, you a large town in category F.
- The Killarney Looking Good group has 17 core members representative of the main organisation in the town, and you have over 500 volunteers in a network with various skills who can work on a range of projects.
- Your meetings vary from summer to winter and with Covid restrictions you have moved to Zoom and phones.
- Well done on the Diversity and Inclusion project which entailed an antiracist poster in 13 languages being presented to a representative from the immigration support centre. That seems to have led to other initiatives such as the rugby club diversity programme, the KASI Women's shed group and the International Choir.
- You have a wide network of agencies that support your efforts, and it is not practical to relist them in this report.
- Projects mentioned include tourism surveys and the shop local campaign.
- For communications you make good use of local and social media, and we noted the Killarney Looking Good competition.
- You have a busy programme working with primary and secondary schools in Killarney which includes many initiatives. Well done on achieving Green Flags.
- Specific projects since 2019 include biodiversity promotion and streetscape audit.
- In the 31 years since first participating in the competition, you have excelled and had many achievements including winning the overall award in 2011. Well done.

#### Streetscape & Public Places / Sráid-Dreach & Áiteanna Poiblí:

- Projects detailed under this heading include the sculpture of the monk which looks very well, the ANAM Art and Cultural Centre (reopened in Dec 2019), Safe Streets and Safe Destination programme.
- Others included the micro athletic track, improved Christmas decorations, the tree of light in the grounds of St Mary's Cathedral which remained lit until the end of January. That tree was mentioned in the 2019 report.
- Age-friendly parking spaces and the shop front guidelines are noted. The restoration of Healy Insurances was well done as was the Columbarium Wall in Knockeendubh burial grounds.
- The upgraded playground looks very well.
- Accessible tourism destination and the audit of streetscape business initiatives are also noted, and you have considered people with disabilities in the Make Way Day initiative.
- Ongoing projects include looking after derelict sites and the Laneway Revitalisation scheme. Before and after pictures tell the story very well.

- You have an upgraded Historical Buildings and Sculpture Trail.
- Future projects include a public realm design for the streetscape, upgrading the Fire Station and new cycle paths. We hope the design team includes street trees in their proposals.

#### Green Spaces and Landscaping / Spásanna Glasa agus Tírdhreachú:

- A new project is the fairy trail at Knockreer. These are a distinctively Irish initiative which has taken off in all parts of the country. They look great and attract children to parks and forests.
- We hope the 80 trees planted adjacent to MD O'Shea roundabout have survived. May is very late for planting unless the trees were grown in containers
- Also at Knockreer, a wildflower meadow is managed using traditional farm machinery pulled by horses.
- The Blue Pool Walk at Muckross was improved by cleaning fallen branches and debris and removing some Rhododendrons. It includes an audio route for the visually impaired.
- The Bee friendly signage looks well and will help to raise awareness.
- Additional plant containers in the streetscape because of Covid restrictions.
- •We note the changed grass mowing regime which encourages wildflowers to develop and well done on having them identified and listed in the common, Latin and Irish name in the table.
- You have also planted 60,000 bulbs on Mission Road including bluebells, snowdrops and wild garlic. No doubt they looked well in springtime as did the Crocus at St Mary's cathedral.
- Ongoing projects include the KASI Community Garden, maintaining permanent display beds,
- Well done on the tree planting programme which will provide long term benefits for Killarney.

### Nature and Biodiversity in your Locality / An Dúlra agus an Bhithéagsúlacht i do cheantar:

- The Falconry display of Sept 2019 is noted.
- Congrats to KCC for the new brochure on Kerry's Parks and Gardens.
- The 2.4 m swift box at Killarney House, installed in the summer of 2019 is impressive.
- The information board for Deenagh will add to the attractiveness of the wooden carved animals and birds.
- You are working on a biodiversity plan for Killarney and the annual autumn talk series have been popular.
- The control of Rhododendrons in Killarney is ongoing helped by 50 members of men's shed in Ireland in November 2019. Did the fire last April destroy any Rhododendrons?
- Sustainability Doing more with less / Inmharthanacht Mórán ar an mbeagán:
- Projects mentioned here include the Café going green, the climate crisis initiative by the Kerry Diocese, new bicycle stands, solar powered parking machines, the global climate protest by students, the hotel sustainability pact of cutting emissions by 25%, the water refill station, the drive to win a grant by students from St Brendan's Secondary School for solar panels to reduce heating costs. The students have also made it to the final of the ECO-UNESCO Young Environmentalists Award.
- KCC operated a shredding system for Christmas trees.
- Recycling banks managed by KCC, and the KWD recycling initiative.
- A cycling skills workshop for girls and a covered area for parking bicycles in St Brigid's Secondary School and the cycle without age campaign is noted.

### 2021 TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION



#### Tidiness and Litter Control / Slachtmhaireacht agus Rialú Bruscair:

- For a third year the staff of Marks and Spencers have joined your volunteers in cleaning street furniture and collecting litter.
- The new signage at the car parks is a great idea.
- Painting railings at the courthouse makes them look very smart.
- Pooper scoopers are erected as well as signs advising dog owners to be responsible for cleaning up after them.
- You were raked in 2nd place in the IBAL survey.
- You hope to have more service cables laid underground in future and the removal of redundant cables.
- In your litter control efforts, you have schemes such as 'Adopt a Road', Wednesday clean-ups and the Council employs litter pickers in the summer months. All schools take part in the spring clean.
- The number of bags of rubbish collected during the county clean-up is amazing and we note the Tanaiste also donned a yellow jacket.
- You are vigilant in taking care of graffiti which is helping to reduce its impact on the town.
- · Works such as painting bollards, railings and kerbs is noted.
- Our congratulations to Killarney Town Meitheal for their range of works undertaken throughout each year since they were formed 11 years ago.
   Residential Streets & Housing Areas / Sráideanna Cónaithe & Ceantair Tithíochta:
- We note that houses in the new social housing scheme have very small gardens. Have you considered giving them some ideas on how to landscape them?
- It is great to see Armagh House redeveloped. The new build looks very different from the old style.
- Well done to the Ballydribeen Resident's Association for their works programme which is very impressive.
- New footpaths in some estates were provided and others upgraded, and all estate name signs are completed and are bilingual.
- You have successful competitions that helps to maintain high standards within each estate.
- A list of projects for improvement in the Ballyspillane estate were noted. Approach Roads, Streets & Lanes / Bóithre Isteach, Sráideanna & Lánaí:
- Mentioned under this heading is the Ceramic Tile Project in Chapel Lane, road resurfacing works in College Street, restoration of Well Lane South and the mural at the entrance to St Anthony's Place.
- Other schemes include Flesk walkway, the car bus park at Rock Road where cables were placed underground, a mural at Glebe car park and extra parking on the Kenmare Road.
- Main Street was upgraded, and many footpath improvements were done in and around the town.
- More road improvements are planned.

#### **Concluding Remarks:**

Killarney is a busy place, and your group are very active in developing and promoting projects that enhance the townscape. Well done on progressing with these especially during the past two years of the Covid pandemic.

#### **Second Round Adjudication:**

The adjudicator is delighted to be back in Killarney for second round adjudication. It has been a difficult two years so its great to be back out and, on the ground experiencing in person, the excellent work that has been taking place for Tidy Towns. Well done on your continued commitment to Killarney and to the competition.

Killarney on the day was busy, with many people experiencing outdoor

dining in some autumn sunshine. The inclusion of outdoor dining has in some places being difficult with limited space, but it great to see that footpaths in places have been extended and re-surfaced, and where outdoor dining is taking place they have been enhanced with planters. Such examples were noted at the area of the Ross Hotel, The Fairview and Milano. Other buildings that caught the adjudicators eye were The Laurels, The Town Hall, Killarney Royal and the Churches. The businesses of Killarney are to be complimented on their presentation. Street furniture was also admired, most notable the unique bicycle stands at different locations around the town. New seating was noted and admired. The Old Milk Market was a hive of activity, the inclusion of the murals on the walls as a throwback to years ago is a nice addition. The area at the junction of Muckross Park road was admired, this area including the public toilets were spotless. The gardens at Killarney House, are beautiful and maintained to an exceptional high standard, what a beautiful area to unwind and relax and was been suitably used on the day. Muckross House and gardens as always didn't disappoint and it is great to see visitors back experiencing the splendour of these areas.


Landscaping is at the usual high standard in Killarney. The addition of tiered planting at locations around the town was admired and this was used effectively to soften the urban backdrop. Muckross road was admired, now with grass verges left for wildlife. The inclusion of the signage at these areas was noted and admired. As mentioned previously, Killarney House gardens are a joy, and the sign about the bees of Ireland was admired. ### **FIVE NEW SOUTH KERRY WALKING TRAILS**

#### ADDED TO THE WALKS SCHEME

All five of the walking trails in South Kerry put forward by South Kerry
Development Partnership CLG (SKDP) for inclusion on the Walks
Scheme have been approved. The Walks Scheme aims to open up our
countryside to local walkers, hikers and tourists.

Under the scheme, funding is provided to farmers and other landowners to maintain the trails that travel through their holdings. The announcement was made recently by Minister Heather Humphries as part of the review of the scheme undertaken by her Department. The five new trails, Keel Loop Walk, Caher Marsh Walk, Bolus Head/Skellig Way, Pound/Knochernawaddra and the Emlagh Loop/Reenore Cliff Walk, will result in an additional 47.5Km of trails in South Kerry being included in the scheme with an additional 49 landowners coming onto the scheme. This will bring the total number of landowners on the Walks Scheme in South Kerry to 356 covering some 216 Km's of trails. South Kerry will have the second largest number of landowners on the scheme nationally, with West Cork having the highest number.

In addition to the new trails being added, the Minister also announced further funding will also be provided to the Local Development Companies, including SKDP, that deliver the scheme as well as for the salaries paid to the Rural Recreation Officers who play a vital role in delivering the Walks Scheme and developing the outdoor recreation sector locally.

Welcoming the inclusion of the additional 5 trails in South Kerry as well as the additional funding for the delivery of the scheme, SKDP CEO Noel Spillane said that this will provide a significant boost for outdoor recreation and tourism in rural towns and villages. "South Kerry has

been to the fore in developing trails under the 'Walks scheme' and it has proven to be an invaluable asset in enabling the development of such trails with the cooperation of all stakeholders involved" he said adding that it provides much needed additional income to the landowners involved in maintaining the trails. "This recent announcement delivers on commitments in both the Programme for Government and Our Rural Future to increase the number of trails under the 'Walks Scheme', he concluded.

A total of 31 new trails across 13 counties are to be added to the 'Walk's Scheme', which aims to open up our countryside to local walkers, hikers and tourists. In addition to the 5 South Kerry trails, 3 trails in North Kerry were also approved for the scheme. Overall, a total of 80 trails across the country are now included as part of the 'Walks Scheme'.

The COVID-19 situation in Ireland is uncertain and of concern. We remain vulnerable to a further deterioration depending on a number of factors, including levels of social contact, adherence to basic public health protective measures, and levels of immunity across the population.

The current level of COVID-19 is having a significant and sustained impact across all aspects of the health service, including in hospitals, Intensive Care Units (ICUs), public health, testing and tracing services, general practice, as well as the broader primary care services.

Following public health advice, the government has agreed a range of measures aimed at interrupting the spread of COVID-19 in the community.

#### Coming into place immediately

Household close contacts who are fully vaccinated and showing no symptoms should now restrict their movements until they have 3 negative antigen test results within 5 days.

### Coming into place from midnight Thursday 18 November

everyone should revert to working from home unless it is necessary to attend the workplace in person

you will need COVID-19 passes (based on vaccination or recovery) for cinemas and theatres

closing times for all on-licensed premises (except for guests staying in hotels) will move to midnight with all customers vacated from the premises by that time

#### Vaccine booster programme

Booster vaccinations are currently being administered to those aged over 60 in the community and residents in long-term care facilities, the immunocompromised, and healthcare workers. The Health Service Executive (HSE) is already planning to expand capacity further through both the pharmacy sector and vaccination centres over the coming weeks, and will now plan a further ramp-up of the delivery programme in the coming days in line with the National Immunisation Advisory Committee (NIAC) advice received last night to extend the programme to those aged 16-59 with underlying conditions and to those aged 50 to 59

Vaccination remains the single most effective protection against COVID-19 and always remains available for anyone who has not yet been vaccinated. Vaccines are proving highly effective in preventing deaths and serious illness from COVID-19.

In contrast, this week, the HSE said 40% of people in hospitals are unvaccinated although



they constitute just 7% of the adult population. The unvaccinated constitute 52% of admissions to ICU and the partially vaccinated another 5%. While the high uptake of vaccination is having a considerable positive impact on the conversion of case numbers into admissions to hospital and ICU, vaccination alone will not prevent transmission and the range of public health behaviours will continue to be a critical component of the collective response to COVID-19.

#### These behaviours include:

- acting fast, isolating and getting tested if we have symptoms
- wearing our face coverings where appropriate
- making sure that indoor spaces are well
- maintaining adequate social distancing whenever appropriate
- covering our coughs and sneezes and keeping our hands clean

### To protect ourselves and the most vulnerable in our communities, we should also:

- prioritise the activities we undertake
- limit our activities in riskier environments (indoor, crowded environments, where distancing is difficult)
- take regular antigen tests if we are asymptomatic and engaged in activities in riskier environments
- hold off on visiting vulnerable people after undertaking these activities

People in age groups approved for booster shots should take up their vaccine appointment as a priority when offered it and exercise particular caution until they receive their booster dose.

#### Working from home

Following today's decisions, engagement has taken place with employers and trade unions, through the Labour Employer Economic

Forum, on updating guidance on working from home unless necessary to attend in person, as well as strengthening communication on protective measures, as outlined in the Work Safely Protocol, for those who continue to attend workplaces.

The government continues to offer a range of economic supports to assist businesses and individuals impacted by the pandemic as set out in the Economic Recovery Plan, which are amongst the most extensive direct supports offered within the EU. They include the Employment Wage Subsidy Scheme (with expenditure to date of over €5.4bn), tax warehousing, a targeted commercial rates waiver, along with low-cost loan schemes to businesses, such as the COVID-19 Credit Guarantee Scheme, mentoring programmes, and direct grant programmes. A range of sectoral supports also remain in place and, through the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, the Gaeltacht, Sports and the Media, the government remains in ongoing contact with the hospitality and entertainment sectors on the challenges they face due to COVID-19.

There will be no change in current arrangements for student attendance and on-site activities in school, further and higher education institutions in line with COVID response plans for those sectors.

#### Antigen testing for close contacts

The HSE advise that you should do 3 antigen tests in total. You can do them at any time of the day.

You should do your 3 antigen tests in this order: first test on the day you get your tests second test 2 days after your first test third test 2 days after your second test



The 2021 British Rally Championship will draw to a close on Saturday, with the final round, the Ulster Rally, to be decided over nine stages in the Newry and Banbridge areas. The event will be the first all-tarmac rally of the year for the Hankook Tire crew of Keith Cronin and Mikie Galvin, who will be aiming to end the season on a positive note in their NPL Rally Hire-tended Ford Fiesta.

Buoyed by setting fastest time on the last stage of the previous round in Wales, Cronin is looking forward to the return to tarmac, his season so far having been gravel-focused.

"We didn't do the opening round at Oulton Park because of the Covid quarantine restrictions at the time, and the Mull Rally wasn't on our schedule either, so the Ulster will be our only full tarmac event for 2021," said Cronin. "The last stage of the Cambrian was tarmac, but that was only 5 kilometres, and it was on gravel tyres. This is the 'real thing', and it's the nearest we have to a home rally this year."

The Ulster Rally follows the three stages, three times format regularly used in Ireland, with Service after each of the first two loops. "The route is largely unchanged from the most recent running of the event in 2019, so anyone who did that rally will have an advantage, the last time we were there was in 2017," Cronin noted. "It's a very competitive top ten, I expect the pace to be tremendous from the start."

The destination of the 2021 British Rally Championship will be decided




on the Ulster between Welshmen, Osian Pryce and Matt Edwards. Pryce, BRC runner-up in 2013 and 2014, holds an eight point advantage heading to Northern Ireland, and Edwards must take maximum points if he is to secure a third title.

The Ulster Rally route will total 150 kilometres/93 miles, over the three loops of the McGaffin's Corner, Bronte Homeland and Shinn Bridge tests. Service will be at the Modern Tyres facility in Newry, with the Finish Ramp also located there.





#### WHAT IS DRY EYE?

People with dry eye either don't make enough normal (lubricating) tears or the ones that they make are of poor quality, causing the tears to dry up too quickly and the front of the eye to become dry and irritated. As a result, dry eye can be uncomfortable and cause the eye to produce the watery type of tears. This only helps for a short time – leaving the eye uncomfortable and gritty.

If your eyelids are sore and red, you may also have another condition called blepharitis. Blepharitis is a condition that affects the eyelids making them sore and inflamed. If the eyelid glands become blocked, you may have a condition called meibomian gland dysfunction. It is quite common to have a combination of these conditions.

Dry eye doesn't tend to cause serious damage to the eyes, but it can be very uncomfortable. Severe cases do have a risk of causing long-term damage, but fortunately these are rare.

#### **Risk factors**

Dry eye is much more common in people over the age of 50. This is often because the glands that make the normal tears, and particularly the oily part of the tears, tend to become less effective as you get older. Also the tears tend to spread across the eye less well with age.

Some general health conditions can cause dry eye as a side effect, such as autoimmune diseases and hormonal changes. The condition is also more common in windy, cold, dry and dusty conditions.

If you're concentrating on your computer or smartphone for long periods of time without a break, this may also make your eyes feel dry.

Air conditioning and central heating can make dry eye worse too, as can some medications and general health problems.

Smoking has also been linked to dry eye as it may both cause the condition and make it worse.

#### Symptoms

People with dry eye may get some or all of the following symptoms.

- A sandy or gritty feeling
- Sore eyes
- Uncomfortable and painful eyes
- An itching or burning sensation
- Short-term blurred vision

Watery eyes, as if you are crying (having watery eyes can mean you are producing poor-quality tears and actually have dry eyes)

#### Treatment

Most cases of dry eye tend to be a long-term condition, meaning that you'll need ongoing treatment.

There are lots of different types of drops and gels that can help your eyes feel more comfortable. The best ones don't have preservatives in them, or if they do they contain very gentle preservatives, which helps to reduce irritation. They may also contain an ingredient called sodium hyaluronate, known to be very effective in treating the condition.

It's important to use the correct type of drops. The wrong drops are unlikely to cause any harm, but they won't help as much. If your drops aren't working or you're not sure which drops to use, you're a sight test can help determine the best treatment options.

While the result might paint the picture of a one sided game, it belies the fact that for long periods, the home side, playing for the first time at the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre, gave as good as they got from the Table toppers from across the County Bounds. # GAA COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP SEMI-FINALS Austin Stacks v St. Brendans



Stacks are the team that

everybody's watching, especially after they toppled the reigning champions and favourites. Joe O'Connor looks like the answer to Kerry's prayers for a dominant midfielder. For that matter, Greg Horan is a very under-estimated player in my opinion. Kieran Donaghy has sidestepped an attacking starring role in favour of directing the play, and players like Darragh O'Brien and Conor Horan are relishing the space and doing damage. Young Armin Heinrich is a real find. Dylan Casey has man-marked a lot of top forwards and shut them down. Actually, Stacks have the best defensive system in this year's championship, with Conor Jordan selflessly closing the channels. Paul O'Sullivan has been a revelation; Ronan Shanahan not far behind him. On top of that, Stacks have big men all over the field, and muscle counts.

Their problem is scoring. Fair enough, they beat East Kerry - but 1-7 to 1-5 on an off night for the champions is closer to a coin toss than a convincing victory. 0-14 against Kenmare, considering their dominance, isn't impressive either - they should have been well out of sight. St. Brendans are the last divisional team standing, and are going into this one as underdogs. I'm not convinced of that at all. St. Brendans knocked out Kenmare Shamrocks, and Kenmare are a testing side for any team. Killarney Legion, apart from one second half burst, didn't produce the same threat, but Brendans were admirably composed. Stacks have a great midfield - but Brendans have two inter-county players there. I will say that at this stage, I don't expect Stefan Okumbor or David O'Callaghan to play any part in the action. One player who might - and could be a crucial piece of the jigsaw - is Ivan Parker from Churchill. And if Parker is there, you are effectively doubling St. Brendans' threat. Not that it's bad anyway - Daithí Griffin has been superb on the forty. while an inside line of Kerry hurler Dan Goggin, James Duggan, and especially danger-man Alan O'Donoghue only need to supply to hurt

My question about St. Brendans is at the back. Eoghan O'Brien is a very good keeper, close to inter-county standard, and Andrew Barry isn't far off Kerry standard either. But I'm not convinced by the rest, to be honest.

If this becomes a shootout, I'd give Brendans a great chance – Diarmuid O'Connor slices that kind of game wide open. But if Stacks are able to play their own game – and I think they will – then I expect the Rockies to reach the final.

#### Dr. Crokes v Kerins O'Rahillys

This should be one to savour. To be honest, Dr. Crokes looked adrift in the Club Championship and weren't on anybody's radar for the championship after defeats to both Templenoe and Kenmare Shamrocks. They were hit by injuries, but that didn't look like their only malaise. Quite simply, that certain insouciance born of confidence was missing.

By God, but they got their mojo back! Johnny Buckley's return has provided a reassurance in midfield. Gavin White, unsurprisingly, has been blistering. Brian Looney has played 69 County Championship games at this stage - there's a reason he has lost very few of them. Micheál Burns is a playmaker turned scorer when need be. David Shaw looked like he was carrying an injury to me; he appears to be moving freely again. Certainly he looks a lot more like himself now, and that's not good for opposition teams. And Tony Brosnan? Yet again, Tony Brosnan looks like the most dangerous forward in the Kerry County Championship. Just get the ball up there, and he'll do the rest. A note of caution, and a strong one. I don't mean to be disrespectful, but West Kerry and Templenoe are not exactly opposition of the highest calibre at this grade.

Rahillys are unquestionably a different proposition. It may have been a while since they stood on the top steps (Gavin O'Brien's father gave one of the all-time great displays that day in 2002) but they are always there or thereabouts.

The defence is solid without being spectacular. The duel between Cormac Coffey and Tony Brosnan should be fascinating – Coffey is sticky and has the speed to stay with the sharpshooter, Equally, Shane Brosnan will look to hold the centre and is capable of it, while Ross O'Callaghan is a clever and accomplished full back

In midfield you have David Moran. Pat Spillane recently listed his 30 top footballers and included both Tyrone midfielders – Kerry may have lost the game, but I thought David took both of them to school.

Up front is the magic. Jack Savage is the top scorer in this year's championship (albeit including a lot of frees – Jack has been inconsistent for me). Tommy Walsh, while I think he was right to step back from intercounty football, is a colossal handful for any defender – literally. I know Tommy can appear a bit ponderous at times and he isn't really a shooting forward, but he's ponderous like an iceberg. How do you tackle that? He's also got great hands. On either side of him you have Barry John Keane, looking back to his absolute best, and an equally dangerous Conor Hayes. Midfield will be paramount here. Both teams funnel back fast, but I expect the one that

dominates possession will also dominate the

scoreboard.

Crokes have slightly more danger-men and a deeper bench; they get my nod.

It turns out that there are no bears in New Zealand.


I'm of that generation. The All Blacks practically transcended sport for us. Ah jaysus, there was an entire Irish sporting mythology built around the single, sole victory by an Irish team over New Zealand. Munster, Thomond Park, 1978. It had a special name among all Irish sporting events, one that summed up the mystique and brilliance and reverence with which the All Black tag was held - "Alone It Stands". It built the myth of Munster that endures to this day. Even though Leinster are by far the better team at the moment, there is something inherently culchie about being a Munster supporter you could envision Moss or Gaillimh or the Bull eating a feed of bacon and cabbage after beating Leinster and cutting turf. No offence to the urbanite crathurs, but Drico and the boys would be eating lobster rolls at the same time. Leinster was D4 basically. Munster was Limerick tenements. Of course it's not fair, but there is no onus on parochial bias or supporter perception for 'fair'.


The All Blacks lived on a different level. No team in any sport could match the aura of the All Blacks. You could pick any player from any generation and he would walk easily onto any other rugby team on the planet – and make them better. Occasionally an exceptional name would cling to the memory, but mostly the All Blacks were a collective entity of excellence, almost a hive mind. Moreover they were mostly small farmers and labourers like ourselves.

Ireland beating the All Blacks. Do not even begin to tell me about Chicago Field. Ireland went into paroxysms of joy over a crudely fashioned win in a marketing exercise (despite teasers, the US is refusing to take rugby's bait and it is the US who decides whether you really are a global sport – they have the money) that I honestly found embarrassing at the time. That was a lame duck affair where the All Blacks were plainly exhausted taking the field.

I wasn't all that blown away by the 2018 win over them, either. Yes, it was an indication that the All Blacks were mortals (albeit exceptional mortals). The professional era had narrowed the gaps, but not erased them.

Let's not get too carried away here, alright? It was an Autumn friendly, which has always had zero relevance to Ireland's fate in the real (yes, I said it, go away with your guff about 'Tests') competitions. The fact that Ireland have three New Zealand natives (Lowe, Gibson-Park, and Aki) on the squad also gives me an uneasy feeling. Rugby has an inherent contradiction there.

But this one had a slightly different feel to a media-fest at a quiet time of year. New Zealand were forewarned for this one. Ireland are hunting. Were they a little bit complacent? Because in their shoes, I'd have smiled at the notion.

And stopped smiling fast. Ringrose with a fast pass instead of the usual vain bash forward. Keenan breaking forward – it sent a message. No trepidation. Ireland were going for it.

Purple jerseys. I will forbear to comment, on the basis that small children might be reading this. Purple jerseys. No.

Not that I was immediately sitting up or anything. Yeah, yeah, throw shapes until they toss a torpedo, we've all seen this before, was my basic premise at that stage.

Pressure on Savea by Doris and Furlong. He didn't shake them off. I'm not sure New Zealand were really prepared for Ireland to come at them fast and hard.

Oh dear. Ireland crumbling a bit. Crossfield pass to Will Furlong and the All Blacks are steamrolling onto our line....except that they make a hames of it and Ronan Kelliher is snapping it up to clear.

Late hit on Sexton. This is my massive worrying. Sexton is in the thick of things as usual, and frankly these days any slight contact on him makes me worry. That's a massive, massive issue for Ireland.

What the – try for Ireland. Essentially, bundle it onto the right corner – the All Blacks can't live with our power, that's hugely significant – and Keenen spins it all the way across. James Lowe – I've loved the extra dimension he gives our attack, even if I am aware of his defensive frailties – goes over. Brilliant by Ireland, especially the sheer speed of the decision-making involved....but to be honest, that was very soft by the All Blacks. Heads will roll on that one, and should.

A difficult conversion is just wide. Jordie Barrett nails an All Blacks penalty. The game has settled into a fast rhythm now – and Ireland are the ones dictating the play. Our hard hitters are simply hitting them harder. Nothing at all wrong with it; that's rugby. Doris will get and deserve huge praise, but for me Furlong, Ringrose, and Henderson....loveable monsters. Ireland are doing most of the attacking, but not troubling the scoreboard. That's okay; rugby is about the grind as well.

Johnny Sexton gone off. Look, for me it has a certain inevitability about it these days.

Ireland try as Tadhg Furlong goes over....no. Ruled out.

Ah jaysus! After all that hard work, Ireland cough up the simplest of tries. Bloody.....I'm raging. I was relatively easy-going initially but Ireland's performance until now had got me going. Then to just hand them an invitation like that. I'm raging now.

Half-time. New Zealand 10 Ireland 5. We battered them. We absolutely wiped them out. I later find out that we had 70% of possession in the first half and had forced New Zealand into 144 tackles and only made 37 (thank you Donal Lenihan, one of those '78 Munster heroes). It felt like it. Only we trail by double scores. Welcome to the All Blacks world. Blast it anyway. If an Irishman was carrying the tablets down from Mount Sinai, he's drop them along the way.

You know what's going to happen now. We all do. The All Blacks have taken Ireland's battering, absorbed, picked their moment, and neatly picked us off. They'll jab us now all through the second half, pick off a couple of holes, stretch us wider and wider, and kill us off like caped matadors in the last ten minutes. And "Brave Ireland Fall Short" will be the headlines. Same as always. Just once, I'd like Ireland not to bother with 'brave'. Imagine if they could actually be 'good' instead. Imagine if the All Blacks feared us instead of admiring our pluck? Ah well. Sure, we beat Japan.

Except Ireland, for once, aren't reading the usual script. Ireland's first try was well-executed but as much about a wide open defence as anything else. This one wasn't – Ronan Kelliher finishes off a move that had score written on it right from the start. Level pegging. Great work by Henderson. He departs – another warrior who probably shouldn't see the World Cup. Beirne on, which is fine.

Oh wow. Caelan Doris, like James Ryan or Keith Earls, was painted as the wunderkind of Irish rugby before he actually did anything wonderful (Irish soccer has the same failing). Here he lives up to the bill. Kelliher's try was a crafted thing of beauty. This is a flash of

inspirational genius. You aren't meant to sidestep an entire team of this quality, and then he's fast enough to power over. New Zealand let him waltz through when they had bodies available and paid a big price. You know who this reminds me of? Mike Gibson (alright, Brian O'Driscoll; of course I never saw the great Gibson play).

Johnny converts. Play resumes and Ireland go just as fast and hard at their counterparts. Johnny puts over a hand enough penalty. New Zealand are battling, but there's something unconvincing about them. Every decision is orthodox. Tackles are merely honest rather than emphatic. Whereas Ireland seem to be relishing the hits. Long time to go, though.

Ouch. Will Jordan goes over. Be fair, that was greatness in itself. It looked simple, but that was perfect execution, especially that lovely little chip over Keenan. Very hard to stop. Simple conversion, and three points in it. 20-17. It's not enough of a lead. Not against the All Blacks. And now it matters to me. This is no longer the Irish team that I'm watching. This is my Irish team now.

Johnny gone. Arrah, he lasted 65 minutes. Nowadays, that's as much and a bit more than I'd be expecting from our adopted Kerryman. Joey Carbery on and immediately slots a penalty. Good. At least force them into a try to win it; to lose this on penalties would be anticlimactic.

Oooh, we were lucky enough. Try disallowed for a forward pass. New Zealand penalty, three points in it again. Check the history; New Zealand always win the tight finishes against Ireland. History si hammering in my ear.

Joey Carbery with a penalty, but it's too long. I'd fancy O'Gara for this, and Sexton would have a decent chance (Johnny's better in open play, but O'Gara was the more reliable kicker), but Carbery? Yup, straight over. Never any doubts, thinks I, wiping sweat from my brow.

Clock almost run down now. Ireland penalty. I'm actually afraid to hope. I'm just looking at Ireland and thinking all about the restart. Not the penalty. I couldn't care less about the penalty. The restart, lads, mind the restart. They'll come swarming down the field. Be ready, lads, the restart....

Bugger the restart. Carbery nails it coolly and calmly (much cooler and calmer than I am right now). 29-20.

They are still the All Blacks. They will still go in to the World Cup among the tournament

favourites as per birthright. But Ireland are Ireland, and we have just beaten them fair and square.

#### Ladies: Ireland 20 USA 10

The build-up to the game was disrupted by a media storm when Women's Director of Rugby Anthony Eddy (who wasn't a vocal supporter of womens' rugby before his surprising appointment to the post) issued statements that the financial support for womens' rugby in Ireland was sufficient. He was rapidly called out on that, most vocally by Cliodhna Foley, but also by Jenny Murphy and Claire Molloy. Ireland captain Ciara Griffin spoke with dignified moderation.....and took the Director to school. In fairness to Eddy, he apologised fully. The IRFU performed their usual ostrich defence of pretending the whole thing happened - it would be great if it wasn't just people involved in womens' rugby who defended it from unjust accusations like this. Supposedly 2020 was the was the year of womens' sports - yeah, I'd say let's run that one again, and do it properly this time.

Both sides were guilty of basic errors early on. In fact it too 25 minutes before the deadlock was broken, and that was through individual brilliance yet again by the phenomenal Beibhinn Parsons after a great crossfield kick by Stacey Flood. The US equalise soon after - a very decent try. Just before half-time Ireland's lineout maul causes huge problems for the US and Leah Lyons drives over. Stacey slots the conversion and Ireland go in at half-time with a 12-5 lead.

The US are limited enough, to be honest, but they score a great try on the restart. 12-10. The US lose a player to a yellow card, though, and Ireland use the extra space well, the aforementioned Cliodhna Foley leading the drive forward before releasing Lindsey Peat in space to go over. This was Lindsey's last appearance in an Irish jersey, some player. Ireland finish it off with a penalty. Good win, albeit over poor enough opposition.

More importantly, point made.

This was Ciara Griffin's last appearance for Ireland as well as Lindsey Peat's. They were two great players. Ciara was always one of the toughest players out there while simultaneously one of the game's greatest ambassadors. The Ballymac native has always done us proud as she captained her country.

#### World Player of the Year

No Irish player on the four man list, God be with the days. Australia's Michael Hooper and Samu

Kerevi, France's Antoine Dupont, and England's Maro Itoje will be battling it out for the honour. Itoje, great as he is, isn't going to win it. As exciting as Dupont is - and there are shades of Lomu, albeit without the incredible physicality, about the Frenchman - France simply haven't lit enough fires. I'd be going for Hooper - he has basically been man of the match in almost every game of Australia's superb season.

#### SOCCER

It has also been a wonderful week for Irish soccer - and that's a sentence I honestly thought I would never write again. For most of the past five years, a good week was one where no scandals were unearthed. Stephen Kenny basically picked up a poisoned chalice when he effectively inherited the Irish manager position, one where supporters and media still had expectations matching those of a Charlton era whose echoes had long since faded, while the reality was an abysmal failure of administration and development meant that it wasn't so much crows coming home to roost as vultures picking over a dead carcass.

Until now. At long last, there are green shoots in the ground at international level.

Ireland 0 Portugal 0

We've been spoilt by the riches of the Premiership. Being honest, the international game is a poor substitute in quality, and this was very much a case in point. It wasn't a great game by any means - Portugal resting a fair few stars for the group decider against Serbia didn't help. It was huff, puff, and work non-stop....and Ireland was comfortable doing that. But there were indications. We were still fairly toothless up front - strikers are a premium resource in world soccer, and frankly, no-one's even looking at what we've got.

Portugal, on the other, have arguably the best in the world right now. Cristiano Ronaldo is unquestionably brilliant. He is polished, charming....and deadly. Shane Duffy, on the other hand, has never been described as a smooth operator. He isn't even so much rough diamond as rough charcoal in world terms. But, frankly, he's in Ronaldo's face non-stop. Legally - close to the border a few times, but legally, and absolutely ruthlessly. That wouldn't bother Ronaldo normally, he's far too good and operates at far too high a level to be bothered by this kind of attention. The lack of any real support was what frustrated the superstar, and he kept his composure well under provocation (good provocation - well done Duffy!). But

Portugal aren't fluent or fluid with the ball. It's a stop-gap game, and Ireland are liking it.

Much, much more pertinently, Stephen Kenny is living up to his promise of having Irish players control the ball and look to play simple passes out of trouble. Before, it would have been a case of survive whatever the likes of Portugal could throw at us and belt the ball straight back to them as soon as possible.

Now we are holding possession and trying - not really succeeding - but trying to have a go. Portugal dominated the ball but if anything, Ireland had fractionally the better of the chances. Don't mind the furore over that late goal – the whistle was long gone.

The truth is that the biggest headlines after the game was about Ronaldo giving his jersey to an little girl – fair play to him, but front page news headlines? Really? Ah well, we've had much worse headlines in our recent past.

Ireland 3 Luxembourg 0

This one was actually far more important to me. Holding one of the big teams to a scoreless draw has always been a possibility for every Irish team. We've always been defensively-minded (it's not like the alternative was popping up regularly as an option!) and we work very hard. We are natural spoilers, not natural creators. We relish the underdog bite-yere-kneecaps-if-wehave-to attitude.

The real measure of us is how we do when we are favourites. We had been shown up brutally already on several occasions in this campaign when we were the ones expected to score goals. I don't need us to be world beaters. But could we be somebody-beaters?

I disapproved of those gawkish purple jerseys by the Irish rugby team. Are ye that hard up for money? But you are a lot more likely to see Kate Moss jigging her way down some catwalk wearing one of them purple yokes than anyone willingly wearing one of those orange monstrosities that the Irish soccer team togged out in. In all fairness, it's even worse than the awful supposedly-gold pallid brown away jerseys that Kerry embarrassingly sported recently. Away is right - throw them very far away, and these orange things with them.

Oabene set the tone early on with a direct charge straight down the wing that almost led to a goal. Non hesitation, no analysing options, he just saw space and went for it. Good. Ogbene looks limited to me, but he has pace and I'm fine with direct. Mind you, Bazunu had to be sharp to turn away a deflection of Josh Cullen (Kenny's best find in terms of new players).

Ireland are the better side here. For the first time in a long, long, long time, we actually dominate possession. Moreover, in keeping with Kenny's philosophy, we are retaining it. We are using the ball.

The trouble for me is that same old, same old. Where are the goals, lads? I like the play, but so far there's as much tangible reward as we ever got from our hoof-and-hope approach. In fact, they score first, only for it to be disallowed for a foul in the build-up.

At last. A poor header clear of a free kick won by Jason Knight, and there's Duffy to head home. Our central defender....and main goalscorer. Not a great sign for our future, to be honest.

Thankfully, that seems to give Ireland confidence and forces Luxembourg to chase it. Knight sets up Ogbene for our second and there's still time for Knight to set up Robinson for a simple finish.

I wouldn't exactly be getting carried away. We are an awful long way away from the force we were. This was a very limited Luxembourg in a game that effectively meant nothing.

Still, Kenny has taken us very far forward from the midden we were in. It's something.

# FOCUS ON BEECH HEDGING

Beech Hedging is an ideal hedging plant for most situations, because of its tolerance of a wide range of soil conditions including well drained soils, soils prone to draughts and soils that can get waterlogged due to heavy down pours of rain.

Even though the beech is deciduous, when it is grown as hedging and is trimmed regularly around August/ September the brown leaves will usually be retained throughout most of the winter.

Beech also comes with a purple leaf - copper beech. Copper beach is best planted in a sunny position to keep its leaf colour where as the green retains its colour better if planted in partial shade.

If you can - it is best to plant your beech hedge bare rooted as it will probably establish that bit quicker, so you have plenty of time from now until the end of March to get planting.





# KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

### **KYR: PASSPORT APPLICATIONS**

**Question:** I noticed recently that my Passport will expire shortly. Are passport applications being processed at the moment?

**Answer:** Yes, the passport office is currently processing passport applications. Passport Online is open to all applicants. The Passport Service is continuing to process Passport Online applications as a priority. Applying online is the fastest way of getting your passport. You can track the progress of your passport online. In general, adult renewals when all the information on your passport is the same as your previous passport are processed within 10 working days.

The processing of Passport Express applications resumed on 19 July 2021 but these paper applications take significantly longer for most applicants. The estimated turnaround time is 8 weeks but this is not a service guarantee and you should not book flights until you have your passport

It is important to note that If you have already submitted a paper application, you cannot apply online.

In the case of an emergency situation such as the death or serious illness of an immediate family member, or for emergency medical treatment of the applicant, you should contact the Passport Service's Customer Service Hub. Further information will be requested by the Passport Service including verifiable proof of emergency.

Updates on services and the latest turnaround times are available on the Passport Service's website https://www.dfa.ie/passports/

**Question:** My partner is applying for a Passport for the first time. Can this be done on-line?

**Answer:** Passport Online is open to all applicants. However, it is important to note that first time applications are complex and require additional time to process. This is because the Passport Office have to verify all documents submitted and to ensure the identity of the applicant. These applications can take up to 40 working days to process.

# BULLYING

Bullying is defined as the tendency of individuals or groups to use persistent aggressive or unreasonable behavior against an individual. It can take different forms including physical, verbal, cyber, social and mental bullying.

There is a common misbelief that the victim of bullying somehow brings bullying on themselves. Some victims wrongly believe that if they were stronger or different in some way then they wouldn't be bullied. But I cannot stress strongly enough that anyone can be a target of bullying and the responsibility for bullying always lies with the bully. There are many reasons why people are targeted by bullies and these can vary from personality characteristics to personal vulnerabilities. People can be targeted by bullies because of physical features, an illness or disability, sexual orientation religious or cultural beliefs or belonging to a particular racial group.

Bullies often bully as a means to exert power over others and to make themselves feel better. They are most likely doing it as a way to deal with their own problems, insecurities and low self-esteem. And not because of anything you've done. No one deserves to be bullied and it should not go unchallenged. Dealing with bullying can be tough yet it is really important to do something about it.

If you are being bullied — verbally, physically, socially, psychologically or online — telling someone about it and seeking advice can help. There is nothing weak about reporting a bully or getting advice and just confiding in someone can help to lighten your load. If you don't feel you can talk about it out loud or face to face, then write it down in a letter or an email. Many bullies want attention so ignoring them or walking away is your best bet. Be assertive and confident, adopt a 'Don't mess with me attitude' (even if you are trembling inside). It is important to not take anything bullies say to heart. Show them that their words have no effect on you. Some bullies may be jealous of you because of your success or popularity — so be proud of who you are.


Welcome back dear reader ....Jesus said to them 'behold I give you the authority to trample on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy, and nothing shall by any means hurt you.
