CLASH OF 'BIG TWO' ON NEUTRAL TERRITORY

Sunday: **Dublin v Kerry, Semple Stadium**, 1.45;

There's no greater rivalry than Dublin v i to spare over Galway while Dublin beat Kerry, the two most successful counties in football history. Between them they have 101 All-Ireland and Allianz League titles and are the current holders of both crowns, Dublin clinching the All-Ireland six-in-a-row last December while Kerry won the Division 1 title two months earlier.

Next Sunday will stage the 83rd meeting between the counties (31 championship, 52 League) with results as follows: Kerry wins 40; Dublin wins 32; Draws 10. It's very close in the League: Kerry 23 Dublin 21, Draws 7 Their most recent meeting ended level (1-19 each in Croke Park), with David Clifford grabbing the equaliser deep in stoppage time last year.

Both Dublin and Kerry head for Round 2 full of confidence after big first round wins over Roscommon and Galway respectively last weekend. Kerry had a whopping 22 points Roscommon by nine points.

It leaves the Connacht pair under pressure as they prepare for their clash in Pearse Stadium on Sunday. The losers will be in relegation trouble heading for Round 3 where Galway will play Dublin while Roscommon face Kerry.

Galway v Roscommon has been a keenlyfought rivalry over the years too, including recent seasons when they met in Connacht finals in 2016-17-19. They drew in 2016, with Galway winning the replay while Roscommon won in 2017 and 2019. Their last League clash was in 2019 when Galway won by 1-17 to 1-10.



KILLARNEY UNITES ON "DAY OF ACTION"

Laid Adam Hafayed, Hicham Ghoumiri, Abderrhim Atba, Taher Anabtawi, Fatima Al Khateeb, Malgorzata Boruka, Mohammed Saleh, Miasar Saleh, Obada Saleh & Aya Saleh at the assembly for Palestine in Killarney, as part of an international 'Day of Action' to stand with to stand in solidarity with the people of Palestine against ethnic cleansing and settler colonialsm.

The community of Killarney assembled, socially distant on the lawn at Deenagh Lodge on Tuesday evening and held a minute's silence to stand in solidarity with the people of Palestine, on their international 'Day of Action'. The event was organised by Killarney Photographer Sally MacMonagle who has spent time in Gaza on a humanitarian mission.

"I was in Palestine in feb 2020- I helped open a gym called 'Aclaí Palestine' in the Lajee centre in the Aida refugee camp in Bethlehem", Sally told Killarney Outlook.

"Specifically my role was logistics to get the equipment from Germany into Palestine through Israel- which is very difficult as Israeli customs confiscate almost everything going into Palestine- they confiscate books, playgrounds, medical supplies aid etc. We could have brought the equipment in Israel and made it much easier on ourselves but as part of the Boycott of Divestments and Sanctions, we wanted to do everything in our power not to do so. I had to find a Palestinian with an Israeli permit to provide me with their



details so I could import the good under his name- not the easiest of tasks and many strings were pulled in the process. It was an incredible moment when we were finally able to unload all the equipment safe and sound into the gym", Sally added. Through various different avenues of fundraising we raised over €30,000 a concert held in Cork 'The Gym Jam' was our biggest fundraiser and had incredible support from local businesses here in Killarney. COVID has slowed the project down, but we hope to be able to return to Palestine in the Autumn to bring the project to the next stage and then the local coaches from the gym will then return to Ireland for 6 weeks to finish their training. Hopefully the gym will run independently, but with our support from then. The aim was to to help improve the overall standard of life in the camp, and go towards fighting the large incidence of diabetes, hypertension, and mental health issues that exist in the camp because of the cramped living conditions and Israeli occupation.

"I made incredible friends in Palestine and feel utterly helpless watching what they are going through at the moment", Sally added.

Everybody is feeling incredibly distressed seeing the footage from Palestine over the passed few days so when a socia media campagin from the Palestinian people, called upon the international community "A Day of Action", all I did was choose a time and a safe location due to COVID restrictions and the people of Killarney were all delighted to show up as a mark of respect, & for our local Palestinian population to know that that have our full support always.

Palestinians Mohammed Saleh, originally from Nablus in the West Bank in Palestine who now runs The VIP Turkish Barbers on Glebe Lane in Killarney was truly overwhelmed by the local support.

In recent days over 200 Palestinians have lost their lives including 61 children and 36 women due to the bombardment of Israeli air strikes in the Gaza Strip & West Bank.

Another rally for Palestine is scheduled for 1.30pm in Tralee on Saturday afternoon in the Square in Tralee and it is being organised by Kerry IPSC.

Cllr. Gleeson attends his final Council meeting

The May 2020 monthly meeting of Kerry County Council was the final meeting for Councillor Michael Gleeson who announced his retirement from public life earlier this month.

At the meeting Cllr. Gleeson raised the following motions:

"As at least some of the insulation material used in homes will disintegrate into tiny fragments

when a house is knocked or remodelled and will then inevitably become pollutants of water and aquatic and life in the rivers, lakes and oceans, that Kerry County Council calls on Government to pursue the provision of more appropriate material for the keeping warm of homes and other buildings and the preservation of our previous waterways."

Councillor Gleeson stated that universally there is ever growing concern for the long-term welfare of our streams, rivers, lakes and oceans and for the future wellbeing of the aquatic and marine life. One of the foremost threats to them are micro beads that enter the water courses and are often ingested by fish and other forms of marine life resulting in slow and painful death.

I have seen the degeneration of water courses and it is painful to watch and scientists regularly inform us of the terrible damage being done to life in the water.

It would be the ultimate irony if material being widely used to help prevent global warming was in the medium to long- term doing or going to do irreversible damage to precious creation at another level. Every home, every building will inevitably sooner or later be either knocked or re-imagined and in the process the material within walls in attics

and in chimneys will become redundant and some will inevitably go down gullies and into water courses as micro beads.

Anyone here who ever picks up roadside litter will tell you that insulation material when it disintegrates is a nuisance to collect and that much of it most certainly disappears from view and goes down the drain.

I ask that the nature of insulation would be reviewed and that material safer for the environment would be produced.

(2) "As standards and expectations in relation to air quality have greatly increased since the Air Pollution Act of 1987 was enacted, that any Application for Licencing under the Air Pollution Act would require the placing of a Public Notice of Application in a prominent location at the main entrances to the site / location in question. The publication of a Notice of Application in a

local newspaper is no longer adequate, fair or respectful for / to the immediate community".

Councillor Gleeson stated that in terms of present- day environmental standards and today's expectations, 1987 is light years in the past. This is true not just environmentally but also medically. Experts have a far greater understanding now of the potential dangers posed to human and animal health by emissions from a Bitumen Mixing Hopper that emits Sulphur Dioxide, oxides of nitrogen, Particulates and other unquantified products of combustion. For the Act to state that it is sufficient to insert a Notice into some local newspaper is to belittle the ambient population, some within 100 metres of the proposed plant.

To have such a plant within that same 100 metres of milking cattle shows scant respect for the well being of animal or human.

The very least that should be expected is that appropriate Signs would be erected as applies to all other forms of proposed planning.

A person of my immediate acquaintance who is a very well qualified Chemical Engineer and who does not live locally having read the documentation described the overall prevailing situation as primitive in the extreme -in the contexts both of informing the public and showing concern for persons long term well-

Students from the three secondary schools in Killarney planted eighty trees in Killarney this week in a new environmental initiative by Killarney Lions Club and Killarney's three second-level schools, supported by Kerry County Council and the Department of Rural and Community Development. The trees will be planted by Transition Year students from St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary School, Killarney Community College and St. Brendan's College on a site next to the Michael D. O'Shea roundabout just outside the town.

The project is aimed at raising awareness of the importance of biodiversity, and encouraging everyone to think about how they could contribute to Killarney's world-famous natural heritage. There were numerous other awards presented on the day including Leadership In Action Awards, Excellence In Music and Hidden Hero Awards.





GOOD EXAM TECHNIQUES WILL IMPROVE YOUR GRADES IN THE LEAVING CERT

With the Leaving Cert exams on the horizon, it's time to focus on your exam techniques. By planning your approach to answering the question papers you will perform better. Begin by highlighting your exam subjects on your personal copy of the exam timetable. That is an important exercise this year as you may not be taking the full compliment of subjects in the written exam. It's also possible that you may be undecided about sitting for all of the subjects for which you have registered. Make that decision as soon as possible and be clear about your subject timeline.

Write the required details on the answer booklet. Read the directions on the Answer Book. Number each question and sub-question clearly in the left-hand margin of each page. The right-hand margin is for the corrector's use only. Write your answers between the margins and work neatly down the page. Write clearly and legibly.

Don't split questions by answering a part on one page and the other part a few pages further on. If you can't completely answer a question leave a page blank to which you can subsequently return. Use diagrams, sketches and illustrations if they enhance your answer. Use decent size diagrams, as they are quicker to draw and allow more detail. The presentation of your answering won't merit extra marks but a well-presented script makes a favourable impression on the corrector.

The core of any exam is the quality of your answering. Keep the content of your answer relevant to the question asked. Read each question carefully before deciding which ones to answer. Tackle a good question first to settle you down. Before answering a question list the key points around which you will build your answer. Be concise, accurate and relevant. Don't be long-winded or wordy. Waffle and repetition will not impress the corrector.

Be familiar with the modified format of each paper well in advance of each exam session.

Know how the paper is presented. What topics are examined? How many questions must be answered? What styles of question can you expect on any exam paper? Familiarise yourself with the choice available on the paper. Are some questions compulsory or is there an open choice? Be careful with a paper, which is subdivided into subsections. Without prior knowledge of such a paper you could easily fail to address the relevant number of questions. Over the next few weeks, as you do past papers, and again at the exam, read the instructions carefully.

Doing well in any exam involves knowing the course material but also in presenting your answers within the time allowed. Attempt the required number of questions. If you don't attempt a question, you can't possibly earn any marks for it. Be familiar with the marking scheme for each paper and work out in advance the approximate time you can spend on each question. The time allocated to each question should be in direct proportion to the marks available for that question. The candidate who attempts the required number of questions is the one who has the best chance of maximising her/his grade in that subject.

When your exam paper is handed to you read the instructions. Then spend about five minutes reading the entire paper. This preliminary scrutiny of all the questions gives you the feel for the paper. It allows you to settle down and gather your thoughts. Stick to your own preprepared answering plan and once you have made your choice of questions, start with a question you can answer well. As you warm to your task, you will be pleasantly surprised at the font of information that comes to mind, as you need it. When you have finished answering each question, reread it to ensure you haven't omitted any part. Allow at least five minutes at the end of the exam to read back over your answers and to check your overall presentation.

- ✓ Number your questions clearly and write neatly and legibly
- ✓ Leave some blank space at the end of each question in case you wish to revisit it
- Read the entire paper before deciding which questions you will answer
- ✓ Keep your answers concise, accurate and relevant
- ✓ Familiarise yourself with the logistics of each exam paper
- ✓ Be careful with a paper which is subdivided into subsections
- ✓ The time spent on a question must be in proportion to the marks for the question
- ✓ Proper allocation of time will enable you to attempt the required number of questions
- ✓ Reread the question when you have answered it to ensure you haven't left out a part
- ✔ Remain in the exam centre until the end of each session
- ✓ Examination timetables are available on www. examinations.ie.



€689,930 allocated for upgrade works

on rural roads and laneways in Kerry-Griffin

€689,930 has been allocated for repairs and improvement works on non-public roads in rural communities in Kerry, as part of the Government's 'Our Rural Future' project, Deputy Government Chief Whip, Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin has welcomed the announcement from the Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, of a total allocation of €10.5 million for projects across the country. This represents a 5% increase compared to 2020, with every county receiving an increase.

Over €68 million has now been invested under the Local Improvement Scheme since it was reintroduced in 2017.

Deputy Griffin said: "This is great news for local communities in Kerry, as the funding announced under the Local Improvement Scheme will improve access to rural homes and farms, as well as outdoor amenities such as lakes, rivers, mountains and beaches.

"The focus of the scheme is to support the continued improvement of rural roads and laneways in Kerry that are not normally maintained by local authorities, but which represent a vital piece of infrastructure for rural residents. "Since the scheme was re-introduced in 2017, almost 2,400 roads have been funded



for repair works across the country. This has made a real difference to the lives of over 10,000 landowners and residents in rural Ireland," concluded Deputy Griffin.

Announcing the €10.5 million in funding, Minister Humphreys said: "As part of 'Our Rural Future', the Government has committed to increasing the level of investment in the repair of non-public roads through the Local Improvement Scheme.

"I know there is a significant demand for funding under the Local Improvement Scheme right across the country. That is why I am today announcing increased funding for every county under the scheme; however, I am acutely aware that more is needed. I am working to identify if additional funding can be provided for LIS in 2021 and I would therefore urge each Local Authority to utilise the funding announced today, and complete the repair works on the selected roads, as soon as possible," concluded Minister Humphreys.

killarney Community College was honoured at the Young Social Innovators of the Year Ireland Awards with the Social Media Award, for their project The Connected Four. The goal of the project is to raise awareness around the false perception of Autism, ADHA/ ADD, Dyslexia and Dyspraxia [DCD] through a printed and digital children's book as well as a series of YouTube videos dispelling myths around these neuro-diverse conditions.

They have also received a Highly Commended for the Digital Innovators Award supported by Virgin Media.

This was a separate category by Virgin Media to recognise young people's positive applicatin of digital technology for the purpose of social good and to promote digital wellbeing.

Huge congratulations to Luke O'Sullivan, Rachel Griffin, Amy O' Donoghue, Eva Lynch, Jack O'Connell, Lauren Fleming, Keelyn O' Leary, Lulu Healy and Ekaterina Gaeve.

Their aim is to raise awareness about the false perception of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)/Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD), Dyslexia and Dyspraxia also known as Development Coordination Disorder (DCD), how the four are connected, and the lack of education around these conditions due to a lack of accessible resources and supporting communities. The students have a very active Instagram and Facebook with details information on the four conditions. They have written a book aimed at Junior Infants to second class students to break down prejudice

about these conditions at a young age. The students, with the help of funds and mentoring from the YSI Den, are hoping to publish this book both physically and digitally in the next few weeks. The Connected Four hosted a nonuniform day for Autism Awareness month on 30th April and raised €480 for 'As I Am'.

Another Kerry School to excell at the awards by winning the overall national award, was the 24 strong Mercy Secondary School, Tralee team's Red Flags - 'Break the Silence' project won the Virgin Media Digital Innovators Award. Their health and wellbeing related project aims to help young people recognise the early signs of toxic relationships and to be aware of 'red flags' signalling coercive control type behaviours.

Working with Adapt Women's Refuge in Kerry as well as Women's Aid, the students launched their campaign aiming to 'break the silence' which saw them unveil an inspired relational mural for their school. The winning group also developed a specially curated SPHE lesson pack for schools, in addition to running a series of fundraisers for the associated local charities. Young Social Innovators CEO and Co-founder Rachael Collier commended all of the students who participated in this year's Annual Awards and congratulated the Kerry students saying: "This is a very special day for two schools in Kerry, Mercy Secondary and Killarney Community College. Both teams exemplify what teenagers can do when they are given the opportunity to innovate. They are bringing attention to important issues impacting young people around the use of digital technology while also using digital technology in creative and innovative ways to bring about positive change. I'd like to thank Virgin Media and their parent company Liberty Global, for their continued support and the involvement of their volunteers throughout Ireland, we are truly grateful."

KILCUMMIN SEWERAGE SCHEME RAISED IN DAIL EIREANN

Deputy Danny Healy raised the issue with the Kilcummin Sewerage Scheme in Dail Eireann this week.

During Leaders Questions the Kerry Ted raised the issue of the building of a sewerage scheme in Kilcummin, east Kerry, north of and bounding Killarney. "The people in Kilcummin have been trying to progress this scheme since 2000. Work was to begin around 2006 or 2007 but the contractor was found not to be able to deliver. Thus, Kerry County Council decided to tender it out again and a new form of tender was demanded by the Department. Kerry County Council was unsure, the contractors were unsure and, anyway, the Department of Finance stopped it and withdrew the scheme in 2008 because the country was gone bust, as



the Taoiseach knows well. Promises were being made continuously, year after year, to deliver this scheme.

In replying, Taoiseach Micheál Martin thanked

the Deputy for raising this important issue, particularly for the residents of the area and those who stand to benefit from the Kilcummin sewerage scheme. The sanctioning of the scheme is important.

Danny Healy Rae said that "The Government will have to fund Irish Water properly to develop these schemes because it is a case of live horse and you will get grass. It will not work. Leaving out the roads of Clashnagarrane, Knockataggle and Rahanane, which the village is actually built in, is absolutely ridiculous.

I am not being critical, but they are saying that funding is not a problem. If it is not a problem, they should make the funding available for this scheme and allow all the houses to be catered

- 5. Pour the bread mix into your loaf tin and Place in the oven for 45 minutes, after 45 minutes take the loaf out of the tin and place the loaf back into the oven for another 15 minutes to baked the crust all over.
- 6. When baked remove from the oven and leave to cool for around 30 minutes before cutting.

This week is World Glaucoma Week

WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?

Glaucoma is the name given to a group of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged. It is often linked with raised pressure within the eye, although the eye pressure can sometimes be normal. When the nerve is damaged, it can start to cause problems with the peripheral vision (side vision) and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage. With early treatment, further damage to vision can be prevented.

Glaucoma may not have symptoms and this is why it is very important to have regular sight tests.

RISK FACTORS

Age is the biggest risk factor for glaucoma. However, your risk also increases if you have family members with glaucoma

Symptoms

The danger with open-angle or chronic glaucoma (slow onset) is that, in the early stages, your eyesight may seem perfectly normal. There is no pain, but your peripheral vision (side vision) is being damaged. Eventually your central vision can be affected. This can be described as tunnel vision because it feels like looking down a long tube. It's important to have regular sight tests as open-angle glaucoma often does not have symptoms.

TREATMENT

Open-angle glaucoma is usually treated with eye drops which reduce the pressure in the eye. You will need to use these daily. Occasionally people with open-angle glaucoma need surgery to control the pressure.



COVID UPDATES Information for Clubs

Adult Return to Training and Games (26 Counties only):

A reminder that from this Monday, May 10th Outdoor training is permitted at adult level in pods of a maximum of 15 people (including coaches) in the 26 Counties. However, games are not allowed, and indoor facilities must remain closed (exception: Toilet facilities).

From June 7th, and subject to the Public Health situation at the time, Club games will be permitted at all levels but must be played "behind closed doors".

In the interim, we would remind all Clubs in the 26 Counties of the following:

- Until May 10th, only training for underage teams (non-contact and in pods of 15) is permitted. "Underage teams" means any registered team at U-18 level or below.
- All indoor facilities must remain closed (exception: toilet facilities).
- Fundraising events on GAA property are not currently permitted.
- Gym facilities must remain closed (exception: Senior Inter County players may use their relevant Club Gym for individual training as long as they are following the advice in the Inter County Return to Training and Play document) Construction work We have received a number of queries in relation to whether construction work at club and county grounds can recommence this has been permitted from May 4th last.

FUNDRAISING EVENTS

Outdoor fundraising events on GAA property are not currently permitted in either jurisdiction. This includes drive in events (such as Drive in Bingo or Drive in Movies). We await further clarification from governments and will provide a further update when available.

2020 INJURY FUND EXTENSION TO 31 MAY 2021

Given that no activity has been possible for January to March 2021 a further two-month extension of Injury Fund cover has been ratified by Coiste Bainistíochta. This will now take the 2020 cover term up until 31 May 2021.

This means that the GAA Injury Benefit Fund cover remains in place based on existing 2020 team registrations. Units do not need to register or pay for their 2021 teams until re-invited to do so. Details with regards to registering and payment for the 2021 GAA Injury Benefit Fund will issue once we have more clarity from Government as to what the coming months may look like. It is a condition of the extended 2020 Injury Fund cover to 31 May 2021 that in advance of any permitted return to train or play in either April or May, "All players will still be required to be individually registered for the 2021 season on the new "Foireann" membership system." 2020 player registrations will "NOT" carry over into 2021 and cover will be declined if a player is not fully registered for the 2021 season in advance of any return to train or play in 2021.

PAUSE ON "LOSS OF WAGES COVER" FROM 1 JANUARY 2021

Following discussion at a meeting of Central Council on Saturday 20th March last, it was agreed to review the following two options as alternatives to the current pause that has been applied to the loss of wages cover that forms part Marian O'of the wider Player Injury Benefit Fund.

- 1. Offer all our playing members who may feel that loss of wages cover is a prerequisite for participation in GAA activities for 2021 to individually subscribe to a stand-alone GAA endorsed personal injury cover plan for 2021.
- 2. Review the 2021 Injury fund premium payable by each of the 1,500 units and potentially increase this premium by 25% to partly cover €1.3m of the forecasted €3m fund deficit to May 2022 if loss of wages cover is to be reinstated during this term. The funds ongoing deficit is primarily due to the absence of gate receipts during this term which ordinarily subvents the shortfall in the fund annually. General

In a general context, while there are undoubtedly some challenges ahead for the Association, there is also plenty of hope that with the availability of vaccines and the roll out of the inoculation programmes North and South of the border, a summer filled with Gaelic Games activity lies ahead.

In the meantime, we await the upcoming government announcements and will continue to communicate regularly with all units. We also request that you keep yourself updated with all communications given the fluid situation that we now find ourselves operating in. Finally, we want to remind you all of the importance of personal responsibility for our actions in relation to Covid-19 as we work together to ensure the safety of everyone in our community.



AWESOME OPENER FOR KERRY

National League: Kerry 4-21 Galway 0-11

Let's do the caveats first. We're big on that in Kerry - always play it down. Don't show your hand, say nothing and say it often. Peter Keane was being a quintessential Kerryman when he said afterwards that "That result could have gone the other way just as handy" with a completely straight face. Charlie Haughey would have blushed, but Charlie was only an adopted Kerryman. I liked that Peter named the team and subs before the game, unlike last year. Not naming the subs, frankly, always reeked of fear to me. Naming the team properly is a statement of confidence - even if Kieran Fitzgibbon starting instead of the injured Shane Ryan was well flagged beforehand. Brendan Kealy's insertion as the sub keeper attracted some comment – I have no problem with it, I always felt that Kerry dispensed with his services too quickly in the first place.

In fairness, what does need to be stressed here is that Galway were woeful. I'm not trying to be mean here, I respect the Tribesmen as much as anyone and do know of our great history with them, but this was a pale shadow of their teams of yore. Galway always played stylish football – back when blanket defences were smothering football panache, they were often accused of naivity for it. But last Saturday Galway played negative keepball. It says something that their best player was probably goalkeeper Bernard Power. They weren't quite as fit as Kerry (Jason McGahan is an unsung hero here), or as fast as Kerry, or anywhere near as strong as Kerry. Most especially, they weren't as direct as Kerry. Give me an accurate kick-passer over a ball-carrier any day, and Kerry had a lot of them. It was the key difference.

It's the first game of the National League. I've always given a wry smile at the excitement that engenders among Kerry supporters; the winter hiatus traditionally means that Kerry supporters get over-excited and read too much into games that are usually about shaping for later on. But this year is different; the National League is less significant in that Kerry won't even play in the final if they qualify because of its proximity to the Clare game. But by that same token, this means that Kerry are much further along in terms of championship training. This is much closer to the championship team, in form as well as personnel, than usual. And I sincerely hope that this is our tactical approach as well – I firmly believe that we have the best forwards in the country (I include our metropolitan rivals) when we give them free rein. My old friend Patsy Cremin, President of Coiste na nÓg Chiarraí, has seen an awful lot of football and his mantra always was "attackers attack and defenders defend". To me in recent years - and it long pre-dates Peter's arrival, by the way, we have been picking forwards for their ability to defend and defenders who like to race up the field with the ball. Last year Cork watched Tom O'Sullivan and Gavin White run repeatedly into patient ambushes. Cork never got sucked forward into open space and it meant that Kerry were running into walls. Against Galway Kerry were kicking the ball quickly and accurately - the advantage is always with the forward when that happens. Kerry's full forward line scored 4-10 from play on Saturday, no defender scored. I like that. Simple, direct football. No question about man of the match, of course, with David Clifford scoring 3-6. In this kind of form, he is simply unstoppable. His older brother isn't going anywhere soon either; Paudie has surely cemented himself onto the starting team. Sean O'Shea didn't score from play, but he had a hand in almost everything; I thought he was outstanding. David's third goal, that neat dummy and pull back to slot home, will be a Goal of the Year contender, but his first one laid down a bigger marker for me. Both Killian and Sean could have gone for their own score, but took the passing option instead for David to rise high and fist home. Poor Liam Silke, who drew the shortest of possible straws to mark the Fossa maestro, never had a chance. Kerry were in the mood for hunting, and I like seeing Kerry hunting goals. It was 1-7 to 0-2 at the first water break and Galway would have gladly shaken hands and departed at that point.

It was a procession. Paudie started and finished the move for Kerry's second goal - again, the passing speed cut Galway's defence wide open. Galway had great individual battlers - credit to Shane Walsh for coming out hunting ball, but I thought Galway's most natural predator would have been better off lurking in danger territory. Damien Comer gave Tadhg Morley a tough test the Templenoe man graduated with honours, of

course. Another thing I liked was that Kerry kept the accelerator pressed down. Very few players are guaranteed starting berths, given the depth of the bench, and they played like they knew it. Paul O'Shea certainly wasn't out of place in the company. Adrian Spillane brought fresh energy, even if he could have been a little more clinical bearing down on goal. Graham O'Sullivan slotted seamlessly into defence. Fitzgibbon proved a more than adequate replacement for the injured Ryan - I was especially impressed with his kickouts, a key weapon in a modern armourv.

Look, we can't get carried away. Galway are missing several of their big guns this year. They started four of last year's U20 team - talk about a baptism of fire! - and Pádraic Joyce's managerial career is under pressure - I expect them in a relegation play-off. I won't be reading too much into the Dublin game, either. If we avoid injuries and give them a decent battle, I'll be quite happy. All of this is shaping. It's not shadow-boxing, the clock is ticking towards championship too fast for that, but there'll be no knockout blows landed for a while yet either. I won't be getting too excited this weekend against Dublin, I don't see Dessie Farrell or Peter Keane throwing the handle after the hatchet in this one. Nonetheless, there's a spring in Kerry's step, a palpable hunger, a lot of background work successfully completed and, most encouragingly to me, an open, confident style of play.

This one was billed from a long way out as a clash of titans, with the winners fancied to win it out and play in Division One next year. Looking at Westmeath's travails, I'm not so sure that's a prize - a long-standing problem in hurling is that there is a huge gap between the top tier and everybody else. A full strength Kerry, considering that we reached last year's McDonagh Cup Final, would have been fancied to beat the Christy Ring Cup side, but Kerry were nowhere near full strength. Padraig Boyle was back from injury, but talismanic scorer Shane Conway couldn't line out, one of ten missing players from last year's championship team. Brendan and Michael O'Leary, Michael Slattery, Bryan Murphy, Tomás O'Connor, Brandon Barrett, Cian Hussey.....facing Offaly in Tullamore without them was always asking a lot. Nonetheless Kerry will be disappointed here as the game was over as a contest from early on - the impressive Padraig Boyle aside, Kerry simply didn't have enough of a scoring threat, while former Kilkenny star Michael Fennelly has Offaly humming.

Colin Walsh actually put Kerry ahead – it would be the only time they would lead all game. It was fairly level pegging in the opening quarter, with Offaly leading by 0-6 to 0-5, but they switched into a higher gear in the second and just accelerated past Kerry. 

FA Cup Final: Leicester City 1 Chelsea 0

There's something likeable about Leicester. The Foxes aren't a glamour team, they don't have the history of a Man United, Liverpool, or indeed Chelsea. Their Premiership win in 2015 is arguably the most iconic sports moment so far of the century – I for one expected them to fade away late on in the season but they clung on for a deserved win. It wasn't one hit wonder, either, Leicester have quietly but convincingly joined the big guns.

Conversely, since the advent of Chelsea's millions and the 'Special One' with his antics, Chelsea are one of the teams I find it easy to dislike. That's not a particularly fair assessment on Tuchel or his players, but the FA Cup has always, ever since its glory days, been more about perception than reality. It was always England's showcase day, and the team that had never won it showed the possibility of romance in the cash-rich reality of elite soccer in the most expensive league in the world. What made it more of a fairytale is how thoroughly outplayed the underdogs were for the most part. Chelsea had 64% of possession and 13 shots on goal. Leicester had the grand total all game of one shot on target. But what a shot it was. Youri Tielemans unleashed an absolute thunderbolt coming up to the three quarter mark, arrowing venomously straight into the top corner. It was a goal that would grace any final. Tielemans and heroic goalkeeper Kasper Schmeichel were the heroes of the hour.

It was a nice one as well for the affable Brendan Rodgers, a manager I have always liked. Something of a Moses to Jorgen Klopp's Joshua at Liverpool - he led them a lot of the way to The Promised Land but not over the line. The Antrim native is an understated but highly efficient manager, and an FA Cup win and qualification for Europe (a more lucrative feat) are colossal achievements.

The drama late on was fantastic for any neutral, with Chelsea mounting enormous pressure but Leicester, especially Schmeichel. In the final minute of normal time, the ball pinballed off 37

year old Leicester captain Wes Morgan into his own net....by now, I was so wrapped in the drama that it broke my heart. Cue VAR, one of the stories of the season (overall, I think it's a good thing, even though the application has occasionally been awry and the waiting for a decision can be brutal) and an offside decision that turned out to be correct (I didn't think so initially; I'd be an awful referee).

No doubt some of you are asking what connection any of this has to Irish sport or Killarney. Aha! The old rule about six degrees of separation comes into play....to be fair, it wasn't me who remembered it, but Mr. Killarney Celtic himself, Nol Brosnan, who remembered 15 year old Belgian Youri Tielemans drilling home a penalty in Celtic Park in a U15 match between Ireland and Belgium - Belgium scored an equaliser in injury time to secure a 3-3 draw. Killorglin's Shane McLoughlin was the only Kerry player to feature that day – his contract with Wimbledon AFC just finished a week ago and the 24 year old is moving on to pastures new.





KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

TREATMENT BENEFIT SCHEME

Question: A work colleague told me that there is a payment to help with the cost of my hearing aids. How do I get this?

Answer: You can get help with the cost of your hearing aids under the Treatment Benefit Scheme run by the Department of Social Protection.

for one aid or €200 for a pair. The scheme also covers the full cost of repairs to aids, up to a maximum of €100.

The Treatment Benefit Scheme is available to workers (both employees and self-employed) and retired people who have enough social insurance (PRSI) contributions. The amount of PRSI contributions that you need depends on your age. You can find out more about the PRSI contributions you need on

If you do not have enough PRSI contributions of your own, you may be able to qualify using your spouse, civil partner a dependent if you are getting certain social welfare payments. You should check your eligibility for the Treatment Benefit Scheme before buying your hearing aids. Your audiologist or

hearing aid provider can do this for you. To find out if you qualify for the Scheme, your hearing aid treatment, you will need to sign a consent form agreeing to them having your information and giving it to the Department of Social Protection.

If you are claiming as a dependant on the PRSI record of your spouse, civil partner or cohabitant both you and your spouse or partner will need to sign the consent form.

There are also dental benefits and optical benefits available under the Treatment Benefit Scheme.

LAUGHTER MEDICINE

Are you feeling rundown and in need of a gentle boost? Then laughing may be just the medicine for you. The use of laughter as a form of therapy is increasing in popularity. A study at Loma Linda University indicates that laughter produces an abundance of gamma brain waves. Interestingly these gamma waves are also found in the brains of people who meditate often and have reached a state of contentment and happiness.

Researchers are still exploring the potential health benefits from laughter. Perhaps it's the physical act of laughing that contributes to this, or maybe it's having a good sense of humour and a positive attitude. But one for sure we know, that it certainly doesn't hurt to laugh.

Laughing can be compared to a 'gentle body workout' as many physiological changes are taking place when we laugh. The muscles on our face and body stretch, our blood pressure increases and we breathe faster sending more oxygen throughout our body. But not only does it boost our heart rate - one study showed that laughing for 10-15 minutes can burn up to 50 calories! Increased laughter can also help to boost our immune cells and increase the levels of disease-fighting antibodies in the body. Laughter can also help us to relax and sleep better.

When we laugh we release 'feel good' hormones and naturally occurring anti-depressant (e.g. serotonin). Laughter can also be a great way to deal with life's unexpected events and help get us through difficult times. Responding to the trials of life with some laughter, can help to protect our body mind and spirit and may be a bleak situation doesn't seem as insurmountable when we can find some humour,

Laughter can also help us to bond, connect and communicate with others. Humour helps lubricate the channels of communication and can make people feel more comfortable.

Think about what makes you laugh and be sure to do more of it. This may be watching your favourite comedy, sharing a good joke, going to a comedy club or watching a funny U tube clip. Why not try now - just turn the corners of your mouth up into a smile and give a little laugh out loud. It may feel a bit contrived, but notice how you feel. Whatever gets you chuckling be sure to factor in more laughter to your life on a daily basis and increase those happy gamma waves.

From now until late autumn there is a large range of flowering shrubs in all different sizes and from evergreen to deciduous for you to choose from. Some can have a short flowering time and others can flower right through the summer.

Remembering when choosing your flowering shrubs that you find out the flowering period as this can determine the position that you are going to plant your shrub.

A good example of a deciduous flowering shrub that will flower for a long period over the summer is a shrub called Potentilla. It comes in a good range of colours also, including white, yellow, orange and red. It is a medium to small sized shrub and if you have a small space, Potentilla Red Ace is quite a compact one and would be suitable.

As with most flowring shrubs, the flowers will go off as the season goes on so remember to dead-head every few weeks.


Welcome back dear reader, after Jesus was raised from the dead He ministered further to His disciples for over forty days culminating in His ascension. Read about it in the book of Acts which is an account of the acts of the apostle's and the first church. Before He ascended Jesus told the believers to wait together and pray until the power of the Holy Spirit came upon them. They waited and prayed in unity together for God's promise to come. And He did! And when the Holy Spirit was poured out on them, the disciples were transformed from tired and fearful followers of Jesus, into anointed demonstrators of God's power filled with boldness and courage. As they grew stronger from being baptised and filled with God's Spirit they spoke the truth about Jesus, and the truth about those who had crucified Him. This got them into all kinds of trouble with the religious leaders and the civil authorities, but God delivered them and they only grew stronger.

The true baptism of the Holy Spirit and His infilling dunamis power does the same thing to hungry believers in Jesus Christ today. The word 'Dunamis' means God's transformational power from which we get the word dynamite. This weekend sees the celebration of Pentecost when the Spirit of God was first poured out. But nowadays very little of God's power is being demonstrated. And we see the fruit of that in the so few lives that are transformed or healed. "When they had prayed the place where they were assembled together was shaken, and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and they spoke the Word of God with boldness" (Acts 4:31). The demonstration of the baptism of the Holy Spirit is evidenced in miracles, signs and wonders — lives transformed from darkness to light (Colossians 1:13), and it accompanies bold preaching of the Good News about Jesus Christ. Don't forget that God always confirms His Word with signs following the preaching of the true Word (Mark 16:14-20).


This is why we do not witness many miracles like the first church did — not because the Holy Spirit has gone away, but because He has been driven away! So many believers have never experienced the true Presence of Almighty God because their leaders and churches have grieved the Holy Spirit by their actions; by their doubt and unbelief, by their lack of knowledge of God's Word; by their strife and criticism of others, and by their refusal to fully preach the Bible from Genesis to Revelation.

The attribute that marked the first church was the very thing Jesus had prayed for — "that they may be one, as We are One" (John 17:22-26). The church in the book of Acts broke bread together, prayed and studied and shared the Word in one accord – which means one heart and one mind (Acts 2:42-47). Oh God, baptise us afresh with Your Holy Spirit, and fill us with Your Love, because that is where You have commanded the blessing (Psalm 133). In Your Son Jesus' name we pray, Amen.


