

JEWEL IN THE CROWN...

A spectacular looped walk along the shores of the lakes of Killarney has received a major boost with the announcement that a half a million euro in funding has been allocated to the project.

The attraction which is considered to be the glittering jewel in the crown in the town will add to the already impressive list of famous attractions.

Local tourism industry chiefs have been working on the development of the looped walk, along the lakeshore, which will encompass some of the most spectacular scenery in the country.

Confirmation that half a million euro in funding has been allocated to the project by the Department of Rural and Community Affairs has sparked great celebrations in the town where locals insist it is one of the most exciting projects every undertaken in the country.

The 9km trail, when complete, will meander through rich woodlands on the slopes of the 735m Tomies mountain and wind its way along the shores of Lough Lein and the spectacular O'Sullivan's Cascade.

The trail is steeped in Irish mythology with Tomies Woods said to have been the summer hunting grounds of warrior hunter Fionn MacCumhaill. Legend also has it that the cairn of stones on the summit of Tomies Mountain is the burial place of an ancient Irish chieftain. Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President, Paul O'Neill, said the €500,000 in State funding will allow a long-time dream to be realised for everybody associated with the project.

"It is fantastic news and a wonderful way to end what has been a hugely successful year for tourism in Killarney.

"We are very grateful to Minister Brendan

Griffin and Minister Michael Ring for this fantastic gesture and we are confident that Killarney will rise to the challenge of creating yet another exceptional gem for Irish tourism through the looped walk at Tomies," he said.

The Government has rubber-stamped €500,000 for the development of the Tomies Wood car park and walk, while a further €208,000 has been approved for a major upgrade of the Dingle Way.

Minister Griffin said: "This is great news for the tourism industry in Kerry. It is crucial that we invest in such world class locations to ensure that they can facilitate visitors sustainably so that everyone can enjoy the experience when they go there".

The Killarney funding will allow for car parking and access to Tomies Wood and the breathtaking O'Sullivan's Cascade as well as path maintenance and restoration on the Dingle Way which is a huge attraction and economic driver throughout the Dingle Peninsula.

WEESHIE THE NARRATOR OF THE KERRY STORY

TRALEE OUTLOOK EDITOR DONAL BARRY -

I t was the John F Kennedy moment of our time. Where were you when you got the news that Weeshie Fogarty died. It will be a day, that even those visiting the county will remember with the amount of Kerry people speaking about it, the amount of social media coverage and the amount of high profile and no profile people taking their time to share a Weeshie story.

In many ways, speaking about the great man is a fitting tribute for a man who spent his whole life, talking.

Talking to people about people. Talking to All Ireland champions and those who never made it to the line, talking to those who he fondly remembered in St Finans and indeed talking to those who had any Kerry connection all over the world.

It may have been his voice that drew attention but it was his attention to details that got him remembered. He was able to bridge the generation gap by uniting today's sports stars with their grandparents. He was a man of his locality and he valued others for their love of place, whether it was

Main Street in Killarney or Rock Street in Tralee, he knew how important it was to each person.

I first met Weeshie, as a student, preparing for the big bad

world of Journalism, when he wrote the back sports page of the Kerry People in Killarney. Even then, back in 1992, I knew Weeshie was special. He took time to ask me my name and where I was from. It meant a lot to a young person, who was ignored by most in seniority, as was the practice at the time. He was not afraid to share knowledge with me.

Our paths would cross on a number of times later in life, on Terrace Talk, on the Street, randomly shopping at LIDL, at his book launches and at a number of matches from Schools games to Senior football county championships to even the great days out at Croke Park.

He never forgot anyone and he wanted to know about those that he did not know. I heard it said that he was a GAA man; to suggest that or to believe is nowhere near the mark of the man.

Weeshie was far more than that. He was a man who loved all Sports, loved his Manchester United, loved his basketball, loved everyone from Kerry who was doing well in sport and even if they were not, that did not matter to him. He was also one of those rare people that treated female sport on a par as male sport.

He may be gone but the memories he created for us, will live long after all Weeshie narrated all the best bits for us.

NO MATTER WHERE YOU MET WEESHIE, HE HAD TIME TO STOP AND CHAT

rom my first time meeting him in the early days of The Kingdom Newspaper (Now & Then) back in the '80's to his regular visits to the Killarney Outlook, Weeshie was a gentleman through and through.

In 2016 Killarney Outlook had the privilege of publishing a collection of Weeshie's photographs on a weekly basis in a Legion of Memories.

The old photographs from the club which Weeshie loved so much, created a stir every week, and regular requests from readers for a copy of the picture were always met with a yes from the man himself.

Weeshie shared his love and knowledge of sport with each and everyone and always left you with the words.... Goodbye my friend. While tributes to Weeshie come in from all over Ireland and further afield, it will be his close friends and family that will miss Weeshie the most. The world has said farewell to a legend this week. Rest in Peace Weeshie.

Weeshie's knowledge of Gaelic games was encyclopaedic

was privileged and honoured to call Weeshie Fogarty a good friend and colleague from those early days. Weeshie's knowledge of Gaelic games was encyclopaedic. In his youth, he was an exceptional sportsman. He played in six county senior football finals with East Kerry, winning four. He lined out with Kerry and was 'understudy' to his boyhood friend and Legion club mate Johnny Culloty in the 1969 and '70 All-Ireland winning sides.

He was part of the panel that toured Australia in 1970. He did not confine his sporting interest to Gaelic games. He had a deep love of Manchester United and was a fanatical supporter. He played basketball with the Busby Babes in Killarney and was a gifted snooker player.

Due to injury, Weeshie's playing career was cut short and he took up refereeing. He quickly became one of the country's top referees handling many key assignments up and down the country. The highlights of his career included being in charge of the 1981 All-Ireland SFC semi-final between Down and Offaly, the Offaly-Galway clash in 1982 and the 1983 League final featuring Down and

Armagh, but refereeing an All-Ireland senior final eluded him due to Kerry's dominance in the 1980s.

Weeshie's career in broadcasting and media began in 1990 shortly after Radio Kerry went on the airwaves where he began reporting on club games. Shortly after, he became Liam Higgins' co-commentator for all the key Kerry games in league and championship.

Weeshie was a very popular figure in press boxes up and down the country, which was no surprise. From Fitzgerald Stadium to Casement Park in Belfast and Ruislip in London to Gaelic Park in New York he was known and loved by Irish people.

conic figures all throughout time are set apart from everyone else by their names. Gandhi,Pele,Muhammad Ali, Messi transcend time, with their name instantly evoking an image. When Aloysius Fogarty was baptised in 1941,there wasn't too many of that name in Killarney. The name was unique,as was its abbreviation, Weeshie. It was almost as if his name was to be given to someone who was going to be set above everyone else.

My first experience of Weeshie was as an exuberant 5 year old in Knockreer on my first day in Legion. Our group were like a field full of leaves blown in every direction by a gale, uncontrollable. With one shrill blast of a whistle we were brought to attention. We were coralled into a tight group by our trainer who introduced himself as Weeshie. He immediately put us to task and our first skill to be practised was fielding. To this day I can still see him demonstrate to us the shape our hands should make to successfully field the ball. "My name is Weeshie, Weeshie starts with a W, so I want you to make a W shape with your 2 hands and catch the ball".It was an easy sell on how to perfect that skill. As we grew and continued our Legion life, Weeshie was a constant. He managed our U12 team, who went through the whole season unbeaten, taking all titles. I particularly remember our first session in February where he politely observed that I had

wintered well. It could well have been the same day that I had a clash of heads and blood was drawn. Weeshie immediately packed me off in his car, brought me to Dr Fullers and stayed while stitches were administered to my head wound. He then dropped me home and declared me fit for the next game. To players of my generation Weeshie was not alone a huge influence but also most generous of his time. It was only with the fullness of time that we realised he was combining training us with an officership in the club, being an intercounty referee,working as a psychiatric nurse all on top of his family life. As time went by and I drifted into the administration side of the club,

Weeshies ideology could again be seen. He always urged that you think outside the box. That if you took on an officership it was your duty to advance that role and leave it in a better place for those who followed. It was his role as Legion PRO, in the mid 1990s, and the innovative way he approached it, that lead him to broadening his involvement into the written and spoken media. He was an always present figure who you could turn to for advice at any time because you knew what you were getting with Weeshie. The good of the club was the foremost in his mind. And he never ever forgot his club. Every chance he got(and there were many) he promoted it.It would be impossible to quantify

the impact he had within the club, it was that big. And yet it was only when he sadly passed away last Sunday, that us club members could fully evaluate how he was perceived outside our circle. News bulletins, Live match broadcasts and Facebook were awash with tributes. He would have smiled to know that he was trending on Twitter.

To best sum up Weeshie I regale a story of meeting him in Dublin Airport after a Kerry jaunt in Croke Park.I was with some fellow Legionnaires as we bumped into Weeshie in the check in area. He was keen to get our views on the game as we set off towards the departure gate. As we walked and talked Weeshie spotted a piece of paper on the floor. It was a boarding card. In his usual dulcet tone he called out the name on the card and the three lads in front of us stopped and turned in the

same movement, in recognition of the voice. The all important pass to the plane was secondary. They were agog to be in the presence of the Voice of the Kingdom. The flight home went like a blink as Weeshie held court in the cabin as an unofficial Terrace Talk broke out.

Despite his illness in recent years he endeavoured to keep apace with club affairs. I was tasked with giving him the DVDs of any club matches and his analysis and observations were as sharp as those he gave from the lofty heights of the Hogan Stand.

To the World he was Weeshie Fogarty, the Voice of Kerry Football. In a time when Kerry football, both club and county, were riding high, he painted, with his words, a wondrous picture.

To his clubmates he was an officer, manager, trainer, coach, advisor, mentor and above all friend.

KILLARNEY LEGION STATEMENT

Killarney Legion Gaa Club were deeply saddened to learn this morning of the passing of club President Weeshie Fogarty (March 1941). Weeshie has been synonymous with the club throughout his life, he has served the club in every capacity from player, trainer, mentor and officer in the club. Weeshie was a member of the clubs winning O'Donoghue cup team of 1967. Weeshie also represented Kerry with distinction at minor, U-21, Junior and Senior level. Weeshie won an All Ireland Junior medal in 1967 and he was a member of the victorious All Ireland senior winning team of 1969. Weeshie also represented East Kerry where he won 4 county championships and one All Ireland club championship. When an unfortunate injury cut short his playing career he turned to refereeing and became one of the leading inter-county referees in the country, taking charge of three all All-Ireland football semi-finals.

Weeshie was heavily involved in all club activities and was the driving force behind the publication of the book A Legion of memories which detailed the history of the club through its first 50 years. Weeshie was of course known throughout the country for his work with Radio Kerry show Terrace Talk, which featured audio interviews with some of Ireland's greatest sporting legends and personalities. Weeshie was awarded a McNamee award in 2004 and he was inducted to McNamee hall of fame in 2016.

A FRONTLINE REPORT FROM THE WAR OF THE RHODOS

The civic and pioneering initiative is a joint partnership with Killarney Chamber of Tourism & Commerce, Haven Pharmacy, Killarney Meitheal Group and Killarney National Park. Through the generosity of Killarney Chamber & Hoteliers, all those attending will be accommodated and fed for the duration of their stay in Killarney.PHOTO:VALERIE O'SULLIVAN

n 1861, Queen Victoria and Prince Albert embarked on a four-day visit to Killarney. The Queen and her party were lavished with all the luxury Kerry could muster.

Killarney continues to bask in the afterglow of that august visit. Victoria's visit lit the touchpaper on the Irish tourist industry as we know it today, and the Co. Kerry town has never looked back.

As far as we're aware, none of the 45 men's sheds members who touched down in Killarney on November 4th are of royal lineage. That, however, did not prevent the people, businesses and hoteliers of Killarney from rolling out the red carpet.

The men's sheds members arrived at the invitation of Haven Pharmacy, the Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce (which organised all accommodation, completely free of charge), the National Parks and Wildlife Service and the trustees of Muckross House.

They'd come to tackle the spread of invasive rhododendron, which continues to blight Killarney National Park despite ongoing and strenuous efforts to keep it under control. Last year's men's sheds expedition cleared a significant acreage of the dreaded shrub, and all parties were more than willing to take up the cudgels once more.

Members descended upon Killarney from locations as diverse as Toome, Waterford city, Dunboyne and Abbeyfeale. Upon arrival on Sunday, November 4th, the intrepid rhodobattlers were feted at Muckross Park Hotel.

Kerry MEP Sean Kelly, who recently presented the Irish Men's Sheds Association with the European Citizens' Prize, was on-hand to welcome members to the Kingdom. "I've been told", said Sean, "that this trip was well oversubscribed, which just shows the attitude and the positivity of men's sheds members, so many of whom want to come here to do tough enough work that's of huge benefit to the

environment and to Killarney generally".

Michael Gleeson then welcomed members to Killarney, on behalf of the Municipal District Council and the trustees of Muckross House. "Men's sheds members daily enhance and inspire", he said; "the shed movement has changed lives, has re-energised communities and has taught us that no-one is ever too old or too untalented to do good for self and for others".

After a further welcome from Haven't Finbarr Kennelly and a briefing from Tim Cahillane of the National Parks & Wildlife Service, members were ready to join battle at a location near the iconic Torc waterfall the following morning. Monday morning brought a sight to gladden the heart in troubled times. Beneath the autumnal forest canopy, shading from green

to russet-red to brown and gold, dozens of men's sheds members, smartly decked out in Haven Pharmacy hi-vis, filed up the gentle slopes.

The air was soon filled with the gentle thwack of hatchet on wood, the brittle crack of loose twigs trampled underfoot, and the goodnatured badinage of men from the four corners of Ireland forging bonds of friendship. Fortified by lunch at the spectacular Muckross House, the men's shed contingent sallied forth to tackle the rhododendrons again in the afternoon, before attending a lively social evening at Killarney Men's Shed. Despite heavy rainfall, the members took to the park again on Tuesday, before departing on Wednesday morning.

Yes, because some of the Irish mortgage lenders have much lower mortgage interest rates compared to others. 

CALL TO PROVIDE POWER CONNECTION FOR LOCAL DEFIBRILLATORS

*Ilr Brendan Cronin has called on the Local Authority to do its part in supporting the great work of the local community by providing a power connection for the two defibrillator units located on Woodlawn Road and Main Street.

Cllr Cronin drew the attention of a full Council meeting to the admirable work undertaken by local community groups in the upkeep and maintenance of defibrillator units. All with locally raised funding.

He reminded the meeting that as recently as December 2014, a defibrillator saved the life of 16 year old Tom Geaney, when he was helping train the Killarney Celtic under-11's, at Celtic's ground in Derreen. Had Tom collapsed at home, with no one around, he wouldn't be here today to speak of his near-death experience.

Councillor Cronin said it was "amazing that I volunteered monies from my allocation to supply a light and that request is still very much in the dark"

He informed the council he had



visited his nearby defibrillator kiosk, and noticed that it was difficult to gain entry because it was not illuminated for ease of access.

He remarked that it seemed unreasonable to illuminate the recently dedicated wooden statue of a leaping deer, with no less than four lights, but not to supply, at council expense a small power supply to make the defibrillators easy to identify in the dark.

Council declared supportive of the idea and offered to support local communities in the provision of a power supply to such facilities, subject to the costs.

6 Year Old Wants to Climb Every Mountain

It would be safe to say that most 6 year olds have not climbed Carrauntoohil, never mind one of the highest mountains in the world. But Joshua, a Senior Infants pupil in St. Oliver's National School, Killarney, is no ordinary 6 year old. He has set a new world record as the youngest person to ever climb Mount Toubkal in Morocco. At 4,167 metres Toubkal is the highest mountain in North Africa, whilst Carrauntoohil stands at 1,038.6 metres. Josh is in Miss Dennehy's class and his mom spoke to the Killarney Outlook to tell us all about his epic climb "The altitude was 4,167 metres, and we climbed over 2 days. Our first day was a 4 hour trek to a mountain refuge where we spent the night. We set off for the summit at 7am the next morning, wearing crampons on our feet. We climbed for 6

hours up a steep snow and ice slope, which was a 40 degree gradient in places. Josh was very strong even at this altitude." Josh climbed the mountain with his mom and her partner Lucky Flynn. Both are keen climbers and spend a lot of time in the Reeks. They have previously spent time in Nepal where Josh developed an interest in mountaineering. Josh was the youngest person this year to climb Carrauntoohil, and they are planning on doing Kilimanjaro next. Josh would be the youngest person to climb this mountain too. They hope to raise money for Make a Wish Foundation. Josh says he would like to be the youngest person ever to climb Mount Everest someday, and also the first Irish person to summit Annapurna. His mom is very proud of his achievement.

The hard-hitting bye-laws which come into force in January seek to ensure all citizens dispose of their waste by using an authorised waste contractor, by taking it to an approved waste facility, or by a bin-sharing agreement. Offenders could also face fines of up to €2,500 for putting recyclables into their rubbish bins or for not storing bins properly.



Weeshie's love of Basketball

Eamonn Keogh recalls Weeshie Fogarty's long association with Killarney Basketball

ondly remembered by many as a broadcasting legend, gaelic footballer and referee, the late great Weeshie Fogarty was a wonderful supporter and ambassador for Killarney basketball and had a deep love for the game that he excelled at in his playing days. Weeshie had no hesitation admitting that after gaelic football, basketball had always been his second favourite sport.

Growing up on Lower New Street, Killarney, Weeshie was only ten years old when the first Killarney Basketball Club was founded by Ben Campion in October 1951. Weeshie was present when the very first game of basketball took place in November of that year in the old Killarney Town Hall and he also had the thrill of watching the high flying Harlem Globetrotters playing an exhibition match on an outdoor court at Killarney Race Course in the mid 1950s. Basketball continued to grow during the 1950s with The Killarney Town Hall hosting the All Ireland Basketball Championship finals in October 1955.


Several Killarney teams began to emerge throughout the 1950s and 60s to participate in a local town league. The United, New Street, High Street, Arbutus Eagles, Ross Rovers, Woodlawn Rangers, St. Mary's, The Panthers, The Warriors, The Red Devils, The Jokers, The Battleships, The Shadows and The Rockets were just some of those teams.

With Basketball booming in Killarney and throughout Kerry, Weeshie and his sports mad friends Louis Nolan, Mick O'Sullivan, Donal Courtney, Jimmy O'Leary, Jerry Looney and Noel O'Connor decided to form their own basketball team and decided to call themselves "The Busby Babes". Weeshie himself often told the story about sitting down and drafting a letter to Matt Busby, then Manchester United manager.

A few weeks later a brown box arrived at the home of Mick O'Sullivan in Daltons Avenue and it contained eleven red jerseys with white collars and all sporting huge numbers on the back. A short letter signed by the great man himself wished the lads every success and added that the enclosed jerseys had been worn by "The Babes" in some of their great triumphs.

Ironically the Killarney Busby Babes team wore the famous jerseys for the very first time on February 6th 1958, the same date as the Munich air disaster when British European Airways Flight 609 carrying the Manchester United team, officials and journalists crashed on a the snow covered Munich runway resulting in 23 fatalities with 21 survivors.

Weeshie and The Killarney Busby Babes basketball team team went on to win numerous Killarney town leagues and championships. By the mid to late 1960s the Busby Babes were the main basketball team in Killarney and in the 1966-67 season the Babes won senior and minor county championship titles while the



junior team lost a final in overtime toThe Red Devils. Weeshie played on that Busby Babes senior team alongside his brother Geni Fogarty, Tadghie Fleming, Jackie Looney, Pat Somers, Johnny Culloty and Tommy 'Bracker' O'Regan. The Babes also went on to represent Kerry in the Munster championship and in a dramatic two-legged affair they beat Cork champions Neptune by one point.

The Busby Babes were also strengthened with the emergence of somegreat young players in this period, particularly the late Paudie O'Connor, a neighbour and friend of Weeshie, who he described as the greatest Kerry born basketball player he had ever seen and the greatest innovator of the sport of basketball in his era.

Weeshie, who was living in O'Sullivan's Place at this stage, alsorecalled a fascinating and proud story about his neighbours who won

three different All Ireland titles in 1969. Paudie O'Connor had the All Ireland senior and minor basketball Cups in O'Sullivan's Place, his near neighbour Vince Johnson was the All Ireland fly fishing champion and another neighbour Johnny Culloty had captained Kerry to win their 21st senior All Ireland title to bring the Sam Maguire Cup to the small housing estate. Weeshie's basketball playing days came to an

end during the 1970s but he never lost interest in the game and he was a passionite supporter of the great St. Vincent's Gleneagle Killarney team in the late 70s and early 1980s. He enjoyed the big nights at a packed St. Brendan's Gym during these glory days when Gleneagle won national titles as well as suffering an agonising overtime loss to Doncaster in the Federation Cup Final in 1982.

His interest in Killarney basketball never waned and he followed the fortunes of St. Paul's Basketball Club during the 1990s right up to the present day. He was always obliging and very supportive in promoting Killarney basketball giving it prominent coverage on his radio show on several occasions.

In an article he wrote for a St. Paul's programme a number of years ago, Weeshie wished the club every success stating that St. Paul's are the heirs to a precious tradition of basketball in Killarney, a tradition handed down from that first ever match played in the town in 1951.

Sincere condolences are extended to Weeshie's wife Joan, daughters Denise and Carolann and son Kieran, son-in-law Glenn, granddaughters Lucy and Eva, sister Sheila, and extended family.

Killarney Legion Gaa Club were deeply saddened to learn this morning of the passing of club President Weeshie Fogarty (March 1941-Nov 18). Weeshie has been synonymous with the club throughout his life, he has served the club in every capacity from player, trainer, mentor and officer in the club. Weeshie was a member of the clubs winning O'Donoghue cup team of 1967. Weeshie also represented Kerry with distinction at minor, U-21, Junior and Senior level. Weeshie won an All Ireland Junior medal in 1967 and he was a member of the victorious All Ireland senior winning team of 1969.

Weeshie also represented East Kerry where he won 4 county championships and one All Ireland club championship. When an unfortunate injury cut short his playing career he turned to refereeing and became one of the leading inter-county referees in the country, taking charge of three all All-Ireland football semi-finals. Weeshie was heavily involved in

all club activities and was the driving force behind the publication of the book A Legion of memories which detailed the history of the club through its first 50 years.

Weeshie was of course known throughout the country for his work with Radio Kerry show Terrace Talk, which featured audio interviews with some of Ireland's greatest sporting legends and personalities. Weeshie was awarded a Mcnamee award in 2004 and he was inducted to McNamee hall of fame in 2016.

The word legend is sometimes over used but Weeshie Fogarty was a club legend and his passing leaves a huge void in our club. The club would like to extend our deepest sympathies to his wife Joan son Kieran daughters Denise & Carolann and his extended family and his many friends.

Weeshie has an impressive role of honour, which spans every aspect of GAA life. He joined his club (Killarney Legion) as a youngster. Weeshie played at underage and Senior with his club and District, winning 3 in a row County Championship titles with East Kerry, in 1968 (as team captain), 1969 and 1970. He also won 2 Munster club SFC titles with East Kerry and an All Ireland club championship title with East Kerry, in 1971. Weeshie won an East Kerry Dr ODonoghue Cup medal in 1967 with his club. He played on the Kerry Minor team(1959) and won an U21 Munster medal with Kerry in 1962. Weeshie won an All Ireland Junior Football Championship Medal in 1967 and an All Ireland Senior Championship medal with Kerry in 1969. Weeshie served as club secretary from 1972 to 1976(inclusive) and also progressed to a hugly successful career as referee, at District, County and Inter County levels. These included Dr ODonoghue Cup Finals and County Championship Finals. He was the man in the middle for a number of Senior All Ireland Football Semi Finals and the U21 All Ireland Football Final in 1980.

Weeshie was the referee in 4 Dr O Donoghue Cup Finals- 1969, 1974, 1979 and 1983.

East Kerry were honoured to have Weeshie support the successful Killarney Feile Parade in 2016. It's all to play for...

Dr Crokes' Micheál Burns speaking ahead of the AIB GAA Munster Senior Football Club Championship Final

"he 'Gooch' has had to make do with a substitute role in recent championship outings for Dr Crokes, but the 35-year-old has continued to put his best foot forward.

Perhaps other men with as much silverware on the mantelpiece — five All-Irelands, nine Munsters, four Leagues, and eight All-Stars might create a stir if they were not starting, but not Cooper.

The Killarney side will face Miltown-Malbay of Clare at the Gaelic Grounds on Sunday next, November 25th, with their star man likely on the bench once more as they look to regain

their AIB Munster crown.

"Colm got sick before the Kerins O'Rahilly's game and Tony Brosnan came in and kicked outrageous scores," says Burns, at the launch of the AIB GAA Munster Senior Football Club Championship Final.

"In 2017, I wasn't getting my place and maybe I wasn't too happy about it. Seeing the way Colm has reacted to this now is making me feel bad about the way I was at times during that campaign. He's driving everything, he's completely about the team.

"Obviously, he's probably not happy about not starting, but he won't let it affect any decision he makes. The man is a genius, he's on a different level. Even the body might be slowing down a bit, but he just sees everything... I don't know what it is that sets him apart, but it's all the small details, the little movements. I'd say when he gets the ball, time just slows down or something; everything is on the money."

Burns has had a busy couple of years, one that began with looking for a place on his club team, to getting a call-up with the county in 2018. After winning the AIB All-Ireland club title as a 39th-minute sub in 2017, he has achieved both of those aims.

Crokes are looking to win a fifth AIB Munster title this decade alone, which would be an incredible achievement considering only they and Nemo Rangers have won more than four throughout the history of this competition. The Cork side beat them in the final last year with five points to spare, and it was a defeat that cut deeply.

"That defeat to Nemo stung badly, we got a lot





of criticism for that, for not performing on the day and maybe taking them for granted, which we didn't in the slightest," says Burns. "We prepared for that game as hard as we would for any, but they were just better than us on the day.

"The game hurt because we were on the road again (in the championship) and trying to get back to Croke Park. This year again you can see now that (manager) Pat O'Shea has stepped it up another level.

"The core group of this Croke's team: the likes of Kieran O'Leary, Brian Looney, Luke Quinn, John Payne, 'Smiler' (Mike Moloney), for fellas who have seven or eight county medals, the drive they're showing is such an example to younger players.

'To see that they've won so much, and they still want more and more and more, it really would keep you going. It makes you want to push on and win as much as you can while you're playing. Your playing days don't last too long."

The dynamic forward is fully focused on his club commitments just now but making a push with Kerry in 2019 is also on his radar. After achieving great success with the county minors, Peter Keane has been appointed as Eamonn Fitzmaurice's successor for the senior role. Burns recalls the Cahirciveen man being involved as a minor selector in 2013, but "wouldn't know him too well."

The Kingdom won Munster last season but came up short in the Super 8s: losing to Galway, then snatching a draw away to Monaghan, before winning against Kildare. From the outside looking in, Kerry seem to be lagging behind top sides such as Dublin.

"I think losing to Galway put pressure on us and put a lot of focus on us," Burns explains. "We're a young team and things didn't go our way, but we're not that far off... Dublin are the team that everyone is trying to catch. It'll happen for us if we keep pushing."

Burns may be a Dr Crokes mainstay by now but his father Micheál was originally a Sneem man. They have the same first name, but the younger is referred to as 'MJ' by his clubmates, while the more senior man goes by 'Mickey Joe'. As is so often the case, the father was a huge influence on his son's progression in the game. "He would actually be a South Kerry, down in Peter Keane's neck of the woods," says MJ. "He would have managed his own club, Sneem. I remember when I was growing up watching them when he was the manager. They were after going up to Division 1 and they were playing against Crokes, which was a massive occasion in the small village to have them coming. Kerry Clubs in Munster Action





A FEW FACTS ABOUT THE MATERNAL SIDE OF JOHN F. KENNEDY'S ANCESTORS

On this date 55 years ago those who had heard the terrible news that that US President John F. Kennedy had been murdered on November 22nd were in shock and disbelief but particularly in Rural Ireland in a time when the majority of people did not have Radios or Telephones the word did not really spread until the following day, when people met up at the local shop, creamery, Post Office or pub.

Thomas Fitzgerald and Mary Ann Fitzgerald — the maternal grandfather and grandmother to JFK's mother, Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy — were cousins who lived beside each other on the Palatine Rd in Bruff, Co. Limerick. Records show that both houses were rented from local landlords. When they left Bruff to go to Boston Thomas was 27 and Mary Ann was 16 and amongst their possessions was a Bible – little did the poverty stricken couple know at the time that the very same Bible would be used to swear in their great great-grandson John F Kennedy as the 35th President of the United States of America.

Jack's maternal grandfather, John F. Fitzgerald, was in born in Boston in 1863, the fourth of 12 children. In 1889 he married Mary Josephine Hannon who was born in Acton, in Middlesex County, Massachusetts, his second cousin and whose father Michael Hannon was from the Lough Gur area in County Limerick between the towns of Herbertstown and Bruff.

They had six children the oldest Rose Elizabeth born in 1890 was President Kennedy's mother.

Joseph Kennedy, President Kennedy's father whose grandparents had emigrated from Dunganstown and New Ross in County Wexford was born in 1888; he was a student at Boston Latin, where as an Irish Catholic he was in the distinct minority. Joe excelled both academically and at sports, and won the Mayor's Cup, for being the high school student with the highest average in the state. Joe then went on to Harvard University. While at Harvard, Joe launched his first successful business venture, buying a tour bus operator business for \$600 and turning a \$10,000 profit after two summers of operation.

Joe Kennedy and Rose Fitzgerald first met and fell in love in the summer of 1906. At that point, her father did not think Joe was a suitable suitor for his daughter's hand. However, the couple were determined to marry and in October 1914, after a four month formal engagement, the two were wed.

One of the lines in the many songs dedicated to President Kennedy says 'If he had lived for another decade old Ireland might be free' with his outstanding love of Ireland that might have come true, and for certain if he had lived to serve a second term and his brother Robert had then been elected US President we would now be living in a far better world.

The man who in June of that fateful year had promised to return could not do so due to a cowards bullet, but many people in Ireland will never forget the pride he gave us in being Irish and we also have to thank his wife Jackie who



despite her grief arranged for an Irish Guard of Honour during his funeral and for a woman to lay our Flag on his grave.

WINTER CAN BE AS HARD ON PETS AS IT IS ON PEOPLE

During the shorter, darker days of winter many of us turn lethargic and gloomy. But seasonal affective disorder (SAD) isn't just a human affliction. The animals we share our lives with may also suffer from something akin to the "winter blues."

According to the American Institute of Mental Health, SAD isn't just a weather-related funk, but a type of depression that fluctuates with the seasons and causes unpleasant symptoms like sluggishness, increased appetite, depression, social withdrawal and even suicidal thoughts in the most severe cases. It's believed that lower light levels prompt a decline in the feel-good brain hormone serotonin and boost the sleep-inducing hormone melatonin.

No surprise then that pets, with their similar brain chemistry, may also suffer from the same kind of seasonal hormonal havoc.

Whether pets are prone to SAD like humans are or they slip into a seasonal slump because of our depressed state, there are ways to keep their spirits high during the chilly season. In fact, the same fixes that help people beat winter depression might also help their animal companions maintain a brighter mood. Here are some simple things you and your pet can try together.

*Open your curtains and blinds during the day to let in natural light. Position your pet's bed near a sunny window and be sure to hang out there, too. Engage your pet more when you're inside during the winter months with new toys, extra play and increased cuddle time.

*Enjoy the outdoors. Take advantage of moodboosting sunny days by letting your pet go outside during peak daylight hours. Better yet, join in for a romp in the yard or a walk in the park (cats can be leash trained). Outdoor time has the added advantage of allowing pets (and you) to exercise, take in stimulating neighbourhood sights and socialise with other people and animals. All are known blues busters.

*If you do not find an improvement in your own mood consider light therapy that mimics sunlight. Buy a full-spectrum light box that covers the electromagnetic spectrum from infrared to nearultraviolet and plant yourself and your pet in front of it for 30 to 60 minutes a day.

What they didn't expect, is the deep impact this bike seems to have where ever they go.

"So I think this isn't just about us, it's about what we can all do for our elderly family members in helping them experience this season in their life to the very end as much as possible" Jill added. So, they decided to call it The Blessing Bike.

"This is lovely. I like the freedom to be able to go outside! It makes you feel good and you feel loved! You're not just sitting around. It's heavenly and that must be what heaven is like, just to know that you are loved" Rosemary said.

TAX-FREE VOUCHERS

Under Irish Revenue's Small Benefits Exemption Scheme, employers can reward employees with a non-cash bonus of up to €500 in value completely tax free each year (the limit was increased from €250 in the Budget passed in Oct 2015). Provided certain guidelines are followed, neither the company nor the employee will pay PAYE, PRSI or USI. It is a tax -efficient way of rewarding your staff.

To qualify for the tax exemption, only one tax-free bonus may be paid to each employee in any one year. If more than one bonus is given in a year, it is only the first one that will qualify for tax-free status, even if this bonus is less than the €500 annual allowance - any used allowance cannot be carried over. The tax-free bonus must also be paid in non-cash form.

Know Your Rights:

OUESTION

My car is due an NCT soon. Have the NCT rules changed recently?

ANSWER

Yes, recent changes to the National Car Test include how defects are classified and how vintage vehicles are treated. displaying a National Car Testing Service (NCTS) disc.

How regularly your car is tested depends on its age. The

- Every 2 years, if your car is over 4 years and less than 10
- Every year, if your car is over 10 years, but less than 30
- Every 2 years, if your car is between 30 and 39 years old and you are not using it for commercial purposes (this used to be every year)

Since 13 August 2018, defects identified during the NCT are classified as minor, major or dangerous.

Minor: the vehicle has passed the test with minor faults. These faults must be repaired and the car must be reinspected by the NCTS before you can get an NCT

Major: (previously fail refusal): the vehicle has failed the test. You must get it repaired and have it re-inspected by the NCTS within 30 days. If it passes re-inspection, you will get an NCT certificate.

Dangerous: (previously fail dangerous): the vehicle has failed due to a dangerous defect that poses a direct or immediate risk to road safety. The NCTS will put a 'failed dangerous' sticker on it. It is illegal to drive a vehicle with a dangerous defect.

Cyberbullying refers to bullying which takes place using the Internet, mobile phones or other technological devices. This may be in the form of sending nasty or threatening messages, emails or photos, videos or putting such materials up on social media web pages. It can also take the form of setting up fake profiles which say cruel things about an individual or accessing someone's account repeatedly to make trouble for them. Cyberbullying, can be difficult to detect and address and sometimes one may not know who the bully is when they are bullied online. Many people view the internet as 'not reality' - and it gives the illusion of being much more anonymous - thus allowing them to behave in a more aggressive way. Given the wide cyber audience, when a message is posted online, the information can be far-reaching and instantaneous.

If you are being deliberately harassed or bullied online, it is important that you tell someone about it. You can talk to your parents or someone you trust like a teacher or a friend. It can be very upsetting to be deliberately attacked or humiliated online. The following is a list of some helpful things you can do if this is happening to you

- You can unfriend or block the bully from your site whether it's a mobile phone, social networking site or chat room. No one has to tolerate bullying from another. Online you have the power to unfriend or block people- which removes the bully's power.
- 2. Don't reply. Never reply to a message the bully only gets satisfaction when they receive a response.
- 3. Keep the message. This will give you a record of the messages, dates and times - which may be helpful for reporting.
- Report Problems to your Internet Service Provider or mobile phone provider, Look for the "Report Abuse" button or contact Customer Care. If you consider the cyberbullying to be of a serious nature or potentially criminal then you should contact your local Garda office.

For further protection and to prevent the problem happening again it is important to block unwanted contacts, change your password regularly and report any abuse on the site to mobile operators or social networking providers.
