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



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Charity Walk & A Set Dance with Sam for Kerry Mountain Rescue

Walking at Christmas time is a lovely tradition in Kerry, well known fundraiser and Musician Derry Healy, James Cahill and crew are fundraising for Kerry Mountain Rescue Team on Saturday, December 27th, 2025. They are organising a charity 'fun day', trekking the 17 km trail of the 'Old Kenmare Road' with none other than that well known piece of silver 'Sam Maguire'.

The trek, inspired by Killarney Man, James Cahill, who says he owes his life to Kerry Mountain Rescue Team following an horrendous fall on Bothar na Gíge (the Zig Zags) while descending Carrauntoohil in July 2016. James is so grateful for the courageous team for saving his life and he wants to give back to the team. James was treated at the scene by KMRT and airlifted to Kerry University Hospital by ICG Rescue 115. James sustained horrific injuries that left him paralysed on his right side. That followed several months of treatment at the National



Rehabilitation Hospital in Dún Laoghaire, with constant support from his wife Carmel and their families

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

GREENWAYS, RAILWAYS AND CABLE CARS

Budget 2026 will see record spending across Kerry. And a few good news stories are teeing things up. The opening of the first leg - albeit the least scenic - of the South Kerry Greenway takes place this weekend. It's about time the Greenway had a name. Like others I know, I would like to see this called the Daniel O'Connell Greenway. If the greenway down to Cahersiveen is to liberate south Kerry then who better to name it after than the Liberator?

The greenway has been a mixed experience. It has taken far too long and we won't be out of it for 40 million euro. It is some years since I suggested we should build a light rail alongside it. It would not have cost more and there would have been half the hassle.

Replacing the railway seemed a bit far-fetched when I floated it ten years ago. But I see now where in Sligo the rail line which was earmarked for a greenway is being looked at for future use as a railway - probably alongside the greenway.

Meanwhile another pet suggestion of mine, a cable car from Mangerton so we don't have to drive, has been taken up by Paris of all places. The Paris urban cable car has just opened and is letting people "soar over the traffic" and the



grid lock. It is Europe's longest urban cable car. The new line, the first in the French capital, connects Créteil to Villeneuve-Saint-Georges in the city's south-eastern suburbs.

The three-mile route cost €138m to build and was inaugurated on Saturday. (So far we have spent Euro 22 million on the south Kerry Greenway and there's only one tenth of it open!) The Paris cable car 's 105 "gondolas" are expected to carry more than 11,000 passengers a day, each holding a maximum of 10 people, the Telegraph reported.

"Historically used in rugged mountain terrain, cable cars are increasingly built to connect urban neighbourhoods," it points out.

Now there's a thought for the budget: money to be set aside for a cable car for urban Killarney to allow us "soar" over the traffic. The new line from Aghadoe to soar over the Mission Road. So far we have spent around Euro 22 million on the south Kerry Greenway and there's only one tenth of it open. The cable car like bringing back the railway may not be so far-fetched in a year or two!

RUDOLF AND CHRISTMAS CARDS AND ALL THAT

Well, I bet you Santa is exhausted and he hasn't attempted the hill up to Mangerton yet.

There are so many visits by him to Killarney the past few weeks even the adults are questioning how he is appearing everywhere. And sometimes everywhere at once. The answer, of course, is "Santa is Santa". Adults forget that they can't understand everything, they don't know everything. They can't be right all the time either.

Santa has unlimited powers of appearance. And that's an end to it. However, a few children I know would like to see Rudolf "deputising" here and there. Just to give Santa a break. (Children are always more "sensible" than adults.)

Sometimes Santa's coat is a bit ragged - having to "hare" in and out of bushes and the Scots Pine in Muckross and the oaks and furze in Tomies mountain to meet so many venues on the same day. Whereas Rudolf's fur coat along with his nose is always shiny, and everyone knows that.

Rudolf stopping in the many places around Killarney Santa has to bilocate towards would create plenty of excitement. Moreover as a deer he would be familiar but at the same time different to the organic kind, so to speak.

It is easy for children to relate to deer in this town of Killarney.

However the real Rudolf with the real glowing red nose can't be mistaken for anything local either.

Meanwhile let's hope Ireland won't turn out to be like the postal system in Denmark. This is the last year people will be able to send Christmas cards to each other in Denmark. From the end of the year the postal service in Denmark will carry only parcels. It has been around since 1624. The red boxes are being removed and only businesses will send letters anymore. That's because of the growth of e-mail, but probably too because people aren't bothered to take time to think too much, or write too much, anymore. Mind you, An Post "geometric" stamps this year are no great shakes and are far too abstract. They are also too big. Are they trying to be not too Christian or something?

Let's hope we at least hang onto the post for another while. Wishing all readers many Christmas Cards!

LIGHT UP IN THE DARK PEDESTRIANS AND CYCLISTS AND E-SCOOTER RIDERS, PLEASE

Probably the most significant campaign this year by Kerry County Council, to light up in the dark, has been launched. High visibility vests are being handed out in rural communities this Christmas period to tackle what the council says is a spike in road users walking and cycling in dark clothing in rural areas. We know this all too well in Killarney. As ClIr Marie Moloney told


We know this all too well in Killarney. As Cllr Marie Moloney told the December meeting: "There isn't one of us here that hasn't had a near miss with a pedestrian in dark clothes."

The urban lighting in Killarney is terrible, by the way. Something for the New Year for our officials and councillors, perhaps? Countess Road, and Muckross Road are particularly poorly lit and bleak. Young men particularly, and children are cycling in the near dark clad head to toe in black and on black bikes. Only this Tuesday night a teenage girl all in black was barely visible on her bike by the old Kerry Mineral Waters on the Muckross Road.

I see it every evening. A motion by Cllr Charlie Farrelly from Castleisland Municipal District wants Transport Minister Darragh O'Brien to make it "mandatory" for pedestrians and cyclists to wear a hg viz garment when using the public road between the hours of darkness and sunlight.

His move was unanimously supported and developed on the suggestion by Tralee's Councillor Anne O'Sullivan to include wearing bright hi viz 24 hours a day. The request to wear mandatory high-viz is d also to include e-scooters, on a suggestion by Cllr Paul Daly.

Charlie is right when he says he has little confidence in the Road Safety Authority - they should already have moved on this. Hopefully the Department of Transport will heed the Kerry request and make it mandatory.



Protecting capacity at UHK by understanding your discharge options

The HSE South West 'Caring for Kerry' public awareness campaign continues this week with a reminder that it's more important than ever during winter months to protect capacity at University Hospital Kerry

Every hour in a bed at UHK is a precious resource, and hospital manager Mary Fitzgerald today reminded the public that it is important to understand all discharge options as soon as they are offered.

"We are asking everyone to work with our hardworking teams planning discharge and consider all your options. Patients will only be discharged from UHK to their home or to further care when it is medically appropriate to do so. If someone resists to move on from a bed at UHK when the acute phase of their treatment is finished, it means that someone else could face a delay in accessing care."

Ms Fitzgerald said that UHK has a new process in place to keep patients moving through the system, and asked for all patients to work with the team when they are planning for your discharge.

"Our healthcare teams in UHK and beyond are working with patients and the public to make sure everyone gets the Right Care, in the Right Place, at the Right Time, delivering on our SláinteCare objectives. The public can help by engaging with all options for discharge when they are offered."


The options you might be offered when it is time to leave UHK:

A transfer to another facility, such as Mallow General Hospital.

A short-term placement in a Community Hospital. This is may be for rehabilitation or if someone requires a further short period of care that is not acute.

A short-term placement in a nursing home.

Community Intervention Team visits - this is when a person requires intravenous drugs but they can be administered in their home.



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
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

St Brendan's College continued its long tradition of supporting the Kerry Hospice Foundation and the initiative once again generated strong participation and goodwill throughout the college.






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MANY ROAD USERS IN THE DARK ON ROAD SAFETY



Kerry County Council is reporting a notable increase in the number of people who are using the road at times of low light and in the dark without wearing any visible or luminous items like a 'hi-viz' vest or an armband.

To help raise awareness about the issue and to improve road safety and visibility among road users, Kerry County Council has begun issuing hivisibility vests to road users in rural parts of the county. On Saturday night last, the Council distributed vests to locals at Ballymacelligott.

Kerry County Council Road Safety Officer Declan Keogh said: 'It is worrying to note an increase in reports of people not being visible on the road while out walking, cycling or on a scooter.

'A motorist may come upon a pedestrian, a cyclist, or a scooter at the last second, and that's when it's too late to react and avoid a tragedy. I would appeal to anyone using the road to make yourself visible to motorists by wear high visibility clothing.

'Being visible on the road is essential to ensure the safety of vulnerable road users and motorists alike. By wearing a simple 'hi viz' vest, an armband or even carrying a torch while walking can make all the difference and will help save lives.'

The Road Safety Authority is working with Kerry County Council to promote road safety and the Council received a supply of high visibility vests recently which will be distributed to road users in rural areas and to promote a road safety message.

14 White-Tailed Eagles Perch as Red Stags Bellow

in Killarney's Black Valley

In Gearhameen, Killarney, Genie Tangney recalls a night when two red stags bellowed all night and another when 14 white-tailed eagles perched on his family farm. Holding his nine-month-old granddaughter, Roisin Mary, Tangney guided Frank Lewis through his special places in the Black Valley for a Radio Kerry feature airing Saturday, December 27, 9–11am.

Genie Tangney and Dux O'Donoghue of Gap of Dunloe Traditional Boat Tours shared stories of the area's past,from "Saltauns" returning from Australia with otter traps to the challenges of 1970s salmon fishing. They also recalled local legends, including a man firing a gable-sized rock across Purple Mountain, and the long history of tourism, with visitors taking jaunting car, pony, and boat trips for 278 years.

Wildlife remains central to the valley's charm. Tangney pointed out salmon shaping riverbeds, rare Ring Ouzels, and a pair of Whooper Swans flying over Cloghernoosh Lake, highlighting the beauty and diversity of Killarney's natural world.

Tangney's deep connection to Killarney's landscapes, wildlife, and history comes alive in his stories, offering a vivid glimpse of the Black Valley's past and present.

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Winter Skin Problems Eczema, Psoriasis and Dry Skin Explained

During the colder months, it is very common to notice changes in your skin. Many people experience dryness, itching or flare-ups of existing skin conditions in winter. Cold outdoor air, warm indoor heating and frequent hot showers can all remove moisture from the skin and weaken its natural protective barrier.

Understanding why this happens, and knowing how to care for your skin, can help reduce discomfort.

Dry Skin

Dry skin is extremely common in winter, even if you usually have healthy skin. You may notice tightness, flaking, itching or cracking, particularly on the hands, arms and legs.

Helpful tips include:

- · Use a gentle cleanser or soap substitute
- Apply a rich moisturiser once or twice daily, especially after showering
- · Keep showers short and warm rather than hot
- · Wear gloves outdoors and when cleaning

If skin becomes cracked, red or starts bleeding, it should be checked, as broken skin can become infected.

Eczema

Eczema often worsens in winter and causes itchy, red and inflamed patches of skin. Scratching can make symptoms worse and slow healing.

Treatment usually involves:

- · Regular moisturising, even when the skin looks settled
- · Avoiding scented soaps and skincare products
- · Using prescribed creams correctly during flare-ups
- Seeking treatment if the skin becomes painful, crusted or weeny

Both children and adults can be affected, and treatment is tailored to the individual.

Psoriasis

Psoriasis causes thick, scaly patches of skin, commonly on the elbows, knees, scalp and lower back. Reduced daylight and winter stress can trigger flare-ups.

Treatment may include medicated creams, scalp treatments, vitamin D-based products or referral to a specialist if symptoms are more severe.

When to seek medical advice

- · Itching that affects sleep
- · Cracked, bleeding or infected skin
- · Symptoms not improving with pharmacy treatments
- Sudden or widespread rashes

Skin conditions are common and very treatable. Getting advice early can make a big difference, especially during winter.



A Lens on Old Killarney

The Legacy of Photographer Louis Anthony

A remarkable collection of vintage Killarney postcards by the late photographer Louis Anthony has recently been shared with the community by Pat Moriarty, whose mother, Maureen Moriarty (nee O'Callaghan) originally from Aglish, once worked alongside Anthony at his studio on High Street.

Before the turn of the century, photography in Killarney was a modest pursuit. That changed in 1904, when Louis Anthony, a native of Alsace-Lorraine, arrived in the town. Initially serving as chef at the Royal Victoria Hotel, Anthony worked amid the splendour of an old-world ballroom, where noblemen and ladies waltzed to the timeless

music of Johann Strauss.

He later opened a guest house on Main Street, where photography began as a part-time passion before growing into a full-time profession. Establishing his High Street studio, Anthony transformed how photography was practised in the region.

During the tourist season, he would travel daily to the Gap of Dunloe first by pony and trap, then by bicycle, and eventually by motor car capturing the beauty of Killarney's landscape. After developing his prints, he would deliver them to Ross Castle just in time for visitors returning by boat from The Gap. His innovation and dedication revolutionised local photography.

Anthony's studio became the backdrop for countless milestones First Communions, Confirmations, weddings, and portraits taken before emigration. Known for his kindness, professionalism, and patience, he made each sitter feel at ease, ensuring every portrait carried a personal touch.

When Louis Anthony passed away in November 1933, he left behind not only an artistic legacy but also a priceless visual record of early 20th-century Killarney. His colour photo-views of the town and its surrounding scenery are now considered rare antiques, treasured reminders of a bygone era and a man whose work helped shape the visual memory of Killarney.






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

Tralee Dynamos - The Heroes Of 1967

In the years before the Kerry District League was formally established, one Tralee side etched its name into local sporting folklore. The Tralee Dynamos of 1967 captured the imagination of the town when they stormed through the West Limerick Desmond League and lifted the coveted Murphy Cup, an achievement still fondly remembered today.

Their finest hour came in the Low Field before a huge crowd, where they faced a formidable Askeaton side known widely as "The All Blacks." In a gripping final, the decisive goal came from Brian McCarthy, a Dublin native, now living in Killarney, whose prolific scoring record left a lasting mark on the club. Working at the Brandon Hotel at the time, McCarthy quickly became a fan favourite, renowned for his speed, instinct, and natural finishing ability.

The victorious Dynamos squad featured a blend of hard workers, talented playmakers, and determined defenders. The lineup for the final included: Tommy Conroy, Gerald "Clobber" Dynamos, Francie Roche, Willie Fitzgibbons, Killarney man Patsy Flaherty, John E. Barrett, Frank Hennessy, Sean Hobbert, Denis Foley, Jimmy (Wa)



O'Connor, Noel Conroy, Brian McCarthy, Tim Counihan, Jery Ryan, Peter (Gordon) Comerford, and Mossie "Neddo" Fitzgerald.

A team photograph from the period shows the squad proudly gathered, flanked by local mentors and supporters, many of whom helped shape an era of communitydriven football. Under the guidance of Tom Horgan and bolstered by the passion of their followers, the Dynamos carved out a legacy that still resonates with older supporters of the game.

More than half a century later, the triumph of the 1967 Tralee Dynamos remains a cherished chapter in Kerry's sporting history.







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MEDICAL CARD QUALIFICATION

Recent reports that an incremental rise in the weekly Old Age Pension had the affect of putting some recipients over the qualifying income threshold and these people then had their Medical Cards immediately cancelled, sounds like a joke according to TD Michael Cahill, who is the Fianna Fáil Party Spokesman for Older People.

"Anyone would be forgiven for thinking when told an incremental rise in their Old Age Pension caused the cancellation of their Medical Card, that they were the victims of an April Fools joke. But apparently that is the case and that kind of anomaly must be put straight as soon as possible" stated the Kerry TD.


"I have called upon the Minister for Public Expenditure to put a system in place whereby any incremental rise in the Old Age Pension is matched by a similar rise in the qualifying income for the Medical Card. It cannot be allowed to continue that any rise in the Old Age Pension, the right to which has been earned over a lifetime, should be the cause of disqualifying somebody close to the threshold from owning a Medical Card" said Deputy Cahill.

"I have also contacted the Minister for Health in regards to this most urgent matter and I will also be raising it at the Joint Committee on Health which I am a member. This is so disappointing especially with the recent controversy in regards to the Blister Packs" stated the Rossbeigh based TD.

"When somebody qualifies for both the Old Age Pension and the Medical Card, I honestly believe that unless their circumstances receive an enormous additional increase in income, they should continue to qualify for them" added Michael Cahill TD.

AVAILABILITY OF BLISTER PACKS

There can be dangerous outcomes for people taking numerous medications daily, because of the confusion that can arise between the different tablets, the numbers of them prescribed and at which time of the day each should be taken and older people especially and their Carers are more vulnerable than most to this, according to the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Older People and Tourism, Michael Cahill TD.



Service Executive (HSE) and the Department for Health would liaise with representatives of Irish Pharmacists to put a system in place where our older citizens can avail of this service at no charge.

"People of any age can be confused by the sheer numbers of pills prescribed and there is a severe danger of harm involved if somebody forgets to take their medication or takes too many. There is a Blister Pack service available in most pharmacies, where the medications are issued



in separate daily doses as prescribed, making it easier to keep track of what has or has not been taken" stated Deputy Cahill.

"Some Pharmacies need to charge for the service, as not all are equipped with automated prescribing systems and it would be a shame if every older patient could not avail of it due to the cost. I have been contacted by constituents from all corners of the county, from West Kerry, Castleisland, Kenmare, Killorglin, Waterville, Tralee,

Killarney and East Kerry and so on, in regards to this matter. Many have confirmed to both my Secretary and I that they are now being charged E30 per month for this service and this is to increase to E50 per month in many pharmacies from January and I am calling on the Minster for Health, Jennifer Carroll MacNeill to put the wheels in motion to deliver this excellent service free of charge to patients, especially our older citizens" added Michael Cahill TD.

Minister Foley welcomes over €85,000 in funding for animal welfare groups in Kerry

The animal welfare organisations in Kerry which will benefit from the funding are Animal Help Net Kerry (\in 30,000), Kerry Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (\in 20,188), Kenmare Locality Animal Welfare Society (\in 20,000) and (Homes for Unwanted Greyhounds in Kerry (\in 15,000).

Minister Foley said:This funding is a recognition of the great work done by staff and volunteers in these organisations to support the rehousing and care of animals in Kerry and promote awareness about animal welfare."



Minister Foley welcomes minor works grants and ICT grants worth €2.2 million for Kerry schools

Minister for Children, Disability and Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed confirmation of the payment of minor works grants and ICT grants worth €2.2 million for Kerry schools.

Minor works grants worth €1.1 million are being paid this month to primary, post-primary and special schools in Kerry for the forthcoming 2026/2027 school year while Kerry schools will also receive €1.1 million in ICT grants for the current 2025/2026 school year.

Minister Foley said: "As Minister for Children, I welcome €2.2 million in funding for Kerry Schools. The €1.1 million in ICT funding will continue to support our schools to harness technology and improve teaching and learning in the classroom. The €1.1 million minor works grant is also an important resource for the management and upkeep of school buildings in Kerry."

Minister Foley welcomes €3 million in funding for Kerry ETB

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry T.D Norma Foley has welcomed confirmation of €3 million in infrastructure funding for Kerry ETB. The funding will go towards energy efficiency measures, ongoing capital investment and the provision of specialist equipment.

The midwinter feast, stretched and twisted by human imagination to include yule logs and mistletoe and various tributes to Odin and his ilk, the green-robed Turkish Saint Nicholas and the dowries he dropped down the chimney, plus the Dutch Sinder Klaas and his Black Peter assistants, Norwegians hiding their rooms from witches, Iceland's Gryla and her troll-like children and of course, the Yule Cat....


A lot of people believe the urban myth that Santa Claus was invented by Coca Cola to promote their product as a winter drink. Santa predates that by several centuries, but they certainly did the first widely popular depictions of the portly bearded humorist in his horse-drawn carriage (reindeer, like turkey instead of goose, became part of the popular stories afterwards). His sleigh's ability to fly has been confirmed by radar, but no-one has successfully captured him on film. Hard lad to pin down. Eyewitness accounts do confirm the description.

Santa takes care of the presents for the small ones, as is right and proper. But most of the adults I know wouldn't exactly be featuring too highly on the 'nice' list (look, ye know who ye are – ye say nothing and I'll say nothing). What are you going to get your loved ones this Christmas? Okay, for people like me, it depends what the petrol station is selling late on Christmas Eve, but for those of you who are more organised, a sports book is pretty much always a safe option.

That's if she hasn't already dropped loads of hints. And I bet that she has, and you weren't listening.

Ó Sé: A Kerry Family A Football Dynasty

honestly didn't have too much hope for this one. And that may sound harsh, given that I've met Marc on several occasions and found him to be a complete gentleman. But Darragh Ó Sé brought out a book, 'Darragh: My Story' ghostwritten by Ewan McKenna, and Tomás brought out a book, 'The White Heat', ghostwritten by Michael Moynihan.

I have both books at home. And....how do I put this? You are welcome to borrow them at any time, and you needn't be in a hurry returning them.

Marc's book is different, it really is. For one thing, it is him looking back on his growing days and then his career as a Kerry footballer. It's far more mature and reflective than either of his brothers. It's not him narrating his impressions at the time of events; it's a grown man re-assessing those events from a more adult perspective. Quite simply, this book has a genuine depth (I'm not claiming that it's profound; it isn't) that his brothers' efforts didn't reach.

His childhood resonated with me more than the football – I especially love when he talks about how much he and his brothers enjoyed travelling on top of the hay bales. That's a favorite memory for a lot of Irish children, myself among them.

I would disagree with a few of his memories of games. He twice references the ungiven foul on Peter Crowley in the 2016 All Ireland semifinal with Dublin. He doesn't mention the fact that a Kerry player committed a worse foul just minutes beforehand and got away with it. Selective memory – it happens with both Kerry footballers and Kerry supporters.

His Uncle Páidí features quite a lot in the book. Too much so, to be honest. I get that Páidí was a huge figure in their growing lives, but there wasn't a single Páidí story in there that I hadn't heard before, and there's more myth than man in those yarns at this stage. His perception of the way Páidi was dismissed as Kerry manager is obviously something the family believe themselves – but it's not fair on a County Board who handled that matter with a lot more sensitivity than Páidí acknowledged.

Small details. When Marc talks about Marc, this book is at its best. Unapologetically so. There's certainly more honesty than either of his brothers in that regard. Marc is genuinely self-reflective. He doesn't try to be politically correct in his dealings with managers – every other book (Darragh, Tomás, and Jack himself) dances around the subject of the Ó Sé's and Jack O'Connor not really getting on. Marc is refreshingly blunt about simply stating that as a fact, without denyng Jack's excellence as a manager. Likewise Marc felt hard done by after being dropped on a couple of occasions by Eamonn Fitzmaurice. He's not airing grievances, merely acknowledging them in the rear view mirror.

None of it is said in bitterness, more in self-


reflection long after the fact.

I imagine a lot of the phrasing comes from Adrian Russell. The book is extremely wellwritten. But it's also obvious that Marc himself put a lot of genuine effort into telling this story honestly, and he succeeded.

Is it the best Kerry autobiography I have read? I wouldn't say so. I thought Kieran Donaghy's was absolutely excellent and I thought Aidan O'Mahony and Paul Galvin both put in real work as well. But in a fairly saturated and frankly anodyne market, this one stands well out from the pack. I would recommend it without hesitation.

More Than a Game: The GAA and Where It's Going Michael Moynihan

For years, Michael Moynihan's column on the back page of the sports section of the Irish



Examiner was a weekly highlight for me. He is perceptive, forthright, and extremely articulate, while also capable of great humour. I consider him one of the best GAA writers of a generation. A book is an entirely different matter to a sports column, though, and I'd consider his record in that regard much more mixed. 'Blood Brothers' was very good. Played it a little bit safe, understandable enough for a Corkman writing about Cork hurling. You won't get many Catholic theologians writing books about the fallibility of popes!

'Crisis and Comeback: Cork in the Eighties' is stunningly good. Genuinely up there with anything that Diarmuid Ferriter has written, and I say that as a huge admirer of Ferriter.

'GAAconomics'....hmmm. It wasn't a bad book in itself. But for a book billed as a look into the underbelly of finances in the GAA.....it just never came close to the billing. It's like watching Evan Ferguson playing for Roma....except that you were told that this guy was way better than

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Ronaldo Nazário. See my problem?

This is the same. It's a good book. It does address topics like payments to managers and the blurring line between professional and amatuer, something that's all the more topical with young players signing for AFL clubs. I would feel that, unluckily for the author, the Revenue are beginning to mark the GAA's cards more closely and that culture was rapidly changing even as the book was written. Revenue remuneration and the use of facilities for corporate events and pop concerts and foreign sports are touched on. And to Michael Moynihan's credit, he absolutely refuses to play any self-righteous "Was it for this our fathers....." or "Will anyone think of the children" nonsense. This is a clear and practical examination....it just isn't remotely forensic. Like GAAconomics, it very carefully steers a very safe course between hazards, carefully skirting anything that could be remotely controversial. And if you are going to write a book about controversial subjects, you can't do so wearing oven mitts.

This is a good book – but it could have been a great one. This is the GAA and approximately where it is; not where it's going. It's certainly not a bad book, far from it, but it's not one I would expect to be re-reading in years to come.

The GAA Uncovered: The History of the GAA in **Match Programmes** John Kelly




I picked it up in the Killarney Library because it looked intriguing to me and I like GAA history. I wasn't expecting too much, more a collection of pictures than anything else.

It is essentially a coffee table book and yes, of course the photos of the old match programmes are my favourite bit. But there's actually far more depth of research in this than I had expected. I found the pieces about the changes in the written forms of gaelic and discussion of the various and changing idioms and dialects fascinating - admittedly, a subject that was completely new to me. I did not expect to enjoy this one half as much as I did. I would argue that the title might actually be a touch over-simplified. This isn't so much a collection of match programmes, as a clear and distinct narration of the story that they, and by implication the GAA itself, tries to tell.

Where Heroes Are Made: Legendary GAA People and the Places that Made them

John Scally



I like John Scally's books, always have. They don't tend to be controversial or especially insightful, but they tend to be well researched and written and he has a good way with 'soft' interviews. 'Great GAA Rivalries', '101 Great GAA Teams', '101 Great GAA Controversies', you get the theme. 'The People's Game' was a cut above, some really good interviews.

'Where Heroes were Made'. I was expecting something a little bit 'by the numbers'.

It's not. It's definitely not. This might genuinely be Scally's best book. It opens with an interview with David Hickey about Dublin's famous 'hut' in the seventies (we are going to gently gloss over Michael Lyster's foreword). Hickey is a personal hero of mine, a conscientious objector to Ireland's failures when nobody else had the courage for that mantle. Aside from a brilliant footballer, he has always been a leader, not always popularly so, on the right side of history. And this is the best interview with him that I have ever read. After that you have Leo Moran, lead singer of The Saw Doctors, almost as articulate from a different GAA perspective - the similarities are as fascinating as the juxtaposition. Then you have Biddy Early's curse and Ger Loughnane, known for the occasional swear word himself. Con Houlihan and Castleisland. Or Castle Island, as he always called it.

This book is a mix of interviews, anecdotes, and observations. That's fair enough; I think the same can be said of the GAA itself. You don't even need to know anything about the GAA. This book would be a perfect introduction.


The Last Ditch:

Eamonn Sweeney

The Irish Independent's Eamonn Sweeney is probably my favourite contemporary sports writer. That's not to say that I always agree with him - he fell briefly into the old Brolly trick of denigrating Mayo footballers but thankfully copped on since. A writer like this should be shaping the sporting zeitgeist, not trying to ride it. Sweeney is able to blend humour and passion and indignation without ever losing articulation; that's a much harder trick than people think (Sky Sports, for example, have nobody that even comes close to achieving it). Sweeney never wrote anything better than 2004's 2The Road to Croker". Everybody remembers the humour - the lad on the bus to Lourdes who was saved by God five times.... sheer genius - but it had depth as well. This year he attempted to repeat the trick. Is it as good? No, but it's still an awful lot better than most. Sweeney is very honest about his fear of travelling and how he gradually managed to face it. There's a small but very moving piece about one of his daughters. There's something a little bit preachy where he talks about the various religious observances and foods from immigrant cultures, but I can forgive that because I happn to agree with him. The games? They are actually relatively incidental to the plot – no great harm in that either.

The Dodger: DJ Carey and the **Great Betraval**

Eimear ní Bhreonáin



Unfortunately, one GAA story above all others from 2025 is going to be remembered. Journalist Eimear ní Bhraonáin delved far deeper into the story than most. So much so that her workin researching this book led to her being co-producer on the award winning RTE documentary. This is forensic journalism at its very best. Meticulous detail and packed with interviews and a clear, concise timeline from start to finish. Totally non-judgemental, so it gives room for the reader to form a judgement (more than a few of the more celebrated crime correspondents in this country, with their penchant for assigning childish nicknames to thugs and killers, could and should take note). It's an absolutely brilliant book. I just don't like it. It's a nasty story all round and I wish it had never happened. It's important that the story be told. I believe that it happened, it shouldn't have happened, and should never be allowed to happen again. But it's just repugnant to me. I don't share this penchant people have for devouring controversies. There's a movie

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out about Roy Keane and Mick McCarthy in Saipan.....jaysus, is this what hiberno-gaelic literature is reduced to? Shaw, Beckett, Yeats, Joyce, Heaney....Roy Keane and DJ Carey. Ah, lads. It won't heal if ye keep picking at the scab.

The Race David Gillick

There's a certain almost mysticism about athletics. To put it bluntly, there's less.....guff (I'm tempted to use stronger words) about it. Athletes tend to be articulate in interviews, easily able to dissect their own part and perspective on the big events far better than any interviewer. You won't get athletes tossing out any of the time-worn mantras and clichés so beloved of other sports (hello, rugby and American football, I'm looking at ye).

Part of it is because I don't believe Ireland fully appreciate how difficult elite athletics actually is. For one thing, by its very nature there are new excuses. You reach the finish line first....or you don't. You jump that high or that far; you throw the longest distance. It's very clear and clinical. You can win or lose in microseconds. Literally. And it is absolutely ruthless. I personally believe that you cannot be a top athlete because of pride in place or family or anything else. You need, deep down, to have that inner core of unshakeable self-belief. You are certainly not doing it for the money. Compared to almost any other sport, most of which are less self-demanding, the money is brutal.

David Gillick lived that life. We all know that this was one of the best Irish athletes out there, but do we understand how close to world class he actually has been? He was almost a multi-millionaire and a world-famous name. 'Almost'...in athletics, that word should be written in capitals.

Sonia O'Sullivan – and I would argue that she had as big an impact on Irish sport, not just athletics, as Ronnie Delaney did a generation before – wrote a very good book, apparently without a ghostwriter (I'm sorry, but 'Sonia: My Story' is suspiciously well-written) about her own athletic career. But Sonia was writing from the perspective of some-one who was unabashedly right up there with the very best. David Gillick's book is rawer, tougher. It's not that it's more honest – Sonia didn't play false modesty or pull any punches. But if you want to know exactly how hard the world of athletics is, 'The Race' really is top class. Like I say, there's no bluff in athletics, and there's no bluff here.

Martin O'Neill: The Changing Game

I mentioned earlier on how I genuinely have no problem with ghostwriters being brought in on commission or fee to use their expertise to translate some-one's life experiences onto paper. But I do want the authenticity of the voice that I am reading to be real. I literally don't bother with listening to political speeches; they are always polished, squeaky clean, and utterly meaningless. Nobody can stand for everything. Populism is useful for wind when you are hanging out clothes to

dry, and absolutely nothing else. But I'm an awful lot more suspicious when some-one says that there was no ghostwriter involved. In my experience, that's almost never been true of sports biographies.

Roy Keane got in trouble for an 'autobiography' that was written by Eamon Dunphy, and Tadhg Kennelly got in trouble for an 'autobiography' that was written by Scotty Gallen. I actually believe both men when they say that they didn't write the particular pieces that offended. Both have the sound of forced drama for the sake of a narrative rather than actual moments in a game. Mind you, I have no sympathy for either man.

It says an awful lot that I'm inclined to believe Martin O'Neill when he says that he wrote this himself. For one thing, O'Neill is highly educated and articulate. Brian Clough, genius though he was, tried to bully a lot of young players with his personality; even then, O'Neill was a match for him. He is actually kinder to his old wayward genius of a manager than I would have been. In fact, this is the mellow side of O'Neill. Highly perceptive in a lot of ways, but I do feel that he plays it a little bit safe. I'd say that he would be much more interesting on the topics addressed if you were chatting with him over a few pints. This book doesn't feel like that. There are real insights, but some of the admiration for the old school, rough-and-ready approach and the occasional condemnation of things like 'XG' (granted, the most abused statistic in history prior to Donald Trump's immigration inventions) rings a little false. O'Neill always unrepentantly mixed progressive methods with pragmatic tactics. He could be trenchant (let's face it; there were times he struggled to conceal truculence – and I wouldn't blame him) - for example, the idea that his conservatism was holding back a phenomenally talented Irish team who could outplay anyone....jaysus, Irish supporters really don't help themselves. The voice here, unfortunately, comes across sounds like some-one whose battles have already been fought. His most recent stint with Glasgow Celtic, which has unquestionably sealed his status as a club legend, unfortunately didn't make it to the print deadline.

This felt to me like Martin O'Neill at half throttle. Maybe his heart was in this at the start; I don't get the impression that it was at the finish. But I'd take O'Neill at half throttle over most soccer books at full speed.

Eddie Jordan: Full Throttle Keith Brennan

I've always liked Eddie Jordan, ever since he was pointed out to me at Dr. Crokes junior games way back when. I never actually spoke to him – frankly, I wasn't sure that people were having a joke at my expense (I was a very gullible child). John Keogh, that great alumnus of Dr. Crokes and St. Pauls, was kind enough to explain Jordan's extensive Kerry and Killarney connections to me more recently.

The sheer existence of Eddie Jordan is one of the great Irish stories. A quiet, friendly Dubliner deciding to go toe-to-toe with the likes of Ferrari, Mercedes, McLaren. It always felt to me a bit like Glenroe's Miley Byrne making a guest appearance on 'Dallas'. Well, holy God, but J.R. Ewing would get some shock....

But this book isn't a biography of Eddie Jordan. It is, and I'm quoting the blurb "a high-octane guide to business, leadership and resilience told through the extraordinary life and lessons of Formula One legend Eddie Jordan.....At its heart lies The Jordan Code - 25 powerful principles for entrepreneurs, leaders and ambitious thinkers who want to win against the odds. Each is brought to life through stories and reflections from Eddie's friends and peers, including Bono, Richard Branson, David Coulthard, Jake Humphrey, Roger Taylor, Mark Webber, and many more."

It may say more about me than Eddie Jordan, or that very good writer Keith Brennan, but I'm extremely sceptical of a premise like that. You can teach the fundamentals of entrepreneurship just like you can art. But too many who succeed attribute that success to an imagined ideology rather than sound fundamentals, luck, and timing. It's worth noting that Jordan was working in finance while motor cars were a hobby; I strongly suspect that you'd have never heard his name if it was the other way around. Webber and Coulthard proved their racing talent in tough apprenticeships. It was speed, not philosophy, that brought them success. Bono and Roger Taylor wrote brilliant songs and performed them well (by the way, Taylor was a lot more than a foil for Freddie Mercury). I don't know who Jake Humphrey is, but I'm just going to assume that he isn't a yoga instructor.

But as I say, I'm sceptical about self-help books. I believe that they largely prey on people's insecurities more than anything else. I believe that it fosters that very American idea that being poor is automatically your own fault. While there are exceptions, the myth of the self-made billionaire is exactly that, a myth. But look, my own beliefs regarding oligarchic capitalism are not in play here.

Eddie Jordan's actual story is fascinating, and those parts of this book are very good. The derived principles....well, I found them mediocre, almost platitudinal – but I'm so cheap I didn't even buy the book. I got it out of the library. Maybe I'm not exactly the target market.

Andy Farrell: The Only Way I Know Andy Farrell, ghostwritten with Gavin

Rugby was into the 'auto'biography market before most other sports. And it has made me wary of them. Too many of them are too polished to be believable. The supposed authors don't claim to be paragons of virtue, but their self-confessed flaws tend to be minor. There's almost always a vulnerability, a sense of insecurity that they manfully overcome, and a family tragedy of some sort that bestowed a sense of humanity.

Jaysus.

Or you have the school of "my life philosophy as derived from rugby". Joe Schmidt – stunning coach, far less stunning book. I felt that there should be a choir in the background singing 'Hallelujah, Reverend' as I read it. Eddie O'Sullivan's was a lot better, although perhaps a little self-serving (I don't believe his version of a couple of events, but he came across as likeable).

Peter Stringer's was good. Johnny Sexton's 'Obsessed' had an enjoyable bitterness about it. 'Becoming a Lion' a decade later felt a lot more contrived to me. Seán O'Brien's was surprisingly good. O'Driscoll, Paul O'Connell, O'Gara..... arrah, look, if they were movies you could watch them in fast forward. Moss Keane's, one of the grandaddy books from my perspective, was brilliant. But I mean, it was Moss Keane, so no surprise. I also really enjoyed Mike Galway's (he may have become known as 'Mick', but that was never his name among his own people), but with the Kerry football connection, that was preaching to the converted. Asking the likes of me to review books like those....look. it'd be like a new mother holding up her baby and asking what you thought. You're not going to say "what an ugly baby", are you?

Andy Farrell's isn't the pinnacle, but it's a long way from the nadir either. Before you ask, no, his tenure with Ireland is not the predominant theme, and I'd be disgusted if it was. Ireland gets almost no mention until the latter third. No reason it should; we are just a brief enough part of what must count as a full life. Farrell grew up in Wigan as a rugby league prodigy.

Was it really that rough and tough? I'm inclined to believe him. We have a tendency to think of rugby as a very upper class sport. Have a check at Limerick's rugby history, or Cork to a lesser extent (Cork back in the thirties and forties was slightly more cosmopolitan; Dublin was one of the great cities). Wigan sounds like Limerick of the seventies and eighties, and that sense of rough but warm community is captured well here. Farrell obviously grew up in a tough school – becoming a father at sixteen doesn't sound like any picnic either.

He switched to rugby union late in his career. It didn't quite work out, and he is honest about that. Then he went into coaching....


Interestingly, he charts his experiences in coaching with the same honest analysis. And he doesn't actually give himself enough credit for his meteoric rise. Within three years of first coaching professionally, he's working with the Lions. He doesn't think that it's all that unusual a progression, or maybe he's just being modest. But I never realised just how seamless his transition to coaching was. The equivalent would have been Ronan O'Gara being appointed manager of England, not Ireland....in 2016. Forget La Rochelle, Ronan never went to Crusaders. And then went on to win Grand Slams. With his country's main rivals. That would be the equivalent of Andy Farrell's career

The match reports are....well, they are match reports. We know what happened, and Farrell doesn't offer particular insights. I'm not sure any coach can do so honestly without falling into the trap of hindsight. But, as with Marc Ó Sé's book, he's able to look at his younger self with a critical but not unkindly eye. His dealings with Sexton are genuinely fascinating – he needed Sexton, but he needed Sexton to cop onto himself a bit. I can readily believe that. The book is well-written. I don't actually know Gavin Mairs' work myself (he writes for The Telegraph) but he can obviously polish a narrative without demeaning it. This is a much better book than I was expecting.

I haven't read Conor Murray's 'Cloud Nine:My

Life in Rugby' yet. I've huge admiration for him as a player. I'm a little sceptical about the book, but I obviously have a touch of the cynic about me

Andrew Porter: My Heart on My Sleeve Andrew Porter, ghostwritten by Alison Walsh



Alas, another one that I failed to get my hands on in time. Give me a break here. I don't spend all my time reading. I do have a social life (okay, I'll admit that's a bit of an exaggeration).

I am looking forward to this, though. It's the Irish Times Sports Book of the Year, and that isn't any empty platitude. I tend to be sceptical of most industry awards – they are basically a marketing tool for the most part. But the Irish Times Books of the Year have a lot of credibility; they do actually tend to be the best.

I'm told – hmmm, again, how much is advertising and how much is substance remains to be determined – that this is a book about a rugby player, but not about the rugby. Porter grew up with a very ill mother who died young and that had huge consequences for him. That sounds to me very much like a story worth reading; it's on my priority list.

It was Van Morrison who sang the tune "My mama told me there'd be days like this". This performance from James Fleming's side is hard to explain given how competitive they have been so far this season. Just the two league defeats and a narrow cup defeat to go with five impressive wins but it would be hard to put into words the reasons for this defeat.

To give Glanmire their full dues they were extremely impressive, led by Viane Cumber, who was the chief protagonist in her side getting thirteen three pointers. The game itself was nip and tuck in the main for the opening half and indeed the majority of the third quarter. But the visitors made a decisive move with four minutes to go in that moving quarter as they outscored their opponents by 14-4 and gave themselves the leg up for the final quarter. It was notable too that five of the squad hit double figures with local trio Jack O Sullivan, Eoin Carroll and Mark Sheehan combining for 39 points. Steve Kelly was at his incisive best assisting in the first half and

feeding the scoreboard in the second while Sam Grant went 67% from beyond the arc, each as important as each other.

It was Tolka who opened the scoring with Sean McManus particularly lively but Sam Grant had his eye in early, contributing three three pointers and adding to Steve Kellys basket to give the Lakers an 11-4 lead with Oisin Spring bringing the defensive energy. Tolka were guilty of some inaccuracy from the free throw line which would have made the game tighter but it didn't deter Carroll, Sheehan or O Sullivan one bit as they made it 17-7 with 3.48 to go in the quarter. Carroll then turned provider for Grant who was on his own under the basket as the Lakers started to look comfortable. But Commins dispelled that notion for Tolka when he hit two outside shots to tighten up the game. It took points from Sheehan and Grant to ensure the Lakers led by the minimum, 41-40, at the change of ends.

The third quarter opened with both sides missing opportunities to add to their totals but McManus did eventually break the duck to give his side a temporary lead. It was immediately wiped out by Kelly executing a nice move and although Badejo steuck again the Lakers moved clear with Kelly and Grant on target . The pivotal moment of the game was about to come as Commins cut the gap to two, 47-45 with four minutes remaining. It was initiated by a Grant basket and when Kelly threw one in from beyond the arc the Lakers started to get real momentum. 

The next home game for the Cougars is versus Moycullen on January 10th.













ALPINES

The vast majority of alpine plants are easy to grow in any reasonably well drained garden soil. alpines are ideal plants for rockeries and gaps in stone walls and they will give you colour from early spring right through the summer, the most important thing when choosing your alpine plants is to make sure you find out the growth rates so that one alpine plant won't take over other alpine plants in the rockery.

A good example of this would be an alpine called Cerastium (snow in summer) which is quite a quick growing alpine and spreads quickly in a short space of time, it can tend to take over small rockeries. having said that it is a beautiful plant with silver foliage and is covered, as the name suggests, in beautiful white flowers.

It can be pruned back to keep it under control.

There are also lots of alpines which are compact and can make perfect mounds and shapes, alpines are also great fillers for stone walls, an ideal plant for this would be a Campanula or aubrieta.

the aubrieta is a pink flowering plant that you see growing out of a lot of grottos. alpines can also be used in containers such as in troughs or window boxes but try to choose ones that are evergreen so that you will have some colour all year round.

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Christmas Message Diocese of Kerry 2025

These lines from a religious poem in the Divine Office capture the meaning and the Spirit of our celebration of Christmas:

Where true love is dwelling, God is dwelling there; Love's own loving Presence, love does ever share. Give Him joyful welcome, love Him and revere; Cherish one another with a love sincere.

A happy and a faith-centred Christmas to one and all, to all homes, all families and all people living alone. It is wonderful that Christmas in Ireland remains so family centred for most people: 'Home for Christmas', 'Together for Christmas'. For homes and families all year-round every week can be pressurised and busy, Christmas is almost the only time most people are at home with their family, a few days to unwind and catch up, time to see the bigger picture of their lives and to count their blessings. I pray God's blessing on every home in the diocese.

If it has been a difficult year or if you are troubled today draw strength from the fact that Mary and Joseph relied on the innkeeper, and all he could provide was a stable, and their baby Jesus was born. What joy and happiness! Everything does not have to be perfect for life to be fulfilling. A word of encouragement. Have time to turn to God over the Christmas days. Pause and gaze at the crib in the home, or at a simple crib-picture on a Christmas card. Visit the crib in local churches. Bring the children. Especially at the crib talk to children about the birth of Jesus, - and the love God the Father has for us all. Speak to children of the love of God, and of all of us putting our Hope in God. Join in the celebration of Mass. Proclaim Christ Jesus as your Hope as you enter the New Year. Share and nourish your own faith over the days of Christmas.

This Christmas we have a new Pope, Leo XIV. We pray for him and for his shepherding of the church in the years ahead. Let us remember Pope Francis fondly. Recall the heroic effort he made on Easter Sunday to show the world his faith and joy in the Resurrection of Jesus, and how he died early the next morning.

2023 was the 800th anniversary of St Francis having the first Christmas crib in Greccio, Italy. In his crib St Francis had live people and animals, - an event that is now seen as the beginning of the worldwide tradition of the crib, - a model of the stable with figures of all the people, animals and objects. At the start of Advent 2019, looking forward to 2023 Pope Francis wrote an apostolic letter entitled "The meaning and importance of the nativity scene".

What follows are two paragraphs, from the middle and the end of Pope Francis' letter, two paragraphs that can help us reflect and pray about the birth of Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us.

"Why does the Christmas crib arouse such wonder and move us so deeply? First, because it shows God's tender love: the Creator of the universe lowered himself to take up our littleness. The gift of life, in all its mystery, becomes all the more wondrous as we realise that the Son of Mary is the source and sustenance of all life.

In Jesus, the Father has given us a brother who comes to seek us out whenever we are confused or lost, a loyal friend ever at our side. He gave us his Son who forgives us and frees us from our sins."

"Dear brothers and sisters, the Christmas crib is part of the precious yet demanding process of passing on the faith. Beginning in childhood, and at every stage of our lives, it teaches us:

to contemplate Jesus,

to experience God's love for us,

to feel and believe that God is with us

and that we are with him, his children, brothers and sisters all, thanks to that Child who is the Son of God and the Son of the Virgin Mary.

And to realize that in that knowledge we find true happiness.

Like Saint Francis, may we open our hearts to this simple grace, so that from our wonderment a humble prayer may arise: a prayer of thanksgiving to God, who wished to share with us his all, and thus never to leave us on our own."
