

BRAVE GARDAÍ SAVE WOMAN FROM SMOKED FILLED HOUSE

The bravery of four Killarney Gardaí was instrumental in saving the life of a woman in her 60's who was found unconscious on the floor of her smoked filled home at Arbutus Grove on Friday night last.

The Gardaí were called to a fire at a residence at 9.20pm and on arrival went to the rear of the property where visible smoke was coming from the kitchen window.

Gardai gained entry by breaking a small window and unlocking the door before they found the woman on the floor in a motionless state.

Garda Tom Moynihan, Garda Martine Desmond, Garda Eddie Meaney and Garda Patrick Finnegan were praised by their Superintendent Flor Murphy who said he had no doubt that their quick thinking and bravery saved the life of the woman. "I am proud to work with these dedicated Gardaí", he said.

The lady was removed to University Hospital Kerry with non life threatening injuries after she was treated at the scene by the Gardaí, two of whom suffered from smoke inhalation.

The gardaí have now recovered and have all resumed duty.

QUALITY ENGINEERING FROM KILLARNEY

An exhibition of quality workmanship and skill from the Liebherr container crane manufacturing plant in Fossa has set the international and local stages alight.

The sheer wonder of managing to get some of the largest ship-to-shore cranes in the world made in Killarney underneath New York and New Jersey bridges with just centimeters to spare has struck a chord not just here, but also " over there", as they say.

RTE has done some great coverage of the operation from Fenit to Cork to Brooklyn and under the Bayonne Bridge where the tide meant the clearance was just over 40 cms in what was a great achievement for the entire team at Liebherr from design to manufacturing to assembly.

I saw for myself the operation of blue and white STS container cranes supplied by Liebherr to the new Cork Harbour just last weekend.

From cab to paint work these are highly technical highly specialised machines.

The three red and white STS machines now in the US port will off load 24 across stacks of containers from the world's largest container vessels.

Warm tributes to the heavy engineering Killarney operation were led by Brendan Cronin at the council meeting on Monday.

Three of the largest cranes in the world, designed and made in Killarney were "a showcase of workmanship and skill", the councillor said.

This was a great achievement for the design team and all the staff at one of the biggest employers in Kerry.

"This was an exhibition of quality workmanship and it is important to recognize that," Cllr Cronin said.

MAKING THE CASE FOR A NEW COURTHOUSE IN KILLARNEY

The prospect at last of a new, modern, county courthouse is good news for the county and Tralee after councillors voted to sell a half acre site to the Courts Service.

Mind you, I have doubts about the location in the Island of Geese. And under half an acre seems hardly large enough for a 22 million euro modern "courts complex".

But the state of Killarney courthouse is also of concern. "The Tralee courthouse is not fit for purpose, but neither is the one in Killarney!" Cllr Johnny Healy-Rae said grasping the opportunity to make the "case" for Killarney's before members of the Kerry Law Society and the Kerry Bar Society who attended the meeting.

There has been a long and unsuccessful campaign to improve the Killarney Courthouse and fit it with facilities for a civilised, let alone a modern age.

The troubled history of courthouses in Kerry was touched on briefly when Sinn Fein councillor Cathal Foley referred to the imperial past.



A new courthouse is needed in Killarney

The 1830s Tralee building was built "when Victoria was a teenager". This was when the British were at the height of their power and people from Kerry were sentenced to deportation to Australia for stealing livestock and food, he reminded us.

Amid the very real prospect that the county courthouse would be taken out of Tralee altogether (the same ClIr Foley said "to Killarney, God forbid!") councillors voted by clear majority to sell the site for the new complex to remain in Tralee.

There is though a very real prospect the listed court building in Tralee will now become derelict.

I was reminded of the suggestion in this column to locate the new county courts complex on the Killarney bypass alongside our own empty listed building St Finan's where there is plenty of parking for judges and barristers and witness cars.

Could we perhaps relocate the Killarney court to Finan's ? Take the unsightly prison vans and such out of the town altogether while at the same time provide civilised settings for criminal, civil and family law and coroners courts with plenty of consultation and press facilities, not to mention toilets?

It may be time to turn the historic Killarney courthouse into the natural theatre it is anyway. We need to get our Kerry TDs and lawyers working on this for Killarney.

NEED FOR LOCAL CONNECTION TO BE RECOGNISED IN TOWN HOUSING ALLOCATION TOO

There was a contentious debate about social housing allocations at this week's council meeting in Tralee and again in Dingle. Historically councillors knew who was allocated houses.

But they are now being kept in the dark, by the council and the housing agencies and they don't know who is coming to live in their areas. Nor are there represtations for constituents being replied to.

Local connection - living in a place for generations - has no bearing on the allocation of council housing in towns, the meeting was told.

Local "indigenous" people born and bred in the area and waiting for years for housing should

have priority on social housing allocations in Kerry and at the very least local elected representatives should be briefed on who was being allocated houses, Cllr Michael O'Shea insisted.

Some 28 houses, built by approved housing body Clúid were recently allocated in Milltown Co Kerry.

"I don't think any of my local people got these houses," ClIr Michael O'Shea said. A month later he still does not know. And he wanted to know who got the houses and how long were they on the waiting list.

The Fianna Fail councillor asked the council to be briefed on allocations and also:

"that you look at people indigindous to the area who are born and bred in the area," .

People in Dingle, Annascaul, Lispole, the same municipal district as Milltown were on the housing waiting lists for 17 and 18 years.

"And I can't see why they weren't offered accommodation in Milltown as we are the one MD," he said.

It was "bad policy" by the council to allow Clúid and other bodies to give out houses "and nobody knows who got them," Independent councillor Charlie Farrelly said.

The rate of refusals would be far less were the allocations to be discussed in advance with local representatives, Cllr Bobby O'Connell FG said.

But senior management said who gets the houses is determined by needs policy alone.

"Who we give the houses to is determined by housing needs policy and that is the way it should be," Chief Executive of Kerry County Council Moira Murrell said.

It was not possible under GDPR rules (EU led privacy data protection law) to discuss the allocations, she also said.

Cllr Marie Moloney, said there had been four housing officers in the three years since she was elected in Killarney and this was "unacceptable".

My question is this: there is a weighing for local connection when it comes to rural housing in planning policies. People with a rural connection, living in a locality with generations or closely related to people there are recognised in the planning process. Why can't there be a similar weighing for Killarney people, Milltown people etc when it comes to who gets urban social housing whether it is council or Clúid who builds them?

A BILLION REASONS. John McShain, yes! I'm still beating that drum again... a man who bequeathed a 'billion euros in today's money worth of land, lakes and historic buildings to the town of Killarney.

To those who are unfamiliar with the history, here is a brief synopsis. In 1885 John McShain Sr emigrated from Ireland to Philadelphia and worked for his uncle in the building trade. Three short years later he set up his own contracting firm. John McShain Jnr, one of four children, who was destined for a career in the legal profession until his father's illness and premature death in 1919 forced him to transfer from Georgetown College in Washington to St. Joseph's College in Philadelphia. On his deathbed in 1919, his father asked John to go into the building business. John McShain built what would become one of the largest construction firms in the United States, operating from his main office in Philadelphia, and from satellite offices in Washington, DC, Baltimore, MD, and Trenton, NJ. He rubbed shoulders with presidents, the American elite and was known as "The Man Who Built Washington". He was responsible for building The Jefferson Memorial, The Department of State, Georgetown University Hospital, National Naval Medical Centre, The Washington Post building, General Accounting Office, The Bureau of Internal Revenue Building, Department of Agriculture, Dupont Circle Underpass, The National Airport Washington, The National Institute of Health, Arlington Towers, The General Motors Car Plant, Franklin D Roosevelt Presidential Library, LaSalle College, Rosemount College, St Joseph's College, Mt. Alto Hospital, US Naval Hospital, Fitzgerald Mercy Hospital, Philadelphia International Airport, Pennsylvania Court House, The Veterans Hospital, Board of Education Building, Power Plants, Department Stores, Colleges and High Schools, Churches and Convents and Banks all over America, just too many to mention. Notably in 1949-52 he rebuilt the White House and 1942, he completed the Pentagon, the largest office building in the world, at a contract price of \$75 million, representing over \$1 billion in today's currency. Ok, so he was an Irish American industrial titan so what does that have to do with

Killarney?

We are all familiar with the famous phrase and song title 'How can you buy Killarney' well read on because he did exactly that. In 1957 John McShain was part of a syndicate that purchased 8,300-acre of the Earls of Kenmare estate in Killarney from Mrs Beatrice Grosvenor, niece of the 7th Earl of Kenmare. The estate also included Killarney House, the ruins of Ross Castle, Glena Mountain, and two of the lakes and islands including Innisfallen Island, the site of a famous early Christian monastery. The proposed plans were to turn what we know as the 'park' today into a playground for rich Americans, golf courses, swimming pools and holiday homes, all to be closed off from the public. He fell in love with Killarney, and its people and in late 1959, John McShain bought out his partners and became the sole owner of a large portion of modern-day Killarney. He and wife Mary made it their home for the rest of their life. Their only daughter, Sr Pauline or Polly, had entered the religious orders in Pennsylvania but visited regularly.

In 1979, McShain effectively gifted some 8,000 acres of woodland, mountain and lake to the State. For a nominal sum, on condition, they formed part of the national park in perpetuity. What is now the heartland of the Killarney National Park? Unbeknown to many he also sold plots to some locals for the princely sum of just one pound. John and Mary McShain were well known for their generosity, they established a charitable foundation in 1948 with a particular interest in assisting Catholic and other cultural institutions and projects. Over the course of 52 years, many colleges, community organizations and arts-related programs benefited from John McShain Charities, Inc. John McShain was inducted into the Irish American Hall of fame. In the White House, there is a descriptive plaque to him on the ground floor! Mary McShain was awarded a Lady of the Grand Cross of the Holy Sepulchre and a Dame of Malta and was also the recipient in 1976 of the highest honour the Vatican bestows on a laywoman - the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice Cross. In 1977, she was twice presented with honorary doctorates: La Salle University, Doctor of Laws, and from Chestnut

Hill College and Rosemount College, Doctor of Humane Letters.

When the President of Ireland, Sean T. O'Kelly, made an official visit to America in 1959, President Dwight D. Eisenhower invited John and Mary McShain to attend the state dinner at the White House to be given in his honor. President Eisenhower asked John McShain to be his official host. Subsequently, he and Mary had often been guests of the O'Kellys at Aras an Uactaráin and likewise they busted Killarney house. On those occasions, John had encouraged his goodwill trips to America. Throughout Sean T's visit to Philadelphia, it was evident that his friendliness and light hearted spirit won the hearts of everyone who saw him. Through his Presidential connects John McShain was instrumental in paving the way for John f Kennedy to Ireland.

Killarney House and gardens remained their lifelong home, John McShain died in 1989; his wife Mary occurred in 1998 and they willed that Killarney House and lands would also become the property of the Irish State. Accepting this gift, the Irish officials agreed to preserve Killarney House & Gardens in perpetuity and incorporated them into the Killarney National Park.

Today Killarney is now known as the town in the Park, how true, in fact, it is one of the largest urban parks in the world. Its significance is incalculable in today's money, but let's try. A study of the economic impact of tourism on Killarney has found that the industry is worth over €400m to the town annually and directly employs more than 3,000 people. As McShains gift, makes up a substantial part of Killarney's amenities and attractions, it would be fair to say he is largely responsible for its success.... or even partly. I'd say that would be a fair argument to make.

On a daily basis, locals and tourists alike stroll the tree-lined walks that meander through the National Park from the demesne to the 15thcentury fortress of the O'Donoghues' Ross Castle. The woodlands that stretch from the town to the lakes team with wildlife. We hold high on our list of local treasures the Middle and Lower lakes, both of which the McShains bestowed on us, Browne island and legendary Innisfallen Island and its historic Monastery. John McShain's gift is in daily use, but nowhere of prominence do I see a tribute. In many travels abroad I have witnessed museums dedicated, statutes in town squares, and treelined boulevards named to honour great philanthropists. The McShains have received the highest honours from around the world, with schools and college buildings in their name.

Today he is barely mentioned, not so much as a park bench is dedicated to this man. John McShain and his wife deserve more from Killarney. There is a half-hearted exhibition of photos in Killarney house (I have more on McShain in my own home) and no mention of him on the information signage in the park. Valentine Browne, Earl of Kenmare is mentioned more, note that he was here for profit, he was after all a capitalist, though remembered fondly by historians he spent most of his time in parliament and London homes. The Kenmare family eventually sold off the estate. In my humble opinion he wouldn't fit to polish John McShains shoes, he was a philanthropist and a true friend to Killarney. When the new slip road was named Mission road I felt then Killarney had missed an opportunity after it was built on McShain land. Killarney has honoured many people in different ways over the years but none can equal McShains contribution, none!

My goal is simple, a plaque won't do, a knight of Innisfallen won't cut it, a naming of something or other, please... I'm campaigning for a statue and information to be situated somewhere within the town. Business owners, particularly tourism related, some generational, have done well over the years from the McShains gift they should now come together and give this man and his family the recognition they so richly deserve. It's the gift that keeps on giving.

Think about what it would be like without Ross Castle, Killarney House, The Demesne, Innisfallen Island, the lakes ... it's unthinkable. Picture a map without his gifted lands. I ask the question of what Killarney would be if it had a private estate surrounding it rather than a public national park. I ask what If access to the lake was prohibited, entry to historic buildings was denied. The town in the park would just be a town and the nearest attraction would be Muckross House and Gardens. Which is named The Bourne Vincent Memorial Park and rightly so, as they gifted their lands to the state. We are unique in Ireland as so many estates were broken up and sold off for profit. I'm only realising now more and more how much of an internationally respected figure McShain was. Killarney hasn't a clue... I'm sorry but it's a badge of shame at this stage. Even today Killarney House is hidden away! Even as a commercial venture, to bring more tourism to the town, if they took down the wall near the haha and opened it up more, a little paved garden, fly the American and Irish flags side by side with a large statue of the man, for all to see from the road, information plaques of his deeds and gift. If anything surely Killarney could see the commercial value of that connection if anything? An unveiling could reignite and foster the Irish/American links to this great man and our town.

I am but one man beating this drum, and I'd say something if it were the rambling of an over enthusiastic local historian but 1000s of locals are firmly behind me. So be it the OPW, trustees, Councillors or the business community please hear this call and act! This man actually bought Killarney and then gave it right back to the people!

9,588 CAO APPLICANTS DECLINE THEIR **COLLEGE OFFER** IN ROUND ONE AS FINANCIAL DIFFICULTIES AND LACK OF ACCOMMODATION HIT HARD By Billy Ryle



CAO R1 ACCEPTANCE

EXPENSIVE

Of the 57,296 CAO applicants who were offered a college course in Round One, 47,708 accepted their offer – 41,990 at Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) and 5,718 at Level 7/6 (Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates). A substantial number of 9,588, or 17% or 1 in every 6, declined the offer of a college course. While there are a variety of reasons why applicants decline CAO offers, any student who was forced to defer or refuse a CAO offer due to lack of finance and/or accommodation must be absolutely devastated.

PROCRASTINATION

Minister Harris has been sabre-rattling during the past few weeks about easing the financial burden for students by considerably reducing or even abolishing the €3000 student contribution and intervening in the exorbitant rental costs to students. Alas, it has all come to nought and the procrastination of previous years is evident again this year.

ABOLITION

The 'student contribution' has its origins in the abolition of third level tuition fees in 1995, which was widely welcomed by hard working parents struggling to finance their children's third level education. The PAYE sector, in particular, was a direct beneficiary of the initiative, as the vast majority of families in that sector were excluded from the Higher Education Grants Scheme, now called Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI), Maintenance costs still had to be met of course but, at least, the financial burden of fees had been removed. STUDENT CONTRIBUTION

Almost immediately, the third level sector introduced a nominal 'student levy' for registration, exams and student services. Regrettably, substantial increases in the services charge, now called 'student contribution,' since 1996 have seen it rise to a prohibitive €3000 per annum. The student contribution is unjustifiable. It's a tuition fee by any other name and should be immediately abolished.

Third level education is very expensive. Many college students have to work part-time or depend on their parents to make ends meet. Thousands of students, who are ineligible for funding due to punitive means testing of the family income, must come up with about €12,000 annually if they are living away from home or about €4000 if living at home. The student contribution of €3000 must also be paid.

SUSI

In Budget 2022. the Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI) grant for all eligible third level students was increased by €200 from this year. In the context of the cost of living it's a paltry increase, which has been surpassed by inflation. The gross income threshold for grant eligibility has been increased by €1,000, ensuring more students should qualify for some level of maintenance. The distance from home to college for the higher grant has been reduced from 45km to 30km. This means more students who are living away from home or travelling to college will gualify for the higher grant. About 60,000 students are eligible for some level of maintenance grants ranging from €305 to €3025 Now their payments will increase by €200.

MAXIMUM

The Budget changes mean that the maximum standard maintenance grant payable to students whose college is 30km or more from their homes will increase from €3025 to €3225. For students who live less than 30km from their college, the standard maximum grant goes up from €1215 to €1415. The gross annual income levels for grant eligibility increases by €1000 from €39,875 to €40,875. There is also a special maintenance grant for applicants whose annual gross income is less than €24,500. That payment increases from €5915 and €2375 to €6115 and €2575, respectively.

INFLATION

Students who qualify for maintenance grants this year will benefit from the nominal increase in grant levels. Unfortunately, the increase has been overtaken by inflation. In the current economic climate, the abolition of the student contribution of €3000 and a substantial increase in the SUSI maintenance grant should now be an immediate priority.







28 groups banded together to host cleanups on the beaches in the Kingdom, removing an estimated 3.5 tonnes of litter. Among these groups were Maharees Conservation Association, Littor Strand Clean Coasts Group, Fenit National School, Rinn Rua Beach Watch and other groups, individuals, households and businesses. These groups tackled litter in different locations such as Inch Beach, Castlegregory, Littor Strand, Fenit, Banna, Tralee, Ventry and more.

The Big Beach Clean is an annual call to action that runs as part of the International Coastal

Cleanup (ICC), operated internationally by Ocean Conservancy and invites communities and volunteers around the country to remove litter from around the Irish coast after the end of the bathing season.

Once more, volunteers were asked to join the call to action, no matter how far from the coast. Statistics show that the number one cause of marine litter is litter dropped in towns and cities and getting involved in the Big Beach Clean has been a way for residents of non-coastal counties to help prevent litter entering our waterways tackle the problem at its source.

This year, a record number of over 500 cleanups were organised by volunteers who removed over 63 tonnes of litter nationwide.

Three Liebherr ship to shore container cranes have arrived at Maher Terminals LCC, in the Port of New York and New Jersey. The cranes, on board a specialist vessel, the Biglift Baffin arrived on Saturday 10th September after passing under both the Verrazzano-Narrows Bridge and the Bayonne Bridge.

The cranes were designed and manufactured at Liebherr Container Cranes Ltd. in Killarney and built in Cobh. The partly assembled cranes were then shipped from Cobh to the USA where they arrived at Sandy Hook anchor point on the 5th September. The vessel dropped anchor whilst preparations for crossing under both the Verrazzano-Narrows Bridge and the Bayonne Bridge were made. In order to safely pass under the bridges, tidal conditions had to be optimum. The low tide at approx. 3pm on the 10th of September would give sufficient clearance for the vessel and partly assembled cranes to pass.

Liebherr engineers boarded the vessel and the booms on the cranes were lowered. Vessel ballast tanks were filled to lower the vessel position in the water, further reducing the height of the cranes above sea level. The vessel raised anchor on the 10th of September and made good progress, passing under the taller Verrazzano-Narrows Bridge, before making its

way toward the Bayonne Bridge. The vessel approached the Bayonne bridge at 15:12 local time and under the expert supervision of the local harbour pilots, had cleared the bridge by 15:19. It was a tight squeeze, with water levels slightly higher than forecast, but well within planned expectations, with the vessel and cranes safely navigating under the bridge with less than 60 cm to spare.

The vessel docked at Maher terminals shortly after. Unloading will take place over the coming days and is expected to be completed this weekend. The cranes will then be fully assembled and commissioned before entering service in the coming months

TÁNAISTE GOES ON WHISTLE STOP TOUR OF KERRY

On Friday last the Tánaiste Leo Varadkar touched down in Kerry Airport for a whistle stop tour of county Kerry. Accompanied by the Deputy Government Chief Whip T.D. Brendan Griffin the Tánaiste visited Kerry Technology Park and JRI America among other venues. Later that evening Leo Varadkar met with some business and farming representatives in Killarney who were given the opportunity to voice their concerns and aspirations ahead of budget 2023.

The hospitality sector was well represented on the night by Pat O'Leary chair of the Kerry Tourism Industry Federation, Bernadette Randles Irish Hotel Federation President and many of Killarney's best known hoteliers. Business representatives from Tralee and Castleisland Chamber Alliance were also in attendance. The format was such that the floor was opened to all attendees, firstly the Tánaiste listened to all contributions and opinions shared by the audience after which he addressed the issues en masse. Kerrys housing crisis, inheritance tax, rising energy costs, complexity of energy grants for businesses, hospitality Vat rate, business rates and lack of FDI in Kerry all came to the fore. From a hospitality point of view some speakers were at pains to explain that contrary to popular opinion price gouging does not exist in the hospitality sector in Killarney and indeed some fantastic value and top class customer facilities and service prevail throughout the county. Acknowledgement was given to the government for the supports that the hospitality sector in particular received during covid but it was stressed that similar supports will be required to offset in some way the rising cost of doing business currently. An IFA representitive in attendance questioned the unrealistic target being put on farmers to reduce their emissions by 25%.

In response the Tánaiste said 'In terms of hotels, tourism and maintaining competitiveness I can confirm that the 9% Vat rate will last until at least the end of February 2023'. He advised the hospitality sector to continue making the case for a reduced vat rate as it is 'certainly a case well made'. He agreed price gouging is happening in a very small number of hotels but feels that it is a small minority offering their last few rooms at a very high price, which is in his opinion very bad business practice.

In relation to energy grants, he said 'they probably should be made more user friendly. Public service schemes are designed as far as possible in a way so that they cannot be abused, with lots of checks and controls as it is taxpayers money that is being spent. We can go too far as well the schemes should be looked at'.

In relation to the 25% reduction in emissions for farmers the Tánaiste said 'the national average is 51% farmers are being asked for less than any other sector of society'. IFA said farmers are likely to achieve 16-18% by 2030 to which Mr. Varadkar said 'that would be a phenomenal achievement. The most important thing we can all do is to work together to achieve what can be achieved. There isn't going to be a punishment if targets are not met. Farmers are not going to be forced to reduce herd numbers. If we don't meet our transport targets we are not going to start confiscating peoples cars... it may be the case as time goes by, that new technologies will help us'.

In relation to inheritance tax Mr. Varadkar confirmed that government will not be increasing the tax and he said he is in favour of reducing inheritance tax but cannot promise anything at this stage.

In relation to more FDI companies setting up outside Dublin the Tánaiste said 50% of the jobs announced by IDA in the last few years have been outside Dublin. Government cannot offer grants to foreign investors to set up in Dublin, Cork or wealthy areas. Sometimes companies will just go where they want to go. Their requirement may be a major airport and a wide variety of universities, a requirement which Dublin meets. It is better that a company sets up in Dublin rather than be lost to the country altogether.

He said 'IDA are concentrating on areas outside Dublin for investment some places such as Kilkenny and Waterford have done well... quite frankly Kerry hasn't but this should change with improved infrastructure and broadband. We are building a second advance factory in Kerry Technology Park and possibly one in Killarney'.

Mr Varadkar thanked the attendees for their advice and contributions and said that he had been given a few ideas to think about and a few to follow up on.

All we can all do now is wait, for Budget 2023 to be announced on September 27th 2022 and hope it is a favourable budget for all of us.

Scotts Lakers St Pauls will start the InsureMyVan. ie Men's Division 1 Basketball season with a difficult yet tasty looking tie against Limerick Sports Eagles at the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre on Saturday October 1st. That will be one of three home games they will have in the month of October with the other Limerick side , the Celtics, visiting Killarney on Saturday October 22nd and Cork side Fr Matthews coming over the county bounds on Sunday October 30th. The sole road road trip in the month is to face the SETU Waterford Vikings in game 2 on Saturday October 8th.

The Lakers were left to rue a slow start to last season when wins were hard to come by and yet by the season's end they were only within one basket of a playoff place. With that experience still fresh in their memory banks they will be determined to make full use of the opening month and get their season up and running as quickly as possible. Having a full squad was a luxury not available in that time as well as playing their first four games away from home due to the use of the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre as a Covid Vaccine centre. COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP GROUP ONE

Kenmare Shamrocks 1-14 St. Kierans 1-11 Last week Stephen O'Brien was the star of the show. This week it was Seán O'Shea who took the plaudits. His dead ball accuracy is already up there with the all-time greats of the game; he finished in double figures here. St. Kierans, with Paul Walsh in impressive form himself, were one of the teams that I thought could well be in contention in the latter stages this year. I thought the long playing schedule would deplete their playing resources - divisional teams by definition have bigger panels available. There certainly are a lot of good players picking up or dealing with injuries, but the very high quality of the Senior Club Championship seems to have honed the edges of the club sides. To be honest, the County Championship has not hit the heights of the club championships so far in terms of quality or real excitement.

This was a decent game, though. St. Kierans led by a point at half-time, 1-6 to 0-8, after Paul Walsh snapped up a soft enough goal chance early on. Eddie Horan made a good start but picked up two yellow cards in quick succession and his departure was significant.

The third quarter opened with a goal by Kenmare midfielder David Hallissey. James Walsh kicked two frees to close the gap and Philip O'Connor picked off two fine points to give St. Kierans a two point lead. Seán O'Shea replied and it was level again with ten minutes left. However, Kenmare finished very strongly with points from O'Shea, Kevin O'Sullivan, and Shane O'Sullivan.

St. Kierans host Shannon Rangers in a dead rubber next weekend, while Kenmare host Dr. Crokes knowing that the winners will top the group.

Dr. Crokes 2-19 Shannon Rangers 1-11

I thought that the loss of county stars Gavin White and Micheál Burns and it was asking a lot for all of their new championship players to gel that quickly as a unit. I also thought that Shannon Rangers, who at one point were struggling to fill a panel for last weekend, would struggle badly.

I was wrong on both counts. Shannon Rangers put up a stern test here, with the likes of Shane Enright, Robert Stack, and Jack Kennelly leading the way. Straight up, I am delighted for them – that's a proud footballing area and I like that they bow out with their heads high.

They were beaten by a better team, and that team would, could, and might - only might, let's not get carried away beat better teams with this kind of performance. Neil O'Shea is probably the most impressive County Championship newcomer out there at the moment. Michael Potts is playing the kind of football that had him on the county radar before. Fionn Fitzgerald and Mark Cooper go about their work quietly but very efficiently. Up front they have absolute diamonds in Tony Brosnan and Cian McMahon, but the regular switch of Mark O'Shea from midfield and Tom Doyle out is very effective. O'Shea is under scrutiny by the Kerry management at the moment, and with very good reason. Jason Foley started on fellow county star Brosnan, but soon switched to O'Shea. Cian McMahon opened the scoring, won two frees, and then hit a great goal. Shannon Rangers were reliant on sharpshooting Jack Kennelly to stay in touch. They trailed by 1-7 to 0-6 at the break, John Payne scoring the last point of the half when Crokes were down a man to a black card. Tony Brosnan put on a scoring show in the second half, capped by a stunning goal, really spectacular. In truth, Shannon Rangers could thank their superb keeper Owen Tydings for a series of great saves.

GROUP TWO East Kerry 0-14 Spa 0-9

East Kerry more or less ran riot against Kerins O'Rahillys last week, while Spa coughed up four goals in a disappointing display against Dingle (albeit missing six regular starters). People were expecting one-way rush hour here, to be honest. Instead, it was more like the traffic at the infamous Paris roundabout – very fast, completely unpredictable, and with plenty of bumps and bangs along the way (both Dara Moynihan and James O'Donoghue were redcarded in the second half, Moynihan just after being substituted with what looked like a recurrence of injury). Spa played on the back foot, and a defensive strategy was exactly right - the likes of Ruairi Murphy, Paudie Clifford, and James O'Donoghue will eat you alive otherwise. East Kerry led by 0-6 to 0-3 at half-time, and Spa would have had a bigger tally if they had been a bit more clinical with their chances. Anyone who thought that East Kerry were hiding their searchlights under bushels was soon disabused of the notion as they still laboured for scores. leading by 0-8 to 0-5 coming up to the fourth quarter. One of their chief tormentors was Liam Kearney in midfield with another powerful display. Mind you, East Kerry had a heat-seeking missile in reserve in one David Clifford, and he boomed over a monster point from either side on his introduction. Just in case anybody hasn't noticed, this lad is worth watching. Points from Cian Tobin and Eoghan Cronin brought Spa within a goal, and they very nearly got in for one (both keepers were busy but impressive), when David Spillane's rocket was just millimetres wide.

The manner of this defeat will actually give Spa a big boost after the deflation of their opening game. I don't think it'll hurt East Kerry all that much, to be honest. A bit of a fright will ground them nicely. I know the panel depth they have and of course they are overall favourites, but the hype has, frankly, begun reaching a level that is nigh on distasteful to me. Remember America's Dream Team at the '92 Olympics? This isn't that.

East Kerry travel to Dingle next week with both sides already through to the quarterfinals. With no home venue guaranteed for the group winners, it's basically a dead rubber. Spa host Rahillys in a repeat of that Senior Club Semi-Final that Rahillys won in controversial circumstances by a point in extra-time, but the two clubs actually get on well and I very much doubt if it will have any bearing on this one.

Dingle 3-16 Kerins O'Rahillys 0-10

Dingle on their home ground are never easy, and Rahillys can point to the absence of the likes of Tommy Walsh, Cormacc Coffey, and

Donagh Buckley, but in truth they left far too much behind them, while Dingle have now scored seven goals in two games. Paul Geaney has very much been the linchpin of their attack, while Barry O'Sullivan links midfield and attack and Mikey Geaney is the main director of operations from deep. It works. Geaney has been as ublime target-man this year for them, without necessarily clocking up huge totals. He had 1-1 on the board straight away, the goal coughed up rather carelessly. By half-time Dingle were already well clear, 1-9 to 0-4, and there was only going to be one end in sight. Rahillys battled bravely, but they were outclassed, with only David Moran, Gain O'Brien, and sharpshooter Jack Savage really competitive. Paul Geaney effectively clinched it with his second goal after 35 minutes and Barry O'Sullivan blasted home a rocket to the net late on. Rahillys will be disappointed at losing two games fairly comprehensively, but in fairness were missing some very big guns in both. Their last game, away to Spa, is again a dead rubber. Dingle are looking like a serious side - those are very good results against decent opposition, and the return of Dylan Geaney is another shot in the arm.

They face East Kerry next weekend and, with both sides already through, have a free shot to lay down a big marker if they go all-out for it (both sides may, of course, opt to rest a few players).

GROUP THREE Mid Kerry 0-20 Na Gaeil 0-16

Na Gaeil are out of the reckoning for the latter stages, but they have shown in their first year at this level that they deserve to be there. Mid Kerry, beaten finalists two years ago, are real contenders, though, and showed why with their greater firepower. Eanna O'Connor is a big addition to their scoring power, while Liam Carey is getting back to his formidable best. Seán O'Brien, another that Kerry management are interested in (he's a brilliant fielder and Kerry could be thin enough in midfield next year) and Colin McGillicuddy are a good midfield pairing, although they did give second best on this occasion to Jack Barry and Diarmuid O'Connor. David Mangan impressed in defence.

It was a close game throughout. Na Gaeil showed greater firepower than against Austin Stacks, even if the long distance place kicking of Devon Burns is a key weapon in their armoury. Éanna O'Connor had 0-8 and Liam Carey had 0-4. Jack O'Connor came off the bench for two second half points.

I suspect that Mid Kerry have yet to really go

hell for leather, but they seem to be building a nice head of steam.

Their game against Stacks is yet another dead rubber, I'm afraid, and that's really a problem in the format that will need addressing. Funny enough, I think that momentum is key for both of those teams and that will be a good game.

Austin Stacks 2-13 West Kerry 1-8

It wasn't as easy as the score-line makes it look, but it was never a cakewalk either. In fact, a goal on twenty minutes from Killian Falvey put West Kerry ahead by 1-3 to 0-5, but goals from Conor Horan and dual star Michael O'Gara gave Austin Stacks a 2-7 to 1-3 half-time lead. West Kerry were playing well, especially their big men around the middle, but just couldn't get enough shots on target. The likes of Killian Falvey, Thomas O'Donnell, and Cian O'Grady are only going to get better - and they are already very good.

The loss of Joe O'Connor has understandably framed the narrative around the reigning champions. Brendan O'Sullivan came off in this one. But I wouldn't be afraid of throwing either Conor Horan or Armin Heinrich into midfield (I remain convinced that they would have won Tralee CBS' first ever Hogan Cup if the competition had reached its closing stages. Take a look at the subs that came on the last day – Seán Quilter, Ronan Shanahan, Dylan Casey, Barry Shanahan, and Kieran Donaghy. That's no bad deck to be drawing from!

West Kerry host Na Gaeil in the final game. Again, the result makes no material difference to either side.

GROUP FOUR

Feale Rangers 2-13 South Kerry 0-13

Feale Rangers have been the story of the championship so far. They have mostly departed the championship without leaving too many ripples on the water in recent years. This year, though, that win over St. Brendans and the unified manner of their play sent out a message. I wasn't sure of how to rate that victory - I had St. Brendans as favourites for that one, but we all know that they couldn't be the same side without the Na Gaeil contingent. But two goals to spare over South Kerry? There's no question marks at all about that one. That's a good South Kerry outfit, even if not the force of old, and they put up a tremendous battle. In fact they were well on top early on, leading by 0-5 to 0-1. Feale Ranger kicked into gear and levelled things, but two frees nudged South Kerry back in front. Just before

half-time, though, Conor O'Keeffe goaled and Martin Stack pointed (he kicked 0-7 this week he's a good footballer anyway but has been revelatory in the county championship – this is the kind of thing that justifies divisional teams). Feale Rangers led by 1-6 to 0-7 at the break and an early second half goal by David Keane and two more points from Stack meant that Feale Rangers had a strong cushion as they faced into a still very competitive remainder of the second half. Niall Collins and Barry O'Mahony excelled for the winners, while Darragh O'Sullivan and Daniel Daly shared 10 points between them and Graham O'Sullivan gave it everything at midfield for South Kerry.

Templenoe 3-7 St. Brendans 1-12

Templenoe have been giant-killers over the past two years - in fact, ever since they lifted a club All Ireland in Croke Park. They were without Gavin Crowley for most of this one and Adrian Spillane was unusually subdued in midfield - both had picked up injuries last week. However, that's not taking away from an excellent St. Brendans's side who could well have taken something out of this game - and it would not have been undeserved. Templenoe trailed by 0-5 to 0-3 at half-time but effectively put the game to bed with a scoring burst that included two Stephen O'Sullivan goals. St. Brendans never gave up, and in fact a late goal by Joe Lenihan could have put the cat among the pigeons, but Templenoe stayed calm. Aidan Crowley swung over two great frees from long distance – he has a habit of nailing the big ones under pressure. Rob Monaghan really caught the eye around the middle for St. Brendans.

Stay with me for this one, because the permutations are a bit complicated. Feale Rangers (4 points) are playing Templenoe (3 points). South Kerry (1 point) are playing St. Brendans (0 points)

Feale Rangers are guaranteed to at least qualify in second place if they lose. In that scenario, Templenoe would top the group with five points. If St. Brendans beat South Kerry, then it won't matter because Feale Rangers and Templenoe would go through anyway. But if Templenoe lose and South Kerry win, then they would both have three points and it would come down to scoring difference (the head-to-head is even after they drew in the opening round). Templenoe have a seven point advantage in that regard.

It depended on a fairly specific set of results and an eight point swing on scoring difference. It's not a dead rubber, but I wouldn't say there's all that much bounce about it either! Look, I've never been one for over-thinking these things. Go out and win your own game as best you can and worry about the rest afterwards if at all.

DR. CROKES RAISE MOLYNEAUX CUP Molyneaux Cup Final: Dr. Crokes 3-10 Glenflesk 1-12

Dr. Crokes retained the Andy Molyneaux Cup last Saturday in a sunny Spa Field, but only after a cracking contest where both clubs served up senior quality football. Dr. Crokes had a real ace in the pack up front in big Paul Clarke, who proved a deadly target-man from start to finish, adroitly slotting over the opening three points. Straight from the kick-out Dr. Crokes intercepted and Seán McGann drilled a superb finish past a hapless Jack O'Donoghue to make it 1-3 to 0-0. Gavin Kelly opened Glenflesk's account in the 13th minute. John Kelliher added one of the best points of the game, and the always-dangerous Luke Crowley made it 1-3 to 0-3. However, Crokes landed a brilliant counter-punch as Clarke rose high to knock down to the waiting Chris Doncel, and the net danced again..

Glenflesk responded to that body blow in superb style as they took over. Luke Crowley, Gavin Kelly, and Tommy Bowler all picked off points in quick succession. A foul on the outstanding Crowley saw Danny Lucey split the posts just after his introduction. They temporarily lost Tommy Bowler to a black card, though, and that turned the tide again, Liam Kelliher supplying Paul Clarke for goal number three. Just before half-time the impressive Harry Potts sent a rocket just barely over the crossbar.

Half-time Dr. Crokes 3-4 Glenflesk 0-7 Alan O'Sullivan opened the second half with a superb score for Dr. Crokes from distance. However, Glenflesk attacked at pace again and a foul on Michael O'Shea saw Danny Lucey step up to the penalty spot and drill home. Dr. Crokes followed up with two goal chances of their own, Cian Lynch brilliantly blocking Paul Clarke's effort and Jack O'Donoghue superbly saving Cillian Fitzgerald's close-range effort. Cian O'Neill won and pointed a free, but Tommy Bowler replied in kind.

Harry Potts and Chris Doncel clipped over points. point, with Chris Doncel snapping over another to make it 3-9 to 1-8. Tommy Bowler swung over a difficult free. Luke Crowley, dangerous any time the ball came near him, kicked two good points. Gavin Kelly added another, and suddenly there was just a goal between the sides, and Glenflesk had all the momentum. Dr. Crokes held firm, though. Paul Clarke had a chance to seal it, but his shot hit the woodwork and went wide. Glenflesk had one last foray, but Crokes' defence again held firm and a foul on Padraic Looney saw Clarke send over to seal a very impressive victory against a Glenflesk team who had given them nothing easily.

The first ten minutes were fairly even but once Firies aligned their shooting boots, they began to pull away. A goal from James Horgan saw them lead 1-9 to 0-3 at half-time. Listry did get the opening point of the second half, but were rocked on their heels by a great goal from Dylan O'Callaghan, with Conall Murphy adding a third green flag close to the finish. Shane O'Sullivan, Dan O'Shea, Ger Fitzgerald, Seán Cooper, Ian Cronin, and James Horgan all impressed for the victors.

> KERRY CUP FINAL Cordal 3-10 Clounmacon 0-8

Cordal became the winners of the inaugural

Kerry Cup after a convincing victory over a brave Clounmacon side. They led by 1-7 to 0-3, with the excellent Mike Flynn picking off 1-2 overall. Flynn and Pa Naughton were outstanding for the winners, who also had impressive displays from Pádraig O'Connell (0-2), Oisín Nolan (0-2), Jonathon O'Donnell (0-2), David O'Connor (0-1), Redmond O'Conor (0-1), Thomas Brosnan, and Matthew Horgan.

MCELLIGOTT CUP Killarney Legion 2-12 Fossa 0-6

Killarney Legion claimed the McElligott Cup in a sunny Kilcummin with a convincing win over neighbours Fossa. Finbarr Murphy (3) and Luke O'Donoghue (2) had Legion five points to the good after twenty minutes before Ruairi Doyle got Fossa on the board. Denis Sheahan (Legion) and Darren Cronin (Fossa) exchanged scores before Finbarr Murphy closed out the first half scoring to leave Legion ahead by 0-7 to 0-2. MANNION AND MCCAFFREY RETURN

Look, it's technically none of Kerry's business, but it's obvious a big talking point. I'm not exactly doing any preview of next year's All Ireland Championship, not just because of the new and busier format, because I think lads even get too excited about League form. It's not even October; cool the jets a bit.

Will Tyrone be better than last year? Aye, surely. I have no idea what happened there and doubt if they really know themselves – the amount of players stepping away from the panel would make me query the commitment being demanded, but I'm guessing. Mayo with McStay at the helm? Solid nucleus of talent there and the likes of Cillian O'Connor fully fit? You'd always keep a weather eye on them anyway. Galway ran us fairly close last year (to be fair, I don't think we would miss as many early chances again) and the age profile is perfect.

But Dublin? All going well, they will be favourites to meet Kerry in the final (I know, many a slip 'twixt cup and lip!). They ran us to

just one single point last year when it counted, having laboured badly in the National League. They should run through Division Two with room to experiment. Con O'Callaghan will be back, and his combination of pace and power, plus an executioner's deft touch... I was sceptical about all the hype about him at minor, but the case is long proven. There were more than a few eyebrows raised when Mannion departed the Dublin panel (whether voluntarily in frustration at the lack of game time or in line with management wishes has been a matter of speculation) and by all accounts he has been flying in their County Championship. But McCaffrey is the one who scares me. Cian O'Sullivan used to sit in that pocket and guard the house as players funnelled back (not unsimilar to what Tadhg Morley did this year) and that left space for Jack to attack. He was, and may again become, the fastest ball-carrier in the game. He could finish too, but the real danger was that the sheer speed of the counterattack slices defensive teams wide open – they can't transition fast enough to get the blanket in place. Jack McCaffrey and Paul Mannion are both very direct and very fast.

But you know what? Win or lose, I still say it's great to have them back playing. They play the game in the right way and they are great to watch, so fair play.

AFL

Tadhg Kennelly is the only Irish player to actually win a Grand Final so far, but that number might, just might, be about to triple. Kerry's Mark O'Connor and Laois' Zach Touhy both play for Geelong, have been knocking on the door for guite a while. Tuohy gave an awesome display as Geelong saw off Brisbane fairly comfortably - the Grand Final will be his 250th AFL game. Mark only came on as a medical substitution late on. Kerry's Deividas Uosis and Dublin's James Madden are both signed to Brisbane, but haven't yet made the breakthrough to senior yet. Ironically, Geelong will be playing the Sydney Swans, with whom Kennelly won his medal in 2005. Their star player is unquestionably Lance Franklin, who scored his 1000th goal earlier this season (against Geelong, with Sydney winning by 30 points that night).

SOCCER - FAI Cup

I don't know of any Kerry player to win an FAI Cup medal. I'm open to correction – I know the Dennehy brothers won League of Ireland Cups. Kilcummin's Matt Keane could become the first. The Limerick club, technically a new entity but with a strong base of previous incarnations to build from, have been formidable since their re-incarnation and Matt has been a key figure

along the way. Look, there's certainly an element of counting chickens before they are hatched about this – Treaty United will unquestionably be underdogs against Derry City in the semifinal.








Welcome back dear student what does it mean to be trapped? The dictionary defines it as 'when someone or something is trapped, that person or thing is unable to move or escape from a place or situation'. God's Word has much to say about being trapped. Though human beings are rarely snared in these traps, throughout the world there are many hundreds and thousands of innocent men, women and children who are treated no differently from trapped animals - trafficked as a mere commodity and held as slaves by corrupt and evil people whose god is the devil. It is widespread in every nation, and let me tell you that Almighty God will hold those people accountable - not only the traffickers, but also those who use the services that they are providing. There are many brothels operating even here in this nation that have young men and women enslaved, and people are using these services - enabling the evil maggots that are running them to enrich themselves at the misery of human beings whose lives have no worth in their eyes. People travel to foreign nations for sex tourism, abusing little children as a treat! Listen, if you are reading this and you have part-taken in it, here is a warning to you - Repent! Repent, while you have breath in your body and get right with God! And then do whatever you can to make things right for the victims who are prey, trapped and snared by vicious predators.

It is a sad thing to say but often people are far more likely to protest and march and set up organisations to help sick donkeys or little kittens, but will turn a blind eye to human suffering for fear of what might happen to them, or because it seems like too big a problem to overcome. This industry has gotten so huge because so few in authority are willing to confront the issues. And I'll tell you why – because some leaders are corrupt or part-taking of it themselves. Corruption needs to be exposed and put right because one day we will all face the Most High God, the Creator of the Heavens and the earth, and He won't be interested in the shallow 'good deeds' we have done, if we have not carried out His greatest desire - to set the oppressed free (Isaiah 58).

Mankind has a way of living to line our own nests – an 'I'm alright Jack' mentality but there are others suffering around us. There are godly organisations who rescue those caught in the sex-trafficking industry such as Christine Caine's 'A21', or Life Outreach's 'Rescue Life' and many others. We CAN do something, by supporting them financially - because these ministries are out on the frontlines rescuing people and housing them safely, and setting them up for moving forward out of their past. It's not enough to rescue someone - they need help to escape from whatever circumstances (usually poverty) that had them end up there in the first place. Think about it.
