2020 sees the 124th year of Charlie Foley's in business on New Street surviving many a hard time. I was most impressed at how two well known local families in business, The Foleys & The Bowlers, had come together in helping each other out in harder times. After being seated at Foley's Bar, there are two options for dining. Foleys in-house pizza service (with many toppings to chose from) or alternatively, by using the unique barcode system at each table to scan in your Eddie Rockets order, owned & run by John & Niamh Bowler. How inventive! Colm claimed it was totally his idea but I'm not so sure about that.

"So what have you been up to Colm for the five months you've been closed"? I asked. "I've been golfing and when I couldn't golf I was gardening. Oh and I got engaged" Colm said. "It was the first August bank holiday weekend I was off for as long as I could remember so I decided to make it a memorable one and got engaged to Leanne Fleming who I have been going out with for two years now". I waited for more information, then asked Colm to elaborate but that was all I was getting. Eileen did let it slip that the proposal happened in Clare but not verified. "I suppose I've missed hanging out with my friends the most during lock down Marie, most especially Karl & Gearoid. I've missed the buzz & life of the bar too but I'm looking forward to the possibility of music in our new found bars again. Things like GAA games & Sports in general and the roars and cheers that go with it. It's part of who we are". 124 years in business is a long time I thought. passed down through the generations whilst retaining the name Foley as the proprietor throughout. In 1893 Charlie & Ellen Foley of Coolbane Killorglin returned from Liverpool and signed a lease for the bar with Lord Kenmare. The couple had five children, two of which were, Charlie Junior who took over the Bar and Sheila Foley who married Paddy O'Donoghue of O'Donoghue's Chemist Main Street and they opened a B&B together on the Muckross Road, now known as the Gleneagle Hotel. "I remember Auntie Sheila taking Max McCarthy's mother Peggy (Sporty) McCarthy, who had worked at Foley's for years, off out to the Gleneagle Hotel". Charlie Jnr had 4 children, one of which was an only son also named Charles who sadly drowned in South Africa so Foley's Bar fell in the hands of his eldest daughter Eileen Foley (pictured) who was at the time nursing in Cork with no intention of running a bar in Killarney. The name above the door never changed. Eileen Foley then married Colm Foley and they had 4 children Grace, Cormac, James & Colm. "I began running Charlie Foley's Bar when I was 17 years of age Marie. That's half of my life (you can do the maths). I had previously studied

Hospitality Management in Tralee so when I took over. I was lucky enough to attract a different crowd whilst maintaining our regular customers. My mother was great. She let me put my own stamp on but was quick to tell me if I did something wrong too. We have a great relationship and long may it last" Colm laughed. "I refurbished the bar five years ago and I've adapted the style of the bar to adhere to covid19 regulations as you can see" Colm pointed out. It was great to sit on a bar stool again at Foley's but there was a certain sense of calm. Most of the seats were full and there was a summer buzz for sure, not the same summer buzz as we knew it but great to see Charlie Foley's (in conjunction with Eddie Rockets) reopened for business.... County Colour Masks in high demand as KCRU rise to the call

ive years in operation, responding to over 800 calls to date, Killarney Cardiac Response Unit, like many other charities have been feeling the pinch in 2020 due to the Coronavirus but they haven't let the pandemic stop their efforts.

Eileen Brosnan (right) and Ann Carroll (centre) had a brainwave over the popular networking app, zoom, one evening in the early stages of Covid19. The girls put their thoughts into practice to create a production line with of a team of 12 responders working in stages in their own homes, with the foresight for the demand of fabric masks!

KCRU made & sold in excess of 500 masks gifting some of the local emergency services over the months of May & June 2020. "The production line began with cutting, pinning, ironing, elastics, sewing, quality control, filtering to size, re ironing, labelling and packing. It was a great effort by the entire team and we are delighted to have been able to maintain some funding which is vital to the running of our voluntary work at Killarney Cardiac Response Unit" Eileen told me. Anne continued "Eileen gave a demo in the beautiful sunshine, so it was possible for us all to sit outside the back garden of Crystal Springs and have a go at making the masks before moving the various production lines to our homes which worked out fantastically. The face masks were reusable, washable and we all felt as a unit that despite not actively responding to emergency calls during Covid19 that we had a role to play in assisting the local community fundraising for the Air Ambulance & KCRU. We were supplying a demand product and supporting life saving services. We are absolutely thrilled with the response, the

In the week he celebrates his 90th Birthday GAA commentary legend **Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh** speaks to **Barry Commane** ahead of Episode Four of AIB's The Toughest Summer, a documentary which tells the story of Summer 2020 which saw an unprecedented halt to Gaelic Games.

The series is made up of five webisodes as well as a full-length documentary to air on RTÉ One in late August. Mícheál is part of the fourth webisode that will be available on AIB's YouTube channel and is available at www. youtube.com/aib.

Q. Do you have a standout game or a couple of standout games for your career? The games you think of as your favourite, or one where the best story came from or your favourite commentary?

Micheál: There is a story attached to every game. The one I think of more often than others though would be the National League final of 1956. Tipperary were playing Wexford, who had won the All-Ireland the year before. People were saying "ah they didn't beat Tipperary, or they didn't beat Cork. They didn't meet them."

At half time in that game, Wexford were 14 or 15 points behind. I was watching that match under the Cusack Stand near Hill 16 and people were saying they had got an easy All-Ireland last year. The second half started - and when the game ended, they were ahead. 'Twas a game I'll never forget. They had proved they had won a real All-Ireland the year before.

They went on to have a wonderful final in the championship later that year, beating Cork. Christy Ring with his 8 All-Ireland medals. What will stay with anyone who saw it, was the wonderful thing the Wexford backs did that day. The final whistle blew and Mick O'Donnell and one of the Wexford players went straight towards Christy Ring. Nowadays players run to their colleagues, but they went towards Christy Ring and they lifted him on their shoulders. That was respect for a man that had won eight All Irelands. Wexford had two at the time. That was a great gesture of sportsmanship.

Q. We talk about you as a commentator but how much did you enjoy coaching? What kind of coach would you describe yourself as? A tough coach? Were you the guy to make them run laps? Were you the arm around the shoulder kind of coach? What kind of coach was Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh?

Micheál: It was Gerald McKenna who was chairman of the county board at the time and he asked Mick O'Dwyer would he be manager of the team, and he rang me to ask would I look after the guys in Dublin. We came together and looked at the season ahead and did the usual things. I always considered that people should be sound of limb and the only way of doing that is to do certain exercises that suit your knees, your ankles and hands. We did a little bit of that. We did a little bit of running.

What I concentrated more on was maybe people who were a little bit slower, to get them to be

able to break, like the horse or greyhound that comes out of the box. A run for a ball is not a long run. If you get 2 or 3 or 6 inches ahead of anyone it would take a while before they get onto you. We trained them to be ready, to be sharp, almost ready to break at the same moment that the referee is about to blow the whistle. We did a lot of that.

We concentrated on accuracy and being ready for the moment and above all, to be fresh on the day, feeling good. I remember a Dublin footballer, Cathal O'Leary. He was a wonderful footballer. He used to love playing at midfield against Mick O'Connell because they both went out with the object of winning that ball. They both enjoyed it. I met him one time after the All Ireland championships were over and he said: "I had no match for two weeks after the All-Ireland final but I never felt better going on the field two weeks later. I was fresh and sharper than I was earlier."

So, you learn little things like that you know to ease off, be ready, feel good, look forward and hope - and leave it to that.

Q. During lock down did you spend time reflecting on things like your favourite matches that you've been to? Did you reflect on your own career?

Mícheál: One way or another the occasion would come when your mind would go to something. I thought about the All Ireland final in 1910 that Kerry gualified for against Louth. Then suddenly Kerry said we're not playing; they wouldn't play in that final. Their grievance at the time was that great southern railway refused to put on a train that would bring the Kerry followers to Croke Park and there were very few cars in Kerry or any place in those days. So, they said they would not play. What could Louth do only stand idly by as they were presented with the title that year? They'd have much preferred it if they had won it on the field, but they won it that year. Louth were great footballers in certain years and that was one of them. The following year there was a train and maybe a second train if it was available. Things like that, you think about them and I often think of an occasion when a team won for the first time. Take Down for instance, they won the Ulster Championship for the first time ever in '59. Nobody in their wildest dreams would think that the following year they would win the National League and win the Ulster again and go on to beat Kerry in the All-Ireland final. A year earlier, they hadn't even an Ulster championship to their name. At the end of 1960 they had an All-Ireland senior medal, they had the National League medal they had the Ulster championship and so on. So, you think on moments like that and you could get them in any county.

'STORIES FROM THE WATERSIDE' Published for National Heritage week

Storytelling is alive and well in all parts of Ireland, as Sevident from number of entries to a national story writing competition called Stories from the Waterside, which ran in April and May during the COVID-19 lockdown.

It focused on collecting stories based on people's memories and reflections around their local river, lake, wetland or coastal area. Entries were received from across the Island of Ireland in both English and Irish, and there was also an Under 18 category.

When complete, people can walk or cycle to and from town and leave the car at home" stated Councillor Cahill.

Mr Cahill said "It is envisaged that a public display of the plans will take place in Autumn 2020 which is likely to be an online format due to Covid-19 considerations."

eet the fabulous Lisa Connolly. Unusually, not someone within our community this week, but a massive hero's welcome from Killarney, with many thanks to proprietor of Killaran House, Ciara Connolly for taking the initiative to find Lisa on Facebook after she had touched the nation on on RTE's documentary 'Inside Ireland's Covid Battle.

For anyone who hasn't seen it, you can find it on the RTE Player but have a box of Kleenex at hand. I will admit I hadn't seen it nor did I watch it before meeting Lisa. I would have been a blubbering mess!! I have since watched it. From whatever walk of life you come from, Lisa's gift to Patrick was the greatest act of humanity I have ever seen.

"It was my first visit to Kerry Marie. I received an overwhelming invitation from Ciara via Facebook 'you have touched the nation Lisa'. Well let me tell you Marie, it was me that was touched by Killarney and I believe all of this was sent to me with love from Patrick Commins". Inside Ireland's Covid Battled featured a fly on the wall look at life inside St James' Hospital during the COVID-19 health crisis. Patrick Commins (97), a resident at The Granby Centre, Dublin was diagnosed with Covid19 and had been in the ICU for eight days when RTE began filming. Lisa Connolly, Care Assistant, was aware that Patrick had no family in Ireland, just one sister in Canada. Lisa sat in the room with Patrick regularly, despite the risks to her own life. After Patrick passed, she stayed with him, holding his hand whilst singing The Irish Lullaby. She bought him a suit so as to retain his dignity. Before leaving him for the last time, she bent down and kissed him on the forehead through her mask. The world needs more people like Lisa. Humanity at it's finest. I was so delighted Ciara had taken the time to find Lisa so our community could extend kindness and gratitude to Lisa, her Mum & her sisters.

"When Ciara contacted me I couldn't believe it Marie. I had never been to Kerry not to mind Killarney before. I knew that there would be some complimentary treats in store for me and the girls and I thought to myself, how am I going accept things for free?? I am going to be so embarrassed. I wasn't Marie. The people of Killarney are so welcoming and I felt like I knew everyone all my life". I was excited to hear about Lisa's agenda compiled by Ciara for her stay in Killarney so we started on Friday and finished on Monday and here are the memories Killarney has made for Lisa and her family.

"We had our own private chauffeur through out our stay Marie, taxi driver Danny O'Sullivan (who we soon nicknamed 'The Silver Fox') was the first person we met at the train station. After checking in to Killaran House, Ciara greeted us with champagne on arrival and before we knew it Danny had returned to take us to town for pampering at Elegant Styles, Glebe Lane with Lorraine & Samona before heading on to Killeen House Hotel. There we were spoiled by Geraldine, Michelle & Ciaran. Unbelievable Marie. We had at least expected to pay for our drinks. Everything was on the house and Ciaran made our night by making 'The Ciaran Special' cocktail. They don't even do cocktails!". What an epic first day after four hours of playing cards on the train for the girls on tour.

A few hours sleep and the ladies were out with The Silver Fox again after the full Irish at Killaran House. First stop - What Women Want for a facial with Rachel. "I had never had a

proper facial before Marie. It was fabulous. I was floating afterwards.... all the way across the road to Who's4Shoes who treated me to a gorgeous pair of stylish trainers. Thank you girls!! All four of us were excited for the next stop 'The Escape Rooms'. Philip & Norrita were waiting to blindfold and hand cuff us. We did very well for ourselves through all the laughing, just two clues short of getting out. Serious team work needed for this and I would definitely do it again. So much fun". The girls left The Escape Rooms and made their way to the Eviston House Hotel where they were greeted by Linda, Patrick & Kris. "Marie they couldn't have been more welcoming to us and the food was delicious. We were so tired so we headed back to Killaran House for forty winks before heading back into town that evening to Reidy's which was really lovely too. The staff at Killaran House couldn't have done enough for us. After a beautiful lunch at the Killarnev Court Hotel (Thanks Eamon) on Sunday, The Silver Fox collected us and we dropped my two sisters to the train station and after that Mam & I took a jaunting cart ride with John Kearney. A most informative man. The National Park is amazing. I had never met Kerry Cows before. John & I had great chats about Croke Park as I had worked there catering for a while. Off the menu, the Kerry folk would always ask for a Curry Chips with Cheese. I had never heard

"I was Patricks Key Worker at The Granby Centre for two and a half years Marie. He had been living there for 25 years in total. He was one of nine of my clients" Lisa told me. So when you and I were at home washing our hands and keeping our families safe, Lisa was putting herself on the line to be with a man who had no one. "I am fairly easy going Marie. Once I can put food on the table and pay my bills I am a happy Lisa. I love my work and if I didn't like what I was doing I wouldn't do it. I went back to college at the age of 33 to complete Level 5 & 6 as Health Care Worker all the while working in the community as a home help. In 2017 I got a full time position at the Granby Centre and I was thrilled" Lisa told me. "And how did you feel watching the documentary afterwards Lisa?" I asked. "I was very emotional watching it back Marie. I didn't realise there would be so much of me & Patrick. I think when you're living in a situation, your adrenalin kicks in and you live in that moment and that's what kept me going for Patrick".

Before I left Killaran House Lisa wanted to thank everyone mentioned above for a fantastic stay in the Kingdom - Peter O'Toole for the beautiful image of Killarney, and The Killarney Framer who framed it, secret envelopes from Deirdre



& Lisa Quinn, a Penney's voucher from Pauline O'Connor Cill Ide to name but a few. "I am forever grateful to Ciara for this amazing stay in Killarney and everything she has organised for me Marie" Lisa told me.

"And before you go I might need your help Marie" Lisa told me. "I had a visitor. All I know is his name is James". I was intrigued. Continue Lisa. "James arrived at Killaran House and handed me a card and just like that he was gone. I opened the generous card and the message inside really moved me. I do know he cycles a bike Marie and wears a cap. I would really love to find out who he is so I can write to him" Lisa explained. Killarney, Let's find James for Lisa! Lisa touched the hearts of the nation recently well done to Ciara at Killaran House Killarney for organising the trip for Lisa and to everyone who did what they can to help Lisa and her family have a well deserved break. We were delighted to contribute in the small way we did.

ILCU survey shows *marked increase in average debt of parents* coping with Back to School costs

Over a quarter (27%) of Irish parents find themselves in debt in order to cover the costs of back to school for their children, with 8% having debts of over \in 500.

The average debt parents find themselves in to cover the costs of back to school is €397, an increase of €40 from last year. Parents now spending €1,467 per secondary school child – up €68 on last year. At primary school level, spending has increased by €174 and now stands at €1,123 per child. 69% of parents believe schools don't do enough to keep costs down Covid-19 related concerns.

42% of parents are worried that their children will fall behind in class as a result of home schooling over the past few months.

Over half (59%) of parents believe there will be a mix of home schooling and classroom for the new term. 49% will carefully consider the measures put in place in schools before deciding whether to send their children back to school. Over a third of parents said they are not equipped with sufficient resources if full or parttime home-schooling becomes the norm with 29% citing poor broadband as a major concern. Media release 12th August 2020: Over a guarter (27%) of Irish parents are getting into debt to cover the costs of back to school. While this figure is down from 36% in 2019, the average debt parents find themselves in has increased by €40 from €357 to €397. Of this 27% in debt, over four fifths (81%) have debts of over €200 with over a guarter of these having debts of over €500. This is not surprising as back to school costs continue to rise for parents, with the overall spend on school items for primary school students at €1,123, up €174 from last year. In secondary schools' parents average spend is €1,467, up €68 on last year.

The top expense this year for parents of primary school children is after school care at an average of €200 up from €117 in 2019. For second level parents the biggest expense is books at €196 down from €220 last year. Voluntary contributions for primary schools have increased by 25% to an average of €110 per child from €88 in 2019, with secondary school contributions remaining at an average of €140. Over two thirds (69%) of Irish parents pay for their children's back to school supplies from their general monthly income with 20% using their credit card, up from 13% in 2019. The use of savings has grown from 27% to 34%, 6% take a credit union loan, down from 9%, with those turning to moneylenders remaining at 3%.

66% of parents say that covering the cost of back to school is a financial burden, although encouragingly this is down from 78% last year. Almost 4 in 10 (37%) consider the costs associated with back to school as their main



concern in the lead up to getting their children ready to return to school, down from 50% in 2019. Interestingly, there has been an increase in parents being concerned amount managing their schedule at 33% up from 20% last year.

The findings were revealed in the annual Republic of Ireland school-costs survey commissioned by the Irish League of Credit Unions (ILCU) and carried out by i-Reach Insights in June 2020 when 948 parents of school going children were surveyed.

The results of the survey also revealed that 66% of parents shop online for school supplies, a rise of 15% from 2019, with respondents citing convenience (59%), saving money (59%) and the availability of better deals (56%) as the main reasons for doing so. Cutting back on family holidays is still one of the biggest sacrifices that families make to cover back to school costs at 34%, with a quarter cutting back on summer camps. 64% have had to deny their children extracurricular activities with 38% cancelling school trips to help fund back to schools costs. 44% of parents say they feel pressured into buying branded clothing, footwear and other

buying branded clothing, footwear and other items for their children as opposed to generic or own brand goods, while more than 2 in 3 (69%) believe that schools don't do enough to help parents keep the costs of going back to school down, an increase of 5% from 2019.

COVID-19 findings

The ILCU survey also highlighted concerns of parents brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic. Over a fifth (22%) of Irish parents reported that there has been a reduction in their household income as a result of Covid-19. A similar number (21%) are finding the extra cost of feeding their children when home-schooling to have had the biggest effect on household finances. When it comes to children going back to school, 59% of parents believe there will be a mix of home schooling and classroom for the new term while nearly half (49%) said that they would carefully consider the measures put in place in schools before deciding whether to send their children back to school.

42% of parents are worried about their child's mental health for the upcoming term if children will not be returning to school in a full-time classroom setting with a further 41% concerned about their children catching up on missed teaching. 42% of parents are already concerned that their children have fallen behind in class as a result of home-schooling during the lockdown, while 23% said they would struggle with returning to work if schools don't reopen fully. Since the beginning of the COVID-19 lockdown, 36% of parents feel their children are spending too much time watching TV or on mobile devices (32%) as a result of being home-schooled. A third of parents (33%) also believe their children are missing their friends from school and may be lonely as a result.

If schools do not reopen or only partially reopen, 38% of parents stated that they are lacking resources for proper home schooling. These include educational resources and materials (38%) and printing (35%). Nearly a third of respondents cited poor broadband coverage as a major concern in delivering effective home schooling. Commenting on this year's findings, Paul Bailey, ILCU Head of Communications said; "Of concern from the survey results is the amount of debt that parents are getting into to cover back to school costs with an average debt increase of €40 compared to last year. While the majority of parents fund back to school purchases from their general household income, the use of credit cards has increased from last year. I would encourage these parents to explore cheaper forms of finance such as a credit union loan.

The overall spend is up again this year for both primary and secondary school and it is clear that parents continually have to make sacrifices to cover costs. We have seen a staggering 71% increase, from \in 117 to \in 200, in the cost of after school care for primary school children while so called 'voluntary' contributions have increased by 25% to an average of \in 120 per child.

It remains to be seen if schools will reopen fully in September and this brings a number of challenges for parents in trying to manage home schooling and to balance work and child care commitments. Our survey shows a substantial number of parents are concerned that they don't have the necessary resources for home schooling, including adequate broadband, in the event of schools remaining fully or partially closed. I would encourage any parent concerned about the costs of home schooling or back to school costs to contact their local credit union to see how they can help."

SOLE TRADERS IN KERRY URGED TO APPLY FOR ENTERPRISE SUPPORT GRANT - Griffin

Self-employed people in Kerry should apply for the newly-revamped Enterprise Support Grant to help them get back on their feet after Covid-19, Deputy Government Chief Whip, Brendan Griffin TD has said.

The grant, worth up to €1,000 per person, is aimed at sole traders such as plumbers, electricians, carpenters, taxi drivers etc, who do not pay commercial rates and therefore do not qualify for the Government's Restart Grant Plus Scheme. Deputy Griffin said, "My colleague, Social Protection Minister, Heather Humphreys, has today opened applications to people who need assistance in getting back on their feet and their businesses back up and running.

"The Enterprise Support Grant previously supported entrepreneurs who were setting up new enterprises. But it has now been revamped to specifically provide once-off supports for self-employed people who have been severely impacted and have had to cease operations as a result of the pandemic.

"I would strongly encourage self-employed people in Kerry to apply for this grant, whether it's to assist with operating costs or salaries for their staff, so that they continue to provide the crucial services that our communities in Kerry depend upon. "Anyone wishing to apply for the grant can download the application form on

www.welfare.ie and, when completed should be sent to their local Intreo Centre.

"Many sole traders and small business owners in Kerry have in recent months been in receipt of the Covid-19 Pandemic Unemployment Payment (PUP).

"The PUP has been a crucial support for people who, through no fault of their own, found themselves out of work and that is why Minister Humphreys decided to extend the payment

until April next year," Deputy Griffin concluded. The Department of Social Protection has stated that this Grant will assist those people who transitioned from the Covid-19 Pandemic Unemployment Payment into self-employment since May 18th, which marked Phase One of the Roadmap for Reopening Society and Business. Once-off funding of up to a maximum €1,000 will be available to assist them with re-opening their business.

The support is available to small business owners who employ fewer than 10 people, are not liable for commercial rates and have an annual turnover of less than €1 million - providing kick-start funding to those enterprises that do not have an entitlement to other business re-start grants.

Announcing details of the grant, Minister Humphreys said, "Whether it's paying wages, fuel costs, purchasing PPE or signage – this is an important grant to assist the self-employed to reopen their business and get back doing what they do best: Providing crucial and essential services in their communities.

"So if you're a plumber, carpenter, beautician, gardener or electrician who is transitioning back to work, or the taxi driver getting your car back on the road – this grant may be of interest to you."

Kelleher calls on Irish Govt to secure additionalEU support to police Irish fishing waters

Ireland South MEP, Billy Kelleher has called on the Irish Government to reach out to other EU member states with a view to securing support in policing Irish fishing waters.

The Renew Europe MEP was responding to concerns from the Irish South and West Fish Producers Organisation.

"Quite rightly, Irish fisheries organisations have called into question the potential of the Naval Service to adequately patrol Irish waters once Brexit comes into play.

"Irish waters are a rich spawning ground for

many species of fish. They must be rigorously protected if we are to secure future stocks and future employment for Irish fishermen. "Until the Naval Service is strengthened, we must look for support from our EU colleagues," said the Fianna Fáil MEP.

"Longer term, Minister Coveney and the Government in general, must commit to restoring the Naval Service, and indeed the wider Defence Forces, to their full operational capacity. As an island nation, our Naval Service is incredibly important and it must be given the resources needed to protect our waters.

"However, we face an immediate threat if Britain restricts access to their waters in the event of a no-deal Brexit. We will see an influx of other European fishing vessels into Irish waters. "We must have the policing capacity to ensure that quota rules are adhered to, that illegal fishing does not take place and that the potential income of Irish fishermen is not drastically reduced.

"I am appealing to the Irish Government to prepare for this possibility and ensure that if it happens, Irish fishermen will have their rights protected in their own waters," concluded Kelleher.

After the embarrassing British U-turn on grades, the Leaving Cert results need to be published as soon as possible



hat a fine mess they've made of it! It would be laughable if it hadn't such serious consequences for emotionally drained candidates. Despite assurances that standardisation, moderation and algorithms would sort out the estimated exam results, the British Government is engaging in a damage limitation exercise days after attempting to defend the indefensible.

Scottish exam results were published on 4th August. About 25% of grades submitted by Scottish teachers were decreased. A Level grades were issued to candidates in England, Wales and Northern Ireland on 13th August. About 37.5% were downgraded.

Candidates from schools in the most deprived areas suffered grade reductions far in excess of candidates from upper income families. This led to allegations that the school not the candidate was assessed and that teachers' professional judgment was treated with contempt.

After a bitter backlash, the Scottish Government quickly scrapped the moderated grades and accepted the grades submitted by teachers. As a result of a nation-wide protest by angry students, education authorities in England, Wales and Northern Ireland backed down on Monday and in an embarrassing U-turn they replaced the moderated grades with the estimated grades submitted by teachers. Candidates are angry, confused and bamboozled by the flip flopping in Great Britain, which may have cost many of them places at University.

Irish Leaving Cert results won't be available until the 7th September, - five weeks later than the Scottish results and four weeks later than British A Level results - which is far too late for candidates, many of whom have serious decisions to make. If the Irish results are 'standardised' like the British ones, there'll be all hell to pay.

The State Examinations Commission (SEC), the second level exams authority, washed its hands of the calculated grades process from the very start on legal grounds, so the question needs to be asked and answered, 'who is overseeing the Irish Leaving Cert calculated grades process?'

What the Irish Department of Education and Skills is playing-down and what candidates may not be aware of is that there is no facility this year to appeal the calculated grade awarded, only the paper trail leading to the grade awarded. This is a fundamental denial of a candidate's civil right to due process and a major departure from long established practice in the state exams.

Any attempt by the Department of Education and Skills to reduce the mark so that it complies with the 'normal curve' in abnormal times should take into consideration that the candidate is not an element of raw manipulative data but a young person with feelings, emotions, anxieties and dreams.

A very simple example helps to make my point. A H4 Grade, 60% but less than 70%, in Higher Level Irish is a minimum entry requirement for Primary Teaching. The school submits a mark of 61%, which fulfils the entry requirement. If, after a process of statistical standardisation based on previous years' results, the mark is reduced by the Department of Education and Skills to 59%, a H5 Grade, the candidate's ambition to become a Primary Teacher is cruelly dashed with no right to appeal the grade.

Ireland must learn from the British mistakes. Forget about pulverising marks into conformity with the normal curve in an abnormal year. Have confidence in the teachers' calculations. Allow a grade appeal process and publish the Leaving Cert results ASAP, so that young people don't miss out on college places.

Covid-19 Support Fund for Golf Clubs

Over the past number of months Golf Ireland has been lobbying on behalf of golf clubs with governing bodies including The R&A, Sport Ireland and Sport Northern Ireland to examine what support packages can be put in place to assist clubs during this difficult time.

The R&A have committed to a ± 7 million funding package, which is aimed at national associations and other affiliated bodies in GB&I and details outlining how to apply have been circulated to all clubs.

With the global pandemic leading to widespread temporary course closures and drastic reductions in domestic and international travel, many golf clubs and facilities are facing serious financial difficulties. The fund is being provided to help The R&A's affiliated national associations to support those clubs and facilities, although some of the money may be used for other activities key to the future health of the sport.

Golf Ireland is responsible for administering a funding package of GBP £555,000 which aims to deliver immediate funding to golf clubs meeting specific criteria to a maximum grant of \in 10,000/£9,000.

One key condition of receiving the funding regards to the Women in Golf Charter. Funded clubs must become a Women in Golf Charter signatory within three months of receiving the funding and commit to achieving a number of Bronze, Silver and Gold commitments in the areas of visibility, governance, participation, culture and gender balance within a set timeframe.

Clubs must also demonstrate a clear financial need for the grant as a result of the pandemic and it is expected that the club Management Committee has already put in place all cost saving measures and reductions where possible to address the current crisis.

The financial support can be used in various ways, including to support clubs to become more sustainable, reduce costs and become more energy efficient.

SENIOR COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

In a normal year, we would be heading into the second phase of the Senior County Championship, but this is anything but a normal year. Instead we have straight knock-out from the word go, and I have to say that I love it. The presence of a back door in both the All Ireland and the County Championship (and especially the constraints on county players) are the biggest reason for the huge glut of fixtures that leave county players constantly unavailable to their clubs (completely devaluing the County League - would Templenoe or Na Gaeil have been relegated from Division One last year if their county players had been available?) and elite young players getting burnt out while ordinary club players remain inactive for long periods.

Straight knock-out? I love it. Interestingly, so does literally every manager that I spoke to (mind you, a loss this coming weekend might change some perspectives, I suppose!). It has a frisson and excitement that only gets badly diluted with a back door. In 1957 Waterford famously knocked out Kerry in the opening round of the Munster Championship. In 1960 they did it to Cork. In 1992 Clare beat Kerry in the Gaelic Grounds to win the Munster Final. They were the among the most surprising and justifiably famous underdog victories in gaelic football. But if there was a back door, how quickly would they have faded from memory? The big guns can come back - East Kerry lost to St. Brendans last year and Dr. Crokes lost to Rahillys in the second round a year before that. The anomalous system was never more stark than the year before that, though. South Kerry lost to Rahillys in the opening round, only to go on to reach the County Final, beating Rahillys in the semi-final. Rahillys then had to go and wina relegation decider in order to keep their Senior Championship status!

Straight knock-out County Championship is far, far better, and I would love that format to be retained. As well as freeing up space for County Leagues and Club Championships (which are brutally squeezed before the All Ireland championship commences, meaning that county players can't train with their clubs and tend to miss a fair few games as well), it simply make for a far more exciting competition. But of course, it would practically halve the revenue, so I don't see it happening in 2021, to be honest. Let's just enjoy the 2020 Championship; it looks like being a good one.

PREVIEWS

Yes, it's time to tempt the dastardly fates again. Half the craic of games happens in the speculation and banter beforehand. I am something of an expert (in the banter; I'm a bit rubbish at predictions

Kilcummin v Mid Kerry, Saturday, 7.00pm, Fitzgerald Stadium

Kilcummin won their first round meting last year and have Kevin McCarthy firing on all cylinders. While they did end up in a relegation battle in the club championship, they most certainly showed that they will be a challenge for anyone. That said, Mid Kerry were missing Darran O'Sullivan and Peter Crowley last year, and with Laune Rangers, Beaufort, and Glenbeigh/Glencar all in the Intermediate quarter-finals, you'd have to give them the nod. Verdict: Mid Kerry

Feale Rangers v East Kerry, Saturday, 6.00pm, Frank Sheehy Park, Listowel

Feale Rangers bowed out in the preliminary round last year and have struggled for scores ever since Conor Cox started playing for Roscommon. No point in dressing it up; everyone knows the raging hot favourites here. Verdict: East Kerry

Kenmare Shamrocks v Shannon Rangers, Sunday, 2.00pm, Fr. Breen Park, Kenmare

Shannon Rangers have made great strides, and the emergence of the likes of Jack Kennelly has lifted some of the scoring burden off namesake Paul, but Kenmare are very much the form team and have homne advantage. Verdict: Kenmare Shamrocks

Killarney Legion v Kerins O'Rahillys, Sunday, 3.45pm, Fitzgerald Stadium

This is one of the toughest to call. Both sides have amazing potential and are capable of destroying any opposition, but neither seems able to unleash it often enough. Both sides acquitted themselves well during the Senior Club Championships, but didn't inflict enough damage on the scoreboard. Both sides have strong defences and very strong midfields (Padraig Lucey has been one of my players of the Championship and a duel with David Moran would be something to see). Legion seem to rely on James O'Donoghue and to a lesser extent Conor Keane for the bulk of their scores. Rahillys, with the likes of Tommy Walsh, Gavin O'Brien, and Barry John Walsh, seem to need Jack Savage to finish off most moves. With James O'Donoghue carrying an injury, I'm afraid Legion will be up against it. Verdict: Kerins O'Rahillys.

Dr. Crokes v Austin Stacks, Friday, 7.30pm, Austin Stack Park

Oh yes. The Black and Amber derby. Austin Stacks are slight favourites to retain the Club Championship crown, while Dr. Crokes were denied a final berth in the dying minutes against Kenmare, having already lost County and east Kerry Finals last year. Fallen giants? You must be codding me. Take another look at the form of the likes of Mikey Potts, David Shaw, Micheál Burns, Gavin White. Throwm in the experience of Mike Moloney, Fionn Fitzgerald, Brian Looney, Kieran O'Leary, and of course, Johhny Buckley. Yes, Daithi Casey and Jordan Kiely are massive aces out of the deck, and Stacks have great players themselves like Kieran Donaghy, Joe O'Connor, Barry and Ronan Shanahan, Darragh and Ferdia O'Brien, and young players like Sean Quilter and Michael Slattery (both are under-rated), I expect those writing off last year's finalists to get a convincing rejoinder. Verdict Dr. Crokes St. Brendans v West Kerry, Saturday,

3.00pm, Austin Stack Park

In the space of a few short years, St. Brendans

have reversed their fortunes. They were regulars

in the preliminiary knock-out round when the new format came in. Last year they beat the eventual champions once and gave them a fair rattle the second time out. I expect the Na Gaeil players to find All Ireland medals more bouyancy than burden. West Kerry bat above their weight and An Ghaeltacht are going very well, but I can only see one winner here. Verdict St. Brendans *Templenoe v Dingle, Saturday, 6.00pm, Dime on fit and the second*

Páirc an Áthasaigh, Dingle Templenoe gave the Senior Club Championship

a very real go. They have just about edged Na Gaeil in recent years in terms of bringing through younger players and using that as a senior springboard. Quite honestly, I remember Tadhg Morley as a young lad lining out to make the numbers in Division Five in the days when Templenoe had the superb sharpshooter Shane Cremin and basically a bunch of brave garsoons. They lost the vast majority of games but never gave a walkover – that doesn't sound like any great boast, but the roots and soul of Kerry football is in that. I like Templenoe, always have, and they have turned over giants in recent years (my own crowd several times). But back then, Dingle were regularly contesting Minor League Finals and backboning the PS Chorca Dhuibhne. the greatest school team ever. Dingle have the brighter crop of sharpshooters and it'll count. Verdict Dingle.

St. Kierans v South Kerry, Sunday, 6.00pm, Austin Stack park

This should be another classic encounter. This could well be the tie of the round. St. Kierans are a blend of districts – I actually think that there is potential for a replacement of St. Kierans with a County Championship team that would include the likes of Currow, Firies, Listry, Cordal, and Scartaglin (a strong East Kerry has already been bolstered with the addition of the Kenmare teams), while Brosna and Knocknagoshel could strengthen the struggling North Kerry teams. But there you go, I've probably stung a few sacred

cows with that one...

Just on this game, South Kerry are always a very dangerous County Championship team. Kierans are a huge obstacle – I rate Luka Brosnan, Sean O'Connell, the Horan twins, and Paul Walsh very highly, but I can see South Kerry just about edging this one and getting stronger from there. Verdict South Kerry.

The Pat Delaney Memorial Cup was one of those eagerly anticipated social occasions that fell by the covid wayside. Thankfully, St. Patrick's Hurling Club and Ross Golf Club have joined forces to ensure that it can go ahead on September 5th. Pat was a staunch supporter of his native Kilkenny always and brought that great grá for the camán with him when his worjk in finance brought him to Killarney. It didn't take long for his great friend Tom Holohan (whose grandsons are now young but promising dual players with Rathmore) and the great Pa Doyle to draw him into St. Patrick's Hurling Club. He was the Hurling Officer and Treasurer with the East Kerry Board for longer than I can remember, although his kindly influence and warm friendship extended far beyond those parameters. He was a county minor and senior selector. Four different Kerry managers were happy to keep his sage counsel on board. Kerry actually beat Clare in Pat's first game as a selector - he knocked great fun out of that with his good friend Tony Considine. Pat was on the County CCC. He was Chairman of South Kerry Hurling. He was also Chairman of the Credit Union - Pat's coat buttoned neatly over a number of roles, most especially family man and friend, and he excelled at all of them.

I'll freely admit that I was the rawest, most awkward hurler that you ever saw. Do any of ye remember tv presenter Anneka Rice descending on Killarney in 1988 by helicopter and having

a go at balancing a sliotar on a camán? Very good-looking, very charming. Not so great at the hurling. She was still way better than I was. But that never bothered Pat in the slightest, he always helped and encouraged me in every way he could.

If you can make it to the Ross Golf Club in teams of three on September 5th, I guarantee you a great time. It's not just about the golf (I'm worse at golf than hurling, if ye must know); it's about the people ye meet and the craic ye will have.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING QUARTER-FINAL

I was lucky enough to be able to attend the Intermediate Hurling Quarter-Final in Lewis Rd. on Monday evening and got to see a superb performance by Dr. Crokes. Pat Delaney would have loved the crispness and direct approach of the hurling in thisn one. Crotta O'Neills came up against a very sharp and hungry Dr. Crokes on theior own ground. Tom Doyle and Owen Hughes traded early scores with Sean Murnane (who along with Cormac Whyte really played his heart out for the visitors) before Michael Lenihan teed up Rob Ryan for a great goal. However, Crokes cut loose at that stage with points from Lenihan (2), a goal from his brother Jack, Tom Doyle (2), Aaron Murphy, Richie Farrissey, and Rory Waters before Cormac Whyte pulled one back. Crotta battled bravely to the finish and added further scores by Whyte and Sean Hartnett, but the Lenihan brothers and Richie Farrissey closed out a very convincing win for the Killarnev side.

SNOOKER

Ah, Ronnie O'Sullivan, you rapscallion. Last week I was writing off your chances in the World Snooker Championships because of your nonchalance. So naturally, you only went off and won the bloody thing. Thanks, Ronnie. I now feel a bit like that time Henry Morton Stanley set out for Africa and took a wrong turn. The occasion where he extended a handshake to a perplexed eskimo, saying "Dr. Livingstone, I presume?" seems to have since been excised from the history books.

Ronnie brought all his eccentric brilliance to the final. He shrugged off some criticism by semi-final opponent Mark Selby (quite rightly, that interview was far less petulant that was reported), criticised the opening of The Crucible to spectators (spot on, but hardly designed to get them on his side), watched re-runs of 'Only Fools and Horses' as preparation (in fairness, always to be recommended)....and proceeded to play some absolutely scintillating snooker. At 8-2, his lead over Kyren Wilson looked unassailable - only to falter near the finish line. Wilson was impressive all through. Snooker is the closest thing there is to physical chess, requiring extreme concentration amid enormous tension, and Wilson dealt brilliantly with that. O'Sullivan has that almost unique and enviable ability to ignore that tension and, once more casually shrugging off the growing weight on his shoulders, promptly closed out the contest with a 96 break. He made it look like fun.

Ronnie has now surpassed the machine-like

Stephen Hendry on the honours list (both have 6 World titles but Ronnie's 37 majors is one more than Stephen). The pair have the distinction of writing two very different autobiographies. Stephen Hendry's is literally the most boring sports book I have ever read. The most interesting bit is that he likes to cook chinese food (written as though that's some mad eccentricity).

Ronnie's? Ronnie could have dwelt on his fairly unique family circumstances. Instead the focuses on his own demons, his addictive personality, and how running, rather than snooker, helped him to deal with it ('Running' is the title of his autobiography) and at least make peace with those demons. Snooker is only a tiny part of the story of Ronnie O'Sullivan; this is a book about mental health and it impressed me beyond belief. I'll never know what to make of him, but I admire him hugely.

SIX KERRY CLUBS IN CORN UÍ MHUIRÍ

After much deliberation, the Munster PPS Committee have decided to run their competitions, albeit in a knock-out format, with the first round planned to commence on December 2nd.

Kerry colleges did superbly last year in football, with Tralee CBS gualifying to challenge for the Hogan Cup. With three of the Kerry U20 panel on board in Joe Lenihan, Seán Quilter, and Conor Hayes, plus a strong all-round team and panel depth, it isn't unfair to suggest that the Green looked well on course to win their first ever Hogan Cup. St. Brendasn, meanwhile, captured the Frewen U16.5 Cup in fine style and were hot favourites to win the All Ireland Paul McGirr Cup. Sadly (and I would strongly argue prematurely) for them and for the Ladies team of Colaiste na Sceilge (who were also in the All Ireland Final), cross-province games were curtailed. Hopefully the 2020 competitions will have happier endings, or at least conclude on the field of play.

Corn Uí Mhuirí Draw Mercy Mounthawk V St Francis College, Rochestown

Rochestown will definitely go in as favourites. They have a strong tradition (the 2015 side was probably the best ever team not to win the Corn Uí Mhuirí. This year's team have a very good underage record, including a Taft Cup. But Mounthawk were unlucky last year not to achieve more after playing well, and I really could see a surprise on the cards here.

PS Chorcha Dhuibhne v Hamilton HS Bandon

Corca Dhuibhne have unquestionably been the team of the decade. From 2012 to 2015 they were only the second Munster team to win four-in-arow (after Tralee CBS in the early '30s) and they added two Hogan Cups. But they had better walk into this one fore-armed. Welcome back dear reader it's time for you to move to a new level of faith! Sincere believers in Jesus often try to please God by doing good works, but when they face a crisis or a difficulty it causes them to question 'is God mad at me - did I do wrong?' The confusion and turmoil going on in the world stirs this fear further. This is a tactic of the devil who uses lies to discourage people and cause them to feel rejected. Romans tells us that to each of us has been given a measure of faith, and that faith comes from hearing the Word of God (Romans 12:3; Romans 10:17). So studying God's Word - actually looking it up for yourself, and speaking it aloud, strengthens your faith in the same way that exercise builds muscle. Jesus prayed for Peter's faith to be strengthened as He was about to go to the Cross. He prayed that his faith would not fail him. He knew that in the flesh Peter would fall down (like we all have), and only his faith would bring him out the other side into victory (Luke 22:31-34). The people who impressed Jesus the most were those who simply believed in Him. He marvelled at the faith of two Gentiles - the Roman officer whose favourite servant was very ill, and the woman whose daughter was possessed (Luke 7:1-10; Matthew 15:21-28). Both trusted that 'with God all things are possible', and their faith in Jesus brought the answer. Our faith is irresistible to Father God - He honours and rewards it (Psalm 91:15).
