



The Kerry Trails Map is an online interactive map for Kerry, which provides essential trail information for those who would like to explore the county's numerous walks and trails and was this week launched by Kerry County Council.

The map was developed in partnership with the South Kerry Development Partnership and North East and West Kerry Development and was funded through the support of the Department of Rural and Community Development's Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme.

The project mapped 130 Kerry trails and offers over 270 options for walks throughout the county, and provides essential information including trail location, length, difficulty, duration, GPS coordinates, directions to the trailhead/parking areas and other important information.

'This is a really exciting showcase for what we have to offer here in Kerry,' said the Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr John Francis Flynn.

'Given the popularity now of outdoor pursuits including walking and hiking, it is wonderful to have such a useful and interactive resource being made available to those wanting to explore and enjoy the many walks and trails which are available all over the county, he said. 

Thanks largely to a shared taste for all things sport, but also a university that probably attracts as many students from Kerry as Cork

But when it comes to Limerick, JP McManus' backing for all things Limerick is surely central to the county's growing status from golf to GAA

After Limerick won the 2018 All-Ireland, he donated 3.2 million euro to every Gaelic Games county board in Ireland, to be divided evenly among the clubs.

Broker and racehorse owner JP wanted to even the money away from his home turf - and the donation of €100,000 to every Gaelic Games county board in Ireland was to be divided equally among their clubs.

JP, a regular at Killarney races down through the years, is not exactly media friendly. And he is a tax exile, although he prefers to be known as someone who works abroad and brings back the money to spend at home. He'd be an emigrant if he made no money, but he's an exile because he has made money, he once guipped. "If I was somebody who set up a business abroad and it didn't go so well I'd be considered an emigrant; if it goes well I'm considered an exile," he said.

His backing for Limerick, whether it's hospitals or hurling or holidays for the Limerick team in Barbados is truly transformative. Ask any Limerick person, and they will simply say "JP" with a sense of gratitude.

Few counties or even countries have anyone like this. Old style patronage, I suppose you'd call it, where money is channeled by an individual to his childhood home directly where he deems it needed.

We would all like a society where funding for services is directed equally and evenly. . But we don't have that. A county with a strong minister, or a senior civil servant in Dublin who has not forgotten what it is like to live outside the capital, will get more basic services than others. Cork with three senior politicians is doing spectacularly well at the moment.

So until we get a fair system, Kerry could do with a JP McManus and whether he's an emigrant or an exile won't trouble us!

SORTING TRAFFIC

raffic is never far from this column. Partly because traffic is an eternal problem in Killarney. I can't understand how it got so bad or when exactly. But on top of the decade of jams, there is the intractable parking problem.

This weeks' county council heard from Councillor Brendan Cronin how the principal of St Brigid's in Killarney, Roisín Moore, has seen no progress since November 2020 when she first raised concerns at a meeting with council engineers about the need for a pedestrian crossing at St Marcy's Tce, and other safety measures for the 730 students.

Just under half the school population uses St Mary's Tce egress and access.

The school is having to put staff on point duty to control traffic to ensure their girls are safe. She was told that by April 2021 there would be a pedestrian crossing, but there still is none.

She can't feel at ease and is indeed in a moral dilemna promoting walking and cycling to school when it is not safe to do so, she has told the council engineer.

"The town's urban landscape and infrastructure does not adequately cater for cyclists and pedestrians and until it does, I am afraid we are fighting a losing battle. It is simply not safe to walk or cycle to St. Brigid's at the moment for a number of reasons,"Ms Moore said.

"No cycle path gives direct access to the school. The cycle paths that do exist stop and start in an ad hoc manner around the town and none bring students directly to the school," she says. Privately owned cars continue to park on the only bus space outside the Cathedral which results in the school bus double parking and creating even greater disruption and privately owned cars double and triple park on a daily basis from the West End as far as the Old Presbytery on both sides of the street. "This type of driver behaviour does not support a safe cycling and walking environment for our young people," she adds.

With September looming, can there be a solution?

A small suggestion from this column to ease the traffic on Mission Road: a one-way with no exit onto Mission from Beech Road would help traffic flow.

The association between Dawn Milk and the Killarney race meeting has continued for three decades and it's by far the longest sponsorship in racing in Ireland, Gerard said.

It was really three years since the last Ladies' Day, and the organisers were "a small bit nervous" and worried that people would still be too anxious to come out, he said.

But Killarney was "blessed with the weather" and everything else.

FINAL PREPARATIONS UNDERWAY FOR <u>FÉILE LUGHNASADH - MILLTOWN</u>

inal preparations are underway for Féile Lughnasadh which will take place in Milltown from July 28 to 31st, and marks a very important time in the life of ancient Ireland. The festival, featuring Sharon Shannon, jiggy and The Rising playing free, open-air concerts, will be a spectacular celebration of tradition and culture for all the family.

Féile Lughnasadh is based on the late July celebration of the beginning of the annual harvest and the origins of this reach back into the mists of Celtic lore. The Celtic god Lugh is honoured in many parts of the Celtic world, throughout Ireland and Europe. County Louth and the Galician city of Lugo in Spain both derive their names from this Celtic past. Traditions including Garland Sunday and Lammastide also owe their origins to honouring Lugh, the protector of the people and provider

of the rich harvest of food, sustaining all for the long winter ahead. Legend tells us that Lugh defeated Crom Dubh and freed the people from darkness and hunger. The end of July in ancient times would see nuts and berries ripen, before the main crops of grain and roots later in the year. People celebrated nature's abundance and hoped the gods would ensure a dry autumn and a good harvest. Lugh and his foster mother, Tailtiu, are the Celtic figures most associated with this festival. Tailtiu gives her name to the Tailteann games, a term used for several events, most recently in the football championships.

Lughnasadh is a key event in the Celtic year, marking the half-way point between the summer solstice on June 21st and the autumn equinox on September 21st. "It's fitting to name our festival after a god who protects the people and provides for their needs. Our festival comes at a time where we need to get out and celebrate our cherished traditions again", said Owen O'Shea. The ancient origins of the festival will be marked with the opening parade on July 28th, with local groups in costume as Lugh and Tailtiu, wearing traditional straw and rush garments in what promises to be a spectacular opening. "We've worked with local groups, using traditional methods to recreate Celtic ceremonial clothes", added Cecelia O'Shea, "making for a rich, authentic experience."

The festival will feature the three concerts as well as the opening parade, music and singing sessions, kids' activities, a food and crafts fair and much more. See facebook and instagram for full details.

BUS ÉIREANN URGES FAMILIES TO CONFIRM THEIR SCHOOL TRANSPORT **REQUIREMENT FOR 2022/23**

he family portal has reopened and families must confirm their request by Friday 29 July 2022

Following the Government announcement that the school transport scheme will be free to families in 2022/2023, Bus Éireann has reconfigured its online family portal and is advising families that it has now reopened. Bus Éireann operates the school transport scheme on behalf of the Department of Education.

"We have emailed all registered families this morning advising them of their next steps. The first thing they should do is to check their inbox. The email has a link to bring them directly to the new confirmation page on the website," said Miriam Flynn, Chief Schools Officer, Bus Éireann. "It is fantastic to be able to offer free school transport for this coming school year. The system is a little different but very simple - it just requires people to click

a button to request their ticket.

We are urging them to log in to the portal as quickly as possible and get that confirmation in as tickets cannot issue without this request on the system."

People who have already made a payment for school transport do not need to take any further action and will be refunded around the start of the school year.

People who have applied but have not yet made a payment will need to log in and request



their ticket on the portal.

People with medical cards do not need to enter their medical card details but do need to log in and request their ticket on the portal.

Free school transport is a temporary measure introduced by the Government to provide assistance to families for the current year. The normal eligibility criteria are unchanged.



Heading for Kerry...

IRELAND'S NEW RESEARCH VESSEL TOM CREAN

reland's newest research vessel the RV Tom Crean arrived today in Irish waters and is currently docked in the Port of Galway before embarking on its first survey

towards the end of July and then making its way to Dingle in advance of its official commissioning due to take place in Autumn 2022. Ireland's latest marine research vessel has been named the RV Tom Crean, after the renowned seaman and explorer from Kerry who undertook three ground-breaking expeditions to the Antarctic in the early years of the 20th Century.

The RV Tom Crean which will be based in Galway after its commissioning will enable the Marine Institute to continue to lead and support vital scientific surveys that contribute to Ireland's position as a leader in marine spatial planning, climate

change related research, environmental monitoring, deep water surveys, and support increased research in the Atlantic Ocean.



WARNING ISSUED BY KCC FOR LOUGH LEIN



erry County Council has issued a warning to the pubic not to swim in Lough Leane following the potential for an algal bloom in the water and on the shoreline.

The Counci has erected signage at a number of locations along the shore of Lough Leane to advise members of the situation.

Following the taking of samples by Kerry County Council staff in recent days, laboratory tests confirmed the presence of cyanobacteria (a blue-green algae) indicating the potential for the formation of algae along the shoreline.

In accordance with protocols for these situations, precautionary signage has been erected at locations along Lough Leane and those who frequent the shoreline are being advised to exercise caution. Members of the public are advised not to bathe in water if there are visible signs of algal blooms in vicinity. They are also advised to ensure that they keep their dogs under control as such algal accumulations can be harmful on ingestion. The situation is being monitored closely on an ongoing basis by Kerry County Council.

WIDESPREAD SHOCK AT AIB ANNOUNCEMENT

Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor has compared Athe announcement of the withdrawal of cash services from AIB Bank branches in Kerry to your local publican advising that he was no longer selling alcohol.

"We have all heard the song 'The Pub With No Beer' but a Bank with no cash is beyond a joke. AIB Bank has once again left down the people of Ireland by withdrawing vital services from them" stated Councillor Michael Cahill.

"I understand that cards are increasing in usage, but that is mostly amongst our younger population. Many of us reared in the cash era, continue to rely on notes and coin to transact our business and transferring to plastic or digital payments would be terribly difficult" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Also, our rural businesses such as shops, restaurants and pubs will continue to require to lodge cash and source coin for change going forward. What are they to do, with no night safe facility even?" said Councillor Cahill.

"I genuinely hope our Post Office network can

step up to the plate and replace our present banking system with the services our people require. I believe there should be a concerted effort made now to transfer any financial business that we transact, to our local Post Office and show the Bank Executives that we, the people don't need them anymore" added Councillor Cahill.

Meanwhile Deputy Danny Healy-Rae has also condemned the act.

"This is a deplorable action by AIB which will leave many people in Kerry without cash. This impacts 5 branches of AIB in Kerry- Kenmare, Castleisland, Killorglin, Cahersiveen and Dingle". Deputy Healy Rae told Kilarney Outlook.


"Many people still use and need cash to survive. Many Businesses, Farmers, Tradesmen and elderly people wont be able to manage and won't be able to get change or make lodgements and it will be setting up families and households for more robberies.

The Government already closed a lot of post offices and they still want to close more of them, now they are downgrading the banks and telling us to go to the post offices, are they all raving or what?

The Government have a large share in the bank. Why are the Government totally silent on this? I am calling on the Minister for Finance Paschal Donohoe and the Government to step in as everyone is still paying for bailing out the banks in 2009", he added.





PURE NATURAL JUICE GOODNESS

The Story so far ... Nicola Lynch in conversation with the Killarney Outlook

Nicola, can you tell us what inspired you to start up Zenergy?

Many years ago I suffered severe burnout from having three business's to run and having four small kids all happening together. When conventional medicine failed me I started looking for other alternatives. I started researching nutrition for my chronic anxiety and fell into a whole new world. I must have read 50 books on nutrition and also saw a very interesting documentary on Netflix called fat, sick and nearly dead. It has been a long journey for me but nutrition is vitally important to keep my head above water. I really do believe there is massive healing in natural foods. Nutrition is only one piece of my jigsaw. I do mindfulness, yoga, tms and nutrition and the combination is working well at the moment.

Was it difficult to start up with equipment etc?

I convinced my husband to go to Barcelona to see a juicer that I wanted to purchase and two week later it arrived from America. It was massive money to invest at the time but I was willing and determined to make a go of it. Zenergy is based in Killarney and we only do door to door deliveries to provide our customers with top class nutrition in a drink. Raw cold press juicing is a hard business and is very time consuming and very precise. It takes a huge amount of time making these juices but you can be guaranteed that they are what they say in the tin.

What sets your product apart from others?

We never pasteurize any of our juices because when you pasteurize a juice it is heated to a certain temperature which will kill off any of the bacteria that would spoil a juice but this also kills off the goodness that should be in juice. Juices these days are mostly pasteurized. Pasteurized juice give a longer shelf life of a couple of weeks to a couple of months. Juice should not sit on a shelf for weeks or months on end it needs to be made and consumed as soon as possible. 
What do you love most about running



This is an expansion of the long-standing July provision which has been in place for many years. As part of this programme schools can identify the children, they feel would most benefit from extra help and then support them for two /three weeks during the summer holidays. This continuity in education can prove hugely beneficial for children who may have complex needs and who need stability and routine to help them achieve their potential. The reduced pupil teacher ratio that this programme provides, gives an ideal opportunity to target particular areas and/or topics that may have proved challenging for these children during the school year. With a 1:12 pupil teacher ratio, as well as the essential support of an SNA, the children will be given the best possible opportunity to fully access the curriculum as well as gain in confidence in all areas. It gives teachers the chance to explore in more detail other areas of education including physical, artistic and STEAM education to help the children. The programme allows teachers to work more closely with individual children and give them more individualised attention.

"We are exploring so many aspects of STEAM education by using robotics and tablets to build and programme robots. We also have an artist, Egle Saladziute, and physical trainer Dan O Sullivan coming into the school to work with the children, As well of course as revision topics in both numeracy and literacy", Mr. Fitzgerald





Which is easier to apply pencil, liquid or gel liner?

Eye liner is a staple beauty product in every woman's make-up bag as it can transform your look. A soft pencil is the easiest to use if it is sharpened well. Use your index finger to hold your eyelid taunt just under your outer brow. If you find it difficult, apply dots of colour first along your lash line and join together after with small strokes. Gel liner is pliable, making it easier to apply if you use a nice thin brush while holding your eyelid taunt. It creates a solid color instantly without having to layer it up and mistakes can be fixed with a cotton tip as it does not set immediately. Pencil or gel can also be smudged out with a pencil brush to create a soft smokey line. You may need more practice to use liquid or felt tip liners. These create intense colour





and are great for a winged look or precise flick. Choose waterproof liquid liner if you have oily eyelids or watery eyes.

COLOUR VISION DEFICIENCY

Most people with a colour vision deficiency (CVD) are able to see things as clearly as other people but they have difficulty distinguishing between some colours. This may have an impact upon a child's performance at school or on the sports field and can also affect career options, for example becoming an electrician or a pilot. As most people with a colour vision deficiency can see some colours. There are some people who are unable to see any colour at all, but this is very rare.

In the normal eye there are three different types of cones. Some cones are best at capturing long wavelength (red) light. Others catch medium wavelength (green) light, while other cones respond best to short wavelength (blue) light. The signals from these cones are sent to the brain where they are perceived as colour. People with CVD are born with one or more cone types absent or different.

Most people with CVD are red/ green deficient, which means they mix up all colours with some red or green in them. For example, a red/green CVD person will confuse blue and purple because they can't 'see' the red element in purple. This is more severe in some forms of CVD than in others.

Who is affected by colour vision deficiency?

Colour vision may be affected by

some eye diseases, but the most common cause of CVD is genetic. The gene for this is transmitted on the X chromosome (from your mother) and so it mainly affects men and boys, with around 8% of males and 0.5% of females having CVD. There are around 3 million people in the UK with some kind of CVD.

What are the symptoms of colour blindness?

If someone has CVD they may have difficulties distinguishing between different types of food for example mistaking chocolate sauce for ketchup. It may also be very hard to get a child with CVD to try green vegetables as they will look unappetising. Older children may confuse the red and green lights on their games console.

If you have any concerns about your child's vision, a sight test is recommended.

How do you treat colour vision deficiency?

There is currently no cure for genetic CVD. Your optometrist may suggest using colour filters on your glasses, or coloured contact lenses. People with illnesses that have led to CVD, may find that their vision returns to normal when their illness has been treated.





Special thanks to our chairman Seán Daly for once again towing our boat trailer.



KILLARNEY OUTLOOK SPORTS COLUMNIST JIMMY O'SULLIVAN DARCY LOOKS AT THIS WEEKEND'S ALL IRELAND FINAL

KERRY V GALWAY

CROKE PARK, SUNDAY, JULY 24TH

Isn't it lovely to go into an All Ireland Final as favourites? The short and simple answer is no, it definitely is not. There is a public perception that Kerry have done the heavy lifting by seeing off Dublin in that pulsating semifinal. Most people, myself included, felt that meeting was fairly inevitable - the Munster and Leinster Championships have been far too predictable of late - and the overall winners would come from that game. I also expected them to be meeting Ulster opposition in the final - Donegal were my fancy. But I will say that I predicted Galway as genuine dark horses - no great trick to that, because so did pretty much everyone else. Galway have been dark horses for the All Ireland every year going back to the 1930s. Strong club scene, great tradition behind them, and - surely to the envy of their green and red neighbours - a knack for unearthing scoring forwards every couple of

The general perception was that Kevin Walsh had tried to implement an Ulster-style blanket defence that didn't suit his players mindset - it's a bit harsh, that Galway side absolutely pulverised us in the 'Super' 8s that year. Eamonn Fitzmaurice's last year with Kerry was an unhappy one. Meanwhile, Galway were progressing at underage - their minors were toasting ours in the first half of the 2018 final before Kerry took over. They also played in the 2016 and 2019 minor finals. Unlike us, they were able to bring it through – U21 finalists in 2017 and U20 champions in 2020. Their U21s beat Jack O'Connor's Kerry with ease - a four point margin hugely flattered us on a day we just never got going. Gareth Bradshaw, Gary Sice, and big Fiontán Ó Curráin retired. Ian Burke, their first All Star in 21 years, withdrew from the panel. Adrian Varley is now playing with New York. Seán Armstrong - I always feared him, though he never quite fulfilled his potential - stepped away. Tom Flynn, Declan Kyne, Seán Andy Ó Ceallaigh, Ruairi Lavelle and Eamon Brannigan were seemingly deemed surplus to requirements.

Those were very, very big calls by Padraic Joyce. Galway had too many runners and utility players, and not enough specialists for either the full back or full forward line. Verv few managers would have acted so decisively. Joyce came in as manager in 2019 and Galway looked like the dashing and potent force of old. However, they lost to Roscommon in the Connaught Final and Mayo in round four of the qualifiers, and it seemed to instill caution in Joyce. This year he seems to have gotten the blend right - I expect that Cian O'Neill is playing a big role in that behind the scenes. O'Neill has the ability to give a team that extra two or three per cent, as he showed with us in 2014.

I'm not comparing paths to the final - it isn't like for like. We coasted as far as the Dublin game - I'll acknowledge that Cork put up a decent battle, but I never once felt that they could win, likewise with Mayo. Galway had built a nice head of steam in winning promotion to Division One, losing a cracking final to Roscommon - I actually think that did them no harm in the long run, and opened their campaign with a belter against Mayo, walloped Leitrim, and beat Roscommon in the Nestor Cup before that high-octane thriller against Armagh. They are plenty battlehardened – both literally and figuratively! Galway have scored a whopping 11-82 in

just five games. Sure, 4-20 against a fairly hapless Leitrim bulks up their percentage, but 2-21 against Armagh? That was absolutely phenomenal shooting. Galway are deadly dangerous, they really and truly are.

Galway Defence v Kerry Attack

This is probably where Joyce has rejigged the most. Connor Gleeson was better known as a soccer goalkeeper and has been somewhat of a surprise in goal. He got criticism for the two goals Armagh got off high balls late in normal time, but I'd be far more critical of the defensive cover. At that stage in the game it was very obvious what Armagh were going to try, they certainly shouldn't have succeeded twice. I fully expect 6'2" Seán Kelly to pick up David Clifford – both of them will be picking up All Stars later on. I imagine Jack Glynn will wander out with Paudie Clifford, while Liam Silke will try to marshall Paul Geaney. We all know that the Dingle man didn't have the best of games in the semi-final, and Killian Spillane and Tony Brosnan are chomping at the bit - Tony was desperately unlucky not to see gametime against Dublin. I'd still be starting Geaney, though, a proven big game performer.

There's no question about who starts on the forty - I'd trust him with the frees as well! Seán has been drifting in and out of the full forward line from the forty, and it's been very effective. Incidentally, Seán was championship top scorer last year and is currently six points behind Derry's Shane McGuigan and four behind Dublin's Dean Rock. The biggest decision for Jack O'Connor will be the starting wing forwards. Galway have big men around the middle and like to crowd the traffic there. Kerry have the option of starting Diarmuid O'Connor and Adrian Spillane on the wings to bolster midfield, but I'd go for Dara Moynihan and Stephen O'Brien to start. Weather will be a key factor in Jack's decision – muscle matters more when slippery ground slows down the speedsters. Moynihan was outstanding when he came on against Dublin, and I think roving Kieran Molloy wouldn't get much change from the Spa man. Stephen O'Brien has been playing well all year, albeit perhaps fading a bit later in games, and he does a lot of hard tracking. I'd give them the nod - the team that starts won't be the team that finishes, of course, and Jack will need to have aces to draw from the deck.

Midfield

Advantage Galway. No point in pretending. David Moran will go toe to toe with Paul Conroy, who has been outstanding all year. He is a typical old-school midfielder in many ways and doesn't roam too far but is always good for a point or two - himself and David could share the kind of duel in the sky reminiscent of O'Connell and Frank Evers three score years ago. That leaves Cillian McDaid for Jack Barry, and McDaid is even more dangerous than Conroy. The former dual player and AFL recruit has everything, including a sharp eye for the posts. When Galway are on the back foot, McDaid often drops back to the half back line, with Tierney coming out to midfield, and that gives him space to accelerate onto the attack - check out his goal against Armagh. McDaid is a certainty for an All Star, and could well be a Footballer of the Year nominee. Make no mistake, it will take everything we have to break even in this sector.

Kerry Defence versus Galway Attack

Shane Ryan is likely to pip Ethan Rafferty to the All Star, I've been especially impressed with the work Kerry have done on kick-outs. Tadhg Morley will nominally be marking Matthew Tierney, but Morley is the anchor of Kerry's defence. Like Liam Flaherty of old, I want our centre back to hold his ground rather than follow the roving Tierney - Galway would thrive on space for direct runs. I suspect that Gavin White will be able to play – I think we'd be told by now if he wasn't, and he's likely to pick up Patrick Kelly. He'll be giving a lot of height away to the big man (6'5"), but Gavin attacks the ball fast and his pace going forward will be a nightmare for Kelly. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch has been an absolute revelation since replacing the injured Mike Breen. I expect Heaney to play deep – he's basically a converted defender - but Ó Beaglaíoch doesn't suffer any altitude sickness in the opposition half! If Gavin is out, I could see Ó Beaglaíoch playing at seven and Paul Murphy starting at five – I have no fears of Paul; he always thrives in this arena and is still one of the most intelligent footballers around. Jason Foley has locked down the full back berth, long a troublesome area for us, and been outstanding. He always had height and speed, but he has added a real maturity to his football. That said, Comer is deadly. Strong as a bullock, great at winning ball, and very, very hard to stop. Jason will have his hands full, that will be a key duel. You need to keep primary possession away from Comer; Jason will need

help. Graham O'Sullivan will be Galway's other main threat, Shane Walsh. Graham is another who had to be patient to grab a starting jersey, and hasn't looked back since he got it. Walsh is a different kettle of fish, though – Walsh drifts into space and is deadly accurate. Tom O'Sullivan will most likely be picking up Robert Finnerty, and like Gavin, his forays forward are a key weapon for us.

It's worth noting that defence isn't really about one-on-one duels anymore. It's more about the collective screen - Kerry have been brilliant at covering for each other one suspects that handiwork of Paddy Tally. Incidentally, I am aware that referee Seán Hurson and Paddy Tally both hail from Galbally Pearses in Tyrone - I just don't care. After all, Cian O'Neill and referee Brendan Cawley, who took charge of the Galway Derry game, also hail from the same club (Newbridge) and I didn't care then either. Hurson is an outstanding referee who gives a bit of leeway. Frankly, be it Bannon, Gough, or Coldrick, I never saw a referee beat Kerry yet, and I find these pre-made excuses tiresome in the extreme.

Kerry have only conceded three goals all year, and I believe that Galway will need two if they are to win. Galway coach Cian O'Neill win this. Galway will be looking to kick in fairly fast, especially to Comer and Walsh, with runners breaking fast in support.

I'm tempting fate, I know, but I just think that Kerry are slightly better in too many sectors of the field and should bring Sam Maguire back to his traditional home. Here's hoping!

KERRY V GALWAY PAST MEETINGS

1913: Kerry 1-8 Galway 0-1 (Semi-Final)

Dick Fitzgerald kicked 1-5 and cemented his reputation as the greatest footballer of the era.

1919: Galway 2-6 Kerry 3-3 (Semi-Final)

Kerry had John Joe Sheehy make his debut this year and become an overnight sensation, but Galway had Michael 'Knacker' Walsh shine as brightly. Jas. Bailey and Tom O'Connor goals earned us a fairly fortuitous draw.

1919: Galway 4-2 Kerry 2-2 (Final Replay)

Galway dominated the replay, with Knacker Walsh scoring two goals himself. Kerry were well outplayed, two late goals giving the scoreline a flattering aspect. Galway had no answer to Kildare's high-flying Larry Stanley in the final.

1938: Kerry 2-6 Galway 3-3 (Final)

Kerry beat Laois in the semi-final (Tommy Murphy and Paddy Kennedy marked each other) with supporters watching from the new Cusack Stand. Timmy O'Leary's goal had us in front with three minutes left but Bobby Griffin goaled for Galway to level it. John Joe Landers actually kicked a great 50 to win it from long range....but referee Thomas Culhane, who had played minor, junior and senior for Limerick in the one year, blew the final whistle with the ball in flight! It was the first final broadcast by schoolboy Micheál Ó

1938: Kerry 2-4 Galway 0-7 (Replay)

Moyvane's Jack Flavin played for Galway, who were always that little bit better than us. Ned Mulholland and Martin Kelly goaled for them but Kerry had a late free to snatch a draw. The referee blew his whistle to warn off encroachers....and supporters swarmed the pitch, thinking it was over. By the time play resumed, Kerry players like Bill Dillon, Bill Casey, and Paddy Bawn Brosnan had departed, leading recruitments like Joe Keohane to be plucked from the crowd to finish the game. It made no difference, with John 'Tull' Dunne lifting the cup and Brendn Nestor (for whom the Connaught cup is named) awarded man of the match.

1940: Kerry 0-7 Galway 1-3 (Final)

It was a tough game. Kerry, backboned by Dingle players, were the reigning champions. The key moment came when John Burke's effort for Galway came down off the crossbar, with super sub Paddy Bawn, who had replaced the injured Dan Spring, grabbing it to clear. Charlie O'Sullivan scored a beauty with his left leg to secure victory.

1941: Kerry 1-8 Galway 0-7

Kerry beat Dublin in a replay in Austin Stack Park, having needed a Murt Kelly special to draw the first game. The final was a much better affair than last year, with Tom 'Gega' O'Connor's goal the difference and two frees by Murt Kelly sealing the win.

1942: Galway 1-3 Kerry 0-3 (Semi-Final)

Kerry were gunning to become the third team to win four in a row, but Galway had other ideas. The withdrawal of a number of Dingle players in a dispute over selection didn't help. A'50 kicked by Dan Kavanagh was spilled into the Kerry net and that remained the gap at the end. Dublin had four native Kerrymen in their ranks as they beat Galway in the final, who had three themselves!

1954: Kerry 2-6 Galway 1-6(Semi-Final)

Tadhgie Lyne had 1-3 and Paudie Sheehy had 1-1 from either wing in a victory that was slightly more convincing than the scoreline, with John Joe Sheehan and John Dowling outstanding. However, we lost to Meath in the final. Full back Paddy 'Hands' O'Brien and 36 year old Peter McDermott, the famous 'man in the cap' were outstanding, but Kerry's decision to drop Jackie Lyne came in for severe criticism afterwards.

1959: Kerry 3-7 Galway 1-4

Kerry had won an enthralling semi-final against Dublin, with Mick O'Connell at his peerless peak. He was carrying an injury in the final, with Frank Evers shading their duel, but a head injury to Seán Purcell was a hammer blow for Galway. Kerry switched Tom Long to midfield, while Jerome O'Shea made a fantastic goal-line clearance. Dan McAuliffe had two goals and garry McMahon another. Star of the show, though, was Seán Murphy at left back - he gave one of the greatest exhibitions of all time, and the final still bears his name.

1960: Kerry 1-8 Galway 0-8 (Semi-Final)

Waterford shocked Cork to leave us with a fairly comfortable passage to the semifinal against Galway. They weren't guite the force they had been. It was still a tough game, but Tadhgie Lyne's accuracy (0-5 in total) and an opportunistic Garry McMahon goal (he scored more goals than points in championship football, 7 to 6 in total) just before half-time when a defender spilled Mick O'Connell's long kick saw us lead by 1-3 to 0-5 at half-time. Purcell scored 0-7 and Frank Stockwell forced a brilliant save out of Johnny Culloty - they also hit the crossbar. Nobody fancied Down in the final – after all, we had hammered them in a challenge game to open Frank Sheehy Park in Listowel - we would receive a sharp lesson in the final.

1963: Galway 1-7 Kerry 0-8

Kerry had a truly great team, and the era would be defined by their rivalry with Galway. Kerry were well on top at first, leading by 0-4 to 0-1. By early in the second half they were in front by 0-7 to 0-2, despite missing good chances (16 wides in total, 11 in the first half). Then Galway kicked into life. Pat Donnellan pounced for an opportunistic goal. Galway's speed began to tell. Seamus Leydon, switched into corner forward, kicked them in front and added another to seal victory.

1964: Galway 0-15 Kerry 0-10 (Final)

Kerry were down by four after ten minutes and never really closed that gap. Cyril Dunne, Tull's son, kicked 0-9, while O'Connll kicked 0-7. The donnellan's were magnificent, not knowing that their father, sitting T.D. and former Galway player John, had passed away in the stand. Joe Joe Barrett had a late chance of a goal, but Johnny Geraghty made a brilliant save.

1965: Galway 0-12 Kerry 0-9 (Final)

Kerry were hurting now, but it wasn't going to get any easier. Pat Donnellan lorded midfield. His brother John caught Derry O'Shea by the shorts - Derry let him know how he felt, and the pair were sent off. Derry was sitting disconsolate in the dressing room when his brother John 'Thorny', a Kerry sub, walked in. Derry thought Thorny had come to comfort him - he hadn't, John had tussled with big Noel Tierney and got his own walking papers!

1984: Kerry 2-17 Galway 0-11(Semi-Final)

Galway had lost in '83 to 13 man Dublin, and there were questions about the great Kerry team after their defeat to Cork that year. But Galway were hit by injuries and Kerry were hungry to reclaim their throne. Jack O'Shea

was imperious in the middle, with goals from Mikey Sheehy and John Egan seeing Kerry to a convincing win.

2000: Kerry 0-14 Galway 0-14 (Final)

Kerry pulverised Galway early on, with Seamus Moynihan comfortably winning the duel with close friend Padraic Joyce and Liam Hassett starring. Once Joyce moved out to the forty, though, it was a different story. The introduction of Kevin Walsh saw them take over midfield, and they gradually and deservedly reeled us in. It was 0-10 to 0-7 at half-time and Galway had chances to win it late on, although the final opportunity fell Kerry's way – but neither side could convert a winner.

2000: Kerry 0-17 Galway 1-10 (Replay)

Galway were missing Ja Fallon and Kevin Walsh picked up an early injury, but got the fillip of a brilliant early goal by Declan Meehan. That only spurred Kerry on, and they led by 0-8 to 1-3 at half-time. Galway dominated the third quarter with four points on the trot to led by 1-7 to 0-9, but the introduction of Maurice Fitzgerald as a third midfielder transformed the game and Kerry never looked back after that.

2002: Kerry 2-17 Galway 1-12 (Quarter-Final)

Reigning champions Galway had early goal chances, but mostly opted for points instead - Michael Donnellan's blistering strike the exception. Kerry had Mike Frank Russell and Colm Cooper on form up front though and Seamus Moynihan, Mike McCarthy, and Darragh Ó Sé winning their personal duels, as they gradually nudged ahead. Seán O'Sullivan scored a fantastic goal himself, and Dara Ó Cinnéide set up Aodhán Mac Gearailt for another one late on.

2008: Kerry 1-21 Galway 1-16 (Quarter-Final)

It was played in a deluge so bad that they had to turn on the lights in Croke Park. Even so, two footballing sides produced a wonderful exhibition of skill. Michael Meehan gave an absolute exhibition, but Kerry had a better spread of threats with Bryan Sheehan, Declan O'Sullivan, and Tommy Walsh. Donnchadh Walsh's goal gave us a 1-8 to 0-9 half-time

lead and the introduction of a sparkling Daniel Bohane for Kerry really put us in control. Galway did nudge into a two point lead with a fisted Joe Bergin goal, but normal service quickly resumed as Kerry won the fourth quarter by 0-8 to 0-3.

2014: Kerry 1-20 Galway 2-14 (Quarter-Final)

James O'Donoghue's helped Kerry into a 1-6 to 0-1 lead, but Tom Flyn slalomed from his own half and buried a brilliant goal to make it 1-8 to 1-3 at half-time. With sub Shane Walsh and Damien Comer impressing among Galway's coterie of newcomers, a Michael Lundy goal made it 1-11 to 2-6. Two points for Paul Geaney helped settle the nerves, though, and while Galway certainly never gave up, they could never reel Kerry in after

2017: Kerry 1-18 Galway 0-13

Brian Kelly had to make a good save to deny lan Burke but a Kieran Donaghy goal made it 1-4 to 0-2 and Kerry kept up the pressure to lead by 1-10 to 0-8 at half-time. In fairness, both sides had left good chances after them. Most notably Comer's effort cleared off the line by Fionn Fitzgerald. Brian Kelly made another great save from Seán Armstrong. Kerry's tendency to cough up chances like that was perceived as a real weakness in this team, but Galway couldn't trouble them enough in point-taking and Kerry always had a relatively comfortable lead to the finish.

2018: Galway 1-13 Kerry 1-10 (Super 8s)

Have you forgotten it? If so, I envy you. The truth is that Kerry were at sixes and sevens all year and just never raised a gallop in this game. Galway outfought us, outthought us, outshot us, and completely outplayed us. It was very near to the end of Eamonn Fitzmaurice's tenure, and that great player and manager deserved a better ending. 13 of the current Kerry panel saw action that day, but just 5 of the current Galway panel. Killian Young played very well until dismissed late on, David Moran tried very hard, and Dermot Clifford's younger son was already a superstar in the making – David's late goal meant that he finished with 1-5. It also put an extremely flattering look on the scoreboard.







Dress it up how you want. These were glorified friendlies in preparation for a World Cup, nothing more. Yes, we have added the width and guile of the likes of Hansen, Lowe, Gibson Park, Keenan (I really rate him as an instigator) to the power of the likes of Beirne, Porter, Ryan, Conan, Sheehan et al. LISTRY BRIDGE RAISED AT DAIL EIREANN







Danny Healy Rae raised the issue of Listry Bridge Repairs during Order of Business recently sparking a debate between the Kerry deputy, An Taoiseach Micheál Martin and An Ceann Comhairle Sean O'Fearghail.

Deputy Healy Rae began the debate by informing the Dail about the importance of Listry Bridge, saying it is on the regional road from Killarney to Milltown, Castlemaine and Dingle. It services all of mid-Kerry. It was built more than 200 years ago.

The Taoiseach What is the name of the bridge?

Danny Healy Rae: Listry Bridge. It was built more than 200 years ago for horses and cars. It is now unable to carry single-lane traffic. Indeed, Deputy Griffin goes over this bridge. I do not know whether he knows the name of it or not. It is very unfair on all the people of mid-Kerry, and on Deputy Griffin, that the bridge is reduced to a single lane. There are plans on file somewhere detailing the need for this bridge. I ask the Taoiseach to dust down the files and provide money to make a proper bridge out of it.

LOCAL LIVE PERFORMANCE SCHEME NOW OPEN

Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill has welcomed the announcement by Kerry County Council's Arts Office, that round 4 of the Department of Culture's Local Live Performance Programming Scheme is now open for applications.

The aim of the scheme is to support employment opportunities for professional performers and technicians across every town, village and county in Ireland and to help underpin the recovery of the commercial live performance sector.

"Individual professional performers, professional bands, groups of professional musicians, event producers, promoters based in Kerry and Kerry arts organisations, festivals, and venues are invited to apply for funding support for costs incurred in the development of work for live performances, including rehearsal and production costs, marketing and PR, Photography/Videography/Live Streaming" stated Councillor Cahill. "This funding will be a great support to those who continue to produce cultural entertainment events throughout Kerry, but have struggled recently through the pandemic lockdown. Our culture is very

struggled recently through the pandemic lockdown. Our culture is very important to us in Kerry and live performances ensure the continuance of our traditional music, dance, storytelling etc" said Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"This is an opportunity to fund performances in every village and town in Kerry and help foster the fantastic talent that exists here" added Councillor Cahill.

PUBLIC SERVICE CARD

Clir John O Donoghue has raised the problems with Public Services Cards at the last meeting of Kerry County Council. "Given the huge delays surrounding getting the Public Services Card, and given that this is needed in order to do driving lessons having completed the theory test, that we ask the relevant Ministers, presumably including the RSA and the Minister for Transport, to place a temporary derogation on the need for the Public Services Card to sit driving lessons. Learning to drive is an invaluable life skill and the current situation where many, particularly young people, are forced to cancel lessons as they are still awaiting the arrival of the Public Services card is entirely unsatisfactory."

The huge strain the social services are under at the moment in this country is a fact all here in this chamber are well aware of. However, one knock on effect of this is the impact it is having on people, and mainly younger people, who are trying to get their drivers licence. To get the now required driving lessons, you need to have passed your theory

test and be in possession of a Social Services Card. The huge delays associated with getting this card has resulted in many learner drivers having to cancel their lessons as after months of waiting, their card has still not arrived. While the merits of public transport are well espoused by the Government, the reality for many in rural counties like Kerry is that without a car you are stranded. Preventing learner drivers from taking lessons because they have not received

their Social Services Card is entirely unsatisfactory and I would like to call on the Minister, the RSA and all other relevant bodies to immediately bring in a temporary derogation on the need for this card to receive their lessons. Proof of application should suffice until such time as the huge backlog has been processed. I call on my colleagues here today to support my motion as this is an issue which affects constituents in all

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

CHANGE OF VEHICLE OWNERSHIP

If you sell your vehicle or trade it in for a new model, you must by law register the change of ownership with the Department of Transport.

A record is kept called the national vehicle and driver file (NVDF). It is important

that the ownership and address details are up to date at all times and that changes are notified quickly. If for example, a vehicle is subject to a safety

If I sell my car privately what so I need to do re changing the Vehicle

If you sell your vehicle privately, you must complete and sign the change of ownership section on the back of the Vehicle Registration certificate (VRC). The buyer must sign the same form. The seller is responsible and must send the

If I sell my car to a motor dealer what so I need to do re changing the Vehicle Registration certificate (VRC)?

If you sell your vehicle to a motor dealer, you must give the dealer the Vehicle Registration Certificate and both the seller and the dealer must complete the Form RF105. An approved dealer can use the online change of vehicle

What do I need to do if the current owner is deceased?

If you buy a vehicle and the current owner (seller) is deceased, a letter from the executor of the deceased's will, or the solicitor dealing with the will, indicating your right to the vehicle should accompany the Vehicle Registration Certificate (VRC). Where the VRC is not available or cannot be produced, an administrative process allows the acceptance of a declaration of ownership change in the form of a statutory declaration sworn before a Commissioner for Oaths or a practising solicitor. The statutory declaration form, which is available from the Driver and Vehicle Computer Services Division, should accompany the letter from the executor of the will or the solicitor mentioned above.

What does it cost to register Change of Ownership details?

There is no charge for registering Change of Ownership details at Motor Taxation Offices or at the Driver and Vehicle Computer Services Division.

When can I tax the new vehicle?



Welcome back dear student continuing on talking about healing. The book of Proverbs 15:15 says this...."all the days of the afflicted (the oppressed, the despondent) are evil (wretched, bring trouble). But for he who is of a merry heart life is a continual feast (regardless of the circumstances). This is a good example of the glass half full or half empty depending on how you see it. Our perception of circumstances, other people and the world in general has the power to cloud everything if we struggle with a negative mindset. It also affects our physical, emotional and mental well being. "The heart of him who has understanding seeks knowledge. But the mouth of fools feeds on foolishness" (Proverbs 15:14).
