



WORD PERFECT.... From Banker to Bard, Paul To Launch New Poetry Book

banker who became a bard is about to release a mesmerising new book of poetry and images that showcase Kerry at its very best.

Paul Byrne described his new publication, For The Love of Kerry, as exactly that – a real labour of love given that he relishes nature and his passions in life include the written word and capturing snapshots of the great outdoors.

Born in Collooney, Co Sligo in 1967, Paul's family moved to Listowel when he was just a year old and he was educated in Scoil Réalta na Maidine and St Michael's College.

After graduating from UCD, Paul's career in financial services kept him in Dublin but after 25 years involved in senior banking, and a decade in other sales roles, he moved to Killarney three years ago.

His said his new surroundings present the perfect opportunity to enjoy nature and to seek inspiration from Kerry's sheer beauty.

For The Love of Kerry features 36 original and beautifully crafted poems with some stunning accompanying images captured by Paul on his outdoor adventures and driven by his love of literature.

Much of his inspiration was found in Killarney National Park – very close to his home on Loreto Road – and Paul said what really drives him is a sense of spirit, soul and scenery.

"I have always enjoyed writing and the magic of the written word. What I put down on paper

is all about respect for the place we live in and the people we live alongside," he said.

His work for the new book was inspired by the outstanding natural beauty he has observed since he moved back to Kerry with his partner, Bridget, in 2022.

"The work is initially inspired by what I see through the camera lens and that is followed by a period of reflection and the application of a vivid imagination," he said.

Fans of his work have described his poetry as building a bridge between senses and nature with his words communicating the very essence of Kerry.

Delving into his new collection, the reader should prepare to journey through lakes, rivers, waterfalls, valleys, islands, castles, beehive huts, monastic sites and experience the stunning scenery of Kerry.

For The Love of Kerry – which will be in hardback and retailing at a great value €15 – will be officially launched by Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Maura Healy-Rae, at a reception in Killarney House at 8.00pm on Thursday, March 6 with Paul available for book signings from 7.30pm. There will be poetry readings and some wonderfully atmospheric music on the night and those that haven't already experienced Paul's poetry are in for a real treat.

For The Love of Kerry will be his second book and it's a follow up to his previous publication Inspirational Musings which hit the shelves in 2020.



Paul has previously read at The Helix in Dublin and Listowel Writers' Week which is quite appropriate given that he can trace his love of poetry back to his childhood in the Kerry town and a love for William Butler Yeats and Seamus Heaney.

"It was an emotional homecoming after a 40year absence and it stimulated my poetic muse and led to this collection being completed over the past three years," he said.

To muse about Kerry, is a wonderful thing, To meditate on Kerry, a precious divine right The world over, they come To absorb her vistas, and embrace her charm Her undeniable and unquenchable beauty Forever etched in the mind. Paul Byrne

A BRIDGE TOO FAR?

A footbridge linking the Killarney bus and rail stations could now cost an astonishing five million euro.

Once part of the same rail yard, the stations are separated by a high railing after the great sell-off of State property in the 1990s. The great sell-off of course paved the way for the Celtic Tiger which devoured us, is still chewing us, and seems to be returning for another big bite.

The result of that era is tourists and elderly people dragging luggage for half a kilometer.

Most recently the council in Killarney - on foot of a motion by John O'Donoghue has agreed to ask owners of The Killarney Outlet Centre for a way through - a suggestion inspired by this column, as John generously acknowledged.

A 2019 review identified that the option of a new pedestrian bridge spanning two tracks and landing on the main platform in the railway station is the preferred technical solution. A lift and steps would be provided on either side of the railway

tracks, the National Transport Authority has told TD Michael Cahill.

"The pedestrian footbridge, lifts, steps and pedestrian walkways, would cut the walk and reduce the interstation walk time to around 2 to 3 minutes."

However, there is "a significant cost attached to this proposal".

The original estimate in 2019 was "very approximately" estimated as being between €1.5 million and €2 million.

"Given construction inflation in the intervening period, and cost outturns on similar type projects, a cost range of between €3 million and €5 million in current values is considered more prudent, "Hugh Creegan of the NTA said.

"This scheme is regarded as a low priority investment and is not being progressed at present," he also said.

By the way Michael Cahill and his team - his son Tommy, secretary Lynda Horgan and no doubt Killarney's Brian Sugrue are playing a blinder for Killarney. Michael is to open an office in New Street shortly.

Pa Daly our only opposition TD and our only regular rail user is also focusing on the Rail Service from Kerry. He called on the Government, Irish Rail and the National Transport Authority to urgently restore catering services on the Tralee to Dublin rail service.

"Despite assurances that the issue would be resolved and a tender would be awarded in 'early 2024', the food trolley has yet to return. This was only ever supposed to be a temporary suspension during Covid when passenger numbers dipped," Pa said. New tracks are the next item!

NOTICE BOARDS NEEDED FOR KILLARNEY

A digital notice board is to be proposed for a central location in Killarney.

Last week we spoke about the way Killarney is so spread out it feels as if it has no centre and how a shuttle bus could help bring it together. It is difficult too to find out when clubs and bodies whether it's the sheds or the choirs meet.

Pubs and Churches have retreated as key centres of communication. And supermarket notice boards go only so far..

Councillor Marie Moloney is to propose a digital notice board along the lines of the one she has been involved with in Kilcummin. This would provide rolling news and notices. The Market Cross or outside the Town Hall would be ideal locations.

I think cinemas and other entertainments could maybe look at joining such a platform. It could be physical or digital and it might also serve to warn people about nuisance activities like the new trend for e-biking and cycling on footpaths.

Cycling on footpaths has become a serious problem in Killarney. Is there a way to curb it? Might schools and also agencies such as the Killarney Immigrant Support Centre, along with employment agencies, be asked to inform our newer residents this kind of activity is not acceptable. A regular patrol in and around the town by gardaí and traffic wardens targeting people cycling on the footpaths would send out a warning. By the way, nothing so far has replaced our Joint Policing Committee where councillors and community representatives could bring such issues to the notice of Gardaí and the public.

PILGRIM FOXES

There was a great appetite not so long ago for attributing human characteristics to native wild animals. Now it feels that the only animals we really are close to are cats and dogs. And they mop up all the attention.

The goose, the fox and the crow were once just as familiar. The fox crops up often. My ears pricked up when I heard a wonderful interview this week by Jerry O' Sullivan on Radio Kerry with a woman, a natural storyteller, from Mountcollins who rears fowl part time. Last year the fox was stressing her geese and they stopped laying.

Foxes are clever animals. And we have complex relations with them. They are beautiful creatures but they are also able to outsmart us. A fat duck of my own walked away a while back; and descendants of an injured fox we helped almost two decades ago still come to the back door for food for their young. Imagine then my fascination when I came across the figure of the pilgrim fox in Christ Church Cathedral a few weeks ago.

Dublin is getting some bad press on litter and violence. Dublin in the late '70s or early '80s was worse. It was drab, dirty and dreary and heroin filled and bent on obliterating its historic past. And there was no Luas. Christ Church is alongside Wood Quay where

a bland office building was plonked in the heart of Viking Dublin. The Cathedral is just up from the Luas stop at the Four Courts. The building is great. But the floor tiles are the true marvel. The fox appears in all his glory - hat on and walking stick and his

packed lunch on his back. Off on that great medieval excuse for travel: pilgrimage. а Spring and early summer would see hundreds on group pilgrimages to Spain, England, France and even the Holy Land. The package tours of their time. Somethings never change. But Dublin has. And for the better.



This tile design is unique to Christ Church, but the tiles are not original to either the first church on the site (built around 1030), or to its 12th and 13th century rebuilds. Due to insufficient foundations, the cathedral roof collapsed in 1562 — shattering most of the medieval tiles, so what you see today are copies of the originals, installed in the 1870s.







LANDOWNERS URGED TO CUT OVERGROWN HEDGES to Improve Road Safety

The Road Safety Authority (RSA), the County and City Management Association (CCMA) and the Irish Road Haulage Association (IRHA) have come together to call on landowners to cut their hedgerows to ensure they are not causing a road safety hazard.

Hedges can be cut between 1 September and the end of February. Under the Wildlife Act 1976, hedge-cutting is prohibited from 1 March to 31 August, except in cases where overgrowth poses a road safety hazard. Properly maintained hedges ensure vulnerable road users are not forced onto the road by overgrown hedges. It additionally affords motorists a clear view of what is in front of them or around a bend, especially on rural



Apply now for PLC courses on the Further Education and Training (FET) course hub

FET

Further Education and Training (FET) offers a variety of life-long education options, including apprenticeships, traineeships, Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses, community and adult education as well as basic literacy and numeracy services. FET courses are provided through the Education and Training Board (ETB) network throughout the country as well as through other local providers including online through SOLAS' eCollege. FET courses are provided from levels one to six on the National Framework of Qualification (NFQ) for anyone over 16 yrs., who wants to learn new skills or enhance existing skills to get the right job, progress to third-level or to support the achievement of personal goals.

ALTERNATIVE

PLC courses are an attractive alternative to higher education and provide a link between 2nd level and 3rd level. The CAO route doesn't suit everybody directly after Leaving Cert. Some may not feel ready for 3rd level. Others may not have secured a CAO offer or may be unhappy with the offer received. Over 200 Colleges of Further Education throughout the country offer PLC courses leading to awards at QQI FET Levels 5 & 6 from Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI).

RANGE

There is a huge range of courses available at PLC level and the courses are free of tuition fees. A PLC course is ideal for a person who has completed the Leaving Cert and requires further vocational education and training to enhance her/his employment prospects. A PLC course provides students with the opportunity to try out a course before committing to 3rd level studies. It's also tailor made for a student with the Leaving Cert Applied (LCA) and for mature students, who are returning to education.

BLEND

PLC courses are full time, mainly one year, offering a blend of academic work, practical work and work experience. Many PLC courses lead directly to employment. Increasingly, PLC courses are used to access 3rd level education, with more than 750 courses in the CAO system

LINKS

Through the higher education links scheme (HELS), the PLC courses provide an alternative route into CAO courses other than Leaving Cert exam results. A PLC course normally involves completing eight modules in the academic year by continuous assessment and a final exam. Students' entry to CAO colleges is then based on a scoring system for PLC awards achieved at Level 5 and/or Level 6 on the NFQ. Full details about the scoring system are available on the QQI website, www.qqi.ie.

FETCH

CAO has provided links to a host of full-time higher education, further education and training and apprenticeship options available to post-second level applicants. However, CAO does not accept applications for further education courses or apprenticeships. For all queries and information about Further Education and Training or Apprenticeship options, click on the further education and training tab on the CAO website. Alternatively. go to the FET Course Hub, www.fetchcourses. ie.

APPLY

To apply for a PLC Course on the CAO website, click on the further education and training tab. This will open up the further education and training course hub. Click on the course category that interests you or select all courses. A list of available courses in your chosen category will be displayed along with details of the course provider. Select the course you are interested in. More information about the course will be displayed including details of course content, entry requirements, course qualifications, awarding bodies and location.

REGISTER

Apply for a course by clicking on the 'apply now' link. You must now register with Fetch. Once registered, up you will be able to see details of the courses you applied for. You can also save courses to your account which you can review at a later date. Contact details for the course provider are available for further information. Once you have applied for a course you will receive acknowledgement of your application. Your course provider will supply details of the next step.

CENTRALISED

The centralised application system has made the application process for PLC courses much easier. Entry requirements normally consist of Leaving Cert standard and satisfactory performance at interview. Mature applicants are assessed on their life's experiences. PLC colleges are now accepting applications so apply early as places on the most popular courses fill up quickly.





Kerry Traffic On the Agenda

A radical approach needs to be taken with regard to traffic solutions for Killarney and the county of Kerry as a whole, if we are to ensure that we do not get the name for snarled up traffic congestion, according to Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill.

"Obviously, the provision of the Killarney to Farranfore Bypass is vital as the centrepiece of the entire plan, to give options to drivers who are going about their business in Kerry. But there is so much more that must be done, I feel Planning for new access points within Killarney town itself and on the existing Bypass there, need to be moved on urgently and a host of smaller projects should also be brought on board, to ensure we get this right" stated Deputy Cahill.

Peputy Cahill. "Projects such as a pedestrian access within the

joint campus of the Train and Bus Stations in Killarney, and the relocation of the Farranfore Railway Station closer to Kerry Airport are but two of a host of possibilities" said the Rossbeigh TD.

"Another crossing of the Laune River at Killorglin to cater for the enormous amount of traffic, both private and commercial that enters and exits South Kerry/Iveragh on a daily basis. The Listowel Bypass was recently completed to complement the works done in Tralee in recent years. Now it is time to deliver the full project on the N86 Dingle to Tralee Road and to open up Killarney to Farranfore and also South Kerry with a modern road network. I also believe that a high-rise carpark must now be looked at in Killarney.

"The Ring of Kerry road is 70% substandard and

requires major, urgent investment, the road and footpaths going through Cahersiveen town are in a shocking condition and this is why I have already raised these important matters in Dáil Eireann" stated Kerry's newest TD.

"All of our road bridges, the likes of Listry Bridge, Caragh Bridge, the S Shaped Bridge at Glenbeigh National School and many more around the county, were built in a different era, without articulated trucks and large coaches and need to be upgraded to two lane carriageways with access for cyclists and pedestrians. This is why I already raised these important matters in Dáil Eireann There is a large job of work to be done" added Michael Cahill TD.

Tralee to Dublin train still without catering services - Pa Daly TD



Sinn Féin TD for Kerry, Pa Daly, has called on the government, Irish Rail and the National Transport Authority to urgently restore catering services on the Tralee to Dublin rail service.

Commenting on a response he received from Irish Rail in response to a question posed to the Minister for Transport, the Sinn Féin spokesperson for Transport said:

"Commuters on the Tralee to Dublin service are forced to wait four long hours without any access to catering services.

"Despite assurances that the issue would be resolved and a tender would be awarded in 'early 2024', the food trolley has yet to return. This was only ever supposed to be a temporary suspension during Covid when passenger numbers dipped. "Passenger numbers have increased

significantly since then.

"A service without any catering was never meant to be the 'new normal' but I suppose that's the type of

service level people have come to expect from Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael.

"According to the response I received from Irish Rail, little progress has been made. Although the tendering progress is supposedly in its advanced stages, the National Transport Authority has yet to reach a funding decision.

"Without a funding decision, the contract cannot be awarded. And as a result, the service remains absent.

"Many elderly people use this service to travel to Dublin for treatments and medical appointments.

"The least they can expect is to be able to buy a sandwich and a cup of tea.

"I have written to the Minster and the NTA to seek clarity on this issue and to provide a timeline for restoration. "With three government supporting TDs representing the people of Kerry, I hope this can be resolved urgently."

OUTCOME OF REVIEW ON MEANS TESTING FOR CARERS IN THE COMING WEEKS - CAHILL

Local Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry, Deputy Michael Cahill has said that he has been informed that their will be an outcome of a review on the means testing for Carers in the coming weeks. Deputy Cahill was informed by the Minister for Social Protection Dara Calleary that an Interdepartmental Working Group with the Department of Health and the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth was established last year to examine and review the system of means testing for carer payments.

Speaking on the matter Deputy Cahill said: "I received an update in relation to the means testing for Carers. I know this is a very topical issue for many of my constituents.

"Minister Calleary informed me that there has been an Interdepartmental Working Group set up with the Department of Health, and Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth. He said the Department of Social Protection are chairing the group", he stated.

As part of Budget 2025, the weekly income disregard will increase from \notin 450 to \notin 625 for a single person, and from \notin 900 to \notin 1,250 for carers with a spouse/partner.

Deputy Cahill has said he is glad that there is movement on the issue of the means test for carers, and that he looks forward to hearing the findings that come from the Working Group.

"Fianna Fáil has outlined in the Programme for Government a timeline which commits to significantly increasing the income disregards for Carer's Allowance in each Budget with a view to phasing out the means test during the lifetime of the Government.

"I look forward to hearing the findings that the Working Group come to as they assess the means testing and hopefully means testing will be phased out sooner rather than later," concluded Deputy Cahill.

Roads Funding Welcomed

Deputy Danny Healy Rae has welcomed the announcement of funding of €33,360,450 for roads in Kerry today.

This includes funding for roads resurfacing and bridge rehabilitation works. This is part of an investment programme of \in 713 million for regional and local roads throughout the country in 2025.

Local schoolboy wins life-saving equipment in competition run by CRITICAL

The defibrillator for a community competition aimed to raise awareness about the importance of AEDs in saving lives during emergencies like sudden cardiac arrest.

Evan said: "We had a first aid class in school a few weeks before the Ploughing Championships. I was interested in it and stopped at the Critical stand when I saw the CPR demonstrations and wanted to try it out for myself. CPR and AEDs are very important in the community because they save lives."

Having access to an AED enables the community to be better equipped to help save lives and promote a safer environment in the community.







But in their absence the likes of Darragh O Callaghan, Jamie O Sullivan and Oisin Spring really stood up to the plate, contributing to the scoreboard and defending ferociously.

Darragh O Callaghans commitment all season was rewarded with a starting berth alongside Mark Sheehan who cut short his involvement in Limerick to line out. Alongside Mikah Blackwell, Darnell Snyers and Abdul Oladipupo they set to their task early with the Celtics relying on the accuracy of Eoghan Donaghy and Ariyon Williams from outside. Sheehan and Blackwell got the Lakers up and running but had to be vigilant to limit the threat of Abdul Wurie and Chima Obikwelu. That duo started well but strong defence in the paint gave the home side energy, something Darnell Snyers and Blackwell tapped into to grab the lead at 13-12. Oisin Spring stretched it to three with a breakaway basket but Williams and Donaghy finished the quarter as they started it to give their side a slender 16-15 lead.

Blackwell and Sheehan answered Williams' free throws to again take the lead but a Wurie scoring burst gave his side the advantage. Cian Gleeson and Martin Frawley climbed off the Celtics bench to both hit threes and open up an eight point gap but Sheehan and Jamie O'Sullivan were quick to respond. The Lakers defence continued to stifle the Celtics offence but found it hard to cash in at the other end . But their spirit kept them in the fight and with a nine point deficit at half time, 34-25, they still had their foot in the door.

The Lakers would have targeted a fast start to the third quarter and Blackwell supplied



that with early buckets. Williams was causing problems cutting to the basket, cashing in from the free throw line but Oladipupo cut the gap to five, 38-33 early doors. Williams' threat was still strong but Snyers and Blackwell kept the Lakers in tow, the latter profiting from a big rebound from O Callaghan. O Callaghan followed that work up with a basket of his own with Oladipupo again striking. Vadjikiba Dosso gave Williams some scoring support but Rui Saravia and Snyers made sure the Celtics were still in sight heading down the stretch.

Blackwell went to work on whittling down the ten point lead , netting twice to cut the gap to six. Williams hit one from downtown but Saravia and Jamie O Sullivan struck back . The exchanges under the basket were physical all night long but the Lakers effort did not wilt. But every time they came within touching distance of the Celtics Williams inevitably had the answer. Finn Hughes gave his team a ten point lead which Blackwell paired back to seven. The Celtics eventually gave themselves some daylight with Hughes picking up the baton from Williams. Snyers kept the Celtics honest right till the end and although the final score would see the Celtics 75-63 to the good, the home side certainly died with their boots

on. If they continue to carry this fight to the end of the season they'll win more games than they lose.







NATIONAL LEAGUE

Dublin 0-19 Kerry 1-14

I wasn't a happy camper last Saturday night after events in Austin Stack Park, and I doubt if too many of you were. Dublin beating Kerry in Tralee for the first time in almost a guarter century (1983) doesn't remotely worry me, never did. Dublin gave us plenty of lessons in February over the years, but the two sides haven't actually met anything like as much as you think, and Kerry were usually glad of those lessons. Remember last year, when Con O'Callaghan absolutely gave us the runaround in Croke Park? Dublin went on to lose an epic National League Final. As I have pointed out many's a time, with the modern glut of fixtures at club and intercounty level nowadays, any team putting on the afterburners is the National League is just wasting fuel that will be needed later on. Ask Dublin or Derry after last year's championship how much that League Final was worth.

No, defeats in February don't bother me all that much. But the manner of this defeat? Absolutely that is a big deal.

First off, that isn't a strong Dublin team. We all know they are rebuilding, including experimenting with quite a few players (personally, I don't believe that you can really have dual players in the modern game). On paper Kerry were a lot stronger. There's definitely at least nine of that Kerry team who will be starting championship for us this year. Can you really say the same about Dublin? I would have liked Barry Dan O'Sullivan to have another run or Cathal Ó Beaglaíoch in midfield. I know that Joe O'Connor is and deserves to be in pole position. But this is Barry Dan and Cathal's only time to stake a claim. Likewise Cillian Burke and Eddie Healy. Damien Bourke has been a revelation for me - I still think that Graham and Tom will be our corner backs and Ó Beaglaioch will be on the wing, but I have really liked the look of Damien Bourke. Now, credit to Jack O'Connor for most of the subs he brought on. There was a certain 'sink or swim' vibe to it; nothing wrong with that. But the cold hard truth is that Kerry sank.

Look, hindsight is very easy. And I know there is going to be people saying that they could see the cracks in Kerry's display and prophesied defeat at half-time. Yeah, we could all see a few cracks, but at 1-13 to 0-4? Nostradamus, you no more predicted defeat than I did....because quite frankly, you should not be losing games from that position. Don't



tell me about the wind: it's not as if it reversed direction at half-time. Dublin had leaders and players willing to put their hands up. We did have battlers; I'm not and wouldn't question anyone's commitment or courage, but that bit of raw steel? I'm not talking dirt either, but every player at this level knows how to slow a game, to interrupt momentum, to be a dog soldier. Even forget the likes of those spectacular points by Lee Gannon or Kilkenny's nous and guile in the middle third as the tide turned - I honestly feel that we got lost in the weeds in that second half. I think that if it had been level at half-time, Kerry would actually have put up a better second half display. That would have been a battleground that we understood.

Another big point for me. The actual football played was.....well, it was exactly what I did not want to be seeing. There's a narrative out there now that 'well done on Dublin for their cuteness in killing the play in the first half'. Arrah, would ye stop. Handpass over and back rather than kick into the wind? Alright, I can sympathise, even if I don't like it. But you had players getting free within fifteen metres of Kerry's goal....and turning to handpass it backwards. I've already seen enough of that....stuff....to last me a lifetime, and it's what the FRC were really hoping to counter. Eamonn Fitzmaurice has understandably been championing the new rules that he was part of formulating, but he was honest about his disappointment about this game in his subsequent interview on Radio Kerry.

I'm not giving any blow by blow account. Ciarán Kilkenny hit the post earlier on but Dublin concentrated on holding possession rather than turning it into something. Kerry were much more direct, with Joe O'Connor sending in a long ball that was cleverly worked into a Micheál Burns score. Dublin were getting wiped out in the middle third. Diarmuid O'Connor is arguably the form midfielder in the country right now (which worries me, there's a long year ahead). Once Kerry turned over the kick-out, there was Graham O'Sullivan to double our tally. Joe O'Connor had a great goal chance but shot just wide – he should have laid off to Paudie Clifford unmarked beside him in support. Joe has many great attributes, not least his power driving forward, but I've never seen signs that he is a player to finish those chances. Kerry actually had seven goal chances in the game and only took one.

Seán O'Shea and Seán Bugler exchanged frees. 0-3 to 0-1. Paudie Clifford spotted Seán O'Shea looping into space and fed him for a superb two pointer - I think Seán and David's long range kicking could be our best weapon later on. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch boomed over another from outside the arc. 0-7 to 0-1. Like I say, there are plenty of people saying that Dublin played it wisely in that first half....I didn't hear any hindsight heroes at 0-7 to 0-1 down. Micheál Burns slotted his second point and another good ball from Diarmuid into Paul Geaney yielded a handy free. I really liked Paul's speed in transferring the ball all game. That could have been a goal chance - mind you, Shane Ryan did well at the other end to gather a fisted effort. Swings and roundabouts....

I don't fully know what to make of former hurler Eoghan O'Donnell as Dublin full forward. He's very strong and very direct, bursting through for a good score, but I thought Jason Foley had the better of that duel. Greg McEneaney notched another Dublin point, 0-9 to 0-3. For some reason, I had visions of Dublin suddenly waking up, abandoning their numbing game-killing approach, and notching a couple of two pointers before the break.

I can be an awful pessimist. Seán Bugler had two chances and made a hames of both (he was excellent in open play, but man of the match? Really? Are Marvel scripting this movie?). Seán O'Shea kicked a superb two pointer. We left another goal chance behind us (nobody, including me, was too bothered at that stage) but Conor Geaney made it 0-12 to 0-3.





Then came the kibosh. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch was going for a score (which I encourage at every opportunity; you won't ever score the shots you are afraid to take, nor will you get any better at shooting). Micheál Burns did very well to get in and challenge, and a loose ball like that spilling around the square? Meat and drink for an accomplished sniper like Paul Geaney. Greg McEneaney did pick off a late score for Dublin, but at 1-12 to 0-4? Let's wrap it up and go home, boys.

Hubris. I have fallen for it before, and I still fell for it again. I'm annoyed with myself more than anybody else, truth be told.

Kerry with a couple of early misses in the second half. Big deal. Keep that stranglehold in midfield, or just break even, and we are home and hosed.

Except that Dublin are beginning to get a grip there, with Kilkenny making a real difference. He opened the second half scoring and Tom Lahiff added another. Lee Gannon and Niall Scully should have added more.

Well worked score from Seán O'Shea. We don't need to match Dublin, just keep tipping away. We can't afford to get caught in possession, though, and a good turnover saw Seán Bugler split the posts. Evan Comerford was well wide with a two point free but Lee Gannon made up for it. Dublin were doing well on Kerry's kick-outs now and Bugler added two more points. 1-13 to 0-11. I'm still not worried as such, but I am a little bit fidgety.

Ciarán Kilkenny with a majestic two pointer. Can you give motm to a player who was mostly anonymous in the first half? I certainly can. Just a goal in it now.

Seán O'Shea with a free calms things down a small bit, but we all know the momentum has swung. Luke Breathnach with a reply. He has done well for Dublin.

Paudie Clifford with a point. Four in it now. No goal, lads, no goal.

The game has changed. Lorcan O'Dell shows why with two great two pointers. Level pegging. At least take the draw, it'd sicken me to lose this one.

Too bad about you, says Luke Breathnach (metaphorically) as he swings over with his left foot.

A bad day at the office. We got almost everything wrong in that second half. Arrah, mid February. But yeah, this one raises questions about what kind of bedrock we are building on. Dublin supporters will know that their display, including the heroic comeback with the wind, won't be winning any All Ireland. The fact that it leaves us fighting to stave off relegation is secondary to me; there's five teams in that mix. Like I say, it's not the defeat. It's the manner of it. But yeah, I am definitely worried.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP DRAWS

Look, the club championships are so far out that you would be as well off buying a lottery ticket as making even a tentative prediction. You have no idea what an opposing club's starting fifteen will look like by then. Frankly, almost everybody has no clue about their own starting fifteen by then. Players will have gruelling U20 and senior inter-county campaigns. There is a greater proportion of dual players in their first year or two playing senior.That's fantastic, but it brings it's own logistical problems. The elongated fixtures schedule has issues for rest and recovery; I personally think it's too much on bodies and carries too high a toll. Gaelic football was once so dominant a pastime in Kerry that anything else, anything, could be classed as an afterthought. It's still unquestionably the most popular, but life is lived at a faster pace, with more demands (yes, plenty of them self-inflicted) and with a bigger drop-down menu. Summer migration is a huge issue don't mind all the guff about the tiny couple of top players heading off to play AFL. That, quite frankly, is a small drop in a huge ocean. You think if I am twenty years of age and struggling to find consistent work in Kerry, I'm hanging around for the summer out of loyalty to my amateur club? Hello? This is the real world calling

All of that is before you factor in the new rules as recommended by the FRC. I'm thrilled with them. Not saying they are perfect, but compared to the absolute drudgery we endured over the past few years? More than a decade, actually. But at club level, this is going to be.....well, the Chinese famously have a curse that says "May you live in interesting times". Don't worry about it; I think we can take interesting times for granted throughout this year!

INTERMEDIATE CHAMPIONSHIP

The Intermediate has traditionally been the most open competition. And this year it is tighter than ever.

In Group One Fossa will be looking to push a bit higher on their remarkable ascent and have a team well capable of knocking on the door – and that's before you factor in a particular pair of siblings. Firies are only just promoted, but there's a reason why they were promoted, and they have both speed and shooting forwards. I think the new rules could suit them. Kilcummin, as always, are deadly with a full deck, they also have a penchant for goals at crucial moments. John Mitchels weren't really fancied last year – they showed a lot of us that they have plenty of good football. Have they the scoring forwards, though?

Group Two. I'd say Laune Rangers must be raising their eyes to heaven. They just ran out of fuel for last year's final replay, but what a group to land in this year. Emmetts

have a good style and some very dangerous players; much will depend on if they can adjust to the new rules, but on home ground they'd certainly back themselves against anyone. Ballydonoghue's Foleys won't like me saying it, but the club just don't have the numbers, you need 20+ to compete at this level. Killarney Legion have top quality football, but do they have the scorers? If the likes of Shine, O'Grady, and the O'Sullivans click, they are a match for anyone, and I don't just mean in the group. But any sentence that starts off with the word 'if'....

Nothing easy in Group Three either, but once again numbers come into play. An Ghaeltacht are another side with more young talent than a lot of people realise and they have big men. They will raise a few eyebrows. But Glenflesk....their battle against Laune Rangers was possibly the best game I saw at any grade last year, and Glenflesk were missing at least three certain starters, arguably a few more. If – and there's that word again – if they are at full strength, they are my overall favourites.

In Group Four Beaufort have been unlucky with injuries, but the Breens, the O'Connors.... with everybody on board, they will rattle cages. Gneeveguilla have been desperately unlucky in the last few years. Páidí famously spoke about "a grain of rice will tip the scale". Yup. That's all that Gneeveguilla need to fall their way to make a major breakthrough. Glenbeigh/Glencar...again, respectfully, I

can't see them having the depth for a long run. Rahillys.....well, that's the great unknown. I'd think some of their top guns are taking a step back. To be honest, looking at underage over the past few years, I suspect that they will be at Intermediate level for a while. But the thing about Rahillys, going back literal generations, is that they always defy the odds.

A slight change to the format this year with three groups of three. You would have to fancy newly promoted Austin Stacks to come out of Group 1 and Dr. Crokes will surely be overall favourites, even with new management. Group 2 is the most intriguing, and the clash between Dingle and Kenmare Shamrocks will surely be the tie of the group stage.

PREMIER JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Last year's Premier Junior was the best championship of them all in my opinion. Very well balanced, with far fewer of the one-sided and predictable affairs at other grades. And that latter stages....not just thrillers, but actual great open play as well. I wanted to send videos of those games to every inter-county manager out there with a note attached saying "Watch. This is what our game can be when you take the shackles off".

I think it's important to note that I didn't actually do that.

It should be as good this year. I'd fancy Duagh to build on last year, especially if Cormac Dillon continues his form. Renard and Waterville are both decent but a team who are definite dark horses for me is Ballyduff, who have a fantastic crop of dual players beginning to shine at senior. As always, though, the hurling will define a lot of their season and will take priority.

In Group Two, your guess is as good as mine. We know that Senans have been hammering on that door and have a good age profile. Listry have been desperately unlucky with injuries in the past few years but undoubtedly have the talent, especially up front.

Division One side Ballymac will of course be red hot favourites in Group Three, favourites for the whole competition, but their key players aren't getting any younger. The cold truth is that I suspect that it's this year or not at all, and I say that as some-one who has always liked the club. I fancy Castlegregory to emerge alongside them. It's always a numbers game with Castlegregory, but they definitely have the talent.

Group Four....ah lads. If Ardfert had the likes of Mackessy and Monaghan, we wouldn't even be having a conversation. They don't, but they were still just a whisker away last year and, like Ballyduff, they have a seamless stream of young dual talent. Keel are also young for the most part, I'd say Evans' children cut their teeth on O'Neills footballs. But Brosna and Annascaul? Honestly, I think there are senior club sides who would struggle to get out of that group.

JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

If it's a numbers game at higher grades, it's practically random selection at this level. I'd fancy Cordal to come out of Group One, with Moyvane to just pip Skellig Rangers to join them. Home venue will play a big part in deciding that one, I suspect.

Lios Póil have to be fancied to come out of Group Two. The other three teams are all tight enough on numbers. Cromane are very tight but have some great young talent, so maybe....but Ballylongford/Tousist will be a tough side to beat. Dual club Kilgarvan, in the expected absence of Donal Down O'Sullivan...well, they always battle brilliantly above their weight and will again.

Group Three has to be Tarbert surely. After the school's All Ireland win last year and the likes of the Colahan brothers etc., they must be actively targeting the championship, let alone the group. After that, it's tight. St. Michaels/Foilmore have one of the best young talents in the county if he can stay injury free, and Sneem/Derrynane have two young players I'd go well out of my way to watch. Again, home venue will be crucial, but I can see a more rounded Scart making the knockout stages.

Knocknagoshel and Beale will both fancy their chances of coming out of Group Four. Again, both will have real ambitions for this competition. With all due respect (the likes of Jack Hennessy and John Kennedy have bailed me out manys a time) I can't see Asdee going too far at the moment. Finuge.... everything on paper says that they will be limited enough, but Finuge are one of those teams....for those of you who can remember Meath in the '80s, even before they were winning All Irelands....Finuge almost have surprise victories in their DNA.

PADDY CULLEN RIP

He wasn't, and would have never have claimed to be, the best player on a team that included the likes of Seán Doherty, Anton O'Toole, Brian Mullins, Barney Rock, David Hickey, Tony Hanahoe, Jimmy Keaveney..... half a century later, those names roll off the tongue. But Paddy Cullen....like our own Johnny Culloty or Johnny Geraghty of Galway a decade earlier, or contemporaries Martin Furlong of Offaly or the great Billy Morgan of Cork, he epitomised as well as represented Dublin. You would have to acknowledge Stephen Cluxton as the better goalkeeper, and for that matter John O'Leary was right up there with any of them, but Paddy Cullen..... there was something quintessentially Dublin

about him that even they couldn't emulate. Stoneybatter native Paddy attended St. Laurence O'Toole's National School and was actually a key player when they reached a Cumann na mBunscoil final in Croke Park, his first time on the sacred sod. He marked a Larkhill lad who was outstanding; it was the start of an unlikely lifelong friendship with Jimmy Keaveney. Paddy was, by his own admission, not the most diligent of students. It was in O'Connells Boys in Seville Place that he, one of ten siblings, blossomed. He captained the 1964 Dublin U21 team from half back. Mind you, Kerry won that All Ireland, Dublin won nothing.

Paddy didn't just blossom in gaelic football (he played midfield for the club). There was basketball, snooker, tennis....even the blasphemy of soccer. This was inner city Dublin, the old idealism of dancing at the crossroads wasn't an option. Dublin had taken over London's mantle for the worst slums in Europe. People ate coddle, but only because they couldn't afford Irish stew. Anyway, gaelic football in Dublin in the late sixties? You'd have more street cred wearing a tutu or, horror of horrors, listening to Irish trad.

Paddy Cullen thrived on the challenges. And people began paying attention. Was it personal ambition that took him to St. Vincents, or were hints dropped? Vincents more or less considered Dublin GAA to be a personal fiefdom in those days. Other clubs could resent it, but couldn't really refute it on the field of play.


Paddy's senior Dublin debut was as casual as it gets, Keaveney persuading the selectors to give him a chance in a challenge game against Derry the day before Galway beat Meath to win the All Ireland. Meath were a feared team. Dublin? Only a handful of diehards watched the challenge game, and most of them were more curious about Derry. Nobody paid much attention to the stripling who played full forward in place of the respected John Timmons. Five minutes later, Paddy was being carried off with a broken ankle. No help, no support, no get well cards. Off with you.

Paddy could take a hint. He was working in McNaughtons, the builders, as an electrician and playing in goal for their soccer team. Dublin was a soccer town, impressing for McNaughtons was far greater currency than playing five minutes for Dublin GAA. Shelbourne came knocking.

Dublin GAA were looking for a keeper. Keaveney, although beginning to be disillusioned, was still Dublin to the core and Paddy got a postcard inviting to play in goal against Offaly in a Corn na Cásca game. He duly walked up to Croke Park - there was no danger of getting caught in traffic! He'd actually forgotten to bring his invite and thought some fast talking might be needed. No better man if it came to it, but it didn't, because nobody cared. He actually got caught out by a long ball by Greg Hughes that looped over him and into the net. He thought he might see a curly finger taking him off, but Dublin didn't exactly have too many players clamouring to take his place. Paddy Cullen was first choice Dublin keeper. They didn't have a second choice.

Things got worse as the seventies started. Offaly lorded Leinster, and Meath were their challengers. Paddy Cullen was a replacement All Star in 1973. Dublin almost made a Leinster guarter-final that year....almost. In desperation, Dublin chairman Jimmy Gray appointed a three man committee to find a management team. UCD manager Eugene McGee recommended his Vincent's archrival Kevin Heffernan. They were relegated in the National League. Good enough for them. Dublin beat Wexford in the opening round of the Leinster Championship. Kerry supporters were here because the National League Final replay was the glamour part of the double -header. The few Kerry fans who watched the opening game weren't impressed. But Dublin somehow scrambled into a Leinster guarterfinal. Offaly. One of the All Ireland favourites. Going for a fourth Leinster on the trot. Dublin were wearing a new sky blue outfit with navy shorts. Townie notions. You didn't see the good teams at that craic. There were few enough spectators in Croke Park and far less wearing blue. Most Dubliners were far more concerned about the Dublin bombings that had torn the city apart a few weeks earlier than anything in Croke Park.

Despite the many myths that have been built around that Dublin team since, that was the game that changed everything. Jimmy Keaveney had been persuaded back. So was Leslie Deegan. Heffernan, Donal Colfer, and Lorcan Redmond had pushed players very hard in unseen training. Offaly were a little surprised but hardly panicked at Dublin's resilience. Even when the outstanding Deegan nipped in to fist Paddy Reilly's long ball into the Offaly net, Dublin only led by a point at half-time. But somehow, Offaly just couldn't get their noses in front. Late on, with



the scores level, Leslie Deegan scored the most important point in all of Dublin's history to win it. He got injured a week later and never started another championship game for Dublin.

And suddenly, just like that, they were household names. Suddenly supporting Dublin football was something to take pride in. Paddy Cullen found strangers talking to him about football. Paddy was actually supposed to captain that side, having been nominated by County champions UCD, diplomatic culchies that they were. Mind you, that didn't last long, Heffernan promptly installing Seán Doherty instead. It suited Paddy fine; the 'Doc' was a better choice to charge ramparts anyway.

Kildare and Meath fell in Leinster. Dublin had been used to meeting up for a few pints the night before their one championship game every year, seeing as they wouldn't be meeting up for the next six months. That habit ended. Dubin were no longer genial adventurers. Heffernan was transmitting steel to willing receptors. Mickey Whelan was introducing training techniques he had learnt on an American scholarship. Soccer, of course, although Dublin didn't broadcast that apostasy.

Cork in the All Ireland semi-final. Dual starstudded reigning champions Cork.

Jimmy Keaveney visited lifelong friend Billy Morgan and his brother-in-law Frank Cogan, who had the Sam Maguire. Jimmy didn't think too much of it, nor did Frank. But Heffernan? Red flag to an already enraged bull – or so he pretended. For the first time, a Dublin team travelled together to Croke Park. And they beat the All Ireland champions, and beat them fair and square with great football. Less than 250 people watched; RTE were in the RDS filming the last day of the Dublin Horse Show.

Galway, last year's finalists. Dublin, normally a somnolent city, was buzzing now. Funnily enough, while Cork had started a cultural revolution by introducing the likes of skinhead Jimmy Barry Murphy to the staid traditions of a GAA dominated by an older generation's values, Dublin's streets were almost witnessing a counter-revolution (social change had always taken a few generations to really take effect. To say that changed in the 1960s with the advent of

television and travel is an understatement). Working class Dublin was proud of itself and it's unique Irishness. The Chieftains, the Dubliners.....suddenly, their popularity exploded. The fusion of youthful enthusiasm and cultural pride, helped of course by Whittaker's economic reforms and a rise in broadcast media, would lead to Thin Lizzy, Rory Gallagher, eventually the likes of U2 and Van Morrisson. I'm not for one moment suggesting that the GAA in either Dublin or Cork provoked that sense of identity for a generation. I am saying that they were the most obvious symptoms.

Paddy Cullen took everything in his stride. His penalty save in the final against IGalway's Liam Sammon is often selected as the starting point, but I definitely go back to that Offaly game. My own belief is that the pebbles were already rolling that would become that blue avalanche. Even if Dublin had lost to Galway – and they looked fitter, faster, and quicker to move the ball than the Tribesmen all through, despite conceding an early goal – they were close to an All Ireland and always likely to get closer within a year or two.

That's not to deny that Paddy's save against Galway, early in the second half, was a genuinely brilliant reflex save to his left. Liam Sammon had never failed to score a penalty prior to that. Galway wouldn't win another All Ireland until 1998.

Dublin would be duelling against adversaries of yore. Gaelic football had always burned bright in Kerry. The young guns coming through were under-estimated compared to the likes of the Ballylongford O'Donoghues, Donie O'Sullivan, Derry Crowley, Seamus Mac Gearailt, or, of course, O'Connell. But the likes of the imperious O'Keeffe cousins, Páidí (known by the more prosaic 'Paudie O'Shea' back then), the Spillanes, Deenihan, Egan, Ogie, Power, Sheehy....if you had asked Paddy Cullen about John McCarthy's sons, or Bernard Brogans', or Noel Curran of Meath's young fella, or Noel McCaffrey's, or Dean Rock, latest scion of that famous family..... legends are always being forged anew.

Paddy Cullen played an iconic role in Mikey Sheehy becoming a legend. The 1978 final. Referee Seamus Aldridge called a free on Paddy Cullen. Ger Power had raced in to contest a long ball by Jack O'Shea, but Paddy came out to gather safely and lay off to Robbie Kelliher. Was it a free? Paddy himself always reckoned that he had gotten away with an earlier foul on Power, but had won that ball cleanly. He argued the point - don't pretend to me that any player then or now wouldn't do the same. Robbie Kelliher handed the ball to Mikey Sheehy for the free. The FRC might approve the gentlemanly conduct, but they wouldn't want to be calling for any show of hands! Mikey, being Mikey, had a knack for innovative goals from childhood. A quick chip, and Con Houlihan wrote his own name in history as he described Paddy being like a woman with a cake burning....

It's forgotten now by many that Kerry's big full forward, nicknamed after German striker Gerd Muller, would score 3-2 as Kerry won out by 17 points. None of it is remembered quite as much as that goal. Paddy and Mikey actually became good friends later on.

Paddy was a better judge of football than he ever let on. In 1990 he took over from Gerry McCaul as Dublin manager. They beat Kildare to win the National League Final but lost the Leinster Final to a great Meath team (O'Rourke, Stafford, Flynn, Beggy, O'Connell, etc.).

Italia '90 happened in that year. There's a strong brand of revisionist history that suggests that it had a profound impact on Ireland's sense of self in much the same way as 'Heffo's Army' in 1974. I don't agree, simply because it's impact never reached the domestic game due to lack of investment (LOI attendances actually dropped as supporters began following their international heroes

on more glamorous English clubs, with Sky and Ryanair helping to facilitate it in the coming years). It's a moot point anyway, because in 1991, with quintessential Dub Paddy Cullen on one sideline and the iconic Seán Boylan on the other, Dublin and Meath played out a four game saga in the Leinster Championship. Dublin were on the losing side but their battles are remembered today and were talked about back then far more than Down's eventual All Ireland victory (Down beat us in the semi-final by 2-9 to 0-8, and weren't remotely flattered by the winning margin). If there were any doubters about Ireland's primary sport, they had just been emphatically silenced.

A year later Tommy Carr lifted Leinster's Delaney Cup on behalf of Dublin and they reached the All Ireland Final, only to fall to Brian McEniff's Donegal. Manus Boyle recovered from a bad start to kick nine points; he fisted an open goal off the crossbar as well. Charlie Redmond was the championship's top scorer (Maurice Fitzgerald was joint second). My own belief is that Dublin had the talent and the hunger, but they didn't yet have the tempered steel to withstand the pressure of being favourites. Paddy guided his team to another league title a year later, beating Donegal, and added another Delaney Cup by beating Kildare. They put up a great battle against Derry in the All Ireland semi-final. Dublin were actually well on top early on,but the likes of Enda Gormley and Anthony Tohill settled Derry and Johnny McGurk fired over one last point to beat Dublin by 0-15 to 0-14. It was enough for Paddy. He stepped away, having given his best to his county.

The same as he always had. It isn't just Dublin who are the poorer for the passing of a giant, nor can his contribution to society be measured by any amount of sporting achievements, not even his.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it

becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.




A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerny County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years. The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

CONIFERS

For colour all year round you can't go wrong with conifers and there are lots of different types to choose from.

When choosing a conifer they are usually classified under four sections. Dwarf which will grow from 1.5ft to 15ft. Medium 12ft t 50ft. Tallanything over 50ft and finally ground cover or prostrate growing from about 2ft in height to a spread of anything from 2ft to 6ft.

When choosing a dwarf conifer it is very important to remember that it can mean two things. It may describe a slow growing variety which will grow to about 2 to 3 ft after 10 to 12 years or it may mean that it will grow to its maximum height in a quicker time frame.

An ideal dwarf conifer to choose is Juniperus Communis Compressa which will not grow more than 2 to 3 ft which makes it ideal for a rockery.

There is also a big choice when it comes to medium conifers. So remember before you choose find out the mature height and spreads. Medium conifers are ideal for shrub beds as they will give you a good focal point and colour all year round whether it is green, gold or bluegrey.

Tall conifers speak for themselves and are ideal for a large garden. Prostrate conifers are ideal for ground cover but make sure to remember that there are different varieties, dwarf, medium and large. Conifers are also ideal for centrepieces in pots and containers.
