KILLARNEY PULLS OUT ALL THE STOPS FOR THE BEST ST. PATRICK'S DAY FESTIVAL EVER

illarney did what it does best last weekend when the organisers of the St. Patrick's Day festival left no stone unturned to ensure that there was something for everyone at this year's event.

Thousands of people packed Killarney for the St Patrick's Festival which attracted one of the biggest crowds the town has seen for the annual celebration.

The streets were near capacity for a number of hours before the parade got underway at 2.00pm and vehicles arriving via all approach roads in the afternoon could advance no further as it was a full house.

Festival fans stood 10-deep on many streets to catch a glimpse of the action in what was one of the most colourful and fun parades the town has experienced. There were in excess of 60 participating groups with marching bands, spectacular floats, excited children flying their club colours, novelty acts and many versions of St Patrick himself – from the very little to the extra-large – hitting the town.

Pride of place in the parade went to Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Maura Healy-Rae, aboard a 1930 Rolls Royce and she was closely followed, in a sleek BMW 320 convertible, by the three grand marshals, Kerry captain Gavin White, ladies' GAA legend Louise Ní Mhuircheartaigh and Ireland Paralympics star Jordan Lee.

Dancing troupes, gymnasts, Little Blue Heroes, visiting friends from overseas, Disney characters, drama schools, international dancers and cheerleaders all got to showcase their well-rehearsed routines in front of the grandstand on Main Street and some of the floats were so spectacular that gasps of admiration were audible as they approached.

One of the funnier moments of the day was when a determined lady in a headscarf, curlers and a housecoat – who was part of the Killarney Valley Vintage and Classic Club – demanded that RTÉ's Paschal Sheehy step down from the grandstand at which stage she dropped to one knee and proposed to the station's dapper southern editor.

She went home disappointed, however, as Paschal decided, after careful deliberation, that one wife was enough for him.

St Patrick's Festival Chairman, Jason Clifford, described the turnout for all the weekend activities as "sensational" and he said there was a massive crowd in town on St Patrick's Day from well before midday.

"Transforming the Beech Road car park into the festival zone for the weekend was a wonderful decision as it allowed us to put on so much more entertainment and activities," he said.

The town's first ever AbleFest was a high quality event on Sunday as it proved an ideal day of entertainment for those with diverse needs to enjoy a fabulous afternoon with Jake Carter the headline act for a rousing open air concert.

AbleFest attendees enjoyed drumming workshops, arts and crafts, an open air disco, an animal roadshow, face-painting karaoke, yoga, face painting and so much more.



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
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KERRY ART NOW!

ST PATRICK'S DAY PARADE -

Signalling changes in our town

The parade is a testament to Killarney. I rarely miss it and look forward to it each year. My perch this year was at pedestrian crossing the Plaza Hotel where I got a bird's eye view of every performance just at the start - before the acts were too exhausted.

The Ukrainian ballroom dancers were a lovely addition this year and one of several performances which brought the parade to life.

To realise how it has improved, most of us need only look back and recall when it was mostly advertising floats drawn by tractors.

There were marked changes this year. There are fewer traditional dancing schools there were lots of stage and cheer and gymnastic schools now.

Marching schools are mainly national schools. In my day the Vocational School float was our pride and joy and we worked on it with woodwork and the metalwork teachers and the school principal.

It would be nice to see secondary schools enter a float in the parade again.

The vintage cars were great but I miss the horses. The Killarney jarveys should again have a role ferrying guests to the stand.

The national park might also get together and come up with a display.

It was left to the Killarney Regatta Committee to remind us we are a town, not just with a national park, but surrounded by water. The regatta tradition here is the oldest in the world - older than many English regattas and it is worth celebrating. Well done to Muckross man Pat Cronin and the late Billy Kenny too and others for keeping the regatta going all those years.

THE MANGERTON LUNULA there may be a glimmer, if we are clever enough

Kerry County Museum recently hosted the Irish Museums Association annual conference at Siamsa Tíre.

I managed to get to one of the lectures - that on repatriation and how museums in colonial countries might be made to hand back objects. Some of the African Benin bronzes have been handed over by France, for instance. The campaign to get the Parthenon marbles returned to Greece is ongoing.

Martin Bradley, barrister, outlined how the



British Museum Act of 1963 - where the Parthenon Marbles ripped from the Acropolis in Athens are just inside the front door - is known as "the fig leaf Act".

Presumably this is because it hides the real motive by the Brits which is to hang onto all they have "acquired" from the world.

Under that Act, "objects vested in the Trustees as part of the collections of this and other museums shall not be disposed of by them," is what it lays down.

Handy. The best way around getting anything back like the 3,000 year ol d gold Mangerton Lunula therefore is to seek it on permanent loan, Bradley told me after the lecture.

"A long term loan is a way out of this," he said. The Annals of Innisfallen are held in the Bodleian Library in Oxford which is not covered by the Act. They are not the easiest to deal with - I have knocked on their door a few times. The Brits use the Strongbow argument - another figleaf. This is from the 12th century, no less, to say we invited them to rule us. So anything that was ours is theirs.

The best way of all is to form a lobby group, Martin Bradley suggested and keep highlighting the need to "lend back" the objects taken from us, he suggests.

The Lunula was found in a bog in Mangerton in 1848 and sold to an army captain to a collector at the Gunpowder Mills in Cork. It is one of the most prized objects in the British Museum.

The most interesting parts of the Annals were composed on Inisfallen. We should have those too - or the very least we should have a costly facsimile.

IT'S ALL ABOUT TRUMP THESE DAYS.

You can hardly turn on the news anywhere in the world and Trump dominates. He is truly "flooding the zone" as he puts it. The Washington Post has a morning bulletin now of what Trump is up to each day.

You can't get away from him. I crossed the Shannon to Kilimer last week and found Trump's West Clare Golf course was headline stuff.

People had vandalised the golf course for Gaza. As if there isn't enough destruction in the world.

The Doonbeg hotel and holiday homes are awesome and the golf course is kept with huge care and pride by local people so it was such a shame to see the carry on by a bunch of loo-las blinded with rage.

The buildings seem part of the dune landscape. And there is a real welcome on the mat.

Along the seafront the erosion is obvious - maybe Trump does need the wall - around Doonbeg that is.

Lunch was also reasonable - but then "you are from Killarney", someone in my company reminded me. Ouch!

What was not reasonable were the MAGA caps - Euro 45 in the hotel shop. Put a tariff on that cap and it will be close to 80 euro.

Trump's tarriff war is an echo of our own during the 1930s. Our economic war also began for political reasons - as an election promise by Fianna Fail to farmers about paying land annuities. Ireland put tariffs on imports of British manufactured goods and raw materials; the Brits responded. 90 per cent of our trade was with Britain. With no market, the Irish calves died on ditches. Emigration soared; unemployment climbed to an all-

time high. Even the cult of DeValera at the time could not disguise it. It was a disaster economically. Someone should tell the US President, the cult of Trump will not disguise the disaster for America either.

Waiting for the ferry we got talking to a mother and her daughter from Atlanta, Georgia. They didn't think Dublin was really Irish, but Killarney they just loved. They had some interesting observations: our food is "too American".

Every president gets Coca Cola delivered - not just Trump.

Also they could not get over the number of Audi cars we drive. "What's with the Audis here?" the daughter asked. I wondered afterwards were they special envoys trying to encourage us to buy more Chryslers? But they turned right for the Cliffs of Moher. And they were renting a small Toyota. Hardly patriotic!

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INTERNATIONAL WOMAN'S DAY MARKED AT KILLARNEY ROTARY CLUB

illarney Rotary Club gathered to mark International Women's Day 2025. The members invited some family and friends to join them on this occasion in the newly refurbished Garden Room Restaurant at the Great Southern Killarney.

The Rotary Club is very international with members representing Ireland, the United Kingdom, Germany, South Africa, Uzbekistan & Canada with more nationalities coming on board soon.

The local club was founded in 1983 but Rotary did not always have female members as it was only in 1989 that the Council on Legislation voted to admit women into Rotary clubs worldwide. By the following year, in June 1990, there were 20,000 women signed up as Rotarians. It was 2001 when Killarney Rotary Club first admitted female members as Rotarians. The Club hasn't looked back since.

The current President, Ciara Irwin Foley was the first and was the only female member for quite a while. She served as a Club President for her first term in 2007-2008, secretary of the Club for a few years and is now serving as President for 2024-2025. There are nine female members in the club and these women are all very active participants in Rotary serving the communities, in increasing numbers and serving in leadership positions in Rotary. The whole club runs very successful events and all members work well together to ensure they run smoothly.

After lunch, President Ciara addressed those attending and thanked them for joining in to celebrate this years theme "For ALL Women and Girls: Rights, Equality and Empowerment. 

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

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
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New 10 Year License for Radio Kerry



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Brown tag conservation regulations in force ON ROUGHTY RIVER

nland Fisheries Ireland(IFI) has this week opened the second lottery draw for anglers wishing to catch and keep salmon from Kerry's Roughty River.

'Brown tag' regulations apply to the river catchment from March 15th until September 30th, 2025, when the salmon fishing season ends.

Anglers interested in entering a lottery draw for a brown tag on April 16th can apply at the IFI website between today, March 18th, and midnight on Sunday, April 13th, 2025.

A total of 74 brown tags are available in 2025. They will be distributed to anglers with a valid rod licence via four draws during the season.

The first draw for 2025 was held on February 26th, after which 19 brown tags were distributed.


Anglers may only receive one brown tag per season for use on the River Roughty catchment.

Those who receive the tags through the lottery system should place them on the fish – along with a blue tag – as proof it was lawfully caught and may be retained for private use.

Anglers not allocated a brown tag are only permitted to fish for salmon on the Roughty River on a catch-and-release basis, where the salmon is returned safely to the same waterbody.

Anglers must use catch-and-release methods only, involving single or double barbless hooks. Use of worms as bait is not permitted.



SOLAR PANEL INSTALLATION: SPA GO GREEN FOR ST PATRICK'S DAY.!

This week has seen Spa GAA swap their traditional blue and gold colours to go green, all for the sake of climate change and the environment. In partnership with REC Ireland Park Road Killarney, solar energy specialist, they have just installed a 28.5 kW Solar PV system at their club grounds in Tullig.

The system comprising 60 PV panels, mounted on the south facing roof of their multi- purpose sports hall and supported by 10 kW battery storage represents a state of the art installation. It comes on foot of the club being one of the first GAA club recipients of Kerry County Council's Climate Action Grant Scheme, launched in 2024.

development " as a hugely positive initiative in terms of reducing our on-site carbon footprint, promoting renewable energy and reducing our dependency on oil and gas."

In a further signal of Spa's commitment to the green agenda the club have recently been shortlisted as the only GAA club in Kerry under the Shared Island Sports Club Electrical Vehicle charging scheme where funding is provided to install a network of publicly accessible chargers for communities through local sports clubs. 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



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CAO March interim figures show a significant 8.5% increase in college applications

INTERIM

Interim figures from the CAO reveal that demand for 3rd level courses has considerably increased. The data covers the period up to 1st March 2025, the closing date for amending course choices. 83,424 applications were lodged with the CAO, up 6,525 (8.5%) on last year. 72,408 applied for Honours Bachelor Degrees (Level 8), an increase of 6,034 (9.1%). Applications for Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates (Levels7/6) have increased to 30,019 up 2,148 (7.7%). CAO has received 2,248 applications from Kerry, up by 2% on last year's figure of 2,196.

RUSH

A major factor in the rush to college is the positive impact of the Technological Universities in the CAO system. The cost of college and the lack of accommodation for students living away from home is problematic. CAO applicants can now study in a university near home at considerably less cost. The final number of CAO applications in 2025 will increase further by late application closing date of 1st May.

MATURE

Applications from mature students (23 yrs. plus) have increased for the second consecutive year. There were 7,047 mature applicants, up by 944 (15.5%) on last year's figure of 6,103, which may indicate a slowdown in employment for this age cohort!

DARE

12,056 CAO applicants have registered for the Disability Access Route to Education (DARE), up by 1,800 on last year's figure. DARE is a third level alternative admissions scheme for school leavers with an educational or medical disability.

HEAR

8,224 applied for the Higher Education Access Route (HEAR) route, a third level alternative admissions scheme for school leavers from socio-economically disadvantaged backgrounds who are resident in the Republic of Ireland. Despite the current pressure on household incomes, that figure is 53 less than last year.

CHANGE

The interim data will change slightly when late

applications are taken into account and when the Change of Mind facility closes on 1st July at 5pm. The majority of CAO applicants may use the Change of Mind facility from the 6th May to add, remove or re-order course choices, which will result in changes to the March figures.

COMPETITION

High demand courses will be competitive this year although the reduction of 2% in the post-marking adjustment will help to reduce points requirements. Upwardly adjusted grades have elevated CAO course requirements to unsustainable points levels, during the past five years, putting pressure on courses where competition is always very keen.

BROAD

Most of the broad disciplines have seen a surge in first preference applications in the Honours Bachelor Degrees (Level 8) list. Engineering (22%), Health (19%), Manufacturing (19%), Law (19%), and Maths/Stats (14%) have all seen a double-digit increase. Other broad disciples that have attracted more first preference applications include Social Sciences (9%), Education (7%), Business (6%) and Biological Sciences (6%). Broad disciplines which have experienced decline this year include Environmental Sciences (5%), Information & Communications Technology (5%) and General Arts (1%).

SPECIALIST

In the specialist groupings, Dentistry (41%), Physiotherapy (25%), Nursing (24%) and Veterinary Medicine (12%) have seen a surge in first preference applications in the Honours Bachelor Degrees (Level 8) list, no doubt due to the promise of extra places in 2025. Applications for Medicine and Pharmacy are up by 6% and 4%, respectively. The increase in first preference applications for Primary Education (9%) and Secondary Education (5%) is a very welcome development due to the severe shortage of teachers. Similar broad trends are evident across the applications for courses on the Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates (Level 7/6) courses.

TRENDS

The increase in CAO applications is substantial and is sending out a message. School leavers want to study at the highest level. CAO will continue to be the main focus for the vast

majority, who are keeping a very close eye on the jobs market and are aware that a good qualification is a passport to a successful career. As always, most applications have opted for the broad churches of general arts, business and health. With a reduction in post-marking adjustment this year, prospects for the 2025 Leaving Cert class look very promising. Except for a few very competitive quota-based courses, there will be a third level course on offer for the vast majority of CAO applicants. That's how it should be!

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

DIABETIC RETINOPATHY

Minister Foley said: "This visit has all been about promoting and nurturing the ties of friendship that exist between Ireland and Britain. We are living in a very unpredictable world and we need to hold on to everything that keeps us sure-footed. Friendship keeps us sure footed in a time of change."

Trade between Ireland and Britain is worth over €100 billion annually. The relationship between the two governments is being strengthened even further with the establishment of an annual Ireland-UK summit, the first of which took place recently in Liverpool.

Minister Foley spoke at the annual CHAMP St. Patrick's Day reception in Westminster. This is the annual gathering of the not-for-profit organization, named after one of Northern Ireland's favourite culinary dishes, which promotes peace and prosperity in Northern Ireland, and throughout Ireland and Britain.

She had a meeting with Secretary of State for Education, Bridget Phillipson, whose grandfather is from Galway.

"We discussed shared challenges in both of our countries including providing more early years and childcare places, reducing childcare costs for parents and many other issues," she said. Minister Foley visited to the London Irish



Centre in Camden to hear about their work with the Irish community. She met members of the London Irish community in the centre's popular café, as well as staff of the centre's Survivors Integrated Service, who support survivors of institutional abuse in Ireland that now reside in London. She was also briefed about their exciting plan to redevelop the London Irish Centre which is being supported by the Irish government.

Minister Foley visited the Irish Cultural Centre in Hammersmith, where she was shown an Irish bible dating from 1830, which was written completely "as Gaeilge."

She attended a reception to celebrate the life of renowned Irish novelist Edna O'Brien who passed away in London in July 2024. She met the Kerry Association in London and many other members of the Irish and British communities. This included SDLP leader Claire Hanna, Ulster Unionist Party MP Robin Swann, Labour Party MP Liam Conlon, Baroness Arlene Foster, broadcaster Ryan Tubridy and actor Jeremy Irons.



Minister Foley attended the St Patrick's Day ball in the Intercontinental Hotel, a key event for the London-Irish community.

Minister Foley concluded her visit by marching along the St. Patrick's Day Parade route in London and addressing the Irish Festival at Trafalgar Square, which featured family concerts and performances by youth groups, community choirs, dance troupes and more.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL NOTICES OF MOTION

At the recent Kerry County Council Meeting, : Cllr. John O'Donoghue raised the following

PARKING AT LOUGHGUITTANE

As was mooted some years previously, that we would write to Coillte, and now also perhaps the Minister with responsibility for Forestry to explore the possibility of acquiring a little ground for increased parking opposite Loughquittane NS.

I'll declare at the outset that this is the school where I work. We were very thankful for the arrival of a new classroom recently which is testament to the growing numbers in the area. However, one downside is that we have lost some playing area. We are hopeful that were we to acquire a little ground directly across from the school to facilitate staff parking as this would free up playing area within our boundary. As the Minister with responsibility for Forestry is now from Kerry, I feel now would be a good time to explore the option further.

CALL FOR WALL PLAQUE AT **KILLARNEY RAILWAY STATION**

In light of the fact that he is now an Academy Award winner, and that he now has very close ties to the County, that we as a Council would liaise with larnród Éireann/CIE to explore the option of erecting a wall plaque and information board at Killarney Train Station highlighting the fact that Cillian Murphy filmed the iconic train station scene from the movie 'The Wind That Shakes The Barley' at the station. The movie The Wind That Shakes The Barley, which was shot in 2006 and won the Palme D'Or, which deals with the War Of Independence, was shot in various locations around the South West of the country, mainly in Cork, but one of the most iconic scenes of the movie was shot at Killarney Train Station. Given that Cillian Murphy is widely recognised as a master of his craft, and

is now an Oscar and Golden Globe winner, I feel there may be an opportunity for us to highlight his involvement in the movie and the fact that Killarney was used as a location. I feel a plaque should be erected at the station detailing its historic links with the movie, as well as perhaps information boards on the train station waiting room. Cillian Murphy now has even stronger links to our county given his recent purchase of the cinema in Dingle, and maybe he could be invited to any unveiling.

ROAD SURFACES NEED MAINTENANCE

That the road surfaces at all roundabouts within the MD, but particularly at Lissivigeen would be examined and any required maintenance work be carried out.

I appreciate that road surfaces at roundabouts are probably tricky to maintain given their busy nature, but the road surface at many of these, but particularly at the Lissivigeen roundabout and also maybe at Cleeney roundabout, have now fallen into a state of disrepair and they need urgent, minor works done as quickly as possible.

SUMMER TRAFFIC

That the Council would detail any plans they have which will be in place by summer 2025 to help alleviate the terrible traffic congestion we have begun to experience all too regularly.

I don't need to elaborate on traffic congestion within the town, particularly during the tourist season, and it is now one of the major topics for locals within our MD. I appreciate that various replies will be given regarding various road projects such as the new N22 bypass etc, but the reality is that these are some years away yet and will do nothing for traffic congestion in 2025, and I probably not 2026 either. I appreciate that the solutions are not easy, and will require major thinking, but they are not impossible. I have previously raised on 2 separate occasions about the possibility of implementing a city bike scheme where people could park on the outskirts of the town, rent one of these bikes for a euro or two, and deposit it within the town or back at their starting point again. I know we cannot displace existing bicycle providers, but have any of them expressed an interest in implementing such a scheme? If not then we need to look at it ourselves. Also, any further update on park & ride facilities for the summer months.

CALL FOR PEDESTRIAN CROSSING IN WOODLAWN

To again request a pedestrian crossing at the entrance to Killarney Athletic FC on the Woodlawn/Ballycasheen road. If the reply is the same as it was previously, that there is not sufficient footfall, to ask the Council what level of footfall is required for a pedestrian crossing as the club currently has almost 800 playing members, the vast majority of whom are juvenile and must get dropped to the field in cars which seems contrary to current Active Travel aspirations.

I am delighted to see that Killarney Athletic soccer club are doing so well and with numbers booming at underage level, that does bring its own problems around accessibility. As the Woodlawn road is so busy, it is not currently safe for children to walk to the club. I have raised the issue previously of parents I know who live a couple of minutes walk from the club, but they cannot allow them their children to walk to the ground as the road is not safe to cross. I was told at the time that there was not the necessary footfall to require a pedestrian crossing, but I hope that my membership figures now render that argument obsolete. This is contrary to Active Travel aspirations and I feel that we as an LA should be doing all we can to facilitate children walking and cycling. The club is very willing to engage with and work with the Council on this matter and I hope that we will see progress before long.

FUNDING FOR STORM DAMAGED FARM: Shannon LNG permission is a victory BUILDINGS

The Minister for Agriculture, Food, Fisheries and the Marine has confirmed to Fianna Fáil TD, Michael Cahill that funding will be made available for farm buildings, damaged by storm Éowyn recently, through the Targeted Agriculture Modernisation Scheme.

"Minister Martin Heydon has informed me that funding is been made available under the TAMS scheme in respect of damage caused by storm Éowyn, said

"I wish to thank the Minister for introducing this scheme as I have been contacted by a number of farmers across the county who were hit hard as a result of damage caused during the storm. This new scheme will be a major help to all those affected by the storm" said the Kerry TD.

"The scheme will be open for a 3 week period from the 7th of March to the 28th of March" added Deputy Cahill.




Kelleher went on to say:

Killarney Swimming Club competed at the 3 Day Aspiring Champions Gala in UL over the long weekend.



KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.

This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.







KERRY RECORD A WIN OVER ALL IRELAND CHAMPIONS

NATIONAL LEAGUE

Kerry (2-0-21) Armagh (0-1-15)

I came out of Austin Stack Park with slightly conflicting feelings. One was ordinary - ye know me well enough. "Ah jaysus, I am absolutely freezing. The brass balls fell off the monkey long ago". Genuinely. Was it just me? I think polar bears would have been looking for hot water bottles if they were there. The second feeling was definitely relief. I had been nervous enough about this one - I still say that Kerry were not necessarily the best team overall in the games against Derry and Tyrone. Frankly, that Derry result was basically a late smash and grab - nothing wrong with that, but it isn't exactly a statement victory either, and the Tyrone game was more about individual brilliance than a convincing team display.

Was this a statement win on Kerry's part? Or was it a case of Armagh keeping a fair bit of gunpowder dry? Bear with me here, I think that both of these things can be true. Armagh definitely weren't throwing the handle with the hatchet here. Remember the sheer physical power they brought against us in last year's championship? But even so, this was a different Kerry to what I saw in previous games. We played very direct, very fast, heads up football. Lads looked like they knew where they were sending the ball before they even received it. It killed me to see Kerry players taking solos and looking around for options in games, especially around our half forward line. The old mantra from my own glory day as a U12 footballer (I never made a starting team on my best days) was that "kicked ball moves faster than any man". It doesn't trip off the tonque as easily as Dr. Eamonn's famous "fear fatal fouling" adage, but it remains just as true. Control the ball at speed and you will win. And that's exactly what Kerry did.

David Clifford had a goal effort within the opening seconds, well saved by Blaine Hughes. It was interesting in light of the rule changes that Armagh dropped attacking



goalkeeper Ethan Rafferty - personally I never liked the whole outfield goalkeeper idea, it felt like a way to circumvent the rules rather than shine within their confines. Overall, I wouldn't say that it helped Armagh's cause. In fairness, Armagh brought a huge support and they were genuinely lovely people (without giving too much oxygen to the eejits with flares, whom I genuinely hope will be introduced to gardaí at the next game they try that, a minority of Kerry supporters certainly did not do us, the team, or themselves proud). There was a bit of 'getting to know you' about some early player confrontations. I don't dress up this stuff but I wouldn't say that there was any nastiness or malice about it. Just a little bit of "Can these lads be bullied? Oh, not at all, fair enough". And despite reports I have seen since, it was players on both sides laying those markers down. The idea that Armagh tried to intimidate Kerry, or vice versa.....arrah, I'd be telling a few journalists that somemes the truth can make a grand story even without the embellishments.

David was clearly in a hungry mood and so were the players around him. Joe O'Connor drifted onto the wing and was a revelation. Plenty of us have lamented the lack of a replacement for Ink player Donnchadh Walsh - saying that Joe absolutely excelled at roving from the wing and snuffed out plenty of Armagh fires is an understatement. Dylan Geaney also played a slightly different role to his nominal corner forward role, kickpassing in from a hole created by Paudie Clifford driving relentlessly forward. I'm not sure Dylan would get the same amount of freedom in championship games later on, but he has proven that he has the vision and the skill to send the ball inside quickly. With three up, players like that could become invaluable. Seán O'Brien didn't cement a midfield berth but certainly put down a place mat. Diarmuid O'Connor is crucial for us, though; he clearly loves scraping the clouds and contested kickouts are meat and drink to him. Jason Foley was at his imperious best. Another player to impress me a bit more than I expected was Mike Breen – I've always known that he is big, strong, good pair of hands, well able to carry....but his offloads were superb. Again, I love the speed.

Three frees on the board for David. Paudie with a great point from play. Kerry were pressing Armagh's kick-out and it was working perfectly, especially with Kerry players kicking it forward to targeted players at every opportunity. It looks simple; any manager will tell you that kind of synchronicity is almost impossible.

Oisín O'Neill finally got Armagh on the board. Five points in eight minutes -this is good football. Mind you, four of them coming from Kerry was always going to put us in an appreciative mood.

Micheál Burns was absolutely thriving – he was also forcing Armagh's defence out of shape with his positioning, and he joined the Cliffords on the scoreboard.

Armagh were at sixes and sevens. Worse than the scoring was the fact that they simply couldn't get their hands on their own kickout. I think Hughes over-compensated under such pressure and a poor enough effort at a short kick-out was grabbed by David Clifford, who promptly teed up Dylan Geaney for a goal (good finish by Dylan, he had plenty left to do). 1-5 to 0-1. I had not expected this when I sat into the car earlier on! David — even in a great team display, guess who stood out? -split the posts and Seán O'Brien launched a beauty to add another — I liked the sense of confidence about that one.





Rory Grugan, arguably Armagh's best player, notched their second score and Conor Tubritt added another one. Kerry supporters near me weren't worried but in all honesty, I was remembering a twelve point lead against Dublin and how that one turned out. Yes, I suppose I am a glass half-empty kind of person when it comes to Kerry or club football. And younger readers needn't bother laughing at me for that. Gather round, children, I'll tell ye a story about a man named Seamus Darby......

There's been Cliffords among those minding me all my life and the two boys came to my rescue again. David pointed another free. Then came a really fantastic piece of team football by Kerry - you can't intercept that, not with the ball moving that fast - and Micheál Burns was dragged down in the square before he could pull the trigger. Up stepped Paudie to the penalty spot and kicked a real beauty low to the left corner - Hughes actually wasn't far away from it, that was a great penalty. Paudie got booked for over-exuberant celebrations....all I could think of was Kieran Donaghy in that famous 2006 match against Armagh and his reaction after hitting the net, "who's crying now, baby!" Rory Grugan scored his second point for Armagh but Paul Geaney replied to make it 2-9 to 0-4. Darragh McMullan did get in for a goal chance for Armagh, but Shane Ryan saved well. Would it have been a turning point? Probably not, but better off to give an outright refusal anyway. David Clifford picked off another Kerry point and Joe O'Connor, always in the thick of the action, added another. Jason Foley....I had to stop and take a second look, yep, it's Jason to tap over the Armagh crossbar...2-12 to 0-4.

Oisín O'Neill kicked a great two pointer free for Armagh. The one question I have about Kerry's displays throughout this league campaign is the last of two point scores. The Cliffords, Seán O'Shea, Tony Brosnan, Tom O'Sullivan, Brian Ó Beaglaíoch, Diarmuid O'Connor, Dylan Geaney (I've alway said that I prefer Paul inside as a front foot predator).... we should have plenty of kickers from distance. I might be adding two plus two and getting nineteen (that will not surprise any of my primary school teachers at all)

but I suspect that Jack O'Connor might be keeping a small bit of dry powder in reserve himself for the summer.

David Clifford closed out the first half scoring with another free to leave Kerry in front by 2-13 to 0-6. Two things on my mind at half-time. Number one, this game is done. Some football by Kerry. Make sure to close it out, but this isn't a wind-driven turnaround. Kerry are just playing all the football here and in a role reversal from last year's semi-final, it's Armagh who are running headlong into an immovable defence and getting turned over fast. And the second thing....lads, have I mentioned how freezing cold I am?

Dylan Geaney and David Clifford (f) quickly had Kerry off the mark in the second half. I'm guessing that Jack referenced that Dublin game in his half-time talk as well.....Rory Grugan replied with two frees, with David replying with one. Kerry were not bringing the same intensity now and, in fairness, Armagh's subs were beginning to have an impact. Kerry were definitely slowing down. That lightning intensity just wasn't there.... and that's just grand. I'm still conscious of that game against Dublin, tóg bog é anois, we don't want any frantic scramble over the finish line....

Andrew Murnin with a good point. Paudie Clifford with a fine reply, though, Kerry still leading comfortably by 2-17 to 0-9. Greg McCabe with a free and Rory Grugan on target. Stefan Campbell. Rory Grugan with a free. Oisín Conaty from play. Grugan again. I know it's still 2-17 to 0-15, but the team that were playing a little bit like a tortoise in the first half are still playing and picking off their points, while the team that looked like a hare out of the traps....really aren't.

Tony Brosnan gathers a quick ball, takes one look up, and lets fly....that's how you do it. Jarly Óg Burns replies but that was a statement point for Kerry and it's as if it shook them awake. David Clifford and Tony again split the posts. Stefan Campbell took one last score for Armagh but there wasn't even real defiance in it and Tony Brosnan closed out a Kerry win. That's three points in a short enough span for Tony – now, you can argue that Armagh defenders were tired by the time of his introduction, but those were good

scores. That's a hand up for a summer jersey. However, this silver lining of a game definitely came with a bit of a cloud. Two minutes before the final whistle, Diarmuid O'Connor came down heavily on his shoulder and it looked like a fairly bad injury. Diarmuid has been one of the best midfielders in the country so far this year. If he is out, I expect Joe O'Connor to be returning to midfield, whereas I loved him in the more auxiliary role, ostensibly on the wing but actually roaming. However, if Diarmuid was to pick up an injury. I'd as soon have it happen now and give him time to recover before the championship heats up. Same with Seán O'Shea, an enforced break for the last couple of games is no harm at all. I'll just say it, because I know that I'm not the only one thinking it. I'd be slightly more bothered by the chances of us going down than reaching a League Final, but neither lights any fire for me (yes, I'm still cold in my bones after Saturday). Would a league final be a big inspiration that would drive us on to greater heights? No, it just wouldn't. The year is already plenty long enough. Would relegation be a disaster? And yes, of course I know that every time Jack O'Connor has won a National League, he has won an All Ireland. But that doesn't necessarily link one statistic with another. There were less games with more recovery and preparation time back in those days - and I know we aren't going back decades. Both Armagh and Dublin have won All Irelands coming out of Division Two in recent years and the fact that there is less pressure - still plenty, in a county like Kerry, that's always going to be a given - means that you can give real playing minutes to aspiring players. Can you do that in Division One? I'm not convinced. Look at us, and all the talk about how it will go. I can tell you the All Ireland football winners for any year since they started, I'd be close enough in hurling but hazy about the early years of this century. The National League winners? I'd be with Errol Flynn on that one, "frankly, my dear, I do not give a damn".

GAA POLITICAL STANCE

Uactaráin Cumman Luthchleas Gaeil Jarlath Burns has called on GAA supporters to back protests to have the A5 motorway in Northern Ireland upgraded. It's an unquestionably laudable cause, and I fully agree with the protests - over 50 people have died on a very dangerous stretch of road. I would be absolutely fine with

him taking a personal stance on the matter. But in his capacity as President of the GAA? No, I'm not comfortable with that. It sets out a very bad precedent. The GAA has not, does not, and in my simple understanding of its ethos, will not take political stances outside of it's sporting and gaelic cultural remit. Back in the early days of the last century, there were clear and deliberate attempts to turn the GAA, already pronationalist in it's aspirations, into a pseudomilitary breeding ground. Look, it was a very tough time for everyone, nationalism and militarism were inextricably linked at the time, war - independence and civil - was fast approaching. But the GAA chose to remain a sporting and a cultural organisation. obviously with nationalist sympathies, but with no outright political stance. It was the wellspring of many a controversy, the Ban and the utterly foolish expulsion of President Douglas Hyde (a national embarrassment for the GAA)....hundreds of stories. But the GAA was adamantly and unapologetically not a political organisation. It's genuinely important. The GAA had at least one



protestant President (and Jack was one of the best of them). I don't just want children of different ethnic and religious backgrounds to feel comfortable playing gaelic games. I want unionists – decent people who simply have different political beliefs than most of us here – to feel comfortable and welcomed in GAA clubs. I really do. A few years ago, well-known referee David Gough, openly gay, wanted to wear rainbow laces inan All Ireland Final as an expression of support for LGBTQ rights. He was, reluctantly, refused, because the GAA does not take political stances. And I supported that decision.

But now the President of the GAA is calling for GAA people to support a political cause? Again, a very laudable one; I don't doubt that. But you can't pick and choose. Either this is a political organisation, and that means that you have imposed a moral obligation on yourself to speak for that diverse membership and take sides, or it isn't. As an individual, Jarlath Burns has every right to take a personal stance. But as GAA President? Not for me, no. Not in that capacity.

CORRIGAN PARK

Very quick and very simple. This isn't 'Newbridge or nowhere'. We aren't going to get into the complete hames of a shambles that is the shambles of an upgrade on Casement Park. Even Roger, a fantastic humanitarian and a great patriot but not exactly recognised as an intellectual giant, would be enormously embarrassed at how nonsensical that has become. But you are meeting the reigning All Ireland champions in the first round of the Ulster Championship, easily the most competitive provincial championship of them all, and your main ground is out of action through no fault of your own, so you want to insist on taking it to Corrigan Park?

I'm not disrespecting Corrigan Park. But it's like saying that the Fitzgerald Stadium is out of action, so Kerry will play Cork in JP O'Sullivan Park or Frank Sheehy Park instead. Great grounds run by very good clubs, but they aren't taking a game like that. Traffic and parking alone.....

No, it's even stronger than that. Look, Armagh supporters outnumbered Kerry in Austin Stack Park. And I am not joking when I say that Austin Stack Park is a lot bigger than Corrigan Park. It has an official seating capacity of 3700. Yes, I've heard the nonsense that it can hold 12,000. Rubbish. Maybe if you stack them on top of each other..... Are you kidding me?All Ireland champions in a championship game? It's not a moral decision. It's a practical one. Antrim insist that they will concede if they cant play that game in Corrigan Park? I know what I would be doing if I was the Ulster Council. I'd be calling it fast and cold and just tell them straight out that "fair enough, you have just conceded and we are awarding a walkover to Armagh".

LEITRIM CONCEDING TO SLIGO

Speaking of walkovers.....this is a tougher one. Leitrim manager Stephen Poacher announced during the week that they had to forfeit their National League game against Fermanagh because of an injury crisis and the fact that six of his pael would be playing U20 championship on Wednesday. Sympathy appears thin enough on the ground among my own acquaintances. The general consensus seems to be that you have 22 senior clubs, of course you could put out fifteen players if you wanted to.

I'm not convinced. I have argued for a long time that the fixtures schedule is too crowded. There isn't enough recovery time and burnout for elite players is a real thing and still not addressed properly. If Leitrim put out a token fifteen and got hammered, nobody would even blink. Giving a walkover...never ideal, far from it, but it might force some small bit of change. Leitrim, respectfully, doesn't have the depth of talent that the likes of Kerry do. I'm not saying that Leitrim are right in this. But I am certainly slow to pass judgement on this one.

HOGAN CUP

Tralee CBS created a small bit of history this year by fielding a Kerry schools team in the Harty Cup. They lost their opening game to Thurles CBS – a hammering on the scoreboard, given that scoring difference came into play, but Tralee actually played well in a general sense. Last week Thurles lifted the Croke Cup for just the second time in their history after a fantastic comeback against Pres. Athenry.

Absolutely nobody landed a real glove on Mercy Mounthawk in Munster this year. The Sem gave them a really good battle in the Corn uí Mhuirí Final, but Mounthawk had that bit more quality. They lost last year's Hogan Cup Final to an astounding Omagh CBS side (I think this year is a bit to soon, but the stream of talent coming through in Tyrone..... it might be a long way twixt slip and twist, to quote the medieval catchphrase, but that's a hell of a head start), but I didn't expect anyone to touch them this year.

Certainly not St. Pats Maghera, who had struggled to scrape through Ulster to win the McRory Cup. I had privately expected Mounthawk to have five points or more to spare in their semi-final. I think, unfortunately, that it shows the competitive difference between the McRory and Corn uí Mhuirí cups. Mounthawk were left chasing shadows in that semi-final; Maghera won fair and square. Last week they saw off St. Colmans of Mayo to win the Hogan Cup, the fifth time in six years for an Ulster side to do so. Maghera have now won six titles and lost another six finals.

DUNLOE CUP

At time of writing, I don't have time or venue, but the Dunloe (Kerry U17) Cup Final will be taking place next week and will feature the Sem against the Green. The Sem beat IS Killorglin in their semi-final last week, largely thanks to a stellar performance by goalkeeper James Murphy. Last Tuesday the Green overcame PS Inbhearr Scéine in a largely wind-influenced game in Lewis Rd. with Nick Lacey, Danny Kingdston, and Seán Hickey doing the bulk of the damage. The Sem versus the Green was the basic story of Kerry colleges football for the bulk of a century. The fact that both struggled to reach this year's final....it's not that either have regressed, far from, it's that other teams have stepped up to the plate, and frankly, it is great to see. Good football.

IRELAND STUMBLE OVER THE LINE AGAINST ITALY SIX NATIONS

Ireland 22 Italy 17

Arrah, let's not dress it up. There's been a bit of that this week with "Ireland won the triple crown but the grudging Irish supporters won't even celebrate it". Spare me, lads. We were eighty minutes away from a Grand Slam and then we were simply taken to school by a much superior French team. That's what happened. The triple crown? Hard currency in an amatuer era, and yes, I do remember 1982. But nowadays you would be as well off trying to buy a pint with a thrupenny bit as tell me that it was a good Six Nations for Ireland. We collapsed. That's the plain truth of it. And yes, I do think that James Lowe being a late withdrawal against France was a real disaster, he brings a width and expanse to our game that is otherwise lacking. More so that Gibson Park or Hansen, both of whom I respect hugely.

We genuinely could and quite possibly should, have lost to Italy. They got the best out of themselves, we most certainly didn't. Now, that's not the issue that it would once have been. I was among the many over the years who felt that Italy simply weren't five nations standard. Everybody was beating them. They weren't competitive games. And Italy kept plugging away, kept working hard and absolutely, over the last couple of years they have completely proven me wrong. Fair play.

But Ireland had the triple crown in the bag before that game against France. We weren't the overwhelming force of last year, and that furore over Sam versus Jack didn't help. Guess what? Neither of them is Johnny, no more than Johnny was that when he started. Did we cling on to Sexton a bit too long? Yes, of course. This is one of the best players in world rugby, at what point do you show him the door? But it's not fair to expect a ready made replacement to just step in and fill those shoes straightaway, life just doesn't work like that. Get over it.

But even so....France taking us apart, and especially the ease with which they did so (and no, it wasn't the 7-1 split – they lost Dupont, for Heaven's sake, and still swept past us at ease) is one thing. But Ireland, this Irish team, barely hanging on against Italy..... there was a mental malaise there.

That's not taking away from Italy. Menoncello was superb and he found Garbisi for a grubber kick that Monty Ioane reached first. Soft? Sloppy by Ireland? Fair's fair, that was well executed by Italy and the conversion puts them up 7-0. We haven't got going at all. It's messy. We are more or less saying that we are there for the taking. It's one of those games where every Irish player is trying a bit too hard and not really getting anything done. There is no feeling of control. Menoncello is the best player out there and always looks dangerous.

Ireland do power over for a try – and 'power' is the right word, no guile – but it's overruled. Maybe that will settle us.

Irish scrum. Crowley to Keenan and he is over. This one counts and the conversion brings us level. Alright, let's kick on from here. Enough of the huffing and puffing.

Nope. Still huffing and puffing. Tommaso kicks a brilliant penalty and Italy are back in front. Deservedly so.

Yellow card for Italy. Unlucky enough, to be fair. Ireland, quite rightly, aren't doling out any sympathy cards and drive forward. Lineout, maul, and Dan Sheehan...aren't, quite frankly, if I was an Italian defender, I'd be getting out of his way. They do try and stop him, but it's like trying to harness a hippo. Dan is over the line and, despite a poor effort at a conversion, Ireland are in front 12 to 10 at half-time. I really can't help thinking that only for that yellow card....but look, we have depth, and we have generally (France excepted) been better in the second half of games.

We don't start any better, though. We just don't look right. We are better than this, it has been proven often enough, but we just aren't producing it today. Sometimes games take on their own narrative. Mack Hansen does make a great break and Jmaes Lowe does score a disallowed try (play called back; I'm not actually sure why).

Irish try. Dan Sheehan again on the end of a driving maul that Italy can't match. No, it's not exactly subtle and it isn't pretty. But it's over the line and right now, that's what counts.

Not an easy conversion and the ball swings too far left. It has to be said that Crowley is not at his best here.

Ireland are looking better now, though. Tdhg Furlong comes on, so does Peter O'Mahony, to a standing ovation. A great servant to Irish rugby, nobody could begrudge. The Italian supporters don't either, fair play to them. Italy are back down to fourteen. They are going to have to talk among themselves about discipline when they review this.

Hansen with a great run. Crowley to Keenan and a try...no, ruled out for an earlier infringement. Still, Ireland are looking more confident and composed. Mind you, with a man advantage, they'd want to.

There we go. Great kick by Gibson Park, Hansen keeps it in play, and there's Dan Sheehan to tap down. 22-10, and I expect that we will pile on more now.

Shows what I know. Ange Capuozzo just drives at us, kicks it past seamlessly, and Stephen Varney finishes it off. Try for Italy, conversion, and back to a one score game.

We hold out. And I mean that literally. We hang on for a win and a bonus point but jaysus, that was very hard work. We made it much too hard. This Irish team won two Six Nations titles on the trot, a Grand Slam.....I honestly believe that if Italy had kept fifteen players on the field, they would have beaten us.

A month ago a lot of pundits had ten or eleven Irish players on the Lions. Now it could in theory be just two players looking for passports. That's an over-reaction in itself, there is less of a connection between drama and reality than people think. Andy Farrell will still be taking at least seven Irish players. But he'll be expecting, and demanding, better of them.

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

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
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"Is anyone thirsty – come and drink, even if you have no money! Come, take your choice of wine or milk – it's all free! Why spend your money on food that does not give you strength? Why pay for food that does you no good? Listen to me, and you will eat what is good, you will enjoy the finest food"

(Isaiah 55:1-2 NLT).

Welcome back dear student, I hope you enjoyed a fabulous St. Patrick's Day. It's common to see folks enjoying green ice cream or green beer to celebrate — the latter may cause some to be worse for wear. The Word of God has much to say about food and drink, yet some of it seems contradictory, so let's delve a bit deeper. "Wine produces mockers; alcohol leads to brawls. Those led astray by drink cannot be wise" (Proverbs 20:1). How interesting — another translation says ... 'wine IS a mocker and strong drink a brawler', meaning there is a spirit attached to alcohol. And that demon brings its attributes to the one dependent upon drink. It's not called the demon drink for nothing! This is not a word of condemnation friend, generally people binge drink for a reason. There's nothing wrong with a social drink, but it's so easy to fall into addiction, and foolish to ignore that much can lead to broken relationships and even abuse.

"It is not for kings, O Lemuel, to guzzle wine. Rulers should not crave alcohol. For if they drink, they may forget the law and not give justice to the oppressed. Alcohol is for the dying, and wine for those in bitter distress. Let them drink to forget their poverty and remember their troubles no more" (Proverbs 31:4-7). Here, the mother of King Lemuel was giving her son wisdom, so that he would lead with integrity and success. There is a culture amongst some that the more you can drink, the bigger the person you are. But God's Word is clear in this advice: craving alcohol is a trap that leads to problems.... 1) forgetting God's ways and entering into sin, allowing bondage take hold, causing that one to do things they would have never done had they not been drinking. 2) Alcohol can open the door to a spirit of death — not just physical sickness, but failure — immorality, broken relationships, lost dreams, and poverty.

The Word explains that people drink for a reason - to numb pain and torment from past trauma, or problems currently endured. These wounds aren't solved by drink: it just makes one forget - for a while. This is not how God planned for His people to live, as it brings curse, hopelessness, and isolation - the opposite of the Freedom and Life Jesus gives (Galatians 5:1). Often lovely people begin depending on drink to heal pain, but the cure ends up worse than the original problem and leads further into a dark world of homelessness, drugs, prostitution, loneliness, and brokenness. So why does God offer wine in the lead Scripture? There are two types of wine listed in the Word. The spirit the world offers may taste good and give temporary relief, but the wine the Holy Spirit gives brings JOY that lasts (Ephesians 5:18-19; Romans 14:17), Jesus said 'I Am the Vine you are the branches' (John 15:1-16). John saw a day of judgement and famine coming, with God protecting those part-taking of His oil and wine (Revelation 6:6; Malachi 3:18-4:2). In Scripture, Oil refers to the Holy Spirit — His Presence fuels God's fire upon us, radiating with the Power of His Love for His children (Psalm 34:5; Matthew 25:3). God's wine is an end product: the fruit of real relationship with the Lord Jesus, Who leads us by His Spirit into True Peace.
