

The master stag is dominant during the mating season (rut) and he will ward off all challengers and will successfully mate with hinds. Typically a mature native red stag has between 12 and 14 points on his antlers, however this one has 21 points on his antlers and a very large body size and he has been given the title of The Grand Master as he has no equal in Killarney National Park. 

BRENDAN KENNELLY



The Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr Jimmy Moloney, has extended his condolences to the family of the late Brendan Kennelly following his death on Sunday.

"Brendan Kennelly was a remarkable poet and writer who produced some of the most important and iconic poems which now form part of his rich legacy. He made poetry popular and accessible, which won him such admiration nationally and internationally.

"Brendan was first and foremost a Ballylongford man and despite many years in Dublin, he always maintained a close link with, and a love of, his native place.

"Several years ago, Kerry County Council had the honour of hosting a Civic Reception for Brendan in his homeplace. I know that was one of his proudest days, surrounded by his family and neighbours."

The Chief Executive of Kerry County Council, Moira Murrell, said that Brendan Kennelly was an exceptional ambassador for Kerry.

"Brendan Kennelly was an exceptionally generous and kind man who always had great time for the people of his native county. He has made an enormous and enduring impact on Irish poetry, literature and culture, which is his wonderful legacy."

Statement from President Michael D. Higgins on the death of Brendan Kennelly

As one of those who had the great fortune of enjoying the gift of friendship with Brendan Kennelly for many years, it is with great sadness that I have heard of his passing. As a poet, Brendan Kennelly had forged a special place in the affections of the Irish people. He brought so much resonance, insight, and the revelation of the joy of intimacy to the performance of his poems and to gatherings in so many parts of Ireland. He did so with a special charm, wit, energy and passion.

Delivered from the flux of transacted life, ordinary words of the everyday had their beauty revealed for audiences and, in their recovery, the public shared life being celebrated.

Brendan's poetry is infused with the details and texture of life, its contradictions and moments of celebration including the wry experiences of football and politics.

With more than 30 collections, he leaves a major body of work, a legacy of teaching as Professor of Modern Literature at Trinity College Dublin, and the gratitude of so many younger poets whom he encouraged with honest and helpful critical advice.

In the plays and poems that engaged the Classical world, Brendan sought to interrogate the inner lives of figures from myth and history and to connect their torment to the sense of loss that endured into contemporary memory and experience.

He was a ballad-maker invoking an ancient craft of balladry but bringing to it his special lyrical endowments. This reconstruction of motive and struggle was something he brought to villains as well as heroes, be it Cromwell, Judas or other figures of history as they struggle with conscience or the legacy of

their actions in unremitting memory. Brendan Kennelly engaged widely with major themes but celebrated too the humour of 'devilment' in intimacy and sexuality with such characters as Maloney in his 'Up and At

He took the responsibility that he saw in the writer's life with a sense of being asked to share what was most human, universal. He was faithful to what he saw as a gift that had been given with expectation of a delivery that would draw on all experience including that of Kerry, its people and stories.

"A gift that took me unawares and I accepted It"

We are all so much the beneficiaries of that acceptance.

When asked on his 80th birthday event in the Abbey Theatre in 2016 how he would like to be remembered, he said that he hoped people would remember his poems and remember them off by heart, for the sharing. How apt then that so many would turn to his poem 'Begin' and use it for comfort and compassion in our recent accounts of life in pandemic times.

There are many for whom an insightful and twinkling intelligence has left us, but it will endure in the lines of the poems as he wished. Sabina and I offer our condolences to his sister Nancy, his brothers, Sean, John, Alan and Paddy, his granddaughters and the extended family as well as his wide circle of friends, all of whom treasured his presence among them, a friendship he valued.

AS A RESOUNDING 22nd EDITION COMES TO A CLOSE

erry International Film Festival (KIFF) celebrated its 22nd Edition over this past weekend, 14-17 October 2021. This year KIFF presented a blended festival that included 15 physical events and 30 online screenings and the KIFF team was overwhelmed with the level of interest and support they received over the four days of the festival.

KIFF has gone from strength to strength over the past 12 months and they recently generated the largest number of film submissions in the festival's history to date. Additionally, KIFF 2021 was the first year back to presenting physical events after going exclusively online last year due to covid restrictions. KIFF were delighted to see a significant increase in both national and international engagement and participants included headline sponsors Kerry Airport, as well as a wealth of local businesses and representatives from Kerry County Council and Screen Kerry.

Sponsors, filmmakers, supporters, actors, and film buffs travelled from near and far to County Kerry in celebration of KIFF 2021 for what was truly a spectacular event and one that exceeded KIFF's expectations. Audiences were treated to a variety of screenings in Cinema Killarney as well as virtually online, and KIFF 2021 events included the opening night celebration in Randles Hotel Killarney, the IFTA Networking event in The Plaza Hotel Killarney, the awards ceremony in J.M. Reidy's and the closing screening FOSCADH (Shelter) being showcased in Siamsa Tíre Tralee.

A highlight of KIFF 2021 was the announcement of the Maureen O'Hara Award winner, Kathleen Kennedy. Kennedy is an eight-time Academy Award-nominated film producer and president of Lucasfilm (ET: The Extra Terrestrial, Indiana

KIFF presented this award online via a special 'In Conversation' interview with Kennedy, hosted by producer Rebecca O' Flanagan (Smother, Handsome Devil). Another important highlight of KIFF 2021 was the Irish Film and Television Academy (IFTA) networking evening which took place at The Plaza Hotel Killarney on Friday, 15 October. This

> event was a huge success and brought together a wealth of industry talent including producers, directors, actors, and film enthusiasts. Hosted by CEO of IFTA, Áine Moriarty, the event outlined the plans that are taking place to showcase Kerry as one of Irelands most spectacular filming locations for international and Irish productions and opportunities for new film business in the future. Áine Moriarty said "The Film industry in Ireland is growing exponentially and Kerry has the ability to attract a substantial part of this business into the country and we can all work together to make this happen". The event included speeches by Chief Executive of Kerry County Council Moira Murrell and Kerry Arts Officer Kate Kennelly. Siobhán O'Sullivan, Screen Kerry, also

Killarney celebrates THE LIFE OF BRIAN

An influential tour operator, who specialised in bringing tens of thousands of American visitors to Ireland, over a period of 60 years, has been honoured for his enormous commitment to supporting tourism in Killarney and Kerry.

Brian Moore was feted at a gathering to mark his last ever Brendan Vacations tour to the town as he plans to spend more time on the golf course after long and distinguished career.

A special presentation was made to the remarkably fresh 81-year-old, accompanied by his wife Mary, Killarney-based sister Stella, and his last tour guests, at a dinner in the Killeen House Hotel where Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Marie Moloney, and Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President, Niall Kelleher, led the tributes.

Mayor Moloney said while the staycation market has helped enormously in the post-Covid recovery, Killarney have really missed the opportunity of being able to roll out the traditional welcome mat for visitors from North America with whom the town has a special bond.

"Central to that wonderful relationship has been Brian Moore who is a true friend to Killarney and I know how very highly regarded he is by all those in our tourism and hospitality industry," she said.

"On behalf of the people of Killarney, I wish Brian, Mary and their extended family every happiness for the future and I thank them for helping to keep Killarney to the forefront of the international vacations industry over so many years," the mayor added.

Chamber President Niall Kelleher said Brian has been one of the true giants of the tourism industry, one of the prime movers and shakers in the Ireland-North American vacations trade for several decades and one of Killarney's true friends.

"The name Brian Moore and the brand 'Killarney' have one very significant thing in common – they both carry the stamp of quality. "Just as Killarney is renowned throughout the world for its sheer beauty, its charm and its hospitality, Brian Moore is equally celebrated for his professionalism, his legendary business acumen and his wonderfully engaging personality.

"As he accompanies his last official tour to Ireland, and to Killarney, we want to avail of the opportunity to express a hearty and very genuine word of thanks to Brian for helping to put our great town on the map – and working hard to keep it there".

In 2015 Brian was inducted into the Order of Innisfallen which recognises outstanding contributions made to the area by people from outside Killarney, especially in the tourism sector.

Born in Dublin and now based in Rhode Island, Brian has been a pivotal player in the development of Irish tourism for six decades.

He started out his career in tourism and travel as manager of the Joe Malone self-drive operation in Limerick and Shannon and he made his first sales visit to America in 1965.

Brian was appointed sales manager for the hotels division of the Ryan Travel Group in 1967 and, three years later, he became the New York based marketing manager for Shannon Travel. He then opted to set up his own travel business, Brian Moore International Tours, in the US to specialise in bringing tourists to Ireland and he quickly developed BMIT into one of the most ground-breaking and leading tour operators into Ireland from America.

It was a very common sight – especially in Killarney – to see large coaches decked out in the BMIT livery, travelling the highways and byways of the country and parked outside so many of hotels and major tourist attractions.

Brian sold his company to a major travel conglomerate in 2000 and he later joined CIE Tours, in a part-time capacity, for a six-year prior during which time he was responsible for a dramatic increase in the company's visitor numbers to Ireland.

In 2012, he became executive director with Brendan Vacations and he brought millions of euro worth of business to Killarney through his hugely popular travel enterprises.

The enterprising Dubliner was also responsible for bringing the first American Colleges football match to Ireland in 1988 with Boston College v Westpoint attracting a capacity crowd to Lansdowne Road.

Brian is married to Mary (née) McElligott from Newcastlewest and they have two daughters, Sharon and Siobhan.

KILLARNEY SLIPS IN POST-LOCKDOWN LITTER

RANKINGS AS TOWNS IMPROVE

The first post-lockdown survey by Irish Business Against Litter shows Killarney and Tralee both deemed Clean but falling in the ranking of 40 areas nationwide, to 22nd and 23rd spots respectively. Last year Killarney was in 2nd position. While the majority of our towns have cleaned up over the past 12 months, litter in our main cities has worsened to levels not seen in ten years. Portlaoise emerged as cleanest town. The study found no fall-off in PPE litter across the country. The An Taisce report for Killarney stated:

It was the reduction in the number of top-ranking sites which brought down Killarney's overall ranking. There were no heavily littered sites. High Street, Killarney Train Station and Port Road were all in very good order, not just in regard to litter but overall maintenance. It would seem

that the 'outdoor dining' was contributing to the litter presence along Scott's Street, based on the menus, food waste and salt



& pepper sachets on the ground. Killarney House and Gardens is a wonderful resource and most of it was very clean, but it was impossible to ignore the litter close to the entrance / signage.

IBAL was once again critical of the failure of local authorities to address sites which they have previously highlighted as heavily littered, especially in urban areas. Of the 103 such sites exposed last year, fewer than half have been cleaned up in 2021.

2021 is the 19th year of the IBAL Anti-Litter League.





Has the CAO ERRED IN NOT **CIRCULATING PHYSICAL COPIES**

of the 2022 CAO Handbook?



he 2021 CAO application season ended on Friday, 15th Oct. and the 2022 CAO colleges application season is all set to open on 5th Nov. A final bit of housekeeping was finalised last week after the publication of the subject appeal results on the 8th Oct. In total, 3,939 candidates appealed 10, 651 individual grades in the 2021 Leaving Cert exam. As a result of the appeals 410 upgrades were issued to 393 candidates. 376 of those received one upgrade and the other 17 received two upgrades. It means that 10% of the candidates who lodged an appeal against individual grades were successful in the appeal. Any of those candidates, who were entitled to a further CAO college offer, received it in Round Five on Wed., 13th Oct.

There's widespread dissatisfaction amongst Career Guidance Counsellors and CAO applicants at the decision of the CAO not to circulate physical copies of the 2022 CAO Handbook this year. The Handbook is available in digital form only, as a plain text edition, as a PDF document and as an interactive flipbook. In my opinion, the physical copy of the Handbook is an essential research document in a variety of educational settings. The physical copy of the Handbook, available free of charge, is the most equitable format for all potential applicants. The Handbook is used as a workbook in guidance class and is an invaluable tool in guidance practice. I scribble information onto it regularly. I constantly add notes and updates on the pages and use a variety of coloured markers to highlight important courses. I requested a physical copy of the 2022 CAO Handbook directly from the CAO and am relieved to have received it. Old habits die hard, especially when they have a good track record!

Some of my main concerns about the digital handbook include the lack of access of some students to computers and iPads, the lack of in retrieving the full document and the increased risk of error. In addition, students use the physical Handbook to highlight courses of interest, to write relevant information onto the Handbook, both in class and at home. The physical Handbook is a vital Guidance Counsellor aid in highlighting key dates and deadlines and it provides equal access for all potential CAO applicants, irrespective of means or social circumstances.

Every Leaving Cert student should now have opened the digital 2022 CAO Handbook. It contains all the relevant information about the CAO application process. Use the next few months to go through it carefully and find the information you need to assist you with your application. The CAO Handbook 2022 explains how to apply for a third level college place. The colleges in the CAO system are listed in alphabetical order by location. The courses in each college are listed directly under the college title, with 'Level 8' courses being listed separately from 'Level 7/6' courses. Select your personal preferences from the entire range of courses in the Handbook. Each course is assigned a code, which you enter on the application. You may apply for up to ten courses in each of the two categories, listed in order of your preference.

The CAO Handbook 2022 doesn't contain information about general academic requirements, specific course requirements nor content of courses, so consult the colleges' Prospecti and websites for that information. Many colleges are currently providing on campus or virtual open days for those contemplating college. Consider the potential career value of each course in which you are interested. Play to your strengths as you do your course research during the next few months. Jot down your personal career profile, including such variables as ability, achievement, application, aptitude, ambition, nationwide high-speed broadband, difficulty values, interests and personality (5AVIP). Select courses that suit you in order to have a fulfilling and successful college experience.

You can open your interactive CAO account from noon on 5th November to 5pm on 20th January at a discount application fee of €30. Thereafter the fee increases to €45 up to 5pm on the normal closing day, 1st February. The online change of course choices facility, which if free of charge, also closes at 5pm on 1st February.



The Economic Recovery Plan addresses the need to build resilience and diversification into Kerry's economy to respond to the additional challenges and opportunities faced by businesses in the county, including in the post-Brexit and post-COVID-19 environment, the transition to climate neutrality, the transition to a digital economy and the opportunities presented by remote or blended working.

It is a comprehensive plan with some 189 actions. Among its key objectives/targets are:

To rollout a significant programme to support the reopening of business in the county from targeted marking campaigns promoting Kerry as a leading destination for business, tourism, investment, and study to investments in outdoor dining and performance spaces throughout the county.

To deliver energy efficiency retrofitting upgrades to local authority housing stock, and public lighting, as well as the continued 'greening' of public buildings.

KEEPING YOUR DOG SAFE AND HAPPY THIS HAUOWEEN

With Halloween fast approaching, Dogs Trust is issuing advice to help dog owners keep their pets safe at what is often the most stressful time of year for pooches.

As dogs' hearing is approximately four times more sensitive than humans, they can hear much higher frequency sounds, so the whizz, pop and bang of fireworks can be terrifyingly overwhelming for many dogs. Research* revealed that while almost three-quarters of fearful dogs recover by the next morning following firework exposure, recovery can take up to one day in 10%, up to one week in 12%, and several weeks or even months in >3%.

The charity has put together their top tips to help keep your dog happy this Halloween:

Make sure dogs are wearing collar and ID tags and their microchip details are up to date in case of escape

Prepare tasty dog friendly Halloween treats, such as food filled interactive toys, like K9 Connectables in advance and consider freezing

them to make them longer lasting to keep your dog busy

Create a cosy den or area your dog can hide safely and comfortably

Walk and feed your dog before the fireworks

Close the curtains, turn the lights on and put on some soothing, rhythmic music to drown out the firework noises and flashes

Before answering the front door to 'trick or treaters', make sure your dog is behind a firmly closed door inside to prevent any escape attempts

Dogs may not recognise people in costumes, so don't force them to receive any unwanted attention, even from family members as they may react in fear.

Niamh Curran-Kelly, Veterinary and Welfare Manager at Dogs Trust Ireland continued: "If your dog really struggles with fireworks, please contact your vet who will be able to discuss whether medical treatment might be helpful during the Halloween period. Also, don't forget



to keep all treats meant for humans safely away from your dogs, especially chocolate, raisins, grapes, and anything containing xylitol, all of which are toxic to dogs. If you suspect your dog has eaten anything they shouldn't, please call your local veterinary practice immediately and always store their out of hours' emergency number on your phone."

- maintaining adequate social distancing whenever appropriate
- covering our coughs and sneezes and keeping our hands clean
- sector-specific guidance and protocols, including with regard to work, hospitality, cultural and sporting events will be reviewed and strengthened where appropriate. Compliance activities will be reinforced by relevant bodies, and through wider public and stakeholder communications. A meeting of the Regulator's Forum will be convened to discuss further with relevant departments and agencies.

In line with public health advice, the remaining aspects of the hospitality, entertainment and night-time economy sector can reopen only with the full range of protective measures in place and the wide and robust

implementation of the EU Digital COVID Certificate (COVID-19 pass).

The further easing of restrictions planned for 22 October can proceed with the extension of some non-pharmaceutical interventions including use of COVID-19 pass (as set out below) in light of the high level of disease in the community at this point in time and the uncertain trajectory of the disease.

Protective measures include:

- requirement for EU Digital COVID Certificate (COVID-19 pass)
- (vaccine or recovery certificate) for indoor hospitality and events
- face masks (can be removed for consumption of food or drinks as appropriate)
- table service only in hospitality settings (max of 10 adults per table, and max 15 including children)
- collection of contact tracing data

for indoor live music, drama, live entertainment and sporting events audience/spectators should be fully seated (standing permitted at your seat)

- specific sectoral guidance will be developed for nightclubs setting out appropriate protective measures. This will involve COVID-19 passes, contact tracing data collection and wearing of face masks except when eating, drinking and dancing
- COVID-19 passes and fixed capacity limits will not apply for outdoor events. However, sectors should ensure appropriate protective measures are in place
- organisers of indoor and outdoor group activities should ensure that appropriate protective measures are in place, and where indoor groups have a mix of vaccinated and unvaccinated people indoors, pods of 6 should apply. Fixed capacity limits will not apply to these indoor and outdoor group activities
- religious services and weddings can proceed without capacity limits but with all other protective measures remaining in place
- return to workplaces will continue on a phased and cautious basis for specific business requirements








1 tbsp oil (plus extra oil to drizzle over tomatoes)

1 red onion chopped

3 cloves garlic crushed

2 tablespoons tomato puree

1 courgette peeled and chopped

150g frozen peas

Salt and pepper

5 tomatoes

900 ml vegetable stock


1 tablespoon nutritional yeast

1 heaped teaspoon golden syrup

1 tin cannellini beans drained 2 cups macaroni pasta

100g spinach

Cut the tomatoes into wedges and place in a baking tray, drizzled with oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper and bake in the oven on high temperature for 20 minutes then set aside until needed. Fry the onion in the oil for 3-4 minutes on a medium heat being careful not to burn. Add the courgette and tomato puree and golden syrup and stir for another minute or so. Add the oven baked tomatoes including any oil left on the baking tray, the peas and beans, the pasta and the nutritional yeast. Stir well and then add the vegetable stock cook for another 12 minutes or so and then stir in the fresh spinach for a minute or two so leaves wilt. Your soup is now ready to serve.





DANNY HEALY RAE CALLS BUDGET

"ANTI RURAL"

Dail Speech Wednesday October 13th 2021

"I am glad to have the opportunity to talk on the budget again this evening. It is an antirural budget. It is hurting a great many people, especially people in rural Ireland. Anyone with a wheel of any kind is affected. People travelling long distances to work, parents taking children to schools, lorry men transporting items to shops and so on will all face increased costs. Taxi men are hurt. Farmers with jeeps and tractors are going to be hurt. There is no recognition at all of the carbon they sequester. Agricultural contractors are being hurt. Elderly sick people who are trying to heat their homes are being hurt. Many people on benefit payments have been let down. I raised this with the Minister. Deputy Humphreys, the other day. I spoke about people on illness benefit, jobseeker's benefit, enhanced illness benefit, occupational injury benefit and disablement benefit. A pensioner living with a cancer patient who is in

receipt of illness benefit does not qualify for the fuel allowance. How can that be fair or right? These people paid their contributions through the PAYE system. They would not be getting the benefit payments if they had not. These people are being left behind and that is totally wrong. In County Kerry, there were 697 applications to the local improvement scheme. Last year, we got money for 11. This year, we got money for 22. That is not enough. That is not fair. The people in Kerry are entitled to a good road to their door, the very same as the people in Dublin 4. They are paying their taxes, these massive fuel costs and carbon tax. They are paying taxes of every kind. They deserve fair play and they are not getting it.

With regard to the hospitality sector, the VAT rate is to rise from 9% to 13.5%. That will affect all of Kerry. While I welcome the €32 million for school transport, it is only an effort to keep up with the costs. Fishermen and communities have been left behind. Look at





what has happened to them. No one fought for their quotas and they are being left behind. That has an effect on coastal communities in their entirety. I thank the Minister of State, Deputy O'Donovan, for the allowances he made but I ask him not to forget Kenmare. He was good enough to come down to Kenmare and Killorglin when we asked him to. There are a few other schemes as well which he did not mention tonight. I ask him not to forget them because the people of Kenmare have suffered for long enough.

Ring of Kerry: THE GOLDEN GOOSE



he Ring of Kerry road should hold a much higher priority in the scheme of things, for Transport Infrastructure Ireland, Kerry County Council and not least, the Departments of Tourism and Finance, according to Fianna Fáil's Councillor Michael Cahill. The Deputy Mayor of Kerry County Council and Cathaoirleach of Kenmare Municipal District says the volume of traffic on the Ring of Kerry, including scores of large coaches daily during the tourist season, should afford it the investment due a much more highly ranked thoroughfare, but more importantly, the revenue it generates for the whole country, marks it out for Central Government funding.

"The Ring of Kerry is by far the largest and most visited tourist destination in all of Ireland and possibly all of Europe, and yet many parts of it are not fit for purpose for the volumes of

vehicles, particularly large coaches and trucks, that it has to deal with" stated Councillor Cahill. "Add to this the fact that, as it meanders through some of the remoter parts of this county, it also has to cater for work commuters who need to travel for employment to the larger centres. Remember, the Ring of Kerry road exclusively services the residents of Glenbeigh, Cahersiveen, Portmagee, Ballinskelligs, Waterville, Caherdaniel and Sneem to mention but a few" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.


"In terms of overall volumes, the maintenance of this very important and integral piece of infrastructure requires a much larger workforce and budget to be directed towards it's upkeep. The Ring of Kerry requires an enormous amount of road improvements as well as day to day maintenance, including hedgerow

management in order that it's fantastic panoramas are seen to their full potential" said Councillor Cahill.

"You would have to stand up on top of a Double Decker Bus to see many of the world class views that we have to offer, particularly between Glenbeigh and Kells on to Caherciveen. Why are we afraid to show off our spectacular county to the world" said Councillor Cahill. "In addition, this is the same route as The South Kerry Greenway, the single biggest and best Tourism Project ever for our county, a project that will bring life back to the town of Caherciveen, a town that has been on it's knees for decades, with closed up businesses and a black spot for forced emigration. As I have been saying for the past 11 years, the South Kerry Greenway will be undoubtedly a Lifeline and a Gamechanger and will bring a halt to emigration in Iveragh, Caherciveen and throughout South Kerry" stated Councillor Cahill.

"The Ring of Kerry is the first destination on any visitors itinerary when visiting Ireland and therefore it is worth countless millions to this county and country and it only makes sense then, as the 'Golden Goose' so to speak, that it be afforded the best of upgrades and maintenance" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"I am calling for a major investment in this 180km unique and extraordinary stretch of roadway as an investment in the future of tourism in this country. I have been beating this drum now, for many a long day, but I am hopeful that recent experiences during the pandemic lockdown will open the eyes of those in authority to the important things that need to be looked after" added Councillor Cahill.

USING YOUR PENSION TO PAY LESS TAX:

Pension contributions can provide a way of paying less income tax. Up to Revenue Limits, contributions to a pension qualify for relief from income tax. This effectively means that, where the higher rate of income tax is 40% and you are a higher rate taxpayer, a €100 contribution to a pension will only have a net cost to you of €60 (had you not made the contribution, the other €40 would have gone to the government as income tax).

Pensions carry another tax benefit: they grow free of tax, unlike deposit accounts in Banks etc (which are generally subject to tax on interest in the form of DIRT Tax) or investment in property or shares (where rent or dividends could be liable to income tax and gains in value are subject to Capital Gains Tax).


When your pension benefits are drawn down, a Retirement Lump Sum of normally 25% of the value of your pension can usually be taken completely free of tax. The rest of the benefit, is usually taken in the form of a retirement fund or a pension for life, is taxable. However many people will find themselves paying much less tax in retirement than when they were working and making pension contributions, and so will often pay very little tax on their pension income when they retire.







PRESBYOPIA What is presbyopia?

Presbyopia is the normal loss of near focusing ability that occurs with age. Most people begin to notice the effects of presbyopia sometime after age 40, when they start having trouble seeing small print clearly.

Presbyopia is caused by age-related process. This differs from astigmatism, myopia and hyperopia, which are related to the shape of the eyeball and are caused by genetic and environmental factors. Presbyopia generally is believed to stem from a gradual thickening and loss of flexibility of the natural lens inside your eye.


These age-related changes occur within the proteins in the lens, making the lens harder and less elastic over time. With less elasticity, this means the eye has a harder time focusing up close and we may have to hold material further away to see it clearly.

What is the treatment for presbyopia?

Presbyopia is a natural part of ageing and there is no cure for it. The solution is generally to wear

glasses for reading Contact lenses are also available for presbyopia if you do not want to wear glasses.

ARE THERE EXERCISES I can do to stop needing reading



glasses? Will I make my eyes worse by wearing glasses?

No. As presbyopia is caused by the lens stiffening, and not the muscles weakening. Wearing glasses will not make your eyes worse and there are no exercises that can help this. However, you may notice that when you take your glasses off, things appear to be worse without them than before you had them. This is simply because you are noticing how clear and comfortable vision should be. Before you had the glasses, you were unaware how blurry your vision really was because it changed slowly over the years.

Presbyopia will get worse as you age until you reach your late fifties, when you will have no natural focusing ability left. Unfortunately there is nothing you can do to stop it.

For any vision changes it is important to have a sight test to determine the cause.



JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY

takes a look at all things sport...



It's one of the anomalies of Irish history that while most of our history over the past millennium is basically the struggle for independence from England's rule, our civil and legal structures are direct beguests of that former empire. That is a statement of fact, not an opinion on history. It's why we have the antagonistic common law structure - one side wins or loses - while most European states follow the civil law rules - the court's responsibility is to find out the truth. That's why we have a Seanad, just like Britain has its House of Lords - both utterly anachronistic edifices whose purpose was to maintain a very out-dated social structure that retained huge elements of feudalism. Although that, to be fair, is a personal opinion.

That's why club boundaries are based along parish lines. Kerry is one of the very few counties that have a strong 'parish rule' and, much threatened though it is and much of a challenge as urbanisation is (and not just for sport; rural communities are suffering badly), I believe that our parish rule is key to us having competitive club championships at all grades. If you look at a lot of other counties, they tend to be dominated by a couple of huge clubs, and most of the ambitious young players tend to join them. Places like Crossmaglen, Corofin, Sixmilebridge, and Crosshaven deserve to be celebrated.

Communal and cultural representation have been key tenets of the GAA from the start. We won't speak about amateurism; we all know that it was cast to the winds in all but name long ago.

Hurling was subjected to repeated structural changes over a number of years (tiresomely often, if I'm being honest) because, frankly, the sport was dying out. It was similar to sean nos in the seventies or gaelic in the eighties. Admired by most in principle, but actually played or spoken by dwindling numbers.

Those structural changes included moving counties across provincial boundaries. And it was a big success. The likes of Kerry got to play in the preliminary round in Leinster, where they were genuinely competitive – they would simply be annihilated in Munster, as we saw with the minors and U20s in the past two years. Galway were always coming in cold into the Liam McCarthy race; Leinster honed their hurling.

The GAA are now proposing to completely overhaul the structure of the All Ireland Football structure, a much radical idea.

The thing is, it's badly wanted. Kerry and Dublin between them have won almost half, 67 of 135,

All Ireland football titles. That's out of 33 teams most years. Including replays, one or other county has appeared in 103 finals, including replays.

Kerry have won 32 more Munster Senior Football titles than every other Munster county combined. Great for us, but bad for football. Cork have won 9 more than the other four counties combined.

Mayo have played in 82 Connaught Football Finals. Galway played played in 78. That's out of 123 finals in total. Between them they have 55 more titles than all the other counties combined.

Leinster is fractionally more open, as in Dublin have only appeared in a mere 83 out of 113 Leinster Finals. They've still won almost three times as many titles (60) as their closest rival Meath (21). Incidentally, I don't know why the Meath Executive want to get rid of manager Andy McEntee, to me he has vastly improved a county that was in apparent freefall. Mind you, this is the county that backstabbed the great Seán Boylan and never really recovered. History does have lessons, lads....

Ulster is also more open, but 'more open' is still very subjective, Cavan – and this will surprise some of you – still have twice as many titles (39) as the next two counties (Tyrone (16) and Monaghan (16).

Granted, just 2 in the last fifty years ('97 has good memories for Kerry, 2020....less so).

These are not remotely competitive championships. And the increase in scientific advancement, facilities, and games has only made the better resourced counties stronger. The introduction of the back door has

Proposal A

This would involve the retention of the Provincial Championships refashioned into four groups of eight. Preliminary games in Leinster (3) and Ulster (1) would see the losers switched to Connaught. That's a very hard sell. The thing is that, as I said at the start, county boundaries are arbitrarily imposed structures anyway, by an urban-centred administration largely intent on breaking tribal territories and culture. Believe it or not, Cavan (most Ulster titles, remember?) was actually in Connacht until 1584. Louth, on the other hand, was a part of Ulster until 1595, when it was moved into Leinster - well, the expanding 'Pale' that was Dublin. This was not long after the Fitzgeralds of Desmond rebelling Munster and the former loyalist Earl of Tyrone, who had been raised at English court and placed in power by the crown over his uncle and clan chief Shane the Proud, was already another huge threat to English rule you and I know him as Hugh O'Neill

The provincial Championships would then proceed on a round-robin basis, with qualifiers and a familiar knockout All-Ireland series thereafter.

The proposal needs 60% approval, and it doesn't seem to have anything near to enough support.

Proposal B

This one is even more controversial, but a

lot more likely. The inter-county year would start with the Provincial Championships as stand-alone features. Unpalatable, of course, to traditionalists. I'm absolutely fine with it. Frankly, since the Munster Championship started including a back door, I don't consider it anything more than a stepping stone. We lost to Clare in 1992, and it was a tragedy. We lost to Cork in 2006....and I dn't believe that we would have won the All Ireland through the front door. We had kinks to work out. The Munster Hurling Final is legendary. Great games always. It's also been comprehensively shown to be a disadvantage to the winners in the subsequent All Ireland series.

The League would be played as usual, except in a tighter time frame – absolutely no harm in that. The training to game ratio has been utterly ridiculous in recent years. The top five teams in Division One and winners of Division Two would qualify for an All Ireland Quarter-Final. The second and third placed Div Two teams and the winners of Divisions Three and Four would play off for the remaining quarter-final places.

The GAA have promised that they will fully promote the Taillteann Cup. As a follower of the McDonagh Cup in hurling, I personally don't believe them on that for one second.

The GPA are strongly, very strongly, in favour of this. There have also been considered estimates that the GAA's income from games would increase by €10m approx. (the GAA deny that, but of course it will). However, the Provincial Councils are, unsurprisingly, strongly against this dilution of their own power. The Munster Final, after all, would become as devalued as England's FA Cup has become, with top teams regularly playing reserve players. A lot of commentators have pointed out that there is an anomaly in Division teams being eliminated while Division Four winners progress. My biggest concern, surprisingly, hasn't received a huge amount of attention, but I think that burnout will be a big concern. Remember that because of the county/club season split (for which I give thanks and praise and utterances of hallelujah), these games will only represent half of their playing season and they will basically be in action all year round.

It's all or nothing. Either next year's championships is played in one of these formats, or under the same old stale and tired format, including those awful 'Super 8' energy wasters. I'd much prefer Proposal B to no change at all. Unfortunately, I don't see it getting enough traction, either. Certainly, neither Uachtaráin Larry McCarthy nor Tom Ryan are showing any hand at all, and that's not a good sign. If they wanted change to happen, they would be leading the way on this. Instead, the only official GAA position is an implausible denial that Proposal B would increase revenue. We'll all know pretty soon.

NEWSTALK ISSUE FULL APOLOGY TO KERRY

COUNTY BOARD

Ouch. Newstalk's 'On The Ball' is one of the most followed podcasts in the country (I believe that Micheál Quirke's podcast for The Examiner is statistically the most popular). But they cover an awful lot of sports, some of them in very fine detail, and I've heard them making fairly obvious mistakes before. No big deal in that; I'm hardly one to point the figure, am I? They make less mistakes than I do and they put more into it.

But their grovelling apology to the Kerry County Board was for a mistake that carried an awful lot of offense and potential harm, and a full apology and a full admission that their broadcast had contained complete and utter lies was absolutely necessary.

There is no schadenfreude here. Eoin Sheehan is a lovely guy, a dedicated broadcaster, and a Kerry supporter who would never have wished to harm anyone. He was told that certain untruths were absolutely true and well-known, and he stated them as facts on an On the Ball broadcast.

I could speculate as to Eoin's source and their motivation for their untruths. I think most Kerry GAA reporters could the minute that broadcast was brought to their attention. And it was brought to our attention pretty quickly as people asked if it was true. But I certainly won't be doing that, because it would only be speculation. I would have no facts, no sources, no substantiation.

Frankly, I knew that it was wrong (not malicious, just wrong) instantly. But I wasn't going to say that – Newstalk had the right to defend their sources. Free speech and a free press can be much abused these days (hello, America!) but it is an absolutely crucial defence against totalitarianism, which is a very real risk everywhere at the moment with the amount of right and left polarism out there.

But there are basic standards to be upheld as well and in the rush to the top in popularity, there has been a corresponding downhill slide in sleaze, nasty rumour, focus on controversial moments in games rather than quality.

And false statements like this from professionals do need to be confronted – by the way, the idea that the media should simply be self-regulated is something I also disagree with. Fair play to Newstalk for holding their hands up when it came down to it. It was needed.

Na Gaeil beating Desmonds (they both lost a semi-final in the 2020 competition) isn't really a surprise. Desmonds did put up a decent battle and are much improved from where they were a couple of years ago, but they aren't ready to to go senior just yet. I'd say the likes of Luka Brosnan cannot be far away from a call up to Jack O'Connor's squad, though. Stefan Okunbor didn't feature for Na Gaeil, by the way, and no harm. Let the lad breathe a bit before we start pushing him for Kerry. Jack knows his name, he doesn't need to be told. Diarmuid O'Connor has probably been the best overall player of this year's championship.

Beaufort beating Rathmore seems to have

come as a huge surprise. I did have Rathmore as slight favourites, especially with the form of Dan Murphy, Brendan O'Keeffe, Mark Reen, and Chrissy Spiers. But people always seem to underestimate this Beaufort team and I don't know why. Admittedly they didn't really do themselves justice in 2020 Final, but this is a very good team. Liam Carey has been simply sensational all year – him going off with injury after 50 minutes is worrying. Mike Breen was potential at the start of this year; now he's most definitely the real thing. Jack O'Connor, Seán O'Brien, the experienced Nathan Breen, goalkeeper Sean Coffey (he's worth a look at Kerry level as well)....

Relegation: No real surprises here. Mitchels would have been expected to see off Currow, who haven't been the formidable force of old in the past two years. Laune Rangers were always going to beat Ardfert at the moment; I was surprised to see Laune Rangers in relegation at all, to be honest. It'll be John Mitchels v Ardfert in the relegation and, although I have a huge soft spot for the occasionally unruly but always welcoming Ardfert, I really can't see them beating the Tralee side.

JUNIOR PREMIER SEMI-FINALS

4-15 to 1-5. Yowsa! Sure, I expected Gneeveguilla to win. I certainly did not expect them to win in this kind of fashion! They were absolutely superb and appear to be hitting their absolute peak (sadly, they might have to climb that hill again in December as the County Championship will delay proceedings)

Relegation: St. Pats Blennerville (0-9) had too much, as expected, for Finuge (0-6), and it's the North Kerry side who drop down to junior. They were an absolute beacon for a generation in Kerry with Eamonn Fitzmaurice, the Galvins, and the Corridans steeling an incredible team in both codes (Lixnaw in the hurling). The truth is that these things are always a generational cycle for most smaller clubs; they will rise again.

JUNIOR SEMI-FINALS

Firies simply blew Renard away in the first quarter. There are no other words for it. 1-6 to to no score. Renard did come back late on to make it 1-14 to 2-6 at the finish, thanks to a great display by Mark Sugrue, but Firies were unstoppable here. Jack Sherwood was as good as I have ever seen. Donnacha O'Sullivan, who kicked 0-9, gave a master class. But they had absolutely no passengers.

On the other side, Skellig Rangers shocked Listry (and me) in a fantastic game of football. Listry came flying out of the blocks and played awesome football. 1-4 to no score at the water break and it could have been more. Paudie Lehane, Jimmy O'Leary, Ruairí Murphy, and goalscorer Ronan Buckley were imperious. Listry were fast, strong, and had brilliant teamwork. Skellig looked stuck to the ground. Except that Skellig are old and hard hounds in this kind of game. They took a while to get going but when they did (I have to say that it occurred to me that the same was always true of the old 'high nelly' bicycle). The seven 'Lovey' O'Sullivans (two sets of brothers - the other Skellig O'Sullivans are the 'Glen' O'Sullivans) were awesome as Skellig rose to the challenge. Listry, so dominant in the first half, listed badly in the second (I had wondered if their warm-up had gone on too long and sapped their energy – but then, it got them through some very tough games this year). Gary O'Sullivan was an exception, he was brilliant in this half. They only got a single score, an Anthony Darmody free. Skellig, with young Darragh O'Sullivan scoring 0-7 in total and Aidan 'Dash' as always leading the way, ran out winners by 0-14 to 1-8.

T O M M Y W A L S H RETIRES

Tommy Walsh was one of those underage players that everybody heard about before they really saw him, in the same mould as the likes of Colm Cooper



or Dvid Clifford. He was big, fast, hardworking, a team player. He played two years Kerry minor, and his partnership with clubmate David Moran seemed almost certain to win Kerry the All Ireland – you couldn't begrudge Roscommon their replay win in the final, though, they won a brilliant game of football fair and square. He was full forward a year later when Kerry were shocked by Clare in the first round of the U21 Championship. He was already breaking into the senior team by then, that's how good a player he was.

He won an All Ireland U21 in 2008, the last Kerry team to do so. He was also half of Kerry's 'twin towers' with Kieran Donaghy that was successfully countered by Tyrone's McMahons in the All Ireland Final (Seán Cavanagh gave one of the best individual displays I have ever seen in that final). A year later Tommy had his second second senior All Ireland medal in three years after kicking four points in the final. He was Kerry's focal point that day.

Tommy signed a contract to play AFL with St. Kildas in Australia. Two years later he switched to the Sydney Swans. He was very successful and even more popular Down Under, but unfortunately an absolutely brutal muscle injury (there is no nice way to say it, he basically pulled the entire muscle away from his leg) finished his time in Australia.

I didn't think he would make it back to playing senior for Rahillys, given the extent of his injury, but Tommy's passion for his club meant that, while no longer as mobile as he had been, his size, uncanny positional sense, and accuracy made him as formidable a targetman as Kerry had. He was called back into the Kerry team – I thought and still think it was too soon.

I can't say that I really saw a place for Tommy in recent Kerry teams. That's nothing against his obvious strengths and talent, and his character is one of those that I hugely admire (Tommy is tireless, uncomplaining, and a gentleman in victory or defeat) but Kerry over the past five or seven years have been using fluid pace – Tommy is more of a battering ram in the modern sense. He was usually a desperate plan

B in games going awry.

He gave everything he had to Kerry, far more than anyone has ever had a right to ask. I wish him all the best in his inter-county retirement.

Galway's recent underage record proves that they have talent...but Galway turned very quickly on the last Clare man to manage them, and Ger Loughnane had no bad record either! It'll be interesting.


In a dramatic final quarter Cunningham cut the gap early on before O'Sullivan got an open look at the basket and fired in from beyond the arc.

DIVIDING HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS

If you divide your herbaceous Perennials regularly it will ensure healthy, vigorous plants that will look good and should perform

year after year. It also gives you the opportunity to multiply your plants.

Every two to three years should be enough to divide most perennials to maintain good vigor and healthy plants but if you want to divide them for the purpose of propagation, it can be done more regularly.

The best time to divide herbaceous Perennials is when the plants are dormant, so anytime from November to mid March.

A lot of spring flowering plants such as Irises, are best divided in summer after flowering when they produce new shoots.

When you have divided your plant and you have either planted some in the border or in pots, remember to keep well watered until established.





KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

APPLYING FOR A STUDENT GRANT

Question: I just started college. Can I still apply for a student grant?

Answer: You can apply for a student grant if you are taking an approved course and meet the income and residency criteria. These include:

- Your family's means must be under the specified threshold for the previous tax year (2020). If you or your family have had a change of circumstances during the current tax year, your changed circumstances may be taken into account.
- You must have been ordinarily resident in Ireland for three of the last five years.
- You must be an Irish, UK, EU, EEA or Swiss national. You may also be considered for a grant if you have refugee status, subsidiary protection or leave to remain in Ireland.

Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI) awards student grants.

You can use SUSI's **eligibility reckoner** to see whether you meet the criteria for student grant funding.

To apply for a student grant, you complete an **application form online.**

Applications to SUSI close at midnight on 4 November 2021. If you are refused a grant or are approved a grant at a rate that you don't think applies to your situation, you can appeal in writing to SUSI within 30 days of getting your decision.

If you are living in direct provision or are in the international protection system, you can apply for support under the **Student Support Scheme for Asylum Seekers.**

UNHEALTHY RELATIONSHIP PATTERNS

Do you find yourself repeating similar patterns in different relationships or in a particular relationship over time? Perhaps you often feel lonely or jealous in your relationships. Maybe you try to earn the other person's attention by being overly nice or giving without paying heed to your own needs or desires. Do you fear rejection or being abandoned? Could it be that you choose partners who are distant and can make your feel and/or believe that you're not good enough. Do you focus so much on your partner that they feel stifled? Often these patterns can reflect our inner experiences and our beliefs about ourselves and our emotional availability to others. Psychologist John Bowlby defined attachment as a 'lasting psychological connectedness between human beings' and attachment theory can help us to understand the ways in which we connect with others - particularly those who are emotionally significant to us. We develop our attachment style in childhood - and the way in which our parents and/or caregivers responded to us will impact on our relationships.

For example, a child who believed that the only way he/she could be loved was when they were doing something for others, may grow up believing that they need to earn the attention and love of others. Adults who believe they are inadequate and unworthy of love may have learned this in their early years — which will inevitably lead to difficulties in their relationships. They may believe that the other will leave them or that they are going to disappoint the other — leading to them clinging to the relationship and/or getting jealous easily.

However, the good news is that with awareness we can discover our own attachment style and learn to cultivate healthier relationships. Some of the ways in which we can bring more awareness to our relationship patterns include the following:

- Bring your awareness to your bodily sensations. How do you feel in your body? Being aware of this can help you to understand how you are feeling and/or thinking.
- What thoughts are you thinking about you/ the other? How do these thoughts impact on your feelings and emotions?
- Which emotions do you struggle with how do these emotions affect your thoughts and beliefs about yourself?
- Are you overly self-critical? Can you show yourself some self-compassion, support and care the way you might a close friend or a small child?
- Learn to communicate more directly about your thoughts, feelings and needs. Once you become aware of what these are — then you can express them more fully to others.

Next week we will focus on the importance of communication and how counselling can help us to find our own voice, and become more confident as we make ourselves known to another person.


