# KILLARNEY'S GERARDINE NAGLE Appointed Director of Football at the FAI

I t was a proud day for Killarney and for Kerry football when Gerardine Nagle was appointed Director of Football at the Football Association of Ireland (FAI) at their recent 2025 AGM. The appointment marks a remarkable milestone in what has been a long, distinguished, and trailblazing career in Irish soccer.

Ger, from Killarney, began her involvement in the sport 25 years ago as a volunteer with Killarney Athletic. Her dedication and leadership quickly became evident, and she went on to become the first woman in the club's history to serve as Chairperson. During her three-year term, the club enjoyed significant growth and success, earning FAI Club Mark Entry and Club Mark Star Player Development Centre awards. She also championed the development of the girls' game, which has since become one of the club's strongest and fastest-growing divisions.

Her influence extended far beyond her home club. For the past 15 years, Ger has served as Vice Chairperson and Welfare Officer of the Kerry District League. Five years ago, she broke new ground again as the first Kerry woman appointed to the Munster Football Association (MFA) Council, where she now also serves on the Executive following last year's election

A respected voice in Irish football governance, she has represented the MFA as a delegate to the FAI General Assembly for the past four years. She also contributes at national level through her roles on both the National League Committee and the Underage Football Committee.

In addition to her administrative achievements, Gerardine is a founding member of Kerry FC and continues to play a key role as a board member and Matchday Operations Officer, further cementing her reputation as one of the county's most committed football figures.



This year, it was the turn of the Amateur and Youth Council to nominate a female candidate for the position of Football Director on the FAI Board. Gerardine was put forward by the Munster Football Association and subsequently ratified by the full chamber, an historic moment as she becomes the first person from Kerry ever elected to the FAI Board.

Her appointment is a testament to decades of service, leadership, and vision.

"It's fantastic recognition for all the hard work done in Kerry," Gerardine told Killarney Outlook. "To be the first Kerry person elected to the board is a great honour."

Her new role places her at the heart of football development in Ireland, an opportunity she has more than earned and one that reflects the deep respect she commands across the sport.

A proud achievement for Gerardine Nagle, a proud moment for Killarney, and a major step forward for representation and progress in Irish football.




## NEW DUCK DISCOVERED AT KILLARNEY NATIONAL PARK

A rare male Bufflehead was recorded on Lough Lein, Killarney National Park on Wednesday afternoon by Dr Tomas C. Kelly, right (Retired Lecturer University College Cork). The Bufflehead is an extremely rare vagrant to Western Europe. Padruig O'Sullivan, NPWS, Conservation Ranger added "Their breeding habitat is ponds and lakes in Canada and Alaska. They normally winter in North America. The perky large-headed duck, makes a habit of 'ducking and diving' under water continuously, leaving the bird observers wondering will it ever reemerge and where? They are similar to the Goldeneyes as they nest in cavities." The Bufflehead was first recorded in the Gearagh, Macroom, County Cork in 1988. The second recorded Bufflehead was in Lough Atedaun, County Clare in 2007. In an update on Biodiversity Ireland website the citation reads:

## THEIR FIRST FLIGHTS RECALLED

There was an air of celebration on Monday. The clouds parted and a rare clear sky marked an occasion celebrating Kerry Airport and its multimillion euro new arrivals and departures facilities.

The history of Kerry Airport is one of great - I always hesitate to use the word pride - quiet satisfaction for this county. Acting chair on the day of the entirely voluntary board, and a long term director, former hotelier Kathleen O'Regan-Sheppard welcomed the Taoiseach, and a host of politicians. She said they were "celebrating not just a building but a story of perseverance and partnership."

"Kerry Airport stands as living testament to what vision, community good leadership can achieve." Kathleen said.

Work on the two-phase project, costing €5 million, was completed on schedule in July 2025 within time and budget.

Kathleen recalled how in the early days, the private airport made its money from cutting hay and from sales in the airport bar.

From a fledgling in 1969, it is heading towards 430,000 passengers in 2025.

The support of key figures including the late Charlie Haughey, and Tanaiste Dick Spring had been crucial to success, along with Kerry Group's Denis Brosnan, Liam Chute and Denis Cregan, and Kerry County managers particularly the late Tom Collins, a civil engineer.

Tourism figures like Kathleen had contributed much too, it must be pointed out. Which goes to show, if more smart and lively presentable people in tourism enterprises were encouraged to put their shoulders to wheels, outside their own demanding industry, how much might be achieved in our county.

#### **MEALS ON WHEELS**

Meals on wheels is to be given a whole new interpretation in Killarney: From next week all Meals on Wheels for Killarney are to be cooked in Tralee and put into a van and driven around. I kid you not.

The HSE's dismantling of the local service ticks no boxes, carbon, local or indeed efficiency. Meals now will be delivered sometimes two days at a time, a concern to the Killarney organisation, a spokeswoman said.

There is a great deal of unnecessary hurt locally as the news to those who have put in decades of voluntary service came without even a proper thank you from the HSE - and was only confirmed publicly some days after queries from this journalist.

Basically Columbanus hospital will no longer continue to cook the core 20 meals delivered by the volunteers with the Killarney Community Service from November 28th, the HSE decided a few weeks ago.

So into "the gap" comes the Meals on Wheels Tralee, Tralee Community Development Project.

It has renamed itself Tralee and Killarney Meals and Wheels. Funded and encouraged by the HSE it came into Kilcummin and mainly outlying parts of Killarney around March of last year offering laundry and meals to the over 60s.

A launch took place on Monday - on social media. The group pic was in front of "God has No Country". No one from the existing, dedicated Killarney Meals on Wheels organisation was included.

Aside from what to many was the insensitivity of Monday's event, the crux for me is also that the new multi-million euro community nursing unit will no longer cook even some meals.

service ticks no boxes, carbon, local or indeed efficiency. Meals now will be delivered sometimes two days at a time, a concern to the Killarney organisation, a spokeswoman said. Paddy Kevane is the chair of Tralee Meals and Wheels. Paddy, who lectures in social care, at MTU, will be known as he last year ran for Sinn Fein in Tralee. He says he is willing to meet with and welcome the existing group. There is "a gap in the service" now, Paddy says. And there is room for more than one organisation, he says. Data Protection - GDPR - will not allow the HSE or even Killarney Community Services if they had a mind to to hand over a list of clients. It's "not a takeover" Paddy says and the launch was to advertise to ensure seamless service and no one is left without a meal in Killarney.

The battle is not over for facilities for a local based service. Cllr Marie Moloney sits on the board of the Torc Family Resource Centre. A past volunteer with Killarney Meals on Wheels, Marie says the real losers in all of this will be the 20 core clients. Personal contact has been built up over years. Torc Resource has the kitchen facilities and will make them available to the HSE.

As we go to press, the HSE has now thanked the volunteers who put in so much effort for so many years and wants to meet with them. It might all have been handled better methinks.

#### **GRIT: A BOOK FOR ALL SEASONS**

Launched at the Kerry Writers' Museum recently, the book Grit by Killarney man Aidan O'Leary ticks all the boxes - poetry, music and photography in celebration of the human spirit. It's a stunning effort.

It is "a fully realised multimedia publication" which means each copy of the beautifully produced book by Lunar Fern Publishing comes with a QR code linking readers to original soundscapes and visuals.

The book is a celebration of the human spirit, accompanied by music and some beautifully mastered photographs and drawings.

It reminded me of the Chinese and Japanese methods of combining poetry with painting.

Aidan is the son of former Killarney town clerk Michael,

and Audrey.

His interests span several creative areas.

"I have a strong interest in film, music and sound design, visual art, writing, photography, videography and documentary production. Audio documentaries are a field I am now branching into alongside my other work,"

Music is a major influence on everything he creates and he is also fascinated by the stories people carry within them and the way they open up once trust is established in a conversation.

He is continuing to write and has already taken steps towards a second book of poetry and prose while also working on several ideas for children's books.

Aidan has already picked up awards for his work and has completed work for the National Opera and other museums.

## Boost for Crohane, Dromkerry as supply upgrade now complete

## The Muckross Suite will boost local charity

The CD project was commissioned by the Trustees of Muckross House to mark the diamond anniversary of the opening of the landmark building to the people of Killarney and around the world in 1964.

The Muckross Suite was composed by JJ O'Shea with arrangements by Paul de Grae and Reidun Schlesinger.

Paul (piano and guitar) and Reidun (harp) are joined by musicians Barry Lynch (uilleann pipes and whistle) and Sean Abeyta (fiddle) and the five-track CD was recorded at Tony O'Flaherty's Sonas Studios in Killarney.

Muckross House archivist and librarian, Patricia O'Hare, said the inspiration for the musical project was inspired by Muckross House itself, its furnishings, its location and its history.

"It was a real labour of love for all involved and it is wonderful to be in a position to support such a wonderful charity," she said.

The five tracks on what is essentially a Muckross House Anthem are:

•Mary Herbert's Piano: A tranquil solo piece dedicated to the former Muckross House owner whose piano is still on show there.

•Kitty in the Kitchen: A jig that celebrates the life and times of the Muckross House staff who worked downstairs.

•View from the Library Window: A harp-based track featuring a spectacular view from Muckross House which inspired Mary Herbert who was an accomplished water colourist. Her art demonstrates her great love and affection for Killarney's landscape,



On the night, the club honoured four junior members of the club for their selection through national trials to join Irish rowing squads for international competition in 2025. The club made presentations to Cian Scannell and Ronan Fahy, who raced for Ireland at the Coupe de la Jeunesse Regatta in Linz, Austria in July. From Linz, Cian returned a bronze medal for Ireland with Lee Valley crewmate Colin Creedon. The third presentation was made to Cillian Leslie, for his successful participation with the Irish team at the recent Coupe de la Jeunesse Beach Sprint competition in Spain, with Cillian making the final 16 for Ireland in the Mens Single event. The final presentation on the night was made to Rachel Fuller, who was congratulated for her double gold medal win for Ireland at the Home International Regatta in London in July. There were also honourable mentions for three former junior members now racing with their university clubs, who also represented Ireland in 2025. 

## The remarkable story of a woman who followed her dreams

of encouragement Kay Randles gave everyone. She was right too because she saw her own dreams come true in 1965, when the Dromhall Hotel first opened its doors.

Embarking on her dream and her desire to work in and one day own a hotel. Kay left her home place in Kilworth, Co Cork and went to work in the Victoria Hotel in Cork City. She was the youngest of five children and came from a farming background but she always dreamed of having her own guesthouse.

During her time at the Victoria Hotel she worked her way up to the position of assistant manager. One wonders if, on later taking up a position at the Muckross Hotel, Killarney, Kay Randles could ever have imagined that, a few years later, she would be married, be a mother and have opened her own hotel?

While working at the Muckross Hotel she met Neil Randles, who was from Kenmare and who came to Killarney looking to start his own garage as his father and uncle had done before him in Kenmare.

It was not long before there were wedding bells though Kay still harboured the idea of having her own guesthouse. She spotted an old laundry shop – where Randles Garage and the Centra Shop is now situated on Muckross Road – was for sale and encouraged Neil to buy the site for the garage and their home.

Mrs O Connor, a neighbour next door, asked Kay to keep four guests one night as her guesthouse was full. Kay decided she would do so without telling Neil.

The next morning, the story goes, there was 10 shilling note on the table from the guests and Neil thought it was the handiest money ever made. The four people and the 10 shilling note set Kay's dream in motion.

ollow your dreams. These are three words : In 1964 the sale of a bungalow by the Kenmare Estate, which was across the road from the garage - on the site of the now Dromhall Hotel - created the opportunity for Kay's dream to become a reality. She and Neil bought the bungalow and opened an 18-bedroom hotel on the site in 1965. Little did Neil

> realise that, within one week, the 10 shillings would give rise to a 10,000 pound investment.

From there the hotel grew rapidly as did the other businesses that Kay and Neil created - Randles Car Hire; C&R Frozen Foods, CRL Oil, Randles Bros Killarney and Kenmare and later on Randles Hotel, Killarney and Randles Bros Tralee.

In 1969 the bedrooms increased to 35, more rooms were added in 1977 and a new reception, lounge and dining room were also built. The bar was another addition.

In 1987, Neil died and Kay was left to carry on the Dromhall Hotel and all the other businesses they owned, as well as rearing their six children, who ranged in ages from 24 to 13. Three of them, at that stage, were involved in the family business.

In 1992 The Rectory house next door to the Dromhall Hotel was purchased and the Randles Court Hotel was built. It continued to grow over the years and today is the four-star luxury Randles Hotel.

In 1999 it was decided by the family to level the Dromhall Hotel to the ground and build a completely new hotel. In June 2000 the Dromhall was re-opened as the new

72-bedroom, conference and banqueting hotel that it is today, along with Kayne's and Bistro, which is attached to the hotel. The name Kayne's comes from perfect partnership of Kay and Neil Randles. 2014/2015

ATRIBUTETO A REMARKABLE : BUSINESSWOMAN, **KERRY** WHO ONE WAS **INSPIRATIONAL** THE PERSONALITIES IN KERRY AND IRISH HOTEL INDUSTRY, HAS **BEEN** UNVEILED BY TAOISEACH MICHEÁL MARTIN.

He marked the 60th anniversary of the busy Dromhall Hotel in Killarney by unveiling a framed portrait of the late Kay Randles who, with her late husband Neil, founded the business on Muckross Road in 1965.

The hotel is now run by the second generation of the Randles family and proprietor, Bernadette Randles, described it as a very proud day for everybody associated with the company over the past six decades.

Close on 150 guests, including some of the hotel's first employees, attended the landmark celebration on Monday and the Taoiseach was joined by Ministers Norma Foley and Michael Healy-Rae, Deputy Michael Cahill, Mayor of Killarney Cllr Martin Grady and the Deputy Mayor of Kerry Cllr Marie Moloney.

"This is a very special day for us – a day to celebrate 60 years in business, a milestone that began as nothing more than a dream in the mind and heart of our mother, Kay Randles, back in 1965," Bernadette said.

"Today is about that dream – her dream – and about the remarkable woman who turned it into a legacy.

"We are deeply grateful that the Taoiseach will honour our mother's impact, not just on our family, but on the town of Killarney and the wider world of tourism," she added.

Bernadette described her mother as a woman ahead of her time.

"For sixty years she poured her life, her energy and her love into building these hotels and businesses, all while raising six children.

"She and my father, Neil, were married just 26 years when he passed away, suddenly, at the age of 50. And yet, for the next 38 years, without her best friend by her side, she led, she built, she worked, she raised us – and she never stopped," she said.

The hotelier added that for a town of its size, it is some achievement for Killarney to have 37 family-run hotels and she noted that many local businesses are now in the third and fourth generation of family ownership.

"It is such a fantastic thing to see so many family businesses thriving in our small town.

"We may compete with one another but we also support each other through advice, friendship and a genuine wish to see each other do well," she said.

The Taoiseach said the story of the Randles family is very much the story of Killarney and it was an example of extraordinary entrepreneurial endeavour.

"Killarney has a very unique sense of getting things done and it is the one location that knows how to do tourism. It's in your DNA," he said.

"There's something about the mindset of the community and the people of Killarney, like the Randles family, are just extraordinary".

Mr Martin said Kay Randles had demonstrated remarkable vision and determination throughout her life and she was like a spark that could never be dimmed.

The Taoiseach said he has had a love affair with Killarney since childhood when his father brought him to Munster finals and while they couldn't afford to stay in a hotel owned by the Randles family back then, he still remembers the sandwiches and the welcome.

"It's all down to the customer experience. You can have all the bricks and mortar you like but it's about how you feel in a place that makes it special. We all learn from Killarney in that regard," Mr Martin said.

## **Full House in Killarney for Powerful Workshop** on Supporting Young Minds

A full house of more than 140 parents, carers, teachers and community members gathered at The Panoramic in Killarney Racecourse for a powerful and timely workshop on supporting young people's mental health. From the moment the opening video began, the room fell silent, with venue owner Ollie Favier noting that the audience was "fully locked in from the first minute" and the atmosphere was so focused "you could hear a pin drop."

The workshop was led by Killarney native and lived-experience mental health coach Neil Kelders, whose practical, relatable approach resonated strongly with attendees. Rather than focusing on theory, Neil delivered tools that parents could use immediately strategies to recognise early signs of worry or low mood, build stronger emotional connection, and better support teenagers navigating stress. "Parents aren't short on effort, they're often short on support," he said. "Last night showed what happens when a community steps into that gap."

When the session ended, many attendees remained for more than half an hour to ask questions and continue the discussion, highlighting both the urgency of the issue and the appetite for accessible, community-based support. Feedback from the night reflected this, with parents describing the workshop as "incredibly insightful," "clear, calm, and deeply relatable," and providing "a real toolkit to understand and support our young people." Others noted that they left feeling "more confident and connected." Carina Audley of The Event Edit called the workshop "empowering and urgently needed."

The event was hosted with the support of The Panoramic team at Killarney Racecourse, whose venue provided a fitting backdrop for an evening centred on understanding, connection and proactive mental health support for families. Kelders, a mental health coach, author and speaker, continues to work with parents, teenagers and organisations across Ireland and the UK, providing practical, future-focused tools that bridge the gap between clinical services and the everyday emotional challenges families face.





## Extra appointments available for RSV immunisation clinics in Kerry

Kerry parents of babies born between March and the end of August this year are encouraged to take up their last opportunity this year to immunise their babies against RSV.

Following a successful immunisation campaign in September, a small number of extra vaccination clinics will be available in Kerry from next week, finishing up in early December. Babies born between March 1 and August 31 this year are eligible for appointments (babies born from September onwards have been offered the immunisation while in hospital). Appointments can now be booked on https://www.2.hse.ie/conditions/rsv/immunisation HSE South West Specialist Registrar in Public Health Medicine Dr. Sinéad Flanagan said: "There has been a fantastic response to the

immunisation campaign, and it's reassuring that so many babies are now protected from RSV. We are running a small number of additional clinics in Kerry over the next few weeks, starting from Wednesday November 19. We strongly encourage any family who hasn't yet made an appointment to do so as soon as possible."

She added: "RSV immunisation provides great protection for your baby. RSV can cause hospitalisations and serious illness, especially for young infants. Before the immunisation programme was introduced, four out of every 100 infants were hospitalised each winter due to RSV. As many as half of all infants were infected with RSV and many needed care from their GP, pharmacist or local Emergency



Department. Thankfully, this free immunisation works really well and protects small babies from RSV."

Clinics will take place in Kerry at the Kerry Vaccination Centre in Monavalley, Tralee and Killarney South Doc on the Upper Park Road.

# HOME REBUILDING COSTS HAVE INCREASED BY AN AVERAGE OF 7% NATIONALLY OVER THE LAST 12 MONTHS

latest Rebuilding Guide published by the Society of Chartered Surveyors Ireland (SCSI) shows that

national average rebuild costs, which include demolition and site clearance, have increased by an average of 7% over the past 12 months. This is up from the 6% rate of increase recorded last year but well down on the 12% increase recorded in 2023.

Labour costs and skills shortages are continuing to drive rebuild costs while two new levies, the Landfill levy from September 2024 and the Recovery levy from January 2025 are impacting costs.

From an insurance perspective your property should be insured for the reinstatement cost and not the market value. In other words the

cost of rebuilding the house excluding the site value. Bear in mind that the rebuild cost could be higher than the market value.

The base rebuilding costs in the Munster region are running at an average of €3,100 per square metre for a 4 bed detached house of 119 square metres in the most recently published guide.

The rebuilding rates quoted by SCSI are for estate type homes and not one-off homes. These are the base rebuild costs only and higher spec fixtures, fittings, built in wardrobes, fences, walls, gates and garages need to be factored in addition.

Garage costs range from €24,482 for a single attached garage to €43,793 for a double attached garage, on average.

It is very important to note that "under insurance" can have a serious effect on any future claims settlements. Most policies include

an "Average Clause" which means in the event of "under insurance" any claims settlement can be reduced in value in proportion to the degree of under insurance. Where the Sum Insured is only 75% of the total reinstatement cost, you will receive 75% of the agreed cost of reinstatement, whether the claim is made for partial reinstatement or total loss.

I would recommend that you undertake a review of your reinstatement sum insured. Many insurers are index linking sums insured at renewal date. In order to get a definitive individual reinstatement value on your house you should contact an independent qualified

### WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?

Glaucoma is the name given to a group of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of

eye is damaged. It is often linked with raised pressure within the eye, although the eye pressure can

sometimes be normal. When the nerve is damaged, it can start to cause problems with the peripheral vision (side vision) and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage. With early treatment, further damage to vision can be prevented.

Glaucoma may not have symptoms and this is why it is very important to have regular sight tests.

### Risk factors

Age is the biggest risk factor for glaucoma. However, your risk also increases if you have family members with glaucoma

### **Symptoms**

The danger with open-angle or chronic glaucoma (slow onset) is that, in the early stages, your eyesight may seem perfectly normal. There is no pain, but your peripheral vision (side vision) is being damaged. Eventually your central vision can be affected. This can be described as tunnel vision

because it feels like looking down a long tube. It's important to have regular sight tests as openangle

glaucoma often does not have symptoms.

### **TREATMENT**

Open-angle glaucoma is usually treated with eye drops which reduce the pressure in the eye. You


will need to use these daily. Occasionally people with openangle glaucoma need surgery to control the pressure.

## Deputy Danny Healy-Rae Raises Key Rural Concerns in the Dáil

Deputy Danny Healy-Rae TD raised a series of issues in the Dáil last week, focusing on challenges facing farmers, motorists, carers, low-income families and communities affected by recent severe weather.

### **CUTS TO AGRICULTURE SCHEMES**

Deputy Healy-Rae criticised reductions in sheep and beef welfare payments, saying farmers were assured on Budget Day that no cuts would be made. "Sheep farmers were expecting €13 and are getting €11.50, while beef and calf farmers were expecting €75 but are only receiving €67," he said, adding that he has sought further clarification from the Minister of State.

### **RISING COST OF MOTORING**

Highlighting the necessity of cars for people in rural Ireland, he said young drivers face "huge costs" including lessons, tests, NCT fees and

soaring insurance. He questioned whether carbon tax could be reconsidered, noting that fuel costs are already high. He also criticised long delays in the SEAI Warmer Homes Scheme, saying some elderly applicants have been waiting more than two years for insulation upgrades.

# SOCIAL WELFARE & RETIREMENT SAVINGS SCHEME

Deputy Healy-Rae called for the complete abolition of the means test for carers and said the living alone allowance must be addressed, as single occupants have "the same household costs but only one income."

He also raised concerns about families being pushed off the social housing list due to small increases in the Working Family Payment.

On the new automatic enrolment retirement savings scheme, he warned that employers will

"finish up paying for it" and criticised the State for not contributing at the same level.

### **ACTIVE TRAVEL & GREENWAYS**

Speaking at the Transport Committee, he said he supports greenways but insisted that land access must be agreed with landowners and not imposed through compulsory purchase orders. "CPOs are not fair on landowners," he said.

### **STORM ÉOWYN REVIEW**

At a joint Oireachtas committee examining the response to Storm Éowyn, Deputy Healy-Rae described the severe impact of snow and ice on high-altitude areas such as Cordal, Glencar, Brosna, Knocknagoshel and Gneeveguilla, where some residents were without electricity for up to a week.He called for measures to prevent similar outages, including removing trees within falling distance of roads and power lines. "Other countries do not allow this, and we should avoid a repeat of what happened during Storm Éowyn," he said.

# Over €5.8 million now delivered through the Vacant Property Grant in Kerry – a strong sign that the scheme is working- Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae

Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae has welcomed the latest update on the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant, confirming that 108 grants have now been paid out in Kerry, with a total value of €5,862,250.

Since the scheme opened, 726 applications have been received by Kerry County Council, with 423 applications, 58% approved.

Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae stated that while the process can at times feel cumbersome and slow, the figures clearly show that people are applying and are receiving significant support:

"Despite frustrations with paperwork, delays and the general complexity that people often talk about, the truth is this, people are applying, people are being approved, and over €5 million has already been put back into Kerry homes and communities. That is a major positive, and it shows that the scheme is making a real difference on the ground."

He added that the key focus now must be on keeping the application process as simple and accessible as possible:

"My priority is to keep pushing for faster turnaround times, clearer communication, and less red tape. If an application is refused, people deserve a straightforward explanation and guidance on what they need to do to resubmit successfully. We cannot lose good applicants because of unnecessary complexity."

Cllr Healy-Rae said the importance of the scheme cannot be overstated:

"Every vacant or derelict property brought back into use is another home for a family, another boost for a street or village, and another step in tackling housing pressures locally. I will continue to promote this scheme across Kerry as this is working and I fear some people may not apply simply because they think they will not get it, the stats say otherwise.









## KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

# ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect".

Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.

This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

## IRELAND REACH WORLD CUP PLAY-OFFS

I never doubted. Not at any stage through any of the last two games. I knew, with an inner belief that propelled more altruistic or more prosletysing prophets into toppling empires, that Ireland were not going to be getting near to the World Cup. I was certain. It wasn't just the enormity of the task – beat Portugal just to give yourself a chance of beating Hungary in Hungary? Arrah, stop, Ireland would have a better chance of winning the Quidditch World Cup in the Harry Potter stories.

No. The challenge for me was that you would have to do it without your best striker; Evan Ferguson has looked like a player struggling to shake off a niggling injury for a year now. I did rate Troy Parrott – the latest in a long line of players hailed as wunderkinds by an overexcited Irish media, only to struggle to live up to that tag at Spurs or on loan at other English clubs. He went on loan to Excelsior and began to thrive, earning a move to AZ Alkmaar and blossoming further there. No, I didn't have any problem with Parrott leading the line.

Nor did I blame Heimar Hallgrimmson, any more than I did Stephen Kenny or McCarthy or Martin O'Neill. We Irish, and in fact soccer fans in general, have this bizarre tendency to blame managers when limited teams aren't great. There is such a thing as reasonable expectations. A win over Armenia would have been one such. Back to back wins over Portugal and Hungary? If you are going to indulge in that kind of fantasy, go on away out and buy a Euromillions lotto ticket for yourself.

Ireland didn't have a bad goalscoring record recently. We have a very good goalkeeper, and I'm much happier seeing Kelliher play regularly rather than being highly rated back-up for Liverpool. We are solid and organised in defence. I do think that Seamus Coleman, one of our greatest ever servants, is pretty much at the end of a fantastic tenure.

No, my issue for quite a long time is our lack of any real midfield presence. Consider how many of our goals came from poachers latching onto long balls (though quality kicks rather than the hoof-and-hope efforts of yore) as opposed to threading it with sharp runs and passes to unlock a defence. Ireland will claim to play a 3-5-2-1 outfield formation. That always - and I mean going back for at least five years - is actually a 5-3-1-1, and that's when Ireland are in possession. We have no midfielder who can put his foot on the ball and direct the play. That's not blaming them - do you really grasp how hard this level is? You need to be exceptional, genuinely exceptional, just to make a living at the game. To play in the English Championship? For a minority sport (soccer in Ireland is second at best to the GAA) in a small country to the English Championship, you need to be one in 50,000. Seriously, crunch those numbers. I'm not exaggerating. And from there to the Premiership is just as big a leap again. Granted, Ireland can't go out and buy elite players like the Premiership teams can (we have made extensive and occasionally imaginative use of the 'granny' rule – anybody wanting to complain about the likes of Rice or Grealish opting for the country of their birth should maybe look at the likes of Tony Cascarino's Irish roots again).

## Ireland 2 Portugal 0

We have Troy Parrott. They have Cristiano Ronaldo. Want to take bets?

As I, and everybody else I heard making any prediction, had confidently expected, Portugal lorded early possession. Totally on top. It felt to me like the bilges were creaking, but they held. It was about repeatedly doing the basics right repeatedly. Ireland weren't making last ditch tackles. Caoimhin Kelliher was not making acrobatic fingertip saves. But somehow, we were heading clear, closing out options, hassling and hustling, and Portugal couldn't seem to work a goal, more like hope one happened for them. I did think Cristiano Ronaldo had made a little bit of a hostage to fortune by complaining about Irish pressure on referees and the like before the game. What was Jimmy Deenihan's famous turn of phrase? "Never talk about the alligator's mother until you are safely across the river."

In the 17th minute, very much against the run of play, Ireland went ahead. Liam Scales got on the end of a corner and knocked it down neatly for Parrott to fire home (that may be a trick worth repeating). It didn't exactly turn the tide, but Ireland did start to play a bit more. Portugal still had a bit more of the ball, but Ireland were beginning to find each other with more confidence. Just before half-time, incredibly, Troy Parrott raced in for a perfectly judged finish and 2-0.

Round One emphatically to Ireland. Now for Round Two and the second half. Could we hold out? Given Portugal's dominance of possession, I'd have taken a draw. Except that Portugal just didn't have any of the verve that you'd expect from the names on their teamsheet. When an Irish observer is saying that they showed a lack

of imagination....well, that says everything. And Cristiano Ronaldo departed after a frustrated elbow to a player. Look, this is one of the best goalscorers of all time, but we are talking in the past tense here. He is not the power that he was. For years, teams played for Ronaldo and Messi, and it worked because those individual players were that good. Is Ronaldo that power anymore? I felt that his second coming at Man United was the start of an ongoing decline - yes, he scored goals, but only because he demanded that central role instead of playing for the team. Against Ireland, he looked like an aging player trying to defy Father Time. Certainly, without him, Portugal just didn't really look like scoring. Plenty of attacks, and water will break rocks down eventually - but not in ninety minutes. 2-0 to Ireland, jubilation

And I'm still sceptical. The onus had been on Portugal. Ireland essentially had a free shot which we made brilliant use of to win, hurrah indeed. But that just means that we have to go to Hungary and win – and we are in a different position. Portugal played like a team with little to lose. More frantic than focussed. We had a free shot in many ways.

Now, we have to take the game to Hungary, for whom a draw would suffice. We have to dictate the pace of play and go hunting them, and that's a much harder job. I don't like these odds. Three minutes in Daniel Lukacs headed home. Sin sin, an sceál deanta. Oh, we'll pull one back, we always do in these circumstances, but win it from here? God and the FAI love your naivety.

15 minutes gone. Chiedozie Ogbene is bundled over in the Hungary box. Clumsy rather than malicious, but it's a penalty. Up steps Troy Parrott and buries it. Good penalty; he is understandably brimming with confidence. All we need is one more goal now. Maybe we can dare to dream....arrah, stop it.

Szoboszlai is taking control around the middle, deliberately slowing the pace of the game. Don't mind the childish booing; he's doing exactly what I would want an Irish player to do in these circumstances.

Great chance for Hungary, great save by Kelliher. We started well but we are definitely second best here now. Ten minutes left in the first half and Varga hits an absolute beauty. Nothing Kelliher could do; that's just a great goal. 2-1 to Portugal at half-time. Two goals in forty five minutes against a better team? I mean, yeah, I know a lad who walked on water and turned water into wine on occasion, but he didn't do it while wearing an Irish jersey.Look, that Varga goal almost came with a tinge of relief. It's the hope that kills you. Now I can settle. Ireland had an awful start to this campaign but they came fairly good in the finish. Beat a disappointing but still formidable Portugal and gave a decent Hungary side a decent game of it. Let's just battle through the second half and leave with

our heads high.

13 minutes into the second half almost gets onto a Parrott through ball but is just a fraction too late. Worse, he's pulled something and has to go off, with Idah replacing him. Ogbene surprised me in this game, showed good movement to go along with his pace. Some of these players have improved a lot along the way; Ogbene is one of them. Idah doesn't have the same range to his game for me, not yet anyway.

Szoboszlai is still the best player on the field but Ireland are just about clearing their lines. Idah actually gets the ball into the Hungray net, but it's offside. Close, but definitely no cigar. My language at that time may have been a bit robust; you don't need to know the details.

Ebosele and Kenny on. Ireland have to attack. Hungary don't; they bring on two defenders. This is awkward for Hungary. Do you go for the jugular and risk leaving yourself exposed, or do you look to hold what you have? There really isn't a right answer. In this case, they are looking to hold on and they let Ireland dictate the play. Idah with a header over. Diffficult chance. Parrott with another but he miscues.

Ten minutes left. Finn Azaz, never a player that I really rated at this level, sends a fantastic ball for Parrott to chase. No better man, Troy Parrott deftly flicks it past the keeper. Ten minutes to find a winner.

Kelliher is the busier of the two keepers, including a fine save to deny Szoboszlai. Ten minutes, and no winner. Hungary doing everything they can to kill the game. As I said, I'd have been doing the exact same. Into injury time, clock ticking ever louder. Minute gone. Two.

Long ball. Kenny, great shot....even greater save. That was surely our last chance.

Desperation time. Six minutes gone. Caoimhín Kelliher, of all people, with a beautifully weighted cross. Liam Scales goes high and heads it down. And Troy Parrott nips in....one touch....

And smashes the internet, in Ireland at least. The Late Late Troy Show. If we can send a turkey to the Eurovision, we can send a parrot to the World Cup.....you've seen the memes. We all have. Irish soccer had been dying a slow death over a decade. Then a player scored five goals in two games against the top teams in the

group, the first Irish male senior player (I'm told the caveats are necessary) to score a hat-trick away from home, and just like that Irish soccer is booming again. Italia 90. Con Houlihan used to say that he missed Italia 90, he was in Italy at the time (the real party was in Ireland).

I know. We aren't there yet. We have to win two play-offs. But if you can't celebrate this one for what it is, I can only assume that you have no soul. You have my sympathies.

## EAST KERRY CHAMPIONSHIP

O'DONOGHUE CUP SEMI-FINAL:

Dr. Crokes 3-22 Spa 2-13

Spa have met Dr. Crokes on a number of occasions in recent years, including O'Donoghue Cup Finals, County League, and this year's Senior Club Championship, and it's fair to say that the black and amber side have very much had the better of those exchanges. Despite a heroic comeback, that never really looked like changing in the Fitzgerald Stadium last Saturday.

With a triumvirate of Gavin White and the two midfielders Mark O'Shea and Billy Courtney dominating possession and Dr. Crokes very quick and precise with their passing, they had no less than eight points on the board before a shellshocked Spa could even press the starting gear. Eoin Carroll stepped out to nail one from downtown but that was soon equalised by Carlisle. 





Beech Hedging is an ideal hedging plant for most situations, because of its tolerance of a wide range of soil conditions including well drained soils, soils prone to draughts and soils that can get waterlogged due to heavy down pours of rain. Even though the beech is deciduous, when it is grown as hedging and is trimmed regularly around August/ September the brown leaves will usually be retained throughout most of the winter. Beech also comes with a purple leaf - copper beech. Copper beach is best planted in a sunny position to keep its leaf colour where as the green retains its colour better if planted in partial shade. If you can - it is best to plant your beech hedge bare rooted as it will probably establish that bit quicker, so you have plenty of time from now until the end of March to get planting.

I'm safe with You, I'm going to make it through...cause I'm standing strong on You". The more we keep our eyes upon the goodness of God and His Awesome Power, the easier it is to receive, and walk in His Peace.
