Residents of Woodlawn Park have once again demonstrated the strength of their close-knit community with the successful purchase and installation of a new publicly accessible Automated External Defibrillator (AED) in the heart of the estate.

The life-saving device, now available to the public in the event of a cardiac emergency, represents a major step forward in ensuring rapid and effective emergency response within the area. In situations where every second counts, access to an AED can prove vital, significantly increasing survival rates.

As part of the initiative, Woodlawn Park residents will undergo full AED training to ensure the equipment can be used quickly and safely if required. The Killarney Cardiac Response Unit has been instrumental in supporting the project and will continue to work closely with the community by providing training and ongoing guidance. Local residents

trained in the use of the AED will also be on hand to offer assistance and reassurance during emergencies.

"Corey, who is autistic and has a moderate intellectual disability, has thrived at the school thanks to what the family describe as exceptional care, dedication and guidance from staff. Tom says the initiative is his way of giving something back to the school, as well as to the children and parents who work tirelessly every day."

"The care Corey receives is out of this world," Tom said. "As parents, we wanted to give back in whatever way we can, and this felt like a positive way to support the school while raising awareness", Corey's mum Debbie told Killarney Outlook.

Time for a “Together Anseo” bus link for our well-cushioned TDs?

Michael Cahill has uttered the *mea culpa, mea culpa*. For dangerous driving. At an incomprehensible speed level of close to 200 kms an hour near Mitchelstown on March 13 last.

Michael's Audi Q5 overtook “the entire flow of traffic” on the M8 at high speed, at 12.20 pm, the court in Fermoy was told last Friday.

He then “aggressively” came in extremely closely behind a van which was about to overtake an articulated lorry. In response, the van driver “pulled into lane one and allowed the Audi to pass at speed in lane two”. It took about 4km or 5km before our Fianna Fail TD spotted that an unmarked garda car, its lights flashing, was pursuing him, asking him to pull in. (Michael's solicitor challenged his client was driving aggressively). He was on his way to an event in Kerry and feared he was late after being delayed by meetings and pulling in to do an interview on Radio Kerry (with Jerry O'Sullivan), Michael said afterwards. He

is embarrassed and his family are. Well, so too, surely, are his Kerry voters.

There was nothing to stop Michael, now a legislator, leaving Dublin earlier or even the night before, was there? But he has said he is sorry and has accepted his punishment - a fine of €500 and off the road for two years. He is to manage his time better. And give up attempts at bilocation and not try to be in two places at the one time, he told Jerry O'Sullivan on Monday. (Presumably he allowed plenty of time for that interview). He normally takes plane or train.

The story has given me food for thought. Would he consider the bus - along with all the teachtairí from Kerry?

That would take the stress out of the journey, and the public expense.

Our messengers who are non-ministers - Cahill, Danny Healy-Rae and Daly collect tidy sums under the standard parliamentary allowance. These are unvouched sums paid on the basis of distance from Dublin.

Most months our TDs collect over €4,000 each just for showing up. Danny gets €4,478, Daly €4,365 and Cahill gets €4,422 for travel and overnight expenses. Look it up - on oireachtas.



A TFI Local Link rural bus could bring the TD's to Dublin.

i.e. (Payments for March 2025 are not listed!) This is on top of their €117,000 plus annual salary and they get extra money for committees etc. They don't need this kind of money. No one does.

A Local Link rural bus to cart them up and down to the Dail, along the lines of “Together Anseo”, departing Kerry on Tuesday morning and returning Friday would take the stress out. And relieve the temptation to speed. Then the State might consider a government run hotel with laundry and meals provided - along the lines of direct provision and Ukrainian refugee centres.

Speaking of speeding: Drivers from Cork coast to Kerry

The N22 Macroom bypass is causing concern down the road in Clonkeen.

“For some reason” drivers from the Cork side were coming onto the Poulgorm junction “away faster” since the Macroom bypass was built. Near misses and accidents are now on a daily basis, last week's Killarney MD meeting heard.

A delegation from Clonkeen, the Clydagh Valley and Glenflesk attended the meeting in the Town Hall to highlight concerns about the situation at the N22 Poulgorm/ Mick the Bridges Junction with the R569 Kilgarvan and Kenmare road.

1,000 people have signed a petition, the meeting was told. The 22 km, Euro 280 million bypass of Ballyvourney and Macroom opened in late 2023 to cut the journey time between Cork and Killarney.

“Since the new Macroom bypass Road, people are hitting that junction away faster. They are coming in at high speed,” the residents' representatives told the meeting.

The volume of traffic had

increased, but so had the speed. Councillor Maura Healy-Rae who invited the delegation said: .

“There is no doubt that since the bypass, the volume and stream of traffic in either direction has increased.”

It was pitch black and in winter mornings there was no lighting while the bypass “was littered with lights.”

Work had been carried out but it was still bad.

Fixed speed cameras such as at Lissarda would help slow them down, Councillor Niall O'Callaghan said, while Councillor Niall Kelleher called for a slip lane to be prioritised. My two cents demi is the problem is wider and rests on the stop start nature of our road infrastructure. There are issues too on the other side. Because we have a bit of a road done here, a bit of a road done there.

And why the Macroom bypass doesn't extend all the way from Cork to Killarney - or from Limerick to Castleisland - is the real issue.

Meals on Wheels - a Killarney service.

The loss of the locally based Meals on Wheels service to Killarney has been highlighted in this column.

Meals on Wheels in Killarney are now being delivered from Tralee - while a state of the art kitchen block in a 13 million euro HSE facility lies idle, we have revealed previously.

The large kitchen at the 13 million euro Deer Lodge mental health residential facility for 40 residents had never been used.

When it opened in 2017, that kitchen block was expected to cater for the neighbouring nucleus of community hospitals.

But “not an egg has been fried there”.

Meanwhile the 40-year-old Killarney meals service was disbanded pretty abruptly and unceremoniously in December by the HSE and handed over to a Tralee provider.

(We wrenched a thank you from the HSE for the service, but it took effort).

“Meals are coming from Tralee. This is absolutely absurd. There is a most beautiful kitchen in Deer Lodge. It has never fried an egg. It is a state of the art kitchen,” Councillor Marie Moloney told the meeting of Killarney MD last week.

A volunteer herself for 30 years in Killarney, Marie said the team knew every person and every house they delivered to daily. The service was about much more than meals.

“That daily contact was vital. I am calling for the Meals and Wheels service to be re-installed in Killarney,” she said.


The Torc Family Resource Centre had offered to cook the meals to facilitate the continuation of the local service, but the HSE had persisted with the delivery from Tralee.

“Do we really need someone to come from Tralee to deliver meals?” Marie asked.

Councillors unanimously backed her formal call requesting that the meals would be cooked in Killarney “and delivered by the team of volunteers who have been delivering heretofore”.

Meanwhile, I would like to ask if any councillor will put forward the idea of a civic reception for the volunteers. I do know the Soroptimists and the Chamber honoured Trinette Larkin for her key role as chair of the Killarney

Community Services for older people some years ago. Surely it is time for our council also to acknowledge them.

LAND PROVISION FOR OVER 4,000 HOUSING UNITS IN KILLARNEY MD

Councillors adopt variation to County Development Plan

Members of Kerry County Council today adopted a variation to the current Kerry County Development Plan which has zoned sufficient residential and employment lands to meet the future development needs of the Killarney Municipal District.

In terms of lands available for employment, there are now approximately 75 hectares of undeveloped lands across the Municipal District. With respect to lands for residential development, there are now about 95 hectares of new or proposed residential lands available within the Municipal District. These lands have the potential to accommodate 4,415 units.

The newly adopted plan aims to set out a comprehensive local planning framework with clear policies and objectives including land use zoning, in the interests of the common good. The successful implementation of the Plan will have a positive impact on the Killarney MD, ensuring it develops in a sustainable manner.

In conjunction with Project Ireland 2040, the National Planning Framework (NPF), the Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy for the Southern Region (RSES) and the Kerry County Development Plan 2022 – 2028 (KCDP), this Variation will complete the planning framework for the area and complement the implementation of the policies and objectives contained in these higher-level plans.


The principal town in the Municipal District is Killarney which is designated as a Key Town in the Regional Spatial Economic Strategy for the Southern Region (RSES) and the Kerry County Development Plan 2022-2028 (KCDP) Rathmore, Barraduff and Kilcummin occupy important roles as District Towns for the area as identified in the County Development Plan.



support at different times and that reaching out for help is a strength rather than a weakness.

Joan Murphy from MTU, with extensive experience in training Mental Health and General Nurses, focused on the cumulative power of simple daily actions to support mental wellbeing. She emphasised accessible habits such as spending time outdoors, incorporating regular movement and carving out moments of reflection, explaining how these small steps can compound over time to create a strong foundation for overall wellbeing.

Why I Took the First Step - and Why Men Should Talk More Openly About Weight Loss

Despite maintaining an active lifestyle through outdoor activities and gym attendance, Padraig struggled for years to manage his weight.

Poor eating habits remained an issue, and he experienced persistent bloating and physical discomfort during everyday activities. Medical advice later confirmed the need for change, as his cholesterol and other health indicators were significantly elevated.

"Although I had long been aware of the importance of managing my weight and overall health, sustained progress proved difficult without structured support" says Padraig.

In response, he joined a Slimming World with Hayley Carter in Killarney and adopted a more consistent approach to nutrition and lifestyle management.

Padraig shares "There remains a perception that weight loss programmes may not appeal to men; however, my experience does not support



this view. Joining did not present any barriers related to stigma, and open discussion around men's weight management and health appears increasingly accepted and encouraged. Mental health was also a contributing factor prior to weight loss. His Anxiety was high, low mood, and stress influenced eating behaviours, reinforcing a cycle that negatively affected both physical and psychological health.

"Following weight loss, I have noticed improvements in my confidence, my emotional well-being, and self-esteem. I am more willing to engage in new opportunities and less affected by frustration."

Group-based support has contributed positively to his mental wellbeing. Sharing his experiences within a group environment allows others to recognise common challenges and solutions, creating accountability and a sense of shared purpose. Being surrounded by like minded people really does help!

Padraig shares that he has no issues in discussing mental health openly within his group because he knows that there's never any judgement or humiliation in group. "Progress has not always be straight forward. During periods where weight loss slowed, for motivation I focused on long-term outcomes and previous progress rather than short-term wins" says Padraig.

"I've noticed symptoms of heartburn have resolved, giving me a significant improvement in daily comfort"

"For anyone uncertain about beginning such a programme, just give it a go. You won't be disappointed"

1,309 Newborn Baby Grants were issued to 1,289 families in County Kerry in 2025

As part of Budget 2025, the Department of Social Protection introduced the Newborn Baby Grant, a once off payment of €280 designed to help families meet the material needs of a newborn baby or a newly adopted child.

The grant is paid automatically alongside the first month of Child Benefit, meaning parents do not need to make a separate application.

In its first year, the Newborn Baby Grant was paid nationally in respect of 49,841 children, at a total cost of approximately €14 million.

Commenting on the figures, Deputy Michael Cahill said:

"The birth of a new child is a time of great joy, but it can also place financial pressure



on families. Supports like this are essential in easing that pressure and allowing parents to enjoy what truly matters, spending time with their newest family member.

"In the first year of this scheme, thousands of families have benefited nationally, with thousands of families in County Kerry receiving support.

"Measures like the Newborn Baby Grant make a tremendous difference to families. It is a priority for Fianna Fáil to continually support parents through schemes like this so they can spend time with their loved ones and focus on the moments that matter."


FIVE FIRST PLACE TITLES FOR LEGACY ELITE ATHLETES

As the 1st February closing date for applying to the CAO looms large, its due time to make sure that the application form is thoroughly and accurately completed.

Applications to CAO are made via "Apply," the interactive online application facility, which remains open until 1st February on the CAO website, www.cao.ie. Apply is user friendly and easy to follow, particularly as CAO provides an 'Interactive Demo Facility' to enable you make a trial application.

ACCOUNT

Go online at www.cao.ie and click on Apply to open your CAO Account. Enter your personal details. Tick the qualifications and assessment section(s) that are relevant to you. Enter your payment option – Credit/Debit card or Fee Payment Form. If you are paying by credit/debit card you will be redirected to a payment facility. Create your own account password. Click on "Proceed with application" to obtain your eight-digit CAO application number, beginning with 26, and your application details will appear on screen.

INFORMATION

Log into "My Application" by entering your CAO application number, date of birth and password. Provide the additional personal information. If you are applying on the basis of Leaving Cert (1985-2026) results enter the name and address of your second level school(s) and the years attended. If you are a Leaving Cert 2026 candidate tick the box

provided. If you have previously sat the Leaving Cert, provide the year(s) in which you sat the exam and your exam number(s).

CHOICES

Add your Level 8 and Level 7/6 course choices by 1st Feb. by clicking on "Add Level 8 course choices" and/or click on "Add Level 7/6 course choices." You may apply for a maximum of ten course choices on each list. List your courses based on genuine order of preference.

MATURE

If you are a mature applicant, click on 'Mature Application Form' to update your mature application form.

DARE/HEAR

If you wish to disclose a disability or Dyslexia/ Significant Literacy Difficulties or Dyscalculia/ Significant Numeracy Difficulties or apply to the Disability Access Route to Education (DARE) click on the "Modify Disability (& DARE Application) Status" button and follow the instructions provided. If you wish to apply for the Higher Education Access Route (HEAR), a third level alternative admissions scheme for school leavers from socio-economically disadvantaged backgrounds who are resident in the Republic of Ireland, click the "HEAR Application" button and follow the instructions provided.

SUSI

If you intend to apply for a maintenance fee grant, indicate this on your CAO online application form. Click on "Modify Maintenance/Fee Grant Application Form." Tick the "I would like CAO to provide my details to the Maintenance/Fee Grant application authority (SUSI)" button. CAO will then provide your identification, contact and offer/acceptance details to the grant authority, Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI).

SUBMIT

Once you are satisfied with the detail you have submitted, click 'Log Out' to exit. All of your details will then have been submitted to CAO.

DOUBLE CHECK

Check your course choices immediately via the "My Application" facility to ensure that they are correct. Use the online change courses facility on the CAO website if you need to amend or add courses. This facility is free of charge until 1st Feb. You may also use the online facility to amend course choices from the 5th February to 1st March (fee €10). Apply is user friendly and secure and allows you to submit your application from the privacy of your own home.

Mid-Kerry Biddy's Day Festival 2026 Programme Announced


The Mid-Kerry Biddy's Day Festival returns this winter with an expanded and richly layered programme of events celebrating one of Ireland's most distinctive living traditions. Running from Thursday 22 January to Monday 2 February 2026, the festival will take place across Killorglin, Cromane and the wider Mid-Kerry region, bringing together craft, music, language, ritual and community in the lead-up to St Brigid's Day.

At the heart of the festival is the ancient Biddy tradition, rooted in Imbolc and the honouring of St Brigid a time associated with light, renewal, creativity and protection. Over twelve days, the festival offers a wide mix of family-friendly, traditional and contemporary events, culminating in its most anticipated moment of the year: The Biddy's Parade.

The Biddy's Parade, taking place on Saturday 31st January, is the centrepiece and defining event of the festival. On parade night, Killorglin town is transformed as Biddy groups from across Mid-Kerry gather in straw hats and traditional costume, carrying Brídeógs through the streets in a

powerful procession of fire, music, movement and celebration. The parade is free, open to all to join in or support, and remains one of the most atmospheric and visually striking expressions of living Irish folklore in the country. Fire performers, live music and street celebrations follow, before the night continues into the town's venues. A strong emphasis on children and families runs throughout the 2026 programme. The much-loved Kids Lantern Making workshop is back this year facilitated by Jane McMorrow, giving children the opportunity to create lanterns that become part of the parade itself. Young dancers are invited to take to the floor at the Kids Céilí – the Kids Biddy Ball.

Music, dance and social gatherings form another key strand of the festival. The Biddy's Ball in Francie's takes place on parade night, offering a late-night celebration filled with traditional music, dancing and community spirit. Singing sessions, céilís and



informal gatherings will take place across local pubs and venues throughout the festival, reinforcing the social heart of Biddy's Day. Cultural heritage and language remain central to the festival's identity.

A series of Irish language events, including Caint & Comhrá, invite both fluent speakers and learners to take part in relaxed, welcoming settings. Traditional craft workshops, including straw hat making, felting, pottery, Brigid's cross making, storytelling and folklore sessions continue the festival's long-standing commitment to preserving and passing on skills that are intrinsic to the Biddy tradition. The intimate Lighting of the Brigid Flame offers a reflective ceremonial moment, marking renewal, hope and the return of light.

Cromane and Beaufort once again play an important role in the programme, hosting a range of community-led events that reflect the area's strong connection to landscape, tradition and seasonal

ritual. These events form part of the festival's wider Mid-Kerry reach, ensuring the celebration extends beyond Killorglin town and into Mid-Kerry.


Founded in 2017, the Mid-Kerry Biddy's Day Festival has been instrumental in reviving a tradition that had been in serious decline. From just two active Biddy groups less than a decade ago, the region now supports a growing network of groups, with children, families and new communities actively involved. The 2026 festival continues this work, blending heritage with creativity and ensuring the tradition remains relevant, inclusive and alive.

Many events across the programme are free and family-friendly, with a small number of workshops ticketed. Booking details for paid events are on our social media.





DRIVING AND VISION

It is important that you can see clearly to be able to drive safely. Conditions that may affect your visual field and driving include strokes and brain tumours, as well as eye conditions such as diabetic retinopathy and glaucoma (if you have them in both eyes).

Make sure you have regular sight tests and if your optometrist tells you that you must not drive, you must stop all driving immediately.

Driving when you are medically unfit to do so is a criminal offence, and you may be prosecuted if you are involved in an accident.

Driving glasses

If you have been advised to wear glasses for driving, make sure you wear them, even for short trips – and keep a spare pair in the car. Choose glasses with thinner sides for driving as they won't block your side vision as much as thicker ones. If you wear contact lenses, keep a pair of glasses in the car in case you need to take your lenses out. Even if you don't need to wear glasses all the time, you will probably find they are particularly helpful when the lighting is poor, and for driving at night.

Headlights of oncoming traffic can be dazzling when you

are driving at night or in poor weather conditions. Special driving lenses designed with a specially-developed glare filter and a contrast-enhancing filter can help reduce reflections and uncomfortable glare from oncoming traffic.

If glare is an ongoing problem for you, make sure your windscreens and headlights are thoroughly cleaned and free from grime and dirt. If you wear glasses, and don't forget to keep them clean too. If you find that problems with glare at night persist, make an appointment to have a sight test.

Sunshine can be dazzling too, particularly when the sun is low in the sky. If you wear glasses, you may find it helpful to have a pair of prescription sunglasses in the car, or to wear clip-on sunglasses over your prescription glasses. Polarised sunglasses are great for driving in bright conditions. Polarised lenses are lenses with a special built in filter to reduce glare and improve vision in bright conditions.

SPECIAL MEN'S HEALTH NIGHT to Highlight Heart Health Awareness in Killarney

A special Men's Health Night focusing on heart health and early prevention will take place on Tuesday, January 27th, at 8pm in the Parish Centre, Park Road, Killarney.

The event aims to encourage men, particularly those aged 30 to 60 to take a proactive approach to their cardiovascular health, with free blood pressure and pulse checks available throughout the evening. Organisers note that many men do not regularly attend GP check-ups, despite prevention being key in reducing the risk of cardiovascular disease.

A highlight of the night will be a talk by former Kerry footballer Darragh Roche of RocheFit Gym, who will share his personal experience of suffering a heart attack at just 29 years of age. His story is expected to underline the importance of recognising the signs and symptoms of heart attack and seeking early medical attention.

Medical professionals Dr Rosemary Kelliher and Dr Danielle O'Leary of GP Care Killarney will also be in attendance. They will provide expert insight into general heart health care and lead a question-and-answer session, offering attendees the opportunity to raise concerns or seek advice in an informal setting.

The evening's programme begins at 7.30pm with blood pressure and pulse checks, followed by the guest speaker at 8pm. Medical talks will take place at 8.20pm, with refreshments and informal discussions from 8.55pm. Health checks will continue until approximately 9.30pm.

The event is being supported by Heartbeat Killarney Kerry Cardiac Support Group, who will also have a display of free information leaflets and booklets available for attendees to take home.

Organisers stress that this is a welcoming event not only for men, but also for anyone who cares about men's health. Admission is free and all are welcome.

HSE SOUTH WEST URGENT VIRTUAL CARE SERVICE helps more than 4,000 patients avoid Emergency Department attendance

Patients and clinicians have hailed the success of HSE South West's Urgent Virtual Care Service, which has now seen more than 5,700 patients since opening in November 2024.

The service offers patients across Cork and Kerry alternatives to attending an Emergency Department, including remote consultations. Since opening in November 2024, the service has seen 5,743 patients. Almost three-quarters (73%, or 4,192) have avoided an Emergency Department attendance.

Urgent Virtual Care allows GPs and paramedics to consult directly (by phone or video call) with a senior medical decision maker in Emergency Medicine or Geriatric Medicine. A team of senior clinicians and support staff provide virtual consultations and assessments from a centralised hub, which is located at Cork University Hospital but accepts referrals from GPs and paramedics across Cork and Kerry.

Professor Conor Deasy, Clinical Director of Emergency and Acute Care, CUH, said: "The Urgent Virtual Care service has been in a much-welcomed addition to our Emergency and Acute Care offering in the last year or so. It helps patients get the right care, from the right clinicians, at the right time, allowing GPs and paramedics to access pathways in hospitals and the community directly for their patients. Often, patients can bypass the Emergency Department entirely and access their care directly. We are constantly working to get

patients more directly to the care they need, and the Urgent Virtual Care service is a big part of that."

The service offers a range of options after a referral, including:

- a direct telephone or video consultation with the patient or GP
- access to services which deliver care in the patient's own home or nursing home
- when needed, a structured and scheduled visit to the Emergency Department

The majority of patients are assessed remotely, often from the comfort of their own home.

Emma Slye, a previous user of the service, said her experience was very positive. "They took care of me immediately, there was no waiting around, and I felt like I was being really cared for. I would recommend Urgent Virtual Care to other people."

Dr Andrew Crosbie of Elmwood Medical Practice said the service allows for better communication between GPs and hospitals, ultimately leading to better care.

for Cork South and West said that supporting GPs and paramedics to find alternatives ways to access care for their patients is paying dividends.

She added: "We are delighted that this service is helping so many patients to get the care they need, when they need it. We are committed to investing in this service and we encourage both patients and GP to consider whether it's a viable option for their needs."

Referrals to the UVC can be made by GPs and paramedics only via Healthlink, Email, or by phone.

Minister Michael Healy-Rae welcomes €3.26 million investment for MTU as part of €41 million national higher education funding

Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Michael Healy-Rae TD, has welcomed today's announcement by James Lawless, confirming over €41 million in devolved capital funding for higher education institutions for 2026–2027, with Munster Technological University (MTU) set to receive €3.26 million.

The funding, announced under the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, will support essential small-scale capital works across the higher education sector, including energy efficiency upgrades, decarbonisation works, health and safety improvements, accessibility works, refurbishment and equipment renewal.

Welcoming the allocation, Minister Healy-Rae said:

"I very much welcome this announcement and, in particular, the €3.26 million allocation to MTU, which serves both Cork and Kerry and plays a hugely important role in the future of education, skills and enterprise in our region." Minister Healy-Rae highlighted the significance of the funding for MTU's Tralee campus, which continues to grow in strength and importance:



"The MTU Tralee campus is going from strength to strength. It is a vital educational, economic and social asset for Kerry, supporting students from right across the county and beyond, and maintaining strong links with local employers, industry and the wider community. This funding will help ensure the campus continues to develop in a modern, sustainable and student-focused way.

The Devolved Capital Grant provides institutions with flexibility to address priority needs on campus, including improving energy performance and reducing emissions in line with national climate targets.

Minister Healy-Rae added:

"Investment like this is about future-proofing our regional campuses. It supports safer, more accessible facilities, helps institutions meet climate obligations, and ensures that students and staff have the modern infrastructure they deserve."

He concluded by welcoming the continued commitment of Government to regional higher education:

"MTU is a cornerstone of higher education in Munster, and particularly in Kerry. I will continue to strongly support investment in the Tralee campus and to work with colleagues in Government to ensure that regional institutions are properly resourced and allowed to thrive."

Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae launches new podcast "The Chamber"

Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae has launched a new podcast, The Chamber, aimed at giving people a clear and direct insight into what is happening inside the council chamber from his perspective. Speaking about the launch, Cllr Healy-Rae said the idea behind the podcast is simple to explain, in plain language, what is being discussed, debated and decided at council meetings, and what it actually means for people on the ground.

"There are more ways than ever for people to get their news and information. Social media, radio, print and online all play their part, but I felt there was space for something more direct and accessible. 

€900,000 in funding for a new cycleway at Park Road, Killarney

Minister for Children, Disability, Equality and Kerry TD Norma Foley has welcomed the confirmation of over €13 million in funding for active travel projects in Kerry.

Almost €9.2 million of this sum is being provided towards the 32km South Kerry greenway from Glenbeigh to Cahersiveen, which is currently under construction.

Around €500,000 is being provided to link up the Tralee and Listowel Greenways. There is €900,000 in funding for a new cycleway at Park Road, Killarney, €650,000 for a cycleway along the Bracker O'Regan Road in Tralee and €420,000 for a cycleway, traffic crossing and traffic calming interventions in Tralee.

There is also funding of €500,000 for the upgrade of bus stops as well as funding for 13 safe routes to school and other active travel projects.

Minister Foley said: "I welcome this significant funding of over €13 million for active travel from my Fianna Fáil cabinet colleague, Darragh O'Brien, the Minister for Transport. During my time in government, I am pleased that significant government funding has been provided to develop a necklace of greenways in Kerry. The most recent addition, the South Kerry Greenway, is underway and today receives significant funding of over €9.2 million to advance it further. There is also important funding for safe routes to school for Kerry students and improved cycling and walking facilities right around the county."

There are 13 Kerry schools who will receive funding for safe routes to school. These include the Intermediate school in Killorglin (€120,000), Mercy Secondary School Mounthawk in Tralee (€50,000) and CBS primary in Tralee (€15,000). Other schools will receive €5,000 under the safe routes to school scheme, including Moyderwell Mercy primary school in Tralee, Presentation Secondary School in Tralee, Sacred Heart primary school in Tralee, Castledrum primary school, Coolick NS, Cullina NS, Glounagillagh NS, St Joseph's NS in Castlemaine, St Joseph's NS in Ballyheigue and Presentation primary school in Listowel.

Record numbers of struggling households cannot afford to keep the lights on - Pa Daly TD

Sinn Féin spokesperson on Climate, the Environment and Energy, Pa Daly TD, has criticised the government for failing to address Ireland's energy rip-off.

Deputy Daly called on them to immediately reintroduce electricity credits as record numbers of households request support from charities this Winter.

Commenting on figures announced by the Society of St. Vincent De Paul today, Teachta Daly said:

"Record numbers of households are struggling to make ends meet as the cost of living crisis continues unabated.

"Workers and families are facing eye-watering costs everywhere they turn. Nowhere is this more acute than Ireland's extortionate cost of energy.

"Instead of doing their job and shielding their constituents from the rip-off, Fianna Fáil,



Fine Gael and the Regional Independents eliminated the last line of defence with their decision to withdraw electricity credits.

"In a move that was both alarmingly shortsighted and cruel, they did this precisely at the time households were experiencing a range of price hikes across the board.

"Unsurprisingly, a record number of workers and families were forced to turn to the Society of St. Vincent De Paul for help. This government had left them with nowhere else to turn.

"The full impact of higher energy costs has yet to be felt, as the first real winter bills are only now landing for many households.

"And for those households that are most vulnerable, such as those who have been involuntarily put on PAYG meters, not only are they charged higher rates but new rules from the regulator mean that energy suppliers can recoup their debt with further price gouges.

"This simply cannot go on. Households cannot take anymore.

"I am therefore calling on the government to urgently reintroduce energy credits and to finally take the steps to end the rip-off for good.

"Both they and the regulator must hold energy companies to account - they must tackle price gouging and anti-competitive behaviour and the affordability of energy as a public good must be prioritised."

Unanimous Support as Kerry County Council Backs Motion of No Confidence in the Road Safety Authority

A motion of no confidence in the Road Safety Authority (RSA), put forward by Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae, was passed unanimously at the January meeting of Kerry County Council.

The motion was supported by members from across the Council chamber and reflected growing concern at the direction, priorities and effectiveness of the RSA, particularly in the context of rising road fatalities.

According to RSA figures, approximately 185 people lost their lives on public roads in Ireland in 2025, one of the highest figures in over a decade. Eight of those deaths occurred in County Kerry.

Speaking following the meeting, Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae said the figures represented a clear failure of national road safety leadership.

"Despite unprecedented levels of legislation, enforcement and penalties on our roads, fatalities are going up. That tells us that something is fundamentally wrong with how road safety is being managed at national level." The motion highlighted what Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae described as the RSA's over-reliance on advertising and media campaigns, including the 30km/h speed limit campaign, which has cost almost €1 million when production, media buying and PR are taken into account and is intended to run for a minimum of four years.

"The RSA has increasingly become a communications operation," Cllr Healy-Rae said.

"At a time when lives are being lost, the focus appears to be on spin and messaging rather than on measures that actually save lives."

Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae also criticised the continued emphasis on the RSA's 'Vision Zero' approach, stating that while ambition is important, the concept has become



fundamentally detached from reality.

"We will always, unfortunately, have accidents. What matters is reducing risk through practical, evidence-based action, not slogans," Cllr Healy-Rae said.

A central issue raised during the debate was the lack of emphasis on road infrastructure safety. Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae pointed to warnings from Transport Infrastructure Ireland, which previously identified the N22 corridor as a route where additional deaths and serious injuries were likely if upgrades were not delivered.

That warning has since been borne out, with a fatal collision already recorded on the N22 in 2026.

"Dangerous junctions, poor alignments and substandard roads cannot be fixed by advertising campaigns," Cllr Healy-Rae said.

"Engineering and infrastructure save lives and they are being neglected by the RSA as it is not a sexy enough issue for them."

The motion contrasted the RSA's approach with the work being carried out locally by Kerry

County Council, including the appointment of a Road Safety Officer, funding of a countywide School Warden service, and ongoing education and engagement initiatives.

However, Cllr Healy-Rae warned that local authorities must also avoid falling into the same trap.

"Education and promotion matter, but councils must also invest directly in safety works on our roads. If we can fix dangerous junctions or layouts using our own resources, then we should do so, lives are more important than waiting on central grants."

The unanimously passed motion calls for a fundamental re-evaluation of the RSA's role, priorities and value for money, with a renewed focus on infrastructure safety, evidence-based interventions and measurable reductions in road deaths.

"Road safety must be judged by outcomes, not advertising reach," Cllr Healy-Rae concluded.

It's very much game on in the Dominos Womens Super League with only one game separating the top five. Killester and Utility Trust St Pauls currently lead the way with eight wins each but Brunell, Glanmire and Trinity Meteors are all in hot pursuit. The remaining playoff spots are currently occupied by Flomax Liffey Celtics, Waterford Wildcats and the improving McEvoy's Cavan Eagles. You would venture to say that only events of a catastrophic nature would deny St Pauls of a berth but the requirement to finish as high in the standings as possible remains the carrot on a stick, with a home quarter-final the reward.

With seven games remaining the short trip up the newly revamped N22 to the Fr Matthews Arena is first on the agenda with the subsequent weekends seeing three home games, against the Cavan Eagles, Trinity Meteors and Flomax Liffey Celtics respectively. By the time they set off on their travels again to Killester, Glanmire and Brunell, everyone will be all the wiser as to what will be required.

Surprisingly this weekend's opponents, Fr Matthews, are yet to secure a win. Surprising for the fact that they are always a very competitive opponent and in the past have made their Arena a fortress. But they can lean on some impressive performances if they are looking to garner some confidence. They were very close to success in their two battles with Portlaoise Panthers while they gave the all conquering Killester a belly full of it in their own patch back in October. The evergreen Grainne Dwyer is still pulling her weight at this level while in Laila Blair they possess the leagues top scorer, some feat when you consider their position. The signing of Stacie Jones in December has brought some improvement while Saidbh Fitzgerald and Tralee native Holly O'Brien won't lack for effort.

After a substandard performance against Glanmire in mid December St Pauls have really got back to the standards they had previously. A hard fought win over Brunell was followed by an epic triumph over Waterford Wildcats while the Panthers win was ruthless and efficient. Those trio of wins have helped them to the summit but they must be wary of a team looking for its maiden win. The form of Tara Cousins, Maisie Burnham and Lovisa Hevinder has been central to their success with the trio combining for an average of nearly fifty points per game. But the Irish contingent have

certainly made their presence felt. Lorraine Scanlon is having the season of her life, Leah McMahon improving with every outing, and back in the frame following a concussion enforced absence. The commencement of the National Football League will mean Siofra O' Shea will again be juggling her commitments but her influence on the team has been clear. Deirdre Geaney is offering great options for coach James Fleming and the form of Denise Dunlea is hugely encouraging. Lynn Jones continues to show great example, something youngsters like Naoise O Connor and Clodagh O'Sullivan are tapping into.

These are the type of games you must be wary of, considering you will be well fancied. With a trio of home games to follow thereafter, a win is a must to continue the push for honours. Tip off in the Fr Matthews Arena is at 5pm.

The biggest game of the season so far takes place this Saturday night, with the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre playing host to the clash of the Northern Conference leaders Dublin Lions and the joint leaders of the Southern Conference Utility Trust St Pauls Lakers. That Luke O'Heas side are in that position is both a compliment to the team and coach. Having lost their opening two fixtures they have embarked on a 9-2 run which has catapulted them up the table. The player deserves huge credit for their level of performance as does the coach as he has engineered some great results, particularly on the road. But now the hard work really starts. That begins with the visit of the marauding Lions from the capital who themselves have been on a massive run. They have gone seven out of seven in recent months with notable wins over the Titans and Portlaoise Panthers. Their latest win over Malahide showed

everything you need to know about their prowess. Russell Marr, the 6 ft 3 guard has made a name for himself as a prolific scorer and durable defender. This is best highlighted by his 34 point and 5 steal showing in that Dublin Derby and he will need serious defending. Liam Osinuga has really settled into the team since joining in 2021 while Aran Lee has averaged 13 points in his 12 games to date. Tiago Pereira has previous experience of the league with the Drogheda Wolves and his season high of 21 points against no lesser team than Ulster University mark him out as one to watch. Ignacio Folgueiras has had limited minutes in recent weeks for the Lions but the former Limerick Eagle can be devastating on his day. Tiernan Howe, Harvey Killeen, Neil Kavanagh and Mo Sabic all help form what is a deep squad.

The Lakers last tasted defeat back in mid November against National Cup finalists Limerick Sport Eagles and their momentum has been generated by a trio of wins over the Galway clubs, namely Maree, Titans and Moycullen, a derby win over the Cougars and fine away wins over Moy Tolka Rovers and Carrick Cruisers. That run has helped Steve Kelly be crowned December Player of the Month, with the same player not far off consideration for the November gong. Eoin Carrolls scoring averages are creeping up but it's his rebounding that has been a real feature for the team. He is the only homegrown player in the top ten stats in that department and is closely followed in seventh place by team mate Sam Grant. The battle under the boards was pivotal to the Titans wins and will be equally so here. Mark Sheehan and Jack O Sullivan are now regularly shooting in the mid teens, a stat that must be maintained to challenge for honours while the squad is boosted by the return of Pablo Murcia to training. Marko Bencic will be available for the game but the squad will be without Rui Sariava. Oisin Spring always brings the hustle with him but has also weighed in with important scoring interventions also while Darragh O Callaghan

has shown his importance to the squad. The Lakers won't travel outside the confines of the town again until the 21st February with their sole away game being the Killarney Derby on Thursday February 12th. KERRY FC BOOK THEIR PLACE IN THE QUARTER FINALS

Kerry FC 2-0 | Cobh Wanderers

GRANDONS TOYOTA MUNSTER SENIOR Kerry FC began their competitive action of 2026 in positive fashion as they booked their place in the quarter-finals of the Grandons Toyota Munster Senior Cup with a deserved 2-0 victory over Cobh Wanderers at Mounthawk Park. On a cold, dry evening in Tralee, Kerry delivered a disciplined and energetic performance, combining defensive solidity with moments of attacking quality to see off their visitors. While the opening half remained scoreless, the hosts stepped up their intensity after the break, with Sean McGrath and Sean O'Connell producing two outstanding strikes to seal the win.

Kerry FC started brightly in front of their home support, looking sharp despite it being their first competitive outing of the year. Daniel Okwute was an early threat down the right wing, and in the twelfth minute, his rasping ball across the face of the goal almost found Cian Murphy, only for Cobh goalkeeper Darragh Burke to react sharply and gather in mid-air.

Two minutes later, Kilian Cantwell tested Burke from distance with a well-struck effort, but the goalkeeper saved comfortably. Kerry continued to press, and Okwute again caused problems in the twentieth minute with a powerful run and shot that was once more denied by Burke.

The game became more physical as the half wore on, with Arran Healy receiving a yellow card in the thirty-third minute. Okwute nearly broke the deadlock five minutes before the interval, showing great footwork to create space for a curling effort towards the far corner, but his shot drifted just wide. Further bookings followed late in the half for Eoin Hastings, Cian Murphy, and Diarmuid Kearney as both sides battled for control. Despite Kerry's dominance in possession and chances, the teams went in level at 0-0 after two minutes of added time.

The second half began at a slower tempo, with both sides cautious and chances initially at a premium. Kerry gradually regained control, and on the hour mark, Sean O'Connell delivered a dangerous corner that caused panic in the Cobh box, with the ball nearly forced over the line before Burke managed to keep it out.

Just one minute later, the breakthrough arrived. A free kick delivered into the area by Sean O'Connell was cleared as far as Sean McGrath on the edge of the area, and he struck a superb volley past the helpless Burke to give Kerry a deserved 1-0 lead. The goal lifted the hosts, who continued to attack with confidence. Okwute once again turned provider in the 67th minute, delivering an excellent cross that Luke Doolan met, but his effort sailed just over the crossbar.

I wouldn't say it lightly, but that may well have been the best club game I have ever seen, even if on the television rather than in the flesh. Superb opening by Dingle, with Mark O'Connor looking very sharp and Tom O'Sullivan kicking the opening score. Brilliant work by an impressive Tadhg Browne, with Billy O'Connor laying off to Niall Geaney for a goal chance that came back off the butt of the post.

St. Bridgets with a tame enough effort easily gathered by Gavin Curran.

Tom O'Sullivan sets up Conor Flannery for a great two pointer and then adds a point himself. 0-4 to 0-0. If St. Bridgids don't get to grips with Tom O'Sullivan and Mark O'Connor (they played three finals in Croke Park together, one minor and two Hogs, and never lost) this game could be over fast.

Shane Cunnane with the Roscommon outfit's opening score. Dingle reply straightaway, though, Dylan Geaney gathering from Paul to score. Mark O'Connor with a great catch to start the move.

Slight goal chance, but Billy O'Connor opts for the point....and hawkeye decides (correctly) that it was just wide.

Ruaidhrí Fallon on the burst and he takes a great score. That lad will take watching. Brian Stack adds another. St. Bridgets are beginning to run at Dingle. Shane Cunnane with a nicely executed two pointer. Level pegging. St. Bridgets miss their first chance to go in front, but Conor Hand makes no mistake with the next one. 0-6 to 0-5.

Long range effort by Eddie Nolan and it drops short....Gavin Curran is bundled into his net but the free out is given. I remember the great Johnny Culloty telling me that when lads tried it on him, they always ran into big Niall Sheehy instead. Old school football.

Dylan Geaney fouled, Conor steps up with a two point chance, but it curls wide. That's okay; the man has plenty of credit in that particular bank!

Good run by Conor Hand, good finish by Ben O'Carroll. 0-7 to 0-5. Dingle are almost a quarter of an hour with no score.

At last. After a good patient build-up, Tadhg Browne is on hand for a Dingle point. They win the kick-out and Tom O'Sullivan adds another. His runs are still a big problem for Anthony Cunningham's side. All square.

Both sides with turnovers, and Bobby Nugent kicks a St. Bridgets' point before adding a free.

Half-time St. Bridgids 0-9 Dingle 0-7.

Good start by Dingle but once St. Bridgids found their groove they have been the better

side.

Paul Geaney opens the second half scoring. Conor Hand replies with a fine score. Ben O'Carroll wins a free but fails to convert. A let-off for Dingle.

Tom O'Sullivan and Matthew Flaherty combine to tee up Mark O'Connor....that's a brilliant two pointer. If he wasn't already in Australia, they'd be making enquiries.....

Dingle with a goal chance, but Billy O'Connor's effort comes back off the crossbar. Credit where due, the defender does well to react and clear. As so often happens, a failure to capitalise at one end comes with a price tag at the other. A long range St. Bridgets' effort comes back off the crossbar, and it's Ruaidhrí Fallon who fists to the net. In fairness, he has been outstanding here all through. 1-10 to 0-10. Twenty minutes to go.

Dylan Geaney has time to size up a two pointer and duly raises an orange flag. That was a bit lax by St. Bridgids. A great kick, to be fair, but surely they knew the danger from this man in particular.

Paul Geaney fouled. Black card and an easy free for Paul. That could be a momentum-changer....actually, the action is coming so thick and fast now that so could anything else. This game is being played at a gloriously bewildering pace. Paul wins the kick-out, exchanges a quick one-two, and splits the posts. He doesn't look right, though. He hasn't been moving freely all game; I can't see him lasting much longer.

Conor Hand with a good score for St. Bridgids, but Tadhg Browne responds with equal skill. Good footballers the both of them. 0-15 to 1-11, but there's loads of time left.

St. Bridgids with a goal chance, but Gavin Curran denies Ronan Stack with a good save. Good pressure by Dingle, but St. Bridgids are back to fifteen now and defend well.

Tadhg Browne. Important chance but he nails it. Dingle two points clear now. It's theirs to lose now - but this game has more twists than Hercules Poirot's worst days.

Dingle in possession. Niall Geaney with a chance, it curls wide. This isn't over.

Brian Stack with an effort, deflected out for a '45. A big kick for Shnae Cunnane, but there's a reason that this team are in Croke Park today. He nails it. One point game.

Bridgids with a chance, but Gavin Curran gathers safely. He doesn't know it yet, but his baby boy has just been born back in Australia. Dingle with possession. Mark O'Connor -what a game he has had - is fouled. Injury time now; just hold on to it.

Niall to Paul Geaney. Dingle are two clear again, 64 minutes gone.

One chance for the Roscommon outfit in the dying seconds. Ruaidhrí Fallon....this is a performance for the ages, and he ices it with a brilliant two pointer. Stunning stuff.

Extra-time.

Bridgids have the momentum. Conor Hand lays

off to a breaking Fallon, and they go in front. Fallon is absolutely burning up the ground, and he adds a two pointer. Three down - it's not looking good for Dingle. Bodies are struggling now. Hard to blame them - I'm just sitting on the sofa, and I'm feeling drained. Conor Geaney fouled, and he nails the kick himself. Dingle needed that. A foul on Paul gives Conor a chance from outside the arc, but the free pulls wide.

Dylan Geaney....what a score. I thought it was a waste of possession to even try it. That was the best score in a game that's seen a lot of great ones. One point game at the break.

Dylan Geaney opens the scoring for the second half of extra-time. Level pegging again. Players are starting to cramp now.

Conor Hand with a two point effort, Gavin Curran emerges to fist clear. Great goalkeeping. Bridgids recycle well though, and Shane Cunnane nudges them back in front. Charlie O'Carroll with another one. Two clear, three minutes to play. I'm muttering words that clerical friends might not approve.

Tom O'Sullivan has been an absolute dynamo, and he comes up with a crucial score. Great turnover by Mikey Geaney. Lays off to Tom. Absolutely no give in him, and he splits the posts. All square.

One last chance. Mikey. Paul may be the jewel in the crown but Mikey and Billy O'Connor have been the beating heartbeat of Dingle for the last decade. It might sound like blasphemy, but for this one kick, I'd sooner have Mikey kicking it even than his All Star cousin. And Mikey, being Mikey, makes no mistake. Dingle in front. They thought it was all over....arrah, Geoff Hurst, you were only average when all's said and done. Subs are leared off the pitch; the referee is letting play continue and Dingle have one last free. Paul isn't taking any chances, quite happy to kick it wide and end a brilliant contest. One of the best games I have ever seen. Ruaidhrí Fallon definitely the man of the match; Mark O'Connor and Tom O'Sullivan both strong contenders. Hard luck to St. Bridgids. They won a lot of admirers on the day, and I am one of them. But comhgairdeas to Dingle, including Killarney's own James Weldon in the background. In a triple crown of club titles for the Kingdom, this was easily the pinnacle.

MCGRATH CUP FINAL

Cork 0-16 Kerry 0-15

It's not exactly the most prestigious trophy going (the crowd has been described using words that would tire out a thesaurus. I don't know why people are dressing it up; I'd go for 'small gathering' long before I'd call it a 'crowd'), but it's silverware in the cabinet and that counts for something. Cork needed this victory more than Kerry, and I think maybe that gave them the extra inch they needed.

When I say that they needed it, I don't mean the McGrath Cup itself. They won that at their ease in the last two years and traditionally, the winner of the McGrath Cup doesn't lift the Sam Maguire. But this one was different from the off. First of all, this wasn't any makeshift Kerry team. Far from it. This was real power, plenty of established players. If you can't hold your own in this company....well, there's plenty of lads behind you very willing to jump the queue. Very strong Cork team as well. What's happening? It feels like both managers are anxious to lay down a marker. I don't really know why. January. I don't know who is in the middle of heavy training, who is just starting to build, who is just trying to shake the rust off their legs. I know young lads on both sides will have points to prove for the summer, but any lad who is peaking in January.....mind you, Jack O'Connor and John Cleary are both a lot smarter than me. It's quite possible that there is a bigger picture obvious to both that I can't see.

Lively start by both sides. Luke Fahy gathers a good Conor Cahalane pass and fires over. Cork are hunting in packs, Kerry seem to be a little more willing to kick the ball, but both are playing well. Seán O'Shea with a '45. Armin Heinrich with good support play and on hand to fire over a point himself. Impressive by the

Stacks man. Mark Cronin with a handy free levelled matters. Tony Brosnan, who looked lively after his tour de force over toothless Waterford, nudged Kerry in front.

Cork should really have taken the lead on twelve minutes. Decent effort by Seán McDonnell and fine save by Shane Ryan. But John Cleary will know that the difference between Division Two and Division One sides is that the top table teams put chances like that away.

Seán O'Shea with a close range free. Once again, though, Cork could have goaled. Mark Cronin should have done better after snaring an uncharacteristically loose kick-out by Shane Ryan. Could have tucked it away, could have squared it to an unmarked Chris Óg Jones..... could have – didn't.

Instead, Sean O'Shea stretched Kerry's lead from play and added a two pointer effort. 0-7 to 0-2. Note to Jack O'Connor; this Kenmare lad can kick them long. Who could have known? Scores from play were scarce enough but the football was actually very good. Dylan Casey became the second Stacks' defender on the scoreboard, but Mark Cronin replied with a free. Tomás Kennedy showed great strength to win a high ball and draw a free, a handy tap-over for a relatively quiet (you know bears hibernate for winter, right?) David Clifford. Colm O'Callaghan, one of Cork's best players, fired over the last score of the first half to leave his side trailing by 0-9 to 0-5.

Chris Óg Jones (I've always rated the speedster and once again he reminded me why in this game) opened the second half scoring and Colm O'Callaghan added another but Tony Brosnan replied.

Brian Hurley was on the pitch now and I consider this guy to be the best Cork forward since Colin Corkery. Unlucky with injuries down the years, and I don't think that any one player, no matter how good, would have counterbalanced the disparity between the two teams over the past decade. But a superb talent nonetheless, and he showed it again with a great two pointer. 0-10 apiece.

Both sides had made a plethora of changes at half-time. I think it's fair to say that Cork got more from their substitutions than Kerry did (honourable exception to a tigerish Micheál Burns in particular).

Tony Brosnan banged over another superb two pointer. He has definitely proven that he is right

in the hunt for a championship starting jersey. Kerry two points up. Cork with the momentum, though. This isn't any early season who cares kind of runaround for either side.

Mattie Taylor opted to fist over. Maybe there was a bit more on the table, but I felt that he absolutely did the right thing. Ruairí Murphy replied, but back came Seán McDonnell with another point. Note to self for later on in the year; Cork have serious pace among their forwards.

Brian Hurley with another two pointer. Fat sizzling on the fire now!

Tony Brosnan with an equaliser. Two minutes on the clock, just about. Killian Spillane, cucumber cool as always, nervelessly fired over to put Kerry in front.

Controversy? Was Colm O'Callaghan fouled? Ah stop, lads, those are always given, and well ye know it. I'm not indulging any of the whinging. Again, from a Cork perspective (which possibly involves worshipping Satan, for all I know) I'd be querying why he hadn't tapped it over with his left leg instead of taking it into contact in the first place. Regardless, Brian Hurley was never going to miss that one.

Level pegging. Hold on – the linesman seems to be indicating that Cork delayed a free. Bring that up 50 metres, tap over the free, and we win the McGrath Cup.

Nope. The referee isn't buying it. How controversial is that? Well, I'll be plenty more controversial. The ref was spot on; well done to Eoin Morrissey.

Cork with possession. One last chance to clinch it, and Chris Óg Jones duly obliges. A fine score, and it's the winner. A selfish part of me doesn't mind. Lads, it's cold. Good football, but I'm more ready for the fire and a cup of tea than extra-time.

This could cost us, though. Don't mind the fact that it's Cork's first senior defeat of Kerry in the Fitzgerald Stadium in 31 years. That's one of these statistics that sounds hugely significant in the match reports afterwards. I never met a player yet who really cared about that stuff; they tend to be far too busy with actually playing the game. I honestly think you are better off shaking that monkey off your back in a relatively harmless match than letting it develop into a piseog.

But Cork have been edging close to us in the last three years. They have been finishing

strongly against us, often after poor enough starts. That seems to me to be a confidence thing. O'Driscoll, Maguire, O'Callaghan, Ó Jones, Hurley, Sherlock on his day...Cork are coming. What they need now is to follow this win up with a strong start to the National League. That's been a bit of an achilles heel for them. They don't necessarily need to actually get to Division One, but they do need to be really knocking on that door. Their finishing has to start matching their football. They needed Brian Hurley on that pitch, not a good long-term sign.

Kerry? I'm not sure what conclusions, if any, can be drawn. We gave a lot of aspiring players game-time; I'm unconvinced how many will be real options when Jack O'Connor starts dealing from a full deck. Jack O'Connor spoke afterwards about the demanding club schedule in Kerry after the inter-county season....I'm banging that drum with a long time. It did improve a bit last year, to be fair. A lot done, more to do....that was Barrack Obama's slogan one time. God be with the days.

This was the big one. The oldest college rivalry in Munster. Leave out St. Jarlaths in football and Kierans and Thurles in the hurling, and it's probably the oldest in the country, and that's allowing for the great days of yore for the

likes of Críost Rí. This one had extra spice after the Sem's win in last year's semi-final and the Green's one point win in this year's O'Sullivan Cup Final.

Was it a great game? I'll be honest, not really. There were some astonishing moments – that two pointer by Gearóid White, you'll not see better in his year's hunt for Sam Maguire. Genuinely. But overall, conditions militated against great football. But that's okay, because great players show their best on the hard days. If any of you have read about Terry Pratchett's Granny Weatherwax, you'll recall that she claimed that "Anybody can be a witch at midnight. The real test is if you can be a witch at noon."

A strange metaphor, I'll grant you, but I have an enormous fondness for Terry Pratchett's books. The Sem made the better start, Liam O'Brien with two and Ben Kelliher on target. 0-3 to 0-0. For me, the Sem were far more adventurous; the Green seemed to be a little more cautious. They didn't score in the first quarter, only getting off the mark through a Gearóid White free in the 17th minute. Plenty of fuel in the tanks, lads, go meet fire with fire. Open it up.

Mind you, Ronan Carroll was the one player driving at the Sem, and I'd argue that he was the best player on the pitch in that period but ploughing a mostly lone furrow. The Sem were playing great team football, dominating midfield and using the full width of the pitch. Samul Scroope, one of four 2025 Frewen winners to start for the Sem, kicked a fine score and the industrious Mark O'Carroll (I thought he had a superb game) made it 0-5 to 0-1. The Sem were very much dominant at that stage, with David McCarthy and Cian Mulcahy impressing at the back. However, they needed to take a lead into the second half, when they would be facing the wind.

Gearóid White kicked over two frees for the Green, but a late bit of dissent (let's just say that I had a certain amount of sympathy) led to a simple tapover for Ben Kelliher to give the Sem a 0-6 to 0-3 lead.

I have to say – and this is observation, not criticism – that I would have laughed beforehand at any prediction that a Tralee side that had Gearóid White, Ronan Carroll, and Nick Lacey up front would fail to register a score from play in a full half of football.

The second half was an entirely different matter. Tralee were much more direct now, Ryan Hurley splitting the posts and Ronan O'Carroll slotting a free to leave the minimum between the sides. This was more like it. The Sem weren't wilting in any way, though. Brian O'Shea doubled their lead and Joey McCarthy added an absolute beauty.

Coming into the fourth quarter, the tempo began to change. A great turnover by White led to a Nick Lacey score. White was absolutely brilliant for the Kerry minors for two years running but has clearly been carrying a knock all through this year. This was the first time all year I've seen him play with real confidence. Quite simply, he started looking like himself, and that's a real handful for anybody.

Ronan O'Carroll boomed over a monster two pointer free and the sides were level for the first

time. Finan Blackwell nudged the Sem back in front, but it was beginning to have the feeling of a siege now. Could the Sem hold out?

With twelve minutes to go, White landed an absolutely phenomenal two pointer from play. Fair enough, he had the cushion of the advantage rule being played (i.e. Tralee would have kept possession anyway, meaning that he had nothing to lose) but it was a superb piece of skill. It also put the Green into the lead for the first time.

Tralee, with the likes of O'Flaherty, Moriarty, and McKivergan really kicking into gear, always looked like winners from here. Now, I don't want it mistaken for any kind of begrudging of a great Tralee team or excuses or any of that nonsense, but I do think it's fair to say that it was in this crucial period that the Sem really missed their injured big men like Dylan O'Meara, Seán Kiely, and Mark Kennelly (they were also without goalkeeper Kacper Robak, but Caolan Mitchell had a fine game between the sticks). In the end, though, Tralee just brought that little bit more to the table at the crucial juncture. Substitute Darragh Murphy doubled their lead and Eoin O'Flaherty, with a trademark burst up the field, closed out the scoring.

Decent game, given the circumstances, but not exceptional. Both sides could arguably do a little better. Neither side will care. At this stage, it is literally all about winning and it's the Green who advance, and they will be carrying the favourites tag. But Marc Ó Sé will know full well that there's a long road ahead, especially with the quality shown in the other quarter-finals.

Neither Pres. Milltown nor St. Pats Castleisland would have played a lot of Corn uí Mhuirí quarter-finals in their time, but both sides showed in a really thrilling derby in Dr. Eamonn O'Sullivan Pitch in Fries why they absolutely belong at this level.

Pres. Milltown made the brighter start, with Killian Fitzgerald booming over a brilliant two pointer free after a foul on the lively Diarmuid Quirke. In fact the pressure by Milltown and the tackling was relentless, forcing a number of turnovers that saw Danny Murphy and Michael Lynch clip over further scores to give the Mid Kerry side a four point advantage.

Castleisland's few forays forward were being mopped up by a strong defence marshalled by Marcus Clifford, Seán Clifford, and raiding wing backs Liam Harmon and Ryan Carey. Micheál Horan did slice through in the 11th minute for a great individual score to put Castleisland on the scoreboard. However, at the end of the first quarter a Brian Mangan score restored Milltown's four point lead, 0-5 to 0-1.

His subsequent Hogan Cup semi-final shootout with young Michael Meehan of St. Jarlaths has since been widely acknowledged by most as the greatest colleges' football match of all time. Liam Sheehan went on to establish himself as one of the great Keel players, playing Kerry junior in 2005 and 2007, before taking up teaching and transferring to Éire Óg in Cork.

It may sound like I am revelling in nostalgia. That's because I am. There isn't too much I can say about the game. Micheál Ó Sé's team did really well to get his team to the knockout stages, but Rochestown are unbeaten so far and it almost looked like a bridge too far. And missing influential midfielder Éanna Murphy? Rochestown always looked that little bit sharper. They totally dominated the first half, opening up a 1-9 to 0-2 half-time lead. Killorglin put up an excellent second half and at one stage trimmed the gap to 1-10 to 0-8, mostly through the superb accuracy of Adam O'Neill, but Rochestown always had a gear in hand if

needed and ran out relatively comfortable winners.

For a small consolation, Killorglin did go on a few days later to beat Tarbert in the Munster U17 soccer semi-final with goals from Cade Jameson, Tommy Foley, Charlie Foley, and Sean Doherty.

Regardless, they are definitely at full speed now and looking better with every passing game.

The Simcox champions coughed up a goal to Aaron McAndrew and were down by 1-2 to 0-0 when the talented Tom Whooley scored a great point for Clonakilty. Their only first half score, 1-4 to 0-1 at half-time.

St. Francis Rochestown, 'Roco' if you will, did win the second half. By 0-4 to 0-2. Sometimes I like to put an exclamation mark into a match report, just to liven things up. Sometimes, it feels like too much of a challenge.

Not that Clonmel will care. They are very much into the final four on merit.







A Word of Victory

"Do you not know that all of us who have been baptised into Christ Jesus were baptised into His death? We were buried therefore with Him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the Glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:3-4).

Welcome back dear student baptism is an outward sign of leaving behind the life of sin, recognising the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus being the guarantee of resurrection promised by God to those who believe (Romans 8:11). John the Baptist was baptising in the River Jordan calling people to come out of darkness (John 1:6-34; Luke 3:1-22). He challenged them to repent of sin, turn back to God, and be baptised. He prophesised the coming Messiah would baptise people with the Holy Spirit and Fire. John baptised Jesus to fulfil the Word of God. When Jesus came up from the water John saw the Holy Spirit descend upon Him as a dove. The dove symbolises purity, God's anointing, and, relating back to the time of Noah, new creation. In water baptism the person is declaring – I believe in Jesus, I'm leaving behind my old life of sin, pain and darkness, and I'm emerging from these waters of Life, into a new way of living: for, and with God.

Under the Old Covenant, the Holy Spirit came at times upon only certain people - the prophets. But when Jesus, the Sinless Saviour, died on the Cross for mankind's sin, and then God raised Him from the dead, a New Covenant began. This New Covenant is an agreement between God and us, written and sealed in the Blood of the Lamb, Jesus. We couldn't pay for our own sins. But God's Son who lived a sinless life, in total submission and obedience to God's Law, took upon Himself our sins, paying for them with His Blood (1 Peter 3:18; Romans 5:6-8; Hebrews 9:28). This made the way for anyone who believes in Jesus to be forgiven of sin, washed and cleansed in His Blood, and reconciled to God (John 3:16). When Jesus died and went into hell, having never sinned, He had authority over the devil to take back the dominion that Adam and Eve had been tricked into handing over in the Garden. Jesus defeated Satan and his demons once and for all, going into hell so we wouldn't have to! He paid our debt and Redeemed us. Then God raised Jesus as He had promised - the firstborn from the dead (1 Corinthians 15). Jesus went through death and resurrection before us, so we need never fear death, if we believe, repent, and call upon His Name for Salvation we have the promise of eternal life (Romans 10:9-13; Hebrews 2:14-15).

In choosing to get baptised we are celebrating being 'in Christ, a New Creation' (2 Corinthians 5:17). This isn't a ritual: it's a decision to completely align one's life to God's ways (Matthew 6:33). It's a new beginning in Christ, leaving behind old negative attitudes; darkness, and sin. It's putting on Love - living a lifestyle that brings God Glory and Honour (Colossians 3:13-17). It's choosing to forgive and release the past; both receiving and giving Mercy; a powerful way to live – free from bondage! Truthfully, it's a choice an innocent baby cannot make, for they have not sinned. The enemy deceives people into living in bondage to sin, twisting God's Word, keeping them in ignorance to bring destruction (Hosea 4:6). Baptism is a powerful declaration of one's faith, and an invitation to God's Holy Spirit. If you wish to learn more, with a view to getting baptised friend, do come to our meetings listed below.
