

Dance students excel on the world stage

There were massive celebrations at the CLRG World Irish Dancing Championships in Belfast last week when Killarney dancers, Caoimhe O'Halloran from the Aine Murphy Dance Academy was crowned world champion in the Under 15 age group and Scott O' Meara from the Hegarty Irish Dance Academy achieved 4th place and achieved a personal best on the World stage.

Caoimhe went one step further than she did at the last Worlds in Greensboro in North Carolina in 2019 when she was runner up.

"This was the 1st world championship since Covid put a halt to everything but she was fortunate to have been crowned All-Ireland Champion in February 2020. She still also holds this title along with the Munster title she won last November" her dance teacher Aine Murphy told Killarney Outlook.

"Caoimhe has battled through a lot of serious injuries over the past 12 months and had to completely take a break for 4 months so it's a huge testament to her resilience and dedication that she was crowned Champion after what was a difficult 2 years for everyone with all the different Lockdowns", Aine added.

Caoimhe trained up to 4 times a week in class prior to the event with competitions at the weekends so like all other dancers she had to skip many other activities to dedicate all her time to becoming the best dancer she could be.

"Scott is thrilled to be bringing a World globe home to Kerry this week

and we are so proud of him", Maureen Vogels, Scotts dance teacher told Killarney Outlook "Scott has been dancing all his life and presently dances with Celtic Steps the Show", she added.

Along with placing 4th and winning a very much coveted World Globe, he also qualifies to dance at the World Championships 2023, being held in Montréal



SE/Cork Kerry Community Healthcare have released a statement regarding the announcement of State Compensation Scheme for the children and young people identified in the Maskey Review as having suffered harm/injury.

The HSE/Cork Kerry Community Healthcare welcomes the Government announcement that a State Compensation Scheme has been established for young people who suffered harm/injury while in the care of the Child and Adolescent Mental Health service as outlined through the Maskey Report.

This compensation scheme will give some assistance to the families and young people affected who did not receive the standard of care they deserved. It will be administered by the State Claims Agency on behalf of the HSE.

The HSE/Cork Kerry Community Healthcare has received details of the scheme and has issued those details by post to those affected to outline details of the scheme and how they can apply.

Separately, we continue to engage directly with the young people affected and their families. A Clinical Support Liaison Team is in place and are available to support individuals

and families. We are committed to providing ongoing support to all those affected by the events outlined in the Maskey Report.

A separate process is underway to make sure all 35 recommendations of the report are implemented.

The HSE would like to take this opportunity once again to apologise sincerely to the young people affected and their families for deficits in care they have received.

Our Information Line remains open 1800 742 800 from 9am to 5pm, seven days a week.

Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill has welcomed the fact that the Government has approved compensation for young patients who were harmed as a result of treatment they received while being treated under CAMHS, a state health provider.

The Maskey Report found that significant harm was caused to 46 children and a further 227 were put at risk of serious harm, while under the care of one doctor, at South Kerry Children and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS).

Councillor Cahill had travelled to Dublin earlier this year with members of the Kerry CAMHS Family Support Group to meet with the Minister for Mental Health services, Mary Butler and other senior Government representatives.

"The early approval by the Government of compensation for the horrific ordeal that these families went through under CAMHS has to be welcomed, but the detail must be examined before it can be determined if the package is suitable to their needs" stated Councillor Cahill, Deputy Mayor of Kerry and Cathaoirleach of Kenmare Municipal District.

"This was a disgraceful event in Public Health Services and shook us all to the core of our being. No one could imagine that such an abhorrent event could be visited on our vulnerable children and adolescents. The HSE must now ensure that all vital posts are immediately filled in all it's services and that all checks and balances are in place to ensure nothing of this nature happens again" added Councillor Cahill.



It's the talk of the town.....



Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney



PROGRESS ON PILGRIM PATH

A pilgrim's path, "road tested" during the recent wander wild festival in Killarney is called Cosán Naomh Abbáin – the Pilgrim path of Abban.

The loop walk, for six miles, designed by Thomas O'Sullivan and Gail O'Donoghue of Lewis Road has 40 stops of interest inspired by Aghadoe, and beginning and ending at the Church of the Sloe, St Mary's (Church of Ireland) in the oldest part of Killarney town.

But who is Abbán? The little Abbot was a Wexford man associated with Adamstown, the with the sloe.

He was the original founder of Aghadoe in the 6thcentury is Thomas' bold theory. Aghadoe was later dedicated to Finan, something prophesied by Abbán.

It is a personal theory piqued by his childhood journeys to his mother's home place and the discovery the Irish for Admastown was in fact Mágh Airní- Plain of the Sloes.

Barrington's respected history of Kerry has a similar theory. A new doctoral thesis in Maynooth on the cult of the saint also believes Abbán to have founded the church in Aghadoe. He it was also founded monastic community with St Gobnait in Ballyvourney.

A researcher on the magnificent Cork and Kerry place names project in the 1990s, Archivist and musician Thomas O'Sullivan has "form" in historical walks, having designed the Killorglin Ballykissane Centenary Loop on a wealth of research.

He is also the author of the wonderfully illustrated Dreamtime – legend and lore of the MacGillycuddy's Reeks.

The Killarney Pilgrim path has taken over a year of research and there is much background info on stops like Mochudda's well in the Demesne - as well as the Killarney cinema, an eclectic mix of mythology, culture and recent history.

"Cloch Mochudda is a tricky place to find," we are told of stop 11 and here we get the history of Inisfallen too.

The plan is to publish a flier and map, if funding is found. It is a worthy project as

Killarney is short of walks, particularly pilgrim walks such as are found in Dingle and other locations.

Just this weekend

Muckross paths were so crowded, it was actually difficult to amble off the beaten track.

The motivation for the new historical loop is so local people can have an appreciation of their own place, Thomas says.

It comes with the promising logo

"Bíonn an Siúltach, Scéaltach" – the walker is a storyteller.

TIME FOR A CABLE CAR SYSTEM?

Speaking of walking, Killarney Mountain Rescue has dealt with eight incidents in the past month in the Reeks and Brandon ranges including to a couple of lost walkers who had become cragfast above Coimín Íochtar on Carrauntoohil.

After a short search the walkers were located and secured to a rope system before being lowered to safety.

The numbers of people on the hills has to be seen to be understood. Thousands are making their way each weekend to Carrauntoohil and the Reeks and to Mangerton Mountain. The carbon footprint of all these car journeys from Cork, Tralee etc just to go for a walk is horrendous.

And that is not to mention the mountains are suffering extreme damage from boots now. The ambitious plan for a cable car on Mangerton— only scuttled after half-hearted objections from jarveys and some locals—raises its head from time to time.

The cable cars have saved much of Switzerland's mountains while also making them available to a wider variety of people. In other parts of the world they are public transport systems.

I can't see how a cable car, say to the Punch bowl or over the Gap of Dunloe and onto the Reeks would bring anything but joy. It would also be of enormous benefit to the environment.



The idea is the chairs lift you – high over the cows with the bells in Switzerland – over the delicate bits or the inaccessible parts and then you may if you like walk other legs before catching the next one.

No place gets too stressed as a result.

A new sign has gone up in Mangerton by the council to ask those arriving headlong to the foot of the mountain and practically abandoning their cars across the narrow road in the rush for fresh air to respect residents. No ambulance, no fire tender can reach the end of the road the way those cars are left. A cable car from the cross in Muckross would be part of the solution.

TOURISM FORECASTS

The tourism forecasts are mixed. A busy April including last weekend is welcome but the rest of the season is very patchy, I am reliably informed. August has fewer bookings than July which lends one to



the notion that the Irish who like to holiday at home in August are heading off.

I also hear of Americans cancelling. I wonder was it a wise idea, from a tourism point of view, linking our St Patrick's Day festivals so closely with the Ukrainian war and flag? Whilst the sentiment was undoubtedly sincere, the result may have been to imprint the idea of proximity of war more than solidarity. In other words, a US citizen watching would think the war was much closer to Ireland than it actually is. In fact the front these days is 800 kms from the Ukraine capital Kyiv itself. That's about from Killarney to the centre of France. According to the April Situation and Analysis Report from Tourism Ireland extra capacity has been added but jet fuel prices have risen significantly since the start of the crisis in Ukraine.

Upward pressures on prices will continue, in particular if more stringent sanctions were to be applied to the Russian energy sector.

Airlines may pass the higher fuel costs on to passengers through higher air fares. At a time of already elevated inflation, higher air fares could reduce demand for air travel.

A recent survey in the US by travel marketing agency MMGY has suggested that the war in Ukraine is causing many US tourists to have second thoughts about planned trips to Europe this year.

The sooner the war ends in Ukraine, the better for tourism locally. Tragically, there are too many international leaders shouting and roaring (while selling armaments) - and too few voices pushing for peace.

The Pope and the leaders of Israel and indeed Turkey are the honourable exceptions.

SEM BOYS SECURE €700 FROM **SOCIAL IMPACT FUND**

TO ADVANCE IDEAS FOR SOCIAL GOOD

5 tudents from St Brendan's College, Killarney secured €700 in funding recently from St Brendan's College, : to advance their social innovation project aimed at addressing male violence.

The teenagers, who are taking part in Young Social Innovators (YSI), pitched their idea to a Dragons' Den Panel including representatives from Cork County Council, Cork Partnership, Virgin Media, and Rethink Ireland for access to a Social Impact Fund dedicated to advancing teenagers' ideas for social good.

The students were alarmed at how little their school and local community knew about the culture of male violence and so they chose to focus their action on peer and community education. Their requests for support at the YSI Den included funding to help publish an educational book they are writing entitled One Punch Can Kill, as well as informational posters for their school and businesses in the community.

Almost €10,000 was granted to 18 YSI teams through the Social Impact Fund that is supported by The Community Foundation for Ireland. The students in receiptof funding are developing innovative ideas around a wide range of issues including biodiversity, plastic reduction, ocean pollution, inclusion, social media and online safety, racism, and more. Some 7,000 students throughout Ireland are currently involved in similar projects with Young Social Innovators in 2022.

ore than 50 locals joined our Ukrainian families living at the Innisfallen hotel to celebrate Easter last weekend, and together we celebrated with dance and music. Thanks to volunteers and Mary O'Carroll of the Consider it cakes charity, our children received more than 60 chocolate eggs and several hundred handmade cupcakes. Another 40 eggs went to the Ukrainian children in Killarney Hotel.

"Consider it cakes" - a group of people living around Killarney who prepare charity pastries. "We had a group of about 20 women from around Killarney and one 13 year old girl named Kim O' Doherty from Kilcummin who baked for Innisfallen and Hotel Killarney", says Mary O'Carroll. "Our bakers are all moms and we wanted to show you moms and children some love. We think ukrainian moms are incredible, strong, dealing with incredible hard times. For me personally my daughter Faye also helps with the baking. We made friends in Innisfallen hotel and promise to help our new friends", - says Mary O'Carroll.

The children were visited by an Easter bunny, who gave presents to everyone, hugged everyone and took a photo. The lady who was the Easter Bunny is an Irish language teacher at school "Gaelscoil Faithleann" in Killarney. She is very loved by all the kids she teaches and is known as "Muinteoir Lisa".

The main highlight of the meeting was a concert to thank the local community for the support of Ukrainians. It was filled with Ukrainian classical and modern music, gymnastic performances, dances and poems. Yevheniia Omelchenko, a graphic designer, has edited all the videos that were shown on the screen during a show. She says she wanted to introduce Irish guests to different parts of Ukraine, to show that we all have a place to return to and why to fight for our country.

"Yes, it is not appropriate to talk about the war

on Easter. But we kept the balance between sad and funny topics", - says Alevtyna Rutto All the guests were especially moved during the performance of the song "I have no home". The piano part was played by amateur musician Timur, who spent two weeks in the basement of the occupied town of Irpin, near Kyiv. He miraculously escaped and is now in western Ukraine. Timur recorded the video of the piano part on his phone and sent it to Ireland. Yevheniia performed a live guitar part at the concert and Tetyana sang. Yes, the song "I have no home" turned into a real emotional culmination of the concert and brought together musicians from Ukraine and Ireland. Mary O'Riordan, was impressed by Timur's

story. "The story of this guy from Irpen struck me to the core. There were tears in my eyes." The women's choir performed an ancient military march of Ukrainian insurgents "Oh, red viburnum in the meadow" ("Ой у лузі червона калина") By the way, recently the legendary Pink Floyd played "Oh in the meadow red viburnum" together with the Ukrainian musician who is currently fighting in the Armed Forces of Ukraine Andriy Khlyvnyuk. This song became famous all over the world.

"We have been preparing and rehearsing for a long time, because it is difficult for us to compete with Pink Floyd, but I think we managed to raise the fighting spirit in the hall. For greater understanding, we made subtitles for the lyrics in English, "says Victoria Volkova, a musician who played the tune on a synthesizer. 15-year-old Mykola performed several parts on the flute. The world-famous "Melody" by Ukrainian composer Myroslav Skoryk was first performed in Killarney.

The concert was closed with the Ukrainian folk dance "Potato". The Ukrainians quickly taught the Irish the movements of this dance. And the locals immediately picked it up and started dancing with us.

"We want to thank the entire Killarney community for all the support we receive every day. We don't just want to help, we want to give something back. So we organized a concert, prepared handmade souvenirs and invited our new friends to share the holiday with us", - says Alevtyna Rutto

Yevheniia Omelchenko says, "Last week we visited the Celtic Roots show where we got to know the culture of the Irish, and we did our

Turn2me was founded in 2009 stemming from the very personal experiences of Oisin and Diarmuid Scollard, who lost their brother to suicide in 2003. In 2013, turn2me gained the support of the HSE National Office for Suicide Prevention to deliver counselling online. In 2019, turn2me joined forces with ReachOut Ireland to create a space for young people to find information to support their mental health online. As of September 2021, turn2me offers adult counselling and peer support services to adults and young people aged 12 plus. It also offers group support services for teenagers, young people and adults.



DOWN THE COBBLED LANES

LOOKS AT LIFE IN KILLARNEY IN THE EARLY 20TH CENTURY

A trip down memory lane is being planned by Muckross House Research library who have announced their latest historical project.

Spearheaded by Dr Patricia O'Hare, staff at Muckross Library, and broadcaster J.J. O'Shea, the project will take you on a journey down memory lane, and explores life in Killarney in the early 20th century.

Over the course of several months in 1985 an oral history

project was undertaken by two members of the Trustees of Muckross House. Tadgh O'Sullivan of Kerry Mineral Waters, and Paddy MacMonagle of Killarney Printing Works, who endeavoured to record their early memories of life in Killarney town. The recordings took place in the kitchen of Paddy's House on Countess Road, with the assistance of Ned Myers, Manager of Muckross House.



As might be expected of home-made recordings of that time, the sound is not always of a very high quality. However, the recordings do provide us with valuable glimpses of life in Killarney in the early 20th century. Extracts from the recordings will be uploaded as a series of podcasts, entitled 'Down the Cobbled Lanes,' over the coming months.

In this, the first podcast, we learn of the former whereabouts of the British Army recruiting office in the town. We also learn of the efforts made by local boys to fly the tricolour over Main Street in the period leading up to the War of Independence.

PLAN YOUR STRATEGY

FOR THE WEEKS LEADING UP TO THE STATE EXAMS



s exam candidates head back to school for the final term before the State Exams begin on the 8th June, they have already done a fair amount of work. Many exam candidates have worked diligently and consistently throughout the year. Others may have been less focussed and motivated as they travelled the road to next June's exams. But the fact remains that every exam candidate has a foundation of work, however solid or precarious, on which to build over the next few weeks. Efficient and careful use of the remaining time will be enough to get you safely over the finish line. No matter how little work you have done to date, you can still achieve a worthwhile result in your exam if you put your best effort into the final few weeks. It's also important to appreciate that you know a great deal more than you give yourself credit for.

The immediate priority now is to reassess your goals and make a plan of action for the run into the exam. The time for procrastination has well and truly passed. It's essential to have clear goals and an action plan to help you to be successful. If you are to achieve your academic goals, they will have to be SMART – specific, measurable, achievable, realistic and timelined. Your focus must now be on your total readiness for next June's exams. Avail of all the help that is at your disposal during the next few weeks to ensure that you are in tip top shape for the challenge of the exams.

The subject teacher at school, who after all is the expert, will guide you through the last few weeks in revision, exam techniques and overall subject strategy. Attend school regularly during the final term and maintain a diligent work schedule to give yourself every possible chance of achieving your goals. Be clear in your own mind as to what exactly your goals are. Have confidence in your ability to achieve

them. Have a plan to accomplish your aim and, critically, execute your plan by doing the necessary work.

Carry out an honest review of your exam programme straight away. Make a decision about the level – higher, ordinary or foundation of the paper you will answer in each subject. Set down a target grade in each subject. Convert each grade to CAO points and add up your six best scores. Now you have a target grade in each subject and an overall points' target to help motivate you. It's vital at this late stage to set realistic goals. For example, if you feel you may not be able for a higher-level paper in a particular subject, are you not far better off taking an ordinary level paper in that subject where you may achieve a decent grade? Consider what you would like to do after the Leaving Cert exam. A singular determination to achieve enough points to get a place in your course of interest is a great motivator. Perhaps, your primary motivator should be to do yourself justice in the exam and to achieve results that reward your ability and effort. Having clear and focussed goals will make your last term more productive and rewarding.

Regard the next few weeks and the actual exam as a challenge that you will meet headlong and with determination. Approach it with confidence and belief in yourself. Take total control of your life and channel your energy in a positive direction. Every time you have a doubt or a negative thought about yourself replace it with a positive one. You will feel better about yourself if you are in control of your situation. To assume that control set aside some time to make out a plan of action. Decide what topics you need to revise between now and the exam. Make out an overall time schedule, a weekly schedule and a daily schedule. Make out that plan of action over the next few days so that you will hit the ground running.







WHY SHOULD YOU **REVIEW YOUR** PENSION?







PRESBYOPIA

What is presbyopia?

Presbyopia is the normal loss of near focusing ability that occurs with age. Most people begin to notice the effects of presbyopia sometime after age 40, when they start having trouble seeing small print clearly.

Presbyopia is caused by an agerelated process. This differs from astigmatism, myopia and hyperopia, which are related to the shape of the eveball and are caused by genetic and environmental factors. Presbyopia generally is believed to stem from a gradual thickening and loss of flexibility of the natural lens inside your eye.

These age-related changes occur within the proteins in the lens, making the lens harder and less elastic over time. With less elasticity, this means the eye has a harder time focusing up close and we may have to hold material further away to see it clearly.

What is the treatment for presbyopia?

Presbyopia is a natural part of ageing and there is no cure for it. The solution is generally to wear glasses for reading

Contact lenses are also available for presbyopia if you do not want to

Are there exercises I can do to stop needing reading glasses? Will I make my eyes worse by wearing

No. As presbyopia is caused by the lens stiffening, and not the muscles weakening. Wearing glasses will not make your eyes worse and there are no exercises that can help this. However, you may notice that when you take your glasses off, things appear to be worse without them than before you had them. This is simply because you are noticing how clear and comfortable vision should be. Before you had the glasses, you were unaware how blurry your vision really was because it changed slowly over the years.

Presbyopia will get worse as you age until you reach your late fifties, when you will have no natural focusing ability left. Unfortunately there is nothing you can do to stop it.





Kerry got past the first hurdle up in Miltown/ Malbay last Monday night, but won't be overly pleased with their performance. There are some mitigating factors – they were against a very strong wind in the first half and Clare played a strong defensive formation that choked off space. It still wasn't good enough. Kerry players looked rusty – they should be playing with their clubs, in my opinion – and the forwards handpassed ad nauseum, they looked too afraid of losing possession. Direct and fast football would have served them better in spite of that big wind. Midfield, in fairness, played well, with both Ruairí Murphy and Seán O'Brien making some great catches.

Joe Raffery and Eoin Rouine to a lone Dylan Geaney free had Kerry 0-2 to 0-1 down. Kerry hit a purple patch and a superb free by Devon Burns and points from Thomas O'Donnell and Geaney again made it 0-4 to 0-2. But Clare took over completely, with Kerry turned over time and again, and reeled off four points on the trot through Thomas Meenaghan, the Rouine cousins, and Seán McNamara. Good scores, while Kerry were at sixes and sevens. I wasn't worried, not really – a two point deficit against that gale isn't a bad situation – but I certainly wasn't impressed.

Joe Rafferty made it 0-7 to 0-4 on the restart. However, Declan O'Sullivan reacted well with some switches and in fairness, Kerry upped it a gear. Kevin Goulding and Dylan Geaney had them on level terms before Kerry strung a great team move together that Cillian Burke finished to the net. That one rattled Clare and Burke, very impressive once he moved inside as a big target-man, added two more points. Goulding added another to make it a six point gap and, with Kerry deliberately slowing down the game and holding the ball, Clare's resistance finally faded away. All they could muster was one last

free by Joe Rafferty.

ALL IRELAND FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2022 quest for Sam Maguire finally kicked off in earnest this week. This is the most open championship in years, mainly because Dublin no longer look the invincible force of yore. They haven't gone away, but for the first time in a decade since half-time in last year's semifinal, Dublin are not overwhelming favourites to take the title (their defeats in 2012 and 2014 were shocks at the time. Mayo were their closest challengers and Kerry had slipped into third place. Tyrone and Donegal were probably closest to that triumvirate, but not really knocking on that door.

There are three basic phases to winning an All Ireland over a year (the team-building stage takes three years in general, the likes of Down in 1960 and Kerry in 1975 are outliers). You have the National League, which counties take seriously nowadays. Good calibre opposition, with enough leeway for experimentation. A good league doesn't mean too much to me; having the right ingredients doesn't guarantee a good cake (I have been trying and failing miserably at baking these days) but a bad one tends to be fatal. I do know that League and Championship doubles have become more common, but I attribute that to the small

number of contenders for both. Then you have the start of the provincial championships - frankly, that's just 'meh' to me. There's usually one big casualty along the way. Big deal, they swan through the qualifiers while their conquerers invariably fade away soon afterwards. It changes very little. Then you have the endgame, starting with the provincial qualifiers. Thank God they got rid of those time-wasting, money-grabbing monstrosities the 'super 8s'. They were truly awful nonsense. Now it's knock-out. This is where the hard winter yards (they say it takes 10,000 hours to master a sport) become vital inches. Kerry had developed a bad habit of coughing up those inches, where Dublin were genuine masters at carving out a fraction more breathing space every time. They were great champions, I liked

Last year Dublin's journey through Leinster was the usual cruise; they even had to pull the oars a bit. But at the same time, they could look around the dressing room at half-time in the penultimate game of the All Ireland championship, ten points up over usual victims Mayo, and feel content.

Contentment is a killer in sporting contests. That was Jim Gavin's greatest trick; he had them focused and hungry even in games that were well over as a contest. He was utterly ruthless in discarding the likes of McAuley and Connolly (there's still an air of abrupt mystery about that one). Dessie Farrell's team have never really had that aura – some confidence seemed to seep out of them without Cluxton. Whatever the reason, they relaxed on the reins against Mayo with the job half done.

To be honest, I don't think it would have mattered of they were playing Kerry (our confidence had a brittle feel to it - still does, I think, after that Tyrone League game) and the blanket teams like Tyrone are great to hold but not good at accelerating. Ten points would have been a bridge too far for them. But Mayo? I adore Mayo football. They can be a bit naïve. a bit gung-ho, a bit swashbuckler. But their spirit is unbreakable. Ten points down means nothing to them, and they just tore into it. And the more Dublin looked shaky, the more Mayo dug at their foundations. It wasn't pretty, but in its own way it really did have a certain glory. And the one thing it definitely did, is throw the speculation door wide open for this year.

MUNSTER

If this was a cowboy movie, Munster would be the one horse town, and we're the horse. Yes, I do remember saying much the same thing in 2020 (and '92 for that matter), and eating those words with a big slice of humble pie afterwards. They do say that in quantum physics the questions remain the same every year; it's the answers that change. Go back a decade ago and

ALL THINGS...SPORT

Cork were Munster champions and Tipperary were Munster U20 champions and on the cusp of a minor All Ireland. Fast forward to 2020 and Tipperary took the Munster title after Cork had beaten an uninspired Kerry with a late goal.

But even that goalscorer has switched to Cork hurling. That's a young Cork team, albeit with All Irelands behind them. The likes of Maguire and Brian Hurley are great players, but Kerry absolutely hammered Cork last year and the Rebels have regressed since then. We still aren't sure where the game will be played, and that has and will fill a lot of column inches. Big deal. That's only a distraction. Kerry were caught on the hop in 2020, but we left the door open with what I still consider to be an extremely defensive approach. We were too reliant on David and Seán for scores. Having Geaney back to his natural predatory role and the older Clifford and Brosnan in the mix tells me that Kerry have pushed on. Cork and especially Tipperary

have regressed an awful lot. Clare and Limerick have improved, but not close to our level. When push comes to shove, I expect the Kerry forwards to be doing the shoving.

Verdict: Kerry in comfort, but bigger tests ahead.



CONNAUGHT

Connaught has traditionally lagged behind the other provinces in terms of All Irelands, a smaller population and a higher rate of emigration being the main reasons. Mayo are the big guns these days. It's been three score and ten years since they lifted Sam, but they have been the second best team in Ireland more often than not and James Horan has pulled off Mayo's magic trick of always unearthing new talent – club football is very competitive up there. Funny enough, the team that wins Connaught is often not the last Connaught team standing. The likes of Roscommon always have a serious burst at their traditional rivals in the province but don't have the legs to go the whole way afterwards.

This year is very open for the 'sheepstealers' (it was a common practise across the Shannon in the 19th century), being on the opposite side of the draw as the other big two. Moreover, they are no longer reliant on a Dolan or Conor Cox for 80% of their scores. They are more rounded – the Division Two League Final was brilliant football. They'll be dangerous.

Galway are the team with the most unfulfilled potential for me. When they click, they are as good as anyone. They just don't click often enough. Pádraig Joyce had a great start as manager but introduced a note of caution to their play and they can't seem to adjust their gears fast enough in games, its all out attack or closed shop – you need to vary both. They will unquestionably give Mayo a great game, that one will be as tight as a coin toss.

But I fancy Mayo. Yes, they were poor in the League Final, but that wasn't their full hand. They won't be going man for man in defence against the likes of Shane Walsh. Ó hÓra might pick him up (a physical match) but that just takes the shackles off Keegan, and himself and Durcan will run at you all day long. Add in championship top scorer Cillian O'Connor back to full fitness and Ryan O'Donoghue, and you have a potent mix.

Leitrim struggled to beat London after coughing up two late goals (London's Kerry

contingent played well) and Sligo got a real fright against New York (who would have faced a real dilemma in terms of visas had they won). Neither will be at the business end.

Verdict: Mayo, but they'll have their work cut out.



LEINSTER

Croke Park have finally, at long last, started a more equitable distribution of funding. Money never brought Dublin any of those All Irelands; I'm embarrassed at those Kerry supporters who try to claim that it did. I hate whinging, gentlemen. But the lack of it did stunt the game in other Leinster counties, and that's become a real problem. Dublin have won 14 of the last fifteen titles, and done it far too comfortably to be entertaining. There's a real frisson of excitement about things now. Kildare showed us what they can do in the opening round of the National League and Glenn Ryan has aces in Flynn and Hyland. But they fell away after that and dropped down alongside Dublin; I suspect that it was something of a false dawn. How about Dublin's old enemy Meath? They gave Dublin a right rattle last year, without really scratching the hide. They were a team that everybody feared....once. Not these days, I'm afraid. Longford are still too porous. Laois have slipped down a fair bit – a poisoned chalice for Billy Sheehan, I suspect.

No. Dublin, currently on a warm weather holiday, are still far ahead of that chasing pack. We know for a proven fact that Fenton and Kilkenny have better in them. Con O'Callaghan is back in training, and that's serious bad

news for rivals. And not just in Leinster. Dublin can still pierce any jugular, write them off at your peril.

Verdict: Dublin, with a bit to spare.



ULSTER

I like to think I have some idea of the other provinces. Ulster? For all my life, and quite a

bit longer, Ulster has been virtually impossible to predict. There has always been real bite in those games and few if any cannon fodder, and that holds even more true now. A lot has been made about players withdrawing from the Tyrone panel, but they are players who weren't getting game time, even off the bench. That doesn't erode a team too much. Their half back line was the rock that we crashed on last year, along with us coughing up bad goals. Tyrone are brilliant at closing up shop and they are dangerous up front. They won a league shootout against us but needed it to avoid relegation, so their form was a bit of a mixed bag. But again, Ulster teams don't go all out for the League. Canavan junior has developed into a serious player along with McCurry and McKenna. Tyrone were very poor in the first half against Fermanagh – that's not surprising, their training won't be tempered to full pitch yet. But they showed what they can do in the second half. Derry have improved quite a bit, but they aren't going to withstand the Red Hand either. Donegal are like Galway. They have everything they need; they just can't seem to put it together. They also have a real stickler against Armagh; McGeeney's charges have become dangerous. Funny enough, I actually think Donegal would be better off to lose a tight contest and build a head of steam through the back door.

Monaghan will be fancied to beat Down with a bit to spare, but I can see potential for a shock there. Monaghan are quietly but consistently resilient and no longer quite as reliant on the still-brilliant McManus. Armagh's forwards, especially Rian O'Neill, are absolutely deadly when given space. But when they are denied it by a tight sweeper system? McEnaney's Monagah will have

their work cut out, but that could stand to them later on.

No, it's the reigning champions for me.
Verdict: Tyrone to sin the tightest province of them all.



OVERALL

We'll only whisper it quietly. Kerry are the bookies' favourites, and I agree with them. I expect us to meet Dublin in the semi-final and that will be a real thriller. We are a bit overrated as far as I can see - that League Final was flattering, as has been the case in recent years - while Dublin have suddenly become very under-rated. They haven't gone away, you know. But we are that bit tighter at the back and a bit more direct up front - please take note, sprinting forward with the ball in a predictable line and ending up in a cul de sac more often than not has cost us more games than it has won in recent years. It gives the opposition (who are expecting from Kerry these days) time to set up and counter. It's a great weapon to use sparingly. Champions Tyrone will be there or thereabouts but would likely need three goals

again to beat us (Tyrone man Paddy Tally has tightened our defence.

McDONAGH CUP Down 1-19 Kerry 0-18

There is no point in dressing it up. This was something of a disaster from Kerry's perspective. The McDonagh Cup is extremely tight this year, with favourites Antrim, Offaly, and Carlow all in the mix. Down and Meath are the two teams that Kerry would have been targeting along the way for expected victories. We lost to Down up in Ards at the League semifinal, but that could be viewed as something of a blip after an early red card for Mikey Boyle.

Mikey was suspended for this one, and Kerry's preparations can't have been helped when Shane Nolan, whom we are told was frustrated at not getting a starting place (I can sympathise; Shane has been one of our best and most consistent performers in general) withdrew from the Kerry panel. To be honest, I wouldn't have aired that in public if I was the Kerry management - such fences are easiest mended behind closed doors. Shane has recently taken over the family concrete business and is a new father, there were fences that could be mended. That said, the will he/won't he nature of Cluxton's departure from Dublin football did them no favours last year.

Down got the perfect start, with Liam Savage and Caolan Taggart combining to set up man of the match Daithí Sandes for an instant goal. The rest of the first half was basically a free-taking duel between Shane Conway (0-8, 7f) and Down's Paul Sheahan (0-5, 4f, 1'65), sprinkled with a couple of great scores from Pádraig Boyle and Pierse Óg McCrickard on either side. Michael Leane had the last say of the first half after a superb Crossfield pass by the excellent Maurice O'Connor, to actually put in Kerry in front at the break.

Half-time Kerry 0-11 Down 1-7

Another brace from the youngest of the Boyle brothers and two uncharacteristic wides from Paul Sheahan meant that Kerry led by 0-14 to 1-9. Three on the trot from Sheahan restored Down's lead, though, and they never again surrendered it. The truth is that we weren't able to break down their sweeper system, with a spare man at the back always mopping up the loose ball. Kerry were a bit frustrated at referee Kevin Jordan's interpretation of the advantage rule, twice bringing back Kerry goal chances for Kerry frees, and one Down player was lucky enough to see yellow rather than red. But those would be fairly lame excuses, and shouldn't be allowed to gloss over the fact that Down's more limited hurlers looked sharper and hungrier all through.

After sixty minutes Down led by 1-16 to 0-16. There was still time to reel that in handily enough, especially on our home ground in Austin Stack Park. In fact, I felt that Down were running out of a little bit of steam. I didn't see a goal coming, but I honestly thought that we were not only capable, but quite likely to score the points to close the gap. 0-18 to 1-16, this was quite doable.

Except that we kept making small mistakes that Down were ruthless in punishing. Silly

defensive fouls and a lack of killer first touch just killed us. Paul Sheahan with two handy frees over the bar and a goal in it again. Daithí Sandes cut through on goal again...ah, jaysus, lads! Penalty! Oisín McManus, cool as a breeze, just tapped it over the bar to make it a four point game.

The only thing you can say for Kerry is that they didn't give up. Niall Mulcahy, not long off the bench, cut in on goal and Down stopped him in his tracks. Penalty, and a chance to make it a one point game.

It's the hope that kills you. Shane Conway hit a good penalty - but Stephen Keith was as fired up as the rest of his team, with the scent of a huge scalp in the offing, and he made a great save. The final whistle blew a minute later.

CRONIN PICKS POLO R5 FOR FIVE

Four-time British Rally Champion, Keith Cronin, is to return to the series in 2022 in a bid to equal the five-title tally of record holder, Jimmy McRae. Cronin will campaign a Volkswagen Polo R5 backed by Hankook Tire, and will be guided by Killarney native Mikie Galvin in the co-driver's seat. The BRC gets underway next weekend with the tarmac surface Rally Tendring & Clacton in Essex, and six further rounds follow between then and October.

"We did five events with Hankook last year as part of a development programme," explains Cronin. "We're doing the full championship this time, and I'm confident the work we did in 2021 will have paid off. I'm looking forward to getting out there with the Polo, the top two in last year's BRC drove them, they're a strong, well-engineered car, and seem to be especially suited to rallying in this part of the world."



Cronin had his debut in the Volkswagen on the recent Birr Rally, and he and Galvin were running in second place before a broken propshaft forced the Killarney & District Motor Club crew to retire. "We entered Birr as a test session really, it was our first day out in the car and our first dry tarmac rally since 2018," said Cronin following the event. "Obviously it would have been nicer to finish, but it's better that the prop went there rather than in Essex next weekend. Josh Moffett had won three rallies already this year, but we matched him on one stage and had an outright fastest time on another, so that's a cause for optimism".

There will be livestreams throughout the weekend on the British Rally Championship's facebook page, @BRCrally.

1 in 4 women admit wearing their seat belt incorrectly*

The Road Safety Authority (RSA) and An Garda Síochána are appealing to women to ensure that they are wearing their seat belts correctly when driving or as a passenger in a vehicle.

Research carried out by independent research company Behaviour & Attitudes for the RSA, found that 26% of women admitted to previously having worn the shoulder strap of their seat belt under their arm rather than on their shoulder. 11% of those surveyed who wear their seat belt under arm do so always or often. 32% indicate that their female friends wear their seat belt under their arm at least sometimes.

Placing the shoulder strap of the seat belt under your arm leaves your upper torso – including your neck, face and head – completely unrestrained during a collision. In such a situation you would be exposed to horrific injury.

The research showed that the main reasons for putting the seat belt under the arm were to relieve neck irritation.

If you are wearing your seat belt incorrectly it will provide little or no protection in the event of a crash. Whether for comfort or vanity, nothing is worth putting yourself at risk of serious or fatal injury. The message to everyone is to always wear your seat belt and wear it correctly. The belt should be worn diagonally across the wearer's chest on their shoulder and never under the arm. If it feels uncomfortable, adjust the height of the belt on the anchor point on the door frame or adjust the seat position and height. The survey found that almost 1 in 4 were surprised that how you wear your seat belt is as important as whether you wear a seat belt or not. Over 1 in 5 were surprised that vehicle occupants risk serious injury by putting their seat belt under their arm. 41% of respondents said they were surprised to learn that 1

in 4 car occupants killed on Irish roads in the past year were not wearing seat belts.

The RSA is running its online campaign "This Season's Killer Look" in a bid to reach young women. It will be fronted by a 30 second public service message that will be deployed on 'Video On Demand' (VOD) platforms. The ad is centred on a young model, posing for a fashion shoot in a glamorous car. As the shoot progresses, the model puts on her seat belt and places the belt under her arm. Suddenly, the model is thrown violently forward and the scene switches to an eerie x-ray world where we see clearly the devastating injuries sustained in a collision. When we switch back to reality, we see the model is wearing a neck and body brace and has scaring on her face.

Lifelong injuries now replace her glamorous look. The campaign slogan invites viewers not to get - 'This Season's Killer Look' – by never wearing a seat belt under the arm. The RSA sought the input of Gerry Lane, Consultant in Emergency Medicine at Letterkenny General Hospital, Donegal in developing the campaign.

Ireland's fifth government Road Safety Strategy 2021-2030 aims to reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries on Irish roads by 50% over the next 10 years. This means reducing deaths on Ireland's roads annually from 144 to 72 or lower and reducing serious injuries from 1,259 to 630 or lower by 2030. Some of the actions contained in the Road Safety Strategy to tackle non-seat belt use include.

Injuries to body following improper seatbelt use. Head: Collision with windscreen can result in severe facial scarring, and in some cases blindness, brain injury, neck spinal injury.

Mouth: Impact with the steering column or dashboard of a vehicle can cause severe damage to teeth, leading to victims needing extensive dental repair. May knock teeth down throat, shatter jaw, block airway.

Neck: Being thrown violently forward in a collision can cause serious injury to the neck and head, and may require surgical repair. May result in paralysis and/or partial or total paralysis.

Torso: Spinal damage caused by impact requires the wearing of a full-body cast (not always, only in "minor cases"), and may result in partial or total paralysis, life changing injuries.

Abdomen: Internal lacerations caused by improper seatbelt use can require extensive surgical repair, and may involve the victim requiring a colostomy bag for life.

Arm: Extreme fractures may need to be surgically repaired with metal rods and pins.

Leg: Extreme fractures may need to be surgically repaired with metal rods and pins.

SUMMER BEDDING

Its that time of year again when we think of putting colour in our pots, baskets and containers and also in the ground. Summer Bedding plants can be used very effectively in the ground for filling gaps between shrubs or border perennial plants as they can cover a lot of ground and add plenty of colour very quickly. When planting Summer bedding plants in the groun the first thing you have to do is to dig over the area



and dig in plenty of compost. Most Summer Bedding plants need a nice sunny sheltered position but if you have a shaded area, begonias are excellent bedding plants for this situation and they will give you flowers right through the summer and into early autumn As an added bonus they will also provide you with excellent coloured foliage from light green to dark purple. Always remember when planting bedding to put the taller ones at the back. If you want to do a summer display of bedding on its own in a bed you will have to choose a centre piece - a good plant for this would be a standard fuschia. Then start with the tallest, such as marigolds or antirrhinums and work your way out to the edge of the bed with some begonias or petunias and finally at the edge of the bed with some lobelia and alyssum. A good idea before you plant would be to position all your plants to get an overall view of what it will look like. And remember to water all plants well in



Welcome back dear student. "Let us therefore strive to enter that rest, so that no one may fall...." (Hebrews 4:11 ESV). Once I released myself into His arms He carried me instantly to the top of the mountain. I have never forgotten that dream, it is still as real today. I remember feeling total peace in God's arms. 
