

Sheep handlers with their loyal canine companions will be flocking to Killarney to compete in the Irish National Sheepdog Trials - a three day national championship which takes place at Killalee, Fossa, Killarney (Gap of Dunloe Road) from Thursday 5th to Saturday 7th, August 2021, 52 acre field used by kind permission of The Europe Hotel and Resort.

The trials will see 150 of the countries top handlers, working with their sheepdogs to compete for the much coveted trophy and be crowned national champion of Ireland.

The event judges will also select 15 of the top dogs in the country, to represent Ireland in the International sheep dog trials, later this year. The event is similar to the popular tv show " One Man and his Dog". This is also the first time the national sheepdog championship takes place in County Kerry.

### KILLARNEY CYCLISTS PROMINENT IN ULTRA EVENT

Killarney cyclists were particularly prominent in the TransAtlantic Way ultra race which started on July 9th and saw the riders race from Derry to Cork, much of it along sections of the Wild Atlantic Way.

There were two separate races within the event and the 'short' course was won by 66-year-old Tom Daly from Killarney Cycling Club. Tom covered the 1,680 Km, with 19,134 metres of climbing, in a time of 6 days and 11 hours. Tom had previously won a number of Masters national track championship titles with the Killarney club. The longer course covered 2,430Km and the Cassidy brothers - Benny (30) and Donnacha (32) - came second and third respectively. Benny, a former member of Killarney Cycling Club, covered the course in 5 days and 23 hours, averaging more than 400Km per day. They are sons of Brenan Cassidy who is a former Chairman of Killarney Cycling Club. Benny was a former elite road racer before taking up ultra-racing. He came second in this event before and in 2019 came 12th in the Transcontinental Race that covers 4,000km between the Black Sea and the Atlantic coast in France.

These events are even more challenging given that the riders are self-supported: they have to carry all the kit they need and have to source food and accommodation by themselves along the way. The TransAtlantic Way terrain is also noted for being extremely challenging with much of it very steep and on poor roads.

This year's event was confined to Irish residents because of Covid and there were 22 starters. The Race Director, Adrian O'Sullivan, speaking after the leading riders finished said: "I don't know what they put in the water in Killarney to make them so tough. In the world of ultra bike-racing, the TransAtlantic Way is notorious as one of the toughest there is. It has unrelenting steep climbs and energy-sapping roads, and to have three riders from one town doing so well is remarkable".


### MAYOR URGES KERRY PEOPLE TO **SUPPORT COUNTY'S OLYMPIANS**

### **STATUS ORANGE** HIGH FOREST FIRE RISK WARNING TO PEAK TODAY



Teagasc is urging all involved in outdoor activity to exercise extreme caution and to heed the high level warning for fires in place for the coming week. Due to current dry weather patterns and high temperature, a high fire risk is deemed to exist in all areas where hazardous fuels such as dead grasses and shrub fuels such as heather and gorse exist. This risk phase is expected to peak by today, Friday, 23 July, 2021.

High outdoor visitor activity levels can be expected in line with the fine weather and the normal pattern of summer holiday usage. Members of the public intending to visit forests and other recreational sites are reminded to adhere to regulations introduced to limit the spread of Covid-19. Vehicles must not be parked at site entrances or impede emergency service access to forest roads. Forest visitors should not use barbeques, or open fires at any stage. Wildfires not only pose a serious risk to property and the rural environment, they also threaten lives directly in their path and may potentially divert the resources of our emergency services. Teagasc asks famers, land owners, rural dwellers and those using the countryside to be extremely vigilant in light of the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine's Condition Orange Fire risk alert and reminds everyone that it is illegal to burn growing vegetation on uncultivated land between 1 March and 31 August. Teagasc also urges forest owners and forest managers to remain vigilant over the coming days and to have appropriate measures in place to help prevent loss or damage through fire. These measures include having:

A risk assessment completed Adequate insurance against fire risk A current and accurate fire plan in place Access routes clear

Fire breaks maintained along boundaries Fire suppression resources at the ready Co-operation with neighbours and fire patrols planned where required

### GOOD NEWS FOR RESIDENTS OF LISTRY BEAUFORT AND FAHA

The Cathaoirleach of the Kenmare Municipal District and Deputy Mayor of Kerry, Councillor Michael Cahill has received confirmation from Irish Water that they have now approved additional funding to replace 2.6km of watermains along the Board of Works Road in Beaufort which also supplies the entire Listry/Faha area.

Following representations made by me on behalf of the residents of Beaufort, Listry and Faha regarding their water supply, I am pleased that Irish Water has more than doubled the amount of funding being made available, thereby increasing the amount of watermains to be replaced along the Board of Works road from the original 1.2km to 2.6km. The Fianna Fail Councillor who has vigorously lobbied Irish Water and highlighted the plight of the residents of Beaufort, Listry, Faha and surrounding areas said that he is delighted with this latest announcement from Irish Water as he has continuously argued that the entire pipework would need to be replaced. The residents of



Beaufort, Listry, Faha, Dromin, Barleymount, Milltown and surrounding areas have endured enough pain for too long. Water is the number one basic necessity in any household and it is a basic human right" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor. Councillor Cahill also welcomed approval for designs to proceed on the rising main to Barleymount Reservoir and the Listry to Faha section of watermains. "We are making some progress at long last" stated Councillor Cahill. Irish Water has identified that it will take significant investment over many years to bring the current water assets up to a good standard in many areas of the country, particularly in Kerry.

### Minister Foley welcomes the announcement of extensive water supply improvements in Kerry



Education Minister and Fianna Fáil TD Norma Foley welcomes confirmation that extensive water supply network upgrades will commence across the county this year.

These important works will continue to reduce leaks across the network in Kerry and this tranche of significant work will specifically target and replace mains in the Farranfore, Board of Works Road and Cordal, near Castleisland.

Further funding will allow for the design of additional mains replacement

between Crohane pumping station and Barleymount Reservoir, along the Listry to Faha road and in the Ashill area.

All of these works are planned for construction this year, with the first section along the Far Board of Works Road, having begun last week.

This announcement comes just weeks after Irish Water confirmed that a new Wastewater Treatment Plant is to be built in Fenit.

Knightstown Wastewater Treatment Plant is also to be upgraded as part of the Small Towns and Villages Growth Programme.

Minster Foley said: "I welcome these essential mains replacement works which will significantly upgrade and improve the water network in County Kerry. I have worked closely with my Cabinet colleague Minister Darragh O'Brien on this issue and I wish to thank him, Irish Water and Kerry Co. Council for their continued commitment, support and determination to upgrade the water network in County Kerry."

### Turning the Sod

Minister Martin Heydon will turn the sod at the Site of The Kerry Food Hub Innovation Centre in Firies today.

The Minister of State with special responsibility for Research and Development, Farm Safety and New Market Development at the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine will mark the official commencement of The Kerry Food Hub 02 Project, supported by Enterprise Ireland, comprising of the construction of 10 new units, with the creation of a significant number of new jobs and the launch of artisanmarket.ie, a B2B Online eCommerce Marketplace.

Leo Clancy, CEO, Enterprise Ireland, David Gleeson, Chairman of Firies Business Hub DAC (The Kerry Food Hub) will also be in attendance.

# Call for St. Mary of the Angels to be **removed from** *Time to Move on policy*



An emergency motion by Fianna Fail Councillor, Michael Cahill at this month's meeting of Kerry County Council has called on the Government to exempt St Mary of the Angels, Beaufort from the Time to Move On Policy, for the following reasons: St John Of God has served notice on the HSE to withdraw as Service Provider in all areas, including St Mary of the Angels from the 30/9/2021. They have also notified HIQA of their intention to cease operations as and from the 30/09/2021. If that happens, with SMOA still subject to that closure policy, it is highly likely that a short-term lease between St john of God and the HSE will be put in place and SMOA will be put on the market for sale by St John of God said Councillor Cahill. This is what happened in County Sligo in a place very similar to SMOA called Cregg House when the Service provider there, who were The Daughters of Wisdom Order, withdrew as Service Provider and handed the service to the HSE.

Cregg house is now on the market for sale stated the Fianna Fail Councillor. The numbers are dropping all the time as the policy does not allow new entries which will also lead to the place closing by default. Residents are passing away each year added Councillor Cahill. There is also a chronic need in the community for the services provided in SMOA, now and into the future. Residents are being discriminated against under the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities as they are not being allowed to live in their chosen place, stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor. Councillor Cahill said SMOA should never have been included in this policy in the first place. It was included for two reasons.

1. Policy said it should close as it is a "congregated setting", which is a setting in which 10 or more people share a single living unit.

There is no living arrangement in SMOA where there are 10 or more people living in a single unit. Reason 2 for including SMOA in the policy was that "The living arrangements are campus based" Councillor Cahill said Many nursing homes are campus based. However , not only are nursing homes exempt from this policy, The Time to Move On Policy identifies this very setting as 'highly appropriate' for people with disabilities.

Similarly exempt from this policy is campus based Carebright Community in Bruff Co. Limerick, where people with Dementia live together in the campus and are cared for.

Other groups of people with disabilities such as people with autism in The Cork Association for Autism, live together in similar campus settings.


These campuses, Crobally House in Mogeely and Grennville Campus in Carraigtwohill, are not included in this policy. It is worth noting that many residents in SMOA have Autism.

Camphill Communities are campus based settings for those with intellectual disabilities and other needs. These are also exempt from the policy.

"In summary people in SMOA with severe disabilities are being seriously discriminated against in being prevented from continuing to live in a place of there choosing that is clearly best suited to there needs.

SMOA gives huge employment in Beaufort, Mid Kerry and throughout South Kerry and deserves our support", stated the Fianna Fail man.

Councillor Cahill's Emergency Motion received the full backing of all members.

### **BUSINESS BODY SEEKS CLARIFICATION ON AIRPORT CRUX**

/ illarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce fully supports Kerry Airport in its efforts to clarify the future of the crucial Dublin-Kerry route, the success of which is imperative if tourism, business and community life in the county is to prosper going forward.

Ryanair has this week notified Kerry Airport that it intends to operate the route once a day until the end of August but the airline has committed to restoring a twice-daily service from September. While the interest of Ryanair in operating the service is greatly welcomed, given the success and shrewd business approach of the airline and its long established links with the county, it is disconcerting why, up to now, there had been no formal discussions on the matter with Kerry Airport.

Chamber notes Kerry Airport CEO John Mulhern's earlier assertion that, up to this week, he had received no notification from Ryanair and that he had not been informed of any details relating to any schedule.

Full and immediate discussions are required between the all parties involved to ensure the restoration of the PSO-supported Kerry-Dublin service. Chamber President Niall Kelleher said it is important that due diligence is observed in

the entire process and terms must be agreed by management at Kerry Airport before any deal is rubber-stamped and any service is launched.

"The route is a vital lifeline for the Kerry economy and with decent access to the county so essential for the tourism and business sector, as well as those travelling between the counties for leisure or medical reasons, the service must continue to be enthusiastically supported when it resumes," Mr Kelleher stated. He said it is essential too that when the service is restored, it will deliver a minimum of two flights per days between Kerry and Dublin to enable same-day return for passengers.

"The short commute time from Kerry to Dublin is an enormous benefit for business interests in the county needing swift access to the capital and, indeed, for those seeking to travel on flights to onward destinations," Mr Kelleher stressed.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce said it is very conscious of the fact that the service ensures that Kerry has access to a major hub in relation to potential tourism growth which is vital to support the economic wellbeing and development of the south west region.

"The Chamber acknowledges and appreciates the fact that Kerry Airport, in addition to being a valuable employer, serves as an economic driver for the region and has a major impact on the social and economic infrastructure of the county.

"Chamber also encourages all public representatives in Kerry to continue providing support for Kerry Airport given its absolute importance to the county," Mr Kelleher said.

of Transport considering an offer from Ryanair to operate the Dublin- Kerry Route on a commercial basis.

Passenger number statistics confirm that the commercial viability of this service is assured only through PSO support and based on the deployment of commuter aircraft. In this context the proposal by Ryanair to deploy 737 Jet aircraft having a seating capacity of more than twice that of the commuter aircraft and with much higher operating costs without financial support has to be questioned.

The importance of the Kerry - Dublin Route to the tourism sector in the region is well established with tourism traffic continuing to grow year on year as Dublin Airport has expanded as an International Gateway. It is critical that flexible connectivity is available to travellers visiting the South-West region with a timetable which minimises transfer times at the gateway airport. A minimum of two flights per day at the correct times are required to meet this criteria.

Connectivity refers not only to passengers but also to luggage. The ability of passengers to check luggage through to their final destination from the airport of origin has long since been common practice. This allows passengers the comfort of transferring through the gateway airport without having to worry about picking up luggage, long immigration queues and recheck in. This facility is not available with the Ryanair option.

'The requirement for an efficient and time optimised service for local businesses and the community cannot be underestimated', says Pat O Leary, The chairman of the Kerry Tourism Industry Federation. 'Dublin is a four to six hour commute depending on where one is located in the county. The service is a lifeline for those daily travellers to Dublin for business, health and social activity. As former MD of a global multinational operating in Kerry the availability of a flexible service to and from Dublin for both visiting international customers and staff was paramount. The disruption which resulted when the service was interrupted some years ago was immense.

Regardless of which airline is awarded the contract, Kerry Tourism Industry Federation is calling on the minister to ensure that the PSO is maintained going forward and that operational considerations agreeable to Kerry Airport management are included in the service agreement contract.

# NOEL LUCEY, RIP

erry GAA has always had a fairly traceable lineage and some familes have played prominent roles. Some? Very many, in fact. The Baileys of Ballymac. The Sheehys of John Mitchels. The Landers from the Rock. The Brosnans of Moyvane, Con and his three great sons. The hurling Hennessys and the Boyles of Ballyduff. The four Murphy brothers from Camp. The Lovetts and the Bunyans. The Caseys from Lispole. The Ó Sé's of Ard an Bhothair and the O'Sheas of Killarney.

The Coopers. The Lynes of Cleeney, one of them played a stormer for the Kerry U20s last week. Their nephews, of course, the Spillanes of Templenoe. All the Ó hAinféins of Lispole and the Geaneys of Dingle (I have to admit that I've lost count of them all). The Burkes of Milltown. The Hassetts in Killorglin. The Kennellys in Listowel. The O'Sullivans in Rathmore. The O'Sullivans in South Kerry. The Sherwoods and their cousin Peter Crowley. The Cliffords, of course – you could hardly leave them out now! The Luceys from Caragh Lake, Brendan, Jimmy, Vincent, and Paul, could hold their heads high in any and all of that company.

Noel made his debut in the 1962 Munster semi-final in Frank Sheehy Park, Listowel. As expected, it was an easy baptism for the new centre back. His second game was against Cork in the Athletic Grounds. I don't know why, but that was the toughest encounter of them all between Kerry and Cork. Not on the field - off it. The Cork supporters, normally our best of enemies and beside us any time real troubles befall, were shouting and throwing things -Johnny Culloty had to shelter in his own net with the umpires that day. Obviously that atmosphere was going to transmit onto the field of play. The fact that Kerry were in control of the scoreboard from early on only inflamed the situation. Referee Moss Colbert had to fight fire on all sides, it was an impossible task. Cork's Eric Ryan had already gone off injured (I don't know why, but in fairness, this game wasn't all saints on one side and sinners on the other!) when tough Joe O'Sullivan got stuck into the greenhorn, test his mettle. He didn't know that this was midfielder Jimmy Lucey's younger brother but he found out quickly, and it wasn't Jimmy who enlightened him.. Joe was one of the great veterans on that Cork team. But he was tangling with the wrong man. Even on a day when he was trying to keep his eyes halfclosed (as I would have myself), Moss Colbert had to send both of them off.

Tadhg Crowley and Dr. Jim Brosnan had to escort him along the sideline, enduring a hail of sods and stones (terraces weren't concreted back then). It was water off a duck's back as far as Noel was concerned. Noel was never the first



man to throw any punch – but he was rarely the first man to stop, either! Donie O'Sullivan, the great Spa footballer, made his debut that day and told me that Noel and Niall Sheehy were the saving of him. By the end of the year Noel Lucey had an All Ireland medal around his neck after Garry McMahon scored the fastest goal ever in an All Ireland Final. He had a National League medal to add to it by the following vear after Kerry defeated New York. However, they came a cropper against Galway in the All Ireland Final. A lot of Kerry players would get to know that Galway team in Croke Park well, three times Kerry met them and three times they had our measure. Noel was gone after his second All Ireland final. And any time he met his good friend Joe O'Sullivan, they had great laughs together

He was back with his beloved Glenbeigh/ Glencar. The brothers, including Noel, all played for their native club, Paul moved to Tralee and fell in with Austin Stacks. He had no problem fitting in! At a time like this many of us remember Noel in the summer sun, standing in the heart of Kerry's defence, defying all comers. But that is just one small measure of a man, and Noel was a gentle giant in many walks of life, but most especially as a husband and a father. 



### Shannon ABC secures €700,000

### for capital equipment to support Irish companies

The equipment to be purchased includes:

• Environmental Monitoring Suite (Elemental Analyser, Greenhouse Gas analyser) Mr Patrick Quille, Dr Oscar Goni (€250,000)

• Photosynthetic growth chambers (upgrades to current chambers, GEN1000-IN incubation chamber (new), GEN2000-SH short-height multitiered chamber, PGC-Flex-2 Tier intermediatescale chamber) Dr Peter Downey, Dr Siobhan Moane (€200,000).

These grant awards bring to  $\in 2.5m$  the amount of funding secured by Shannon ABC for capital equipment in the last three years.







### DRY EYE Air conditioning and central heating

WHAT IS DRY EYE?

People with dry eye either don't make enough normal (lubricating) tears or the ones that they make are of poor quality, causing the tears to dry up too quickly and the front of the eve to become dry and irritated. As a result, dry eye can be uncomfortable and cause the eye to produce the watery type of tears. This only helps for a short time - leaving the eye uncomfortable and gritty.


If your eyelids are sore and red, you may also have another condition called blepharitis. Blepharitis is a condition that affects the eyelids making them sore and inflamed. If the eyelid glands become blocked, you may have a condition called meibomian gland dysfunction. It is quite common to have a combination of these conditions.

Dry eye doesn't tend to cause serious damage to the eyes, but it can be very uncomfortable. Severe cases do have a risk of causing long-term damage, but fortunately these are rare.

### **Risk factors**

Dry eye is much more common in people over the age of 50. This is often because the glands that make the normal tears, and particularly the oily part of the tears, tend to become less effective as you get older. Also the tears tend to spread across the eye less well with age.

Some general health conditions can cause dry eye as a side effect, such as autoimmune diseases and hormonal changes. The condition is also more common in windy, cold, dry and dusty conditions. If you're concentrating on



as it may both cause the condition and make it worse.

### Symptoms

People with dry eye may get some or all of the following symptoms. A sandy or gritty feeling

- Sore eyes
- Uncomfortable and sometimes painful eyes

An itchina or burning sensation

Short-term blurred vision

Watery eyes, as if you are crying (having watery eyes can mean you are producing poor-quality tears and actually have dry eyes)

### TREATMENT

Most cases of dry eye tend to be a longterm condition, meaning that you'll need ongoing treatment.

There are lots of different types of drops and gels that can help your eyes feel more comfortable. The best ones don't have preservatives in them, or if they do they contain very gentle preservatives, which helps to reduce irritation. They may also contain an ingredient called sodium hyaluronate, known to be very effective in treating the condition.

It's important to use the correct type of drops. The wrong drops are unlikely to cause any harm, but they won't help as much. If your drops aren't working or you're not sure which drops to use, you're a sight test can help determine the best treatment options.







### KERRY AND CORK IN THE FITZGERALD STADIUM MUNSTER FINAL PREVIEW

No offence to Clare or Tipperary, both of whom gave us plenty to do, but they have never been the first counties we think of when the draw for the Munster Championship rolls around. The first meeting that I can trace with certainty between Kerry (represented by Laune Rangers) and Cork (represented by Nemo Rangers) was in 1890. Leather, hair, and skin have all been frequent flyers when the two meet ever since – and neither would want it any other way.

Cork beat us last year, a deadly sting in the tail when it looked like we were just about to scrape across the line. And yeah, the memory stings even now. Not in a begrudging kind of way. They hung in there and that was superbly done by Mark Keane.

But I still say that the dull weather slowed Kerry down a bit and our defensive selection and running tactics suited Cork perfectly. Saying that it was a confluence of circumstances and Kerry got things wrong is not intended to take anything away from Cork's victory, any more than I would Tipperary's subsequent victory of them in the Munster Final.

I watched the Cork Limerick game this year and I saw a couple of their league games. I'll cast caution to the wind once more. I predicted a comfortable Kerry victory last year (without beating Dublin later on). I'm going to double up this year, and if we get through this, I think we should roll the table. I don't for one minute think Dublin have fallen back to anything like the extent people are saying; it's a false narrative to drum up excitement. They have had players step away, but remember how many players fighting to even get on their panel already have All Ireland U20 medals in their hands. That ain't any dry wellspring!

But I'm getting ahead of myself. Like I say, Cork had speed and a real cutting edge up front – Kerry have struggled to contain direct runners in recent years. And people can criticise McCarthy all they want, but he is a very astute manager and shouldn't be underestimated.

Kerry have lost James O'Donoghue, and it looks like Dara Moynihan is out with injury. But Mike Breen and Paudie Clifford are massive additions to last year's panel and it sounds like Tony Brosnan will be knocking on the door for a starting jersey. Peter Keane has choices to make in defence (where does Tadhg Morley fit in? Paul Murphy or Mike Breen? Will there be some juggling?), midfield (Jack Barry must be chomping at the bit and Adrian Spillane has impressed on every appearance, but David Moran and Diarmuid O'Connor are in possession) and as for up front? An abundance



of options ina multiplicity of positions. No, I'm not even going to have a guess.

With just 2500 tickets, I don't expect to get into the ground myself, but that's okay. I can shout advice over long distances while watching on the telly. On home ground, I don't see Cork lightning striking Kerry twice.

### JAMES O'DONOGHUE STEPS BACK FROM INTER-COUNTY

James O'Donoghue first wore the Kerry jersey in championship action, just as his father Diarmuid had worn one before him, on May 14th 2008 against Cork. It wasn't a surprise to anybody. With his startling speed and twisting agility added to his radar-like accuracy, James had been long recognised as an upcoming serious talent. A star-studded minor side eventually bowed out to a Mayo side that included Aidan O'Shea. Three years later the bones of that team were hammered at U21 by Cork. James had already established himself on the senior panel, though, in 2010, making his first appearance off the bench in a National League match against Dublin. To say that he never looked back is an understatement. In

2012 he scored 1-11 in the championship, just behind Colm Cooper and Bryan Sheehan as Kerry bowed down to Dublin by a single, solitary point. In 2013 he scored 3-11, with Kerry bowing out in the semi-final, once again to Dublin. 2014 was his annus mirabilis.

Unfortunately injury has been a real bugbear for James in recent years, so much so that his last appearance for Kerry was in February of 2020. His skills, poise, and intelligence were as strong as ever, but his body just wouldn't bear the strain. He has remained a committed member of the senior panel since but has suffered from a lack of playing time and has decided to step away from the panel and get back to playing for his club, scoring 1-2 in his beloved Killarney Legion's county league win over Kenmare Shamrocks last weekend. There's plenty of football left in James O'Donoghue yet, and I suspect that with Brian Kelly, Jonathon Lyne, and James all back in the fold, Legion will be a team to watch in the club competitions this year. Either way, I will wish the club's smiling assassin all the best going forward.

### **JO JO BARRETT RIP**

Any debate about Kerry's best full back would be a long and interesting one. To me, it would be a three way split between Joe Barrett in the twenties and early thirties, Joe Keohane a decade later, and John O'Keeffe on the Golden Years team. Mike McCarthy and Seamus Moynihan were brilliant there, but it was never the closest role to their hearts, and I respectfully haven't seen anyone of that calibre lock down the position for Kerry ever since.


Jo Jo Barrett, namely son of a namely father, was a good footballer in his own right. All the Barretts were, his brother John stepped in when Kerry were short against Waterford in 1957 (one of our most famous defeats) while reporting for The Kerryman. Jo Jo himself won an All Ireland medal on his very first appearance for Kerry, coming off the bench in the 1962 All Ireland Final against Roscommon and becoming a mainstay in the forwards in the following, fruitless years. A strong republican like his father, his book 'Shadow of a Gunman' is amazingly candid about the War of Independence and the Civil War. Then again, the Barretts were straight talkers always.

Jo Jo fell in to training Stacks after his playing days were done and was their manager in 1977 when they became the first Kerry club to follow in the East Kerry 1971 team's footsteps and win the All Ireland Club Championship.

He enjoyed a successful inter-county managerial career until it came to an abrupt end in an altercation with a referee after his team had come from ten points down to go two up, only tio lose out to last minute penalty. That shouldn't detract from his enormous contribution to Kerry and to the GAA overall and, indeed, society down through the years. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam dílis.

### KERRY MINORS BOW OUT IN DRAMATIC FINISH All Ireland Minor Final: Derry 2-12 Kerry 1-14

So near and yet so far. It stung, no point in pretending otherwise. But over the course, not even of a year but almost two, everyone of these Kerry minors stood up to be counted. Derry took a two point lead. Kerry had an early goal disallowed before Cillian Burke (2), Cian McMahon, and Keith Evans made it 0-4 to 0-2. The Kerry defence was holding up very well against hard-running Derry. They had to be, Derry pressed hard but two great blocks and a post meant that four attacks yielded just a point from a free by Matthew Downey. Kerry very nearly got in on goal but there was a blatant foul - the referee did issue the Derry player a black card during the water break little recompense for such an important chance at a goal. Mind you, we were fairly haunted ourselves - Cian O'Donoghue did brilliantly to get back onto the goal-line and get his body in the way of a certain goal, but he didn't know



much about where the ball was at that speed. That great move deserved a Derry goal, to be fair, lucky escape. William Shine (2) gave Kerry a 0-6 to 0-3 lead and Derry seemed to be creaking somewhat. Mark Doherty scored for Derry and they did have a shot on goal, but Seán Broderick was perfectly positioned. Keith Evans made it 0-7 to 0-3 to Kerry at halftime. Derry had been the bigger side and had asked hard questions of a Kerry defence who passed the tests brilliantly, while Kerry's attacks were that bit fast and more astute. Kerry could (arguably should) have had two goals, while Derry deserved one, but all that was water under the bridge now.

Derry missed a few chances, while Cian McMahon comfortably slotted a free won by Paudie O'Leary, and Oisin Maunsell on the run pointed for Kerry in response to a Derry free. The game was very much about strong runners bursting through tackles on both sides - personally, I hate seeing players take the ball into contact when there are easy passes available but, arrah, I'll show you my medal collection some time and you'll understand that you shouldn't pay much attention to me. Derry brought it back to a goal but Kerry looked the better side now. Then disaster struck. Cillian Burke won a great ball and went on a searing run to bear down on goal...in retrospect, he should have slipped it to his left or hand-passed over the bar, but hindsight gives easy answers. His shot was saved, Kerry swept down the field, and Lachlan Murray fisted to the net. Mark Doherty pointed to put Derry in front but Burke and Maunsell nudged Kerry ahead 0-11 to 1-7. Derry, surging with renewed confidence now (they were great footballers) hit four points on the trot. Jordan Kissane, who impressed greatly on his introduction, very nearly set up a Kerry goal; his pass at full speed was just two inches behind and Kerry were also denied a point by a great block. Seán Broderick calmly nailed a '45 but Kerry were unlucky when the referee erroneously thought a punched overhead pass was thrown (don't misunderstand me; we got lucky on plenty of calls during the game as well) cost us a point. 1-12 to 0-12. Cillian Burke was unlucky to slip after gathering in the Derry square and the defence smothered the chance, but Cian McMahon pointed a free and added a fantastic score from play. One point in it.

The unfortunate Derry keeper had a nightmare as an alert Maurice O'Connell swooped on a disastrous short kick-out...Kerry goal!

Full credit to Derry. They didn't blink for a second. The ball was at halfway by the time av couple of Kerry players stopped celebrating, and in the Kerry square before they could do anything about it. No qualms about the penalty, it was very clear-cut to me and I thought the same when I watched it on television afterwards. Bang!, and Derry back in front.

We had chances to level but couldn't snatch an equaliser, and when the final whistle sounded, Derry had their first minor title since 2002 and their fifth in total.

Hard luck on Kerry. James Costello and co. has taken one team to an All Ireland semi-final and another, in arduous circumstances, to another. I'd trust him with any team. And these players, every last one of them? To have the resilience, the strength of character, the humility to take on advice, the commitment during the long, long hours when nobody was watching.....true, they don't have an All Ireland medal to show for it. But medals never measured any man, and they have legacies from this that will stand to them all the days of their lives. All I have to say is 'thank you'.






### **MEMORIALS | NOVENAS**








Welcome back dear reader "for God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind" (2 Timothy 1:7). We have written about fear many, many times, but the level of fear upon the earth attacking people is at an all time high, fuelled by the bad news media and social media in particular, which has brainwashed people into magnifying the negative, and eliminating anything positive or truthful. This is a toxic situation.


