

Killarney Chamber Launches 2026 with Ambitious Vision

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce has set out an ambitious and confident vision for 2026 following a well-attended Chamber Luncheon at the Dromhall Hotel on Wednesday, 11 February.

Chamber President Johnny McGuire welcomed members and thanked the local business community for its continued support, which contributed to a successful Christmas season in Killarney. New members CSG and Activate Gym were formally introduced and warmly received.

A HUNDRED YEARS - A SHORT TIME IN POLITICS

The spirit of Fianna Fáil was very much alive at the opening of "Soldiers of Destiny, Fianna Fáil in Kerry 1926-1933" in Tralee Monday morning. This is the story of Fianna Fáil from its foundation in May 1926 to the general election of 1933 when the party's vote in the Kerry constituency was the highest in the entire country. It is the work of Owen O'Shea based on his doctoral thesis and subsequent book. There was an energy in the room I haven't come across recently.

Taoiseach Micheal Martin was in flying form, flanked by the party's two TDs, Minister Norma Foley with her Kerry flag and Michael Cahill.

The 1927 poster: "Fianna Fail provides the Remedy", set out the objectives of Eamon de Valera's fledgling party

Fianna Fáil was "not an abstentionist party", it proclaimed. It proposed, if elected, to repudiate partition, and to develop fishing and other industries for the Gaeltachts.

It was also to secure credit for agricultural and industrial development.

And this one: "Secure by prompt legislation, following enquiry, that no town tenant should be obliged to pay an excessive rent, or be

liable to eviction without reasonable cause, and further to provide adequate facilities for the purchase of his house by the occupying tenant."

The party which was in charge longer than most has met few of these objectives, I felt. The fishing industry in west Kerry is decimated; the Dingle harbour is now to be a marina for tourists and housing is geared towards short-term lets, not Irish speaking locals. As for housing...

Would FF of 100 years ago be proud of today's party? I asked An Taoiseach..

Micheal Martin was adamant they would. Yes, rents were too high, he said. The way to tackle that was more house building.

But 100 years ago Ireland was one of the poorest places in Europe. There had been extraordinary progress - free education, growth in third level and the recent security of tenure meant for the first time there was an end to no fault evictions, he replied,

It was always a party for the ordinary person, to improve their lives, An Taoiseach said. I came away chewing over a few things - which

is what a good exhibition does. There was a bit of myth busting going on. The Civil war was only part of the political story. Independent politics may be waning again, giving way to a more collective sense, a sense of collective responsibility, just as in the early days of the State.

Can Fianna Fail pull it off a second time? Return from Tír na n-Og and not fall off the horse in Bealagh Oisín? Never mind a week in politics being a long time: A hundred years is a short time in politics in Kerry, I came away thinking. The exhibition moves to Killarney Library on March 10th.

MARTELLO TOWERS AND UNDERSEA CABLES - AND THE THREAT

If you are a fan of Glengarriff and Garnish Island, you will know how the highest point on that lovely garden island is the Martello Tower. There are Martello remnants too on the coast in Dingle and west Kerry and their name is a misspelling - after a tower in Corsica's Mortella Point.

Martello Towers dotted the trade routes coast from Ireland to South Africa and to India under the British Empire. They date to 1804 and to fear invasion by the French. They are squat, cylindrical. They were meant to hold gun batteries against invading ships and later they were also used to host communications signals.

The funny thing is they are not a whole pile different to the undersea cables - fat rubber encased copper - that stretched from south Kerry and Valentia to New Foundland 50 years later. Miles were laid deep in the ocean and several broke before success.

I have seen them in scrap yards and on people's desks fished from the depths.

They are a wonder of the world.

These days we are being asked to fund the defence of the undersea cables and some question why we should. Just as the Martello Towers and the undersea cables were part and parcel of an imperial world, back then, many of today's cables are actually symbols of the new imperial world order.

Ireland now is part of the EU and is being frightened into paying to defend the cables underneath our overfished waters.(The same EU with consent from this State has decimated our fishing industry).

But the real new order is where a few tech guys own and control the world in the way countries and empires once did.

Most of the cables are not sending messages between friends, but serving huge technology firms to route enormous volumes of data through Irish waters to Europe. Ireland benefits yes. But the question is should we pay to defend this global corporate network?

But wouldn't a theatre be lovely in the grounds of Killarney House? Or maybe turn the house itself into a theatre? It wouldn't take much and there's an outdoor performance area already there. Just a thought.

TAOISEACH OPENS CENTENARY EXHIBITION ON FIANNA FÁIL IN KERRY

Exhibition at Kerry Library marks early years of the party in Kerry constituency

The Taoiseach and leader of Fianna Fáil, Micheál Martin, has officially opened a new exhibition on the origins and early years of the Fianna Fáil party in Kerry. This year marks the centenary of the foundation of the party in 1926 and the exhibition, presented by historian Dr Owen O’Shea, focuses on how the party developed and grew in Kerry in the late 1920s and early 1930s.

At Tralee Library on Monday morning, Mr Martin said the exhibition “has provided a deep insight into the foundations and rapid growth of one of democratic Europe’s most successful political parties.”

The exhibition is called “*Soldiers of Destiny, Fianna Fáil in Kerry 1926-1933*” and is supported by a Commemorations Bursary from the Royal Irish Academy. It tells the story of Fianna Fáil from its foundation in May 1926 to the general election of 1933 when the party’s vote in the Kerry constituency was the highest in the entire country.

It will be on display at Tralee Library until 28 February and at Killarney Library from 10 to 31 March.

Mr Martin said: “This exhibition draws on the work carried out for Owen’s brilliant thesis and book ‘From Bullets to Ballots: Politics and Electioneering in Post-Civil War Kerry’. This work, completed under the supervision of Professor Diarmuid Ferriter and published by UCD Press is a striking example of the type of work being carried out by a new generation of historians.”

He continued: “Owen’s past work on the Civil War in Kerry was one of the most important contributions to the national remembrance of its centenary. In a balanced and fair way, he showed how the war was more intense and prolonged here than anywhere else. What Owen has done is to make a major contribution to answering the question of another leading historian – after the division of the Civil War, how did we so quickly move forward as a country and leave that conflict behind?”

New research about the establishment of party branches, the results of elections, the role of newspapers and propaganda all form part of the display as do profiles of the seven Fianna Fáil TDs who represented Kerry between 1926 and 1933. Relatives of those TDs were present for the official opening on Monday.

“The foundation of Fianna Fáil was a transformative moment in Irish politics and represented a new phase of Civil War politics in Ireland. In this, its centenary year, I am presenting the story of the party in Kerry where its organisational and electoral successes were without parallel in this period,” said Owen O’Shea.

“I am very grateful to the Royal Irish Academy for funding this exhibition and I hope it will attract anyone with an interest in Irish history and politics,” he added.





Legendary 1968 & 1969 Killarney Camogie Team Finally Honoured at Fitzgerald Stadium

There were emotional scenes at Fitzgerald Stadium last Sunday as the legendary Killarney camogie team of 1968 and 1969 were finally honoured for their historic achievements, almost six decades after their county triumphs.

The special presentation took place at half-time during Kerry's clash with Laois in Division 2A of the National Camogie League, as the crowd rose to acknowledge a team whose place in local sporting folklore has long been assured.

The Killarney side were crowned Senior County Camogie Champions in both 1968 and 1969 after defeating Ballyduff, yet remarkably, they were never formally presented with the county cup at the time. On the day of their 1968 victory, the trophy was not available, and was again absent for the 1969 presentation.

After years of the cup's whereabouts remaining unknown, the Kerry Camogie County Board recently succeeded in locating the missing trophy. Last Sunday, members of that historic team finally got their long-awaited moment as the cup was presented to them in front of a proud home support.

The occasion marked not just a celebration of camogie success, but also a unique chapter in Killarney's sporting history. In 1969, the club achieved a remarkable double, capturing the Senior County Hurling Championship title as well with a narrow 2-6 to 2-5 victory over Austin Stacks.

The camogie team had been coached by the late Tom Galvin and Dermot Moynihan, who were fondly remembered on the day. Several surviving members of the panel were in attendance to accept the belated presentation, while family members represented teammates who have since passed away.

It was a lovely day, filled with pride for a team who had waited nearly 60 years for the recognition they so richly deserved.



Ministers Lawless and Foley launch First-of-Its-Kind Education Partnership to Support Students with Care Experience

Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, James Lawless, and the Minister for Children, Disability and Equality, Norma Foley have launched a landmark initiative to support students with care experience in the education system.

A care-experienced student is someone who has lived in foster care, residential care or is in aftercare. Young people with care experience are among the most vulnerable young people in society and often transition to adulthood without the family support available to many of their peers.

Munster Technological University, University College Cork, Kerry



ETB, Cork ETB, Tusla, and EPIC (Empowering People in Care) have now come together to help these students to navigate further and higher education systems. The education partnership, which is the first of its kind in Ireland, will provide a coordinated 'one stop shop' information hub of pre-entry and post-entry supports for students with care experience. This includes career guidance

and a named personal support advocate in each college. The state currently provides care for around 5,000 children who cannot remain in the care of their parents. Almost 90 per cent of these children are in foster care, which provides a safe and stable environment and is the preferred option where possible. Other types of care include children living with relatives

(known as kinship care), care in residential facilities, care for separated children seeking asylum and special care for children who are very vulnerable with complex psychological and sociological profiles.

The education partnership is based on the needs and requirements identified from the lived experience of young people with care-experience. Munster Technological University, University College Cork, Kerry ETB, Cork ETB, Tusla, and EPIC have committed to a range of supports with the clear aim to reduce barriers, improve participation and enhance educational outcomes for care-experienced student.

Taking A Step Back In Time...


URBAN TENURE AND REFORM IN EDWARDIAN KILLARNEY

In the early years of the twentieth century, the town tenants of Killarney were finding their voice. At a time when the Irish land question dominated national politics, a parallel struggle was unfolding in market towns across the country. Reports in newspapers during the Edwardian era reveal a determined local movement seeking fairness, security and dignity for urban tenants.

At a meeting of the Killarney branch of the Town Tenants' Association in December 1905, the Chairman told those gathered that he felt honoured to address them. Ireland, he said, was living through a period of awakening. After years of neglect, people were beginning to assert their rights. This applied not only to farmers but to town tenants, whose grievances had long been overshadowed by rural agitation. While agricultural and rural tenant reform had rightly commanded attention, it was now time, he argued, for town tenants to organise on their own behalf. The Association offered unity and a collective voice. Its aims were clear: proper housing for workers at fair rents; an end to short leases, heavy fines and the confiscation of tenants' improvements; greater access to home ownership through expansion of the Small Dwellings Act; fairer taxation of land values; and practical measures to encourage town improvement, support local industry and reduce excessive transport charges. Central to the complaint was insecurity. A tenant might rent a property at a high rate, pay a fine to secure a lease, invest years of labour and savings in building up a business, and yet have no lasting protection. A landlord could raise the rent or terminate the lease, effectively seizing the fruits of the tenant's improvements. In some cases, leases of 21 or 31 years expired only for rents to be increased dramatically. One example described a house built for £200 or £300 on a nominal ground rent of five shillings; when the lease ended, the rent rose to six pounds. Though legal, such practices were denounced as deeply unjust. Housing conditions for the poorest were equally troubling. In cramped lanes, three or four families might share a single small dwelling. It was hardly surprising, the Chairman observed, that misery drove some towards drink. Far better would be clean, decent homes - even at slightly higher rents - offering stability and self-respect.

By May 1906, attention had turned to strengthening the movement. After a conference in Cork, the branch secretary wrote to Mr Briscoe, urging the appointment



of a dedicated organiser and suggesting that each branch contribute to a common fund. In reply, Mr Briscoe expressed confidence that a forthcoming Bill would address many grievances, but stressed that success depended on "absolute unity" and firm resolve. The Killarney branch resolved to invite him to the county and to organise a demonstration. Funds were modest - £3 had been raised by canvassing two streets - but enthusiasm was strong. Killarney was proposed as a central venue for a county gathering, and arrangements were set in motion.

By 1908, the *Kerryman* paper could adopt a lightly humorous tone about the branch's "war chest", built up to defend any member in dispute with a landlord. For the moment, it suggested, landlords were keeping quiet. But if old habits returned - exorbitant demands or unreasonable conditions - the tenants would be ready. The struggle, it hinted, might prove as stubborn as the earlier land war. Support came from influential quarters. The Most Rev. Dr Mangan, Bishop of Kerry, sent a sympathetic letter, consistent with his reputation for siding with the oppressed. Other towns were urged, half in jest, to revive or establish their own leagues. If places such as Listowel, Tralee or Kenmare were silent, it could hardly be because all grievances had vanished.

In 1910 the branch continued its steady work. Members were reminded that a subscription of just one shilling secured the Association's backing in times of difficulty. A letter from Mr John Breen of High Street expressed gratitude for the branch's sympathy following a family bereavement - evidence that the organisation also fostered solidarity beyond politics. Addressing the branch that year, Mr Eugene O'Sullivan, M.P., declared that reform of town tenure was among the most urgent issues facing Ireland. Towns shaped public opinion

and national life; their influence must be independent and healthy. Yet under existing conditions, tenants remained at the mercy of landlords and speculative middlemen. Real progress, he insisted, depended on the tenants themselves. Half-hearted efforts would yield little. But united and persistent action could secure meaningful legislation. He welcomed provisions in the new Budget proposing a tax on building land near towns, arguing that such measures would encourage the sale of land at reasonable prices and enable local authorities to provide cottages at fair rents. He also pledged to press for the inclusion of Lord Kenmare's town properties in any sale of his estate, while warning that division among tenants would only weaken their cause. The story of the Killarney Town Tenants' Association is not one of dramatic confrontation, but of steady organisation and civic resolve. Through meetings, modest subscriptions and appeals to public opinion, ordinary townspeople sought security in their homes and businesses. Their campaign reminds us that Ireland's struggle for justice was fought not only on the land, but in the streets and shopfronts of its towns - and that lasting change depended, above all, on unity and perseverance.

Tertiary courses provide an alternative route to Level 7 and Level 8 degrees

TERTIARY

The National Tertiary Office (NTO) was established in 2023 to coordinate further and higher education progression pathways from Further Education & Training (FET) courses to Higher Education Institutions (HEI). A links scheme already existed between Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses and HEI's. However, the number of places available to PLC graduates in the links scheme is limited and there is no guarantee of success, particularly in much sought after courses.

GUARANTEE

Tertiary courses developed by HEIs and Education and Training Boards (ETB) provide a definite path to a third level qualification where progression from further to higher education will be completely seamless. The tertiary course enables an applicant to start a degree at an ETB college and complete it at a university. From day one of a tertiary course, students are registered at both the ETB where they are commencing their course and the partnered university. This provides the student with access to dual supports and services including libraries, sports, and other campus facilities as well as academic, health and wellbeing supports.

ENTRY

You don't need the same leaving certificate points for a tertiary course as a person applying for the same degree via the CAO. Each tertiary degree has different entry requirements. The entry requirements are at the bottom of each individual course page. Students may need to submit proof of achievement in other learning, such as certain subjects in the Leaving Certificate or LCA, to meet the entry requirements for the course. Mature students, aged 23 or over, may have different entry requirements. For some courses, applicants need to submit additional documentation and/or participate in an interview or submit a portfolio. Refer to the course information section in the course page of the NTO website for those details. The course provider will be able to advise you of any additional paperwork which is required for your application. The contact details for the course coordinator can

be found in the course page.

APPLY

Applying for a tertiary course is straight forward. An applicant can apply directly through the course information page of the NTO website, www.nto.ie, from November 2025 to late September 2026. However, Applications for the BSc (Hons) in Occupational Therapy will close on 1st March, 2026 and applications for the Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) will close on 12th April, 2026. The website also provides a full list of courses for 2026.

JOINT

A tertiary course is a joint further and higher education degree programme. Students commence their third level experience in further education with the ETB but will complete the remainder of the course in the local higher education colleges. It varies from one year to two years studying in the FET college, depending on the course. It's expected that more than fifty tertiary courses will commence this September in area like Business, Digital Business, Business Tourism, Business Psychology, Media Production, Applied Sports Science, Nursing, Information Technology Management, Public Health, Sustainable Engineering Technology and Social work. It's fairly certain that additional degree programmes will be available before the closing date for applications.

COLLABORATION

Tertiary Degrees are offered by 14 ETBs, partnering with 8 HEIs. New locations are being added every year. Munster TU (MTU) is collaborating with ETB Kerry to provide tertiary courses in a B.Sc in both General and Mental Health Nursing, BA in Arts (Animation, Visual Effect & Motion Design) and a B.Sc in Occupational Therapy. University College Cork (UCC) is collaborating with Cork ETB to provide a Degree in Social Work. Other Technological Universities participating in the tertiary scheme this year are TU Shannon (TUS), Atlantic TU (ATU), South East TU (SETU), TU Dublin (TUD) as well as Institute of Art, Design and Technology, Dun Laoghaire (IADT), National College Ireland (NCI) and Dundalk Institute of Technology (DkIT).

More traditional universities are collaborating on the development of joint tertiary courses but it is not yet known whether any will be ready for 2026 entry. Tertiary courses are a wonderful development and have expanded to about fifty plus courses in 2026.

PATHWAY

Tertiary courses are a new pathway to a Bachelor's degree, at Level 8 or Level 7. The course information section in the course page of the website details the qualification available. Applications for the courses are now open. Applications for tertiary course are separate from applications to CAO and from applications for PLC Courses.





END OF AN ERA FOR 'CELTIC MIST' RESEARCH VESSEL

The yacht once owned by Charles Haughey will carry out its final surveys this year

The Irish Whale and Dolphin Group (IWDG) has announced that 2026 will be the final season for its dedicated research sailing vessel, Celtic Mist. The 17-metre yacht was donated to the IWDG by the Haughey family in 2011 and has surveyed more than 100,000 km of Irish inshore and offshore waters since 2012.

The vessel undertakes systematic visual surveys for whales, dolphins, porpoises and wider marine wildlife around the Irish coast, contributing essential long-term data for marine conservation, research and policy.

Celtic Mist has circumnavigated the island of Ireland on five occasions, sailed to the Isle of Man and the Inner Hebrides, Scotland twice to connect with like-minded groups in the UK. In 2018 she embarked on a seven-week expedition to Iceland where she rounded the famous Hornstrandir, Iceland's most northernmost peninsula, entering into Arctic waters in search of humpback whales.

Last year, the Celtic Mist completed a 3,300 km survey with Fair Seas as part of the campaign for Marine Protected Area (MPA) legislation to protect, conserve and restore Ireland's marine environment. Over 11 weeks, volunteer skippers and crew recorded more than 2,000 individuals of eight species of whale and dolphins.

"These were important cultural highlights in our town's history, and I am pleased that we have a lasting memorial to those special times here near the entrance to Austin Stack Park," said Cllr O'Brien.





5 Reduce your allergen exposure.

Eye allergies can cause itching, redness, burning and light sensitivity.

Try to limit your exposure or take allergy medication to combat the symptoms.

6 Use artificial tears.

Eye lubrication can go a long way to help treat dry eye, digital eye strain, as well as eye allergies.

7 Use a screen filter app which can block the blue light coming from your screen, and the internal flicker rate of your screen, which can trigger light sensitivity.

More vacant and derelict properties to be turned into social homes as Government announce expansion of Buy and Renew Scheme

Scheme has already brought almost 1,000 previously disused homes into use as social housing

The Government has today announced a significant expansion of the Buy and Renew Scheme, ensuring that more long-term vacant and derelict properties across the country will be transformed into high-quality social homes. Under a new expanded approach, building contractors will, for the first time, be able to directly acquire and refurbish vacant and derelict properties, providing a new delivery channel for bringing disused buildings back into productive use.

Before works begin, contractors must enter into an agreement with a local authority or an Approved Housing Body (AHB) to purchase the homes for social housing when completed. Previously, the scheme was only open to local authorities and AHBs to directly deliver social housing and today's change to the scheme will allow greater scope for restoring more properties.

To date, over 960 previously disused homes have already been brought back into use through the scheme. With the enhancements now being introduced, the pace of renewal is set to accelerate, helping to reduce dereliction and increase the supply of social homes nationwide.

Importantly, the eligibility criteria for the scheme is also being updated so that properties must now be both vacant and derelict, ensuring that the scheme is targeted at the most challenging buildings—those which are less likely to be taken on by private owners through other supports such as the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant.

Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, James Browne TD emphasised:



"I've repeatedly said that allowing buildings to lie idle when homes are needed is not acceptable. Bringing long term derelict buildings back into productive use is one of the most effective ways of increasing supply as well as revitalising communities in our towns and cities.

"Expanding and building on the success of the Buy and Renew Scheme will allow us to tackle some of the most challenging properties, increase the supply of high-quality social homes, and support local builders and tradespeople in the process.

"This approach will help ensure that no building with potential is left idle and that more families can access secure, sustainable homes. Additionally, by tackling the scourge of dereliction, this scheme helps to regenerate town centres."

Originally introduced in 2016, the Buy and Renew Scheme enables local authorities and AHBs to purchase or acquire long-term vacant or derelict properties, refurbish them to required standards and make them available as social housing. The expansion announced

today maintains this core purpose while adding a contractor-led pathway to increase the volume of homes delivered. It will also offer new work opportunities for local builders, tradespeople and small contractors as well as give certainty to contractors who are prepared to restore vacant and derelict properties with the assurance of a guaranteed end purchaser. The forthcoming Derelict Property Tax, due to be introduced in 2027, is also expected to help generate a strong pipeline of suitable properties for renewal under this and other Government schemes.

As part of the Government's Housing Action Plan 'Delivering Homes, Building Communities', local authorities will continue to enhance their dereliction-tackling efforts by expanding Derelict Sites Registers, improving enforcement and advancing compulsory acquisitions where owners fail to engage. A national aggregated Derelict Sites Register including mapping and standardised information will also be published annually.

CALL FOR MINISTER TO EXAMINE TAXATION LEVELS FOR CARERS

Cllr. John O'Donoghue has called on Kerry County Council members to write to the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Social Protection and ask that taxation levels on Carers Benefit and Carers Allowance be re-examined, and that if possible these be excluded from being considered an income".

Speaking at the February meeting of Kerry County Council, Cllr. O'Donoghue said:

"This issue has hit the headlines recently as many carers received letters from Revenue stating that they have tax liabilities. While I absolutely accept that whether carers realised it or not, their allowance was always taxable, I feel now is a good time to seek to have the system revised and if possible that carers allowance be exempted from income tax. Revenue themselves have said that less than 10% of carers will be affected, but since the number is so small, and it in all likelihood wouldn't affect the public finances that much, I am calling for the allowance to be exempted. It is a means tested allowance, and as all other means tested benefits are not taxed, it would bring it in line with the others. It is estimated that carers save this country approximately €20 billion per year as they look after family members in their homes, and this vital work should be supported in any way possible. The Carers Allowance is quite modest and I feel very strongly that it should not be reduced through taxation. I hope my NOM will be supported by my colleagues.

A broad political welcome has greeted confirmation that Kerry will receive more than €65 million in combined national and regional roads funding for 2026, including €33,690,825 for the county's national road network.

Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Michael Healy-Rae described the allocation - more than double last year's €14.2 million - as "a decisive turning point" for Kerry's roads.

"When I made the decision to go into Government, it was to deliver for Kerry and this is exactly what I meant," he said. "Securing €33.6 million for our national roads is a serious statement of intent and a huge leap forward after years where Kerry's national road network was allowed to fall behind."

"People don't want talk - they want tar, tar and more tar - and that is what this allocation will deliver." He said he worked directly with Transport Minister Darragh O'Brien and Minister of State Seán Canney to ensure Kerry's needs were prioritised, adding: "This allocation represents a huge catch-up after years of underinvestment and

sends a clear message that Kerry's national road network is now a priority again."

Deputy Danny Healy-Rae also welcomed the announcement, which includes €31,367,325 for regional roads.

"I welcome the funding for roads announced today which includes €31,367,325 for regional roads in Kerry and €33,690,825 for national roads in Kerry," he said. "I have been working on getting funding for many of these projects for many years and have raised the need for increased funding for roads and bridges in Kerry at every opportunity in the Dáil."

Fianna Fáil TD Michael Cahill said the €65 million investment "will protect and renew roads in County Kerry."

"I am delighted to welcome significant investment in our regional and national roads here in County Kerry," Deputy Cahill said. "This funding will make a real difference in communities right across the county allowing safer roads and more efficient journeys." He added: "Fianna Fáil is committed to maintaining and strengthening our national and regional road

networks right across the country. Today's investment ensures that our roads remain safe and meet the needs of all road users."

Minister for Children, Disability and Equality and Kerry TD Norma Foley confirmed that Kerry would receive €33.6 million in national roads funding and €31.3 million for regional roads.

"Improving the road network and infrastructure through County Kerry is a priority for me as Minister," she said. "I am delighted to confirm that Kerry is to receive funding of €65 million for national and regional roads in the county. I wish to thank my Fianna Fáil party colleague Darragh O'Brien T.D., Minister for Transport, for engaging with me and providing this funding for Kerry."

Projects to benefit include funding for the N22 Killarney Bypass, the N70 in Cahersiveen and from Sneem to Blackwater Bridge, the N86 Tralee to Dingle, works in Glenbeigh, Kenmare to Bonane, Muckross, the Ring of Kerry South, Creamery Cross, Milltown Castlemaine and Listry Bridge.

The funding forms part of a €1.5 billion national roads package announced by Minister O'Brien,

with €718 million allocated to regional and local roads nationwide.

The Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr Michael Foley, has welcomed the allocation of €65m in funding for roads infrastructure in Kerry which has been announced today by Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII).

"This is a very welcome and significant investment in the roads infrastructure here in Kerry and will allow Kerry County Council to progress many key projects across the county which will be of benefit to motorists and all road users," said Cllr Foley.

The funding includes €6m for the N86 Ballynasare to Ballygarret, €2m for the further development of the Farranfore to Killarney Bypass, and €4.5m for N70 Blackwater Bridge to Sneem.

"I welcome also the announcement of funding for safety works, pedestrian crossings, pavement improvements and bridge rehabilitation works."

"Kerry County Council looks forward to working with TII in continuing to enhance and improve our local roads network," said Cllr Foley.



But all's not lost for the Lakers as qualification for a home quarter final is entirely in their own hands with three games remaining and there is no doubt this week will be spent shaking the effects of this defeat off.

Mark Sheehan gave the Lakers the best possible start with a smart basket but the Eagles looked sharp from the off. American Alexander Carlise looked confident early on and his three point play epitomised their early intensity. 

KERRY FC KICK OFF THEIR FIRST DIVISION CAMPAIGN

UCD AFC 2-1 Kerry FC

Kerry FC began their SSE Airtricity Men's First Division campaign on Friday night as they took on UCD AFC in Belfield. Kerry FC enjoyed an impressive off-season, both on and off the pitch. Signings and wins in the Munster Senior Cup have the Kingdom crowd geared up hugely for what promises to be the biggest season yet. Last season, our first trip to Belfield came with a memorable game and result. Two penalty saves from Tim Oliver-Hiemer, and a winning penalty from captain Sean McGrath ensured all three points were heading back to the south on a cold and wet night in the capital.

On Friday, the First Division was back, Kerry FC was back in League of Ireland action, and the Kerry faithful were in full voice on the opening night.

FIRST HALF

The opening stages were played at a lively pace, with both sides pressing high and trying to establish early control. UCD enjoyed spells of possession, but Kerry FC looked dangerous on the break, with Daniel Okwute and Cian Murphy working hard to close down space and force mistakes.

The first notable moment arrived in the 19th minute when Dara Kavanagh's poor clearance was blocked by Murphy, and the ball ricocheted into the path of Okwute. The chance developed quickly, but Kavanagh recovered well and gathered the ball at the second attempt to prevent a major scare.

Kerry FC's intensity was reflected earlier in the half when Niall Brookwell received a yellow card in the seventeenth minute for a challenge in midfield. UCD continued to build pressure and came close on the half-hour mark when they struck the post from close range inside the six-yard box, a major let-off for Matt Connor and the Kerry FC defence.

UCD threatened again soon after when the ball dropped to Luca Caillioce on the edge of the box, but his shot was gathered comfortably by Connor in the thirty-second minute. While UCD had created the clearer openings, Kerry FC began to grow into the contest as the half progressed and started to deliver more threatening balls into the area.

That approach paid off in the forty-third minute, although in an unfortunate fashion for the home side. Okwute delivered a dangerous cross into the box, and Carl Lennox, attempting to deal with it, turned the ball into his own net. The own goal gave Kerry FC a 1-0 lead and rewarded their improved spell late in the half.

UCD attempted to respond before the break but were unable to find an equaliser, and Kerry FC went into half-time with the advantage.



SECOND HALF

UCD returned for the second half with renewed urgency and quickly began to tilt the game in their favour. Kerry FC were forced into more defensive work, and the intensity of the contest increased as both sides fought hard for control. The physical edge of the match showed early in the half when Cian Murphy received a yellow card in the fifty-third minute as he protested a foul given against the Kingdom. UCD's Mikey McCullagh then followed him into the referee's notebook two minutes later, as the game became more stretched and competitive.

The equaliser arrived in the fifty-eighth minute. A free kick from deep was delivered into the Kerry FC penalty area, and Carl Lennox rose to meet it, making amends for his earlier own goal. He reached the ball just before Matt Connor could claim it and guided it into the net to bring UCD level at one goal apiece.

Kerry FC tried to respond quickly and nearly regained the lead in the sixty-first minute. Brandon Bermingham delivered a cross into the area, and Murphy met it at the near post, but his header drifted wide of the target.

UCD continued to press and came close again in the sixty-fourth minute when Hugh Smith struck a shot from inside the box, only for Connor to produce a superb save to keep Kerry FC in the match.

However, the turnaround was completed a minute later. In the sixty-fifth minute, UCD produced a well-worked move with good interplay, and a cross was delivered into the area for Ciaran Behan, who nodded the ball into the far corner to make it two-one.

Colin Healy reacted by making changes, with Luke Palmer replacing Bermingham in the seventy third minute, while UCD introduced Colin Bolton for Louis Dignum. UCD then freshened their midfield and defence in the eightieth minute as Killian Caillioce and Michael

Raggett came on for Stephen Mohan and Smith. Kerry FC pushed forward in the closing stages and made a late change of their own when Cian Brosnan replaced Sean McGrath in the eighty-seventh minute. UCD looked increasingly comfortable managing the game, although the match took another twist late on.

Adam Wells had been booked earlier, and in the ninetieth minute he was shown a second yellow card, leaving UCD to see out the game with ten men. Four minutes of stoppage time were added, and Kerry FC attempted to take advantage, but UCD defended resolutely and limited the visitors to half-chances.

The full-time whistle confirmed a two-one win for UCD AFC on the opening night, as Kerry FC were left frustrated after leading at the break but being unable to withstand UCD's second-half response. Kerry FC must now dust themselves off and get back to the drawing board as they play their first home league game of the 2026 season next Friday, as they take on Athlone Town in Mounthawk Park, which promises to be another tough contest.

Kerry 2-17 Galway 3-14

Well, we might have been counting an amount of chickens about to be hatched, but instead what we definitely got in the finish was a curate's egg. Once upon a time everybody knew about the curates' egg – the parish priest would always get a good egg for his tea. The curate's egg...would be good in parts.

And Kerry, when they were good were very, very good. I liked the start. It seemed to me that Galway were slow in their build-up, a lot of passing before a tame enough shot into Shane Murphy. Kerry, on the other hand, were much more direct. I loved the long, accurate kick-passing. Joe O'Connor long into David Clifford, quick release to Dylan Casey, and Kerry on the scoreboard. Armin Heinrich with a good burst forward, and Micheál Burns from a tight angle made no mistake. Another nicely worked Kerry move, and Keith Evans coolly slotted over.

Joe O'Connor was lording midfield (he was Kerry's best player overall for me), Clifford was a perfect long target with Evans buzzing around him, Armin Heinrich was driving well, Micheál Burns was tigerish, and Cillian Trant wasn't far behind him. Matthew Tierney did pounce on a scrambled clearance to open Galway's account, but David Clifford did gather another high ball and lay off to Trant for a point. In fact, the keeper tipped it over – for me, being honest, a more experienced finisher would have buried a goal there. Shane McGrath (he was my actual man of the match; I thought he was superb) notched Galway's second score.

Kerry were on top now anyway, but Galway didn't help their own cause by coughing up a fairly cheap turnover in their own square. I remember the genial Jerome O'Shea at a Kerry Supporters Social playfully telling Marc Ó Sé how he disapproved of defenders playing ball near their own goal – "just belt it clear, Marc!" I'd be from the same school. Galway should have gathered, but in nipped a Kerry player (Armin, I found out after) to deftly poke it away. Tony Brosnan snapped it up and drilled a piledriver – fair play to Eamon McGrath for a great save, but an alert Keith Evans was following up and slotted the rebound. Good predatory instincts by Kerry, but that was poor defending, to be honest.

The response said a lot about Galway, and maybe a bit about Kerry too. Galway, for once, moved the ball up the field fast. Great football, to be sure, and a Kerry defence that had been calm and controlled against a slow build-up suddenly looked discomfited. Matthew Tierney – along with McGrath, I thought he was involved in everything good about Galway – cut in at a very tight angle and just squeezed it into the net. Not as bad a goal to cough up as Kerry's one – it was very well crafted at speed – but not one you'd be happy with coughing up at the same time.

Both sides left chances behind them before Oisín Mac Donnacha fired over a two pointer. Good work by Tony Brosnan helped set up Joe O'Connor for a well-deserved point. Kerry were much the livelier side, Trant picking off two points and Evans another. 2-14 to 1-5.

Galway needed something to kick-start them. Shane McGrath kicked a great two pointer. Should have added another point, yet again, it dropped short. No matter, Cillian Ó Laoí split the posts.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP DRAWS

Senior Club Championship

Group One

Dr. Crokes, Dingle, Rathmore, Spa

Well, isn't that a lovely group? Judging by this draw I wouldn't say this is a week for Spa to buy any National Lottery ticket! You have the All Ireland club champions – although Dingle might well feel the after-effects of that

long and gruelling campaign and have been susceptible to summer migration in recent years, not to mention the couple of top players living in Australia. Rathmore, who beat Spa fairly comfortably and put up a great battle in last year's County Semi-Final. And just to top it off, Spa's campaign opens with an away game to Dr. Crokes, the reigning champions, who have definitely had the Indian sign over their neighbours in all competitions in recent years and who will have been incentivised after that loss to Mid Kerry last year.

Realistically you'd fancy Crokes and Dingle to advance from this group, but Rathmore were excellent last year and nobody will fancy playing them. Too close to call, I reckon.

Group Two

Kenmare Shamrocks, Templenoe, Austin Stacks

I'd have Stacks right up among the overall favourites – they will have recent county players on their subs' bench and arguably have the most depth in their panel. Kenmare Shamrocks probably have the most in-form player in the country right now – Seán O'Shea's performance against Donegal was reminiscent for me of Seán Cavanagh in 2008 or Maurice himself back in 1997. Moreover, not least because of the same Seán's work in SP Inbhearr Scéine, Kenmare have a lot of blossoming young talent. Suggestions that they are a one man team are just lazy characterisation in my opinion. My own feeling is that Templenoe are likely to struggle. They have been batting above their weight for so long that I think we have all started to take them a little bit for granted, but I think the inhibitions of population size might finally be catching up with them.

Group Three

Na Gaeil, An Ghaeltacht, Milltown/ Castlemaine

A tough group to call. Na Gaeil, with players involved with Kerry in both codes, had struggled for a couple of years and may have been lucky that relegation wasn't on the table once or twice, but last year they were a revelation, powering their way to the final. With all the big guns like the Barrys, Okumbor, and Diarmuid O'Connor in play, the only part of the jigsaw in question is whether the likes of Maunsell, Sheehan, and Devine can provide scores equal

to their quality of play. An Ghaeltacht bring an All Ireland trophy with them back to senior ranks, again, that long campaign might take a toll. But they are physically big and have a range of scoring threats. Milltown/Castlemaine have taken some fairly comprehensive defeats in the last couple of years. The team that won promotion had an older profile. Mid Kerry football is unquestionably on the rise, but I think it will be another two years before we really see that.

Intermediate Championship

Group One

Fossa, Ballymacelligott, Glenbeigh/ Glencar, Gneeveguilla

Fossa have been knocking really hard on the door in recent years, reaching two finals in three years. A fully fit Paudie Clifford could be that little bit extra to get them over the line.... arrah, you'd be as well off throwing darts at the moon as guessing at the favourites in the Intermediate. But Fossa will certainly be aiming to get out of the group at the very least. Ballymac....well, when I say that Fossa have been knocking hard on the door....Ballymac have finally gotten promotion from the Premier Junior, and are bringing an All Ireland trophy with them. They also have a good young contingent pushing into senior ranks. It's a big jump, though. Glenbeigh/Glencar are not the force that they were; I suspect that their clash with Ballymac will have a big say in how the group plays out and Ballymac would be slight favourites there for me with that bit extra in terms of firepower. A full strength Gneeveguilla are a big handful for anybody, but my understanding is that they will be missing a couple of key players.

Group 2

Kilcummin, John Mitchels, Firies, Ballydonoghue

Kilcummin had a good run at it last year and will rattle cages along the way again. Serious contenders, especially with the O'Shea brothers in form. John Mitchels are an old power but certainly not the force they were – is it just me, or did the move outside of town to their undeniably superb facilities maybe work against them a little bit? I don't really see them getting out of the group. Firies are

another young side who pushed hard last year and have made very good progress in recent years. I thought they were maybe a little bit unlucky not to reach the knockout stages last year, and I think they can do it this time around. They have scoring power, I rated James Horgan even before his excellent Sigerson campaign. Ballydonoghue...a tough outfit, and Jason Foley has been an absolute phenomenon for them in championship football, but have they enough? I fancy Kilcumin and Fries to emerge from this group.

Group 3

Killarney Legion, Listowel Emmets, Laune Rangers, St. Mary's Cahersiveen

Tough group. Legion are a match for anybody when on song, but they struggle to put the choir together. For me they have been slightly less than the sum of their parts, good football, but not enough of it shows on the scoreboard. They should certainly be able to get out of the group. Listowel Emmets are defensively solid and Joe Joe Grimes was one of the players of the championship for me last year. It'll take a good team to beat them, but there's plenty of good teams chasing an Intermediate title. Laune Rangers could not have run Stacks any closer two years ago and will be very disappointed with failing to qualify last year despite their opening win over Legion. They have been unlucky with injuries and absentees in recent times. The quality is there, though, Clifford, Cleary, the Hassetts....if they click, and it is a big 'if', they really could go all the way. South Kerry football is struggling, and there's no point denying it. St. Marys will go out swinging – they gave Glenflesk a ferocious battle last year - but I do expect them to bow out at the group stage.

Group Four

Kerins O' Rahilly's, Glenflesk, Beaufort, Castleisland Desmonds

There's no easy groups, but that one is savage altogether. No matter what, there's going to be two good teams gone at the first hurdle. Beaufort are probably overall favourites for me – I know, they'll love me saying that! But I just think that they have quality all over the field. In fact, I thought that they were caught on the hop by that late Paudie Clifford goal last year, having left a fair few goal chances behind themselves. Glenflesk are another team that are always there or thereabouts. They have just been unlucky, I don't think they have had their first choice fifteen on the field at any one time in recent championships. And they haven't brought Wayne Quillinan in because he is a nice guy. Don't get me wrong, Wayne is a very nice guy, but he won't be teaching them the finer points of social etiquette!

Rahillys didn't qualify last year. They are finding it difficult to replace players like David Moran and Tommy Walsh – so would any other club. Again, they are perfectly capable of qualifying, but do they have the strength in depth to go all the way? Respectfully, I don't think so. Castleisland Desmonds are a mercurial side. It almost seems to me that they can rattle any of the top teams, but struggle to put away more

average sides. You never really know what you are going to get.

Junior Premier

Group 1

Listry, Annascaul, Tarbert, Ardfert

Lads, that's another tough group. Listry have been knocking hard on that door and with that midfield diamond and a scoring inside line, they'll be very dangerous again. Ardfert at full strength (they will need the hurlers on board) can take anybody. Possibly need another reliable scorer. Tarbert, last year's Junior champions, have been on the rise for the last few years. I can't see them winning the competition out, but they will have a say in the final destination. Annascaul didn't get out of the group last year and, good side though they are, I don't think they have improved enough to get through – the likes of Killian Falvey, Gearóid Lyne, and Colm Moriarty have plenty of time to change my mind, though!

Group Two

Keel, Waterville, Duagh, St. Pat's

Keel bowed out to St. Senans in last year's semi-final and they will certainly be looking to go at least one step further if not more. There's a reason Keith Evans is playing with the Kerry seniors and there will be at least one more of the clan reaching that level in the next year or two. For years all you needed to know about any Keel game was "How much did Gary Sayers score?" Those days are gone. Gary is still deadly, but he's a long way from their only threat now. Waterville, Duagh, and St. Pats will have a fair battle for the second qualifying spot. Duagh with Cormac Dillon....maybe.

Group 3

Piarsaigh na Dromoda, Currow, Churchill, Brosna

Churchill are a very solid Division Two outfit and very consistent. I can certainly see them getting out of the group. Currow could feel a fair bit of justified grievance after last year's controversy and they have a really solid team anyway. Mind you, there's nothing easy in this

group for anybody. Dromid have a fine team, St. Marys' main rivals in South Kerry in recent years. Graham O'Sullivan drives their engine, Niall Ó Sé is as deadly a sharpshooter as ever, and Donagh Shine O'Sullivan has been in with Kerry already this year. Brosna are another tough, consistent outfit.. The likes of Eamon Kiely and Timmy Finnegan are great footballers, but they always need Adam Barry wearing his shooting boots.

Group Four

St. Senan's, Ballyduff, Reenard, Castlegregory

Of course you'd have to fancy St. Senans after last year's campaign. Last two campaigns, really, and the form of the likes of Cillian Trant, Seán O'Connell, the Kennellys, Dillon, Foran, McGrath....they could win it out. Plenty of wild cards, though. Ballyduff....when it comes to football, they can beat anybody any time they hurl the handle along with the hatchet. Hurling comes first, though. Castlegregory are real dark horses for me. Thomas O'Donnell is in with Kerry, Cian O'Grady is nigh on as dangerous, Maurice O'Connell, veteran Alan Fitzgerald....I wouldn't fancy taking them on. Reenard have good footballers in the likes of Seán Teahan, Mark Sugrue, and Michael O'Leary, but I don't think they have the strength in depth to maintain a championship run.

Group 1

Cordal, Valentia, St. Michael's-Foilmore, Sneem/Derrynane

I think you'd have to fancy St. Michael's/Foilmore. Ian O'Sullivan is a quality attacker. If they had Jack Clifford and Matthew O'Sullivan....ah well, sure, if wishes were wings we would all be flying. Cordal are always there or thereabouts; I'd certainly expect them to get out of the group. Killian Dennehy is one of the best young prospects in the country, let alone Kerry, and if they have Philip O'Connor back from injury..... They may as well get used to the road down to South Kerry! Valentia have made a great return after very early folding, and with Emmett Daly they always have a chance. Sneem/Derrynane have handy forwards as well, Zak Fayan, Ruairí

Burns, Tom Clifford....up against it, though.

Group Two

Moyvane, Ballylongford, Finuge, Tuosist

Tough group to call. I'd fancy Moyvane, last year's finalists, to get there again, with the Stacks, Mulvihills, and Darragh O'Keeffe on board. After that? Your guess is as good as mine. Tuosist surprised a few of us last year, they punch above their weight. Ballylongford had a tough campaign last year and to be honest, it's not going to get any easier this time around. I'd say the same for Finuge. The likes of Gavin O'Keeffe, Jeremy McKenna, Ivan Conway, and Ricky Heffernan are fine footballers, but you are a long way from the days of the Corridans, Galvins, and Eamonn Fitzmaurice.

Group Three

Beale, Cromane, Lios Póil

I suspect that Lios Póil have drawn the short straw here. Beale must be short odds to win the competition outright after reaching last year's final. A great all-round team, but I'll certainly be looking out for Rob Stack. Kerry currently have a lot of midfield options – a good campaign by Stack will definitely see him join that company. Cromane have quietly become really solid as well, aside from their brilliant ladies' team, and Darren Houlahan is a huge handful for any opposition. 

Gardening

SPRING BEDDING PLANTS

Between now and the summertime there is still plenty of time to put a big of colour in the garden with some spring flowering bedding plants. It is probably best this Spring to use them in containers and baskets as the ground is saturated from the amount of rainfall we have experienced.

The first thing you have to do is choose the type of container you want. There are lots to choose from i.e. Terracotta, glazed, plastic and wooden. Now that you have chosen a pot, the first and most important thing to do is sort out the drainage. All terracotta and glazed pots should already have drainage holes in them. Plastic ones probably won't so you will have to punch some holes in them. Next you need to put some gravel or aero board broken up over the holds of the pot and then cover with some landscape fabric like Mypex. Now it is time to add some compost and ideally some slow release fertilizer mixed with it. Then choose some plants. Firstly choose a center piece and always make sure that center piece is evergreen and suitable for the size of the container. This way you will only have to change the bedding plants from season to season.

Here is a list of good winter/spring bedding plants for containers:

Primroses, Polyanthus, winter pansies, cyclamen, ornamental cabbages and trailing ivy.

A Word of Victory

"I am greatly afflicted; renew and revive me, O Lord, according to Your Word"
(Psalm 119:107 Amplified Bible).

Welcome back dear student, there is a saying... 'it knocked the stuffing out of me' meaning something caused such distress; exhausting and weakening the one affected. As a kid my bicycle was my transport if I wanted to meet friends during school holidays. I was not at all mechanical, so nothing was more upsetting than when my tyres were flat. But lo and behold when someone fixed it, the tyre was re-inflated, and my freedom and joy was restored! Life can be like that bike. All is great at times, then bang – your gallop is halted. "My earthly life clings to the dust, revive and refresh me according to Your Word" (Psalm 119:25-28 – also verse 50, and verse 93). Negative experiences rock a person's confidence in themselves, and in others. Toxic encounters leave a bitter taste. Health issues, or financial problems are heavy stressful weights to navigate through. But there is Good News - the Word of God revives us!

"Behold, the days are coming, declares the Lord God, when I will send famine on the land - not a famine of bread or a thirst for water, but a famine of hearing the Word of the Lord. People will stagger from sea to sea and roam... seeking the Word of the Lord but won't find it. Beautiful girls and strong young men will grow faint in that day, thirsting for the Lord's Word" (Amos 8:11-13). Could this be why so many struggle with anxiety, oppression, unhealed trauma, or physical infirmities - because there is a severe lack of knowledge of God's Word in today's world? Beautiful generations have been duped into believing that God is not relevant to them - that they instead have the 'power of the universe' within them to bring their own success, and that faith in Jesus is weird and unnecessary – only fit for sad people. There's plenty of rituals, formulas, and step programmes promoted, but relationship through the Living Saviour with the God Who created and knows us inside out, is frowned upon as freakish. Yet statistics don't lie. Suicide, breakdown of minds, marriages, families, and societies all point to something lacking (Hosea 4:6). Never before have we had so much therapy, and organisations helping humanity; yet problems worsen. People lean more on drink, drugs, prescription meds, and social media - anything to get a feeling of peace, joy, and significance. Once Jesus met a woman who was fetching water when everyone else was inside out of the midday sun. There was a reason she was alone. Her sinful lifestyle shunned her from others. She was isolated, in troublesome pain. She had knowledge of religion, but no revelation of God. She had sought love and found turmoil. Jesus asked her for a drink and talked to her about receiving His Living Water that leads to eternal life. This personal encounter with the Messiah changed her forever. He knew things about her life by the Holy Spirit, which caused her to run and tell her villagers that she had met God's promised Saviour (Psalm 139:1-12). Meeting Jesus not only affected her, but impacted the whole neighbourhood, and many had life changing experiences with Him as a result of her testimony (John 4:14-42). Jesus said, if we abide in His Word: continually obeying His teachings, living in accordance with them, then we are truly His disciples, and we will know the Truth, and that Truth that we know and understand, shall set us free (John 8:31-32; John 7:37-38). God's plan for you dear one, is not a deflated life – it is to revive you with His Living Water! We need You Lord Jesus, as the air we breathe.
