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

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Killarney Aims for Gold

in Tidy Towns Competition

illarney is setting its sights on Tidy Towns glory, buoyed by a strong showing in the latest Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) League rankings. The positive result is seen as a timely morale boost as the town prepares for the upcoming visit from Tidy Towns adjudicators.

According to Killarney Chamber of Tourism Commerce, the impressive performance reflects the ongoing dedication of local volunteers, residents, and businesses to maintaining high environmental standards. The Chamber emphasised that this recognition is "just the tonic" the town needs as it strives for top honors in this year's Tidy Towns competition.

The IBAL judges ranked Killarney third overall in the country and congratulated everybody who played a part in what they termed "a superb performance".

Chamber Co-President and Tidy Towns committee member, Johnny McGuire, said what was most encouraging is that no less than seven of the 10 sites inspected on this occasion received the top A grade and the judges were very impressed by all the approach roads to town.

"You only get one chance to make a first impression and it's great to hear that the impact Killarney gives when approaching the town is a very good one," Mr McGuire said.

He said enormous credit is due to the management and staff of Killarney Municipal District Council who have performed in an outstanding fashion and they are leading by example by presenting the town at its very best.

"It's not that long ago when Killarney was languishing well down the IBAL league table but the team in the town hall and dedicated volunteers have really turned that around and created a town we can all be very proud of," the Chamber official said.

PROTECTING NATIVE SPECIES

Sika deer, a species introduced to Killarney from Japan, should be removed completely to protect our native oak woodlands and our native Red deer, according to Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill. Sika are not yet classified as an 'invasive species' but the Kerry Deputy believes that, given the fact they are not native and that they pose a threat to our native Red deer and oak woodlands, we should be pushing for their reclassification and removal.

"The explosion in the numbers of deer, now seen wandering far from Killarney National Park is a sign that there is insufficient food sources to keep them in their usual haunts. As they have no natural predator, culling is the only way of managing their numbers. And the fact that our native oak trees are under threat from deer eating the bark must ring alarm bells" stated Deputy Cahill.

"The sheer vastness of numbers means that deer of both species are a danger on roads throughout Kerry and are also the cause of recent rises in the incidence of Lyme disease, borne by ticks that attach themselves to deer. If we wish to protect both our native Red deer and woodland oak, and reduce the spread of Lyme, it makes sense that we have a major cull

of deer" said the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Older People and Tourism. "I have raised this in Dáil Éireann and have been advised by the Minister that there is ongoing work being done at EU level and by the Irish Deer Management Strategy Group (IDMSG), and that protection of our native woodlands is a priority. I will continue to push for this significant cull" added Michael Cahill TD.

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Funding Announced for Killarney Teen Hangout Project on Park Road

inister for Children, Disability, Equality, and Kerry TD Norma Foley has announced €50,000 in funding to develop a new recreational space for teenagers in Killarney.

The Killarney Teen Hangout will be located on the Park Road, Killarney. The project includes an outdoor 'hangout' shelter, sheltered seating area, integrated Bluetooth speakers, outdoor exercise units, boxup outdoor locker and bike racks. The shelter will be prefabricated and brought onto the site. The features and equipment included in the final design will ensure that teenagers with additional needs will be able to access it, this will include wheelchair accessibility. The location of the site is adjacent to a private carpark with train and services 3 mins walk from the site.

The funding, secured through the Dormant Accounts Fund, aims to address the growing need for teenage-specific amenities such as multiuse games areas (MUGAs) and social "hangout" spaces. The initiative recognises the increasing teenage population and the limited number of recreational facilities currently available for them.

Local Authorities, in partnership with their local Comhairle na nÓg, were invited to submit proposals developed in consultation with young people. Applications were evaluated by both youth and adult panels. Kerry County Council's successful application will see the creation of a "Killarney Teen Hangout," offering a safe, inclusive, and engaging environment for teenagers.

Minister Foley commented:

"This funding will provide innovative and exciting recreational spaces for teenagers in our county. By providing safe, inclusive spaces for our young people, we are investing in the future of our communities. I'm especially pleased that young people played a central role in shaping and assessing these projects."

Commenting on the news, Michael Cahill said, "This is fantastic news for



young people in Killarney and a welcome investment in their wellbeing, social development, and inclusion. Teenagers are too often left out of the conversation when it comes to community amenities. The €50,000 secured for the Killarney Teen Hangout project is a vote of confidence in our youth and a recognition of their right to accessible, safe, and inclusive spaces where they can connect and grow."

Michael Cahill also praised the collaborative approach taken in developing the project, with meaningful input from young people via Kerry Comhairle na nÓg, Kerry's youth council. "Young people were at the heart of this application, and I commend Kerry County Council and our local Comhairle na nÓg for ensuring the voices of teenagers were heard and acted upon. This is exactly how community planning should be done, with young people, not just for them."

Michael Cahill concluded, "This is a step in the right direction for Kerry and a strong endorsement of our young people's needs and ideas. I look forward to seeing this project take shape and will continue working to secure further investment in youth services and spaces throughout the county."

MILLIONS OF EURO FOR THE FOSSA STRAIGHT



Over one month on, I finally got the figures for the Fossa straight. And they are not narrow! Just to recap, the road project is under the control of Kerry County Council.

The N72 Fossa Traffic Calming and Enhanced Cyclist and Pedestrian Improvement Scheme commencing West of the N72 / R563 junction at the Golden Nugget Bar and Restaurant to East of N72 L4040 Gap Cross junction is 1.574km in length.

Now, no one for the past month could give me an exact price. I asked some councillors and they told me it was three million euro. On e-tender comment sites I saw figures of up to five million.

The truth is closer to five than three. The final approved tender figure is €3,976,388.91. And this excludes VAT.

The aim of the project in Fossa is to address safety issues the council said.

The design provides speed management, improves the existing active travel facilities and includes measures for Safe Routes to School. And apparently it follows the Design Manual for Urban Roads & Streets and the National

Transport Authority's (NTA's) Cycle Design Manual, which are mandatory design standards for roads through urban areas.

Sorensen Civil Engineering Ltd. had submitted the most economically advantageous tender Drainage and landscaping is included.

The tender assessment report was submitted to TII for approval.

So there it is - just over a kilometer and a half and the cost is four million euro. And I have rarely heard more concern about a project and more dissatisfaction. Not the works, but the design, it has to be stressed. Sorensen are simply doing what they tendered for.

At this stage, I think our public representatives in Killarney and our TDs need to be more forensic. They need to read the small print in major projects, ask the hard questions before giving approval. And find out the cost when the tender is awarded.

NEW REGIONAL HEALTH STRUCTURE EQUALS THE RETURN OF THE HEALTH BOARDS

Twenty years ago, Micheal Martin's big idea as health minister, apart from banning smoking, was the creation of the HSE.

The centralised system would work better than the health boards which were vulnerable to local pressures and be more accountable, Micheal as health minister felt in 2004.

Mary Harney who succeded him implemented the disaster that is the HSE.

Kerry became part of a massive regional health forum that included Cork city and county councils of Carlow, Cork, Kilkenny, South Tipperary, Waterford and Wexford.

And guess what now? The latest thinking is that local people need local access.

Centralised and stream lined how are you, the HSE became a labyrinth. Or perhaps a maze. No

one knew where to go or how to get into it and getting out of it often posed problems.

Just to give you a taste of the disaster the HSE as conceived by our Taoiseach was. When I had a query on the acute hospital in Tralee I had to go to a private PR agency in Dublin. When I had a query about a community hospital I had to go to a communications office in Cork; and when it was to do with other health matters then the place was the HSE central office in Dublin. Then there was also the Department of Health. It was a mess. And frequently you would get a reply saying this after all was not the right place. So what it was like for patients can be deduced from that. Streamlined? No.

Now we are to have six new 'health regions'. The responsibility will be for community care as well as hospitals is all in the one place now. Again.

What we have of course is a return of the old health boards. Kerry is now once more with Cork City and Cork County.

However the last meeting of the regional health forum elicited important information thanks to questions by Deirdre Ferris and Marie Moloney.

Deirdre got a list of the empty buildings owned by the HSE in Kerry while Marie received the first written commitment by the HSE to a primary care centre in the Áras Phádraig site. The HSE said it was "fully committed".

"There have been a number of previous attempts to provide a primary care facility in Killarney, with little positive results on the same," Julie O Neill , Integrated Healthcare Manager Kerry, HSE South West said.

"Both the HSE and Kerry County Council officials are of the opinion that the provision of the Theatre and a Primary Care facility on the same site in an urban setting will be complementary to each development from a planning and sustainability view point," the manager added.

LET OUR RIVERS RUN FREE

The canal at Ross is being cleared thanks to a question by Michael Cahill TD in the Dáil.

Lots of our rivers are clogged and unsightly. It is some years since the late Sheila O'Donoghue raised concern about the build up in the Flesk River near her.

It was nearly an island, Sheila said at the time. Could they not clean it, she wondered.

Well it was not cleaned. And now it is an island and it is very unsightly. Rivers have input from conservation bodies including the NPWS and Inland Fisheries Ireland but they are primarily the responsibility of the OPW and the Kerry County Council. The OPW will actually fund most of the cost of clearing a river but it is up to the council to put forward the case there is a risk of flooding.


Looking at the Flesk at the moment, there is a clear risk of flooding with further build up and if not flooding then the erosion of the banks is on the cards too. The water is having to circumvent the growing island and indeed islands and is forming channels. That means a greater body of water and faster flowing is building up on either side.

There was an interesting motion to come before the council meeting on Monday in Tralee by Robert Brosnan. He asked that Kerry County Council

flood division engage with the OPW, IFI, and landowners to plan for river/ stream clean-ups over the coming months. Alas though it wasn't moved presumably because before it was reached Robert and his colleagues in Sinn Fein stormed out over some perceived insult about their party structure which was later withdrawn,

I have to tell you I am far more interested in cleaning up the rivers of the present than the past. It is a great pity the motion was not moved. Let our clogged rivers run free is what I say!

COMMUNITY FIGHTING BACK Against Invasive Enemy

major community initiative aimed at tackling the widespread devastation caused by the invasive rhododendron plant in the 27,000-acre Killarney National Park is making remarkable headway.

Since 2014, dedicated volunteers from the Killarney Mountain Meitheal have been at the forefront of the fight, contributing an estimated 30,000 work hours to date. Their tireless efforts have formed the backbone of an ambitious programme that continues to gain momentum—and deliver significant results.

This grassroots movement, driven by a deep commitment to protecting the park's natural biodiversity, stands as a powerful example of community action in the face of ecological threats.

The National Parks and Wildlife Service – which is spearheading the project – has confirmed that thousands of acres have been cleared by park staff, paid contractors and volunteers.

NPWS Divisional Manager, Eamonn Meskell, said the ongoing eradication work is necessary in such a hugely important area for biodiversity, including ancient oak and yew woodlands.

The Trustees of Muckross House are the main sponsor of the voluntary Mountain Meitheal which sees dozens of volunteers taking to the woods to tackle the rhododendron, every Sunday and Tuesday morning, from October to Mav.

To date, the Trustees have provided funding of €120,000 for insurance, equipment, fuel, training and food. The specialist training involves chainsaw-handling courses, as well as instruction in trail design and maintenance, manual handling and the use of pesticides.

"It is a pleasure to be in a position to support the work of the Meitheal," declared Muckross House General Manager Shane Treacy.

"The dedication displayed by the volunteers is staggering and it reflects the esteem in which the National Park is held by the people of Killarney.

"The Trustees look forward to working with the NPWS and supporting the Meitheal for many years to come," he added.

One of the Meitheal founders, Johnny McGuire, said the project has involved the equivalent of 1,000 volunteers annually.

"We're working to clear rhododendron from highly sensitive areas of the National Park under the auspices of the management of the NPWS but we wouldn't be in a position to achieve our goals without the support of the Trustees of Muckross House and the NPWS," he added.

Mr McGuire said the volunteers are encouraged that the necessary resources have been put at the

disposal of the NPWS to keep the wonderful State asset that is the National Park in an appropriate condition.

"We take great satisfaction in experiencing the transformative impact of the recent purchase of two specialist, heavy-duty machines by the NPWS to eradicate the rhododendron in an efficient, labour-saving, speedy way," he said.

The Mountain Meitheal held a total of 53 workcamps between last October and this May with an average of over 20 volunteers per outing.

"These sessions are essential for giving native plants an opportunity to regenerate naturally," said Mr McGuire

Specific areas in the National Park which have been the focus of the Meitheal work include the Blue Pool, Bluebell Wood and the Abbey Wood.


Another sponsor, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce, provided food, accommodation and transport for three Men's Sheds workcamps which saw 120 men from all over the country volunteering for three days of clearance duties in Killarney

Companies and organisations in Killarney are also turning out in sizeable groups to help with the clearance work and the organisers would be delighted if more people were willing to get involved in that way, even on a once-off basis.

Killarney National Park, which is home to rare plants and animals, is one of the most important areas for biodiversity in Ireland, but invasive species, such as rhododendron, have been a major threat to that biodiversity.

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


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PAT FAVIER PAYS TRIBUTE TO

The late Paddy O'Donoghue B.E.

Paddy O'Donoghue (78), who was fatally injured in an accident while cycling near Kilgarvan recently, was born at Killeen, Clonkeen in the parish of Glenflesk, and was a lifelong supporter of local projects.

Paddy's commitment to causes, his powerful work ethic and his infectious enthusiasm brought success to many ventures.

His sporting talents were quickly recognized while an engineering student at University College Cork. He has the rare distinction of holding a Sigerson Cup Medal as well as a Cork Co. Championship medal winning both in 1969.

These achievements were followed by winning the inaugural All Ireland Club Championship with East Kerry in 1971. All the while he regularly lined out with Glenflesk in their various games, which included a County Junior Championship win in 1970. Participation in the Ballyvourney football tournament was a 'must' every summer. Paddy managed to find time to act as secretary and selector with Glenflesk Club.

Having qualified with a Bachelor of Engineering Degree, Paddy spent a few years working in Cork, but there was never a doubt that he would return to his native Kerry where he spent the remainder of his career with Kerry County Council. Not a fan of bureaucratic niceties Paddy's focus was on the delivery of a reliable and abundant supply of water to the people of Kerry through council and group schemes.

Paddy's espousal of the sport of cycling brought him to many parts of the country while travelling thousands of miles. He was an avid participant in the annual Ring of Kerry Cycle.

Paddy was an integral part of the technical development of St. Agatha's Park in the early 70's. His leadership and engineering acumen transformed some grazing land and a railway embankment into a top class playing pitch which is utilized by successive generations. His expertise was also freely available during the construction of the accompanying GAA Hall.

Paddy's esteem in the community was evident at the removal of his remains when a Guard of Honour was formed by Co. Council staff, Ring of Kerry Cycle Committee and the Glenflesk GAA Club. It was fitting that Paddy's remains were lowered at Killaha Graveyard to the strains of the local anthem, "Glenflesk of You we are Proud". (Pat Favier)





Eithne Murphy to Take on Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle in Honour of Her Father

On July 5th, Eithne Murphy, originally from Gneeveguilla and now living in Castleisland, will take on the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle for the very first time. She's doing so in support of the Irish Kidney Association, a cause that holds deep personal meaning for her.

This year's cycle holds special significance: it coincides with the anniversary month of her father Ted Murphy's life-changing kidney transplant, which he received twelve years ago. Eithne's participation is a heartfelt tribute to her father's journey and a way to give back to the organization that supports kidney patients and their families across Ireland.

By joining thousands of other cyclists on the scenic 170km route, Eithne is not only challenging herself physically but also helping raise vital funds and awareness for those affected by kidney disease.

The eldest of three sibling sisters, Eithne is cycling in honour of the deceased kidney donor to her father whose kidney transplant in July 2013 at Beaumont Hospital marked a major turning point in his health and his family's life following nearly three years of dialysis treatment.

What led to Ted's diagnosis of end-stage kidney disease was that he presented at Mallow General Hospital feeling extremely unwell and was transferred from there to Cork University Hospital. After a series of tests, doctors discovered he had been born with just one kidney – and that it was failing. He quickly progressed to dialysis



treatment which he depended on to keep him alive, and the news came as a major shock to the whole family.

"It was such a difficult time," Eithne recalls. "We had no idea anything was wrong. Watching him go through dialysis attending Tralee General Hospital three times a week and seeing how it affected his energy and quality of life and watching him lose weight was heartbreaking."

Now retired from his long career at Munster Joinery, Ted still resides in Gneeveguilla. He is the proud grandfather of five grandchildren, the youngest of whom, Dervila (11) was born just three months after his transplant.

"We're so glad to still have our dad here with us," said Eithne. "He's been able to watch his grandchildren – who were very young when he got sick – grow up, and we never take that for granted. The transplant gave us more time together, and we'll always be thankful for that."

Eithne, who herself a mother of two and works at an accountancy practice in Killarney, is participating in the iconic Ring of Kerry charity cycle to give back to the Irish Kidney Association, who supported her father and family throughout his journey.

"I'm so grateful for everything the Irish Kidney Association has done. Taking part in this cycle is my way of saying thank you and honouring my dad's kidney donor and their family. It's a small gesture, to show my appreciation."

She's encouraging others to support her efforts, not only to raise funds but also to spread awareness of kidney health and the importance of organ donation. "Any support you can give would mean the world - not just to me and my family, but to so many others who rely on this incredible charity including over 2,500 dialysis patients and their families from around the country. Thank you for helping me give back and raise awareness for this vital cause." At the heart of the legendary Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle is the Irish Kidney Association (IKA), the grassroots charity that founded the event 43 years ago. Since then, the IKA has played a pivotal role in not only organising the iconic ride but also in raising crucial awareness and funds for kidney patients. Kerry Player Lands €2,000 a Month for 5 Years





Tesco Ireland Launches "STRONGER STARTS COOKS" PROGRAMME IN KILLARNEY

Tesco Ireland has introduced Stronger Starts Cooks, a free, six-week educational programme focused on children's health and nutrition. Rolled out to nearly 3,000 pupils in 42 primary schools, the initiative is currently running in Gaelscoil Faithleann, Killarney, involving 69 students.

Aimed primarily at 5th class pupils, the curriculum-aligned programme includes hands-on cooking workshops, lessons in food science and safety, and a guided visit to a local Tesco store. Students learn about food origins, nutrition, and budgeting in an engaging, real-world context.

92% of Munster parents want more food education in schools.

Dogs Trust Issues Hot Weather WarningFOR DOG OWNERS

The charity is advising dog owners to walk their dogs during cooler mornings and evenings to prevent heatstroke which can be fatal

Tips and advice on keeping canines cool can be found on DogsTrust.ie/ HotWeather

With the sunny weather set to make a comeback this week and temperatures reaching into the twenties, Dogs Trust is reminding dog owners to protect their pooches during the summer months. Dogs aren't able to handle the heat as easily as people can, and high temperatures can quickly become dangerous, and potentially fatal, for them.

Exercise is one of the biggest risk-factors for dogs developing heatstroke with more than two-thirds of cases occurring from simply walking in the heat.* Dogs Trust recommends walking dogs in the cooler times of the day such as early morning or later in the evening when temperatures aren't as high. The charity also advises owners to keep walks short, bring plenty of water for your dog to drink and take breaks in the shade if needed.

While all dogs are susceptible to heatstroke, certain breeds with flatter faces such as Bulldogs and Pugs can be up to fourteen times more likely to be affected.** Dogs Trust is also warning owners with older dogs, overweight dogs, or dogs with underlying health conditions to remain extra vigilant during the warmer summer months, as these dogs are more likely to struggle with the increased temperatures.

While exercising dogs in hot weather is the most common cause of heatstroke, dogs need to be kept cool while at home too. Dogs Trust advises owners to always ensure their dog has somewhere cool and shaded to relax both indoors and outdoors. Make sure they also have

access to plenty of cool, fresh water throughout the day to keep them hydrated.

The charity is also reiterating the ever-important message to never leave dogs alone in a hot car. On a 22-degree Celsius Day, the temperature in a car can rise by 11-degress in just 10-minutes. Parking in the shade or rolling down the windows does little to alleviate this, so please, never take the risk.

As the reigning champions from the last staging in 2018, Ireland will be hoping to defend their European crown next month, and with the likes of Damien in the lineup, their prospects look strong.


head coach Brian Priske at one of Central Europe's most storied clubs.

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Work begins on Ross Castle Canal clean-up-CAHILL

Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Deputy Michael Cahill, has welcomed an update from the Minister for Housing; Local Government and Heritage, James Browne TD on the cleaning of the Canal by Ross Castle in Killarney.

By way of Parliamentary Question, Deputy Cahill asked the Minister for clarification on the cleaning of the Canal by Ross Castle in Killarney into the lake and for the works to be expedited. The Minister informed Deputy Cahill that consultation on this issue with local representatives of the relevant stakeholders and positive discussions about those issues have taken place.

The Minister went on to confirm that the NPWS, the National Parks and Wildlife Service, will be clearing the Bunrower end of the Canal, and this is much needed according to Deputy Cahill.

"I am happy to hear that the National Parks and Wildlife Service is progressing this matter. The Minister has confirmed to me that the NPWS will be clearing the Bunrower end of the canal" stated Deputy Cahill.

"I acknowledge the Ministers response of the scale of work being significant, but this work needs to be carried out as soon as possible in order to preserve the lake. It is vital the NPWS continues to engage on the ground and keep locals informed on its progress" said Deputy Cahill.



Concluding Deputy Cahill stated he was pleased to hear the NPWS will maintain an open channel to the Canal at Ross Castle to continue to allow boat access.

"Finally, I am pleased to hear that the NPWS will continue to allow boat access along the Canal at Ross Castle and this is absolutely vital to the local economy in Killarney" said the newly elected TD. "This is essential in the summer months and it is a hotspot for boats and visitors. I'd like to thank the Minister for his engagement on this matter, and I look forward to further engagement as it progresses," concluded the Fianna Fáil Spokesperson on Tourism.

ENERGY BILLS SET TO INCREASE DUE TO SOARING NETWORK COSTS – Pa Daly TD

Sinn Féin spokesperson on the Environment, Climate and Energy, Pa Daly TD, has called on the government and energy regulator to ensure that rising network charges do not lead to increases in household bills.

Teachta Daly said: "Households have been hit with another blow following the announcement that their electricity bills were set to soar by at least €83 due to rising network charges.

"Ireland already has the highest electricity prices in Europe. Hundreds of thousands of households are in arrears. And rates of energy poverty are at record highs.

"Ordinary workers and families are already at breaking point as the cost-of-living crisis rages on. They simply cannot afford another price hike.

"At the same time, significant investment is urgently needed in our electricity grid. That is not in question.

"Without it, we have no hope of meeting our



housing targets, let alone anything else.

"Households, however, should not be punished for Ireland's infrastructural deficits that successive Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael governments created. "What we need is a fair funding model, with the burden more equitably distributed. Large energy users like data centres should be paying their fair share.

"Direct exchequer investment also has a role, as outlined in Sinn Féin's proposals for a renewable energy investment fund.

"I am calling on government and the regulator to do everything in their power to minimise the impact of these network charge increases on households. Many are already at breaking point.

"I am also urging them to keep their election promise of bringing down the cost of energy. While a minuscule reduction in the PSO is on the cards, this will be completely wiped out by increased energy prices.

"Households will already be considerably worse off as the government has callously decided not to provide households with an electricity credit this year despite the fact that prices remain 60 – 70 per cent higher than 2022."

Seán Kelly, MEP for Ireland South and Leader of Fine Gael in the European Parliament, has said that while broader regional instability in the Middle East is alarming, Europe must not lose sight of the ongoing humanitarian catastrophe in Gaza.

"We are at a dangerous juncture," Kelly said. "The escalation between Israel and Iran has rightly raised alarm bells, but it cannot be used as a smokescreen to cover what is still happening, every day, in Gaza."

"The reality is this: civilians in Gaza are still being killed indiscriminately. Humanitarian aid is still being blocked. Children are still starving. These are not background details in some wider geopolitical drama - they are atrocities in their own right," Kelly continued.

"We need to show leadership, not through airstrikes or threats, but through diplomacy, pressure, and principled action. Dialogue must replace destruction," he stated.

Electric Vehicle Grant Scheme Reopens for Taxis, Hackneys and Limousines

Minister for Transport Darragh O'Brien today announced that the 2025 Electric Small Public Service Vehicle (eSPSV25) Grant Scheme will re-open on Monday 23rd June.

The scheme was initially launched in February with a €12.5 million budget. It received a record number of applications, which have now been assessed. Almost €7.5 million has been allocated to successful applicants, meaning just under €5 million will be available when the scheme re-opens.

Successful candidates will receive substantial grants to enable the switch to electric vehicles, including:

€10,000 towards the purchase of a new full battery electric SPSV

€12,500 towards the purchase of a new full battery electric wheelchair-accessible SPSV. For those scrapping older, high-mileage, or more polluting vehicles, the grant doubles

€20,000 for a new full electric SPSV

€25,000 for a new wheelchair-accessible electric vehicle.

Since its inception in 2018, the eSPSV Grant Scheme has facilitated over 3,200 SPSV operators to make the switch to electric vehicles, contributing significantly to Ireland's climate goals.


While acknowledging the growing risks of ! regional spill-over, Kelly urged that restraint and de-escalation must be the immediate focus. "This isn't just about Israel and Iran – it's about preventing an all-out regional war that would have devastating consequences far beyond the Middle East."


"But let's be clear: Gaza cannot be pushed to the side. The suffering there is not just an unfortunate side-effect of conflict - it is the direct result of choices being made on the ground," Kelly said.

He praised the Irish Government's recent steps in response to the crisis. "Ireland is showing what leadership looks like. The moves on illegal settlement goods and the Tánaiste's push for meaningful legislation – these are not symbolic. These are acts of real political courage."

Kelly also called on the European Union to live up to its principles. "We cannot be the EU of values in name only. If we say we care about human rights, then breaches must carry consequences. The EU-Israel Association Agreement cannot continue accountability."

"Yes, we must work to prevent further escalation across the Middle East," Kelly concluded. "But we cannot - and must not - look away from Gaza. Doing so now would be a betrayal not just of the people of Gaza, but of everything this Union claims to stand for."





KERRY'S KENNEDY CUP CAMPAIGN

Kerry's Kennedy Cup campaign came to a heart-wrenching conclusion on Friday as a stoppage-time winner from Galway condemned them to an agonising 1-0 defeat in the 7th/8th place playoff.

It was a cruel end to what had been a superb week of soccer from a talented and determined Kerry squad, who played with pride, discipline, and attacking flair throughout the tournament, ultimately finishing in a creditable 8th position out of 30 teams.

The week began with great promise, and Kerry wasted no time in making their intentions clear. They opened their campaign with a controlled and clinical 2-0 victory over North Tipperary on Monday.

After a cagey opening to the first half, Kian Cronin broke the deadlock in the 22nd minute with a composed finish, becoming the first Kerry player to score at this year's tournament. North Tipp rallied, but Kerry stood firm, showing maturity beyond their years to manage the game.

Then deep into stoppage time, Listowel Celtic sharpshooter and team captain Joe Joy produced a moment of brilliance, lobbing the keeper with a superb dinked finish to seal the win and get Kerry off to the perfect start.

Tuesday brought a double-header to complete the group stage. Kerry showed no signs of fatigue and produced one of their most impressive displays of the tournament in a dominant 3-0 victory over South Tipperary. Joe Joy was simply electric, scoring twice and playing a central role in another

He nearly opened the scoring in the second minute with a sharp run and shot, before finally finding the net in the 12th minute. Fed down the right by Max Moynihan, Joy showed quick feet to get into the area with a slick dummy, he evaded the last Tipp defender, before calmly finishing into the bottom corner.

Kerry doubled their lead on 27 minutes when Joy's dangerous cross was turned into the net by a Tipperary defender under pressure. They nearly added a third before half-time when Cronin's inswinging corner was tipped over the bar by the Tipp keeper.

Kerry's dominance continued after the break. Moynihan fired wide on 38 minutes before Joy added his second and Kerry's third in the 40th minute. The South Tipp defence failed to deal with a long clearance, and Joy was alert, rounding the keeper before slotting home. Moynihan and Marc Cremin both had chances to add to the tally in a commanding performance. The third and final group match on Tuesday afternoon saw Kerry face South Belfast with top spot on the line and they delivered once again, beating the Ulster side 3-1 to complete a perfect group stage campaign with three wins from three.

Kerry started at pace, with Killian O'Sullivan and Joe Joy combining well down the right. Moynihan struck first in the 8th minute with a powerful long-range effort that flew past the keeper. However, South Belfast hit back immediately, taking advantage of a lapse in the





Kerry defence to equalise just a minute later. Despite the setback, Kerry remained composed. Net minder Leni Rujevcan was solid at the back, while Joy and Cronin continued to probe up front. A lovely move nearly saw Shea Horan restore Kerry's lead, but his shot was well saved. O'Sullivan also came close just before the break, heading narrowly over from a Moynihan corner. The breakthrough came in the 44th minute. Daniel Diggins sent a long free kick into the box, sparking a neat move finished off by Joy, who slotted confidently into the bottom corner to put Kerry 2-1 ahead. He was involved again late on, turning provider with a smart assist for O'Sullivan, who buried the third goal to seal the win and confirm Kerry's place in the Kennedy Cup quarter-finals.

Wednesday's draw pitted Kerry against a strong Donegal side, and for the first time in the tournament, Kerry came up short, losing 2-0 in a tense and tactical battle.

The first half was a tight affair, with both teams creating half-chances. Connie O'Connor was commanding between the posts, making several key saves to keep Donegal at bay. But the pressure finally told just after the 20-minute mark when Donegal forced the ball over the line after a goalmouth scramble to take the lead.

Kerry regrouped and pushed hard for an equaliser after the break. Marc Cremin went close early in the second half with a rasping effort that whistled just wide. Joy and Moynihan continued to threaten, but Donegal's defence was rock solid.

The killer blow came in the 55th minute when Donegal converted a brilliantly struck free kick from the edge of the area to make it 2-0. Kerry kept fighting until the end, Joy had a shot blocked, and from the resulting corner, Gerry Moroney's powerful header crashed off the bar, but it wasn't to be. Donegal's defensive resilience saw them through, and Kerry's hopes of lifting the Cup were dashed.

With little time to rest, Kerry turned their attention to the Plate competition, facing Waterford in Thursday's semi-final. Despite taking an early lead through a fine Moynihan strike, Kerry ultimately succumbed 4-1 to a ruthless Waterford side.

Moynihan's opening goal, a crisp shot from the edge of the box gave Kerry hope, but Waterford responded immediately with a goal straight from the restart. They then took the lead before the break with a well-worked move, leaving Kerry with work to do in the second half.

The boys in green and gold threw everything at Waterford in the second half, but the Munster rivals struck twice more on the counter in the dying minutes to secure their place in the final. That left Kerry with one final task, a 7th/8th place playoff against Galway on Friday. Despite playing their fifth game in as many days and with tired legs across the pitch, Kerry gave it everything in search of a strong finish.

The first half was closely fought. Kerry looked to exploit the flanks, with Joy and O'Sullivan linking up to good effect. Joy came close after muscling past a defender, sending a long-range effort









narrowly wide. Defensively, Kerry were resolute as the back four of Brosnan, Cremin, O'Leary, and O'Sullivan anchored by Rujevcan stood firm to repel Galway pressure.

In the 27th minute, Daniel Diggins tested the Galway keeper with a fierce drive from distance, while Joy saw a header saved shortly after. At the other end, Cremin made a crucial block to deny a Galway shot as the clock ticked into the final ten minutes.

Both teams pushed for a winner in the closing stages, and just when it looked as though penalties might decide the contest, Galway launched one last attack. With Kerry stretched and energy reserves depleted, they were caught out by a late break, and Galway struck with virtually the last kick of the game to snatch a dramatic win.

It was a devastating way to finish the week, but there was no shame in defeat. Kerry's players left everything on the pitch and showed incredible resilience, unity, and talent throughout the tournament. Topping their group this Kennedy Cup campaign was one to be proud of.

Kerry's Class of 2025 can look back on this week with pride. The heartbreak of Friday will fade, but the memories made and the progress shown will endure. The future is bright for this talented group of players.

Diggins proud of Eighth Placed Finish At Kennedy Cup

KERRY SCHOOLED BY MEATH

Group Stage Game Three

Meath 1-22 Kerry 0-16

Ouch. This was a bad one, really bad. Sometimes the cloud just doesn't have a silver lining and this was one of those.

We can dig for excuses. Kerry were already guaranteed to qualify for a quarter-final and a certain lack of intensity is understandable. Except that won't wash; so were Meath. And an extra week's rest is a huge advantage in this artificially elongated championship format. We had plenty to play for – we just didn't show up to play for it.

We had a load of injuries. True, very true. Diarmuid O'Connor, Brian O'Beaglaíoch, Paudie Clifford, Barry Dan O'Sullivan, Paul Geaney, and Seán O'Shea. They would all be starting as first choice. That's two starting midfielders (I'd be hoping to have Joe at ten and bring Graham back into defence) and our top three scoring forwards. That will hurt any team. But Meath were missing two of their top front men in Matthew Costello and James Conlon. I didn't think Kerry were lacking potency up front; we just lacked supply lines. Beaten in midfield and deeply uncomfortable when Meath ran at our defenders - which Meath did every chance they could get. And if we stood off them, they were quite happy to pick off two pointers. Some days are these days.

Remember 2001? That utterly helpless feeling in the second half as Kerry were absolutely wiped out by the Royals. Declan Quill got our sole score of the second half. This wasn't quite that bad, but it was certainly in that kind of territory. In fact, it might be a small bit worse, in that a lot of us (absolutely including yours truly) were quietly confident. I felt that Meath had slightly over-performed against Dublin and we would have enough to see off their challenge, even with the injuries (I was unaware of Seánie's absence until shortly before the game).

Kerry had the two early attempts but both tailed wide. Ruairí Kinsella had a shot wide at the other end, but it had gotten a touch and Meath keeper Billy Hogan calmly opened the scoring with the '45. Meath are already looking sharp. Keith Curtis had a glance at goal but wisely took his point. A turnover on Joe O'Connor allowed Meath to run at us again, Shane Ryan forced into a great save. With advantage played, Jordan Morris tapped over the resultant free.

At last Kerry seemed to find her gears. Micheál



Burns slotted over after a nice team move. David Clifford got out in front and sent over a great two pointer (notably, it was our only one all game). Tony Brosnan won the kickout and set up Dylan Geaney for a point to put Kerry in front. Tony added another himself and David wasn't far away with another two point effort. This was a lot more like.

Ciarán Caulfield at wing back was already dominating the play and he raced forward to set up Donal Keogan for a point. Conor Duke was completely unmarked as Meath won the kick-out and he split the posts.

A foul on Gavin White saw Killian Spillane open his account. Dylan Geaney exchanged a good one-two with David Clifford before clipping over and Kerry were two points to the good again, 0-7 to 0-5.

That didn't last long. Meath took over and never again relaxed the reins. Eoghan Freyne opened his account and added a free after more good work by the outstanding Caulfield.

Freyne, invariably Meath's top scorer, was really hitting form and nailed a lovely two pointer. Ruairi Kinsella added another and Conor Duke notched a point for himself. Meath were the dominant side in general play, and now it was really beginning to show on the scoreboard as Jordan Morris made it 0-13 to 0-7. It could have been worse, but Blly Hogan's two point free drifted wide.

A foul on David Clifford saw him pull one back, but just before the break, Kerry were caught with just two players forward and Eoghan Freyne had a simple free to put his team six points in front.

Half-time Meath 0-14 Kerry 0-8.

Jack O'Connor had his work cut out.

In fairness, Kerry did look more confident when they re-emerged. A black card for Cathal Hickey after fouling Gavin White gave us the numerical advantage as well. Dylan Gaeney had a great goal chance but couldn't keep the shot under the crossbar. A point was worth a lot at that stage, though, and he added a superb second

point. Meath came on the attack themselves but Jason Foley managed to get it away from Cian McBride with danger looming. Killian Spilane with a Kerry point, just a goal in it now. Seán Coffey made it 0-15 to 0-11 and Conor Duke added another. I hate to say it, but it felt as though it was Meath with the extra man, not Kerry. We wasted three good chances in a row before Killian Spillane slotted a badly needed free

Then Meath simply and effectively stepped up to burn off our challenge. Ruairi Kinsella had plenty of space to line up his point – frankly, too much space. Shane Ryan had to make a brilliant save to parry the returned Cathal Hickey's rocket. Seán Coffey at the back post just couldn't knock in the rebound at the back post – a real let-off for the Kingdom.

It's all Meath now. Ruairí Kinsells with loads of space, an all-too familiar feeling by now, and he promptly takes a two pointer. Conor Duke with another. We are being orn apart, Kerry are completely floundering.

Meath come again. A goal feels inevitable and it duly arrives, Bryan Menton firing home. 1-21 to 0-14.

David Clifford with a point. Goal chance? Arrah, not really. Tony Brosnan with another. Just futile defiance at this point, and everybody knows it. The Meath supporters are in full song. We can't exactly blame them, can we? Ciarán Caulfield, my man of the match, wraps it up with a final point.

A bad day for Kerry. Very bad. We thought – or at least, I thought, that we had a deeper bench than that. Midfield and defence were in trouble all day. Once again we didn't have the necessary stamina late on. We all know that Munster isn't a hot enough fire to forge steel. Our kick-outs need to be faster and players need to give Shane





options. We need, and this is absolutely crucial, to be much faster to contest the breaking ball (which is why Graham O'Sullivan is up in the haf forwards). We coughed up two pointers with far too much space for the shooters and could only take one ourselves. In the modern game, that'll always cost you.

Look, some of the inquests are a bit over the top. Let's not be throwing out any babies in the bathwater. Jack O'Connor has been coach, manager, or selector for twenty six successful Kerry teams in All Ireland Finals. Questions do deserve to be asked but we are still in a quarter-final. And look, being a small bit cynical, but a big game - hopefullyCavan supporters will travel - in the Fitzgerald Stadium is a huge boost for Killarney town. As a team, of course we would have been better off without it, but that pays a lot of bills for all of us.

The road is harder than we realised. We do need players back and we need to reconsider options. There are five teams with a realistic chance of winning the Sam Maguire. At full strength or very close to it, we will still be in that mix. Just about. Take two midfielders, three absolutely top quality forwards (I would literally have David, Paudie, and Paul as our main threats. in that order) and there's few enough teams will live with it. Three hard games now in three weeks? I still say that it's stamina at least as much as skill that will win this year's All Ireland - and I don't believe that we have enough of it. Donegal and Mayo was absolute blood and thunder. These games may only artificially elongate the championship and lighten player's energy reserves and supporters' wallets along the way, but some of them can be really thrilling and this was one. Donegal, with the likes of Gallen, Murphy, and Ciarán Moore look, even if Donegal go out at the next hurdle, that lad must be nigh on a shoe-in for Young Footballer of the Year. Mayo were not short of heroes themselves - are they ever? They bow out with their heads high, but I imagine that will be small comfort. Stephen Rochford spoke very graciously after a cracking game of football. Jimmy McGuinness...winning doesn't ever cheer him up, does it? Arrah, that's some people's style of management, fair enough.

GROUP TWO

You just don't know what to make of Cork. They were taken apart by Roscommon in the League. Gave Kerry two superb games in Munster. And then just failed to show up against Meath – yeah, hindsight gives a different view of that one now! Cork do have plenty of work put in and good footballers. Beating Roscommon doesn't exactly come as a major shock, but it wasn't expected either. Cork take the third spot and an away quarter-final by 1-17 to 0-17. They could rattle a big gun yet!

GROUP THREE

With respect, possibly not the strongest group. But Monaghan have that little bit of something about them. Big men and hard runners. They put up 2-6-15, that's great scoring. And it's

not like Down are any pushover; they gave Monaghan plenty of it. Monagja have their quarter-final, while Down are at home next weekend. Tough draw, though.

Clare bowed out, but Peter Keane was justifiably proud of his team afterwards. They gave it absolutely everything and came very close to reeling Louth (themselves absolutely one of the huge gaelic football stories of this year) in, but just fell short and bowed out. Louth got in for two first half goals, and in the end a gallant Clare were just left chasing that to the bittersweet finish.

GROUP FOUR

The eponymous 'group of death'. Dublin, with Con O'Callaghan back, looked very much back to themselves. And I do mean, 'very much back to themselves. That was Dublin with the assurance of old. Stephen Cluxton has looked mortal on more than a few occasions this year; he was imperious here. Peadar O'Cofaigh Byrne reminds me of Michael MacDara McAuley - not necessarily the most refined footballer, but a hugely effective one. Lee Gannon has grown into a really good footballer. Have they been quietly building up a head of steam? I don't care what anybody says; that's still a really talented Derry team. They can't seem to get the results ever since that penalty shootout National League title, but I'd have the likes of the phenomenal Conor Glass, Brendan Rogers, and arguably Shane McGuigan on any starting fifteen and they have runners. Dublin had to survive a few late scares and only won by two points (0-22 to 0-20) but they have a definite hint of brimstone about them and restricted Derry to just three points in the last quarter. Derry bow out – I remember those lads coming through as minors and college players (simply because they played Kerry – have a look at the line-outs for the 2016 Hogan Cup Final, you'll know a lot of the names on both sides). Afew of their careers are moving closer to a finish; personally I like them and I hope they end up with silverware at some stage.

I would say that Donegal against Mayo was the most openly entertaining game of last weekend, but Galway v Armagh was the best. Two really big guns genuinely going at it. Galway had just enough in the tank to win by a very short head in the finish, Mind you, I think it's significant that Galway had to win

just to keep their hopes alive, whereas Armagh were already guaranteed to go through. Kieran McGeeney put in a few of the younger players and they fitted in seamlessly. The fact that there is clearly very real depth in their panel (unlike us) and a week's rest is a big advantage to them. Right now they are unquestionably my favourites to retain the Sam Maguire.

PRE-QUARTER-FINAL DRAW KERRY V CAVAN

Not the worst draw we could have gotten, but after last weekend, we are facing an uphill road. This Cavan team deservedly beat Mayo. If we were at full strength, I'd certainly fancy us in Killarney. I'd certainly be hoping for two players back and a big improvement. Cavan had a few wides and shots dropped short against Tyrone, plus two good saves by Morgan...if they take those scores, we will be in trouble. But home venue and a hurting team with a point to prove? I'd be actively expecting a completely different performance.

DUBLIN V CORK

Like I say, Dublin look like they are coming good at the right time. A few players back in harness and a bit more intensity. Cork are a good side. The likes of O'Driscoll, Taylor, Maguire, and O'Callaghan can rattle anybody. But can they put enough on the scoreboard against Dublin? I'd be surprised. I don't expect them to go out easily, but I do expect them to bow out.

DOWN V GALWAY

I strongly felt that it was the long road that took too big a toll out of Galway last year (look, I'm not begrudging Armagh, who had to earn it the hard way, but that All Ireland Final had a lot more drama than quality football overall) and once again, I think their energy levels are being sapped. Can Shane Walsh repeat his form of that second half? Can they get Damien Comer back in harness? A fit Comer is like a human torpedo in that full forward line. This Galway team have been rattling around a Sam Maguire for the last couple of years (as we well know from three years ago!) and nobody could really begrudge them (well, okay, Mayo could and would). I expect them to get over this hurdle but the fuel tank will drop a little bit lower and there's a lot of road to be travelled yet.

LADIES Group Stage

Kerry 5-7 Cork 2-9

Cork and Kerry have a longstanding and healthy rivalry in Ladies gaelic football going right back to the seventies. Even when either side isn't going great, they are always able to give each a real rattle and last weekend in the second game of the group stage, it was a similar story. Neither side was particularly impressive in a stoic enough first half, but Kerry, especially their lightning full forward line, were able to open the throttle.

Kerry opened with a bolt of lightning as Niamh Ó Chonchúir blasted home a gola. Danielle O'Leary was just inches wide with another effort but Cork were soon level, Áine O'Sullivan recovering after spilling the ball to fire past Mary Ellen Bolger. Katie added a free and Melissa Duggan, a cornerback who has never actually played cornerback, roaming at will, scored a trademark point that Mary Ellen Bolger had to be alert to tip over.

Siofra O'Shea pointed a Kerry free after good work by Danielle O'Leary. Hannah Looney replied to make it 1-3 to 1-1 in Cork's favour but at the end of the first quarter, Katie Quirke struck for a brilliant individual goal that left Cork five points in front. With twenty minutes gone, points from Rosie Corkery, Abbie O'Mahony and Laura O'Mahony meant that Kerry were trailing by 2-6 to 1-1. Late in the half, Siofra O'Shea scored Kerry's second point from a free and Caoimhe Evans, not long after being introduced off the bench, fired over a good score.

Katie Quirke opened the second half scoring but already Kerry looked a lot more lively. Caoimhe Evans made a great turnover and sent a peach of a ball into Danielle O'Leary, who soothly laid off to Siofra O'Shea who drilled it past the keeper. Rachel Dwyer added a third Kerry goal to draw things level. Laura O'Mahony nudged Cork back in front but six minutes later the Rathmore and Southern Gaels poachers combined again for another goal for Siofra. That one came off a long ball into a lively Rachel Dwyer - that long ball was really beginning to work for Kerry. Truth be told, I'm a little surprised that Cork didn't drop in a sweeper. Kerry made the long trip up to the Liatroim Fontenoys in County Down for the second and probably most important game in the group stage of the All Ireland Intermediate Championship. Last chance for CAO applicants to register a change of course choices online by 5pm on 1st July

FINAL TASK

The state exams conclude next Tuesday, 24th June and the thoughts of exhausted candidates are no doubt turning to holidays, travel or summer jobs. But there is still one very important task to be done. Those who applied to the Central Applications Office (CAO) must now turn their attention to the CAO course change of mind facility. This provides each applicant a last chance, if s/he wishes, to register a change of course choices online by 5pm on 1st July.

OPTION

Not all applicants to CAO avail of the change of mind facility. Many applicants are happy with the course choices they submitted by 1st February. On the other hand, others will have changed their minds about the courses they would like to study. Whatever your reason for submitting a change of mind form, make sure you know exactly what you are applying for. Don't list any courses which you haven't researched. Don't apply for any course which you know that you won't accept if it's offered to you. Most important of all, never apply for a course in which you haven't the slightest interest just because your friends are applying for it.

CALMLY

If you decide to submit a change of mind form, work calmly on your choices before going online. Start from scratch and write out your new list of courses. Don't tinker with your original list while online as it's very easy to make a mistake. Check the minimum and special requirements for each course you are including on the change of mind form.

CHANGING

When you are happy with your revised choices, open your CAO account via the "My Application" facility. To make changes to your

existing course choices click on Change/Add Level 8 Course Choices or Change/Add Level 7/6 Course Choices. You can then use the New Courses list to enter new courses, disregard existing course choices, or reorder your existing course selection. Enter all the courses that you wish to apply for in your order of preference on the new list/s. Every choice is important so fill up all ten choices in each category. Check that your course choices are listed in correct order and that the codes are correct.

SFPARATE

The two course categories – Level 8 and Level 7/6 - are totally separate from each other for the purpose of submitting a change of mind form. You may change one category and leave the second category unchanged or you may change both. On the other hand, you may decide to stick with the choices you submitted by 1st February last.

UPDATED

If you change courses online, CAO will send an acknowledgement to your email address. Check that your courses have been updated by using the "My Application" facility by 5pm on 1st July. You may change your course choices free of charge as often as you wish up to the closing date. The final change of mind form that you submit is the one that will count for your CAO offers. So, be sure to check online before 1st July to make sure that all is in order.

WINDOW

After the 1st July you can make no further changes to your CAO application form. So, the remaining days provide you with a valuable window of opportunity. Use the time to put some serious thought into your choice of college courses. With the state exams done and dusted, you can give your undivided attention to submitting a 'change of mind' form that truly contains your course interests. It will be time

well spent if you achieve your course of choice when the college offers are issued on the 27th August.

CHECKLIST

- You have until 5pm on 1st July to avail of the CAO "Change of Mind" facility
- Not all applicants to CAO avail of the change of mind facility
- Don't list any courses which you haven't researched.
- Don't apply for any course which you know that you won't accept
- Never apply for a course in which you haven't the slightest interest
- Work on your new list of course choices before going online
- Check the requirements for the courses you are including on the change of mind form
- The two course categories are separate from each other on a change of mind form
- The remaining days provide you with a valuable window of opportunity
- After the 1st July you can make no further changes to your CAO application form
- The Leaving Cert (LC) exam concludes on Tuesday, 24th June
- CAO 'Change of Mind' Form closes at 5pm on Tuesday, 1st July
- Leaving Cert results will be published on Friday, 22nd August
- CAO Round One offers will be available at 2pm on Wed., 27th August

Irish Study Explores Children's Vision and Lifestyle



An Irish research team is calling on parents, teachers, coaches, and optometrists across the country to share their insights into how modern childhood habits may be impacting eyesight. The study, led by Eoin Kerin at the Centre for Eye Research Ireland in TU Dublin, is exploring how screen time, outdoor play, and physical activity relate to the growing issue of childhood myopia (short-sightedness).

With over 500 responses already gathered, it is one of the largest and most comprehensive studies of its kind globally, and uniquely includes input from those who care for, teach, or look after the eye health of children in everyday life.

"We're asking the people closest to children to help us understand what might be contributing to changes in vision," Eoin explains.

All responses will help shape future awareness campaigns and strategies to support children's eye health across Ireland.

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












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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.




A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

SUMMER FLOWERING SHRUBS

From now until late autumn there is a large range of flowering shrubs in all different sizes and from evergreen to deciduous for you to choose from. Some can have a short flowering time and others can flower right through the summer.

Remembering when choosing your flowering shrubs that you find out the flowering period as this can determine the position that you are going to plant your shrub. A good example of a deciduous flowering shrub that will flower for a long period over the summer is a shrub called Potentilla. It comes in a good range of colours also, including white, yellow, orange and red. It is a medium to small sized shrub and if you have a small space, Potentilla Red Ace is quite a compact one and would be suitable.

As with most flowring shrubs, the flowers will go off as the season goes on so remember to dead-head every few weeks.



"Our Father in heaven, Holy is Your Name. May Your Kingdom come. May Your will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread, and forgive us our sins, as we have forgiven those who sin against us. And don't let us yield to temptation, but deliver us from the evil one, Amen." (Matthew 6:9-13)

Welcome back dear student, knowing how to pray can be a puzzle, and some folks just stick to a learnt off childhood prayer, rather than engaging in conversation with God personally. One day all the great kings and celebrities will each bow before God, and the titles and applause they received here on earth will fade into obscurity. Jesus told us to pray using His Name as the keycard and bring Glory to the Father (John 14:13-14; John 16:23). We worship God because He is Holy. This links up with the first commandment (Exodus 20:3). "Enter His gates with thanksgiving, into His courts with praise; give thanks to Him, and praise His Name" (Psalm 100:4).

Every king reigns over a kingdom. God's Kingdom is in heaven, but because of Jesus' sacrifice, His Kingdom is available for us here on this earth. Jesus said to pray that heaven manifests here on earth. How? By yielding in obedience to God, worshipping Him alone, and leaning upon Him for provision, mercy, and protection, we can enjoy His Kingdom benefits right here, right now. Forgiveness is a requirement though, for there is no offence in heaven's hearts. It takes faith; but 'faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God' (Romans 10:17). When we immerse ourselves in God's promises and learn His ways, following in obedience to His Word, our faith is enriched and strengthened to bring God's purpose and plans into reality. This isn't the power of positive thinking, or manifesting occultic powers, it is simply believing that God's Word is true, trusting His timing and His deliverance. When we live this way, totally submitted to God, fear will depart, because in relationship with the Lord of Heaven's Armies, you will fear no evil (2 Kings 6:15-17; Hebrews 2:14-15). And His Holy Spirit leads us upon the right paths. It's a beautiful place to live. Sure, there are evil and awful things happening in the world, but we can live in the midst of difficult circumstances knowing that God loves us, that He has a good plan, and that Jesus, the Prince of Peace has already won our Victory.
