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Tree of Light Star to honour Rena's memory

woman who dedicated much of her life to ensuring Killarney was a special place to live in and visit every Christmas is being remembered in the town in a very special way this festive season.

The feature star on the spectacular Tree of Light in Killarney takes on an extra special meaning this year as it will be dedicated to the late Rena Kennelly, the gifted artist who designed and created the magnificent Christmas crib in St Mary's Cathedral for over 50 years.

She had been at the helm of that project every Christmas season since the Church was refurbished in the 1970s and her work was created using life-sizes figures, a striking stable full of animals, an artificial lake, fir trees and moss which she sourced herself.

Fittingly, she also helped create the state-of-the-art new crib – designed for a new generation – which was unveiled last year and she was also responsible for the design of the wonderfully atmospheric sacred space in the cathedral.

Rena, who passed away last March, lived in Aghadoe, Killarney and formerly at Cleeny, Killarney and Ballymullen, Tralee.

For her incredible dedication, she received the coveted Benemerenti Medal in August 2022 which is the highest honour Pope Francis can bestow on a person for services to the Church. She was also honoured with a civic award by Kerry County Council.

Rena worked in her earlier years as a nurse in Scotland before she met the dashing Colm Kennelly, a Trinity graduate and a fine footballer who was the youngest member of the Kerry team that won the 1953 All-Ireland.

Colm then worked as a civil engineer for the ESB in Tralee and affairs of the heart brought her home. They later moved to Guyana in South America before returning home again four years later when Colm accepted an offer to join Kerry County Council, later to become county engineer.

Predeceased by Colm, Rena is mum to daughters Shirley and Kate and son Mark.

She is greatly missed too by her daughter-inlaw Paula, sons-in-law John Joe Clifford and Dan O'Driscoll, sister Margaret Moriarty, brother Gene O'Sullivan, grandchildren Jason, Kenneth, Ciara, Colm, Ailbhe, Justine and Catherine and great-grandchildren Roan and Ben. Chairman of the Christmas in Killarney Committee, Cllr Niall Kelleher, said the star dedication was a fitting tribute to a wonderful woman who is very fondly remembered in the town.

"Rena was a wonderfully creative and gifted woman and we all saw her remarkable wok in the cathedral every year," he said.

The Tree of Light and the feature star will be officially switched on after 6.15pm Mass in St Mary's Cathedral on Monday, December 2nd.

The 1,000ft Californian Redwood tree is adorned with over 3,500 energy efficient bulbs. In previous years the Tree of Light star was dedicated to the memory of Johnny Hickey and Yvonne QuillI for their dedication to the Tidy Towns campaign and Paul Coghlan who is a former President of Killarney Chamber of Commerce.



A spectacular 100ft tree, festooned with close on 3,000 sparkling lights and topped with a giant star, will again illuminate Killarney this Christmas.

The towering Tree of Light features on the grounds of St Mary's Cathedral on a landmark giant Californian Redwood tree just outside the main door of the Pugindesigned building.

The project is an exciting collaboration between Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and the Killarney parish and it creates a wonderful focal point in the town in the lead up to and during the festive season. The lights will be officially switched on immediately after 6.15pm Mass in St Mary's Cathedral on Monday, December 2.


Killarney Parish Administrator, Fr Kieran O'Brien and the project committee extend a warm invitation to all community groups, schools, clubs and organisations, families and individuals to join the wonderful community celebration.

The Tree of Light was first lit to mark the millennium year when it commemorated all those who lost their lives in the conflict in Northern Ireland and it was again illuminated in the mid-2000s to remember those who had been killed on Irish roads.

Since then the project is all about community and it celebrates the fact that Killarney is such a wonderful town to live in and to visit. The feature Californian Redwood tree is one of the most wonderful visual features in Killarney and it will greet tens of thousands of visitors passing the cathedral on their way to and from Killarney during the festive season.

The tree is being fitted with up to 3,000 lightweight, energy efficient bulbs to symbolise the memory of loved ones burning brightly within the hearts of those that visit the magical space at Christmastime.

The Christmas in Killarney is organised by Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce with support from Kerry County Council.

BACK COFFEE CUP FESTIVE PUSH

anta Claus and the Mayor of Killarney have joined forces in the lead-up to Christmas to highlight the importance of supporting the innovative local coffee cup project during the festive season.

Shoppers who will be enjoying coffee on the go in the coming weeks have been urged to support the campaign to banish single-use cups and there is a great determination in the town that not even the mischievous Grinch will be allowed to steal the festive spirit and spoil the great work that has been done.

The coffee cup project has eliminated over one

million single-use coffee cups – equating to 18.5 tonnes of waste – per year thanks to the huge effort being made by local coffee shops and hotels

In the absence of a long promised latte levy, the reusable cup takeaway system in operation has sparked a very noticeable reduction in litter throughout the town and the national park and Killarney is setting a great example for every other town, city and village to try to emulate. Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Maura Healy-Rae, noted that the reusable system removed an estimated 23,000 single-use cups from the town every

week and the results are very obvious on the streets and along the nature trails and public amenities.

This Christmas also there will be a novel scheme in operation encouraging people to declutter their home or office by donating a stash of reusable coffee cups for charity.

There will be a charity return station at the Christmas in Killarney Christmas Markets which will be in place in the Fair Hill car park on weekends in the lead up to the festive season.

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THE COMFORT OF UNIFORMS NEEDED ON OUR STREETS

People tell me openly they are wary of walking the Demesne and fearful in parts of the town centre

The common complaint is the lack of garda presence. In Killarney, when all we had was a passing tourist trade - and you knew who and where to avoid - a garda was never far away. These days there has been a sudden and

phenomenal increase in terms of thousands of people we do not know living among us and speaking languages we do not understand and with whom we cannot communicate - and there are no guards to be seen.

We have always welcomed the stranger in Killarney. We depend on foreign visitors and on foreign workers. We travel abroad. We have people living abroad. I challenge anyone to say most people living here, old or new, are not decent people.

The truth is everyone including bewildered immigrants and tourists and locals alike would feel more comfortable with more uniforms.

Foot patrols by gardai and maybe even an offshoot of the Tidy Towns in yellow jackets called Friendly Municipal Police, FMPs, would be welcome.

Last Friday evening at the top of New Street I feared being knocked over by two stropping young fellas on electric scooters literally scooting among pedestrians on the path at Sewell's Corner.

Back down New Street, near Beech Road, people had to edge their way in towards the shops opposite the post office as a large black car pulled up right on the footpath taking up most of the space. There was no room for buggies or wheelchairs. This wasn't late at night, this all happened between 5 pm and 5.30 pm. Not a Garda or warden to be seen.

ELECTION SOUNDINGS

In 2020, Sinn Fein were on the rise and it was easy for me at least to predict the election of Pa Daly, unknown in south Kerry.

two.. The focus is on the Fine Gael seat which was won back after a long drought by Tom Sheahan - on a night I saw old Blue shirts crying. Fianna Fáíl makes no secret of trying to wrest it. But they will have to do a lot of work. Sole candidate Billy O'Shea's campaign is stylish and energetic. More than we are used to in FG campaigns.

As Billy said: "the longer this campaign goes on the more energetic I feel. Because I am getting the response from the people." But will FG be the authors of their own destruction and will one or two FG councillors remain sulking in their corners to the great satisfaction of Fianna Fail?

Fianna Fáíl's real target is the Raes. If Killarney wants major projects we will have to look at the big picture and send back a Government TD is what FF are putting out.

The Raes who are solving lots of small problems but can't get their hands on the bigger ones, don't like it.

Michael Cahill has a strong appeal to Rae voters, is what I hear.

Linda Gordon-Kelleher is backed by the party hierarchy, and she offers a clear and let's face it, younger contrast.

But Danny should survive with daughter mayor Maura behind him. A dark horse in Kerry is Thomas McEllistrim, from the FF family and now with Independent Ireland.

If Mc goes out, will his second preferences go to Cahill, Healy-Rae or to Gordon-Kelleher? Prediction: Same as 2020: One FF, One FG, One SF, Two Non Party, but with an outside chance

Killarney Housing

The stark truth of homelessness in this town - that we have not a single roof for people losing rental accommodation was revealed to Labour councillor Marie Moloney at the recent meeting of Killarney MD.

As I write, news is coming through on the go ahead on Port Road for 224 housing units, all for the private market. This was previously turned down because of the bat on his commute. Those concerns have now been met. Michael Hegarty director of Portal Assets is welcoming the Board Pleanala decision as great news for Killarney "at a time when the housing need has never been greater".

Traffic, density, ecology were all raised by residents and by groups and 29 conditions have been placed.

Meanwhile, there were a total of 42 adults including 6 families with 12 children in emergency accommodation from the Killarney MD. The sad truth is none of the families are

housed here in Killarney - they are sent to Tralee.

Killarney singles can end up in Listowel.

I can't be the only one scratching my head about a so-called local authority with a multi-million euro budget, with a full complement of well-paid councillors, with several empty State and Church buildings from Finan's to the parish hall under its command that can't provide a few houses for emergencies for local people.

"Kerry County Council acknowledges that, at present, there is no facility to provide this service in the Killarney Municipal District due to the shortage of suitable facilities which has been impacted by the various ongoing resettlement programmes. However, Kerry County Council is actively seeking to address the situation and is exploring a number of options with private service providers in the area," they told Marie. Make of that what you will. But they have been saying this with three years.

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.



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OCULAR MIGRAINE

Retinal migraine migraine) is an eye condition that causes brief attacks of blindness or visual problems like flashing lights in one eye.

episodes can be These frightening, but in most cases they're harmless and shortlived, and eyesight goes back to normal afterwards.

Some people get retinal migraine every few months, although the frequency can vary.

Retinal migraine is a separate condition and should not be confused with headachetype migraine or migraine with aura, which usually affects the vision of both eyes.

The symptoms of retinal migraine may include:

- partial or total loss of vision in one eye – this usually lasts 10 to 20 minutes before vision gradually returns
- headache this may happen before, during or after the vision attack

It's unusual for an episode of vision loss to last longer than an hour. The same eye is affected every time in almost all cases.

Vision may slowly become blurred or dimmed, or there may be flashes of light. Some people see a mosaiclike pattern of blank spots (scotomas), which enlarge to

(ocular : cause total loss of vision.

Retinal migraine is caused by the blood vessels to the suddenly narrowing (constricting), reducing the blood flow to the eye. It may be triggered by:

- stress
- smoking
- high blood pressure
- oral contraceptive pill
- exercise
- bending over
- high altitude
- dehydration
- low blood sugar
- excessive heat

Retinal migraine tends to be more common in:

- women
- people aged under 40
- people with a personal or family history of migraine or other headaches

Treatment for retinal migraine usually just involves taking pain relief for any headaches and reducing exposure to anything that might be triggering the retinal migraine.

If you experience any sudden changes in you vision it is important to have a sight test to rule out more serious causes.

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

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.


Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.

KILLARNEY BYPASS - Killarney Town is clogged with traffic on a daily basis and many people have called for an outer relief bypass road, we have been waiting for over 20 years for a defined route, the TII came back with a proposed route 2 weeks ago taking in a route of over 400m in width which is the equivalent of the length of three football fields, this is very unfair and worrying for all the landowners whose land this proposed route is to go through, I have asked the TII to act immediately and go into discussion with each and everyone of the farmers and householders involved on this proposed route. I have asked that the defined corridor be announced as soon as possible.

HEALTH – embargo on recruitment of medical staff has to be lifted, respite care has to be transformed, abolish carers means test, restore reimbursement for cataracts, assessments for ADHD, autism and mental health issues need to be addressed urgently. I have continuously raised the urgent need for an injuries clinic, residential services and day services for Killarney and have asked the HSE and Government that the District Hospital and St. Columbanus Home be used for this purpose.

HOUSING – affordable housing in Killarney and throughout the County, rural cottages need to be progressed, emergency accommodation restored in the Killarney Area.

PLANNING – planning permission is too restrictive for local people in their local areas, lack of wastewater treatment systems is stifling development.

FARMING – food security, too much regulations on farmers, delays and red tape on grant applications and payments, there is no real incentive for young farmers to stay in farming whether it is dairy, beef or sheep.

BUSINESS – the VAT rate needs to be reduced to 9%, rates have doubled and trebled, self-catering providers targeted.



GRADY RAISES LACK OF AMENITIES FOR TEENAGERS IN KILLARNEY

Cllr. Martin Grady has raised the issue of the lack of amenities for teenagers in Killarney.

"Some people may believe Killarney has it all, that's not the case, I think it terms of tourism we may have it all, but for our teens and senior citizens we are lacking amenities", Cllr. Martin Grady told Killarney Outlook.

Teens will tell you themselves the Lack of amenities can lead to anti social behaviour, they need a safe place to meet up winter and summer, i.e, pool tables, snooker, a Bowling alley, according to the last census 1 in every 3 are over 60 in Killarney,

The Killarney Women's Shed and Active Retirement Group, needs a purpose built, permanent home to meet the needs of 160 women currently signed up at the Shed.

Renting a space does not work because they are restricted in terms of access. They can only use the space once a week. They are also restricted and greatly inconvenienced by having to put out chairs/tables, equipment for activities, equipment for catering etc. having to clear away and pack up all our equipment. What cannot be stored has to be taken home by committee members.

The women of Killarney have no space to call their own. Retired women in particular who attend the women's Shed need 'connection'. Sheds help to alleviate isolation, depression and help many who are going through bereavement.

1 in 3 women in Killarney is over 60. (1 in 4 nationally) Kerry has highest rate of over 65 yr olds.

Men's Sheds have access to their premises all week. Women may not need work benches and power tools but they do need a space for activities, talks, dancing, exercise classes, Art/painting etc.

Renting a space that us not fit for purpose is not 'Age Friendly' and is just not working especially with large numbers.

The over 65 demographic has increased by 40% between 2013 and 2023.

This trend is reflected in Killarney town but there is not even a community hall in the town", he added

CARER'S ALLOWANCE

Means Testing for Carer's Allowance is unfair on both Carers and Patients and is costing the State millions of Euro more every year, according to Kerry Fianna Fáil General Election candidate, Councillor Michael Cahill. Carer's Allowance is a weekly Social Welfare payment to people who care for someone because of their Age, Disability or Illness (including mental illness), for at least 35 hours per week over 5 to 7 days.

"If you have savings, shares or property, other than your own home, it will affect your Carer's Allowance. After a lifetime of working hard, I believe people are entitled to have savings and this should not be taken into consideration when applying for Carer's Allowance. People should be entitled to a nest egg after their life's work and many of those caring for a child, may have other offspring for whom they may need to provide for" stated Councillor Cahill.

"If somebody who has savings needed to change their car for example, there may not be much left of it and in these cases the Means Test would prevent many from applying Inflation over the years has also rendered this scheme out of date and I have contacted the Minister for Finance, Jack Chambers and the Minister for Social Protection, Heather Humphreys to remove Means Testing from this vital Government support" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"If our people do not qualify for the Carers Allowance, many more patients will have to rely on the State for their daily care and the bill to the Exchequer could run into hundreds of millions extra" added Councillor Cahill.

GNEEVEGUILLA GRAVEYARD NEARLY FULL

Residents of Gneeveguilla are getting extremely anxious about the number of burial sites available in their local graveyard, according to Fianna Fáil General Election candidate, Michael Cahill. The Kerry County Councillor says it is a similar situation to the issue that arose in Beaufort, the solution to which he helped bring about.

"It can cause elevated stress and worry to people if they believe their deceased loved ones would have to be buried outside the parish and the residents of Gneeveguilla deserve burial spaces in their own area. Kerry County Council have been unsuccessful to date in sourcing suitable land to extend the existing graveyard on the grounds of the Church of the Holy Rosary" stated Councillor Cahill.


"I know the graveyard quite well, having deceased family connections buried there and I understand the feelings and fears of the locals. If an extension has been totally ruled out at this stage, we may have to look to a new site for the future. While this would not be ideal, there would seem to be little choice" said Cahill.

"The vast majority of residents in Ireland wish to be buried in their own parish or town and the residents of Gneeveguilla are no different. The fear of families being divided between different parishes is a very real concern and can cause quite alot of upset. Every measure must be taken to avoid this from happening" stated the experienced Councillor.

"I have contacted Kerry County Council and I will liaise with any local interested parties to facilitate any meetings or negotiations that may be needed, in order to bring a speedy solution to the Gneeveguilla burial site issue. This is what I did in Beaufort and we were successful" added Councillor Cahill.





This canal creates the island of Ross, entering the Lower Lake on the eastern shore at Bunrower and on the western side, it flows under the centuries old Guards bridge, into the Bog Bay at Ross Castle" stated Councillor Cahill.

"The canal, according to the anglers, is in a sorry state, with maintenance not being conducted on it in decades. The area itself, offers a safe haven for boats, but not safe transit. There will of course be environmental sensitivities that have to be taken into account with such a project, but I have urged the Minister and senior officials in the NPWS, National Parks & Wildlife Service to progress it urgently for Killarney" added Michael Cahill.



CALLS FOR THE RESTORATION OF TOWN COUNCILS

The restoration of Local Government Town Councils, with their full statutory powers, needs to happen as a matter of urgency in Kerry, according to Fianna Fáil Councillor and General Election candidate, Michael Cahill.

Councillor Cahill believes that the larger towns like Tralee, Killarney and Listowel need localised representation and decision making to be returned to them, to ensure those who understand their challenges best, are at the heart of it.

"Talking with representatives of local community organisations in all Kerry towns, it is clear to me that the majority favour a return to the Urban District Councils. People felt a more direct connection and sense of place and achievement, when dealing with their local town council. The centralisation of powers has taken that away from townspeople" said Cahill.

"Killarney town, for example, is the capital of tourism in Ireland, attracting visitors from all corners of the globe. Killarney in the past had its own Town Council, its own budget, its own decision makers, Management and Town Councillors who had Killarney at the very heart of the community and were more than capable of making decisions in the best interests of Killarney" stated the Kerry County Councillor.

"The same can be said for Tralee and Listowel. Local democracy is hugely important and motivates people to work for and on behalf of their own area. Not alone do you feel a sense of belonging, but you feel a sense of some control over your destiny" added Michael Cahill.


NEW SIGNS TO BE ERECTED AT ACCIDENT BLACK SPOT

Cllr. John O'Donoghue has raised the issue of Poulgrom Bridge at the recent meeting of Kerry County Council.

In light of yet another serious accident at the junction, that we would again ask the TII to examine further safety measures at Poulgorm Bridge at the junction of the N22 Cork road and R569 towards Kilgarvan.

This junction, which I have had repeatedly on the agenda, is consistently an accident black spot. I feel that until the speed limit is reduced and some extra lighting put in to highlight that there is a junction there, the problem will not be resolved and my great fear is that we will have a fatality here if the TII do not take action. While some improvements have been made at the junction, local residents feel that these measures do not go far enough and it remains a source of worry for them. Reducing the speed limit to 80kph would go a long way in addressing these concerns and I again ask that we call upon the TII to heed our call.

" I was delighted with the response to this Notice of Motion when told that several signs will go up in the coming days indicating a turn off in 1km, 500m 200m etc. This is very positive as it will make the junction much more visible by alerting motorists it is coming up. They have also agreed to apply for more funding in early 2025 for further safety measures. While these changes may not solve the issue completely, they are a huge step in the right direction and I both thank the TII for their reply and welcome the proposed changes", Cllr. O'Donoghue told Killarney Outlook.


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



With Denise Dunlea, Siofra O Shea and Leah McMahon all on the easy list it meant plenty of game time for the Pauls bench with Lynn Jones, Lorraine Scanlon and Meabh Barry all rotating with the starting five. Simeone O'Shea stole in with a nice move but Irish Internationals Kara

McCleane and Shannon Cunningham kept the home fires burning to leave 23-19 at the end of the first in St Pauls favour.

The home side started the second quarter well with Lily Hynes, Rivers and Cunningham drawing them level. But some good defence from Diop in unison with some fine scores from the O Sheas, Rheanne and Simeone, Ormiston and Kerr opened up an eleven point lead, 37-26. Kerry GAA Motions For Convention

They aren't actually heard and voted on : reduction in the County Leagues, I do think at Convention anymore, but rather at the County Board Meeting prior to it. That's not a bad thing in itself. Convention, with the election of officers and the reading of reports from various sub-committees as well as the Chairman's speech, used to run into the early hours of the morning sometimes. There was more passion, certainly – being honest, I found the last couple of County Conventions that I attended fairly anodyne affairs. In the old days it could be quite hotblooded - remember, Kerry senior selectors were elected as well - great entertainment for neutrals, but I wouldn't necessarily say that it was a more efficient way of running thinas.

It is important to note that the debates were quite civil and all speakers, supporters and opposers of all motions, had the best intentions for the games and the voluntary spirit of the organisation. That may sound like me plamásing, but I really do believe it. People care because the GAA is far more than a sporting organisation; it is embedded within our culture and communities in a way that extends far beyond the playing fields. Over the bones of a century and a half, meetings like this are the core reason for

Motion 1

From 2026, the Credit Union County Senior Football League to consist of 10 team divisions. To achieve this, the following will apply for the 2025 Credit Union County Senior Football Leagues:

- In Divisions 1 to 5 inclusive, 4 teams will be relegated.
- In Divisions 2 to 6 inclusive, 2 teams will be promoted.

This motion was withdrawn on a technicality, but I get the impression that it wasn't going to garner enough support anyway. I'm on the fence about this one. Not that I have a vote, reporters are welcome to attend County Board Meetings, with very rare and important exceptions in regard to matters concerning juveniles etc., but don't have a vote and quite rightly can't address the room without a specific invitation to so so. You'd be surprised – and hopefully a little bit worried – at certain other counties preference for operating in secret. There's usually a reason for that, and not a good one. Anyway, in regard to the that we need to lighten the ridiculous playing schedule at the moment, but at inter-county, not clubs. You are picking the low-hanging fruit there, in all fairness. Once again - and I will not tire of saying this - you can clear a whole month out of the schedule simply by getting rid of that absurd group stage in the All Ireland Football Championship. Any politician who comes to me with an promise that they will try to have the appalling phrase 'preliminary quarter-final' made illegal will have my vote.

Motion 2

That the 2025 County Football League commence 3 weeks earlier at the start of March and finish at the same dates as the 2024 County league. This is to avoid fixture congestion and promote player welfare. (Gniomh Go Leith)

Gneeveguilla delegate Bill O'Riordan spoke very well on the proposal. He was absolutely right in pointing out how incredibly tight the schedule for the County League is, with eleven games played over fourteen weeks. With three weeks more to play with, clubs could spread their games a bit better, give players more of a chance to recover, and allow for family occasions or weekend breaks, things can't really do now without hurting their clubs.

However, Joe Costello on behalf of the CCC made a strong argument himself in pointing out that the three extra weeks would be coming from the time allotted for District Leagues and for hurling, which is already far too squeezed anyway, and the delegates accepted that argument.

Motion 5

That the age of Minor be increased to 18 without decoupling (Players U-18 and over 17 can play both Minor & Adult competitions). All other age grades to be changed to even ages and no adult competitions can be held up as a result of playing an U-18 player.

(Cill Airne an Leigiun)

I've never made any secret of where I stand on this. Back when the idea was first being mooted at Coiste na nÓg meetings and the like, I was strongly opposed. So was practically everybody else that I know in Kerry GAA. But Central Council were pushing this very hard, without ever really putting up a convincing argument. U18 clashed with the Leaving Cert....except that, with a majority of schools now implementing transition year (the Sem were one of the pioneers of that very successful educational model), it doesn't. Instead, what happened was that the U20 inter-county championship clashed with third level exams. There was too much pressure on U18s - rubbish. All the players I know loved being involved. And no, I'm not suggesting that most 18 year olds are David Clifford, Declan O'Sullivan, Paddy McBrearty, or the Canavan brothers. But able to play the likes of county league games for rural clubs that are struggling very badly with urban migration and emigration? No, it never made the slightest iota of sense to me and seeing it in action after it was snuck in at National Convention during covid (it wasn't worded as a reduction in age grades, because it had been made very clear in the two previous Conventions that such a vote would not pass) only made it worse. The U17 inter-county minor games had a marked drop in interest and attendance (the fact that an hour between the minor and senior games had to be allocated because extratime was required - once again, allowing for the insertion of more games into a crowded calendar - didn't help). You could look at the likes of Seamus Moynihan, Colm Cooper, or David Clifford and know that you would be seeing them in a Kerry senior jersey within two years. Now, the most talented minor player is four years away, and that does

You also lost a playing grade at Coiste na nÓg. Previously U18 was senior, but you had U16, U14, and U12. You got to know who the players were and who to look out for in terms of Kerry minor prospects, etc. Changing it to U17, U15, and U13 was more complicated and harder to fit into schedules. It also got complicated in terms of post-primary football - some Frewen players were eligible for minor and more fell into the six month lacuna and were too old, sometimes by days (the age grades for the colleges have since been modified in line with Northern Ireland schools and club grades, a move that made a lot of sense). Also, girls can play with the boys at U12 by rule, but not at U13 - again, a reduced birthrate and a lot of young couples being forced to emigrate makes this more significant for many clubs at underage than you realise. Incidentally, if you think that U12 girls aren't capable of bating into boys the same age, God love your innocence. I grew up with four sisters, you should just take my word on that one.

But the biggest issue, the big huge elephant filling the room, is what happens to the U18 players who now don't have a minor grade.

They are going to come home from college or leave work early to sit on a subs bench on a rainy day somewhere thirty miles from home for the senior team? Maybe, though it's unlikely, get two games in the U21 Club Championship, which has always been the poor relation of Kerry club football and mostly involved amalgamations in recent years anyway? No. The majority of them will be gone playing a sport that they can actively participate in on a regular basis or else give up sport altogether. And please, do have a look at the drop-out rate in all sports from 18 – 22 (it's over 50% in both GAA codes according to a 2022 ESRI Study).

As far as I am concerned, the whole county owes Killarney Legion and delegate Donal Culloty in particular for this one. It won't affect things nationally but I believe that it will have a hugely beneficial role In Kerry over the coming years.

Look, I know I'm spending a lot of time on this, but I have good reasons. This one is important; I honestly consider it vital. I'd much prefer if inter-county reverted as well, but it's far more of a priority for me that 18 to 21 year olds get games.

Legion's Donal Culloty told the meeting: "We would like to see the minor age go from under-17 to under-18, and we think decoupling (allow also to play at adult level) should be allowed. We think when it comes to fixtures, if there's a conflict between a minor player and a senior player that a senior competition can't be held up - because the minor should actually play with the minors. "I've been in charge of the Legion minors, and I've been coaching teams for the last ten years, we said we'd take a look last year and see what happened at under-17 and under-18 level.

"I would ask every single person here to look at their minor team from last year, and see how many of those are playing seniors. In our club, we've been Division One for the last two years, and out of 30 (ex-minor) players, there are only four playing senior. There is a mass exodus; there are loads of players not playing. They're going to other

codes, because the gap between under-17 and senior is too big. We need to go back to under-18. Out of the 32 counties in Ireland, I think there are only ten now that are actually at under-17 level. There is lot of them doing dual, some are doing under-17s, and some are doing under-18.It's not working, we are over-emphasising the elite players. Every time I come into a meeting I hear about loading and elite players. The ordinary club players, we are losing those at 18 years of age, that might become fabulous players at 21 or 22."

The strongest argument for the reduction to U20 and U17 was the argument for burnout of elite players. Make no mistake; neither I nor anybody else is trivialising that. It is a very real thing and genuinely dangerous. Not just in terms of wear and tear on the body and lack of proper rest periods, but there is an absolutely colossal mental toll. Thankfully a lot of players have spoken open and honestly about this in recent years, but it was and unfortunately sometimes still can be a very serious issue. Joe Costello pointed out that risk for some players, citing three particularly talented players who played Kerry minor last year and have played at high levels this year at senior (very high levels) as well as reaching a Hogan Cup Final. He didn't name names, and it's not as if he needed to - he could also have mentioned a lad who went pretty far with those teams and hurling as well. One of those players could have played up to 45 games. That's not safe and it is an issue that needs to be looked at.

But taking pretty much all football away (maybe a token run or two, but nowhere near enough to sustain interest if you aren't a starter on your senior club team) from around 500 18 year olds to accommodate three elite talents....I have very genuine respect for that speaker (I promise you, this is a guy who has been down in the trenches of club football for a long, long time and put in far more honest work at it than I ever have), but I just don't agree with him on this one. The big problem with burnout was the fact (and this has been studied) that a lot of players were doing eight

training sessions for each game that they played. Nowadays the biggest risk is simply the amount of games - the introduction of the split season was intended to simplify the calendar but what actually happened was that a lot of extra games were crammed in. That was never a problem that started with the clubs or the 18 year olds and the solution lies elsewhere as well. The idea that the CCC did establish competitions for over 17s but that the clubs didn't buy into it feels like a little bit of a red herring to me as well, to be honest. The U21 Club Championship, as opposed to the U21 County Championship (our U21 and Minor County Championships stayed at those age groups and have been the better for it) never generated too much interest. It had to be run off between too many stools, because clubs wanted their U21 players for County League, Club Championships, etc., and most clubs were down too many players (summer migration, etc.). In fact, the U21 Club Championship generally featured more amalgamations than solo clubs, and that problem long predates the change of age grades.

Now, look, one sticking point is the idea that U18 players can't hold up a senior game because of a minor commitment. What needs to happen is that if a U18 player can't play for the minor team that week, then he can't play for the seniors either. Apply that rule strictly, no workarounds. Remember when county managers could hold a player from their club for up to seven days before an inter-county game? You don't really remember, because I never once saw it actually applied. Not once. I saw lower level club championship games where inter-county panelists were watching from the sidelines and able to line out for Kerry shortly afterwards. I saw a good player - a great player - miss his team's first U21 Final in a generation because he was an unused sub for Kerry the following weekend. Thankfully, they won it, but how was that lad supposed to feel if they had lost? I do not want to see U18s missing minor games and lining out at senior, and that is a worry for me. Look, it was a very good debate, a very honest debate, and a very open debate, with a number of speakers. But in the finish, when it went to a vote, the delegates made their feelings very clear, with Killarney Legion's motion passing by a whopping 52 - 7. Kerry were revert to even ages from next year. I consider it a brilliant result for Kerry football at the ground level and I thank Legion, and Donal in particular, for their work on this one. There were a number of hurling motions put forward, but it was decided to leave those to be discussed at a meeting with the CCC and the hurling clubs. Look, Kerry hurling is on a upward curve at club level (and if we could stop haemorrhaging players at inter-county level, we'd be rattling at that grade too) and I do think that decisions affecting their competitions are best made by the clubs that participate in them.

Eamonn Fitzmaurice gave a presentation of the proposals of the Football Review Committee and there was a general

acceptance (not a formal vote as such) that Kerry would be supporting the proposals on November 30th. It's an easy decision for me. Gaelic football as it stands is an awful spectacle at mens' inter-county. Attendances are dropping like a stone, and frankly, with very good reason. Quite simply, the status quo is so bad, change is vital.

A fairly reasonable team overall. Eilís Lynch and Ciara Murphy are unlucky, in my opinion, but who would you take out? Ferguson, the McConvilles, Davoren, Quirke....absolute locks. Nicola Ward's pace and precision were seriously impressive. There is no way that she is Footballer of the Year for me. I had Kayleigh Cronin as hot favourite for that even before the All Ireland Final, and she was widely acknowledged as the stand-out player in that game. That one really does have me scratching my head.

SOCCER

I'll go against the common grain here. And ye need to be patient and stay with me on this one. I actually think it was a good international window for Ireland. Frankly, a lot better than I was expecting. The thing is that I thought that our 1-0 victory over Finland

was a woeful display by Ireland, and the 5-0 loss to England's B team had an awful lot of positives.

Ireland 1 Finland 0

They absolutely schooled us in midfield. Defensively we were solid enough - let's face it, Finland are not exactly cutting edge specialists, but Ireland looked nicely controlled. My worry was that we would cough up one or two goal chances for Finland to nick, and simply not have any threat ourselves. That's not disrespecting Ferguson, whom I consider the first Irish striker since Robbie Keane to actually be worth the hype, but Finland would be playing defensively as well and our midfield and our service from midfield? I'm not trying to be wide after the event, our attacking play has been chronic with three in the middle. Two in the middle? Ireland? I actually like hat Heimar (I've decided to give him the honorific of using his Christian name from now on; I get a good impression of the guy and I'm finicky like that) and maybe he is seeing something nobody else has. But straight up, I'd have taken 1-1 at the start.

The big talking point of the first half was the chances that Finland had. They were unlucky with two goal chances - genuinely unlucky, not wasteful - but we came close once or twice as well. Finland absolutely destroyed s in midfield, ran literal rings around us. But they didn't get through. In the 23rd minute Szmodics latched onto a through ball from Ferguson and produced a very neat finish. Yes, he was offside, but it was tight, that was genuinely good play by Ireland. Just seven minutes later we were wide open for a simple ball, a rare enough slip, and Lod was unlucky as his curled effort cracked off the woodwork. That would have been an absolutely exquisite finish. Soon after Kallman gets up for a good header but can't quite direct it on target – the top players are putting that kind of chance away. In the 42nd minute Collins just about gets enough of a touch to deflect an Antman strike onto the post. Another let-off, really. Getting to the break level and a chance to regroup is the most I was expecting at that stage; Finland were taking us to school in general play. And all of a sudden Ireland were in front. And it was actually a good goal. I'm a bit dubious about Mikey Johnston. He's tricky, he is ambitious in play and takes men on, he's direct. It's just that he is a bit too peripheral in terms of pressure and positioning. A bit of an Aidan McGeady. He'll produce something brilliant....or nothing at all. But like McGeady, when it works, it's brilliant. I thought he was taking too much out of it as he jinked and twisted along the left before cutting open enough space to curl the ball in. And Ferguson...it's one of those that looks simple, and it's not simple. He squeezed in between two defenders and leapt high to nod it home. 1-0 to Ireland at half-time. By rights I should be rushing out to buy a lottery ticket with that kind of luck - not our goal, but the fact that Finland hadn't scored anv.

Ireland were better in the second half. I'm not saying they were great, but I thought there was a bit more confidence about the team. There was a vague cheer as Daniel O'Shaughnessy came on from Ireland – let's face the fact that it was a dismal enough crowd. 39,163 the official figure....arrah, you'd have fed the most of them with a few loaves of bread and a couple of tins of tuna without any Sermon on the Mount. Not a hope was there anything toucxhing on 40,000.

Finland got back on top as the half wore on, albeit they were made to work for it. But in the 74th minute Ferguson had an inadvertent handball in the Irish box. Penalty all day long, 'inadvertent' is just not relevant. On the balance of play, Finland probably deserve an equaliser.

Except that Caoimhin Kelliher gets a hand to knock it away and is up fast to gather the rebound. In the end, Finland were probably the better team overall, and definitely didn't deserve to leave empty-handed, but it was a reasonably decent second half for Ireland and a brilliant result.

England 5 Ireland 0

Look letting in five goals is never nice. Three of those in six minutes is fairly disastrous. But calling it 'Ireland's Worst Night' and nonsense like that is attaching a grandeur to this game that's just preposterous. Heimar made the point in the build-up that England will be going to the World Cup hoping to win it. Ireland are just hoping to go to it.

I'd go further. England play in the Nations League at B grade because they don't even consider it a warm-up competition. That's why they dropped down, they are easily A standard if they wanted, but they didn't. Why would they care about glorified friendlies? And with this result being entirely immaterial, 'glorified' might be a bit strong in this particular case.

Ireland, on the other hand, have to take it seriously – as things stand, we will be third seeds in a four team qualifying group and facing a play-off just to retain our B status in the Nations League.

This was always a free shot. This was playing to our greatest strength, gallant underdogs acquitting themselves well. Irish teams made that an art form over generations until Jack Charlton played along to that tune but also actually won a few games with direct football. I was actually delighted with our first half. England controlled the ball but couldn't play their way through some impressive defending. This England team generally prefer space to run into attack and Ireland just stayed locked in a low block. Unpretty but effective. I have to say that Harry Kane has been one of the greatest strikers of a generation but he just doesn't fit properly with this English team. While it was makeshift (nine players dropping out of an international? Yeah, England won't be hosting any parades for promotion) you still had some top players. And Ireland, definitely much more limited, were stubborn enough to hold them out. It was more root hog than ballet, but that's grand. And Festy Ebosele was lively. Jaysus, very lively, I'm hugely impressed. He's attacking at every opportunity but he's doing the hard yards behind as well.

In fact, after twenty minutes, Ireland should have had a clear chance to go in front. A good ball from Dara O'Shea and Evan Ferguson tussling with Marc Guehi on the chase. I thought it was one of them, two of them at first glance, but on replay yes, Guehi clearly is pulling Ferguson by the shirt. Nothing subtle about it. Clear penalty all day. VAR was supposed to be in play. Look, I hate calling out match officials (this nonsense about David Coote and Liverpool FC....arrah, get over it) but somebody dropped the ball on that one.

The one on Sammy Szmodics? Even Hugh O'Neill or William Wallace wouldn't give a penalty against England for that one.

0-0 at half-time. Come on, that's a superb feat by Ireland in our current state against a team like this. Fair enough, we absolutely imploded after that. No excuses, no hiding. And look, yes, Liam Scales had picked up a slightly careless yellow late in the first half after tussling with Harry Kane. But I'm not having any cheap scapegoating either. Scales has been a real breakout player for me throughout this window. Yeah, he got a bit stuck into Kane and the English captain used his experience well. Learning curve. So be it.

A little bit lazy by Ferguson...no major sin there either – and a good through ball by Kane onto Bellingham. Scales was isolated – a rare lapse of concentration by the Irish defensive unit, and Scales with a late lunge of the leg to try and knock the ball away from his feet. Not malicious, more desperation, but yes, of course. A penalty all day long. I thought Kane fairly poor for most of the game, but in fairness it was a great penalty. What is unforgivable, what really would have me tearing strips in the dressing room afterwards, was the complete collapse. Six minutes later we were three down. Six minutes. Both goals coughed up far, far too easily. Heads were gone. Look, we all know this team is in tough times and it will almost certainly get tougher, we just don't have the quality and it's not on the horizon. Our best player these days is our goalkeeper, and he gets plenty of chances to prove it. But we need to be tougher than that. You don't just fold. We were never realistically going to get that goal back and look, they were always going to get another one. But three goals in six minutes? No. That's just not good enough. It ended up being five. A more ruthless England would have scored ten, it was basically a shooting gallery.

Look, it was a free shot. We were finishing third no matter what and facing a play-off. It's not like there was big interest on either side. Nine players pulled out of the England squad, and quite understandably. The FAI returned tickets to the FA. The 'crowd's biggest contribution to the night was booing each other's anthems – as Milton said, "the hungry sheep look up, and are not fed, but, swoll'n with wind and the rank mist they draw, rot inwardly, and foul contagion spread". There's pride, and there is stupidity, and there's people out there on both sides who don't know the difference.

Arah, we went toe to toe with a much better side for over fifty minutes. It was more than I was expecting, even if the collapse was disappointing subsequently. There's a rough foundation of a team there.

Great window for Caoimhín Kelliher. Very good overall for Scales, Collins, Ebosele, and Szmodics. As limited as Josh Cullen is, he did a hard and unglamorous role as best he could. Heimar? Learned a leson from the attempt at two in midfield, had a clear blueprint, showed a pragmatism that is as admirable in its own way as Stephen Kenny's unrealistic idealism. Honestly, I don't think it was a bad window for us at all.



FOCUS ON WINTER BEDDING PLANTS

With most of the bedding displays in hanging baskets, containers and window boxes finished, now is the time to start replanting them with a winter selection of bedding plants. Even though you won't have as much of a selection of winter bedding as you have in the summer, there is still a large range

When you are choosing your winter bedding plants, try to pick the biggest and strongest as they don't grow during the winter. The good thing about the winter displays in containers is that you can choose what you want as a centre piece, because you will probably get a few seasons out of it in the container and you can plant it somewhere in your garden afterwards.

Some good centre pieces for containers are Large: Phormium, Cordyline (green or purple) Varigitas, Holly or Bay tree

Small: Care, Algold, Heuchara, Euonymus, Azalea. You need to also make sure when choosing that the plant is evergreen. There is also a good selection of flowering winter bedding which you can plant, including Violets, Pansy, Primrose, Polyanthis, Cyclamen and Ornamental Cabbage
