Kerry Mountain Rescue Team EXPRESS CONCERNS

Following a large number of callouts in recent weeks Kerry Mountain Rescue team have expressed concern that many of the people rescued are inexperienced hillwalkers. They have also observed that a number of families with young children are attempting to climb Carrauntoohil without proper equipment or footwear.

This month alone, Kerry Mountain Rescue team has responsed to 16 callout, five of them were parties who got lost and 11 were injuries.

The most recent callout involved 24 members of the voluntary group, took almost 6 hours and resulted in the casualty being airlifted to University Hospital Kerry by Coastguard Rescue They are calling on climbers and walkers to take personal responsibility and keep in mind the following before they decide to set out on mountains: Are they, or members of their group, fit, competent and experienced? Do they know the area, can they



navigate effectively in all weather? Have they got the right gear, including boots and raingear for the mountain, with food, water, map and compass, a fully charged mobile phone, first aid kit, bivvy bag/shelter? Have they checked weather the forecast? Do they have a route

plan and have they

notified someone of their intended route, start time and expected return time?

Kerry Mountain Rescue Team is made of 35 voluntary active members who come from all walks of life and who are all active and accomplished walkers and mountaineers in their own right. Their area of operation covers the entire South West of Ireland principally the peninsulas of Beara, Iveragh and Dingle – and boasts fifteen of Ireland's twenty highest peaks, including Carrauntoohil (the country's highest, at 1039 metres).

"Bloody but unbowed"

BRÍD FINDS THE SPARK TO IGNITE BODY, MIND AND SPIRIT

Following a cancer diagnosis, just fifteen months after her mother had received a terminal diagnosis, Bríd O'Connor struggled to find a glimmer of light.

Her diagnosis was coupled with the fact that two of her sibling's had tested positive for BRCA gene meant that the family unit became shadowed and veiled and that cancer had invaded her happy homestead.

Brid's mum, Evelyn O'Regan passed away in November 2020 and her death and living inspired Bríd's idea for her book, Spark, Stories to inspire body, mind and spirit.

With her greatest champion gone, Bríd needed to find a way to "turn and face it", a phrase her mom often used in her role as a basketball coach.

As a History teacher, Brid always had a keen interest in stories of triump and she turned her skills to research how others had recovered from great loss? How did they rise from the dark and what had they done to heal themselves?

In doing so, Brid decided to write a book with contributions from storytellers who have all gone through a time in their lives when they were faced with adversity.

In the book, there are pieces on grief, illness, accidents, suicide, depression and addiction but all of the writers reveal what resets them. "There is a strong message of hope throughout the book with lots of nuggets of golden sparks on every page", Brid told Killarney Outlook.

"The writers are from all walks of life, some are family and friends and more are friends of friends", said Bríd, who is very thankful that they have all allowed her to be custodian of their story.

Among those who have contributed are Billy Keane, Dick Spring, Neil Kelders, Elaine Galvin, Dr Dearbhaile Collins, Naomi Brosnan, Holly Power and Mikey Sheehy Jnr.

In her own story, Brid realised that she had lost her spark and zest for



life after her own diagnosis. With a young family, she found herself in unchartered waters and rudderless. Searching for something to help her navigate her new journey, she found the poem "Invictus" by William Ernest Henley would have a lasting and profound effect.

"Invictus" translates from Latin as "Uncoquered" and on difficult days the poem became Brid's mantra, her battle-cry, her spark, guiding her in the knowledge that she too had mastered her own fagte and captained her own soul.

All proceeds from the sale of the book will go to Comfort for Chemo Kerry, a charity which is obviously so close to Bríd's heart.

"While the staff are amazing at University Hospital Kerry, the faciities for those receiving chermotherapy are far from ideal", Bríd said.

The vision at Comfort for Chemo Kerry is to fundraise €5 million euros to build and equip a state of the art purpose built Chemotherapy Unit for the people of Kerry, where the best care available will be delivered in an environment which is welcoming, reassurig, comfortable and dignified. Queen Victoria herself, accompanied by her husband Prince Albert and their children Prince Albert, Princess Alice and Princess Helena were on board and began what is now the Killlarney Tourism Experience.

The Herbert Family of Muckross enjoyed a high social standing, which reached its climax in 1861, with the visit of Queen Victoria to Killarney. Although the Queen had visited Ireland on two previous occasions, in 1849 and 1853, this was the first time that Kerry was included in her itinerary.

The Queen was accompanied by Albert, the Prince Consort, the Prince of Wales, Prince Alfred, Princess Alice and Princess Helena.


The Royal party stayed the night of Monday, 26 August, at Killarney House, home of the Earl of Kenmare. They then travelled on to Muckross, where they spent the following two nights. The Queen's visit to Killarney House was very

much a state occasion. However, her stay at Muckross was a much more private affair. The local press reported that Her Majesty'had declared her intention of being "very quiet" while at Muckross.' (Kerry Evening Post, Wednesday 28 August 1861).

At 6.30 pm on the evening of Monday, 26 August, the Royal train arrived in Killarney from Dublin. The Royal party were then escorted to Killarney

House, where a large dinner was held that evening. The next day the Queen embarked at Ross Castle for a day on the Lakes. Lunch was served at Glena Cottage. In the evening the party returned to Ross Quay, from where they were escorted back to Killarney House.

At about 6.30pm that same evening, Tuesday 27 August, the Queen and her family set out for Muckross. They were accompanied by The Right Hon. Henry Arthur Herbert, Viscount Castlerosse (of the Kenmare family) and a troop of the Royal Dragoons. The Times described how Mr and Mrs Herbert received the Queen on the lawn at the door of Muckross House. A host of




Pictured is the arrival of the Royal Party at Kenmare House on the 26th of August 1861. Picture courtesy of Donie Whitty O'Sullivan.

other ladies and gentlemen were also present and greeted the Queen enthusiastically. (The Times, Friday 30 August 1861).

Elaborate preparations had been carried out at Muckross for the Royal visit. Tapestries, mirrors, Persian carpets, silverware, musical instruments, linen, china and servants' uniforms, are all said to have been specially commissioned for the occasion. The curtains, which still hang in the Dining Room of Muckross House, were specially woven, probably in Paris, for the occasion.

The Queen's apartments at Muckross were described in the local press as follows:

'An entire section of the mansion has been set apart for the royal family, so that all their apartments communicate without the necessity of passing into the corridors to be used by other



On Thursday 29th August, the morning of her departure, Queen Victoria visited Muckross Abbey, a fifteenth century Franciscan friary within the Muckross demesne. Eleanor, the eldest Herbert daughter described this visit as having been, 'very quiet, hardly any of the suite with us, they were all enchanted and wandered over it gathering ferns and leaves as recollections. She is to have ivy from the Abbey and ferns from various places sent to Osborne as recollections of this place.'

Before departing from Muckross, the Queen



occupants of the house. The Queen will live here in privacy, and from the windows of her rooms she can walk into delightful grounds, which will be kept private during her stay at Muckross. In her sitting room - which, like all the others, is a splendid apartment furnished richly and tastefully, there is a series of views of the Lakes of Killarney, painted by Mrs Herbert. They are works of the highest artistic excellence.'

(Kerry Evening Post, Wednesday 28 August 1861).

The following day the Queen, accompanied in her carriage by Mrs Herbert, drove around the

sent for Mrs Mary Herbert and presented her with a bracelet of gold, pearls and diamonds. Her daughters, Eleanor and Blanche, also each received a piece of jewellery. The Royal Collection at Windsor Castle contains three water-colours by Mary Herbert. Presumably Mary presented these to the Queen on her departure.

At noon the Royal party left Muckross House for Killarney

Railway station. There they boarded their train for Dublin, which they reached in just a little over five hours. Mr Miller, Chief engineer of the Great Southern and Western Railway drove the train both to and from Killarney.(Kerry Evening Post, Saturday 31 August 1861). The unstable financial situation of the Herberts in the late nineteenth century may have stemmed from the outlay involved in preparations for this Royal visit.

KILLARNEY CYCLIST NAMED ON IRISH JUNIOR SQUAD FOR **EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Killarney Cycling Club has received a big shot in the arm with the announcement that its Junior rider, Stefan Caulfield Dreier, has been selected on the Ireland Junior track team to compete in the European Championships later this month.

Stefan, who lives in Beaufort, started cycling with the club in 2013/14 as an under-12 and enjoyed mixing his cycling with other sports for a number of years. Along the way he had many under-age successes culminating in an under-16 national time-trial title in 2019 and this year he won two silver medals at the Irish Junior Track Cycling Championships.

Club Chairman, Mark Murphy, said that Stefan's success was due, in the first place, to his own talent and work-ethos but that the club also took satisfaction from seeing the fruits of its Youth Academy initiative started about seven years ago: "Stefan's dedication to his sport is a beacon to all our young riders and shows that love of sport and

hard work can pay off. On behalf of everyone in the club, I congratulate Stefan, his parents Heiko and Louise who have closely supported him, and his club mentors".

While various Killarney riders have been on different track squads down through the years, Stefan is the second to make a track squad, the last being John Blackwell who was on regular Irish Track Team duty between 2004-09.

The Ireland National Junior Coach, Martin O'Loughlin, speaking from the squad's training camp in Spain, said that Stefan will compete in both team pursuit and individual pursuit, and hopefully the Omnium which is four bunch races in a single day. He also paid tribute to Stefan's work-ethic: "He has made a huge commitment to track cycling this year, travelling twice a week from Kerry to Dublin for training, and it has paid off for him".

Mark Murphy also put Stefan's success in the broader context of the fall-out from the Covid epidemic: "It is especially significant given the difficulties with Covid as our excellent crop of Juniors – which we had nurtured up through under-age years - have missed out on two years of top-level competition and opportunity, such as The Junior Tour of Ireland. They would possibly have been one of the strongest Junior teams in the club's history".

However, as Mark outlined, the club is redoubling its efforts in this regard: "In the Autumn

we will launch a new initiative to promote the retention of young riders in the sport and to give a supported pathway of progression from U-16 to Junior and onto to U-23 level. "We are going to spare nothing in this regard and I would like to thank all our sponsors and supporters who's good will and financing make this type of outcome possible."

Stefan's first national outing with the national squad will be in Apeldoorn in the Netherlands from 17th to 22nd of this month.

"IF I CAN'T STAND UP - I'LL STAND OUT....

FOUR YEARS ON, **IAN RELFECTS ON LIFE** SINCE HIS ACCIDENT

On the 16th of August 2017 Ian O'Connell was out cycling with his friends in Killarney National Park when his bike hit a log and he was thrown over the handlebars.

The life changing accident inspired Ian to defy the odds and exceed all medical expectations.

In his own words following the accident, Ian said "the minute I hit the ground, I just heard a crack in my neck and lost all feeling. I didn't know my body was there. I stayed conscious and I landed on my neck and then fell onto my back. I looked to one of my friends and said 'ring an ambulance, quick!' and they were still in shock. I said to my friend 'Michael, I'm paralysed'.

This week he looked back on his life since that fateful day in August 2017. "4 years ago today my life was turned upside down and inside out for the rest of my life. Some will say it's something bad that happened to me, but in my opinion it was a blessing in disguise. I have been to hell and back, been through things and saw things you would never want to see, I have been through it all. When I went over the handlebars and landed on my neck I heard the cracks of my neck breaking and my body went lifeless and all I could move was my eyes. To be honest, I thought it was all over but I wasn't going without a fight. I looked up at the blue sky, I said a prayer. I still distinctly remember exactly what I said to myself "Ian don't close the book when something bad happens, flick the page and start a new chapter".

I have overcome multiple barriers and different types of adversity in the last 4 years. Some life threatening and some everyday obstacles. When I fell I broke 4 bones in my neck, severed my Spinal Cord, developed a collapsed lung and bleeds to the brain which have thankfully all gone. I was told I would be on a ventilator for the rest of my life and 80 days later I took my first breath of fresh air without a ventilator. In 2020 I got a collapsed lung which resulted in cardiac arrest which have now been overcome, thank God.

It's things like these which give you a different perspective on life and show how grateful I am to be healthy today.

When asked would I go down the hill I had my accident if I could go back in time, the answer is yes I would. The reason is yes I would because I didn't know it would lead to all this, I went down that hill everyday during the summer but on the 16/08/2021 God had different plans for me and I was just unlucky but lying on the ground I never thought it would lead to a better life than before my accident. Yesterday Is the past, right now is up to you and tomorrow is a mystery.

The only time I ever look back on the 16/08/2021 is to see how far I have come because that log I hit on the ground made me the man I am today. The support I have been shown is hard to put into words it's phenomenal from all of not only Ireland but all over the world. Its the support and the kind messages that motivates me".






The British Rally Championship action resumes at Trackrod Rally Yorkshire on September 24th & 25th. It will be the first two day event of the season, with a twelve mile stage in darkness opening the rally on the Friday evening, followed by a further 45 miles of competition on the Saturday.



When Can You Access Your Pension & What Are Your Options When You Want to Retire?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Taxable Cash: You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash.

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working. It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

AN EYE EXAMINATION SHOULD MAKE THE BACK TO SCHOOL CHECKLIST

A comprehensive eye examination is as essential for back-to-school success as supplies for learning. Studies have consistently linked school performance to poor vision and visual disorders.

More than one in 10 children in every classroom is estimated to have an undiagnosed common vision problem that affects their learning and development.

Some eye conditions do not display any signs or symptoms, so the only way to know for sure is to take your child for a sight test.

Signs which may show there is a problem with a child's sight include: • an eye appearing to drift inwards or outwards:

- difficulty concentrating:
- headaches:

• sitting too close to the television; or

rubbing their eyes a lot.

The condition 'lazy eye' can run in the family, so if someone in your family has either an eye turn ('squint') or suffers from reduced vision in one or both eyes('amblyopia'), it's a good idea to take any related children for a sight test.

What can I do if I don't want my child to wear glasses?

Some parents avoid taking their children for a sight test, because they do not want them to wear glasses

It's important to understand that some children do need visual correction so their vision can develop normally and to achieve their full potential. The good news is there is now a much wider range of attractive frames to choose from and less stigma attached to wearing glasses.

Many children are also suitable for contact lenses.

This is particularly helpful for children who take part in regular sports activities and they can be successfully worn from an earlier age than most parents expect.

IRELAND HAS A MORAL OBLIGATION TO HELP THE AFGHANISTAN PEOPLE

Statement by Seán Kelly, MEP for Ireland South and Head of the Fine Gael Delegation in the European Parliament, on the situation in Afghanistan



The current situation in Afghanistan is appalling, and we have a moral obligation to help. Tragic footage is emerging, such as of desperate crowds running alongside a US military plane as it prepared to depart Kabul airport on Monday.

I welcome the Government's response to the emergency to date. Ireland has committed to grant programme refugee status to up to 150 Afghans under the Irish Refugee Protection Programme, in addition to the 45 visas which were approved in recent days. These measures are vital to help secure the safe departure of foreign nationals and Afghans who wish to flee the country.

The current humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan will not be short-lived. Therefore, it is highly important that Ireland continue its current efforts to help, even once the initial shock of the recent developments has passed.

Many women in Afghanistan have expressed deep concern for the future. Under the Taliban's previous regime, women and girls were subject to repressive policies and systematic human rights violations. Ireland must continue to strongly advocate for the safety and freedom of women, minority groups and human right defenders in Afghanistan as a matter of priority.

I will continue to closely follow the situation in Afghanistan and the Irish and European response, and assist in any way I can. I call on all Members of the European Parliament to advocate in their Member States for support to victims of the crisis.

Kerry Vs Tyrone

Saturday August 28th, Croke Park

Well, after all the 'ifs' and 'buts' and 'maybes', we have a game. It was on, it was definitely on. Then it was off. Nope. Tyrone were quite clear. That there was covid within the Tyrone camp was no secret – joint manager Fearghal Lohan and four players, Tiernan McCann, Rory Brennan, Richie Donnelly, and Frank Burns missed the Ulster Final while self-isolating. We don't know whether any of these players actually had covid or were self-isolating as a precaution (nor should we, that's their own private business. But we do know that it spread rapidly in the Tyrone camp. So much so that they looked for a two week extension.

One, said Croke Park, with the firm decisiveness that they like to pretend to have. Ah no, came the swift reply. Ah no, said Tyrone. No, sure, we'll leave it.

I'm just going to address the elephant in the room at this stage. Were the Tyrone players vaccinated? If not, why not? If the guidelines were followed, then how did it spread so rapidly? Look, I'm not trying to have any dig at Tyrone players, I do have enormous sympathy for them (at least one of a minimum confirmed number of seventeen cases is believed to be seriously ill). But there are questions to be asked and answered here, not least because if Tyrone did do things right, then either vaccines are a lot less effective than we thought, or covid, particularly the delta variant, is far more potent than we thought. Either way, it's information that we need to know. Croke Park have said, in a very unconvincing manner even by their standards, that they may investigate the matter at a subsequent time. Yes. And geneticists are close to a breakthrough in attaching wings to pigs.

This is a dangerous situation, especially for players who, obviously in a contact sport, will be coming in close contact with their opponents. Will it be safe? Are enough people in authority asking that obvious question?

Tyrone Statement, August 14th

"This morning, the Tyrone GAA Management Committee has decided that it is not in a position to field its senior football team in the rescheduled All-Ireland football championship semi-final in Croke Park, on next Saturday."

"Having received expert medical opinion on the existing, and future health and welfare of the players who contracted the Covid19 virus during

the period of this last two weeks, and following consultation with the team's management, this decision has been made with the greatest reluctance, and with deep regret."

"It is acknowledged that the decision taken will cause major disappointment and significant inconvenience for the Association, in general, the GAA fraternity of Kerry, and especially for Tyrone's patrons and supporters, but the welfare and safety of players has been the over-riding factor in all considerations of this difficult situation."

Fair enough. It's tough on Tyrone, just as it was tough on the Dublin hurlers or on Sligo last year, but health and safety is paramount. To be honest, if the situation in the Tyrone camp is as bad as they have said, and if the spread of infection is that quick and dangerous, then this plain and simple shouldn't be going ahead. That's the bottom line, and we all know it.

Please note that I said 'if'. I most certainly would not – will not – be surprised to see Tyrone coming out with all their formidable guns blazing. Given the obfuscation about hard detail in the information we are getting, I suspect that there's a fair amount of 'beal bocht' ar siúl.

Kerry Statement, August 15th

I'm not printing the whole thing. It's widely available online. But I liked it. Composed, carefully worded, but yeah, there was a little bit of bite in it.

"Kerry is a proud GAA County, rich in the tradition of Gaelic Games which is deeply engrained in all our Clubs and Communities. Every All-Ireland title that Kerry has won, has been hard earned after a tough competitive campaign and we expect this year to be no different."

That bit could have been worded a bit better – there's a long way to go yet before Kerry win any such title. But hey, if people want to read it as arrogant? I'm fine with that. We know what we have been missing for quite a while now? That little touch of certainty about ourselves. Even that 2014 All Ireland was devalued a bit by the quality of the final (those two great clashes with Mayo still resonate in my memory). I wouldn't want swagger in Kerry footballers – it's not in our nature anyway, for every All Ireland a player has won, there's a lad up the road who has two. But a sense of "we are Kerry and heirs to a great tradition." Yup. Most definitely. More of that, please.

"We find ourselves in a very difficult situation not of our making. We have explicitly followed all Covid protocols and we have taken every precaution to protect our Players and Management." The implied criticism is mild – but it's there alright. Again, no harm.

"Notwithstanding this and having considered every possible aspect of the situation, our overarching wish is to ensure that the All Ireland Semi Final against Tyrone is played at the earliest possible opportunity. On that basis we have conveyed our position to National GAA earlier today and now await their deliberations and decision." In other words, the ball is in yere court. We are Kerry, we'll play anybody, anywhere, anywhen. We want a semi-final (it would leave us untested going into an All Ireland Final).

Kerry have, quite rightly, received a lot of praise, with a number of national outlets reporting that without their intervention, Croke Park would have stuck to their guns and Tyrone would have been forced to concede a walkover. That would have been a disaster for Tyrone, detrimental to Kerry's chances of achieving their best, and very harmful to Croke Park's depleted coffers. Being fair, I do believe that Croke park have not stinted financially during covid and would, to their credit, have been quite willing to take the hit on this one as well.

Match Preview

Let's be certain of one thing. Tyrone really do have formidable guns. They have beaten Cavan by 1-18 to 0-13, Donegal by 0-23 to 1-14, and Monaghan by 0-16 to 0-15. They have been missing players for all of those games, most especially Monaghan, but the likes of

Cathal McShane and Darragh Canavan were back in the fold by the finish of the provincial campaign. That Ulster Final, by the way, gave them an early taste of Croke Park, something we haven't had in a while. I'm not worried about that; it's a natural hunting ground for Kerry footballers. The likes of man-marker Pádraig Hampsey, Mattie Donnelly, Kieran McGeary, and especially Darren McCurry are in the form of their lives for Tyrone.

I'm worried about this one – note: I'm a natural worrier anyway, I'm afraid Kerry's glass is always half-empty for me in previews. But we haven't met any team of the calibre of Tyrone's opponents so far – let's remember that Cork had to survive a relegation play-off to stay in Division Two. Yes, we blew Clare out the water (3-22 to 1-11), followed up by shutting down Tipperary (1-18 to 1-9), and gave Cork their worst Munster beating ever, 4-22 to 1-9.

We hammered Tyrone in the National League, put six goals past them. But I don't care how much people assure me that Tyrone were going handle after hatchet for that one. I was at it and no, they most certainly were not. They hardly played a full back line even before the injury to Darragh Canavan. Those floodgates were always going to open; Dooher and Lohan were keeping their eyes firmly fixed on the forthcoming Ulster Championship. Quite rightly, I might add; I would have done the same thing in their place.

The big scoring returns against Galway (who barely turned up - Kerry were good, but they beat next to nothing that day) and Roscommon and the fightback to get a draw (I really did think that Dublin stepped off the pedal a bit after their goals in the first half, but the fact that Kerry had the legs to outrun them late on is a change and a very welcome one) didn't presage anything to me. I'm one of those who feels that the League is a tuning process and a base foundation, rather than a cornerstone, of championship. The easy concession of goals in that game is a concern to me. We haven't played any other teams as capable of going that route as Dublin; Tyrone (and, indeed, Mayo) are well capable of it. Physicality was a problem for me. one which the introduction of Mike Breen has helped. Paudie Clifford has been even more of a revelation. Gavin White is in the form of his life. Peter Keane has a job on his hands making sure that the infectious optimism of being the bookies' favourites (that and a euro will let you rent a shopping trolley), the fact of our nemesis Dublin being gone (we have a fabulous record against Mayo but again, that ain't hard currency for me, especially with a new-look Tyrone with bolstered ranks in the way), and our scoring record this year doesn't get into players' heads. He also has some tough decisions for me. Personally I prefer Morley to Foley at full back, Tadhg is that little bit stickier for me. Murphy or Crowley in the half back line? Paul gets my nod, but it's a close-run thing. Who partners David at midfield? I'd prefer Barry's muscle to O'Connor's mobility (if, as we are assured, Diarmuid is fit). I expect Adrian to be held in reserve, but this will be a battle before the finish and there's no better man than Adrian Spillane for that kind of battle, not least because he maintains his discipline without backing down an inch. Up front the only change I can see is the inclusion of Dara Moynihan (if fit). Workrate will be crucial in this game (actually, in modern football, it's an absolute prerequisite for winning any game) and there are few workers like Dara – but whose place is up for grabs?

Look, Tyrone didn't fake the rate of covid in their camp – I do suspect that it has been exaggerated for effect – and it does put us in as strong favourites for this game. I do see warning lights, though, and I don't think enough pundits or supporters are paying attention. This one will be a real battle, something we haven't faced in a while. But we stand armed and ready, and I think all the components are starting to slot into the right place. I'll go for a narrow Kerry win.

Fall of the Titans All Ireland Semi-Final



Mayo 0-17 Dublin 0-14

This one surprised a lot of people. It absolutely shocked me, especially after a first half that was all too familiar. I have made no secret of the fact that, while the absence of the likes of McCaffrey, McMenamon, and of course the talismanic Cluxton was always going to hurt Dublin, they had ample supply lines in the likes of Howard, Scully, Byrne, the Small and Basquel brothers. Meanwhile, Con O'Callaghan was easily fulfilling the promise that wasn't as evident at minor as people now claim (Dublin don't invest anything like as much as we do in the preparation of minor teams; they concentrate more on the U20 grade). Brian Fenton hadn't yet reached top gear but was still lording the skies and stinging with his accuracy, while Ciarán Kilkenny was unabashedly my redhot favourite for Footballer of the Year. James McCarthy was (and still is) my Footballer of the Decade. True, they hadn't galloped through Leinster with their usual abandon, it was more of a leisurely stroll, but I saw no game that they ever looked in danger of losing. I always felt that they were saving their engines for later on. Mayo? Ah, God love 'em. Brave as ever, dogged as ever, as fit and strong as ever, as limited up front as ever. No Oisin Mullen meant that they had no man-marker to really stymie Dublin's deadly inside line – despite his displays against the mercurial Diarmuid Connolly, I've never considered Lee Keegan to be a pure manmarker. I could only see one ending to this dame.

The first half was mind-numbing football, to be honest. We've seen this narrative played out many times between them over the past decade. Mayo's big men, lumbering like bulls, glaring as steam issued from their nostrils, chased shadows. Lithe and agile Dublin, like blue-clad matadors, danced around them, whirling metaphorical capes before delicately extending the rapier to inflict another small cut, slowing bleeding Mayo's hopes to death without ever going for the jugular.

Kilkenny was in great early form. As I had suspected, Keegan wasn't anticipating his movement. He was fouled for Dean Rock's opening score. Diarmuid O'Connor had a free to reply, but it was a poor attempt, and Ryan O'Donoghue sent another one wide. Kilkenny doubled the lead and Dean Rock made them three points to the good. This was already ominous. A Paddy Durcan effort fell short; Mayo couldn't buy a score. Con O'Callaghan opened his account. Aidan O'Shea had a good chance sail wide.

Mattie Ruane (a lock for an All Star) drove forward and finally scored for Mayo, a long distance beauty. Water in a parched desert for his team. Kilkenny picked off his second point. Ryan O'Donoghue responded with a mark but a foul on Paddy Small (probably Dublin's best player on the day, great energy) saw Dean Rock make it 0-6 to 0-2 at the water break.

Diarmuid O'Connor with a long ball into Aidan O'Shea. He made a fantastic mark,

super catch. Surely he can't miss....oh dear. Paddy Small won another two frees for Rock to slot over. Dublin were refusing any halfchances, quite happy to recycle the ball and comfortably able to retain possession until a sure thing chance opened up. Mayo hadn't landed a glove on them.Small pointed himself. Rob Hennelly showed his forwards how it's done by coming up to stroke over a long range free. Ciarán Kilkenny took and converted a mark for his third score to put Dublin into double figures, but Conor Loftus had the last say of the first half.

Half-time: Dublin 0-10 Mayo 0-4

Nope, sod this for a game of soldiers, says I to myself. Senator Palpatine's Empire will not be crumbling today to these Mayo jedi. I am off for a walk.

I'm not joking, by the way. I missed the third quarter out of lack of interest in what I was certain was a foregone conclusion. I only returned, in somewhat of a hurry (a very slow jog, in my personal case) after my brother rang me to tell me that Mayo were making a game of it. I didn't even believe him at first. I have seen it since.

Enda Hession burst through and looked bound for goal but Dublin assuredly closed it out. Aidan O'Shea wins possession but can't get away for a shot. Ryan O'Donoghue, though, picks off a beauty. Mayo are defiant against fate here; it's always been the most admirable of their traits. Kevin McLaughlin lofts a big effort from the wing but it tails away. Dublin are weathering this brief storm. Con O'Callaghan is one on one with Pádraig O'Hora and gets a shot off but it crashes back off the upright. Dean Rock hits a wide. Dublin are maybe a little too comfortable here - not that I ever expected it to cost them. After all, Mayo had only one point scored and it was still 0-10 to 0-5. With Mayo's conversion rate so far, Dublin had nothing to fear. Eoin McLaughlin with a bad wide. Rob Hennelly kicks his second free - the goalkeeper

is their joint top scorer after 45 minutes of an All Ireland semi-final. This is football of the '20s, alright. The 1920s.

James Carr goes for a shot when it wasn't a good option. Dublin are still ghosting with the ball, recycling and switching the play, but they are also ghosts as far as impact on the scoreboard goes. Honestly, it looks like they are so pleased with their ability to retain possession that they don't want to waste it by anything as blasé as taking a score. I know managers want their teams to slow it down when in front but this is just snuffing the life out of their team. Mayo, meanwhile, clearly unaware that they are already a comprehensively beaten docket, are rising to every challenge as though they still have a real chance to win this thing. I, of course, know in my bones that Dublin will tease and toy with them before applying the hammer late on, as is their wont.

Hold on, Aidan O'Shea going off? Yes, he's slowing down the play too much and simply not converting those chances he's winning – Mayo are obviously going to start relying on pace more than the long ball – but that's a big call by James Horan. Lose this game, and Aidan's name is going to feature prominently in the post-mortem.

Lee Keegan with a point just before the water break. Will it upset Mayo's rhythm or inspire Dublin to resume the controls?

John Small with a big hit on Eoin McLaughlin before Basquel blazes wide, should have done better. Small's shoulder charge looked okay to me in real time, I don't blame Conor Lane at all (people expect the impossible of referees, it's easy to criticise after watching replays). It was a foul, and deserved a red, but it was reckless, not malicious. Could all the aul' peasants put down them pitchforks, please?

Ah, there we are. Paddy Small with Dublin's first point of the half after a good catch by Brian Howard.

Dean Rock with a beauty - not a phrase I often say, I consider him more clinically consistent than brilliant, but that was superb. 0-12 to 0-7. When Evan Comerford fetches a big Ruane effort out of the sky, it looks as if Mayo's bolt is shot.

Rob Hennelly takes a free but it's going right and wide....wow! Somehow Diarmuid O'Connor stuck out telescopic right leg to keep it in play and Kevin Mclaughlin takes the point. Jordan Flynn addas another. Mayo are well on top and too physically strong for Dublin to shove the genie back in the bottle. There are little signs of composure breaking down in Dublin; this wasn't a scenario they were ready for. They need leaders to step up here – Mayo clearly have plenty of that ilk.

Dublin decide, very bizarrely, to play around at the back and kill the clock some more. It's a mistake and rapidly punished by Mayo's press, as Comerford is fouled while breaking forward. This tendency by keepers to play like outfield players, not only prevalent with Dublin this year, is something that I find ridiculous. You aren't a spare defender, you are a goalkeeper. Ryan O'Donoghue coolly slots it over. 0-12 to 0-10.

Brian Fenton with a huge catch, cometh the hour etc. But Tommy Conroy wins an even better turnover and it's Mayo advancing again. Both teams are coughing up handpasses and turnovers now -l'm not surprised given the intensity of the play – but Conroy takes a great point. Can Dublin hold out? They are in full retreat now again, I always consider it a mistake. The best defence is actually a score at the other end

John Small wins a free and Dean Rock sends it over. Still injury time though, and plenty of it left. Carr with a wide for Mayo, could be costly. They win the kick-out, though, and it eventually results in a free – David Byrne was lucky to escape with a yellow. Ryan O'Donoghue with the free – in the enforced absence of Cillian O'Connor, the apprentice has become the master.

Comerford spills the ball, recovers....'45 for Mayo! Rob Hennelly. This could be his moment.... going clearly wide. Shoulders slumping....no! Interference by Philly McMahon, re-take the kick! Big, big call. Go away with yere criticisms of Conor Lane, a lot of referees would have ducked that one, but he called it and he called it right. Dublin have been messy, truth be told, as they started to feel the heat. Hennelly nails his second attempt and Lane blows the whistle as players did and drag at each other. It couldn't be called a brawl, I suppose, with more shapes than punches thrown, but it wouldn't qualify anyone for mensa either.

Brian Fenton wins the throw-in and Bugler nudges Dublin in front. But Keegan – once O'Hora went on Kilkenny, Keegan was able to bring his influence on the general play – wins it and it ends up with another great Tommy Conroy score. Walsh is bodychecked by Basquel, black card and Dublin are down a man. Conroy again – Mayo in front for the first time. Darren Coen splits the posts. Dublin are the ones chasing shadows now, and worse, Mayo are brushing off their tackles with consummate ease. Mayo are accelerating into the game, it's Dublin who are desperate to slow it down, and they aren't getting their wish. Ryan O'Donoghue with another Mayo point.

Dublin, the great survivors. The greatest gaelic football team of all time. The Brogans, Paul Flynn, James McCarthy, Philly McMahon, Jack McCaffrey, Ross O'Connell, Cian O'Sullivan, Brian Fenton, Michael Darragh McAuley (he wasn't pretty with football but he was effective), Diarmuid Connolly, Ciarán Kilkenny, Cian O'Sullivan, Paul Mannion, Dean Rock (top

scorer, albeit with a lot of frees) and of course the greatest of them all, Stephen Cluxton.

They were incredible to watch playing the game, even if it hurt me. I had to admire them and I still do.

Nor will the snappish, ill-tempered shenanigans at the close of their incredible winning streak. Did Cluxton's drawnout departure leave too many questions behind? Arrah, all such questions are moot. They were great, and might still be again, but today the throne is empty and three teams are jostling for it. There will be time enough for recriminations and reflections and applause during the long winter.


In order to receive God's salvation we need to 1) Repent of all our sins, and acknowledge to God that we could never save ourselves by doing good works alone.
