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

Welcome to this week's Killarney Outlook. It's a busy one with all the news, sport and fantastic offers from our loyal advertisers.



SUCCESS ON THE DOUBLE

erry Captain Gavin White is hoping that, all going according to plan, two major trophies could be on display in Killarney in the coming months with the overall Tidy Towns award paraded through the streets alongside the Sam Maguire Cup.

The brilliant defender has the honour of captaining his county this season as a result of his club Dr Crokes winning the Kerry Senior Football Championship crown and the speed merchant wing back is certainly leading by example.

He capped a fine performance against Roscommon last Saturday with a goal at Fitzgerald Stadium but he had little time to celebrate as he had to swap the football for the brush and the green and gold jersey for the hivis bib to launch this year's Killarney Looking Good Competition.

Apart, perhaps, from climbing the steps of the Hogan Stand to collect Sam for the first time since 2022, Gavin would love nothing more than to see his beloved Killarney crowned Ireland's Tidiest Town for the first time since 2011.

And, like the Kerry team, the Killarney Looking Good Committee members are hoping that teamwork, determination and a little extra polish can make that dream come true.

The Killarney Looking Good Competition,

which returned stronger than ever in 2022 after an enforced three-year absence, due to the pandemic, will see awards presented in 26 different categories and high achievers in the business and residential community will be honoured at a gala prizegiving ceremony at the close of the tourist season.

In the business community, there will be awards for the best large and small commercial premises, best newly painted premises, best signage and the best retail award with prizes also for the most impressive hotel, public house, restaurant, café, guesthouse and best public building as well as the most improved premises. In the residential categories awards will go to the best large and small estates, best private residence, best roadside garden, best floral display and best friendly planting award.

Other categories include a green hospitality award, a corporate special responsibility award, a restoration award, best school and a special biodiversity award and several highly commended awards will also be up for grabs while the winner of the prestigious overall award will be announced at the prizegiving ceremony.

There are also two special categories in memory of two remarkable people who played massive roles in keeping Killarney looking its best down through the years.

The late Yvonne Quill was the driving force

behind the Killarney tidy towns campaign for several years and she was at the helm when the sought-after overall award was secured 14 years ago.

This year the Yvonne Quill Memorial Award will be presented to the volunteer of the year – a person who the adjudicators consider to be a standout contributor – in the overall effort to keep Killarney tidy.

Up to the time of his death in January 2020, Fr Michael Murphy was the public face of tidy towns and he played a huge part in Killarney, Kenmare and Sneem winning the overall national award in 2011, 2000 and 1987 respectively. Affectionately known as Fr Tidy, this year the Killarney Looking Good Competition will honour his memory with a special Pride of Place award.

The Killarney Looking Good Competition is organised by Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and Killarney Municipal District Council with support from the Killarney Looking Good Community Employment Scheme.

MD O'Shea & Sons are the overall sponsors of the competition and O'Mahony Media Ltd is the media sponsor.

The competition will run throughout the tourist season and businesses and residential areas will be monitored by the adjudicators on an ongoing basis.



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Kerry community college calling on other schools to become SunSmart

astleisland Community College became a sun safety leader in 2024 and is now asking other schools to join them as a SunSmart School in 2025.

The Transition Year students at Castleisland Community College were crowned winners of the Young Social Innovators 2024 for their skin cancer awareness project called 'Sun Smarties'. The college became the first school to pilot being a SunSmart School. The school designed a four-step process that would enable them to become a SunSmart School, with an opportunity for other schools to implement this model in their own school and become accredited as a SunSmart School.

Shirley O'Shea, Senior Health Promotion and Improvement Officer - Cancer Prevention for HSE South West said:

"HSE South West was delighted to work with the school on this campaign. Castleisland Community College's project was innovative and has helped to provide other schools with a model to educate students about being 'SunSmart', which can help reduce their risk of developing skin cancer later in life.

"Children and adolescents spend half of their childhood at school and about eight hours per week travelling to and from school, on lunch breaks, and participating in outdoor school-based activities. Much of this time falls between the hours of 11am and 3pm when the sun's UV rays are at their strongest."

Now, to promote the importance of sun protection in schools, the HSE's National Cancer Control Programme (NCCP) and Healthy Ireland have launched the new SunSmart School Accreditation resources for primary and post-primary schools.

The toolkit has been developed to provide information and tools for students, teachers, parents and guardians on how to become a SunSmart accredited school, as well as providing learning opportunities on sun protection.

UV radiation is a part of sunlight and it can damage skin and increase the risk of skin cancer. Skin cancer is Ireland's most common cancer with over 11,000 new cases diagnosed annually. The majority of skin cancers can be prevented by protecting ourselves from the sun's UV rays and from artificial sources of UV e.g. sunbeds.

Playing and spending time outdoors is such an important part of childhood, but it is important that children and adolescents are protected and safe in the sun. Teachers, parents and guardians are important role models. If they adopt sun protection behaviours, children will be more likely to do the same. Make SunSmart part of your daily routine especially from April-September when the intensity of UV radiation from the sun is greatest, even when it is cloudy.

The SunSmart 5 S's emphasises simple yet effective measures to protect children's skin:

- Slip on clothing to cover exposed skin.

- Slop on broad-spectrum sunscreen on exposed skin with SPF 30+ for adults and 50+ for children which is water resistant. Reapply regularly
- Slap on a wide-brimmed hat to protect the face, ears, and neck.
- Seek shade when UV rays are at their strongest, especially between 11am and 3pm.
- Slide on UV-protective sunglasses to guard eves.

Remember, do not deliberately try to get a suntan. Avoid getting a sunburn. Never use a sunbed.

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MR PARNELL IN THE SOUTH

A report of a meeting with Charles Stewart Parnell in Beaufort on Sunday 16th of May 1880.

The Meeting was held in Patrick O'Sullivan's field – South of Beaufort Bar. Another account by Anne O'Sullivan, daughter of Patrick, formerly Beaufort Hotel, opposite the Beaufort Bar, stated that prior to the location of the meeting being agreed, the Parnellite's canvassed local tenants for a suitable site. Patrick O'Sullivan then made his field available.

O'Mahony, the landlord at the time, who resided in Dunloe Castle let it be known that any of his tenants who facilitated the meeting would be evicted from his lands. The fact that the turnout was so large, O'Mahony decided to leave matters to rest.

A land meeting was held on Sunday at Beaufort, near Killarney. At the appointed hour a telegram was received from Mallow from Parnell, stating that he would be in Killarney by special train at three o'clock. A band appeared and a carriage in which Mr. Parnell and Mr. O'Donoghue M.P. - the latter having posted at 2 o'clock in the morning to Mallow, to induce Mr. Parnell to attend the meeting. The meeting originated in consequence of some misunderstanding between The McGillicuddy and other landlords in the neighbourhood with their tenants, but strange to say, no allusion was made to the matter by any of the speakers. A Government reporter was on the platform and a posse of police were in attendance. When the meeting had fully assembled, the numbers were estimated at 3,000.

They were assembled to proclaim to the world that the present land laws required a change and to to punish the men who attempted to drive the people from their homes (cheers)

'The O'Donoghue', M.P. thought that the scene of landlord tyranny was the proper place to hold a meeting. (A voice -'We'd go into their houses to hold it') Kerry desired that her meeting should partake of a national character. by having amongst them one who represented Irishmen all over the world - Charles Stewart Parnell (cheers) He was the shining star in the pages of contemporary history. (cheers) He was the leader of the Irish people. He looked upon him as such and his own experience in the House of Commons, taught him so. Like the Israelites of old, they would follow the leader and boldly cry out - 'Onward' (cheers) In conclusion the speaker asked them to give Mr. Parnell a hearty reception (cheers).



Mr. Parnell, who was received with vociferous cheering, said it was the largest land meeting he had attended since in County Mayo twelve months ago. They initiated the land agitation which will swap the vital system of landlordism. The people of Ireland were now united in a great movement - the greatest undertakings that anyone could engage in - the task of obtaining for the people the land of their native country. But in this work they were beset by difficulties and dangers of no ordinary character. Famine had come upon the country - the laws the landlords made gave them the right of exacting any rent that they please, of seizing the food upon which the tenant is to rely for his existence in satisfaction of that rent and finally in driving the tenant from his holding if he fails or is unable to pay this rent

They had had enormous agitation in Ireland. They had 600,000 tenant farmers and 10,000 landlords the right to rack-rent and drive from their homes the 600,000 farmers. They might patch and amend the system as they pleased, but they would never make it but a bad system. It was their duty in making the lines for the settlement of this question to see that these lines are laid right and not on false foundations. They should have some measure to prevent the eviction of the smaller tenantry until such time as their objectives would be attained. Some said that they should pay only fair rents on the

Government valuation. (A voice – 'That is too high too')

In proposing that evictions should be suspended for two years in holdings valued under £20. They would rely on the landlord on the same footing as the shopkeeping classes, who are every day supplying the farmers with the means of subsistence. Let the Government lend them a sum of ten millions, and any landlord who charges an excessive rent would be served with notice by an appointed commission that he would get 20 years purchase at the Government valuation and would at once cease to derive any more rents from his property.

If the Legislature refuses to step in, the agitation would increase tenfold in intensity and the people will do for themselves what the Legislature refuses to do for them. He concluded by proposing the first resolution.

Resolved – 'That is the opinion of this meeting, the eviction of occupiers of land for non-payment of rent arbitrarily fixed by the landlord is unjust, subversive of the true interests of the country and calls for the emphatic condemnation of all lovers of justice'





BRIGHT BLUE IN MUCKROSS -

Time for others to colour up



Wedgewood blue to much of the building. The 18th century colour is part of an ongoing effort to bring what is a historic past to the fore.

The hotel is probably the oldest hotel in Killarney. The Lake Hotel dates to 1820; the International to the mid 1800s and the Great Southern to 1854 with the coming of the railway. But the five-star Muckross dates to 1795.

Some people were applying the brakes last week at a colour which was the same as the cloudless sky with sunglasses on. Was it an undercoat, they mused?

It was quite the overcoat.

Muckross Park marketing manager Josie O' Kelly says the hotel is delighted with it and "the new colour has certainly caught people's attention" when I put it to her.

It is officially described as "Spring Blue", Josie said.

It was chosen not only for its elegance but also to reflect the Georgian heritage of the hotel

and complement the building's architectural character.

"We are thrilled with how it turned out," she said. Jane Austen was a Georgian and I wonder if she ever made it to Killarney. Certainly George Bernard Shaw did a century later and wrote Pygmalion while a guest at the old Muckross Hotel.

On a broader note, it would be nice if more guesthouses and hotels in Killarney coloured up. We have too many grey and dull buildings. The Muckross Road is meant to be Killarney's Golden Mile but is particularly cheerless. I often wonder why the town officials can't come up with a colour plan for Killarney which could bring a bit of joy to the stuck motorist. Colour could be part of Tidy Towns assessments - actually I am increasingly underwhelmed by Tidy Towns reports. There's a lot of mush in them, as if the judges are afraid of offending anyone. Understandably. But we need strong statements in reports - as much as strong colour in towns to put a bit of life in us.

SHELTER FOR EMERGENCY SITUATIONS FOR LOCALS -AT LAST

At long last, Killarney is to get an emergency homeless accommodation facility - the first in more than three years. The facility is understood to be on the Muckross Road and will provide emergency accommodation for families and individuals from south Kerry as well as Killarney.

Over the past three years no homeless facility has been available in the tourist town with the previous emergency houses used as accommodation facilities for Ukrainian refugees fleeing war and others seeking asylum.

Families with children in schools and individuals from Killarney and south Kerry who were evicted or lost their accommodation were forced to go to Tralee and Listowel.

It was a shameful situation: That this tourist town could accommodate thousands and thousands from other countries either as

paying guests or as State paid shelter but had no room at the inn for anyone local in trouble in a housing crisis was a total embarrassment. The news was relayed in a report to the council by chief executive officer Fearghal Reidy and the council's housing director, John Kennelly. Killarney councillors I spoke with welcomed the development.

It has been hugely challenging to find emergency accommodation. The reality is there was more money to be made from housing Ukrainian refugees, Independent Councillor Martin Grady said.

He has raised the issue a number of times at meetings of Killarney Municipal District where officials acknowledged they found it impossible to source accommodation despite several attempts.

Niall O'Callaghan said it was a hugely significant step for Killarney and for the past three years there had been none because so much more money was paid by the State to people hosting refugees and IPAS clients.

St Vincent de Paul is also to provide 14 housing units at St Anne's House.

Meanwhile, the over provision of social housing - while no affordable housing is being provided by the council - was highlighted by Councillor Tommy Griffin (FG). He said Milltown with a population of 2,000 would have 200 social housing units by the end of 2025. Milltown had a reputation as a starter town where young couples could afford to buy but this was no longer the case. New private housing in Milltown was starting at 400,000 euro.

The focus by the council was on social housing and the council should have a balance especially as it had so much land which could be provided for affordable homes, he said.. Tommy called for more affordable housing and "a balance between private, affordable and social housing".

RESPONDING TO THE FINE WEATHER

The arrival of early fine weather - a mirror of 2020 when Covid hit - needs a new approach.

Lifeguards should be placed on duty on Kerry beaches earlier than scheduled, a meeting of Kerry County Council was told.

The meeting in Tralee on Monday also heard of "traffic chaos" at major beaches and there were calls for parking facilities to be developed by the council and the National Parks and Wildlife service at Inch which is part of the country's newest national park. It is the most popular Kerry beach.

The NPWS really needs to address parking or park and ride all over Kerry, it seems. The county has seen crowds on beaches over the prolonged period of fine weather. But where is the parking? And where are the lifeguards? Lifeguards traditionally do not come on duty until the first weekend in June.

"Not to have a lifeguard on duty is not where we want to be," Castleisland Councillor Fionnán Fitzgerald, (FF), said.

The meeting also heard of "chaotic scenes" with traffic at the Inch Beach.

Cars got stuck in the sand, a bus got stuck on the road, and locals had to don high viz jackets to direct traffic.

In the middle of it all a private company was clamping cars. Imagine!


Speaking of cars, could our town councillors or Tidy Towns people approach supermarket car park owners and ask them to plant trees or find some method of providing shade. One idea is for opaque covers such as in Spain - maybe with solar panels.

Again, the sun has shone light with problems with Dundag. We need a degree of supervision to deal with broken glass, glass bottles and all kinds of leavings. Toilets and

Billy Alexander makes it three in a row with gold medal at RHS Chelsea Flower Show

'Wilde Kells Bay Gardens' fern exhibit wows judges at prestigious horticultural event

he judges at the esteemed Royal Horticultural Society's Chelsea Flower Show have this morning awarded a Gold medal to Ireland's Master Gardener, Billy Alexander for his impressive fern collection. In a triumph for Irish horticulture, this marks the third consecutive Gold medal that Billy has received for his exhibits at the prestigious event.

'Wilde Kells Bay Gardens', sponsored by Wilde Aparthotels is Alexander's most ambitious display yet, in terms of scale at 120 metres and complexity of design with over 100 species of ferns featured throughout. The Chelsea Flower Show takes place from today Tuesday 20th – Saturday 24th May 2025.

Speaking about the announcement, Billy Alexander, Owner Kells Bay Gardens said, "I am quite honestly speechless, and over the moon to have received another gold medal this morning. The announcement today is the culmination of 24 months of planning, cultivating and working with my incredible team and partners to get to this moment. It takes a huge amount of work to protect the plants, get them looking their best and to transport them safely all the way from Cahersiveen to Chelsea but it is worth every minute. I'm delighted to be able to share my passion with others and want to extend my gratitude to the RHS and its judges for this acknowledgement".

Wilde Kells Bay Gardens

The 2025 exhibit builds upon Alexander's previous showcases and highlights the unique beauty and diversity of ferns from around the world. As one of the oldest family of plant species in the world, ferns thrive in the naturally temperate microclimate of Kells Bay Gardens,



situated on the Ring of Kerry with breathtaking views of the Iveragh Peninsula. Complementing the exhibit, sphagnum moss and rocks from Kells Bay are situated in a woodland and bog garden around a dark, still water pool. The towering display wowed judges, with rare and exotic fern species from New Zealand, Australia, Juan Fernandez Islands, Vietnam, Chile, Japan (to name a few) featured throughout.

A groundswell of support

Last year, the Royal Horticultural Society further recognised Billy's talent and contribution to the sector with the Lawrence Medal, which is the highest honour awarded to an exhibitor for their display. It is awarded annually for the best exhibit shown to the RHS Society during a given year. Alexander had considerable success at the 2023 RHS Chelsea Flower show, securing both a Gold medal and the coveted "Best Exhibit in the Great Pavilion" award. He also

received Gold medals in 2021 for his displays at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show and Hampton Court Garden Festival respectively.

Boasting one of the largest private fern collections in Europe, Billy has specimens that hail from the Pacific Islands, Indonesia, Vietnam and New Zealand and he regularly travels to exotic locations to meet with other plant experts and to seek out new specimen to add to the collection at Kells Bay. Outside of horticultural shows, ferns from Alexander's collection are held in high esteem and can even be found in royal grounds – including King Charles' private place of residence Highgrove House in Gloucestershire, UK.

Communication is a human right, and we want every child to be able to communicate their needs to those around them. But we need your help. There is a severe shortage of Speech and Language Therapy appointments, and the system in Ireland is failing this generation. In 2023 there were 19,000 children waiting for assessments, which delays and impacts their chances of communicating.

In 2024, Down Syndrome Ireland developed an innovative Speech and Language Therapy Assistant programme, to ensure no child is left behind.



Under the mentorship of their physics teacher, Kevin McCarthy they undertook an ambitious





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Physical fitness is important at state exam time

FITNESS

With the state exams fast approaching, it's important to keep an eye on your physical fitness. Study and revision are demanding. The pressure, which some candidates feel around exam time, is a good reason to maintain a level of physical fitness. In the context of an exam, physical fitness is every bit as important as mental alertness. A regular exercise programme is a great way to burn off tension. It relieves stress and is good for the self-confidence. Exercise is a welcome break from the demands of regular study. Set aside an hour two or three times a week to exercise in order to keep in good physical shape. The amount of active exercise you take depends on yourself. Strenuous, competitive exercise is not advisable before and during the exam period as it causes fatigue. An aerobic exercise programme results in a feeling of well-being, it helps you to sleep soundly, to build up stamina and endurance and leads to improved concentration

NUTRITION

A well-balanced nutritious diet is important around exam time when you need high reserves of energy. Ensure that your mind is clear and alert with a diet that is high on protein, carbohydrates, unsaturated fats, vitamins, minerals and energy. Take three substantial - but not too heavy - meals each day. Enjoy a high-fibre breakfast to keep the digestive system functioning normally. Eat a healthy dinner, which contains constituents such as vegetables, potatoes, rice, pasta, salads, chicken, fish or lean meat. Take a regular evening meal of brown bread, eggs, cheese and related high protein-based foods. Rather than having three very heavy meals you might prefer to supplement your main meals with a few nutritious snacks made up of yoghurt, fruit, cheese and the like. Don't over indulge in junk food. Drink at least two glasses of milk daily as well as plenty of cool fresh water to avoid dehydration and to keep the fluid levels high. Be moderate in your use of artificial stimulants such as tea and coffee, which contain caffeine. Keep a clear head by abstaining from alcohol before and during the exam period.

RELAXATION

Counteract any nervousness by using a few simple relaxation techniques. Stress and anxiety are related to muscular tension. So, by using a relaxation technique to reduce tension in the muscles you will also reduce stress and anxiety. An effective one is to close your eyes and inhale a few comfortable deep breaths. Hold each breath for a few seconds. Then breathe out, slowly and quietly. As you breathe out say 'relax' to yourself and you will feel the tension flowing out of your body. Open your eyes and then carry on with your study. This simple but effective physical relaxation technique can be done in about two minutes and can also be used for periodic breaks during the exam itself.

SLEEP

Aim to get eight or nine hours sleep each night. A tired mind, however brilliant, cannot perform at its best. So, the importance of an adequate amount of sleep cannot be over emphasised. Long hours of study into the night can be counter- productive and energy sapping. Rather than burning the midnight oil go to bed at a reasonable hour to ensure that you get sufficient rest.

HYGIENE

Be particular about your personal hygiene, especially in warm weather. If you feel fresh and comfortable your mind will focus better on the task in hand. Hang up your uniform after school and change into casual clothes before you

settle down to evening study. As the tension of the day often manifests itself in the feet, change from your school footwear to lighter more comfortable footwear. Always take the time to enjoy a regular shower or bath. A fresh effervescent feeling will help you to meet the demands of study and exams.

CHECKLIST

- It's important to get eight- or nine-hours sleep every night
- Instead of burning the midnight oil go to bed early
- Good personal hygiene keeps you fresh and comfortable

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

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COMMON EYE CONDITIONS

Glaucoma

Glaucoma represents a number of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged. It is often asymptomatic and is often linked to raised pressure within the eye.

When the nerve is damaged, it starts to cause problems with peripheral vision and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage.

Cataract

A cataract happens when either all or part of the lens in the eye becomes cloudy. There are different types of cataract, but the most common is agerelated cataract.

Cataracts are very common, being the main cause of impaired vision in the world. If left untreated they can lead to partial or total sight loss.

Cataracts are very easily diagnosed by optometrists.

Age-related macular degeneration

Age-related macular degeneration (AMD) affects the central part of the vision and is caused by damage to the macular region of the eye, which is the part of the retina that provides high-resolution, central vision.

There are two main types of AMD - dry and wet. AMD is the most common cause of sightimpairment that affects older people.

Dry Eye

Dry eye syndrome is a common condition that occurs when the eyes do not produce enough tears or they evaporate too quickly.

Dry eye can lead to the eye becoming red, swollen and irritated, and in certain cases cause considerable discomfort for the sufferer. In very rare cases dry eye can be a sight threatening condition.

Red eye

Red eye comprises a number of conditions such as conjunctivitis or burst blood vessels in the eye and are usually nothing to be unduly concerned about.

However, if the eye is painful this could be a sign of something more serious such as iritis (inflammation) or acute glaucoma.

While the majority of red eye conditions are short-term issues, they could be a symptom of other more serious conditions, such as acute glaucoma which is medically urgent and could result in loss of sight in that eye.

Watery eye (epiphora)

Watery eye is a condition that is usually caused either by tears not draining correctly from the eye or, paradoxically, as a result of an underlying dry eye condition which results in irritation.

This can cause blurred vision, sore eyelids, swelling and vision impairment. Severe cases of watery eye can cause significant discomfort for sufferers.



IFI opens third draw for Kerry salmon anglers for 2025

Inland Fisheries Ireland (IFI) has opened the third draw for anglers wishing to catch and keep salmon from Kerry's River Roughty.

Brown tag regulations apply to the river catchment until September 30th, 2025, when the salmon fishing season ends.

Anglers interested in entering a June 12th lottery draw for a brown tag can apply at the IFI website until midnight on Sunday, June 8th, 2025. Commenting, Sean Long South-Western River Basin District Director at IFI stated: "The number of wild Atlantic salmon returning to our rivers is declining. The risk of over-fishing puts stocks in further jeopardy.

"Brown tag measures for salmon and sea trout are required on the Roughty River to conserve stocks and avoid accidental over-harvesting. "Where there is a modest harvestable surplus with a risk of over-exploitation, this brown gill tag system is introduced to closely monitor the angling quotas."

A total of 74 brown tags are available in 2025. They are being distributed

to anglers with a valid rod licence via four draws during the season.

The previous draws were held in February and April, with 38 brown tags distributed to date.

Anglers may only receive one brown tag per season for use on the River Roughty catchment.

Those who receive the tags through the lottery system must place them on the fish – along with a blue tag – as proof it was lawfully caught and may be retained for private use.

Anglers not allocated a brown tag are only permitted to fish for salmon on the Roughty River on a catch-and-release basis, where the salmon is returned safely to the same waterbody.

Anglers must use catch-and-release methods only, involving single or double barbless hooks. Use of worms as bait is not permitted.



ALL IRELAND CHAMPIONSHIP Group Stage Game One

Kerry 3-18 Roscommon 0-17

The bottom line is that a win is a win. I don't actually think that it would have been a disaster if we had lost; three teams coming out of a four team group gives a lot of leeway. Some people, myself included, would say far too much; it should be two teams emerging straight into guarter-finals. I think the attendance reflected that. Apparently the official attendance was 6814. You'd be disappointed with that as the attendance at a County Final, let alone an intercounty game. But, look, cost, traffic, parking, no sense of jeopardy, and a multiplicity of games, even in GAA alone, to choose from..... there's plenty of reasons for a low attendance. But two very obvious ones stand out for the home side. County League games being on at the same time where both teams agree. There's few die-hard pundits who still cavil at the split season, because it makes lazy journalism harder - I myself see those articles and think, "what split season are you on about?" But a big one for me is the Kerry hurlers being in action at the same time in a game that was effectively their McDonagh fate on the line (not quite in mathematical terms but very much so in real time) being on at the same time.

Look, a part of that is me being cranky. I know the automatic response is "ah, but Jimmy, we have to get the games played". No, you absolutely don't. You are cramming a forced 'group stage' into a competition that never needed or wanted it, just like that distinctly notso-Super 8 rubbish that preceded it. Hey, look, I have no objections to money. It does matter, in fact it's any sporting organisation's most vital resource. I like money (we have very rarely met in person). But when it comes to quality, you'll make more money out of a few diamonds than a lot of charcoal, and that principle applies to games too. The GAA have accepted the public's verdict - i.e. attendances at football matches dropping like the US economy these days and this awful group stage is gone next year, replaced with a winner/loser back door system. For which I sing 'hallelujah'.

Roscommon looked sharp at the throw-in. Good work by Ciarán Murtagh found Ben O'Carroll, and he slipped it off neatly to an davancing Ronan Daly for the opening score. They had another chance drop short and then Brian Stack burst through aftera turnover but had to content himself with a point as Kerry closed in.



Roscommon had the wind but were playing a certain amount of rope-a-dope. Defending deep to draw Kerry forward and then breaking at speed. Not quite blanket defence, but a similar principle. I don't blame them. Kerry were strong favourites. The underdogs have to try and hang in there, frustrate the better team, and try and tempt them into mistakes.

Diarmuid O'Connor made Kerry's first foray and picked off a neat point. Great to see him back in action; he will be needed. Also, with Bary Dan O'Sullivan having effectively secured a championship berth in my eyes, Diarmuid's return provides an option for Joe 'Connor's pace and power from wing forward in a more roving commission. That's an experiment that has worked out really twice for me - although I would question the quality of Munster opposition. That's not denyin the great battle that Cork put up, but the likes of the Ulster teams are coming a harder road and yes, it makes a huge difference. Frankly, I wanted a real battle from Roscommon, and I never felt that either side was really going all-in here.

Paul Geaney curled over a lovely free from a tight angle. Keith Doyle replied with a good score from Keith Doyle. Joe O'Connor, whose presence was very much being felt, was unlucky to fist off the woodwork instead of a point.

David Clifford with a free kick from away out near the sideline. Straight over for two points. Good move by Roscommon and Dylan Ruane applied a nice finish for the point. Roscommon's ball-handling and support play was very good, in fairness. Daire Cregg almost got another, I think maybe he was caught between going forward for a goal chance or taking his point. In the end it goes wide.

Joe O'Connor kicked a good point for Kerry, but Ben O'Carroll replied equally stylishly and the sides were level again, 0-5 apiece. Roscommon will have been quietly pleased to be containing Kerry's attack, but personally I felt confident enough that with our bench and the second half wind, we would pull away. Seán O'Shea with a two point free after Gavin White was impeded after claiming a mark. I know the rule seems harsh, but impeding frees was an endemic tactic and slowed down an awful lot of games. That's no holier-than-thou nonsense. Every Kerry player, and I'm talking club as well as county, knew how to do it and was actively expected by supporters to do it. The punishment shouldn't fit the crime in this case; it should be much harsher. Seán O'Shea – of course – accepted the two points on offer. 0-7 to 0-5.

Daire Cregg quickly pulled one back for Roscommon (very close to the arc but just inside it) but Kerry's pace and power around the middle third was starting to show, with both Diarmuid and Joe O'Connor adding to their tallies. Just before half-time, Roscommon got caught with just two forwards up, and once again Seán O'Shea accepted the gift.

Half-time Kerry 0-11 Roscommon 0-6. Considering that Roscommon had more or less given Kerry four points from two-pointer frees, things had been even enough in a first half that never really sparked into life.

David Clifford and Brian Ó Beaglaioch with early wides for Kerry in the second half. Kerry looked to be getting into hunting mode. It was Roscommon who got the first score of the half, though, Ciarán Murtagh with a free. They won a '45 but Conor Hand's effort curled too far. I didn't want Kerry to get sucked into a dogfight here.

Joe O'Connor on a great run but John McManus somehow manages to get back and get a hand in. To be fair, that was top quality defending, as good as you will see.

David Clifford with a nice point. He has an uncanny ability to make these things look simple. Meanwhile, Jack O'Connor was starting to make switches, with Tony Brosnan and Graham O'Sullivan coming on. I rate Graham hugely as a footballer, always have, right back to his early days with Coláiste na Sceilge. But not as a forward. I know he is a ball-winner

on kick-outs, but I've seen umpteen Kerry defenders moved into the forwards and offhand, I would say that Mick O'Dwyer is the only really successful one that I recall. Paddy Bawn or Eamonn O'Donoghue maybe, and it would be tenuous enough with either of those. Ogie Moran did start his senior career at wing back, but he was well-known as a star forward from college long before he ever was eligible to vote. I would look for a way to leave players like Paul Murphy, Tom O'Sullivan, Gavin White, Brian Ó Beaglaíoch bomb forward, which they do to great effect. I would never select them as forwards, kick-out primacy or not. Still, if I were picking the Kerry team, we'd be very hard up for managers!

Tony wasn't long getting in action, rapidly nabbing a point to cancel out Ben O'Carroll's score. 0-13 to 0-8.

Twenty minutes to go. At last Kerry's threats came to fruition. Brian Ó Beaglaíoch with a powerful run and a lay-off to David Clifford. Roscommon closed him down quickly but he simply shrugged them off and finished to the net. A goal that was at least as much about power as guile; they all count the same on the scoreboard.

Shane Ryan slotted a '45. Seán O'Shea clipped over from a tight angle. Roscommon had battled hard all day, but it looked like they would be overwhelmed in the finish.

Kerry came again, hunting with purpose. A good move involving Joe O'Connor, David Clifford and Seán O'Shea saw the ball crossed to Paul Geaney for the finish. What I really liked about that goal, really really liked, was the unselfishness of it. Any of them could justifiably have gone for their own shot but instead they made quick and correct decisions on the ball, and it actually looked instinctive. It isn't, it takes an awful lot of trust and even more training to combine like that. 2-15 to 0-8.

Full credit to Roscommon, they were not going to go out with a whimper. This game may have been lost, but at group stage, scoring difference could very well come into play. Mind you, the 'sheepstealers' – it's not an insult, it is a genuine nickname for Roscommon from back in the Great Famine, and one that they are justifiably proud of – have always had a certain streak of defiance of the fates about them anyway. Ronan Daly, for me their best player

over the hour (including a bit of wholehearted aggression, nothing wrong with it) kicked a great two pointer. Ciaran Murtagh added a point, but Brian Ó Beaglaíoch fisted over in reply.

With 61 minutes Gavin White, a key component of Kerry's strongest line, timed his run perfectly for Paul Geaney's pass and fisted to the net. Seán O'Shea danced through a few tackles before fisting over from a tight angle.

Roscommon picked off the last few scores, Listowel's Conor Cox kicking a free and a two point free and Diarmuid Murtagh pointing from play. Consolation scores, to be honest about it. Roscommon left no pride behind them, but I really don't think they had all their bets on the table either. I think they were okay with keeping the score down against Kerry and targeting the other two teams in the group. I don't know....it was a nice day out, and a lovely crowd in town, but it had no sense of tension or hite.

Cork up next and I genuinely hope that we get another ferocious battle from them. You don't want to be climbing cliff-faces - I wouldn't want to be in Galway or Mayo's shoes right now - but coasting downhill will do nothing for us when the big guns are firing broadsides in Croke Park. It's been a mantra of mine, and smarter minds than me, all my life. When Cork are going well, so do Kerry, and vice versa. We keep each other's blades sharp. Right now I can't help thinking that, while we have looked clinical, we haven't exactly needed rapiers so far. I know. I'm a glass is half-empty rather than half-full kind of guy. And it really does take a Kerryman to be complaining after a ten point win, especially where we scored three goals again. But there you are. I'm not the first to say it and won't be the last: Páidí had our number

OUTSIDE KERRY

Arrah, Kerry v Roscommon is not exactly going to stick in anyone's memory too long. It was always going to be a case of 'how much', rather than 'if'. As I say, it was obvious early on that Roscomon were not hurling the handle with the hatchet. Elsewhere....well, that was a bit of a whirlwind.

Dublin 2-2-10 Galway 1-0-18

I wasn't remotely surprised. There was a rush to write off Dublin, a touch of schadenfreude perhaps. Now, I'm wrong as often as I'm right, I'm not the guy who gets to say "I told you so". But people writing off Dublin on the basis of a loss to Meath - a genuinely brilliant result for gaelic football overall, because the Leinster Championship was so dead I'd have been reluctant to watch it on television - but writing Dulin off? Galway are good, very good. They have been the second best team in the country for three years now....but you can ask any Cork supporter from the 1970s how much 'second best' is worth. Dublin didn't play all of their big guns against Meat and some of their top players had bad days. Anyone writing them off on that basis....God love you, crathur.

Both teams meant business. Unlike our own group, there's absolutely no room for manoeuvre in theirs, and it showed early on. A game with a bit of bite to it. Cormac Costeloe's breakaway goal meant that Dublin led by 1-9 to 0-8 at half-time, and deserved it. Unlike the Meath game, they had a palpable hunger. Mind you, none of that is to suggest that Galway folded the tent, any fool that wants to write

them off now can do so at his own peril. They struck for two goals in the second half, Stephen Cluxton denied Shane Walsh another. Honestly, I thought Walsh, unquestionably talented, telegraphed the finish. A tiny bit of guile and he would have stroked it home - I know, easy for the likes of me to be saying it. In the finish it was level pegging when Cluxton hit a perfect kick-out and Tom Lahiff combined with the outstanding Ciarán Kilkenny and finished the move himself. Yes, Galway's marking was a little slack at that stage, but this was a Dublin that we have seen before. Practicality mixed with panache. Throw the likes of Lee Gannon, Eoin Murchan, and the Small brothers Paddy and John (here's a clue: neither of them are small).... yeah, I'll be writing off Dublin the same way that Conor Cruise O'Brien famously wrote off Charlie Haughey "If I saw Mr Haughey buried at midnight at a crossroad, with a stake driven through his heart - politically speaking - I should continue to wear a clove of garlic round my neck, just in case." Yup. Dublin. I genuinely admire them as a team. That don't necessarily make us friends.

I'd say Mayo are everybody's favourite second team. If Mayo actually win an All Ireland any time soon, this country will throw the biggest party it has ever seen. Mayo are so good they keep getting very, very close,....and their hearts get battered every time. Not broken, never broken. Tough people. This is a county that was absolutely riddled by emigration. To hell or Connaught? There were times in this country's history where you'd nearly toss a coin. They keep coming. And what I admire most about them is that there's no trace of bitterness. When Kerry are playing Mayo in an All Ireland Final, you can meet Mayo supporters the night before and talk away and they are a fierce welcoming people. And you promise them that you firmly believe that Mayo will win (you don't, really, but you have to pretend. It's an unspoken law in Kerry, ye know it as well as me). But the truly great thing about Mayo is that you can meet those exact same people the night after, and they will be just as sound. Frankly, if Kerry lose an All Ireland, we can be sour enough. Not nasty, in all fairness, but we are a desperate people for whinging and looking for excuses. Mayo don't do that.

We haven't the same history with Cavan. They were a great power in the game away back in the forties, but not in recent years. We played them in the '97 semi-final, Brian Clarke with a disallowed moment of absolute genius, a young Mike Frank stamping his greatness at senior level...but even to a raw garsoon like myself, it didn't feel historic. And we met Mayo in that final after and Maurice Fitzgerald, famously the undoubted best player never to win an All Ireland, cast off that mantle. I still remember thinking that he would do well to put that sideline kick near the end out of play, don't give Mayo the chance to break forward... Maurice being Maurice, he put it straight over. Mayo, far more so than any communist regime, really are a riddle wrapped in a mystery

wrapped in an enigma. The Connaught Final was a cracker. A familiar pairing meant that it didn't capture the attention as much as its Ulster or Leinster counterparts, but it was two great teams having a real go at each other. If Mayo had been playing the likes of Kerry, Dublin, Donegal, or Armagh last weekend, I suspect it would have been a ferocious battle. But somehow, it just seemed from early doors that they couldn't rise their game against Cavan. The Ulster side - and I'm beginning to worryingly believe that the high standard in Ulster is rising all boats there – tore into it right from the start. And it seemed to catch Mayo on the hop. They are a better team than that, they have proven it time and again....but it was the most of twenty minutes before Mayo got anything at all on the scoreboard. I, and I imagine everyone else, expected a different Mayo side in the second half, but Gerard Smith's goal immediately on the rstart was a hammer blow. Mayo did eventually get their game together, but Cavan won fair and square. Cat among the pigeons now indeed! There's a fair amount of criticism of Kevin McStay...lads, either throw away those hurleys, or get off the ditch. He has done more for Mayo than any of

Down 3-27 Clare 1-16

The days of great Down players like Mickey Linden or the McCartan dynasty have receded into memory - not always good memories for us, famously, Kerry have never beaten Down in a championship game. You can recite it with me, '60, '61. '68. '91.

Clare rattled us plenty of times in the Munster Championship recently enough, but it's my belief, respectfully, that Kerry were at the latter end of bulk training rather than in top gear for several of those games.

Down were in charge here from the first minute to the last. They led by 1-9 to 0-1. Then they led by 2-13 to 0-5. It just never happened for Clare. I don't know how many of you remember the 1991 semi-final between ourselves and Meath. They absolutely destroyed us. Meath were good, but not that good. We just never got out of the starting blocks. Everything that could go wrong went wrong. Some days are these days. Declan Quill got our lone point in the second half. Last weekend it was Clare's turn to have one of those days; it just happens. In many ways it was worse, simply because Down were coming in as Taillteann Cup champions whereas Clare were provincial finalists. But the people who are hailing this as a shock for the ages? You do know that Down are a Division Two team in the National League, and Clare were unlucky not to get out of Division Three? It's not a subject I want to dwell too much on, but yes, the press conference afterwards has drawn a lot of attention. Peter Keane reacted to a journalist, and Peter was wrong to do so. But that journalist was deliberately baiting, and I genuinely consider it nasty. I've met Peter in many press briefings, including after hard defeats, and he has always been an out and out gentleman. I happen to know the man personally, and it may well be that it colours my perception. But I've always tried to be respectful in such situations. It's a tough thing to do, stand up and oblige the likes of me after losing a game you put our heart and soul into. I'm not sure I'd be tough enough to do it. So a bit of respect is the minimum standard. Sink below that, and you may as well unionise with the likes of Logan and Jake Paul or that appalling misogynist Andrew Tate. Peter was wrong to take the bait and react as he did, but quite frankly I don't believe for one moment that he is the villain of the piece.

GARY LINEKER

'RETIRES'

Discussing that clickbait 'interview' leads me to another topic. Gary Lineker has not exactly been persona non grata at the BBC, but not for the want of them trying. has previously been critical of British Government policies



and they tried to get rid of him...and paid a big price as the public supported Gary Lineker's right to have an opinion. This time, Gary Lineker published tweets regarding the situation in Gaza. I haven't seen those tweets. But I'm told that they were 'anti-semitic'. Unfortunately, that's a very loaded term nowadays. A trigger warning, to use that overblown phrase. Very few of the people who use it seem to grasp that 'semite' is an ethnicity, not an ideology, and there is no semite tradition of supporting the deaths of little children. I would never judge anyone based on ethnicity or skin colour (I will bluntly say that luminous orange is not good, oompa-loompas should not govern humans. and you shouldn't be allowed to impose tariffs unless you can actually spell the word).

Look, I have political opinions, and I'm not putting those on anyone. These are very complicated situations and there's plenty of smokescreens on all sides. You are perfectly entitled to your own opinions. I write a sports column. That's it, that's the brief. But I am entitled to my own opinions. I will not deliberately tell lies against my own beliefs and if any employer, prospective or otherwise, wants me to, they will be refused. I don't buy into the usual nonsense that too many journalists aspire to, as some sort of public moral arbiter. The raison d'etre for the job is to get paid for selling product. That may be a cold truth, but it's true nonetheless. Freedom of the press is a genuinely important concept. Have a look at every despotic regime from the dawn of time, and controlling the narrative is always a priority. Academics and journalists are always among the first to be put up against the wall and given a blindfold. Many, not all but many, of both professions try to project reality rather than illusion. Despots don't like it.

I'm not suggesting that Gary Lineker is a huge victim in all of this. I won't remotely claim to be sorry for the multi-millionaire. I don't know

how many of you remember the name of Jamal Khashoggi. Or Viktoria Roshchyna. A lot of the world doesn't...or, more likely, doesn't care. I really think that you should. Gary Lineker's enforced departure is not that, of course... except that if such things go by without comment, there won't be any 'of course' about it.

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

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
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












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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect".

Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.

This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

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Again there is a large range of different types of window boxes and containers. The most popular ones are the plastic. If it's a plastic window box that you have the first thing you must do is sort out the drainage.

Turn the window box upside down and you will see holes marked out. You can either use a screw driver or a drill to punch out these holes. Turn the box back up and put some small stones or polysterine around the holes. Fill the box with compost and a slow release fertiliser to about half an inch from the top of the box and firm in compost. When choosing the plants for the window box make sure that the taller plants are at the back trailing plants towards the front and medium sized plants for fillers inbetween.

A good example for tall plants at the back of the box would be upright geraniums or upright fuchsias. Good trailing plants for the front of the box would be trailing geraniums or trailing petunias. Other examples of good trailing plants for fillers would be trailing lobelia, bacopa and bidens.

When you box is planted, water in plants well and don't put into position for a few days. Remember that all window sills slope so when your trailing plants start to grow you will need something to hold you box in position.


Student Art Exhibition: Hidden Beauty of Castleisland Church
