WORKS BEGIN TO UPGRADE MAIN STREET

An investment of €100,000 in the upgrading of Main Street in Killarney will commence on Tuesday next, 27 October, with the repair and replacement of the granite paving blocks on the carriageway along the street.

The works, which are part of the agreed Killarney Municipal District Works Programme for 2020 will take place in phases over several weeks with every effort being made to limit disruption for local businesses, shoppers and pedestrians.

The works, which will be substantially completed by the end of next month, will require the closure of Main Street to vehicular traffic but the street will remain fully open for pedestrians. Deliveries to and from local businesses will be facilitated throughout the

works.

The original granite brick surface on Main Street is over a decade old and the commitment to repair the road surface was contained in the recently adopted Works Programme for 2020. Small sections of the carriageway (roadway) will be completed during each phase of the work and access to all local business will remain fully open to pedestrians at all times.

Local businesses are being briefed on the project which, on completion, will require approximately one month to allow the new surface to bed in. It is envisaged that the street will reopen to vehicular traffic at the end of December. Traffic diversions will be in place via the Ha-Hah, East Avenue Road and Mission Road.

Raising money for AADI, enjoying the beauty of the National Park and walking 50 miles... **Bernice and Eileen chat to Marie**



As we enter Level 5 of Covid 19 restrictions this week, our second lockdown since last March, we are unfortunately minus the beautiful weather but thankfully minus home schooling too.

I don't know about you but I am not a natural teacher. Huge respect to all the principals, teachers & SNA's in our community for educating our children in these unprecedented times. It got me thinking to how difficult it must have been to the parents of children with intellectual disabilities and how they coped throughout the first lockdown.

Charity fundraising is at an all time low but there are so many doing their very best with virtual events nationwide. Sometimes it's the smaller charities such as AADI (Autism Assistance Dogs Ireland) who are forgotten. I had met these two ladies in the park over the past while waking their 50 Miles for AADI.

"I absolutely love dogs Marie. They seek me out" Bernice told me. "She's like a magnet to them Marie. I prefer photography and nature so between the two of us our walks are well extended, between talking to every dog that passes" Eileen said..... followed by Bernice who interrupted to say "and taking pictures of every leaf & tree in the park"!

Bernice McMonagle & Eileen Sweeney have walked 50 miles for AADI and have raised €680 and counting.

"We're delighted and would like to thank everyone who has donated so far" Bernice told me. "So why AADI Bernice. Is there a reason for choosing this charity" I asked. "I have two nephews who are autistic Marie. One verbal and one non verbal. I can see first hand the benefits a dog from AADI has given them and their family. Simple things like calming a situation or making a trip to the hairdressers a success. Having an AADI dog has had a massive positive impact on their lives. My nephew received his first holy communion recently and his dog was beside him the whole way up the aisle. So many impossibilities for children with autism made possible. It's fantastic. It costs €22,000 to train just one dog but the difference it makes to their life is priceless" Bernice said.

"I worked with people with intellectual disabilities 23 years Marie at St Mary of the Angels and I now work with Kerry Mental Health

at Deer Lodge. When Bernice mentioned it to me I was only delighted to part take. It's great for our own mental health too, to get out and about in these strange times" Eileen said.

Both ladies are well into their fitness of a normal day. You can tell by looking at them. Eileen has become well acquainted with my lens at Ladies Day at the Killarney Races. "I used to do lots of running Marie over the years but I have an injury that requires me to walk instead of run these days" Eileen said. "Oh but you were well able to run last week when you thought a stag was coming at you during rutting" Bernice laughed. "I'm so afraid of them roaring Marie" Eileen explained. "But sure if you run they will only run after you Eileen" Bernice said laughing away.

I wanted to ask Bernice how she felt about the gyms closing. "I really feel they should have left them open Marie. I believe they are only No9 in the statistics of transmission. I understand why the government has decided to close them but I think it will do more damage than good for peoples mental health in the long run".

I left the girls as they were off on their merry way for another walk in the park and the thought dawned on me haven't they already finished their 50Miles?? "Oh we've finished 'our' 50K yes Marie but we've enjoyed a great social network of people who are also fundraising for AADI. Many have become injured so others have decided to complete the 50Miles on their behalf so while we can we will" Bernice said as they both waved good bye to me in the lashing rain with Bernice's dog Milo. Good on ye girls! Back to simplicity in complicated times as this year's 54321 CHALLENGE is completed

The 54321 Challenge which started 8 years ago with a team of 5 People over 4 DAYS, completing 3 CYCLES, and climbing 2 MOUNTAINS for 1 Cause – a local charity.

The Challenge had grown in numbers over the years, and this year was to be no different with a large number of participants ready to undertake the challenge. However due to the current COVID-19 Coronavirus pandemic and the corresponding lockdown, and health & safety recommendations from the HSA around large groups of people, the 54321 Challenge committee made the tough decision that all 50 participants could not complete this years Challenge. The 54321 Challenges top priority was to ensure the safety of its participants and in the current climate, this extended to their families, neighbours, friends etc. So Instead the decision was made that the Challenge would revert to the original 7 participants undertaking the 4-day challenge, which took place from Thursday 20th to Sunday 23rd of August 2020 inclusive.

This was to include the following.

Day 1 (Thursday 20th) - Cycle the Ring of Kerry. Day 2 (Friday 21st) - Climb Carrantuohill.

Day 3 (Saturday 22nd) - Cycle from Killarney to the foot of Mount Brandon and then climb Mt Brandon

Day 4 (Sunday 23rd) - Cycle from Dingle to Killarney.

However, Storm Ellen had different ideas on this as it hit on Thursday the 20th August, the participants were faced with the dilemma what do we do with this. A Zoom call was had and the team decided that Day No 1 would now become Day No 4, so all the participants in varying locations cycled 70 km on rollers and spinning bikes. Day No 1/4 done, now onto day 2 and the weather still was not on the teams side to climb Carrantuohill, so another Zoom call later and the decision was taken to cycle the Ring of Kerry 180km on spinning bikes at the Kerry Sports Academy at ITTralee, I can safely say an experience not to be repeated too often give us the open road anyway. Nevertheless, it was all done with smile on face and the attitude of the day are not we so lucky to be able to do this. Day 3 saw us get back on schedule and climbing mount Brandon was on the cards and we did so despite strong winds and the odd heavy shower, the heads were up and the singing voices were on and a massive thanks to our Guide Seamus Begley on the day who knows the mountain like the back of his hand. On Day 4, we got to do Day 2 and climb Carrantuohill and finally the sun cream had to come out as the sun shone down on us, and again many thanks to our guide on the day Donal Cronin. The 54321 Challenge 2020 raised €34,768.97. This year's selected charities are Skellig Stars (Group of children and adult athletes with special needs); The Kerry Hospice and Enable Ireland Kerry.

A major contributor to this year's fundraising efforts were a number of Spinathon Days where this year's participants, volunteers from the various causes, family and friends took the streets in different locations around the county on spinning bikes. These events took place in Cahirciveen, Killorglin, Listowel, Dingle, Killarney and finally in Tralee. Thanks to everyone who made these Spinathons possible, to all the volunteers, and thanks to all the members of the public who gave their support and generous donations, and finally yet importantly thanks to An Garda Síochána and especially James Foley for his help with the organisation of the Spinathons.

An hour later I found myself at Ruby Tuesday's, Park Road as Betty's geared up for the snip!

The Rapunzel Foundation is a charity organisation that works to improve the lives of those living with hair loss (alopecia) through fund raising as well as hair donation.

The Rapunzel Foundation's"Ponytail Campaign" is when people commit to growing their hair 13 inches or longer and there after sending it to the foundation to help make much needed hair pieces to improve the lives of those living with the hair loss and Triona O'Shea has given her time to the charity for many years now.

"My son Frank gave me the idea Marie back in 2012 when he donated his strawberry blonde hair to the Rapunzel Foundation. Frank is currently at UL studying engineering because UL has the best surfers club Marie" Betty laughed. Integration in an organic manner... KASI opens their Going Green Store

While we are winding down as a nation adjusting into Level 5 of Covid19 restrictions, KASI Going Green Zero Waste Refill Store is opening up!!! It's always been important to keep business in the community but now more than ever.

If each of us spent an extra ≤ 20 a week in small businesses over the next 3 months it would boost our local economy by ≤ 875 million. Worth thinking about.

So I met with the brain child of KASI Going Green Zero Waste Refill Store, Marilyn Catapat Counihan, who has lived within our community since 1983 devoting her time supporting and helping to integrate asylum seekers, refugees & other migrants into our community in Killarney. It is important to know that KASI is not a business, it is a voluntary organisation ran by the people within our community.

 In 2009, we got an opportunity to develop a community garden with 34 site kindly provided by the Killarney Parish (Catholic Church). Asylum seekers & refugees were not allowed to work at that time (they are now allowed to work). We needed something productive & rewarding so the community garden provided an 'occupation' for them in the form of 'volunteerism' in the garden. Many of the local people in Killarney also volunteered. Their interest was in gardening, but because they worked side by side with our Asylum Seeker volunteers, they got to know each other. The garden became the focus of meeting people from various cultural backgrounds, including Irish people, where people share gardening skills, stories, culture and FOOD! Integration as such happened in an organic manner... It was great" Marilyn told me. "It was a dream of Marilvn's to have a log cabin on the site to create KASI Café Marie. She is such an ambitious lady and has fantastic ideas and somehow makes things happen" Sheila Casey added. I could see what Sheila meant. Marilyn was lighting up with enthusiasm & pride as she spoke. Like many who talk about going green, Marilyn & her team see the way forward and take action!

"Well Marie, when I was given the go ahead to begin the log cabin when another opportunity knocked and I grabbed it" Marilyn continued. "Out of courtesy I approached the principal of St Oliver's National School, Rory D'Arcy, because we are 'neighbour's and we also do a lot of integration work in their school through our awareness raising programmes. I just want to let him know that our plans were (at the time) to open a café at KASI Garden. I couldn't believe Mr D'Arcy's interest and wanted to include the children of St Oliver's National School. His



suggestion was to open the café within the school. I remember having our conversation where I asked him if they have a canteen and he said we'll find one and then he asked me where are we getting the money to set it up and I said we'll find the money! I am delighted to say that we now supply four schools in Killarney Marie - St Oliver's NS, Holy Cross Mercy NS, The Mon NS & Gaelscoil Faithleann with healthy affordable lunches. It generates employment, training, placement, builds up language skills and integration happens again in an 'organic' manner, just like our gardening project. Again, it was accidental, informal, opportunistic integration. Amazing" Marilyn said.

What a girl Marilyn is and I said as much to her. She shook her head and said "We are a team Marie, they are merely my ideas, but it's the team behind me that help in making things happen. That's it."

So to tell you all about the new cafe which has since experienced the blip of Level 5 restrictions but none the less is still open for business on a take away basis during lockdown. "There are two sides to the CAFÉ & REFILL STORE. Most of the produce from the cafe comes from KASI garden and where it is not in season, items are sourced from local farms around Killarney e.g. Cheese from Wilma's in Killorglin, Meat from Ballyhar Meats, Milk from Chris at Ballymacelligott, Vegetables from Mary Walsh on the Tralee Road, Sourdough Bread from Cormac Finn in Beaufort & our own Mary Carroll for our pastries. The garden's planting cycle is just beginning and we are in the winter season now but will always source our suppliers locally and organically when we can't supply ourselves. All of our packaging is recyclable & compostable.

The other side of KASI Cafe & Refill Store is our refills where you can bring your own containers to fill with organic herbs, flour, spices, rices, nuts, raisins, fruits, currants etc There are over 150 products in total Marie including items such as eco friendly tooth brushes and many cleaning products which are all eco friendly" Marilyn explained. "Our vision is to have no waste. All of our peelings, coffee grinds & packaging are compostable and come back to our garden to turn into compost and put back into the soil where the vegetables grow".

From visiting war torn countries.... and living life off the beaten track... Jerome is enjoying a bit of down time

was having my usual 'Home Improvements' chats with Connie (Flash) O'Shea over the back wall discussing Level 5 lockdown and how it wouldn't affect him, his wife Mary or his son lan as they all are essential workers with An Post.

Gogglevox

"We will be busier than ever before Marie" Connie said. While Connie is winding up, I have somewhat wound down and hoped my 5K restrictions wouldn't challenge my Gogglevox column too much. "You should have the chats with Jerome Corkery Marie" Connie suggested so here I am, having the chats with Jerome a very well travelled man and a Killarney man through and through.

Jerome Corkery, Corkery's Bar High Street, loves to globe trot. "I think when you grow up in Killarney you are somewhat used to mingling with different nationalities. I was very privileged. When the travelling bug hit I'd check online for discounted flights which took me to so many different destinations Marie. I could go for a few months at a time as my Dad Tadhg used to hold the fort at Corkery's Bar. Western media portray false images of places like Iran for example. It's extremely unfair. Many of these countries have been given such bad press and really are fabulous. As an outsider visiting different parts of the world you are a novelty. I have gotten on the back of motorbikes with strangers and found myself teaching English to adults & children alike" Jerome told me. I'm not sure about you but I would hardly go to London alone so the thoughts of globe trotting and literally going where ever the road takes me kinda unnerves me. "You've been watching too many movies Marie. People are the same the world over. You just have to believe like you belong and act accordingly. You learn to blend and take your cues from the people and situations around you, much like working in a bar!! To see true culture you've got to hang with the locals. I have been in many war zones, Jordan at the Syrian border for example. That's one thing I would love to do actually, return to Syria to learn Arabic. I remember when I was in Tehran, I chatted to a group of boys who turned out to be a band. They used me as bate to talk to girls. The religious culture is very strict there but I was the 'go between' for educational interaction without any raised eyebrows if that makes sense. I love to explore something new. I love looking at different societies and people watching in general. It's hard to see poverty but it is the same the world over. The world is not a bad place Marie. It's fascinating" Jerome said. I had to ask Jerome his favourite place to visit as I'd imagined from our conversations there wasn't very many places he hadn't



been to. "It's difficult to say. I like somewhere spicy, the salt to my chips, somewhere off the beaten track and generally try to avoid my own culture. I suppose Turkey, Gobekli Tepe is an archaeological site built over 12,000 years ago, in the Southeastern Anatolia Region of Turkey approx 7 miles from Sanliurfa. It's a Kurdish area Marie. Loved it. In the off season I love to visit Istanbul, one of the most relaxing destinations. In the winter it's easy enough to get a cheap ticket out of Dublin" Jerome continued.

While Jerome Corkery is a well travelled man he is the epitome of a Killarney man. I was born and raised on High Street Marie and Corkery's Bar has been in our family since 1946 originally owned by my grandfather Jerome Corkery who also had a carriage business making jaunting carts as we know them now as this was the main means of transport at that time. "So how long have you worked at Corkery's Bar Jerome"? I asked. I suppose I began collecting glasses from the age of 4 or 5. I was brought up in the trade, an assistant to my parents, a family industry. I'm one of those people who can't sit still Marie so when I'd finish in Corkery's I'd go to JJ O'Donoghue Bar, Main Street. Some might remember it as Paddy's Restaurant. It was the only bar on Main Street at the time until Mustang Sally's opened. Reidy's was always there yes but didn't really operate as a bar as such. It was the hub of conversation and popular with the Killarney's barmen and hoteliers. I knew the gossip from all angles" Jerome laughed. "Connie O'Shea was a regular and worked at Murphys Bar at the time Marie". Jerome now works in the Bar at the Lake Hotel . I thought what a change that must be to running your own business. "We rented out the pub two and a half years ago Marie. The plan was that I'd have more time to spend with my parents. We handed over the pub of a Monday and sadly my Dad passed on the Friday. I left it too late. A huge regret I have. My Mum Joan lives on Lewis Road and I love living on High Street over the bar so we are just a stone throw away from each other. I used to do 60/70 hours a week in Corkery's Bar and now I sometimes finish at 5pm at the Lake Hotel with alternate weekends off. It was a steep learning curve Marie. I came from the rough and tumble of a pub on high street to a 4 star refined hotel. We've won a lot of awards recently and very popular on tripadvisor but that filters from the top down. The hotel is not run by accountants and the Huggards are great employers. Tony & Joe came with us on a fishing trip to Dingle last week but we deny all responsibility for Fungi's disappearance" Jerome laughed. "I'm enjoying some downtime in my own town and county now as the hotel closed just two weeks ago but I'll enjoy travelling again too Marie. Life is not over yet. There is lots more to come"!

Thanks for the chats Jerome Corkery. Connie Flash was right. A Killarney man with many stories that I would loved to have heard more of if time was on my side.

Businesses in Kerry should apply for the extended **Apprenticeship Incentivisation Scheme** - Griffin

Businesses in Kerry should apply for the Apprenticeship Incentivisation Scheme which is now being extended until mid-2021, Deputy Government Chief Whip Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin said: I am delighted to receive confirmation from the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science Simon Harris TD that the Apprenticeship Incentivisation Scheme is being extended for businesses to apply to it. "So far 18 businesses in Kerry have applied for the scheme, which is designed to support employers to continue to recruit apprentices during the immediate Covid-19 period.

"It ensures that businesses who take on an apprentice are hired at $\in 2,000$ per apprentice and another $\notin 1,000$ if the apprentice is still on the books for a year.

"This is a good model. It allows a person to earn and learn and allows businesses to train recruits and get some payment for it.

"Minister Harris is also developing a new Action Plan for Apprenticeship, but the scheme has offered a lifeline to many businesses seeking to take on apprentices and security for the apprentice.

"SOLAS has also moved to simplify employer access to apprenticeship through a relaunched website at www.apprenticeship. ie where employers can find information on participating in apprenticeship or, indeed, discover how to kick-off the development of new apprenticeship programmes," Deputy Griffin concluded.

Speaking today, Minister Harris said: "Covid-19 has upended all our lives. While the challenges the crisis presented are unprecedented, they also open up unique opportunities for us.

"In this week's Budget, we secured a package of €118 million to help thousands of you reskill and retrain in areas where we need more workers or where there is potential for future employment.

"One area we will focus on is the area of

apprenticeship. We have also secured funding to expand training courses in retrofit skills to 1,500 people per annum. We will extend programmes to include 500 places for people in search of employment in this developing area as well as providing more places for people in the construction sector.

"2020 has been an incredibly difficult year for businesses and people with us all having to adapt to new ways of working. We will also roll out a new climate action upskilling scheme through Skillnet Ireland. Skillnet programmes are industry led. Courses will be designed by industry, for industry and will give businesses the skills to adapt to a sustainable, low carbon economy.So log on to www.gov.ie and find out more."

Fianna Fáil MEP to take crucial role in lead gun shot over wetlands objection

- Common sense sadly is not that common in the European Commission -

Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher has been given a crucial role, as one of the 'Shadow' Rapporteurs, on the lead gunshot over wetlands objection that will be debated in the weeks and months ahead.

Kelleher, a member of the centrist Renew Europe group, was appointed as the shadow following his lodging of a formal objection to the European Commission proposals that would effectively write off the use of lead gunshot in Ireland.

"I'm delighted with this appointment as it will give me a direct role in developing the resolution that will be put before all members of the European Parliament.

"It's important to say that I am not against the phased elimination of lead gunshot but under the current Commission proposals it would be a disaster for farmers and gun sports enthusiasts in Ireland.

"The current proposals I believe are

disproportionate and unenforceable. Worse still, it contains a clause that would criminalise a farmer for just carrying lead gunshot near water.

"The Commission didn't look at the practicalities of countries such as Ireland. How they can develop a proposal that categorises a puddle forming in a field as a wetland, then introduce a 100m buffer zone around it, and still think it makes sense is beyond me. Common sense sadly is not that common in the European Commission.

"Many of my colleagues in the Renew Europe group, and indeed across the parliament, are strongly opposed to this regulation as currently written. The Commission needs to go back to the drawing board and start again.

"I hope other Irish colleagues will do the right thing and join me in voting in favour of the objection when it is debated in the ENVI Committee and finally in a full Plenary vote later this year," concluded Kelleher.

As the centenary of the Headford junction ambush is approaching on March 21, 2021 and following a local committee seeking the assistance of the Municipal District Cllrs to help source funding to refurbish and upgrade the Headford Monument for the 100 year anniversary. This week, local councillors Cllr Brendan Cronin and Cllr. Maura Healy are delighted to report that Mr John Breen, Director of Services in KCC has confirmed that the Dept of Culture have approved funding of €10,000 for Commemorative funding specifically for the Headford Monument. "As this was a major event in Kerry's history it is important that adequate funding is provided", Cllr. Cronin told Killarney Outlook while Deputy Danny Healy Rae and Cllr. Maura Healy Rae Danny and Maura thank the committee for their great efforts and works and wish them all the best with the works.

Domestic Violence Campaign

Launched in Kerry Invites Men to be "Better Than This"



If your behaviour is causing a problem If your behaviour is affecting your children, If your behaviour is causing a problem at home, things can get better.

The Covid 19 pandemic has seen a 30% increase in the reported incidence of domestic abuse in Ireland. That is the bad news, but there is hope. Research shows that men can change with the right support and challenge, when willing to look inside honestly and take responsibility for what they say, think and do.

The "Better Than This" campaign, launched this week in Kerry by MOVE Ireland, aims to engage men who are worried about their behaviour towards their partners or children. MOVE Ireland provides a structured programme called "Choices", where men are challenged to take responsibility for their abuse and to change their attitudes and behaviour and develop respectful, nonabusive relationships.

Unfortunately, many men who are concerned about their behaviour are not aware that this service exists. This campaign aims to reach these men using posters, newspaper and radio ads and online material, with the clear message that life can become "better than this" if they seek help to change.

Speaking at the "Better Than This" campaign

launch, MOVE Ireland Chief Executive, Owen O'Neill asked all members of the public do their bit to make homes happier and safer by spreading the word about this service via friends, family and social media.

"The past cannot be changed, but the future does not have to be more of the same. Change isn't easy, but it is not impossible. Our programme combines targeted one-to-one interventions and group work and is run by trained facilitators. It has been up and running in Kerry for the last two years and we are currently accepting new participants."

"We understand that it can be difficult to reach out and ask for help. But your family deserves Better Than This. You can be a better parent and a better partner. If your behaviour is causing problems at home, we can help things to get better"

"Have you ever threatened your partner, scared them or put them down? Does the pressure you are under have an impact on your family? Are you concerned that your behaviour is impacting your kids? If you want to be Better Than This, contact us today and you will be treated with respect and without judgement".

wellbeing of women and children who have experienced violence and abuse in their intimate relationships. As part of our programme the partners or ex-partners of the men are also offered support."

Over the month of the campaign MOVE Ireland will maintain a sustained media presence to invite men who need this service to pick up the phone and make the first move. The "Choices" group run by MOVE Ireland in Kerry is not currently running group sessions but will resume them when it is safe to do so. However, one to one support is still available and that is a key message of this "Better Than This" campaign.

The campaign also aims to raise awareness among professionals who may encounters these men in the course of their work.

As part of this campaign, MOVE Ireland will be offering free training - a mini webinar and two short online training workshops for frontline professionals on October 16th and 29th from 10.30 -12.30.

Irish Water and Kerry County Council replace ageing water mains in Ballymallis

Irish Water, working in partnership with Kerry County Council, is replacing 1.1 kilometers of problematic water mains in Ballymallis to improve water quality and tackle high levels of water leakage.

The old, brittle, problematic pipes are being decommissioned and replaced with new watermains. The works will commence on Monday 19 October and are expected to be completed in seven weeks.

The works are being undertaken off the N72 Killorglin/Killarney road, from the crossroads near Kerry Woolen Mills, Listry to Ballymallis Cross, approximately 1.1km south.

The works will involve laying new water service connections from the public water main in the road to customers' property boundaries and connecting it to the customers' water supply. These works are part of Irish Water's national Leakage Reduction Programme which will see \in 500m invested nationally to tackle



problematic pipes and leakage in Ireland's ageing water network. The works will be carried out by Kerry County Council on behalf

of Irish Water.

Areas of work will be limited to short sections to minimise impact and disruption to commuters. Traffic management will be in place during this time. Local access will be maintained, but it is advised that through road users take alternative routes for the duration of the works. Emergency access will be maintained at all times.

The works may involve some short-term water shut offs and the project team will ensure that customers are given a minimum of 48 hours notice prior to any planned water shut offs.

"We will work with the community to minimise disruption. Customers can phone Irish Water on 1850 278 278 if they have any further questions about the project," Steven Blennerhassett, Leakage Reduction Programme Regional Lead, Irish Water said.

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU

WANT TO RETIRE? You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Taxable Cash: You may be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash. Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. SPORTS UNDER LEVEL 5 COVID RESTRICTIONS

A thing of the past.... we are all missing scenes like this from Fitzgerald Stadium.

Obviously Taoiseach Micheál Martin's announcement on Monday evening of the new Covid restrictions in an attempt to arrest the rising number of infections has implications for all of Irish society.

In the sporting context, the following are the main points of note. Note that while certain sports at high levels may be permitted under the new regulations, their governing bodies may decide to cease activities for safety reasons or the prohibition against spectators,

and that some sports bodies such as the GUI have requested further clarification from Sport Ireland.

Elite Sport

Sport will be allowed to continue behind closed doors and only at the elite level. In this regard, 'elite' refers to the top national level at which a sport is played and does not require that sport to be professional. However, note that all requirements re covid precautions (no dressing rooms, covid questionnaires, separate travel, and contact tracing) will still apply fully.

The GAA Inter-county season will continue as

planned, with Donegal travelling to Kerry for our last remaining National Football League fixture before opening our All Ireland campaign with a Munster semi-final against Cork.

In hurling, Kerry will meet Meath in the opening round of the Joe McDonogh Cup this weekend.

The U20 Championship and Minor Championships will not be going ahead – it has been clarified that only senior competitions qualify as 'elite'. The U20 Football Final between Dublin and Galway was scheduled to take place this weekend, with the Kerry minors scheduled to open their campaign shortly. These games will not be going ahead.

The Six Nations Rugby and the Autumn Series will be going ahead.

The League of Ireland can be completed and the FAI Cup go ahead, as will Ireland's Nations Cup tie against Bulgaria, as will Dundalk's Europa League matches.

Horse-Racing, including the forthcoming National Hunt season, will go ahead, as will Greyhound Racing.

Note that gyms, swimming pools, tennis courts, and golf courses are closed during Level 5 restrictions.

In recognition of the impact on children and young people of restrictions, non-contact training can continue for school-children outdoors and in pods of 15.

All training activities should be individual only.

No dance or exercise classes are allowed.

UPDATE ON COVID-19 FROM KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Kerry County Council's Senior Management Team met this week to consider the Government's announcement that the country is moving to the Level 5 category of COVID-19 restrictions and its implications for the services which the council provides to the people of Kerry.

In accordance with the Government's list of essential services, council services will continue to be provided to the public including housing construction, housing maintenance, fire and water services, environmental, street cleaning and waste services, public conveniences, planning services, roadworks and road repairs and maintenance, greenway projects and other services, having close regard to the prevailing public health guidelines.

Public parks, beaches and playgrounds remain open and the advice remains to observe the Government guidance on travel limits (5km), social distancing and hand hygiene.

In the interests of public health, Kerry County Council is strongly recommending that members of the public avoid visiting council buildings and public counters where possible and that they engage with staff by phone, email and online in the first instance. A light goes out in Dingle harbour

The search for Fungi the bottlenose dolphin who is missing now for over a week had been wound down.

The dolphin, who has been part of the fabric and identity of the west Kerry town for over 37 years was reported missing by local fishermen and the news sparked a search operation which included the entire town.

The bottlenose dolphin, who was first sighted in the 1980s, is an integral part of the town and is considered more than a tourist attraction by the people who live there.

He was first sighted by Paddy Ferriter, a lighthouse keeper. The arrival of the dolphin attracted a bit of curiosity from locals at the timem but most thought that there was a storm on the way and that he was in the harbour for shelter. However, he never left and stayed for over 37 years, something which is unusual for a bottlenose dolphin.

In 2019, the Guinness Book of Records named him the oldest solitary dolphin in the world.

A Honda Civic in Co. Carlow has had 43 owners, the highest number of owners of a vehicle in Ireland.

The news comes in a report from vehicle history expert Cartell.ie report this week.

There are 17,166 vehicles in Ireland that have 10 owners or more over the course of their lifetime. The highest number of owners recorded for a single vehicle still live in the fleet is 43 owners. There are 8 vehicles with 24 owners, 8 vehicles have 25 owners, 2 vehicles have 35 owners and 1 vehicle has 36 owners.

Of those 17,166 vehicles with 10 or more owners, 3,598 are located in Dublin, 1,883 in Cork, 988 in Galway, and 856 in Limerick, while the number in Kerry is 525.

The majority of vehicles in Ireland are on their first, second or third owners.

Bodhrán making and playing at Castleisland Community College

Transition Year students at had a fantastic all day workshop making and playing bodhráns! Michael Vignoles a bodhrán, uilleann pipe maker, musician and craftsman from Claddagh in Galway provided the innovative workshop.

It was an exciting cross curricular lesson which saw the students engage with woodwork, history, art, music agus 'an cultúr Gaelach'. Their day was spent in the woodwood room. In the morning session they made their bodhráns. They soaked goat's skin in water whilst sanding down the wooden frame of the bodhrán. The wooden stick was then shaped to be used as a support for the interior of the bodhrán. The goat's skin was secured initially with a rubber band onto the circular wooden section and thumb tacks were then used to secure it better. The bodhráns were then placed in the sun to dry. A blade was used to trim off excess goat's skin. The afternoon saw them tracing and painting their crest onto their bodhrán. Prior to the workshop they had researched their family crest. The last hour of the workshop was a music lessson which saw them learn how to play the instrument correctly. They finished the day playing Molly Malone together in perfect unison!

NO JOY FOR LEAVING CERT CANDIDATES IN THEPUBLICATION OF GRADES APPEAL RESULTS

The results of the calculated grades appeal were released last Friday. 16th October and, as expected, they had minimal impact.

There was little or no joy for candidates who were expecting grade increases. The main reason for that was the fact that the grades could not be appealed this year, only the paper trail. In view of the major errors made in the standardisation by Polymetrika International Inc. of Canada, there was some expectation that the appeals process might be broadened to include a grades' check. In the event, that didn't happen.

The Dept of Education received the highest ever number of appeals submitted in any Leaving Cert year as a record 12,272 candidates appealed 33,677 grades. This is significantly higher than last year when 9,049 candidates appealed 16,965 grades leading to 2,916 upgrades. This meant that 17.2% of the grades appealed last year were upgraded.

This year, 17% of grades awarded to candidates by their schools were downgraded but there was no facility to appeal the calculated grade awarded, only the paper trail leading to the grade awarded. This was a major departure from long established practice in the state exams. The limited appeals process included three stages. First, checks were undertaken on the forms completed by the school and the transfer of the information from the forms to the data collection system. Second, there was a review to ensure that the data was correctly received and processed through the systems used in the national standardisation process. Third, students unhappy with the outcome of the above process can have their appeal reviewed by independent appeals scrutineers. The Dept of Education ultimately reviewed the paper trail of 33,301 individual subject records belonging to 12,216 candidates. That number excluded candidates who initially entered for an appeal but later withdrew their application. As a result of the process, only 18 increased grades were awarded to 18 individual candidates from 12,216. Eleven of these were upgrades following an appeal by the candidate. A further seven grades were upgraded following quality assurance checks.

As I previously advocated, The Dept of Education should have accepted the schools' submitted grades. This year's appeals process focused on looking for errors in the transmission and processing of the data. The process did not allow students to appeal the estimated percentage mark or rank order provided by the school. The professional judgement of the school was outside of the appeals process. The design of the algorithm and the application of the national standardisation process was also outside of the scope of the appeals process.

The 18 students who were upgraded were contacted directly by The Dept of Education on Friday afternoon. The CAO was also notified by the Dept of Education of the outcome of the appeals process. Candidates who were eligible for a new offer as a result of an upgrade on Friday were contacted by CAO.

The publication of the appeal results of Friday completed stages one and two of a three staged appeals process. Students unhappy with the outcome of the above process can apply to have their appeal reviewed by independent appeals scrutineers. They will check to ensure the correct procedures were followed throughout the appeals process. The scrutineers will have access to the records and documentation considered at the first and second stages. Very few candidates will avail of this option as it's unlikely to make any difference to Friday's appeal results.

Meanwhile, CAO issued Round Five of college offers on Friday last, 16th October but it contained very few extra offers.

Il Things Sport is becoming less and less Asport in this particular year. Now, I love sport - ironic, considering that the last time I had to run a hundred metres.....well, let's just say that RTE would not screen that particular video before nine o'clock. It wasn't pretty.

In PCE (Pre-Covid Era) I often attended a minimum of five games a week and usually more in summer. Mostly gaelic football, but I actually believe that a good game of hurling beats a good game of football. The reverse is also true, by the way, a bad game of hurling is truly bad. Hurling does take more skill to play, it really does (physical prowess will cover up a lot of flaws in a footballer that would be quickly exposed in hurling). I get to the occasional rugby match at local level, but admittedly very few. I watch a lot of it on television. Personally I preferred players that manipulated space, the big body collisions of nowadays are just gladiatorial bouts without finesse to me. Congratulations to Louise Galvin on being the Ireland Sevens Player of the Year, and best wishes to one of Kerry's best sportswomen in several codes on her retirement.

I love athletics and I firmly believe that it is the most inclusive and healthiest of all - I also think that it is poorly marketed in general, with a heavy concentration on statistics. Simplify the story for people like me. I spoke to one of Killarney and Ireland's top athletes, high jumper Jordan Lee, a while back. He mentioned his personal best at the time to me (he has since beaten it) but it was just a number - until he explained that it was higher than the barrier lifts in a car park. That's an image I can grasp immediately.

I love basketball – aside from the skill (I firmly believe that accuracy trumps any other skill in Irish basketball), it has a closeness that other mainstream Irish sports just don't have. You are very close to the action. It also puts more effort into interacting with supporters – introducing the players, lights, music, they usually put on some half-time entertainment. It also has they advantage of being indoors - you can bring your children to a controlled, safe, and still exciting environment. The NBA is obviously the pinnacle of the game, but to me it's almost like watching a movie. The college games (which are harder to stream nowadays than they used to be) are more relatable; I can understand the tactics and interplay much better than the individual superstardom of the NBA games. Quick confession; I loathe US commentators with a passion, be more informative and do less yelping. You aren't the star of this show, so get over yourself.

There is a point to all of this. I love sport. But right now, I don't actually want any. I love my family more. I started off last week looking hugely forward to the games at the weekend. By the same the same weekend had arrived, watching the incremental increase in infections, I was very worried about games going ahead. And I was right; most of those games were affected by covid (fair play to Basketball Ireland for doing the right thing and cancelling their schedule).

Until numbers get back under control - and as I write they are increasing at a genuinely frightening rate - sports bodies should do the right and obvious thing. And I include 'elite' players who are actually amateurs and who shouldn't be expected to be travelling to compete in contact sports at this time. It isn't just a risk for them; it's a risk for everyone they come in contact with as well, including their families

GAELIC FOOTBALL

NFL Division One: Kerry 0-17 Monaghan 0-14 I'm not going to do a traditional match report; those who are interested will have read several by the time you read this. I will just make some observations.

Kerry looked very fit and very sharp. We played a very strong blanket defence; purists may complain but every team does these days. What Dublin, and to a limited extent Kerry, have brought into the mix is a faster transition into attack. Anytime that Monaghan ventured forward, we had a numbers back to stop them. Monaghan opted for short kick-outs and building from the back with a running game; I thought it gave Kerry time to set themselves and a lot of Monaghan's forays were repulsed. I also got the impression that Monaghan didn't fancy contesting 50/50 ball against Kerry in the middle and didn't use the space as well as Kerry. Shane Ryan opted for longer kick-outs and sure enough, Kerry won the most of them. Allied to the speed of their counter-attack into space, I thought Kerry were much the better side in the first half and fully deserved their 0-10 to 0-5 half-time lead.

This wasn't classic football by any means and, to be honest, it wasn't exactly thrilling to watch. Efficiency was the byword of the day, and Kerry were simply more efficient. The blanket defence as perfected initially by Mickey Harte relies heavily on counter-attack with opposition players drawn forward out of position; patient build-up with rotation and avoiding contact negates that. Jim Gavin's Dublin perfected the rapid transition from lightning attack to blanket defence: Kerry aren't far behind on the same road. Gavin White was my man of the match, covering every inch of ground on both halves of the pitch; Diarmuid O'Connor, Tom O'Sullivan, debutant Ronan Buckley, and Dara Moynihan also impressed in that regard. David Clifford is unguestionably the jewel in Kerry's attack; he also had a commendably high work-rate and

came out to the half forward line in search of ball, leaving Tony Brosnan to snipe impressively inside.

Kerry looked good overall here, and can and should be proud of their overall display, but the emergence of Conor McManus in the second half asked real questions of our defensive setup and I didn't feel that Kerry's answers were convincing. In fact, if Monaghan had converted four decent scoring chances at the start of the half things might have gotten very interesting indeed! We get the bodies in the way, but we aren't great at actually winning the ball in tackles. We were always able to hold off a very game but ultimately limited Monaghan attack. We only introduced subs late on - I have to say that Tommy Walsh was only for the pitch for a few minutes but had a big impact.

It was a good win, and a fully deserved win, even if it was more about work-rate than entertainment.

Galway's loss to Mayo (who desperately needed a win and showed that they definitely haven't gone away) means that Kerry top the table. In recent years, the National League has been a stronger indicator of Sam Maguire success than ever before (Dublin have won four doubles in that time) but I think it's more an indicator of the increased season length and demands on intercounty players. This year? These are warm-up games and nothing more. I expect Kerry to beat Donegal next week if the game goes ahead, but there will always be an asterisk beside that title as far as I am concerned.

Our focus needs to be on Cork, and I feel that their easy win over Louth to get them back to Division Two won't help them too much against Kerry - but the ease with which they sliced through for goals is worth noting, especially after last year's Munster Final. All to play for yet!

U20 ALL IRELAND SEMI-FINAL: GALWAY

1-15 Kerry 1-10

This is a game that shouldn't have gone ahead, and that's not carping about what was a completely fair result on the day. Kerry were missing five starters (Marc Kelliher, Dan McCarthy, Paul O'Shea, Patrick Darcy, Darragh Lyne, and Donal O'Sullivan) while Galway were missing three certain starters and two who were bound to feature. John Sugrue and his team did everything right; I don't think there was a single unturned stone in terms of preparation, but to no avail.

Eddie Horan was Kerry's linchpin and always a huge threat - added to his tour de force in the County Championship, this is one to watch. Horan was at the centre of everything for Kerry, including tapping down for Ruaidhrí Ó Beaglaíoch's goal. Kerry led by 1-7 to 1-5 at

half-time, but Galway dominated the second half (the loss of an effective Paul Walsh to injury didn't help) and we can't have any real complaints.

Stand-in keeper Deividas Uosis was also superb, but we'll probably have to watch him from afar - he is expected to return to Australia's Brisbane Lions in the AFL.

The bulk of these teams met in a good minor final, with a strong second half by Kerry seeing them claim a fifth minor title on the trot. This was role-reversal, and frankly it worries me how often our minor triumphs are getting reversed at U20/U21 grade in recent years. Equally worrying is that Dublin in particular (and anyone who wants to suggest that Dublin aren't by far our biggest obstacle on the road to Sam in recent years should possibly go back under their rock for another year or two) do the exact opposite. They have been fairly poor at minor grade in recent years....but have won four U21/U20 titles (nine Leinster titles) and are back in another final. Their production line is so consistent that it's a pattern in development. Ciarán Archer is the latest wunderkind at the grade, but they seem to find a few of them every year. Granted, Kerry withholding U20 players for the sake of the senior team was ridiculously short-sighted and probably cost us the 2018 title and possibly one in 2019 (and, no, that isn't me being wise after the event; it was blindingly obvious at the time), but our problems lie far deeper than that. Kerry and Dublin have both brought players up from the minor teams of those years - Kerry's players have minor medals, but Dublin's players have senior All Irelands.

NHL DIVISION TWO FINAL

Antrim 2-23 Kerry 2-20

No joy for the Kerry hurlers, but they gave a great account of themselves in the Division Two Final. In fairness, Antrim were the best side in Division Two this year and were more deserving of promotion (we relied on a somewhat fluky result by Offaly over Antrim to get to this final). Antrim were strong favourites but Kerry stayed with them for long periods. There was no doubt about Kerry's best player, UCC star Shane Conway scored a whopping 1-14. Mostly from dead balls, and let's be fair, the goal was a long range fluke, but Conway was superb in open play as well - and picked up a few hard tackles that were at least borderline for his trouble. That's not making excuses; Antrim were the better hurling team. Kerry's full back line has come in for some criticism - I completely disagree, I thought they stood up brilliantly to constant, and I do pretty much mean constant, pressure.

Kerry were able to stay with Antrim in the first half, trailing by 1-12 to 1-11. Again, there was a touch of luck in three Monaghan defenders spilling what should have been an easy ball out to a lurking Mikey Boyle - Mikey never refused such kind invitations!

In the second half Antrim were always able to stretch the gap that small bit - Domhnall Nugent, James McNaughton, Niall McKenna, and Conal Cunning very much to the fore. Great stylish hurling; credit where it's due. Shane's long free dropped into the net and his follow-

up point trimmed the gap back to one, but Antrim were able to close it out, finding gaps as Kerry pressed forward in desperation. Antrim advance to Division One; Kerry must bide a while. Maybe no harm, we have great young players supplementing a good panel. Fintan O'Connor is very much on the right road. No complaints, but a lot of pride.

U20 Cork 2-24 Kerry 2-10

That scoreline probably sounds bad, does it? Well, it shouldn't. Kerry were always on a hiding to nothing here. Kerry have played in the B grade since it's inception - albeit with a lot of success. The gulf in standard to the Munster A Championship is so vast it makes the Grand Canyon look like a minor dent. But Kerry stepped up to this one and did a lot more than give it a rattle – they were fantastic. They battled relentlessly from start to finish. They did play a defensive set up (of course they did - anyone who expected any different should lie down for a while with a damp cloth on their forehead) making it a tough outing for forwards like Dr. Crokes' Michael Lenihan and Tom Doyle. But Cork manager Pat Ryan, whose side face Limerick next Monday in the semi-final and will likely contest a third Munster Final in a row against a fancied Tipperary, came off the field looking worried (to be fair, he had almost certainly kept a few aces in reserve) while Kerry manger Fintan O'Connor had a real and justified spring in his step.

MINOR

Tipperary Kerry

Look, we were more likely to win the U20 than this one, and everybody knew it. Kerry have been in the same middle ground at minor as in U20. We have been very, very strong at the B grade....but there's a huge gulf between the A and B grades. Kerry made a good start here and actually led early on, Ronan Walsh picking off three early points. Tipperary always had a higher gear and simply stepped on it at 0-5 apiece to add 8 unanswered points. It was double scores at half-time, 0-14 to 0-7, and was never coming back. Tipperary scored at will in the third quarter. To be honest, Tipperary could have gone for goals in the second half if they had wanted to be ruthless. No fault to Kerry, who gave it everything, but we simply aren't ready yet to compete at this level. Nice to see South Kerry players doing well for Kerry. Dual player Luke Crowley (Rathmore) in midfield was one of Kerry's better players, Charlie Keating (Dr. Crokes) picked off a great first half point, Liam Palmer hunted and harried all day, while Eoin O'Shea (Kilgarvan) impressed off the bench.

SOCCER

Let's be nice. If we have to mention Finland, let's do it in a nice context. Did you know that Finland is the original home Sinter Klaas, the original Santa Claus? Or that it has a spy museum? It's a lack of quality players as opposed to honest but limited ones is our problem, not tactics, and the myth of magic managers that prevails in all sports in modern media only impacts sensationalist headlines, not long-term results. Let's not talk about John Delaney, either. Apparently he needs more time to examine his own documents, which are being examined by the ODCE as part of a criminal investigation into his activities. Ah, John, you loveably ridiculous scamp, you make Pat Hickey or the original gangster himself, Charlie Haughey, look competent. And that's saying something.

My best wishes to new FAI CEO Jonathan Hill. Is it too early for a sympathy card? Hi first job should (but probably won't) be to develop a proper support system for the League of Ireland - Cork City FC's travails are only indicative of a deeper problem there. The Premier League is still a television solace for those who love talking about sport more than actually playing it. Spurs coughing up a 3-0 lead to West Ham was....actually, I'm trying to think of a polite euphemism for 'hilarious'. Mourinho, love him or loathe him....and ever since his appalling conduct towards Anders Frisk, I incline towards the latter....but he is a special kind of entertainment.

I'll give Arsene Wenger's autobiography a skip. I like Wenger; he always showed an old-

They are already guaranteed to join Kennelly, Jim Stynes and another former Kerry minor, Seán Wight, in being the only Irish players to play in a Grand Final. Mark was inducted into Geelong's seven-man leadership group alongside Tuohy earlier this year - just trust me, that's a very big deal in AFL, and indicative of his importance in games like this. Stefan Okunbor, another All Ireland winning Kerry minor, hasn't been with Geelong for as long as Mark, but he is definitely heading on the same road, while Deividas Uosis will no doubt share a bit of banter when next he meets up with Stefan who is on the books with Brisbane!

As expected, the most significant change for the sport was the approval of a recommendation to the International Olympic Committee that coastal rowing events be included for the Olympics in Paris 2024. The international standard for coastal rowing, with two sculling oars per rower and a sliding seat, is known as offshore rowing in Ireland. This is to distinguish it from traditional Irish coastal rowing which mainly relates to fixed seat rowing using a single oar per rower. The additional events proposed for Paris include a Mens Solo (1x), Womens Solo (1x) and Mixed Double (2x). The IOC Executive Board is due to confirm the programme for Paris 2024 at a meeting in December.

Level Five What it means to you ...

At Level 5, the public health risk means that you will be asked to stay at home, with certain exceptions. There will be no gatherings other than small numbers at funerals and weddings.

Social and family gatherings

If you live alone - you can form a support bubble with another household.

In your home or garden

There should be no other visits to homes or gardens.

Other settings outside your home or garden

It is possible to meet with 1 other household in an outdoor setting which is not a home or garden, such as a park, including for exercise.

No other social or family gatherings should take place.

Weddings

Up to 25 guests can attend a wedding ceremony and reception, whether indoors or outdoors.

Organised indoor gatherings

No organised indoor gatherings should take place.

Organised outdoor gatherings

No organised outdoor gatherings should take place.

Exercise and sporting events

Training and matches

No training or matches should take place, with the following exceptions:

non-contact training can continue for school aged children, outdoors in pods of 15 professional, elite sports and inter-county Gaelic games, horse-racing and greyhound racing are permitted to continue behind closed doors All other training activities should be individual only.

No exercise or dance classes are permitted. Gyms, leisure centres and swimming pools Gyms/leisure centres/swimming pools closed. *Religious services* Services will be held online.

Funerals Up to 25 mourners can attend.

Museums, galleries and other cultural attractions All venues closed.

Libraries will be available for online services only.

Bars, cafes and restaurants (including hotel restaurants and bars) Take away food or delivery only.

Wet pubs Take away or delivery only. Wet pubs in Dublin remain closed.

Nightclubs, discos, casinos

Nightclubs, discos and casinos will remain closed.

Hotels and accommodation

Hotels, guesthouses and B&Bs may remain open, but only to support provision of essential services. Retail and services (for example: hairdressers,

beauticians, barbers) Face coverings must be worn.

Essential retail and essential services will remain open. This includes food shopping. All other retail and personal services are closed.

Work

You should work from home unless you are providing an essential service for which your physical presence is required.

Domestic travel restrictions

Stay at home.

Exercise within 5 kilometres of home. There will be a penalty for movement outside 5 kilometres of home, with the following exceptions:

travel to and from work, where work involves providing an essential service

to attend medical appointments and collect medicines and other health products

travel to attend disability day services for food shopping

for vital family reasons, such as providing care to children, elderly or vulnerable people, and in particular for those who live alone but excluding social family visits

for farming purposes, that is food production or care of animals

to attend a wedding or funeral

to visit a grave

Schools and creches

In line with current NPHET advice in respect of Level 5, schools, early learning and childcare services will continue to remain open and are deemed essential.

Higher and adult education

Primarily online with exemptions for essential onsite activities.

Outdoor playgrounds, play areas and parksOpen with protective measures in place.

Transport

Face coverings must be worn. Walk or cycle where possible. Public transport will operate at 25% capacity for the purposes of allowing those providing essential services to get to work. School transport is unaffected.

Over 70 and medically vulnerable individuals

Those aged over 70 and the medically vulnerable are advised to continue to exercise personal judgement.

It is recommended that they stay at home as much as possible, limit engagement to a very small network for short periods of time, while remaining physically distanced.

When taking exercise outdoors, it is important to maintain 2 metres distance from others and wash hands on returning home.

It is recommended to shop during designated hours only, while wearing a face covering, and to avoid public transport.

Visiting long-term residential care facilities (nursing and care homes)

Suspended, with the exception of visits required for critical and compassionate circumstances.

WHAT IS A SUPPPORT BUBBLE

What a support bubble is

To support those who risk isolation, a 'social bubble' will apply for the duration of Level 5. In certain situations, you can form a bubble with 1 other household (of any size).

You can then act as one extended household. You must still keep physical distance from people outside your support bubble.

Who can form a support bubble

You can form a support bubble with another household in any of the following situations:

if you are living alone with children under the age of 18

if you live alone and have mental health challenges

if you share parenting or custody arrangements

if you live with a partner who has dementia (needs full-time care)

if you live by yourself and have a carer or carers who support you

How to form your support bubble

Support bubbles are designed to help you

if you live on your own. You can only form a support bubble with one other household if they are not already part of a support bubble. Wherever possible, you should choose a household in your locality to form your support bubble, but it can be outside the 5 kilometre limit.

The reason for this is to prevent the spread of COVID-19 between areas that might have lots of cases and ones that have low numbers of cases.

FOCUS ON TREES

Trees are beautiful in any garden and their long life makes them a wonderful garden feature. A tree should be the first think you plant in your garden after the hedging – they can be underplanted afterwards with bulbs and shrubs. Trees are interesting in all four seasons with attractive unfolding of leaves in spring, full foliage in summer, good Autumn colour followed decorative bark in the Winter. The first and most important think you need to know when buying a tree is what's the height and spread going to be when it is mature. There are many varieties of trees to choose from and there is a tree suitable for most areas. Trees can be planted all year round but as with hedging, trees can be planted when they are dormant between November and March.

When planting your bare rooted tree, dig the hole big enough that you can spreads out the roots all around the hole. Then drive your stake into the hole roughly about 6 to 8 inches below the bottom of the hole, place your tree and spread the roots out well. If possible place your stake on the side of the prevailing winds as this will ensure that the tree is blown up against the stake when the wind is high. Fill in the soil mixed with compost around the roots and firm in with the heel of your foot. Lastly place your tree ties on — one near the top and one at the bottom with a spacer in between to stop the bark being damaged by the stake.
