

Fossa Community Sustainability Fair PLANNED FOR FEBRUARY

he Fossa Community Sustainability Fair returns this year and will take place over the Bank Holiday weekend, on Sunday February 2nd.

The first event of the year celebrates a time when seeds are sown for the brighter days ahead. Imbolc literally translates as 'in the belly' meaning this is the perfect time to learn new things and see what environmental projects and enterprises are happening in the local community.

'What we hope is that the 18 or so Exhibitors on the day might inspire, educate and empower attendees on the day. We are facilitating the sharing of ideas on how to consume in a way that doesn't cost the earth' says PRO of the Group, Diarmaid Griffin When established over a year ago, Fossa Climate Action Group, committed to hosting a public event every quarter. These events coincide with the feast days of the Celtic year: Imbolc, Bealtaine, Lughnasa, and Samhain. 'We thought it would be fitting to start the new year off with an event that showcases the positive work that is ongoing in the locality. It was of great benefit to attendees and exhibitors last year, so we hope for an even bigger event this time around' explains Paul O' Raw, Chair of the Climate Action Group.

'Expect tea, chats, and a friendly atmosphere again this year, plus a few new exhibitors' says Mary Fitzgerald, Secretary of FCAG.

Pop down to the Fossa Community Hall from 3pm to 5pm to experience the occasion. Entry is free but donations are very welcome. All proceeds will go towards the hosting of this event and other events throughout the year.



Sarah Off To A Flying Start



These last few weeks of the indoor athletics season have been superb for Killarney Valley AC's Irish international athlete, Sarah Leahy.

The Killarney athlete's season opener came with a victory in the AAI games in the NIA in Abbots town Dublin where Sarah came first in 7.35 seconds, a brilliant indication for the season ahead and showing great form for the upcoming National indoor athletics championships.

The flying Kerry woman took her form into the indoor national league at the same venue last weekend winning in 7.48 seconds and scoring valuable points for the Killarney valley ac team who are currently placed in 8th place out of the top elite 19 clubs in the country.

This Tuesday Sarah flew to Aarhus in Denmark for the international event and placed in 2nd place in a stacked lineup in 7.40 seconds only .04 seconds ahead of Magdalena Linder from Austria.

The race was won by Gloria Hooper from Italy in 7.32 seconds.

The packed-out arena which holds several thousand spectators was electric with the athletes being introduced to the music and lights show for all the finals.

Sarah will be racing frequently over the next number of weeks internationally as well as at the national indoor championships which are upcoming.

Sarah is working very hard to lower her PB (personal best) indoor time of 7.30 seconds and in search of more valuable points, as she is hopeful of qualifying for the European indoor championships later in the spring.

The Killarney Valley ac athlete is also part of the squad for the Irish relay team as they are in search of European and world qualification, with sessions ongoing.

Chairperson of Killarney Calley AC, Jeremiah Griffin has said that track and field athletics is in a great place for 2025 where the track at Killarney valley is buzzing with top class training and participation at all levels.

"The achievement of national league teams both women and men from Killarney Valley AC should not be underestimated", he added.

In other news, The national league team are doing brilliant also Jordan Lee is throwing the shot putt now as he is recovering from his knee injury.

Also Oisin Lynch in now in Adam's state university in Colorado on scholarship and is due to run the 800m indoor in his first race for the college - watch that space on his times as he aims for European qualification this summer.

KERRY AIRPORT

Announces Increased Frequency On Summer Sun Destinations To Spain, Portugal & France In 2025

'SNOW' need to think about anything other than the sun after Kerry Airport revealed details of increased frequency on Ryanair routes to Spain and Portugal from April and with Chalair to France from June.

Passengers can choose from five flights a week to Alicante in Spain in June, July and August with three flights a week in April, May, September and October.

Ryanair flights to Costa Blanca sunshine will commence on Wednesday 2nd April, a day after the return of the twice-weekly route to Faro on Portugal's Algarve which also runs to the end of October.

Chalair have announced the return of their popular weekly peak-summer routes to France from June to September serving Brest in Brittany, Caen in Normandy and Pau near the Pyrenees with the addition of a route to Brive in the stunning Dordogne Valley.

Book now on Ryanair.com for the routes to Spain and Portugal and on en.Chalair.fr for the flights to France.

The CEO of Kerry Airport, John Mulhern, said, "We are delighted to welcome the return of our summer sun destinations for 2025 and we thank Ryanair and Chalair for laying on these popular routes once again. The increase in frequency to Alicante and a fourth destination in France will coincide with the expected completion of the new Arrivals



Hall and Departures Lounge in the summer. The development has been undertaken due to growing demand and to ensure that everyone who travels through Kerry Airport has a comfortable and positive experience." 2024 was another record year for Kerry Airport with 417,409 passengers, the third highest passenger numbers in the airport's history, for the year to the end of December.

The summer sun routes saw an 11.2% increase on the previous year with 61,641 passengers travelling to Spain, Portugal and France.

There was an increase of 3.8% on the Kerry to Dublin route with 114,447 passengers travelling between the Kingdom and Capital compared to 110,255 in 2023.

Reduced frequency to some of the UK routes and to Frankfurt Hahn in Germany resulted in decreases of 2.4% and 18.9% respectively in 2024. Last year 211,723 people travelled between Kerry and London Stansted, London Luton and Manchester, while 32,326 people flew to and from Frankfurt Hahn.

Looking ahead into the Spring of 2025, passengers will enjoy a choice of 11 destinations from Kerry serving Dublin, London (Luton & Stansted), Manchester, Frankfurt Hahn, Alicante, Faro, Brive, Brest, Caen and Pau. For more information visit www.KerryAirport.ie.

JANUARY

Following successful communications with the twinning association in our twinned town of Saint Avertin, France; a 2nd year student exchange took place in January and March 2024. Marie Limon-Tillous arrived in Killarney on Saturday 13th January accompanied by her father who was shown some landmarks in Killarney by members of KTTA on his overnight stay while Marie got to know her host family and exchange partner, Adi Lucey. Marie stayed with Adi Lucey's family and attended St Bridget's Presentation Secondary School for 2 weeks, immersing herself in the school and culture of Killarney. Adi travelled to Saint Avertin, France on Saturday 9th March and stayed with Marie and her family attending College Jules Romains for 2 weeks also. KTTA members have spent a lot of time engaging with schools and clubs to encourage more exchanges as we see it as a great way to promote our town twinning/sister cities collaboration and ethos.

MARCH

Preparations for the St Patrick's Day Weekend took several months of planning with our twinned/ sister cities associations and we welcomed the following dignitaries;

• Marco Couso, Mayor of Casperia, Italy, accompanied by his wife and son, along with Deputy Mayor; Roberta Genari and a number of their twinning association members, including 20+ Majorettes.

• Julie Dunlop, Mayor of Kendal, UK and her husband Jim.

• Josef Miehling, Former Mayor of Pleinfield, Germany accompanied by his wife Erika including 30+ members of their twinning association and the Hummell Group.

The renowned Majorettes di Casperia, who have participated in many international events, entertained the crowds observing the parade along with the Pleinfelder Hummel group who are a masked club whose origins date back to the 18th century. KTTA arranged a number of activities for the travelling groups, including a trip to Killarney Celtic Soccer



grounds, a meeting with the President of the Rotary Club and the Mayor of Kendal found time to participate in the Killarney Park Run. KTTA hosted a post parade reception for our visiting groups in the Plaza Hotel, as well as assisting with accommodation, transport etc. We are extremely grateful to Eileen O Connor & Mathew Farrell of Killarney Municipal District for organising the meeting with the Cathaoirleach, Maura Healy-Rae and giving the dignitaries the opportunity to sign the distinguished visitors book in the Town Hall.

meet a group from Santeny,


in the Killarney Hotel who were visiting Ireland with a view to twin with a town in Ireland. Sheila Dickson and I met with the Mayor of Santeny and the Chairperson of the Santeny Town Twinning Association, Seynabou Diop and had a very open discussion with them both. They were visiting Dingle, Clare and Galway also for discussions on possible twinnnings. Santeny is located in the southeastern suburbs of Paris, 21.8 kms from the centre of Paris. It has two golf courses, along with a host of community and sporting groups, primary school and college. **DECEMBER**

We received official correspondence from the Santeny Twinning Association in December requesting KTTA engage further with a view to progressing a twinning project between our two associations in 2025.We plan to arrange a zoom meeting in the New Year to see how this can progress.

On the 13th December 12 students from St Brendan's College and 2 students from St Bridget's Secondary School along with 2 teachers travelled to Roth College in Bavaria, as part of a student exchange which will see students from Roth College attend ST Brendan's College for one week in March 2025. This trip would not have been possible without the support of Angela Daly, German teacher in St Brendan's College and the Principal Sean Coffey. KTTA met with the students and teachers prior to their trip and made a small presentation of gifts to the teachers who will meet the Mayor of Roth along with the County Mayor. A new Irish consulate opened in Munich and the Consul General is non other than Listry native James C O Shea, whose late father Tony worked in Culloty's drapers and other Killarney based businesses for many years. James kindly met with the students and teachers on their trip along with Pleinfield Twinning Association members who hosted a dinner in their honour. This student exchange was a long time in the planning and shows what two active twinning associations can achieve when buy in from colleges/teachers.

As we close off our report for 2024 we continue to maintain strong links with all our twinned towns and sister cities and continue to monitor activity with those we are twinned with to ensure they remain active in promoting the ethos of our twinning agreements. We would like to thank Killarney Municipal District Office & Elected members for their continued support and look forward to working with all in 2025. We would also like to thank local media and Killarney Today (on-line) for their continued support.

OUR NEW GOVERNMENT THINKING LOCALLY, NOT GLOBALLY

The new Government should be good for Kerry and Killarney and congratulations to the Healy-Raes who are coming in from the colour of opposition. Already, it is more about local, less about global - a complete reversal of the outward looking agenda of the last Government.

Minister Norma Foley is pushing for the LNG terminal in Tarbert for climate security. There is an important commitment for local management of Tralee MTU campus also at her instigation. The amalgamation was favouring Cork too much and Kerry was losing all sorts of ways, a birdie tells me. Her clause in the programme for Government is "there must be balanced senior management representation based across the campuses".

There are huge outstanding issues locally. The courthouse for Tralee is screaming to be addressed. Again a birdie tells me it's remarkable how early birds are singing this year - there are problems with locating a huge building on the site bought by the courts service. These have only come to light.

There must be determination now to buy up the An Post site in Edward Street for a new family court and do up the Ashe Street building. That's one for all four Government TDs. And in Killarney St Finan's has to be addressed by the Healy-Raes.

There are already signals the new Government will be more sensible in terms of foreign policy. There is a commitment to defining anti-semitism. Outgoing FF senator Ned O'Sullivan, a close friend of Micheal Martin and Norma a friend of the Jewish people, has had an influence here, I suspect. There is also a row back, thankfully,

to the daft occupied territories bill, which threatened to cost this country dearly. It has to be revised root and branch, Micheál Martin said - which is the same thing as saying it is being scrapped. Our tech industry was at risk as was our pharma.

Let's just hope the pendulum does not swing too far local. It's a while since I studied 17th century Metaphysical poetry. But "making one little room an everywhere" was a line from John Donne - the microcosm reflected the macrocosm.The mantra of the Healy-Raes already seems to be that what's happening in Kerry is happening everywhere in Ireland. Mayor Maura Helay-Rae was out with the line at the recent council meeting in Killarney - "what is happening in Kerry is happening everywhere else" and water and housing were "not just Kerry problems they were Irish problems," she said.

LOCAL LINKS

The Killarney Municipal District meeting last week heard how an idea put forward in this column, a link between the bus and train stations through the outlet centre, is to be looked into. We are delighted.

John O'Donoghue's motion asked the council to examine the possibility of providing pedestrian access between the train and bus stations through the side of the outlet, as mentioned in the Outlook by the journalist in the room!

This was in the light of larnród Eireann's ongoing failure to provide a footbridge.

Brendan Cronin said the need was glaring and two years ago he had met with senior management in larnród Eireann, the national service provider, but it was well down their agenda.

The solution was not rocket science, surely, for stations that were side by side, Brendan said.



Engineer John Ahern said they will provide whatever assistance they can if the Outlet Centre management are amenable to it.

Meanwhile the disgraceful lack of homeless accommodation in Killarney was fully acknowledged by management when raised by Martin Grady.

It is three years now since Killarney has had a homeless shelter, Martin said. Killarney families who found themselves evicted had to uproot entirely and go to Tralee and Listowel for hostel or B&B accommodation.

Martin stated the glaring truth - we have had "loads of room" for refugees. The last homeless shelter in Killarney now houses Ukrainians as the Government contract gave more money to house refugees than homeless locals, he said.

Ger O'Brien, housing director, acknowledged the situation and said they were trying to tackle it.

Of course it is not the refugees or the homeless who are at fault: it is the Government policy. Too much money has been given to private operators. The solution is public facilities for both refugees and homeless. St Finan's is the obvious answer. We will be watching to see what our four Kerry Fianna Fail and Independent Fianna Fail TDs will do about this. Michael Cahill and Michael Healy-Rae are both involved in the Ukrainian refugee business, so they will have first-hand knowledge.

TIME FOR IRISH STUDIES

More than 20,000 students no longer take Irish as a subject in secondary schools. Most now opt out on the grounds of having a learning disability signed off on by psychologists. But these same students are still able to study Spanish, French or German!.

This smacks of an Irish solution to an Irish problem: like the Greek



island where the taxi drivers were on the blind pension. The reality seems to be a rapidly declining appetite for Irish as a pure subject. Learning Irish is difficult. A lot of time goes into it and the end result is poor. Irish is a language little used and outside of TG4 and Radio na Gaeltachta where will our young even hear it?

I hear Russian and Polish every day in Killarney - I rarely hear Irish spoken. It is probably time we faced the music and rather than cling to the sinking liferaft.

A new Irish Studies subject would make more sense for 21st century Ireland. That way Irish is not ditched altogether as a language. And new Irish people are integrated quickly into the country. Irish informs our English and our way of thinking and to me it is what gives Hibernian English its richness.

The way to preserve our unique way of thinking, therefore, is to introduce a little of the language, a little of the history of literature, and a bit of music and art.

The old dinnseanchas could be dusted off for the study of local place names and historical landscape to provide excitement locally. Make Irish Studies compulsory and Irish language an option, is my strong suggestion.

We offer our heartfelt condolences to Mikes wife Christina, children Padraic, Aisling and Colin and all his relatives and friends.



The book available in Eason's and other outlets and retails at €8 with proceeds going to Pieta House.


Minister Foley confirms new school facilities for St.Patrick's Secondary School in Castleisland


On the evening the 2025 Network Ireland Kerry committee was introduced with an overview of the Network's calendar of events and collaborations for the upcoming year.



RECORD NUMBER OF NEW HOMES COMMENCED IN KERRY IN 2024 pipeline for future supply strong

COMMENCEMENT DATA SHOWS CONSTRUCTION OF NEW HOMES IN KERRY MORE THAN DOUBLED IN 2024 COMPARED TO 2023

The Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage has published its monthly data on the number of Commencements Notices (residential construction starts) for December 2024 and the total number of all new home commencements in 2024.

In 2024 there have been commencement notices for 1,007 homes in Kerry, more than double compared to 2023 (414 homes).

Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien said: "Strong figures on home starts in Kerry in 2024 confirm that a robust stock of new housing is in the pipeline.

"Government initiatives such as the development levy waiver and the Úisce Éireann rebate have had a positive impact in getting projects off the ground with the ultimate goal of increasing our housing supply to meet housing needs.

"This significant rise in housing supply will enable more people to become homeowners and also help increase access to a wider range of secure housing options."

Nationally, the data shows that between January and December 2024, there were 60,243 new homes commenced, up 84% from the 32,801 recorded in 2023. This equates to, on average, 239 new homes

commenced every working day during 2024. This is the highest number of annual residential commencements since records began in 2014. The full commencement data set can be accessed at: Construction Activity Statistics







They may not be legislators, but they have priorities, To promote their county, with astute expertise. They both are funds of common sense, from a rural background,


And well taught by Jackie, to keep both feet on the ground. They have great business acumen, and both can turn a bob,





With the 2025 Leaving Cert exam timetable now available on the State Examinations Commission (SEC) website, www.examinations. ie, CAO applicants will be motivated to secure one of the 52,000, or so, coveted college place which will be available. As the 1st February closing date for applying to the CAO looms large, its due time to make sure that the application form is thoroughly and accurately completed.

Almost all applications to CAO are made via "Apply," the interactive online application facility, which remains open until 1st February on the CAO website, www.cao.ie . Apply is user friendly and easy to follow, particularly as CAO provides an 'Interactive Demo Facility' to enable you make a trial application.

Go online at www.cao.ie and click on Apply to open your CAO Account. Enter your personal details. Tick the qualifications and assessment section(s) that are relevant to you. Enter your payment option - Credit/Debit card or Fee Payment Form. If you are paying by credit/ debit card you will be redirected to a payment screen. Create your own account password. Click on "Proceed with application" to obtain your eight-digit CAO application number, beginning with 25, and your application details will appear on screen.





SHOULD YOU BE CONSIDERING SWITCHING YOUR MORTGAGE

Yes, because some of the Irish mortgage lenders have much lower mortgage interest rates compared to others. There has been a lot of discussion recently in the media recently as regards mortgage switching this is because there can be a very substantial difference in interest rates and monthly repayments between lenders. For example on a mortgage of €250,000 over 30 years based on a property value of €350,000 and comparing current 4 year fixed interest rates. One lender is as low as slow as 3.40% (4.18% APR) which costs €1,108 per month whereas another lenders 4 year fixed rate is as high as 4.85% (APR 4.49%) monthly repayment €1,320 per month. The monthly repayment for the lender with the higher rate is a staggering €212 per month more expensive. 

DRIVING AND VISION

If you find that problems with glare at night persist, make an appointment to have a sight test. Sunshine can be dazzling too, particularly when the sun is low in the sky. If you wear glasses, you may find it helpful to have a pair of prescription sunglasses in the car, or to wear clip-on sunglasses over your prescription glasses. Polarised sunglasses are great for driving in bright conditions. Polarised lenses are lenses with a special built in filter to reduce glare and improve vision in bright conditions





I'm no fan of teams, especially teenagers. training over Christmas, personally I believe that there does need to be a real rest period for players. The squeeze on fixtures schedules....I'm delighted that the GAA have grasped the thorny nettle of how dull most gaelic football matches have become, especially at the top level. But that's not the only weed in the garden, and the schedules....as Del Boy Trotter used to say, only fools and horses work, and horses don't work this hard.

For those of who thought that my New Year's resolution was to be slightly less cantankerous and more appreciative of the many blessings in my life.....yeah, let's just move on sharpish from that particular notion.

St. Brendans 1-18 Tralee CBS 1-9

I do hindsight better than foresight (which would be part of the definition of both terms, now that I actually think about it), and I don't mind admitting that I was worried about this one. I couldn't make it myself (I was reporting on the Mounthawk game in Mallow at the same time) but I have watched it several times on clubber since.

The Sem versus the Green was always going to be the big draw. Two of the traditional superpowers and their rivalry literally goes back to Dr. Eamonn O'Sullivan and college GAA's baby steps in the late 1920s under beloved teacher, jazz enthusiast, and Kerry football Micheál Ó Ruairc.

It was a cagey enough start. Two heavyweight teams circling each other, not guite willing to start trading the big punches until they have taken each other's measure. Both defences were sticky. Joey McCarthy's movement was excellent for the Sem, while Jamie Moynihan and Oran O'Neill got a slight but definite edge around the middle third and Jack Rudden's pace from wingback wreaked a certain amount of havoc. Most impressive early on, though, was Frewen winning sharpshooter Ben Kelliher, who was fast into space to pick off two points. Tadhg O'Connor and Ronan Carroll (for the most part the Sem got their tactics perfect against Tralee's main dangermen, especially Carroll and O'Driscoll, and

it has to be said that the absence of the extremely talented Gearóid White didn't help the Green's cause). Jamie Moynihan split the posts to put the Sem ahead by 0-4 to 0-2, and Ben Kelliher was unlucky when defender Eoin Moriarty reacted sharply to scoop his deflected goal attempt off the line. Great defending, in fairness.

The Sem were on top now. Joey McCarthy, Oisín Fleming, and Jamie Moynihan with a massive score put space between them, Ronan O'Carroll and Ryan O'Driscoll slotted a free. O'Driscoll is a proven talent and he has been in brilliant form all year, second only to another Stacks' player who attends a different school (answers on a postcard if ye want, but there will be no prizes for stating the obvious) replied for Tralee CBS, but the Sem were full value for a 0-7 to 0-4 half-time lead. No question but that Kieran Herlihy would have been happier than Marc Ó Sé going in at the half-time break, especially at the quality of his teams defending. Both managers will have felt that there was a lot more to come.

And there most certainly was. I make no apologies for criticising the standard of football in recent years - it's feels more like athletes shutting out good footballers than a game of skill and joy - but I have to admit that the Crokes/Errigal Ciarán game, as much as that one stings, had the blood singing, and the second half of this game had the same feel to it. A certain exuberance. A willingness to embrace the risk and trust in team-mates. It really felt like there was an unspoken understanding of who they are, where they come from, and that there's a certain way they do things. I don't know; maybe I have a tiny smidge of romanticism buried somewhere deep down inside....blast ye, don't ever tell anyone I said that.

Jamie Moynihan notched his third point to put the Sem four up. The Green needed

to respond and promptly did so, Ronan Carroll applying the finish touch for a goal. Ben Kelliher replied with a fine point, but the Green were growing into the game now and Ronan Carroll and Ryan O'Driscoll had them on level terms. Josh Bowler and Joey McCarthy exchanged points with Luke Rochford and Máirtín McKivergen. This was great football on both sides.

What was the Chesterton poem? "The high tide, King Alfred cried, the high tide and the turn"....I love Chesterton's stuff. It has a certain mythic quality. A game like this, similar to a shield wall battle in many ways, does have a certain momentum and sometimes you can just feel it start to shift. Very slowly but with a certain inexorability, the Sem began getting on top in the key duels, especially in defence. The Kerry minors will surely be talking to Ben Kelliher before too long, as he notched two more superb points, with Oisín Fleming adding another. Then came the goal that really killed off Tralee's challenge, Jamie Moynihan perfectly timing the pass to match Joey McCarthy's clever darting run down the left to find space. Six points in hand by the Sem and, with the hard work done, they could just focus on keeping an increasingly desperate Tralee CBS at bay and keep picking off points on the overlap through Fleming again, a Jamie Moynihan free, the excellent Cian Mulcahy, and Liam O'Brien.

This really was a statement win. I would actually say that it is a defining moment for a team. The Sem have had a couple of tough enough defeats in the past couple of years and they have won nothing yet, but there was an assurance about them here. They haven't suddenly become favourites, no chance of that, but they certainly aren't going to be stopped easily either.

Oh boy. Ben Murphy to Cormac Bastible to Paddy Lane, and the ball was in the Rocco net after just 16 seconds. A penalty seven minutes later after an unstoppable burst by Tomas Kennedy saw Paddy double his goal tally. Daniel Kirby with a third goal early in the second quarter to make it 3-12 to 0-3. I'm not even going to pretend; I don't like reporting on games like these. Rochestown is a very good school, lots of very good people who have been repeatedly kind to me over the years. Good player who have put in a lot of work for that jersey. What am I supposed to say about this? I'd love to dress it up and pretend it's a contest, but it just isn't. The likes of Ronan Dooley, Ben Delaney (he scored a fine penalty of his own), and Pádraig McGrath played their hearts out, but you'd have the same chance if you put me in a boxing ring with Tyson Fury. 5-12 to 1-3 at half-time. Any chance we could all just shake hands and get an early start on the road home? I'm not really joking.

Mounthawk took off Paddy Lane around the three quarter stage. He only had 2-12 scored at that stage – maybe they are hoping to spring him as a surprise in the semi-final (yes, that one is me joking). Now, you can argue that conceding four goals in the final ten minutes is a real sign of a chink in Mounthawk's armour. Or you can stop attempting to dress up a pig as a princess and admit that, yeah, there was 28 points between the teams at that stage. You can't really be pretending to me that one of those things didn't influence the other.

One of the annual conversations around this time of year is who are favourites for the Corn uí Mhuirí. There's a reason that particular debate finished among those of us who follow it well before Christmas.

PS Inbhearr Scéine 1-13 Patrician Academy Mallow 0-6

It's not that long ago that Mallow were the new kids on the block themselves, and they were seriously impressive from the start. They are only drawing from a few clubs, but they have big numbers and they are well organised (not just in gaelic football - they impress me in a lot of sporting codes). Inbhearr Scéine, though, have been a revelation this year. Seán O'Shea and Ronan Buckley have got real and visible 'buy-in' from the players. Kenmare Shamrocks minors, along with Austin Stacks and Dr. Crokes, have been up at the top in terms of county minor leagues and club championships in the last few years. Inbhearr Scéine don't necessarily have individual stars (the two O'Sullivans in midfield and Jack Tangney do look special), but they are just solid steel all through and the right mindset. I knew – I actually am on record in my preview – that they had a better chance here than most people thought. But what surprised me and a few more, is how controlled and in command of the play they actually were. They were on top from the very start. Ben O'Shea actually opened the scoring for Mallow, but Tangney slotted three kicks in a row and Cathal Kelliher's goal effort was just stopped on the line. Kenmare's Barry Fitzsimmons had to gather a speculative enough shot himself before Neal O'Shea made it 0-5 to 0-1. Mallow pulled back two points but O'Shea again and then Donnacha O'Sullivan with a brace from midfield (both Kenmare's midfielders have been scoring consistently in games) made it 0-8 to 0-4 and both teams added a point before the break. If Inbhearr Scéine could clearly be said to have won the first half, they absolutely lorded the second. Mallow could only muster up a single point. Kenmare were growing in confidence and, significantly, seemed to have plenty left in the tank towards the finish. Neal O'Shea's clinching goal was just the icing on the cake. This was a comfortable victory in the finish.

Too comfortable to suit me. Don't misunderstand me; I am genuinely delighted for Kenmare; I just hoped for a better battle from Mallow.It's not a conversation anybody really wants to have, but while the number of participants have grown, has the Corn uí Mhuirí declined a bit in quality and competitiveness? The Sem v the Green only attracted a few hundred people. Nobody would be mistaking this Kenmare v Mallow game for Woodstock or Live Aid either. You wouldn't mistake it for a boyband tour even. Cork schools, just like Cork inter-county teams at underage in football, are really struggling at the moment, and the hard truth is that it was always expected to be a Kerry winner this year....a winning run that extends back to 2012. People, better experts than me will tell you that a decline in Cork football does Kerry absolutely no favours in the long run. You can't sharpen your own steel without a whetstone. Arrah, look, it's a conversation for another day.

Hamilton HS Bandon 2-14 PS Chorca Dhuibhne 0-11

Corca Dhuibhne were dark horses for me. I just liked the cut of them, I felt that there was something building there, especially after a hard-fought preliminary quarter-final against Macroom. But in fairness, they came up against a really excellent Bandon outfit.

Oisín McCarthy was a great pivot for the Cork side on the forty and opened with two frees. Big Oisín Gillain was already doing damage in midfield. Ned Ó Riain got Corca Dhuibhne off the mark but Kevin Hannon and McCarthy again made it 0-4 to 0-1, while Daniel Coughlan (one of three rugby/football dual players on the team) couldn't quite tuck a goal chance away. Corca Dhuibhne trimmed the gap back to two points and the introduction of Pádraig Mac Gearailt late in the half gave them a better cutting edge, but Gillain and McCarthy had already set up

Seán Murphy for a tap-in goal by then. Cian Mac Gearailt and Pádraig Ó Mainnín did trim it back to a goal, 1-5 to 0-5, at half-time.

Corca Dhuibhne actually started the second half brightly with good scores from Diarmuid Ó Seaghda and a Padraig Ó Mainnín free to leave just one between them. Bandon corner- forward Humphrey Canty has had a quiet enough Corn uí Mhuirí by his high standards (I rate the former county minor very highly) but he cut in for a superb score that visibly lifted his team. Padraig Ó Mainnín replied, but Oisín McCarthy (2, 1f) and Oisín Gillain pushed their side four clear. There was no way back for a gallant Dingle. The simple truth is that they did nothing wrong; they just came up against a better team, and there was no shame whatsoever in losing to that Bandon outfit, who wrapped it up by a flattering margin with a late goal from substitute Sam Browne after more good work by the really impressive McCarthy.

SENIOR CLUB FINALS Senior Club Hurling: Na Fianna 2-23 Sarsfields 0-20

My heart goes out to Sarsfields. No club ever wants to go out like that. They just couldn't get going - maybe they just weren't allowed to. I don't really know. I did put it on the television, but in all honesty, my attention was long gone once the scoreline drifted out to 0-9 to 0-1. We have all been there on days like that for our teams, and we didn't want to be, and when you have absolutely no skin in the game, a one-sided contest just isn't going to capture the imagination. I remember Kerry's face defeat to Clare; my clear memory is that the scoreline didn't reflect Clare's superiority, they had actually shown us more respect than our play deserved. Our that infamous game against Meath in 2001, a single point from Declan Quill was our second half total. I wouldn't mind, but go back and check the names on that Kerry team; they were great players. Some days are these days. In fairness, Kerry native Bryan Murphy actually did very well, but....as I said, no point in pretending. I o know the final score, but that's only because I googled it.

The only point of note is that Con O'Callaghan becomes the first Dublin player and one of a select few, thirteen in total, who have won both senior club hurling and football medals. Eleven of them, including such famous names as Jimmy Barry Murphy, Donal O'Grady, John Allen, Niall Kennefick, did it with St. Finbarrs in Cork, who lorded hurling in the seventies and football in the eighties. The only other exception beside O'Callaghan, though he did it with two different clubs, Salthill Knocknacarra and Clarinbridge, is Alan Kerins of Galway.

Senior Club Football: Cuala 3-14 Errigal Ciarán 1-16 It was a Dublin double as they won both the



hurling and football crowns, with Cuala seeing off Northern champions Errigal Ciarán in what ended up being a far more entertaining game. Not that it looked like it in the first half. Cuala looked more organised, faster, that little bit hungrier....they were ahead to everything. Darragh Canavan fumbled a ball....that's one of those statements like "Bryan Sheehan has kicked that fourteen metre free wide"....your brain takes a second to absorb and go "what just happened?"

Peter Harte is deftly turned over....again, what?....and seconds later Cal Doran is stroking home a goal. Cuala added a second after turning over a kick-out. 2-4 without reply. I happen to know for a fact that there is an episode of 'Grumpy Old Men' on the other channel at the moment. I'm not a fan, I already have the personality of a grumpy old man; I need no insights. It's a bit desperate, but I'll leave the football on. I have a good book to read (I'm halfway through Joe Schmidt's autobiography, I have to say that it's a lot more interesting than I expected and he has some good insights).

3-9 to 0-5 at half-time. Hmmm. There have been greater comebacks. Frankly, if the Canavans start walking on water, let me know. Otherwise I'd say we are pretty much done here. And at least one Canavan won't be walking very far at the moment, Darragh is gone off after taking an awful bang. Oul' conspiracy theorists can waffle away, there was no intent or malice in that and I despise the kind of attention-seekers who foment such nonsense on social media. It's not as if it's Cuala who are desperate at the moment. Especially not when Peadar Ó Cofaigh Byrne bangs home a third goal, this one made by Con O'Callaghan bursting through. They'll be facing Kerry later on this year, and they will both asking questions of us.

Except.....hould your whist a minute as the second half begins. Character counts, and say what you will about Errigal Ciarán, they are certainly not lacking in that department. There may actually be some entertainment breaking out. Peter Harte in particular is a man transformed. 0-5 to 0-1. It's not a transformation, and Errigal Ciarán are

still battling up hill, but they are wearing crampons now.

Cracking goal. I thought Harte would be better off with a sure thing point, kind of thought the keeper should have done a small but better there. Tiny margins.

3-12 to 1-12. They could pull this off. Half a goal chance, but Ruairí Canavan couldn't quite get the pass off.

Great free by Tommy Canavan. Five points in it now. Pádraig McGirr from play. I literally don't know anybody from Errigal Ciarán, but how could you not be enraptured by this?

Peter Harte again. Cuala have been consistently great, but there's an obvious man of the match here. A goal, and plenty of time left.

Errigal Ciarán have proven their character. But be fair to Cuala, they have steel inside them too. They have been bending against the onslaught, but they aren't for breaking. Con O'Callaghan to Conor O'Groarke, an important point. Four between them and the last grains of sand trickling out of the hourglass.

All over. Enjoyable watch, highly enjoyable, but not easy. Well done to both teams.

GAVIN WHITE APPOINTED CAPTAIN

No surprise at all, given Dr. Crokes' dominance and his own wealth of experience, but a good move on all sides for Gavin White to be appointed as incoming captain of the Kerry team. A lot of Dr. Crokes players have worn that armband down the year, and several of them have lifted a certain S. Maguire. Let's hope that Gavin can join the illustrious brigade; I have no doubt but that he will give it everything.



I actually like reading the history and culture of sport, and most but not solely as part of

our own cultural heritage. Without trying to be pretentious, I genuinely think that the sports that we idealise, that form themselves as part of our mythologies, speak to the human condition.

This is a big part of the reason why it actually does annoy me when you have bone-idle pundits pretending that soccer was invented in 1992 along with the Premiership and pay-per-view television. When Abramovich brought his millions into Chelsea, suddenly you had supposedly die-hard Pensioners.... who had never heard of Peter Osgood or Ron Harris (not that I was an admirer of Chopper Harris, who was to soccer what Bill Laimbeer was to the NBA). Man City fans who have never heard of Colin Bell or Bert Trautman if you only google one name I mention today, let it be him. Obviously I never met him in any way, but I think of him as 'Bert' in my own mind. They made a movie called 'The Keeper' about him in 1918. I've never watched it and certainly don't intend to, some stories do not need a romanticised touch.

Leeds....arrah, don't get me started. Leeds certainly hovered on the brink of success more than they achieved it, and I would say Revie was a good manager but not necessarily a great one, but this myth that the likes of John Giles was a dirty player? Absolute nonsense. Tough and uncompromising, certainly, but putting him in the same bracket as Chopper Harris or, indeed, Bobby Charlton's bruiser of a baby brother is ridiculous. The same myth has followed Man United's Nobby Stiles.

Liverpool, to be fair, do tend to be good at acknowledging their history. Part of that is the 'scouse, not English' thing, and part of it is simply that they have a really good history, a strong working class population base. Liverpool was one of the greatest port cities in the world, they had three managers on the trot who all enjoyed huge success, and that was in an era where the money tended to whisper rather than shout and even FIFA pretended to have a little bit of probity. Remember that in the sixties and seventies in England, most players were earning good wages but not unimaginable to their supporters and many of them would take public transport to and from games. Supporters felt a real connection. The likes of George Best with the stories of hotel rooms and Miss Worlds was very much the exception, even to his team-mates. The celebrity status was reserved for royalty, a few politicians and Hollywood until the more hedonistic seventies.

Denis Law was already a big name player when he signed for Matt Busby in 1962. He had started with Huddersfield in 1955 (Busby initially tried to buy him as a sixteen year old), signed for Man City for a record fee in 1960, and joined Torino a year later (a number of top British players went to Italy, where the game wasn't stunted by a wage cap that meant owners could line their own pockets with the full connivance of the likes of Busby (great manager – really not so great a human being, and of course he was eventually cruelly scrapped by the club himself). It didn't

work out and Law, a Scottish international since 1958 (their record goalscorer with 30 alongside Kenny Dalglish, and he did it in almost half as many games, although I would say Dalglish was the more rounded player), was convinced to join United by Busby. It was his third record transfer fee at £115,000, and was to prove well worth it. He scored on his debut against West Bromwich Albion, and basically never stopped for the next 13 years. He won the FA Cup in 1963, the European Player of the Year Award, the predecessor to the Ballon d'Or, in 1964. Charlton and Best did likewise in that era. In 1966 and 1967 he won the First Division, and that wage cap meant that the old First Division was far harder to win than any modern Premiership, despite the guff that you will sometimes hear nowadavs.

I saw a quote recently in a tribute to him on a United fan forum that I thought was actually a lovely touch and a piece of class. "On a team that included Bobby Charlton and George Best, they called Denis Law 'the King'". I think he would have guietly demurred, because that was his nature (a bit unlike the other two - Charlton was never brash or ignorant, but he was a clear and concise commander, very much 'old school' English elitist, while George Best was.....well, that he actually was as good as his opinion of himself as a player, rather than a person, is the highest compliment that can be paid to the greatest wasted talent sport has ever seen), but he would have liked it. That he was a truly great striker is undeniable – the numbers are there, and his technical ability to execute chances was second to very few, if any. His most famous goal, of course, was for Man City during his injury-led decline.....it was believed, and he always believed, that it was the goal that relegated his beloved Red Devils. It turned out not to be true, they would have gone down anyway. Denis Law was not going to spurn the goal opportunity, to his mind that would have been unbearably dishonest, but he never once celebrated it in any way. No even mild humour in later years, he had too much class for that. It was a fantastic backheel finish, by the way, one that highlighted his enormous intelligence on the ball.

Manchester United have had two 'kings' in their history. One was the enfant terrible of French football - Alex Ferguson famously picked him up for next to nothing from Leeds. It has been hailed as a genius move ever after - hindsight is grand, but with Cantona's well-known and self-inflicted disciplinary record at both club and country, I'd have been slow to take him on. He was the right man at the right time rather than inherently great, he brought a swagger and arrogance that a rising generation of young talent were able to thrive on. Denis Law was the King of Stretford, not based on his own opinion, but on theirs. I marvelled at Best - how could you not - and mourned the waste of a phenomenal talent, and was an admirer of Charlton, a real leader of men and a personification of dignitas. But the one I would have loved to have sat down and had a pint with before alzheimers took it's cruel grip? Denis Law.

Wheels turn and lives moves on. Manchester United are.....freefall is a little bit strong, this is still a colossal corporate enterprise, but it is certainly not the giant it was. Billionaire investors have altered the game hugely....I would argue irretrievably at this stage.

Denis Law was one of the last relics of a genuinely more communal age. And one of the stalwarts of it. May he rest in a deserved peace.

Carla Ward Appointed as Ladies Manager

No point in pretending. I had never heard of her before she was appointed by the FAI. She has a very strong CV and certainly looks impressive. Through no fault of her own, it has been a tough start. Not only is public sympathy with Colin Healy, having turned down the opportunity to manage Cobh Ramblers on the basis of an implicit by the FAI's promise, but his version was extensively reported by the media at the time. To say that Marc Canham's denials are weak and unconvincing is being very generous, to say the least, and the silence from David Courell is deafening. The Ladies' team lost a lot of public credibility after a poor showing against Wales and failure to qualify for the European Finals - I'm sorry, but it means that we are two years away from a World Cup and, even if Carla Ward were Napoleon and Katie McCabe were a Ballon d'Or winner, the Nations League glorified friendlies were always going to be a tough sell. I wish Carla Ward the very best of luck; it looks to me as if she will need to. And I hope that, like Eileen Gleeson, she has made sure to protect herself contractually, given who she is dealing with.

Mike Murphy will this year be inducted into the Killarney Legion Hall of Fame and few could argue with his contribution to the club over the years. Originally from Rathmore he moved into town where he hooked up with Derry O Keeffe, Diarmuid O'Donoghue and Paddy Griffin in the Presentation Monastery. Obviously his playing career came first and he was noted for his versatility where he could line out in any position up the middle. It wasn't only on the football field that Mike stood out. He was the envy of every student in St Brendans College as he travelled to school in his mothers car, a mini, the only student to go by such means. KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take $\leq 20,000$ via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.


A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000. Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.





EARLY SPRING FLOWERING SHRUBS

Now is a good time if you are planning a new garden or trying to add some colour to an established garden to plant some early flowering spring shrubs. One of the best known shrubs is the Camellia and these popular shrubs are starting to flower in most places at the moment. The Camellia is a very valuable shrub in the garden as it can give a focal point to any shrubbery all year round with its glossy green leaves and showy blooms from early spring. A lot of people think that Camellias are a difficult shrub to grow, but in fact they are no more difficult than Rhododendrons or azaleas, and most varieties on sale now are hardy. When choosing the spot to plant your Camellia, make sure it is sheltered from cold winds as they can damage the flowering buds, as can frost. When planting your Camellia make sure to mix plenty of moss peat with the earth, rather than on its own around the plant, as it will tend to root out quicker.

Carnellias are also ideal for growing in containers. Remember if you are planting your Carnellia in the ground, that it might be small initially but most will grow to the size of a small tree, so allow plenty of room around it. There is very little maintenance with Carnellias only to prune out old dead wood, clean up old blooms that fall to the ground, and to mulch around the base of plants every spring with some moss peat. There are a lot of other good spring flowering shrubs, here is a list of just a few: Forsythia, (ythisus, Corylus, Berberis Darwinii, Ribes, and skimmia.


