## KILLARNEY OUTLOOK CHARITY FUNDRAISER

In a week when Kerry Hotelier John Brennan praised the work of the Kerry Cancer Support Group on the Late Late Show, Killarney Outlook are delighted to support this amazing charity in our magazine next week.

We are all aware that charities are one of the casualties of COVID-19 as many if not all of their fundraising activities have been postponed or cancelled.

In next week's Killarney Outlook, we are donating the proceeds of all of our advertising to the Kerry Cancer Support Group which provides many services but primarily they operate the Kerry Cork Health Link Bus which brings patients from Kerry and West Cork to to Cork University Hospital, Mercy University Hospital, Bon Secours Hospital and The Cork Clinic for cancer treatment free of charge five days a week.

In this week's Killarney Outlook, we speak to two people who used the services of the Kerry Cancer Support Group and who cannot praise it enough.

Tracy Sheehan from Fossa was 41 when she was diagnosed with breast cancer in the summer of 2013. Along with the shock, fear and anguish that goes with a cancer diagnosis, Tracy had to travel to CUH every day for radiation therapy. "Driving wasn't an option to me and 'Our Bus'

"Driving wasn't an option to me and 'Our Bus' saved me", Tracy told the Killarney Outlook.

"I was the youngest person in our group of heroes. We were all sick and scared so we vowed to mind each other when the bad days came. And they did. But the craic we had on the good days would rival kids on a school tour. There were songs sung, boxes of chocolates scoffed to beat the band, we told really bad jokes, we had wig talks, tips for 'bateing the heat' and sometimes we just sat and held each other's hands in silence. We talked about our loved ones and our dreams for the future. When you go through cancer, it's the loneliest place in the world. Our Bus changed that. We felt connected, our own little gang waging an inner war. We are

still friends to this day and always will be. Not all of us are still here. But they are forever in my heart. They made my journey easier and the love I feel remains as strong as ever. Thank you to all of you who help keep the bus on the road. It's life changing. And for that I am forever grateful to you all", Tracy said.

Due to COVID-19 the Kerry Cancer Support Group has had to increase their services to allow for social distancing on the bus. They have many volunteer drivers from Killarney and around the county who are always available to help and they ensure that there are masks gloves and sanitiser in all their vehicles and their drivers are temperature checked before each journey and the vehicles are cleansed before during and after each trip.

Another user of the bus is Graphic Designer Sheila Carroll.

Sheila was also diagnosed with breast cancer in 2013 and used the service of the Health Link Bus. "The health link bus made such a great difference during my treatment in 2013. At a time when life can be overwhelming you didn't need to worry about transport to your daily treatments in Cork. You were made feel comfortable from the off. The driver was so kind and welcoming. Little connections were made with fellow patients, we could share our experiences or you could take a nap as the bus was so comfortable. I thank the Kerry Cancer Support Group and I wish them continued success in the essential service they provide which is only possible through charitable donations:, Sheila told the Killarney Outlook.

Another service user, Nicky Barry, who regularly pens poetry for the Killarney Outlook will share his journey on the Heath Link Bus with us through poetry next week.

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# HOLLY TELLS HER STORY OF **POSITIVITY** AND **GOOD NEWS**

In the week where **Holly Power**, a student, at St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary School, won the 'Comórtais Óige' competition and secured 1st place in the senior students category, she shares her inspiring story following her cancer diagnosis with the readers of the **Killarney Outlook**.

entered the 'Comórtais Óige' competition as part of Seachtain na Gaeilge, mainly because my Irish teacher Ms. Healy Rae persuaded me to! The category I chose was to write a blog.

The piece could be based on any subject. After a lot of thought, I decided to write something original which was a light hearted twist on my own personal story. Reflecting on the journey of my cancer diagnosis, and having to repeat Transition Year. My piece gave an incite into my journey 'as Gaeilge' and I included a bit of craic throughout! It wouldn't be me otherwise!

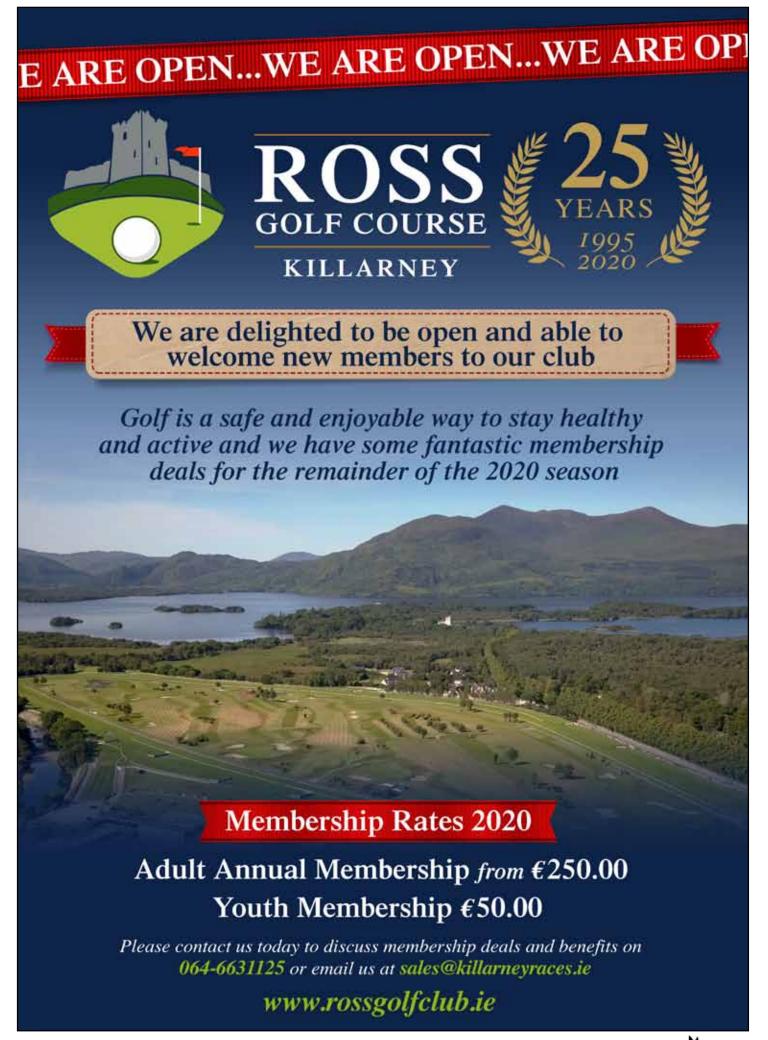
Last year I was a regular 16 year old girl in transition year. I enjoyed the year full of opportunities and new experiences. The summer had come and I was enjoying the time off playing football with my local club Dr. Crokes and had just finished the season with the Kerry u16 ladies. I had been sick on and off since January and had many numerous trips to the doctor with swollen glands in my neck, but it wasn't anything too serious or so I thought. It was only when I discovered I had another swollen gland under my right arm that things seemed a bit more serious than expected. I didn't worry too much when I was sent to Cork for a biopsy, which came back clear. It was a matter of 3/4 weeks of waiting for results of the surgery I underwent to remove the lypmhnodes from underneath my arm. It was a long process and a wait which felt like forever. It was a fabulous Wednesday evening. I was below at the pitch watching my team train. I was due to get the results of my lymph node removal that Friday, but my mom received a phone call from the hospital saying I had to be in Cork Thursday morning first thing. Positivity was probably my best friend at this point a trait I definitely get from my Grandad - one of the most positive people I know and I feel like it was a good thing to an extent, at the same time I had convinced myself I was going to be fine. However, when I got to the hospital that morning the wait was over. I had been diagnosed with Hodgkins Lymphoma. When I heard the words my initial reaction was



tears. I was shocked, confused and had so many questions I just wanted answered. What did it mean? What was going to happen to me? I think the words 'Cancer' can scare anybody both young or old. It's something that touches many families. I didn't have long to process the whole situation. It was a matter of hours before I had been sent to Cork University Hospital where I met with my oncology team. Who were amazing and I cannot thank enough! All my friends back home were out enjoying Ladies day at the races. I was seeing pictures of everybody all dressed up and enjoying themselves. I sat in the waiting room wondering how will my friends and family react when I tell them? Why did this have to happen to me? I was faced with all the facts that day in the room. I would be undergoing chemotherapy, losing my hair and my life was going to change just for the time being. That day I got to go and visit the unit where I would be receiving my Chemotherapy. It wasn't the best experience ,somewhere I never expected to be. I left Cork that day, with so many thoughts and emotions. I felt confused and like it wasn't real, almost as if someone would tell me that it wasn't true. But it was and I had to take time to understand that, everything happens for a reason. Don't get me wrong it was the most difficult thing I have ever had to process in my life. I had the best support network I could ask for and they were always there for me. From the second, I told everyone they supported everything I went through. My summer plans ended before they had even started. I began my first of 12 rounds of Chemotherapy in August. September had come and there were days I could barely leave the bed, so school would have been a struggle. I was due to be going into 5th year, but that was on hold for the time being. I would always have said that I enjoyed school and I loved seeing my friends everyday. It was a big change being at home and having to keep myself company. At the start, people might think it's a novelty not having to go to school, a few months off sure what more would you want! I wasn't long getting sick of it! My friends would come to visit me a lot and I was always in contact with them. As the time went on, I was missing out on more things than I expected. I had to choose a different mind set which helped to make myself feel better. I used to go and watch my Football team play their matches and support them from the sideline whenever I could. My life changed in ways that I couldn't control. However, I could control how I dealt with the changes. Looking and feeling different inside never changed anyone's opinion of me, whenever I was with my friends it was just like before no difference. I kept a positive attitude and was determined to get to the end of my journey. After what felt like forever, I received my last chemotherapy in January. I was looking forward to returning to school and slowly get my life back to a new normal. I have always enjoyed Irish in school and thanks to my two Irish teachers over the past two years Ms Collins and Ms Healy Rae. My standard of Irish has greatly improved. So I took the opportunity to enter this competition and express my personal story through my love







## KERRY'S POLITICIANS NEED TO **ACT NOW**

he Kerry Tourism Industry Federation (KTIF) is calling on Kerry's politicians to set aside their differences and mobilise behind their county as the Kingdom braces itself for the economic fallout from Covid-19.

According to an assessment commissioned by Kerry County Council and compiled by economist James Dorgan, the economy in Kerry is set to suffer losses of up to €1 billion in 2020 due to the impact of Covid-19 and a large percentage of this deficit will be due to the decline in tourism.

"This report makes for very grim reading, but we need to be realistic about the serious challenges facing our county," says Pat O'Leary, Kerry Tourism Industry Federation Chairperson. "It spells out, in no uncertain terms, that our tourism industry needs help now if we are to save people's incomes and livelihoods."

Before the Covid-19 pandemic, it is estimated that 1 in 5 jobs in Kerry were dependent on tourism, in fact Kerry is much more dependent on tourism than any other county in Ireland. According to the assessment, tourism and





related industries will see a drop of more than 70% in income this year which is the equivalent of nearly 10% of total estimated Kerry household incomes. The recent survey shows a direct hit to the tourism sector in Kerry of some half a billion Euro in 2020.

The assessment cites the lack of certainty around international travel regulations, the implications of social distancing and hygiene protocols on tourism operators, the seasonal nature of the industry and the precautionary reluctance of the domestic market as the major

contributory factors.

"We (KTIF) have already presented our public representatives with a number of measures which, if implemented, would help the tourism industry navigate its way through this crisis. We need our politicians to act on these measures now."

KTIF's programme of measures were identified after extensive consultation with Kerry tourism practitioners and engagement with Kerry County Council and other public bodies, and include immediate and long-term actions.

"This is a time for innovative solutions with a view to recovering the current situation and progressing a series of measures for the future of the Industry in the county. In particular immediate and ambitious financial intervention by Government is urgently required at this time. We look forward to, and have no doubt that with all parties working as a unified team that, the tourism industry in the county will recover and return to its pre Covid-19 position as the leader in the sector in the country." concludes O'Leary

## Appointment of Pat O'Leary good news for Kerry

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce is greatly encouraged by the setting up of a Tourism Recovery Task Force by the Government and, in particular, the appointment of Chamber member Pat O'Leary, to the group.

Pat, the retired Managing Director of Liebherr Container Cranes, was recently appointed Chairperson of the Kerry Tourism Industry Federation and he is a very strong and influential voice to represent the county.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President, Paul Sherry, said: "Given Pat's great experience and long track record of success in industry, I have absolutely no doubt that he will seamlessly settle into his new role, which will greatly benefit tourism, business and every aspect of the economic life of Kerry,"

The new Tourism Recovery Task Force has been charged with the responsibility of identifying measures required to enable Irish tourism to recover from the devastating effects of Covid-19 and how it can adapt and recover in the changed environment.

"In the aftermath of the last recession, tourism created 90,000 new jobs and with the right supports, the industry has a very important role to play going forward. Pat O'Leary can play a major role in that recovery and Killarney Chamber wishes the task force members every success with the important body of work that awaits them," Paul Sherry added.

St. Mary's Cathedral opened this week, on Wednesday for parishioners to have some personal prayer time, however the church still cannot have contregations for mass for some time yet.

A statement from St. Mary's Cathedral stted that "We are delighted that Bishop Ray has announced that we can reopen Churches for personal prayer, but we still need to be prudent and exercise caution and good hygiene practices. We are only opening the Cathedral at the moment so as to avail of the size of the Cathedral to help with distancing and also that we can manage cleaning etc there first. It will be open daily from 11am to 5.30pm. At the main entrance, the inner doors will be open so that people can enter and leave without touching door handles. There will have regular cleaning and have sanitiser dispensers in place. As people are doing for visiting other places, so also it is encouraged to wash your hands before leaving home and on return, using gloves or mask if you wish, being aware to touch as few surfaces as possible, allowing at least 2metres distance to others, being patient with others walking the aisles and not to congregate at candle shrines etc.

While the Cathedral will be closed during Mass time, it can be accessed on the parish radio and on the webcam via www.killarneyparish. com, praying for God's protection for us, for our loved ones, and for our society in these positive steps to increase movement.

"Visiting a church reminds all of us: that Christ is ever present in our midst; that the Mass continues to be celebrated in our parishes on behalf of and for us all; that we are strengthened by having time to turn to God each day in prayer", Bishop Ray Browne said.

Continue to observe 100% all Public Health restrictions and guidance. If your local community does not seem to have had people who contracted the virus, give thanks to God, and don't become complacent", he added.

The stories come in rotation from the eight Kerry districts – Caherciveen, Castleisland, Dingle/An Daingean, Kenmare, Killarney, Killorglin, Listowel and Tralee. Possible contributors are contacted by Storied Kerry's district directors – listed on the web site contact page.

The news on Kerry story, published in the storiedkerry.com diary page in the past weeks, covered a wide range. Tourism based on story developed by Batt Burns of Sneem over the past 25 years. The delayed launch of the Bonane dugout boat. A cuckoo orchestra performing at the foot of Mangerton. The recent difficulties highlight how lucky we are to live in Kerry.

The web site has a page on the annual Storied Kerry conference. Delagates from



all parts of Kerry have for the past two years beenentertained with Kerry story and informed on further ways we can become aware of the story. Details of the 2020 conference will be published on the site over the summer,

The storiedkerry.com web site initiative is aimed at encouraging every Kerry person – by birth or inclination - to write, record or photograph stories on their part of Kerry. To get involved or submit a story contact the districts through the website's contact page. This is an initiative of Storied Kerry/Ciarrai Scealach a group of volunteers, all involved in Kerry story, who believe that a greater awareness of our story will bond us more closely to our own place and in this way enrich and enhance our lives – socially, culturally and economically.

The web site is developed in conjuntion with the Institute of Technology in Tralee. It is designed by founding technical editor Phillip Doyle, Dept of Creative Media & Information Technology, IT Tralee.

"We have spent the last three years working towards this site," chairperson of Storied Kerry Frank Lewis says the plan was to launch next September, "but then it was felt people had time at the moment and it was a unique opportunity to be distracted and engaged by our story and its potential. The enthusiasm for the site has shown this was right."

Ciarrai Scealach was started to help existing and new independent Kerry story initiatives. Storiedkerry.com tells that these have included:

- stimulating Kerry communities, commercial concerns and public bodies to look at developing their own 'story-house' with its library of local story, on-going collection and research, performance and training.
- Fexco digitising the 250,000 pages of Kerry material in the National Folklore Collection.
- \* Piloting story initiatives in primary. second and third level schools.
- \* Encouraging 'story-rooms' and continuing storytelling in libraries.
- \* Encouraging churches to tell the Christian story of their hinterland
- \*The extensive collection of Kerry nuns stories. As well as working as a catalyst Storied Kerry also aims to inform and train, to explore access to funding and to get Kerry story the status it deserves. A key ambition is to get Kerry story UNESCO World Heritage status.

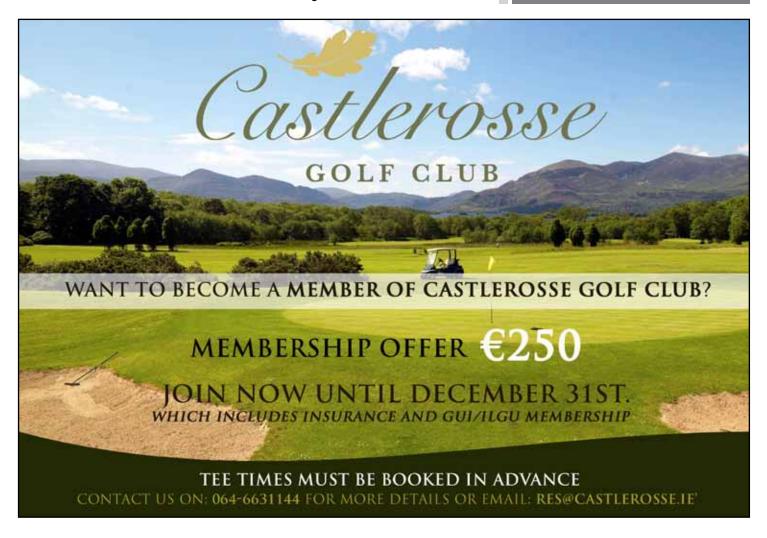

## IN THE OUTDOORS

Golf Clubs in Killarney including Killarney Golf & Fishing Club, Castlerosse Golf Club and the Ross Golf Club welcomed members who lived within 5k of the course this week as Phase 1 of the Government's Roadmap for the reopening of Society and Business began on Monday last.

Agencies and organisations involved in the delivery and promotion of outdoor amenities have welcomed the recognition of the importance of the outdoor recreation, which plays an important role in supporting the physical and mental wellbeing of society and people are encouraged to enjoy the outdoors while adhering to Government protocols and public health guidelines.

One significant change in Phase 1 means that from May 18th, people can exercise using outdoor public amenities - either on their own or in a group of no more than 4 people - where social distancing can be maintained and where there is no contact with other people. #### Agencies and organisations are advising members of the public to:

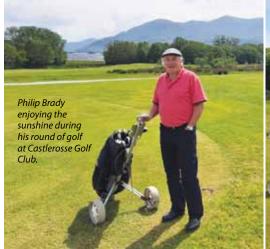

Exercise with members of your household or a maximum of 3 people from outside your household. Observe physical distancing by keeping at least 2 metres apart. Park legally and responsibly if driving to outdoor amenities. Keep dogs on a lead at all times. Respect the natural environment and dispose of waste properly. The outdoors is a valuable amenity for all members of society to enjoy. People are encouraged to take personal responsibility and adhere to the spirit of the guidance so that the outdoors remains accessible to all for the duration of restrictions.

## PUCK FAIR 2020 IS CANCELLED

Puck Fair 2020, which was due to take place on August 10th through 12th, has been cancelled.

In a statement from it's chairman Declan Falvey, he said "We have been monitoring the situation since the onset of the virus and as the health, wellbeing and safety of our visitors, volunteers and residents is paramount, and to comply with government legislation and guidelines, we have made the difficult decision to cancel all Puck Fair events this year.

"We would like to thank the public in advance, for their ongoing support and cooperation in complying with Government legislation and the World Health Organization's Health and Safety Guidelines. We look forward to bringing Puck Fair back to Killorglin in 2021", he said





The Office of Public Works (OPW) has announced that the Skellig Michael World Heritage Property will not open to visitors in 2020 because of Covid–19 concerns. Opening of the Island heritage site had been scheduled to take place on 15th May but this will not now happen. In light of the continuing restrictions governing the reopening of tourism locations, which is generally to begin in Phase 1 after May 18th, the OPW, in liaison with the Department

of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, have concluded that it was not feasible to maintain visitor and staff safety at Skellig and that the Island must remain closed to visitors this summer. OPW intend to carry out a maintenance inspection next week when key National Monuments technical staff will travel to the Island for the first time this year.

# Council publishes independent assessment of impact of covid-19 pandemic on Kerry economy

Anticipated €1bn impact on Kerry incomes in 2020 Research and data will inform recovery policies and initiatives All sectors working with Council on economic recovery

 $\mathbf{K}$ erry County Council has published a comprehensive assessment of the anticipated economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on County Kerry. The analysis, compiled by an independent economist, James Dorgan, and with input from Kerry Tourism Industry Federation, IT Tralee, Kerry Chambers Network and the wider business sector in the county, identifies the challenges posed by the current public health emergency and will inform local actions and policies to achieve economic recovery locally in the months and years ahead.

in the months and years ahead.
Drawing on a wide range of economic, demographic and employment research, 'The Economic Impact of COVID-19 on the Economy of County Kerry' finds that the current crisis is having, and will continue to have, significant economic consequences in Kerry, particularly given its exposure in the tourism sector. Drawing on existing and new research, the report finds that the impact will equate to a loss to the Kerry

economy of €1billion in income in 2020, with approximately 40% of that loss of income being borne by the tourism industry. Other elements of the research include:

Tourism and related industries will see a €400m (drop of 70% in income) impact this year, the equivalent of nearly 10% of total estimated Kerry household incomes

Kerry has the highest relative dependence on tourism income per capita by county

Of the estimated 69,000 people in the labour force in Kerry, the largest employment cohort is in the retail and wholesale trade followed by hotels and restaurants 93% of active enterprises in Kerry are micro-enterprises and employ less than 10 people

36% of 'at work' residents in Kerry were in receipt of the Government Pandemic Unemployment Payment in the middle of May 2020. When added to the numbers on the Wage Subsidy Scheme and the Live Register, this equates to two-thirds of 'at work' residents in the county

An assessment of the likely impact in sectors including agriculture, retail, manufacturing and construction based on national and local projections

The research has been supplemented by surveys of



businesses undertaken by Kerry County Council and the Kerry Tourism Industry Federation recently to gauge the expected impact across many economic sectors. Among the findings were that half of businesses in the county are anticipating a decline of between 50% and 75% in their incomes over the next twelve months.

The Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr Niall Kelleher, said the report is a critical piece of research which will inform initiatives which will support the reopening of the economy locally.

There is no doubting the economic impact of COVID-19 in Kerry but it is vital that we quantify that in this way. The figures are stark and indicate the challenge we all face to restore economic activity in the county but having this data will help us to target supports, investment and promotional initiatives to where they are needed most, he said.

Chief Executive of Kerry County Council, Moira Murrell said the report is being considered closely by council management and elected members. It will also shape the continuing discussion of a new Business Leaders and Interests Group in the county and Kerry County Council's own Economic Recovery Team and will guide a series of actions and initiatives which will be rolled over the coming weeks and months.

'This research will be made available to all sectors in the economy to help guide their approaches. A new group including business leaders and local agencies has already begun the discussion on the initiatives which will be taken in the coming weeks and months to deal with the impact of the crisis on local businesses as well as leading out on the marketing and promotion of the county as normal economic activity resumes,' she said.

'We have already activated a series of practical supports for businesses in the county through the Local Enterprise Office and our Economic Development Unit. There is also important work being done in the tourism sector and other industries which complements that. This research which we are publishing today will inform efforts to reopen the Kerry economy into the future,' said Ms Murrell.

#### Revenue issue warning regarding fraudulent messages

This week the Revenue Commissioners have become aware of fraudulent emails and SMS (text messages) purporting to come from Revenue. Some of these seek personal information (name, address, date of birth) from taxpayers and/or seek credit card, debit card or bank account details in connection with a tax or wage subsidy refund.

These emails and text messages did not issue from Revenue.

The Revenue Commissioners never send emails or text messages requiring customers to send personal information via email, text or pop-up windows.

Anyone who receives an email or text message purporting to be from Revenue and suspects

it to be fraudulent or a scam should simply delete it. Anyone who is actually awaiting a tax or wage subsidy refund should contact their Revenue Office to check its status.

Anyone who provided personal information in response to these fraudulent emails or text messages should contact their bank or credit card company immediately.

#### Kerry enterprises urged to apply to Restart Grant for Small Business - Griffin

Minister of State for Tourism and Sport, Brendan Griffin TD has urged small and micro businesses across Kerry to apply for the new €250m Restart Grant, which will give direct grant aid to help them with the costs associated with reopening and reemploying workers following COVID-19 closures.

Minister Griffin said: "The Grant will be available to businesses with a turnover of less than €5m and employing 50 people or less, which were closed or impacted by at least a 25% reduction in turnover out to 30th June 2020.

"It is a contribution towards the cost of reopening or keeping a business operational and re-connecting with employees and customers. "The grants will be equivalent to the rates bill of the business in 2019, with a minimum payment of €2,000 and a maximum payment of €10,000." Minister Griffin continued: "I am acutely aware of the difficulties facing small businesses in Kerry during these challenging times.

"The Restart Grant is designed to help these

businesses get back on their feet. The grant can be used to defray ongoing fixed costs, for replenishing stock and for measures needed to ensure employee and customer safety.

"Small businesses, whether it be the local hairdresser, café or clothes shop, are absolutely vital to the social fabric of our towns and villages throughout Kerry.

"In response to the very significant economic challenges posed by Covid-19, the Government has moved swiftly to introduce a range of measures to support enterprises of all sizes.

"These measures have included supports for wage costs, liquidity supports and the deferral or waiver of payments.

"The Restart Grant will further help to support activity and employment across Kerry," Minister Griffin said.

Minister for Business, Enterprise and Innovation, Heather Humphreys, said: "These businesses have made huge sacrifices to protect their employees and customers during COVID-19 and we want to help them get back up and running so that they can return to viability and contribute to the national economic recovery.

"These are small grants but they can make a big difference in terms of giving businesses an extra helping hand to open their doors again." Applications for the Restart Grant can be made online to Kerry County Council from Friday 22nd May. Processing of applications and payment of the Restart Grant will depend on the initial surge of applications but, as far as is feasible, will be prioritised according to scheduled re-opening dates in the national Roadmap.

This direct grant support is part of the wider €12bn package of supports for firms of all sizes, which includes grants, low-cost loans, write-off of commercial rates and deferred tax liabilities, all of which will help to improve cashflow amongst our SMEs.

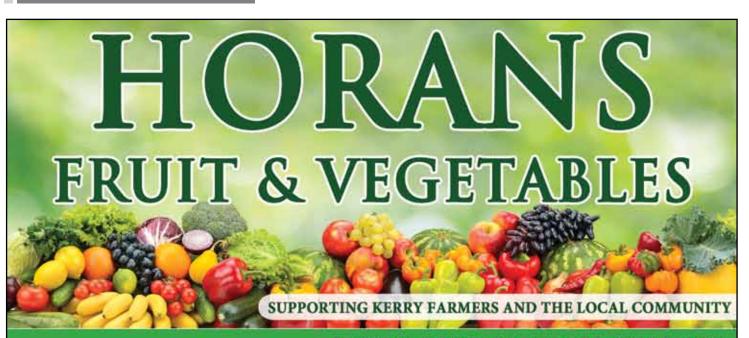

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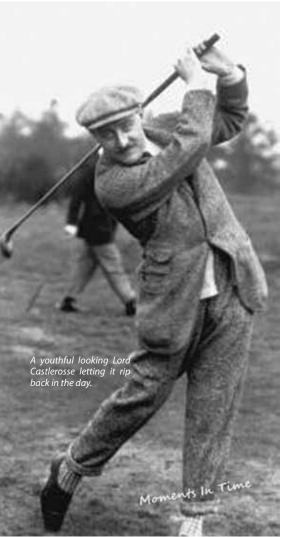






## MOMENTS IN TIME

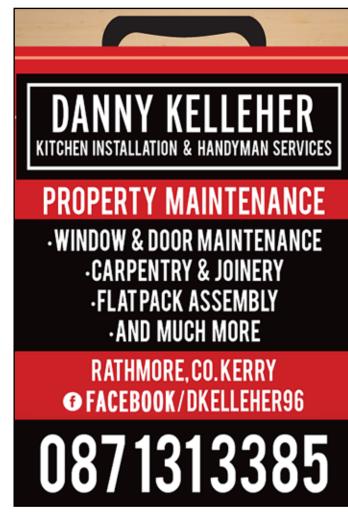

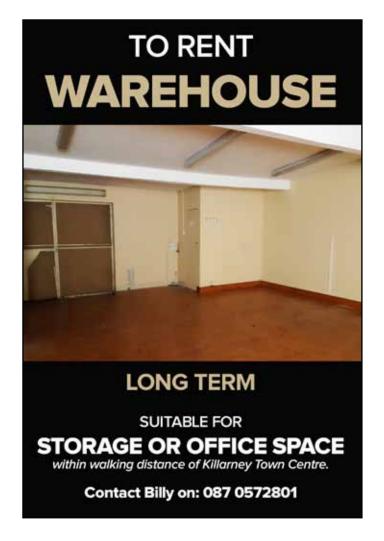

#### WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. 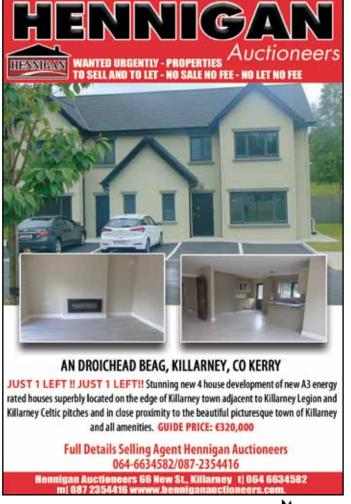
Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

**Taxable Cash:** You may be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash. Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income, usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. 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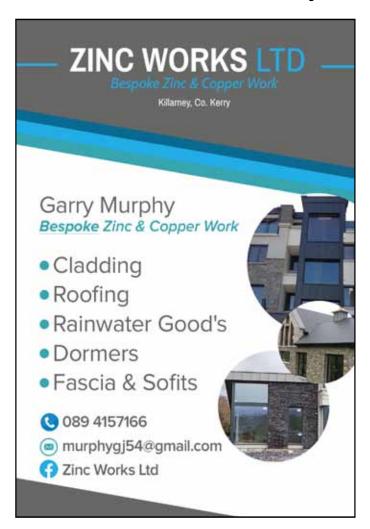

# LEARNER DRIVERS

# LEFT IN LIMBO! - Norma Foley TD

Rural drivers severely disadvantaged

Transport Minister needs to outline the government's plan for dealing with the backlog of provisional licences and driving tests, which is continuing to build up during the Coronavirus restrictions.

Deputy Foley said "Learner drivers here in Kerry, particularly in rural areas, are very frustrated with the current situation. Some younger drivers had hoped to get their provisional licence at the beginning of the summer so that they could help out on local and family farms. Without their licences they're unable to drive tractors or other farm machinery.

"Another cohort of learner drivers may have been dependent on older relatives to act as their qualified driver, but with some parents having to cocoon, these drivers have been left in the lurch. They're worried about how long the will have to wait before they can get their test and get back in their cars again. Access to a car is hugely important in a rural county like Kerry.

"Driving tests were suspended when the government implemented the COVID-19 restrictions back in March, so people with learner permits have been unable to sit their tests for around 8 weeks now. Despite the suspension of the tests, applications are still being processed, which will inevitably lead to bigger backlogs once they resume again.

"The average waiting time for a driving test before the COVID restrictions was 4 weeks, and with new applications being submitted over



the past two months, learner drivers could be waiting months once the tests resume.

"Young people have already been asked to make considerable sacrifices to fight the spread of COVID-19, and many are facing into considerable uncertainty in terms of school, work and other aspects of their life. I believe the Department needs to begin examining options to alleviate the backlog of provisional licence and driver test applications." concluded Deputy Foley.

# CLLR. CALLS FOR BIODEGRADABLE BALLOONS

This week Cllr. Michael Gleeson received a reply to a Notice of Motion he proposed at the October 2019 monthly meeting of Kerry County Council,.

He proposed: "As non-biodegradable Balloons are a major cause of damage to Wildlife on land and in water that this Council calls on the Government to insist all Balloons sold in Ireland are biodegradable".

The following reply has been just received from Mr. Richard Bruton T.D., Minister for Communications & Climate Action.

"The delay in replying is regretted. The position is that in June 2019, the EU Commission published Directive (EU) 2019/904 on the reduction of the impact of certain plastic products on the environment. This Directive is often referred to as the Single Use Plastics Directive. It obliges all EU Member States, including

Ireland, to reduce the amount of single use items used in their territory. The Directive makes no differentiation between biodegradable,compostable or plastic balloons. Under the Directive Member States are obliged to introduce an Extended Producer Responsibility scheme for balloons by 2024".

Councillor Gleeson stated that he is very disappointed with the reply from the Minister as 2024 is much too far into the future. The amount of environmental damage and degradation that will occur in the interim will most likely be considerable. He asks that the Irish Government would insist on an earlier date for the introduction of the Directive and that the manufacture of plastic balloons would cease and be replaced with biodegradable product.

# NEW MOTHERS DISCRIMINATED AGAINST - Norma Folev TD

(Wage Subsidy Scheme Fails To Include Women Returning From Maternity Leave) Norma Foley TD says urgent changes are needed to ensure that new mothers who are finishing up their maternity leave can apply for the Temporary Wage Subsidy Scheme.

Many women returning to work have been told that they can't apply for the scheme as they were not on the payroll in the months before it was introduced. The scheme requires workers to have valid payslips from January and February in order to process their application.

Deputy Foley explained, "Returning to work after having a baby can be difficult at the best of times, but in the midst of a global pandemic and concerns about the future of their job, the current situation has made this transition even more challenging. What's worse is the fact that that many of these women have been told that they don't qualify for the Temporary Wage Subsidy Scheme. This is nothing short of discrimination and wholly unacceptable treatment women".



"This is an extremely stressful time for households right across Kerry, but this situation seems particularly cruel. My party has already raised the issue with the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Employment Affairs & Social Protection but nothing has been done to-date. This is simply not acceptable and must be addressed as a matter of priority" she concluded.

# **KEEPING EVERYONE FIT AT HOME**

#### ······ WITH **KILLARNEY OUTLOOK**

Emir Coffey who owns and runs Muckross Pilates & Barre classes is this week passing her skills to enable everyone, inlcuding the elderly, to keep fit. Below I have set out 4 exercises that you can do from the comfort of your chair. For some short seated exercises videos please look at my YouTube channel Muckross Pilates & Barrre. Stay active, healthy and safe but only do what feels

comfortable, exercises should not be painful. I have added in some hand exercises this week, an area we often forget to exercise. You can do one hand at a time or the two together. For some exercises I am using a soft ball but a small cushion can be used as an alternative.

For all 4 exercises, sit up nice and tall with the shoulders relaxed, making sure that you are sitting forward in the seat and not sitting all the way back into it. Start off with a few breaths, breathing in through the nose and out through the mouth. Engage your core muscles by gently pulling your belly button in and up. Remember, only do what feels comfortable, these exercises should not be



1) Hand clenches Make a tight clench with your fists. Then open out the hands spreading the fingers as wide as you can. Repeat 8 to 10 times, or as many as you feel able to



2) Forming circles with fingers Like in the previous exercise, spread the fingers out wide. Then touch the thumb and the baby finger together to form a circle. Then spread the fingers wide again. Then touch the thumb and the ring finger together to form a circle. Spread the fingers wide. Repeat with the middle finger and the index finger. Reverse the direction, starting with the index finger work back down to the baby finger. Repeat the full exercise 2 to 3 times or as many as you feel able.



3) Ball compressions

Sitting tall, hold the ball/ cushion between the palms close to the chest. Keeping the shoulders relaxed but keep the elbows high. Inhale to prepare and as you exhale squeeze the ball, holding for a count of 4. Inhale and relax. Repeat 8 to 10 times, or as many as you feel able to do.



4) Seated cycling

Like in the previous exercise sit nice and tall holding the ball between the palms in front of the chest. Gently squeezing the ball, engage the core muscles and hover the two feet off of the ground. Then pretend the you are cycling a bike and circle the legs in a forward motion for 6 to 8 rotations, then reverse the direction pedalling backwards for 6 to 8 rotations. Relax and lower the feet. Make sure to keep breathing throughout. If you feel able, repeat the exercise.

Peter **McCarthy** from **B-WELL FITNESS** gives us some exercises that we can do at home. It is important to warm up first - so follow Peter's advice and use this time to increase your fitness levels.

Repeat each of these exercises back to back for 4sets with only 1 mins recovery between each set

Exercise 1: Jab combos- 30secs Exercise 2: wall sits - 30secs

Exercise 3: slow mountain climber singles into donkey kick 20secs each side

Exercise 4: combo matrix Press up x 4, 4x knees in slow, 4 legs out , 4 heal taps - 1mins

# CAO Applicants have until 1st July to avail of the "Change of Mind" facility

f we were living in normal times, the state exams would be just a fortnight away. Not this year however, as the state exams have been scuppered by the Coronavirus pandemic. But there is still an important task to be undertaken by those who hope to progress to third level education in September. Applicants to the Central Applications Office (CAO) should now turn their attention to the "Change of Mind" facility which affords them an opportunity to register a change of course choices online by 5.15pm on Wednesday, 1st July. Now that they don't have exams to worry about, CAO applicants have the advantage of some extra time for career research. Use the next six weeks well and wisely to make sure that you submit the course choices that you really favour for third level

Not all applications to CAO avail of the change of mind facility as many of them are happy with the course choices they submitted by 1st February. On the other hand, you might have done further course research or you might have changed your mind about your earlier choices. Whatever your reason for submitting a change of mind form, make sure you know exactly what you are applying for. Don't list any courses which you haven't researched. Don't apply for any course

that you won't accept. Never apply for a course in which you have no interest just because your friends are applying for it.

If you decide to submit a change of mind form, work on your choices before going online. Don't tinker with your original list while online as it's easy to make a mistake. Start from scratch and prepare a new list of courses. Then open your CAO account via the "My Application" facility. Click on "Add Level 8 Course Choices" and/or "Add Level 7/6 Course Choices." Then use the "New Courses" list to enter your new course choices. Every choice is important so fill up all ten choices in each category.

Check the minimum and special requirements for each course you intend putting on the change of mind form. Don't list any course which has been cancelled, but you may include any new courses which were announced after the 2020 CAO Handbook was published. All of this information is easily accessible on the CAO website, www.cao. ie. The two course categories – Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) and Level 7/6 (Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates) are totally separate for the purpose of submitting a change of mind form. You may change one category and leave the second category unchanged or you may

change both. On the other hand, you may decide to stick with the choices you submitted by 1st February last.

If you make changes to your course choices online, an acknowledgement will be sent to your email address. Check that your courses have been updated by using the "My Application" facility. You may change your course choices free of charge as often as you wish up to the closing date. The final change of mind form that you submit is the one that will count for your CAO offers later in the year, so check online by 5.15pm on 1st July to make sure that all is in order.

After the 1st July you can make no further changes to your CAO application form. So, avail of the remaining weeks to give some serious thought to your course choices. With the state exams off the agenda, you can give your undivided attention to submitting a "change of mind" form that truly contains your course interests. It will be time well spent if you achieve your course of choice when the college offers are issued later in the year.

Sean Wight, Tadhg Kennelly, Tommy Walsh, Padraig Lucey, Mark O'Connor, more recently Deividas Uosis and Stefan Okunbor liked that game so much they stayed down under playing it. David was always involved in sport. He was an outstanding footballer on an outstanding Castleisland District team. In 2014 they played Mid Kerry in the County Final. It was and is quite simply the best game of football that I have ever seen - and yes, you can throw in any All Ireland Final that you like into the mix; this was better. Two fit, hungry, incredibly skillful teams who gave it absolutely everything. In the end Castleisland won it by a single point, 2-14 to 3-9. That team had Richard Cotter and Seamus Scanlon on the sideline. The Horan twins, Shay Walsh, Luke Brosnan, Sean O'Connell in midfield, Danny Hickey and Brosna's Paul Walsh up front.... serious talent allied to serious application. It was Castleisland's first county title at Coiste na nÓg. Two years later the two sides met again, this time in the U16 County Final. And it was another great battle, with David again in the thick of things at centre back. Castleisland were again victorious, with Eddie Horan scoring 2-3 out of their 4-4 total.

By 2017 he played midfield in a North Kerry Minor Final and his obvious talent was attracting attention outside his own parish. David was part of an age group that looked like missing out on minor grade when it was changed from U18 to U17 in 2017 (despite our own phenomenal success at the grade, I'd prefer to see that decision reversed). There were two Kerry minor teams that year, a U17 and U18 team, both of them managed by current Kerry senior manager Peter Keane. The U18s won the All Ireland, but the U17s came a cropper at semi-final stage in Ennis against Roscommon; it was just one of those days where Kerry just could not click into gear. Gaelic football and rugby are natural



sports in Castleisland. American football....not so much. David's father Jack says that he had the grá for it early on, though. David's older brother Robert loved the game and introduced it his younger brother. By the time that David was 10, the pair were staying up late to watch the Superbowl. "David loved the atmosphere, the razzmatazz, the whole thing. He was a bit later discovering the colleges football and he loved that straightaway as well, he wanted to make it. I suppose his lightbulb moment, in a sense, came when he realised that there was an obvious pattern of Australian guys kicking college ball." "After watching for a while I started to notice that a lot the punters and kickers were Australian. They were really the only international guys that were getting scholarships to play football at these big colleges.

"I got the notion that I could be a punter. I was just kicking the balls as hard as I could without any emphasis on technique. After a while, I started to research more about it and how the professional guys did it. I started to improve a lot once I started doing that. I used to film myself kicking and then break it down to see how I compared to guys that were in the NFL. The key when kicking an American football is to get it to spin a certain way, it's called a spiral. If you get the ball to spiral properly it goes a lot higher and farther than it would if you just kick it like a Gaelic football. To get it to spiral you have to drop the balls really flat and try and kick the 'sweet spot' of the ball, which is around the middle of it."

Donie O'Sullivan, Kerry's All Ireland winning captain in 1970 and first All Star in 1971, was a noted kicker and was invited to punt for St. Johns College in Queens, New York, while studying there. They soon realised how serious he was about the art – he stood out so much in a game against the New York Jets that they offered him a professional contract to play alongside Joe Namath. Darragh O'Neill, son of Cork footballer Colm and nephew of Maurice Fitzgerald, played for the Colorado Buffaloes.



The Ray Guy Award (William 'Ray' Guy is a Hall of Famer and the benchmark for punters) is given to the best 'punter' (i.e. kicker) in colleges football. Six of the last seven came through Prokick in Melbourne, a professional academy run by two former NFL players. So David put a video clip of his kicking and emailed it to them. Natural talent is one thing. Dedication to training and improvement is another. But the intelligence to see and the nerve and ambition to send that email....look, at that age I was hardly mature enough to be let into town on my own. John Smith and Nathan Chapman were obviously impressed as well. John Smith rang David the following day and flew over from Manchester to have a look at this kid from Castleisland. At 18 years of age David flew halfway across world to Melbourne to fulfill his dream. "It was obviously a big decision to make, moving across the world on my own at 18, leaving home for the first time. But it was something I just really wanted to do and it just felt right. While my parents thought I was mad, they were extremely supportive and I definitely could not have done any of it without them. I moved to Melbourne at the end of last August and I absolutely loved it. I lived in a house with five other guys doing Prokick. We trained every day, in the gym and on the field so we were always really busy. It was an unbelievable experience. I really enjoyed every bit of it."

He made good use of his time. College football is huge in America and the big universities are always keeping an eye out for talent. Prokick have a reputation backed up by a record of unearthing talent. Georgia Tech, the 'Yellow Jackets', are one of the big dogs – they play in the ACC Football Conference against the likes of Duke, Virgina, Miami, Pittsburgh. They were due to play Notre Dame, the 'Fighting Irish' next November. A scholarship to Georgia Tech is big time football. They look for the best and make them better.

# **KILLARNEY'S SPORTING YEAR-1951**

This was the year that Minister Noel Browne tried to introduce the Mother and Child Scheme and ended up being forced to resign under pressure from an affronted catholic church, especially the tyrannical (albeit sincerely devout) Archbishop John Charles McQuaid, who was arguably more powerful at the time than taoiseach John A. Costelloe – moral welfare was his business, not the Governments. It was a different age – Dr. Browne's challenge to their authority would not be the last.

One of the greatest boxing matches of all time took place this year – 'Raging Bull Jake LaMotta had no answer to the panache of Sugar Ray Robinson.

Superglue, power steering, and videotapes were all invented this year. So was the first commercial computer

#### **FOOTBALL**

The 1951 County Football Championship was a bit convoluted. The format was similar to the current club championship structure, with teams playing off in a league system before advancing to knock-out stages. Remember, the calendar was less packed than now in the absence of a County League (Dr. Jim Brosnan brought that in as County Chairman in 1971, but twenty years earlier he was a Kerry footballer alongside his brother Mick, both of them sons of the great Con Brosnan of Moyvane.

'Killarney' had one team in 1951, and reached the 1950 County Final, but lost to Castleisland. One of Castleiosland's best players on the day. the hugely popular Kerry Junior Paddy Batt Shanahan, won the 1949 County Final...with Killarney! It was a common enough in those times for players to switch clubs along with work or residency changes. Fitzgeralds' keeper Donal Marcus O'Neill was originally from Farranfore but soon joined Killarney Legion before moving to Cahirsiveen this year - he would win three County Championships with South Kerry and play for Kerry (he famously refused to play in 1957 when Kerry were sensationally beaten by Waterford, Until his sad recent passing, you could meet himself and Junior Murphy at any game in Con Keating Park, great company and good judges the pair of them always.

In 1951 Killarney was an amalgamation powered mainly by Legion players. Dick Fitzgerald was a combined team with Dr. Crokes and what we now call Eoghan Ruiadh (Kilcummin, Glenflesk, Rathmore, and Gneeveguilla), But Rathmore felt that the name Dick Fitzgeralds was too identifiable with Dr. Crokes. Newly elected East Kerry Chairman Fr. James Galvin of Glenflesk Parish (he would soon be transferred

to Moyvane and eventually end up in Fossa) tried to resolve the dispute. Frankly, there was merit and stupidity on both sides of the argument. Rathmore, who had a good team at that time, entered the championship on their own - a bad early blow for the Dick Fitzgeralds. Rathmore failed to get out of the group stage. Killarney won their first two games, walloping Mid Kerry and winning a hard battle against St. Marys. The second round game on the same day between Mid Kerry and Shannon Rangers saw the opening of JP O'Sullivan Park in Killorglin. Killarney had great players in the Lynes of Cleeney (Denny, Jackie, and sharpshooter Teddy all played) and Paddy O'Connor of Deenagh Rangers (Kilcummin parish had two teams at the time, Wolfe Tones and Deenagh Rangers). However, a quarter-final against Rahillys, and especially the young midfielder nameed John Dowling who was soon to make his championship debut for Kerry, proved a step too far.

Dick Fitzgeralds beat Listowel comfortably enough but gave a walkover to John Mitchels. That meant that it came down to the final group game, and Fitzgeralds won a cracker against Kenmare by 1-8 to 1-6. Iveragh (the old South Kerry) were a tough proposition in the quarter-final, but the Killarney outfit prevailed by 1-7 to 0-3 thanks to a kicking exhibition by Tadghie Lyne. Shannon Rangers took Dick Fitzgerald's to a replay. Fittingly, on the 21st anniversary of the great man and first East Kerry Chairman's passing, the team named after him made him gave their best display and won easily by 4-8 to 0-5.

Dingle came through the other side, beating Rahillys in the semi-final. Dingle were something of a superpower in the forties, Fr. Jackie McKenna's school leagues were a big factor. Paddy Bawn Brosnan and his brother Tim ('Timaleen Deas'), Bill Casey (a nephew of Paddy Casey and an uncle of Brian Mullins, two great Dublin footballers in different eras), Tom Ashe, Mick Murphy (he would soon join Kerins O'Rahillys and play for Kerry), Tom Long (Paidi Ó Sé's first cousin was a great player, but very young in 1951, he would transfer to Dr. Crokes when he arrived as a teacher in Fossa) and Bill Dillon were all well-known, and with good reason.

The final was a fitting one for the times. That is to say, it was more about strength than skill. The Kerryman expressed it as mildly as they could "It was a keenly contested game, at times over-vigorous, and if the referee had sent a couple of players to the sideline, nobody could have blamed him." Scores were hard to come by. Dick Fitzgeralds led by 0-4 to 0-1 at half-time and ended up winning by 1-7 to 0-3.

Dick Fitzgeralds: Donal Marcus O'Neill, Denis Will Fleming, Donie Murphy (the Kerry player had marked Kevin Heffernan as a minor in 1946 and would later be a great mentor in Mayo), Andrew Larkin, Miah Larkin, Teddy O'Connor (Captain), Paddy Tangney, Michael O'Leary, Billy Will Fleming, Donal Prendeville, Pa Joe Teahan, Connie Riordan, Dan Kavanagh, Tadghie Lyne (the best sharpshooter of the era), and Gerald Teahan. Donie Sheahan came on in the forwards and played well – the Killarney pharmacist would later coach East Kerry to three County titles and advise Mick O'Dwyer as a Kerry selector.

Dick Fitzgeralds also won the County Minor Championship, with Michael 'Coiny' O'Connor (future Chairman of the Munster Council and principal of Anabla NS) scoring a cracking goal to turn the tide against Austin Stacks. Notable names on that team include Sean O'Shea the Kerry hurler, Paddy 'Bomber' O'Shea, Pa Joe Cronin the future hurler, Fr. Paddy O'Donoghue, John Cahill from Headford, and Michael O'Callaghan and John O'Leary (the future TD) from Kilcummin.

Kerry beat Cork in the Munster Final by 1-6 to 0-4 thanks to a last minute goal by Dermot Hanafin and heroic defending by Paddy Bawn Brosnan. Mayo, with big Eamonn Mongan and John McAndrew in midfield and the likes of Sean Flanagan, Padraig Carney, and Peter Solan, were hot favourites for the semi-final. Henry Kenny, one of the best players in the country, was a newly elected TD who was celebrating the recent birth of his son Enda.

Kerry held them to a 1-5 apiece draw the first time out. In fact Kerry should have won that, having led by four points as injury time started, only for Tom Langan to poach a goal and they snatched an equaliser. Kerry lost out in the replay by 2-5 to 1-5, Sean and Mick Flanagan goaling for Kerry and Pat Godley for Kerry. That Kerry team included Donie Murphy, Jackie Lyne, and Gerald O'Sullivan of Legion, Micksie Palmer who had previously played with Legion (he was a Kenmare man) and John Joe Sheehan of Firies. Tim Healy of Dr. Crokes came on as a sub and Tommy Cooper of Legion was also on the bench. Mayo went on to win the All Ireland if you had told me at the time that it would be their last All Ireland win, I'd have laughed (also, I'd have been very surprised, considering that I wasn't even born).

Kerry beat Cork to win their seventh Munster title in a row, but lost to eventual champions Armagh after a replay in the All Ireland semi-final. Laois native Ben Campion had been assiduously promoting hurling in Killarney. It was working; Killarney won the County Minor Final

this year. Johnny Culloty would wear a Kerry jersey for the first time as a result, lining out as goalkeeper with the Kerry minors – he was just 14 years of age when he was called in for trials. Killarney's seniors caused absolute sensation in this year's County Championship, beating redhot favourites Lixnaw by 4-5 to 4-1, to qualify for the County Final. Crotta had hammered Killarney by 3-3 to 0-1 in their very first game but this was a different Killarney. Crotta led by 2-2 to 1-1 at half-time and Killarney couldn't reel them in, but Killarney was on Kerry's hurling map.

That same November, a 39 year old Cork hurter who had made his inter-county debut in 1937 as a minor at the opening of the Fitzgerald Stadium scored 6-4 against Wexford in a National League game.

1951 was a momentous year for Killarney basketball. Local historians recall that the very first game of basketball took place in November of that year, in the old Killarney Town Hall, featuring the likes of Eamon O'Donoghue, Ben Campion, young Michael Looney, and Paddy Culligan.

The Sem won the Dunloe Cup and the O'Sullivan Cup. Coláiste losagáin won the Corn Uí Mhuirí – the Hogan Cup competition was in abeyance at the time. Tomas Murphy of Camp, one of the famous brothers, was one of their best players.

# MUCKROSS ROWING CLUB RETURN TO ROWING

In advance of this week's move to Phase 1 of the government's Roadmap for Reopening Business and Society, the club's committee and coaches have been working on plans for a gradual and safe return to some limited rowing activities, in consultation with the relevant bodies and aligned with Rowing Ireland's Protocol for a Return to Rowing. provides for individual members living within 5km to row in single sculls (boats for one person), in groups of three sculls with a coach also present. Limited land-based training outdoors, such as running, may also resume in groups of four. By this weekend, we hope to have finalised all arrangements necessary to restart club activity on this basis. With such limited numbers allowed and adopting staggered training times, we appreciate the patience and cooperation of all members.

- 9. Can an employee simply refuse to return to work because they feel it is unsafe to do so? No, once the employer is adhering to the return to work protocols and all answers on the return to work form are No. 10. Are employees who were temporarily laid off entitled to bank holidays during that time? Yes, for the first 13 weeks on the lay off.

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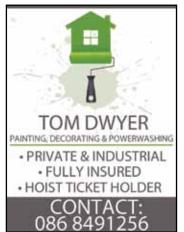
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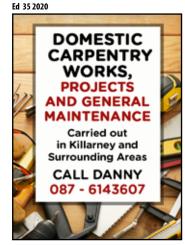

They need to feel they have a place in the family - and that they will be missed if they are away and that they have a part in what needs to be done, such as family chores. They need you to spend time with them, support their interests, show you care - with actions and words and show you are interested in what they have to say - even when you don't agree.

Build your child's self control: Children need to develop a sense of being able to manage things for themselves as they grow up. They can start learning this from babyhood. There are lots of ways that you can teach them this kind of confidence. Attend to your baby's needs and respond to his cries and little noises. Allow your toddler to explore (safety) and to say 'no' (within reasonable limits). Show delight in what your child is learning and help him/her to learn to do things for himself instead of you always having the answers. Give your child choices and then be prepared to let him/her have his choice. Ask your child's opinion about things that are to do with him/her (help your child to feel that they have some say). Start to teach him/her to solve his own problems by thinking about what they could do. Give approval and encouragement for trying new things and for getting something right, even if your child doesn't get it all right at first. Give children lots of time to do what they are good at. It is tempting to keep them practicing what they aren't so good at but they also need time to succeed.

Give them opportunities to learn new skills: Provide encouragement to attempt difficult tasks, and respond positively to your child's mistakes. This teaches your child how to handle challenges better next time. As children get older give them responsibility for doing things for themselves, such as work reason). Be prepared for them not to do it the way you would - and for them to make mistakes. Children should see mistakes as a basis for learning - too much protection from disappointment and failure may not give children the chance to learn how to deal with their mistakes or difficult situations Protect your child from adult problems: If you're having troubles with your child's other parent, make an effort to keep your child out of what is adults' business. Help your child to see it is not her fault (children often believe it is). Your child also needs to know that whatever happens somebody will be there for her/him. Grandparents can also be a great support when you are feeling very stressed.

Find outside support for your child: Children often do better when life gets difficult if they have some support from people apart from their parents. This person or people could be a grandparent, relative, family friend or counsellor. As children get older their own close friends can provide some of this support. Get support for yourself. Sometimes things go wrong between parents and children for all sorts of reasons. It is important to try to get help whatever your child's age. This may mean you need to get support from a professional who has special skills in this area.

Have family rituals to celebrate events and daily routines: Family routines and rituals are essential to family life and can offer stability in times of stress or when families are in trouble

If the rejection or wounds were caused during childhood, then, every time something happens later in life they react to those circumstances as a child would - never having been able to grow up emotionally due to that un-resolved pain. This brings them to a place of instability in their emotions, or complete denial of those emotions. It can also force them to become 'people pleasers' in order to gain the approval and affirmation of others. Here is a deadly trap because not everyone will like or agree with us, and some 'friends' motives can be ungodly. This is a painful and frightening thing to accept when a person has struggled emotionally because we all like to be affirmed, loved and appreciated. But there is a 'Friend who sticks closer than a brother' (Proverbs 18:24) -His name is Jesus - God's Son, who gave His sinless life to pay our ransom note, so that we could be redeemed from every work of darkness. He endured betrayal, condemnation, mocking, rejection, shame and humiliation; He was grieved by those He loved and then crucified without mercy so that whoever would believe and trust in Him could be set free and be made whole (Isaiah 53:3-5). Ask Jesus to be your Lord today and receive God's Perfect Love!

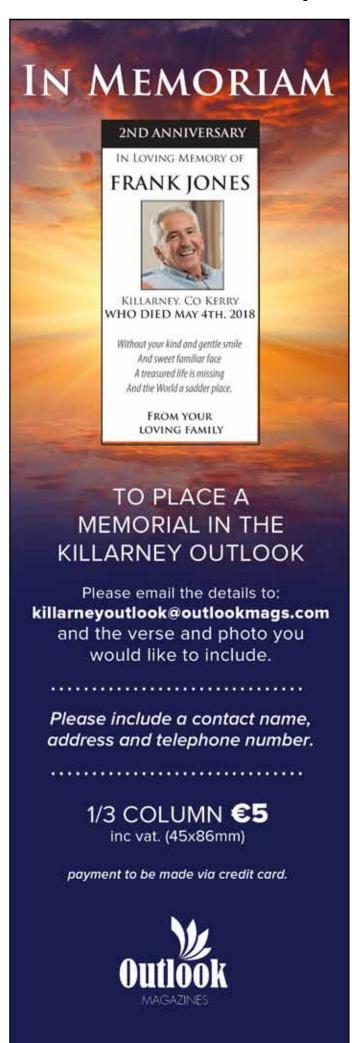
