

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Killarney Cardiac Response Unit

Nears 10-Year Milestone with Over 2,700 Calls Attended

he Killarney Cardiac Response Unit (KCRU) is marking a significant milestone this week as it approaches 10 years of active service in the Kerry region. Since its formation in 2015, the entirely volunteer-led scheme has grown steadily and has now responded to over 2,700 emergency calls

From its beginnings in Killarney, KCRU has expanded to include dedicated teams in Beaufort, Firies, Rathmore, and Kenmare, providing vital support across a wide geographical area.

"KCRU would like to thank everyone who has supported the scheme over the past 10 years, our volunteers, past and present, the many individuals and organisations that fund the scheme, and the emergency services personnel whose support and guidance have been invaluable," Kevin O'Leary, Operations Manager for the group told Killarney Outlook.

The unit provides immediate basic response care to life-threatening medical emergencies, particularly cardiac incidents, in the critical minutes before the arrival of the National Ambulance Service.

KCRU has placed strong emphasis on training, equipping, and supporting its volunteers to maintain high standards of patient care. The organisation also acknowledges the longstanding support of local businesses, especially Tricel and Independent Irish Health Foods (Henry & Richard), for their continued backing over the years.

Despite being 100% volunteer-run, the service operates 24/7, made possible by a committed and growing team of responders.

In addition to emergency response, KCRU actively promotes community awareness and preparedness through a range of annual initiatives. These include Operation Resuscitation, Restart a Heart, and the School






CPR Challenge, which aim to train members of the public, young and old, in life-saving techniques.

As it enters its second decade, KCRU expressed gratitude for the ongoing community support



and reaffirmed its commitment to serving the people of Kerry.

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Killarney Man To Run Non-Stop 2-Day 200km Kerry Way Ultra Marathon For Kerry Mental Health Association

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SEÁN KELLY MEP

Announces Bid for Fine Gael Presidential Nomination

as Fianna Fáil Faces InternalPressure to Act

Former GAA President and long-serving Ireland South MEP Seán Kelly has officially announced his intention to seek the Fine Gael nomination for President of Ireland, following Mairead McGuinness's recent withdrawal from consideration due to health reasons.

In a public statement, Kelly said he had taken time to reflect on the evolving situation and consulted with family and supporters before deciding to put his name forward.

"In light of these changed circumstances, I believe the time is right to put myself forward for this enormously important role," he said.

Kelly, who has served as MEP for Ireland South since 2009, emphasized his lifelong dedication to public service, as a teacher, as President of the GAA, and as an elected representative in Europe. He said he would be honoured to represent the Irish people at Áras an Uachtaráin.

"I am confident that I can represent the country with integrity, inclusiveness, and a commitment to our communities. To be entrusted with that honour would be the greatest privilege of my life," he added, while thanking constituents for their longstanding support.

Kelly also welcomed a competitive selection process within Fine Gael, noting it would ensure the party puts forward its strongest candidate in what is expected to be a high-profile election.

Meanwhile, across the political aisle, Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has called for an urgent meeting of the party's Parliamentary Party to discuss its position on the forthcoming Presidential Election.

Kelleher, also representing Ireland South, warned that without immediate

action, the party risks losing valuable preparation time.

"Without a meeting convened soon, Fianna Fáil TDs, Senators and MEPs will not meet in person until mid-September at the earliest," Kelleher said, describing that timeline as "too late in the day" for such a critical decision. He confirmed that he had contacted Brendan Smith TD, the Cathaoirleach of the Parliamentary Party, requesting a formal meeting be held to determine Fianna Fáil's approach.

"In my opinion, Fianna Fáil, the largest party in the Dáil, the Seanad and in local government, should be actively involved in either running its own candidate or facilitating a candidate that represents our values and beliefs as a political movement," he concluded.

With Seán Kelly entering the race and pressure mounting within Fianna Fáil, the landscape for the 2025 Presidential Election is quickly taking shape.

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
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
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Minister Patrick O'Donovan to Launch Kerry Icons Art Exhibition by Paul Egan



The Department of Culture, Communications and Sport, in partnership with Kerry County Council, is proud to present Kerry Icons, a striking exhibition by visual artist Paul Egan. The collection is on display at Government Buildings, New Road, Killarney until September 23rd.

The exhibition will be officially launched by Minister Patrick O'Donovan at 10:30am on Tuesday 26 August. The event is open to the public, and all are welcome to attend.

At just 22 years old, Kerry-based artist Paul Egan has gained recognition for his unique graffiti realism style, using aerosol spray paint on recycled materials. Kerry Icons features 50 near-photorealistic portraits of influential Kerry figures—from writers and athletes to actors and activists—sprayed onto repurposed vinyl records sourced from local charity shops.

Subjects include cultural icons like John B. Keane and Peig Sayers, sports legends such as David Clifford and Mary Jo Curran, and internationally renowned actors including Jessie Buckley and Michael Fassbender.

"This collection celebrates those who have shaped Kerry's identity," Egan says. "It honours both well-known and forgotten heroes who've made a lasting impact locally and beyond."

Michael Moore of the Department added, "We're delighted to host this powerful exhibition, which highlights the depth of Kerry's cultural influence."

Celtic Erasmus+ participants receive YouthPass certs

Launched by Ireland South MEP Seán Kelly and club executive members last February, Killarney Celtic Football Club's historic Erasmus+ Youth Mobility project has now drawn to a close with participating players presented with YouthPass certificates to acknowledge their learning and experiences during the initiative.

The certs were awarded to all the Irish and Italian participants in the project which saw a ground-breaking youth event take place in Italy at Easter.

It was the first time an Irish sports club has availed of Youth Mobility Erasmus+ funding and the trip saw 30 young Killarney Celtic players, with group leaders and accompanying adults travel to Verres in Northern Italy for the exchange.

The link, established between Celtic and Verrès college ISILTEP, delivered a great programme of activities which was undertaken jointly by a group of Italian youth with the Irish visitors drawn from six different Killarney Celtic teams at under 13 and under 16 levels.

The programme, supported by the local mayor and community, included a full programme of


cultural activities, sports and climate change impact tuition and it focused on challenges facing young people in both communities.

In its final project report, the club has called upon the EU and Léargas, the national agency supporting Erasmus+ projects in Ireland, to involve more sports clubs as a means to build on their youth networks for exchanges.

The Celtic club officers are happy to share their experiences to encourage other Kerry clubs

to get involved in Erasmus+ projects through the Kerry PPN, the Kerry Recreation and Sports Partnership and the Kerry Schoolboy and Girls' League.

Based on the success of this exchange, the club hopes to apply for funding for further Erasmus+ projects in the future and looks forward to hosting a delegation from the Italian partners in August 2025.

WHO'LL BE WOULD-BE PRESIDENTS?



Our minds in Killarney are on the Presidential with our local man Seán Kelly now "enthusiastic" about running.

MEP Seán seems to have overcome his seven year itch: Among other reservations about the office, Sean said seven years was too long a term and a day out of Kerry (John B Keane is the originator of this fatuity, though nobody seems to attribute it correctly or even at all) was a day wasted for a mainly ceremonial role. Seán is furiously trying to row back on all that now as I write.

But what do we want for president? Michael D was not just a politician - he was a poet, albeit more doggerel than rhyme. And a bit of an intellectual snob. Far too vocal on some issues and not saying anything much on other more pertinent Irish ones. Such as housing and immigration where we badly needed common sense leadership.

A Bob Dylan fan, with more than the whiff of Lenin and Trotsky, Michael D in his clipped clear lecture tones had a lot of cachet. Certainly Seán Kelly would appeal to the GAA and especially the older men and women is my thinking. No bad thing at a time of extreme volatility.

But I couldn't see too many young people voting

for Kelly. His is an older, more male Ireland, steady and teachery and Catholic conservative and very much obedient eurocrat.

Heather appeals more. She's a no-nonsense woman and from a Protestant/Presbyterian background who has walked the bridge; she has a great grasp of social issues having headed up a credit union and distinguished herself in several ministries. She wears pearls well and already looks the part.

The Fine Gael foot soldiers as well as hierarchy including the Limerick arts minister are behind her. Why anyone expects Fine Gael ministers like Patrick O'Donovan to get behind anyone from Killarney is beyond me - we didn't even elect a Fine Gael councillor here not to mind a TD. And as for Patrick gifting us millions for a theatre, dream on!

After Presidents Higgins and McAleese, we could do with a bit less grandstanding and Heather would be no grandstander. I would love to see Bertie Ahern's hat in the ring. I think all his skeletons have been exposed and there is little to fear in Fianna Fail putting him forward. I met Bertie numerous times and I can only say he was unfailingly courteous and open and still is if I bump into him walking in the gardens in Glasnevin. Of all the Taoisigh I met over 30 and more years, he remains my favourite. Always accommodating journalists even during his holidays, often privately - and presciently giving out to us about news editors and the direction of media. He was friendly without being too cosy. I never heard bad language and cursing out of him and neither did he put on airs and graces. Unlike one or two others.

Northern Ireland remains the big cross. All three I have mentioned have the cachet of having contributed to peace and a more open Ireland.

Kelly with Croke park opened to rugby (and concerts); Heather with being from Monaghan and her background; and Bertie with the Good Friday Agreement whose negotiations he stuck with even through his own mother's funeral.

Should our cafes open longer in an effort to meet the new cafe culture?

Limerick council has urged cafés and retailers to extend their opening hours to increase footfall in the city and to meet the "massive demand for non-alcohol related events", I read.

Limerick has a night-time economy advisor and he has been working on the Twilight Thursday initiative to revitalise the city.

It is something we should seriously consider in Killarney.

I have several times been disappointed in Killarney to find cafes closing at 4 or 4.30 pm. Doubtless they have their reasons. But it gives a poor impression in a tourist town to find you can't linger over a coffee and a chat till late afternoon.

The pub culture dominates in Killarney - even as most people are drinking less and less. And even as pubs now are in the coffee trade.

The Kenmare Place area might be replicated in other sectors including on the Beech Road and lanes off Main and High Street.

There was a proposal some years back to put umbrellas over Main Street. But roofing against rain and also too much sun would be far easier to achieve along the narrow lanes. We have too many people involved in promoting tourism and too few coming up with new ideas. Perhaps a night time officer for Killarney? To take into account the late afternoon?

The Edwardian Hunting Party

The Cahill political family - who Fine Gael now realise will be very difficult to oust - are the latest to raise the scourge of too many deer.

Michael Cahill TD and son Tommy, his parliamentary advisor, are looking at the serious risk deer pose to the human population in Killarney.

"Wild deer wandering freely on the roads of Kerry, pose a significant threat to the safety of all road users and that combined with the added danger of contracting Lyme disease from their ticks, makes it imperative that deer numbers are culled to manageable numbers," the Cahills said. Climate Change is now being cited as a reason for an increase in Lyme disease cases in the US. Warmer temperatures and increased humidity accelerate the spread of ticks that carry Lyme disease. Mild winters and longer, hotter summers allow ticks to survive and reproduce more successfully, potentially expanding their range and increasing the length of time they are active each year.

Michael talks about the first step which is Deer Management Strategy Group which he believes will have bigger culls to reduce the numbers. He also wants to have a Lyme Disease Department set up in UHK in Tralee - given the proximity to such large deer herds in Killarney National Park.

I would like to throw the revival of Edwardian house hunting parties into the mix. The shooting parties could be limited to a few weeks in the autumn, and the number of guns also limited. Hunters would be vetted for their skills in deer hunting, accompanied by rangers from the

national park and charged huge fees. Packages to include top hotels in Killarney would surely lure some of the best deer hunters in Europe. The deer killed could be eaten and sold locally, alongside Mangerton lamb. We really are unrealistic if we think that we can have Bambis running amok all over the county and not address management issues. Not the least of which is the dire state of our woodlands and wild areas overgrazed by the starving deer.





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Ballyhar Dynamos Celebrate 50 Years WITH FAMILY FUN DAY

allyhar Dynamos FC is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year having been formed in 1975.

The club played its first Kerry District League game in October 1976 and has been an everpresent since. This is a huge achievement for a small rural club to survive and grow at a time when soccer was not as popular as it is now. So many of the other clubs from that era have folded but Ballyhar Dynamos, thanks to the hard work of club members past and present, has continued to grow and develop with close on 300 members currently from u6 to senior level.

The club is based in the parish of Firies which is situated mid-way between the Kerry towns of Tralee & Killarney. Today the club has teams in the Kerry District League and the Kerry Schoolboy/girl league. Over the years many divisional & cup honours have been won by our Senior, Youth & schoolboy/girl league teams. Our seniors have won the Kerry reserve cup on three occasions along with winning the Kerry area of the Munster junior cup.

In the early years the club faced many challenges and only for generous local land owners allowing the use of their land the club would not have survived. The club purchased three acres in 2003 at Rusheen, Firies with the playing pitch finally open from September

2006. The clubhouse was built and in use from 2007. A 40m x 25m Astro pitch was installed in 2017 with the surface of the access road & car park being upgraded in 2020. The support of locals through the club lotto and fundraisers over the years as well as support of grants and sponsors has allowed the club to offer the highest level of support to its members. The fabulous facility which the club has now at Rusheen is named Murt Scott Park in honour of local man who passed away in July 2008 after three decades of service to the club. There are plans in place to develop a second full size playing surface in the coming year to help cater for the growth the club has experienced. The club has secured generous grants in the form of Sports Capital grant and hope to have some fundraising events to help complete this project.

The club continues to cater for boys, girls women and men and is growing every year. The ladies Social Soccer team has been a great addition to the club and acts as great inspiration for young girls, showing them a pathway to plays sport into adulthood. The club has also just recently launched a new set of club gear and will be looking fantastic for years to come. The future looks very bright for Ballyhar.

This Sunday 24th August the club is hosting a free family fun day celebration from 12pm – 4pm at Murt Scott Park (V93VF1H). There will



be facepainting, an underage blitz, activities for all the family. Vendors will be there with coffee, ice-cream and hot food as well as a shop to cater for every need. The day will culminate with the honouring of the founding members and a 'Legends' game. Where past players of all ages will make one last return to cross the white lines and represent the club in a friendly game. We hope to see as many people as possible on the day to help celebrate the amazing work this club has done and continues to do for the local community.

The evening will feature guest speaker Maeve Ryan of Kerry Recreation & Sports Partnership, who will provide a tutorial on the use of Activator Poles followed by a Q&A session. A representative from Kerry Library will also be on hand to discuss the Activator Pole Loan Scheme available through the library.

As an added bonus, on Thursday, August 28th at 11am, there will be a full demonstration of the poles in action, led by the Killarney Strutters Walking Group. Participants will meet at the bridge opposite St Mary's Cathedral. If interest is strong, Kerry Recreation & Sports Partnership is considering launching a 4-week Activator Pole Walking Programme.

What Are Activator Poles?

Originally developed by Canadian therapists, Activator Poles are specially designed to assist people with mobility or stability issues. Now gaining popularity in Ireland through initiatives such as FitWALKIreland, these poles are used both in rehabilitation and community

fitness settings.

They are built with ergonomic handles for comfort and wrist alignment, telescopic shafts that adjust for height, and bell-shaped rubber tips for improved traction and

stability on uneven or slippery surfaces.

Benefits of Walking with Poles

Scientific research backs the growing trend, citing a wide range of benefits:

Better posture and balance

Reduced joint stress (especially in the knees, hips, and ankles)

Improved upper body strength and coordination

KILLARNEY CHARITY HONOURED IN KENYA SCHOOL CELEBRATIONS

July 17th 2025 was a special day in the history of Edmund Rice Education Centre, Embulbul Kenya as the school celebrated 25 years of education provision for the children of the village. What started out as a feeding centre for needy children in 2000, very quickly developed into a primary school with the aim of helping children from the slum village attain a primary education.

In 2004 a secondary school was opened followed in more recent years by vocational training units providing further educational training in Dress making, Hair Care, Woodwork. In 2025 the complex houses both schools, the vocational units, a hostel for 12 girls, and a newly created dairy unit providing milk and yogurt for the school students and methane gas to fuel the kitchen which feeds approx.. 800 students and staff each school day.

The Kenya Education project set up in 2003 has been linked with the school story from the beginning. The project started out by sponsoring a small number of needy students to attend school. Today the project is sponsoring 100 students, some at primary level, others at pre school and secondary. A sponsorship guarantees a full year of schooling and a hot meal each school day as well as some paid text books and stationery. A number of students are helped each year to attend further educational colleges and training opportunities. The project sponsors a sports day each year with

students competing in Volleyball, Soccer, Netball, Table Tennis and Basketball. During yearly visits volunteers visits the homes of sponsored students and see at first hand the challenges many students experience on a daily basis in getting an education.







Chimneys remain a top cause of fire in homes according to fire brigade data



Chimneys, flues, hot ashes and soot were the top cause of fire recorded in 2024. Fires occurring due to malicious intent and rubbish burning also featured highly in statistics published today, compiled by the National Directorate for Fire and Emergency Management, in the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage using data provided by fire services throughout the country.

Fire brigades attended almost 20,000 fires in 2024 across various locations that included domestic

buildings, industrial facilities, motor vehicles, forest and grassland areas, outdoor rubbish sites, right through to ships and aircraft. Within homes, fires caused by electrical wiring and electrical equipment, cooking and heating all featured as causes of fire attended by fire brigades in 2024.

The data also records 25 total fatalities in 2024 from fire incidents in homes, with 21 of those 25 deaths involving people aged 55 or over.





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Today's a day to celebrate outstanding Leaving Cert results but keep an eye on the timeline



SUCCESS

The 2025 Leaving Cert cohort achieved a great success today, Friday, 22nd August, when the exam results were issued at 10am by the State Examinations Commission (SEC) directly to candidates through the Candidate Self Service Portal (CSSP). Results are also available in schools from 10am.

SUPERB

Leaving Cert results in Kerry are superb again this year. When it comes to achievement in the Leaving Cert and securing places in Further, Tertiary and Higher Education, Kerry students are top of the Class. While success should be celebrated, it's important to consider your options during the next few days and to keep a close eye on the fast-moving timeline. CAO offers will flood into Kerry when Round One is released at 2.00pm on Wednesday, 27th August and important decisions will have to be made about your next step.

EARLY

Leaving Cert results were issued early again this year as the timeline gets back to normal after the disruptive pandemic years. 66,144 candidates entered for the Leaving Cert this year - 61,632 for the established Leaving Cert and 4,512 opting for the Leaving Cert Applied (LCA). 1,932 candidates from Kerry entered for the 1,854 Leaving Cert exam - 1,711 for the established Leaving Cert and 143 for the LCA.

ADJUSTMENT

The post-marking adjustment applied by the SEC following the marking process was reduced to an average of 5.5 % this year, down from last year's 7.5%. That should result in an overall downwards adjustment of 2025 Leaving Cert exam grades and should see some downwards movement in CAO points' requirements for some courses. However, the 19,782 applicants to the CAO who are presenting previous years Leaving Cert results with inflated grades could

keep points high for competitive courses.

MARKS

Candidates can see their marks, including marks for each component and the post marking adjustment, on the CSSP from 12pm on Tuesday, 26th August. Candidates can apply on the CSSP to view their scripts online between 5pm on Tuesday, 26th August and 8pm on Wednesday, 27th August. LCA application to view scripts is done online during the same timeline. It's well worth viewing your marked scripts before deciding to appeal any subject(s) results. The facility to view marked scripts is provided free of charge.

VIEWING

Both scripts marked manually and scripts marked online will be available to candidates for viewing. In the case of the former, each candidate will be assigned one of two three-hour sessions on Saturday, 30th August. Session One is from 9.30am to 12.30pm, Session Two is from 2pm to 5pm. Online access to view scripts that were marked online will also be available from 9am on Saturday, 30th August to 9am on Sunday, 31st August.

RECHECK

Any candidate who wishes to submit an appeal application against an awarded grade – commonly called 'applying for a recheck' – can do so on the CSSP between 10am on Sunday, 31st August and 5pm on Monday, 1st September.

APPEAL RESULTS

The results of appeals will be available to view on a candidate's CSSP from 11am on Friday, 26th September. Appeal results will also be available on Schools Portals from 11am on Friday, 26th September. The appeal fee is €40 per Leaving Cert subject and €15.50 per LCA subject. The fee is refunded if the appeal is successful.

TIMELINE

The timelines for candidates to apply to view scripts and to lodge their appeal applications are very short. The SEC maintains that these timelines are essential to ensure that the remaining stages of the appeal process can be completed as quickly as possible. The SEC will not accept late applications for viewing scripts or for submitting an appeal against an awarded grade.

CAO OFFERS

Latest CAO data confirms a final application figure of 89,308 applicants, up significantly from 83,169 applicants in 2024. The blue riband courses are again in high demand and will require high points to secure a course offer. However, with over 50,000 places on offer this year, applicants can be very hopeful of a college offer. All will be revealed when CAO Round One of offers is released next Wednesday. I sincerely hope that it will be a joyful day for Kerry's CAO applicants.

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

Killarney Among Kerry's Trio of Nominations for

Ireland's Greenest Places 2025

Killarney has been named one of the five towns longlisted for the prestigious Ireland's Greenest Places 2025 competition, alongside Castlegregory / Maharees in the village category and the Dingle Peninsula in the community category.

Killarney's nomination highlights its continued leadership in environmental sustainability, thanks to initiatives like the elimination of single-use coffee cups, biodiversity projects, and the work of Killarney Tidy Towns, Mountain Meitheal, and Killarney Sustainable Vision 2030. Bridget O'Keeffe, who nominated the town, called it "a shining example of how natural beauty and community-driven sustainability can go hand in hand."

At the heart of the town is of course Killarney National Park, a 25,000-acre UNESCO Biosphere Reserve of ancient woodlands and a sanctuary for wildlife.

Among the major environmental acAievements here was Killarney becoming the first town in Ireland to eliminate single-use takeaway coffee cups, preventing over 1.5m cups or 18.5



tonnes of waste from reaching landfill. Then there are the achievements of the local Tidy Towns Committee, the Killarney Bee Friendly Initiative and the work of Mountain Meitheal in removing invasive plants as well as Killarney Sustainable Vision 2030 which promotes ecofriendly tourism, biodiversity protection and a transition to renewable energy.

"This is not just a town that protects its natural heritage, it is a community where sustainability is a way of life" says Ms O'Keeffe.

Kerry's three entries are among 26 locations across Ireland selected from more than 120 public nominations. The shortlist will be announced at the end of August, with category and overall winners revealed two weeks later.


NORTH TO ALASKA!



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
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












LOVE WHAT IS

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BEAUFORT BUS SERVICE

Newly elected Fianna Fail TD, Michael Cahill has again called on the Minister for Transport, Darragh O'Brien and Local Link Kerry to urgently consider a new Bus Route in Kerry, which would provide a service from Beaufort via Churchtown, St. Mary's of the Angels, Meanus and onto Killorglin town and vice versa. Deputy Cahill previously outlined to the Minister that the demand for this service is very high, that it would cover a large hinterland, with a large population. This would be in invaluable service for the area and allow for easy access to and from St. Mary's of the Angels and St. Francis Special School, and to and from Killorglin and Beaufort. The Kerry TD said it would be a boost to the local economy while



contributing to reducing traffic. The Fianna Fáil Spokesperson for Older People and Tourism has asked the Minister and Local Link Kerry to review their previous decision.

"I believe that there is sufficient demand to justify this service and I will continue to fight hard to ensure that rural communities in Kerry are not forgotten about when it comes to state infrastructure and public transport" said Deputy Cahill.

"There is a major ongoing campaign for this new Bus service in Mid Kerry" added Michael Cahill TD.

Councillor Tommy Cahill has also confirmed his support for this important service in Beaufort. "I will be raising this important issue at the next Council meeting where I will seek the support of the Council" said Councillor Tommy Cahill.

Healy-Rae's Welcomes €388,000 for Kerry Outdoor Recreation Projects

"We have some of the finest walking trails and outdoor attractions in the country. This funding recognises the importance of keeping them in top condition, as well as planning for future improvements so that Kerry remains a world-class destination for outdoor activities."

The ORIS programme supports the goals of Our Rural Future and the National Outdoor Recreation Strategy – Embracing Ireland's Outdoors, with further announcements under Measures 2 and 3 expected later this year.

Minister Foley receives confirmation that Language Assistants in Kerry will get a pay rise of 10%

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry TD Norma Foley has today received confirmation that Language Assistants in Kerry are getting a pay rise of 10 per cent.

The Language Assistants Scheme is also being extended by a year for the school year 2025/26 as part of a nationwide package worth €1.964m for the year.

The scheme, which has been in existence since 1992, is managed on behalf of the Department of Rural and Community Development by Oidhreacht Chorca Dhuibhne in the Southern Region. The purpose of the Language Assistants Scheme is to strengthen Irish as a community and family language in the Gaeltacht by providing language assistants in Gaeltacht schools.

As a result of this increase, the Language Assistants' pay rate will increase from €23.20 to €25.52 per hour from the beginning of the new school year.

Minister Foley said she had received confirmation of the pay rise for Language Assistants from her cabinet colleague, Minister

for Rural and Community Development Dara Calleary.

"This is a positive development for Language Assistants in Kerry and it acknowledges the great work that they do to protect and promote the Irish language," she said.

The scheme operates in 102 primary schools, 29 post-primary schools and one special school across the Gaeltacht and in 11 primary schools and 5 post-primary schools located in Gaeltacht Service Towns or in Irish-Language Networks in which language plans are in effect.














Kerry FC were back in Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup action on Friday evening as they took on Cobh Ramblers in Mounthawk Park in the third round of the competition.

Cobh came into the game on a hugely impressive run of form, losing just one game since the twenty-seventh of June. They progressed to this round of the cup thanks to a 2-0 win away to Crumlin side Bangor Celtic with goals from Sam Bellis and Matthew Whelan.

Kerry FC's route to the third round was one of the highlights of the second round weekend as a Joe Adams free kick late in stoppage time brought them to extra time, where Kennedy Amechi would get the winner.

The cup weekend came at a good time for Kerry FC as they needed a distraction from last week's loss to Finn Harps in Tralee, and it was hoped it would be a good one. The sun was out, and the Rose of Tralee International Festival was in full swing; all that was needed to cap off a great weekend was a place in the Quarter Final draw The game got off to a lightning-quick start when, inside the first minute, Cian Brosnan dispossessed John O'Donovan just outside the area. O'Donovan then took down Brosnan, giving referee Aaron O'Dowd no choice but to give a straight red card. Brosnan took the given free kick, which was a bullet, but unfortunately went wide of Timothy Martin's goal.

Kerry FC knew then they would have an advantage on the away side, but also needed to take that advantage; thankfully, they did so in the ninth minute of the game. A cross into the area was headed away by Shane Griffin and came back to Cian Brosnan, who hit a left-foot volley straight into the back of the net, being nothing short of a Cian Brosnan special.

A couple of minutes later, Ronan Teahan was in a great position to double the lead in no time, but the chance was also in a very tough angle, meaning his proceeding shot could only find the side netting. Kerry started very lively, and Cobh looked to be on the ropes since going down to ten men inside just the first minute

Cobh Ramblers had their first opportunity of the game after fifteen minutes when Barry Coffey had the ball in the back of the net, but he was ruled to be offside, which was a close call but the right one from the fourth official.

Just after the half-hour mark, Ronan Teahan had a curled effort from inside the area go wide, nearly getting that second goal that they deserved in the game. Chris McQueen got on the end of a Sean O'Connell free kick seven minutes later, but the glancing header went just wide of the right-hand post.

The cross came from the right and Murphy rose highest to but O'Connor made sure that Kerry FC protected their lead. Just five minutes later, Harvey Cribb had a glorious chance at the back post, but he didn't a good enough connection on the opportunity, and he squandered the opportunity

They would live to regret that as just three minutes later, Kerry FC had the chance to go

Kerry FC were in dreamland, and the overall performance warranted the win because from minute one to ninety-six, they were nothing short of pure class

The full-time whistle sounded, and Kerry FC added their name to the Sports Direct Men's FAI Cup Quarter Final draw for the first time in their short history. All eyes will now be on the draw on Tuesday afternoon to see who the next team is on this brilliant Kerry FC cup run.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS

SENIOR

Group One

Na Gaeil 1-15 Austin Stacks 1-12

Look, there's no point in pretending. If you had just told me the final scoreline without distinguishing the sides, I would have been impressed with Na Gaeil getting to within three points of them. Straight up, my confident prediction at the start would have been Crokes, Dingle, and Stacks as main contenders, Kenmare with an outside chance. Na Gaeil? Very good defence, probably the best midfield options out there....poor enough in attack, especially with the retirement of Dan Goggin. Stacks? A multitude of injuries is all that really took them down to Intermediate, and look at the players coming through, even if at least one is watching the likes of 'Home and Away' and 'Neighbours' nowadays.

The simple truth is that Na Gaeil were absolutely full value for a win that I would call little short of sensational. Diarmuid O'Connor was sensational, notching 0-5, Stefan Okunbor stuck rigidly to Joe O'Connor in a mostly successful man-marking job – few enough inter-county players can say as much this year – and all three Barrys did well. The main gamebreaker, though, was Kerry's hurling captain Oisín Maunsell, who came off the bench to kick 1-2. Na Gaeil were a point up late on but Diarmuid O'Connor's second two pointer wrapped up the win.

Group Two

Dingle 1-19 Milltown/Castlemaine 0-10

Dingle, last year's finalists, absolutely had to win to keep their hopes alive. Once again they were badly depleted, missing four Geaneys, Tom O'Sullivan, and Barry Dan O'Sullivan. At full strength they are a match for anybody – as they showed last year, they get stronger towards the latter stages, provided that they can get there. On this occasion they were down a point at halftime but sprang Paul Geaney. For my money he has been the best individual performer in Kerry domestic football for the past two years, with Kenmare's Seán O'Shea second - that's not disputing that Crokes have a better team. but in terms of individuals....Look, Paul Geaney came off the bench here at half-time, and he still finished with 1-8. Milltown/Castlemaine are a fine team, but they couldn't amass that total collectively. Technically they can still wallop Kenmare Shamrocks and qualify, but they are 25 points behind Kenmare on scoring difference and 11 behind Dingle. Beat Kenmare by 12 and they go through, but to be honest, I don't see that happening. Very much a coming team, but not quite there yet.

Group Three

Dr. Crokes 1-14 Rathmore 0-15

Champions Dr. Crokes have two wins from two and are guaranteed to top the group. They were made to work hard for 45 minutes against Spa in their opening game, and they were made to work even harder on this occasion against Rathmore. In fact, it took a brilliant late goal by Alex Hennigan to see off Rathmore, who were leading by two points at the time. I don't think Crokes' management will mind the hard games – frankly, it's no harm to have any slight rust knocked off early on - but they will be a little concerned at chance conversion rate, an area where the team normally excel. Topping the group means that's a problem for another day, though, whereas Rathmore are facing into what is effectively a winner-take-all game against Spa for the second spot. A draw would suffice for Rathmore, but it should be a belter of a game.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

Group One

Kilcummin 0-16 John Mitchels 0-10

Kilcummin are quietly and cleverly going about their business, and clocked up an impressive win over John Mitchels (Na Gaeil are the only Tralee side to win last weekend). Paul O'Shea kicked 0-5 for the winners, but they had a range of threats, including Brendan Kealy's accuracy from two point frees.

Fossa 4-16 Firies 0-18

It says a lot when people were asking me "How did he play?". Not "how did they play?". For the record, Emmett O'Shea played superbly and kicked 2-6 along the way. Mind you, Emmett himself will be smiling at the idea – the 'he' in question kicked nine points, by the way. Fossa led by 1-9 to 0-10 at the break and a slightly fortuitous goal by Emmett early in the second half had them in control even before Ted O'Gorman blasted another. Matt Rennie scored the fifth early on. Firies are very good but very young. Killarney Legion absolutely had to win this and did so, but they will freely admit that they rode their luck a bit in the dying minutes. Joe Joe Grimes, who was spectacular at times, levelled the game in the second half but Listowel were caught with just two defenders while on the attack, resulting in a switch of attacking direction and a handy free for David O'Sullivan. With the last play of the game, Seán Keane had a two pointer free for Listowel to win it, but it was too far out even for a free-taker of his quality. Listowel will feel a little hard done by, given their performance, but Legion take the points. Listowel have to beat Laune Rangers in their final game (I submit that the Killorglin side will be strong favourites) and have to hope that other results fall their way.

Laune Rangers 1-10 Ballydonoghue 0-13

Laune Rangers could be said to ride their luck a little bit as well, with a late free by Eoghan Hassett earning them a share of the spoils. Brian Mason had appeared to have won it for Ballydonoghue with a late two pointer. John Tyther's penalty had put two points between the sides, and that was the biggest margin at any stage in a cracking game of football. As things stand, Ballydonoghue v Killarney Legion is basically a winner-take-all in the final round. A draw would suffice for Ballydonoghue – but Listowel beating Laune rangers would throw any angry cat right in amongst those pigeons!

Group Three Glenflesk 1-21 Castleisland Desmonds 3-11

Another game with a highly dramatic finish. Adam O'Donoghue and PJ Curtin goaled in the first half for Desmonds but an incandescent Tommy Bowler kicked four two pointers from midfield to give Glenflesk a 0-15 to 2-7 half-time lead. There was little between the sides in a gripping second half. Darragh Roche equalised in the closing ten minutes and Luke Crowley nudged Glenflesk in front, but Desmonds were desperately unlucky to see a kick-out go awry

and Tommy Bowler goal to snare the win.

An Ghaeltacht 2-18 St. Marys 0-15

There was a touch of luck about Aidan Walsh's first half goal, Bryan Sheehan having injured himself with a short kick-out that effectively left Walsh to tap into an empty net. There wasn't anything lucky about Gaeltacht's win, though Cathal Ó Beaglaíoch notching 1-2 and cousin Ruairí kicking 0-5. An Ghaeltacht have to lose by less than a potential Desmonds' win over St. Marys plus 13 points. Not a foregone conclusion, but unlikely enough, especially if the talismanic Sheehan is out for St. Marys.

Group Four Gneeveguilla 5-16 Kerins O'Rahillys 0-12

I think Na Gaeil's win over Austin Stacks has to take the plaudits as the surprise result of the week but, even allowing for Gneeveguilla's known quality, a win of this magnitude over a traditional power like Rahillys has to run it a close second. Gneeveguilla were lightning fast, especially a hugely impressive Paudie O'Leary. Up front Pádraig Doyle had three points on the board before setting up Seán O'Keeffe for the first goal to make it 1-7 to 0-1. Yes, read that scoreline again, just in case. Paudie O'Leary goaled himself late in the first half for a 2-9 to 0-5 half-time lead. Pádraig Doyle had two goals himself in the third quarter and the game was already over as a contest.

That makes for not one, but two cracking games in store in the final round. Rahillys have to beat high-flying Beaufort, who are almost – again, I stress the almost, scoring difference could come into play – certain of qualification with two wins already. SENIOR COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

Okay, stay with me here, because this is kind of complicated. I'm not sure exactly why it needs to be so complicated. Sixteen teams....I wouldn't have thought it was a hard number to work out a knockout championship format, but there you go....

Anyway, North Kerry (frankly, an amalgamation of Feale and Shannon Rangers has been long overdue, and the success of North Kerry at underage has had a clear and visible impact on football there – it was an obvious move, given that neither Feale nor Shannon Rangers have been really competitive at senior for a very long time, too long for a heartland of Kerry football) drew the short straw and are straight into round two. Look, without being patronising or particularly accurate, I'm going to refer to that as the 'loser's round'. All of this is officially called 'preliminary round one'. Arrah, stop.

There are six divisional teams in round one (preliminary). Let's go crazy altogether and call that 'the first round'.

This was a very simple draw with 6 divisional teams in the hat with a straight draw to make three Rd 1 fixtures; East Kerry, Mid Kerry, St Brendan's, St Kieran's, South Kerry and West Kerry.

St. Kierans v East Kerry

I would say this is the tie of the round. East Kerry at full strength are an obvious powerhouse and will be up among the favourites. St. Kierans' have always had a huge obstacle in drawing from three different divisions, a real tangle in terms of co-ordination, but even without the unfortunately injured Philip O'Connor, they have a lot of talent to draw on. I agree that East Kerry will be favourites, but I genuinely think that this is very far from a foregone conclusion.

St. Brendans v Mid Kerry

Beaufort and Laune Rangers are up among the favourites for the Intermediate (mind you, that's the tightest championship I think I have seen, with a lot of teams in the mix). St. Brendans were outstanding last year, but when you take Stacks out of the equation.....still plenty of good footballers, but I give Mid Kerry the nod here. Buy-in will be important from the clubs. The harsh reality is that if you have a real chance of winning an Intermediate All Ireland (and the Kerry winners always have a real shot – the presence of divisional teams in or County Championship affects the grading), you are going to be slow to jeopardize it for a divisional Bishop Moynihan.

South Kerry v West Kerry

Look, the truth is that rural depopulation

means that neither side is the powerhouse of old. South Kerry have a lot of coming players.... lan O'Sullivan, Jack Clifford, Emmett Daly, Donnacha Shine....West Kerry have a lot of power, but have they the cutting edge up front? Honestly, I don't think so.

The 3 losers of this round will join North Kerry to make 2 Rd 2 fixtures. The 3 Rd 1 winners and the 2 Rd 2 winners will join the 9 senior club teams in the Round 3 open draw. The first two teams from the draw will receive a bye into the quarter finals with the remaining 12 teams making up 6 Rd 3 fixtures and it will be straight knockout from here on in.

SOCCER

It's hardly a newsflash, but last week the FAI finally admitted that the planned switch to summer soccer was no longer mandatory. No surprise to anyone; that was a nonsensical idea from the start. I get the theory. Yes, of course you want to play in the best weather conditions. You want kids spending more time with the ball if you want to develop them into elite players. The only problem with that laudabe ambition is that there were good and valid reasons for playing during the school season in the first place, and you haven't even attempted to address them. I always fel a bit sory for Ruud Doktor, and absolute gentleman from start to finish - and a lot of his ideas, particular in terms of time on the ball for juveniles, were and are brilliant - but he was dealing with a sporting administration who made FIFA look both competent and honest, and a soccer culture that had never advanced beyond the sixties (why would they, when all our talented players were moving to English clubs asap?). His replacement? Talked a great game...after a month, I would have happily paid into a go fund me page for his ticket back home on a permanent basis.

Forget summer soccer. During the school year, kids have fixed schedules and soccer coaching can be slotted into that. During the summer? Family holidays and events, summer camps (the GAA's Cúl Camps are the most prominent, but every sport uses these as fundraisers)..... you can't fit a fixed schedule of games into an unfixed schedule. You can argue about the GAA's split season all you like (a lot of players go travelling/working abroad during the league and return for the championships) but the problems are an awful lot more fundamental.

I beleve, and have believed for a long time, that you have a lot of petty fiefdoms in Irish soccer and very little centralised ideas. The LOI should be paramount and your main juvenile coaching basis should be through those clubs. But there is a complete disconnect between them. For decades, any juvenile looking to advance their soccer career simply had to move to a DDSL club. Gaelic football is undisputedly the top sport in Kerry, hurling in the likes of Kilkenny and Clare. Cork, Limerick, and galway embrace all sporting codes. Rugby made huge advances twenty years ago; I'm not sure that it has grown much since then. Dublin is the only county were soccer dominated as a juvenile sport, and that hasn't been true for at least a

decade (mind you, senior success and massive GAA investment were strong drivers that might not necessarily continue into the future). How many juvenile players in Kerry go on to play senior soccer in the KDL? In 2015 Kerry won the Kennedy Cup for the first and only time under Brendan Hogan. Three years later, one member of that panel was still playing the game. One. That's your problem. Nothing else; that's it in a nutshell. So you need to link those two things. Summer soccer, even if the idea had a chance of working, would do absolutely nothing about

After covid, the League of Ireland it new heights of popularity. Clubs still lost money, which is a very bad sign, but more people were watching than ever before. Last year's title race gripped a lot of casual sports followers - that's exactly what you want. This year Shamrock Rovers are pretty much running away with it the excitement just isn't here. Nothing against Rovers, but you want drama. But Irish soccer's biggest problem? That popularity growth (and spectator numbers have dropped significantly across the board from last year's highs) had absolutely no impact on juvenile soccer. None. It is an entirely different realm of sport.

Yes, you need to invest in better coaching (and volunteerism is in decline across the board in all sports). Better facilities, definitely. Long term, you'd like to see a link-up at underage between the FAI and the IFA (i.e. Northern Ireland). I did say long term – right now, the blunt truth is that IFA games have a serious hooligan element.

And that's going to require approaches slightly more sophisticated than going to the Irish Government cap in hand. I believe that the FAI should support LOI clubs a lot more than they should (remember when John Delaney used to get paid almost triple what the LOI winners would receive?) and investment in juvenile coaching should be done through the clubs (given previous records, the money should be ring-fenced and paid out on receipts, obviously). Will that happen? Not a chance. The Schoolboys/Schoolgirls Association would lose all their power at a stroke and the FAI Executive would lose all that lovely bargaining power and votes. It would be a much better way of doing things from the kids' perspective, of course, but when did that matter

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.





ALPINES

The vast majority of alpine plants are easy to grow in any reasonably well drained garden soil. alpines are ideal plants for rockeries and gaps in stone walls and they will give you colour from early spring right through the summer, the most important thing when choosing your alpine plants is to make sure you find out the growth rates so that one alpine plant won't take over other alpine plants in the rockery.

A good example of this would be an alpine called Cerastium (snow in summer) which is quite a quick growing alpine and spreads quickly in a short space of time. it can tend to take over small rockeries. having said that it is a beautiful plant with silver foliage and is covered, as the name suggests, in beautiful white flowers. It can be pruned back to keep it under control.

There are also lots of alpines which are compact and can make perfect mounds and shapes. alpines are also great fillers for stone walls, an ideal plant for this would be a Campanula or aubrieta.

The aubrieta is a pink flowering plant that you see growing out of a lot of grottos. alpines can also be used in containers such as in troughs or window boxes but try to choose ones that are evergreen so that you will have some colour all year round.



"Remember not the former things, nor consider the things of old. Behold, I AM doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert" (Isaiah 43:18-19).

Welcome back dear student the season of back to school is hectic - parents frazzled at the costs and lists, children and teenagers anticipating the new school year, families trying to get a few last days out together to make some memories. When the seasons change transition can be difficult for people young and old. But change is good — every day we are given opportunity to grow and learn more. But if a person is living with regret of the past it can hinder their ability to move on and look forward (Mark 11:22-25). Last week we looked at the torment of fear and unforgiveness and its relation to sickness attacking the body. You know yourself that wounds untreated will fester and become nasty. It's no different with offence, bitterness, and unforgiveness. Not only does it have a toxic effect upon the mind and the body, but it stunts one: chained to the past. This makes it difficult to progress. "It was for freedom that Christ has set us free" (Galatians 5:1).

The Lord Jesus sacrificed His life and freedom for our sins, iniquities, curse, and pain (Galatians 3:13). "Yet it was our weaknesses and griefs He carried, it was our sorrows and pain that weighed Him down. And we thought His troubles were a punishment from God. But He was wounded for our rebellion (sins), bruised for our iniquities (generational sin and trauma), the chastisement for our peace (freedom) was upon Him, and by His wounds we are healed" (Isaiah 53:4-5). This is such an insightful passage - spelling out the suffering of the Son of God, Jesus, the Lamb Who brought Salvation for anyone who will believe and receive Him (Romans 10:9-13). God promised that whoever calls upon the Name of the Lord Jesus for Salvation will be saved - that is Good News friend - it means forgiven, healed, delivered, and set free. Mankind had no hope of salvation, so God's Son came down as one of us - but He never sinned, and then Jesus paid the ultimate price by taking our sins upon Himself, becoming cursed, so that we could receive freedom and redemption. No one else could save us. And His Salvation is not just a ticket into Heaven when we die, as some kind of 'just made it and hope to scrape by in God's Kingdom as a skivvy'. No! God has adopted us into His family making us His covenant sons and daughters, as joint heirs with the Lord Jesus so that we can enjoy the benefits that He paid for - righteousness, health and wellbeing, peaceful minds and families, joyous purpose, and fellowship with both God and others - and freedom from slavery and bondage (Romans chapter 8).

The Bible is a letter from God to you and me and anyone who will believe Jesus. Talking about going back to school — is there a letter you would write to your younger self? What would you share with that child: direction, reassurance, and wisdom? I'm not talking about sending the winning lotto numbers! But looking back, you've gone through things that have caused learning. You understand more now, you're wiser, and growing in your relationship with God. The freedom that Jesus bought with His Blood has brought you on a path of restoration from the pain of the past. 
