Sadness at the passing of Tommy Cronin

here was a palpalable air of sadness throughout the town last Friday morning when the news broke that one of the town's favourite businessmen Tommy Cronin had passed away.

Tommy ran T. Cronin & Sons on High Street, with his wife Caith and son Denis and the traditional family butchers have served the people of Killarney for 5 generations.

Tommy passed away peacefully at home in the presence of his family and this week Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce has paid tribute to the late Tom (Tommy) Cronin, commenting that his passing marks a real end of an era for the Killarney business community.

Mr Cronin, who was laid to rest in Aghadoe on Monday, operated a thriving butcher shop on High Street and the business has been in the Cronin family for five generations.

It continues to thrive under the guiding hand of his son, Denis. Cronin's Butchers has been synonymous with Killarney business life and the shop has supplied and continues to supply several hotels, restaurants and guesthouses as well as tending to the needs of the community as a whole.

A statement issued by joint chamber presidents, Pádraig Treacy and Johnny McGuire, said Tommy will be fondly remembered as a great and proud Killarney man whose knowledge of and love for the town was second to none.

"The fact that a song about Killarney was sung as his remains were carried from St Mary's Cathedral says it all. He loved the town, he loved its people and he served them with passion, with loyalty and with great enthusiasm," they said.

The chamber added that Tommy Cronin was always a welcoming face behind the counter of his shop, with a warm greeting and a broad smile for everybody.

He loved exchanging the news of the day and hearing how his customers and their families were getting on.

Killarney and while he will be greatly missed, so many people have very fond memories of the over-the-counter exchanges in his bustling High Street premises," the statement added.

The Irish Cancer Society says that this will be their biggest Daffodil Day yet and are hoping to raise €4million in funding to support their services





After raising a whopping €914,000 in the 2022 cycle, this week, the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle (ROKCC) Committee announced that this year's 175 kms cycle will take place the first Saturday in July, it's habitual slot in the calendar.

Online registration will open on March 1st and with the aim to raise in excess of €1 Million for national and local charities.

In 2022, the Cycle was back on the road after a two year hiatus, and 6,000 cyclists took part and raised a whopping €914,000 for 34 Irish Charities and Voluntary Organisations. Since the events inception in 1982 close to €18 million has been raised making a powerful and meaningful difference to the people who need it most.

"A weekend seldom passes in Ireland without a Cycling Event happening somewhere in the country, YES - there is one significant difference when it comes to the Ring of Kerry Cycle!", John Rice, Chairman of ROKCC said. "Its purpose is solely to fundraise and to give back to communities. We are a non-profit organisation. It is not a race, nor is it an event for cyclists looking to set a new PB time for the Ring of Kerry, of course it is for cycling enthusiasts as it is for newcomers to long distance cycling who want to make a difference, make a sacrifice, prepare for the challenge and give back to a Charity or Voluntary Organisation that is important in their own lives", John added

The 175 Kilometre cycle starts and ends in Killarney. The scenery along the route is beyond spectacular. Vistas of the Atlantic Ocean will accompany you for nearly 100 kms of the route from Glenbeigh to Kenmare and the most welcome views of all are that of the Macgillycuddy Reeks that will accompany you for your descent back to Killarney. More than one thousand volunteers comprising of medics, marshals and teams of

people manning the water and food stations ensure participants safety and sustenance.

Also announced today are the selected beneficiary charities for this year's cycle; commenting on the event, Fundraising Manager for Breakthrough Cancer Research, Eoghan O'Sullivan said "to be selected once again as beneficiary charity is a huge WIN for us. Thanks to the generous support of the public and the ROKCC we have invested millions in cancer research, funding the development of new treatments and diagnostics for cancer which has already led to eight new treatments progressing to clinical trial. Funds raised from the ROKCC 2023 will help fund two exciting new projects in breast and oesophageal (food pipe) cancers and ultimately helping us in our mission to make more survivors."

"I arrived to Belfast and met all 23 other winners of the award from Ireland and Northern Ireland and immediately we were all attached at the hip rushing to dinner together and having our first night of our trip", Abbie said.

The group then spent the following day in Belfast, first visiting city hall and having a private luncheon and conversation with the Lord Mayor of Belfast, Tina Black. "She taught us about her position as both a women in politics and also her position in Northern Ireland. We then visited Stormont. We had a guided tour and spoke with three MLAS and had the opportunity to ask them questions", Abbie said.

The group then headed to Dublin to visit Europe House where they learnt about all the facilities and opportunities available to them in the European Union and share their thoughts on big issues.

"In my opinion, this trip taught us how to work and converse as adults whilst also have as much fun as possible with our peers!", she said. The group received their official certificates and then went to the Dáil for our second tour of state governments.

It was then onto Frankfurt airport and the long drive to Strasbourg from Germany where the group booked into a hostel which they shared with over 500 other Students attending the

A LITERARY FESTIVAL FOR KILLARNEY?

EAMONN FITZGERALD LOOKS AT HOW THE TOURIST SEASON COULD BE EXTENDED IN THE TOWN

Ardshanvooley residents are beaming with pride on the recent birth of Conall Cooper, the first child of proud parents Ceitilís and Colm Cooper. Colm, affectionately known as Gooch, is one of the greats of Kerry football stars winning 5 All-Irelands and 8 All-Stars in a glittering career.

In faraway Japan another Ardshan. native continues to excel in another field. Colin O'Sullivan, a teacher of English to Junior High and Senior High School students in Aomari in the north of Spain regarded as the snowiest city in the world has published 6 well-known novels, and his name will certainly be up on lights next autumn when Sunny, the Apple TV series based on his novel The Dark Manual will stream worldwide. It will run for 10 episodes and is scheduled for the autumn.

Jessie Buckley, Michael Fassbender, the late Donie Courtney, Joe O'Connor, Dóchas, West End [Killarney] School of Acting, The Scarlet Pimpernel of the Vatican[Monsignor Flaherty] and now Colin O'Sullivan the award-winning writer, should set local minds working.

Killarney Chamber of Commerce or a forward-thinking Town Councillor should promote the idea of a literary festival to complement the other wonderful festivals that make Killarney so attractive for visitors and locals alike. This could be ideally centred through the new St Brigid's bank holiday weekend. Killarney has the accommodation, facilities, unrivalled scenery, and proven organisational expertise to pick February 1st, extending the 2024 tourist season a full 6 weeks ahead of the present kick-off date of St Patrick's weekend.

There is something special about Ardshan football and writing.

Author Colin was very modest about his achievements when I contacted him this week. "I visited the set [Sunny TV] in November 2022 with my wife Yuki and we got the whole VIP experience from Apple and A24, the production company. We got to meet some of the stars, Rashida Jones et al, and they all were utterly charming and down to earth. Also, we met with Irish director Dearbhla Walsh as she directed it. It's a mixture of English and Japanese and will stream worldwide."

Following on the Oscar nomination for 'An Cailín Ciúin', language is no barrier to world acclaim. Colin's books have been translated into French, Russian, and Turkish.

Colin's parents are Betty and Pa O'Sullivan, both now retired in Woodlawn and well known in Killarney where they ran the very successful Safe Hands Dry Cleaning service at Michael Collins' Place, now the Shire bar and Coffee shop.

I spoke to Betty and she said,

"We were delighted with the confirmation that Colin's latest book will be serialised over 10 episodes on TV. Now he will be reaching a much broader readership. We are very proud of his writings. Sure, he was always writing. Now we look forward to seeing him and his family home to Killarney visiting family and friends. He's a real Killarney man".

Colin 'O'Sullivan the prolific author and native of Killarney is married to Yuki. They have two offspring, their son Reinan (17) and daughter Nina (14)

The prizewinning author excelled in his 1992 Leaving Cert getting the top of the range A+ in English. That was no surprise to his teacher of English, who saw and encouraged the brilliance of this student. "Colin O'Sullivan was exceptional and a joy to teach. I recall his essays in preparation for the 1992 Leaving Cert. His interpretations of the literature on the course were so mature for an 18-yearold and he had the mastery of language to convey his individual interpretations. He wrote about 'misogyny', a word that is very much in vogue now, but back over 30 years ago, it was unknown and unused. He was a fan of Samuel Beckett and Beckett's writings are never easy to interpret. As a writer, he understands that life is never just black and white, more like the interchanging of light and darkness, and this is one of the features of his writings."

At Trinity, College he studied English and Philosophy where he discussed poetry with Brendan Kennelly, his lecturer, and tutor. He got to know journalist John Boland very well at Griffith College, Dublin, where he did a postgrad. in Journalism and Media Studies.

He was thousands of miles away from his native Killarney when he published first novel, Killarney Blues (2013), but his boyhood memories of the Killarney jarveys were crystal clear. The central character in Killarney Blues is Bernard Dunphy the eccentric fictional jarvey. "Yes, part of the joy of writing my debut novel was the process of imagining /recollecting

Killarney. It's the only novel where I mention actual place names. So, for example, when I was writing "Port Road" I was naturally seeing it in the mind's eye and delighting in it. The jarveys were of course an inspiration, I think primarily because of their uniqueness. You don't get them in any other town, hardly in any other country. They are a special breed for sure; how could I not write about them, they're so emblematic of Killarney. Everything in the books is entirely fictional, not based on any actual events Of course, certain characteristics of people find their way into characters in books, that's just down to observing, noticing, and utilising, "he said.

He received the prestigious Prix Mystère de la Critique, and was nominated for the Grand Prix de Literature Policière, for this his first novel,

The Starved Lover Sings (2017) is different: more dystopian and political with shades of Samuel Beckett. Poetry came to the fore, and not surprisingly as the author was 'always writing'. More of his novels include My Perfect Cousin, Marshmallows, The True Story of Cinderella and Other Secret Siblings

His 6th novel, The Dark Manual is a mix of Irish and Japanese, where the heroine is Irish but has a Japanese setting. His next novel will be published in May. The author has happy memories of Fia Rua Writers' Group, prominent in Killarney in the 1990s. "I am still in touch with my dear friends Eileen Sheehan and John W. Sexton.", he said.

Middle Ireland finds its voice- The way forward for Fianna Fail?

There was a heated debate on Joe Duffy on Tuesday with contributors from squeezed "middle Ireland" wondering why they bother to work at all.

Not only is middle Ireland not entitled to anything, they are penalised. They would be far better off never trying to buy their own house, and never trying to put anything aside for a pension, was the reaction to the news that once again there were generous tax breaks and hand-outs for everyone but them.

Suddenly we live in a society where either the very top or the very bottom are rewarded and there really is nothing for the workhorse in the middle who feels abandoned by all political parties, was the theme.

Almost anticipating this anger, there was an interesting and brave contribution from Fianna Fail councillor Michael O'Shea at Monday's council meeting in Tralee.

Basically, there is no housing in Kerry for people of modest incomes who want to buy their own home.

Social housing either by the council or by the myriad number now of voluntary housing agencies is the only game in town.

The "trend" was for private developers to get planning for highly concentrated developments, but then to enter into agreements with social housing bodies to sell off the lot to these agencies which meant only social housing applicants whose incomes are low enough could get a house, Michael said.

That meant a whole segment of society, "middle Ireland" was being excluded, the mid-Kerry councillor said. "It's not all about social housing. Middle Ireland too needs a chance. Young couples can't get a start and are being left behind," he said.

Michael is the first local representative I have heard to so strongly advocate for this forgotten modest income sector - what was once the traditional voter base for Fail and indeed Fine Gael.

(Why a section of social housing, say 20 per cent, cannot be made available to be bought is beyond me. Especially when we already have such a provision in private housing).

Might I suggest that Fianna Fail as a party follow Michael O'Shea's lead and try and represent middle Ireland (the crowd Leo says get up early in the morning)? There would be votes - not to mention political representation for this most overlooked group.

The group who pay for everything from mortgages to college fees to Gps and private health insurance - and are entitled to nothing.

Let Sinn Fein have one end of "liberal"

Fine New book from Lewis Road native - Ireland woke and broke!

The art of the long essay is not dead. Killarney has long punched above its weight when comes to literary prowess and love of the pen. "Muzak: Inside New Ireland 20-16-2020" by Lewis road native Donal Horgan is a fine example of the



thought provoking art.

Donal, a historian whose previous works have concentrated on tourism and travel, turns his attention to the elephant in the room and the myths of new Ireland. This is a country with a simplistic idea of itself where everything in the past is being painted as a travesty and everything new is painted as progress.

"Today, Ireland is most likely to be presented as some socially progressive and prosperous Atlantic idyll located off the coast of Europe. It's a view widely shared and promoted by Dublin's liberal commentariat," Donal writes as he dismantles the cliched groupthink that has almost completely undermined the strong honest values of middle Ireland.

Ireland's own narrative about itself is one that remains largely unquestioned, Donal writes. The prevailing view is that Ireland has been transformed from a socially conservative backwater into a modern progressive utopia. But this is a country that, in the space of one generation, has simply swapped nationalism for globalism, Catholicism for consumerism and conservatism for liberalism.

"This is now one of the most centralized countries in Europe, one increasingly centred on the Dublin metropolitan area."

100 years after the Easter Rising 40 percent

of the citizens of the Republic now live within 50 km of Dublin's GPO - twice that of 1911.

It is an Ireland in which the State has never exercised as much influence over the lives of its citizens, he writes.

"Woke and broke" is an apt description of the very vocal echo chamber sector meaninglessly shouting and marching only to preserve the views of the new centre left establishment.

New Ireland holds up "the glittering and tantalising prize " of a world of equality for all - while the young's chance of buying a house is remote.

What has become a very one sided Irish media also comes in for a bashing.

There is much to chew over in this excellent, soundly argued reflection written during lockdown.

Although not directly involved in education now, "the very presence of the nuns in the town had been invaluable" and should be celebrated, he said.


Fr Hayes supports the call by Nora Finnegan of Kenmare Lace and Design to establish a museum to the nuns.



MINISTER kept pledge to be a **FRIEND** TO KILLARNEY

✓ illarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce has welcomed the Government's decision to extend the nine per cent hospitality VAT rate until the end of August, commenting that it will be very significant in helping the tourism industry to continue its post pandemic recovery.

Former Chamber President Niall Kelleher, whose two-year term ended earlier this month, said he had made the VAT issue his number one priority during his recent discussions with the Minister for Finance, Michael McGrath, and he thanked him for the positive outcome.

At the Killarney Chamber President's lunch in January, which was attended by Minister McGrath, Mr Kelleher asked for measures to be taken to ensure commercial and industrial enterprises were supported.

"The minister was well aware of our campaign here in Killarney to ensure the nine per cent VAT rate was maintained beyond the planned cut-off date of February 23. He knew that the tourism and hospitality sector locally was most impacted by the public health restrictions," Mr Kelleher said this week.

"The reality is that hospitality needed that support and if the 13.5% rate was reintroduced, it would have created a major disadvantage as consumers and overseas visitors would have been paying the third highest tourism VAT rate in Europe if visiting here," he said.

"As the Kerry branch of the Irish Hotels' Federation and its chairperson, Bernadette Randles, had repeatedly pointed out, they had done really well to rebuild employment levels in the tourism industry back to 90% of the prepandemic figure and they must now seek to restore and grow tourism further, which can be achieved with the reduced VAT rate," Mr Kelleher added.

Ms. Randles, Chair of the Kerry Irish Hotels Federation (IHF) Branch, said that the measures

announced now give tourism businesses greater certainty as they grapple with the impact of the cost-of-living crisis on Irish consumers and key overseas markets.

"Tuesday's announcement is a clear recognition by the Government of the challenges facing tourism and hospitality, Ireland's largest indigenous employer which currently supports over 250,000 livelihoods. It will go a long way in

businesses and consumers are Picture: Valerie O'Sullivan facing significant economic and financial headwinds."

"A vibrant tourism industry is one of the most effective ways to spread employment opportunities and prosperity throughout the entire country. That is why the decision to extend the 9% VAT rate is so critical for communities and regions that rely on tourism as a major employer and driver of economic activity."

Tellingly, on that visit to Killarney on January 13, Minister McGrath reacted positively when the Chamber President called on him to support the continuation of the lower VAT rate.



COUNCIL INVITES APPLICATIONS FOR COMMUNITY RECOGNITION FUND

Funding available to community facilities supporting Ukrainian refugees

Kerry County Council is inviting applications for funding under a new scheme designed to support communities who are hosting Ukrainian refugees. The Department of Rural and Community Development has announced details of a €50 million national fund to support the development of community infrastructure and facilities in recognition of the contribution of communities in hosting new arrivals in the county in response to the Ukraine crisis.

This fund has been allocated to local authorities based on the numbers of new arrivals located there. Kerry County Council has received an allocation of €4.4m. Details of the scheme are now available on the Council's website.

The available funding will be distributed under two measures. Measure 1 will be distributed for use on transformative capital projects of a scale that will revitalise and enhance the economic and social environment of communities.

Proposals under this category 'must demonstrate that the funding is targeted at, and specifically invested in, those communities, villages and towns where the highest levels of new arrivals are located and where there is a clear need for investment identified.'

Measure 2 is a fund which will be allocated for small to medium scale capital projects 'that will deliver tangible benefits for communities' up to a maximum value of €40,000 per eligible project which are proposed by community groups, cultural organisations and sporting clubs across the county.

Application Forms for Measure 1 and Measure 2 Projects are available on www.kerrycoco.ie and applications must be submitted by 2 March 2023



APPLY NOW FOR PLC COURSES ON THE FURTHER EDUCATION AND TRAINING (FET) COURSE HUB



Further Education and Training (FET) offers a variety of life-long education options, including apprenticeships, traineeships, Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses, community and adult education as well as basic literacy and numeracy services. FET courses are provided through the Education and Training Board (ETB) network throughout the country as well as through other local providers including online through SOLAS' eCollege. FET courses are provided from levels one to six on the National Framework of Qualification (NFQ) for anyone over 16 yrs., who wants to learn new skills or enhance existing skills to get the right job, progress to third-level or to support the achievement of personal goals.

PLC courses are an attractive alternative to higher education and provide a link between 2nd level and 3rd level. The CAO route doesn't suit everybody directly after Leaving Cert. Some may not feel ready for 3rd level. Others may not have secured a CAO offer or may be unhappy with the offer received. Over 200 Colleges of Further Education throughout the country offer PLC courses leading to awards at QQI FET Levels 5 & 6 from Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI).

A PLC course is ideal for a person who has completed the Leaving Cert and requires further vocational education and training to enhance her/his employment prospects. A PLC course provides students with the opportunity to try out a course before committing to 3rd level studies. It's also tailor made for a student with the Leaving Cert Applied (LCA) and for mature students, who are returning to education.

PLC courses are full time, mainly one year, offering a blend of academic work, practical work and work experience. Many PLC courses lead directly to employment. Increasingly, PLC courses are used to access 3rd level education, with more than 700 courses in the CAO system

now accepting a PLC qualification for entry. Last year, about 14,172 applications to the CAO offered a PLC qualification. This is a very healthy development as it provides an alternative route into 3rd level.

Through the higher education links scheme (HELS), the PLC courses provide an alternative route into CAO courses other than Leaving Cert exam results. A PLC course normally involves completing eight modules in the academic year. Students' entry to CAO colleges is then based on a scoring system for PLC awards achieved at Level 5 and/or Level 6 on the NFQ. Full details about the scoring system are available on the QQI website, www.qqi.ie.

CAO has provided links to a host of full-time higher education, further education and training and apprenticeship options available to post-second level applicants. However, CAO does not accept applications for further education courses or apprenticeships. For all queries and information about Further Education and Training or Apprenticeship options, click on the further education and training tab on the CAO website. Alternatively. go to the FET course hub, www.fetchcourses.ie.

To apply for a PLC Course on the CAO website, click on the further education and training tab. This will open up the further education and training course hub. Click on the course category that interests you or select all courses. A list of available courses in your chosen category will be displayed along with details of the course provider. Select the course you are interested in. More information about the course will be displayed including details of course content, entry requirements, course qualifications, awarding bodies and location. Apply for a course by clicking on the 'apply now' link. You must now register with Fetchcourses. Once registered, up you will be able to see details of the courses you applied for. You can also save courses to your account which you can review at a later date. Contact details for the course provider are available for further information. Once you have applied for a course you will receive acknowledgement of your application within three days. Your course provider will supply details of the next step.

The centralised application system has made the application process for PLC courses much easier. Entry requirements normally consist of Leaving Cert standard and satisfactory performance at interview. Mature applicants are assessed on their life's experiences. PLC colleges are now accepting applications so apply early as places on the most popular courses fill up quickly.


"Our hard-working chairperson Brid O

and incoming talent with businesses to meet their growth needs.



MINISTER FOLEY **CONFIRMS OVER €1.7** MILLION IN ONCE-OFF FUNDING

for voluntary and community health providers

inister for Education and Kerry T.D Norma Foley welcomes Iconfirmation of €1,760,614 in once-off funding for voluntary and community health providers in Kerry through the Government's 'Inflation Fund'.

UTILITY BILLS TRIPLE IN 12 MONTHS

Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill has re-issued a warning that many businesses throughout Ireland are on the brink of collapse, due to the sheer size of the Utility Bills they are expected to pay. It is widely reported that the cost of oil, electricity and gas, has returned to the levels they were at before Russia invaded Ukraine, but this is not reflected in the costs to homes and businesses.

"I have put down a Notice of Motion asking Kerry County Council to call on the Commission for Regulation of Utilities to initiate an investigation into the prices charged by these companies both pre and post invasion in comparison to the cost to them of oil, gas and electricity. If there is any level of price gouging involved, I will expect all customers to be

> reimbursed" stated Councillor Cahill.

"However, many businesses are on the brink of collapse, due to the fact that they cannot service such inordinate price rises. I have had representations from business owners, in

Glenbeigh, Cahersiveen, Killorglin and Killarney, businesses who are well known in our communities, who have put their life and soul in to building up what they have, who tell me that they suddenly find themselves in a loss making situation, have to borrow money and have to put their staff on notice" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"A businessman in Killorglin recently showed me his electricity bill for the month of January and it was over €14,000 in comparison to €5,000 for the month of January in 2022, triple the amount. He is now borrowing to pay his bills and this is not sustainable" stated Councillor Cahill

"This is a possible national economic disaster for Ireland and we must urgently find a way to prevent it from happening. We are already experiencing restricted hours in our Restaurants and Public Houses due to these increases and now we face restrictions, even closures, in other services such as a shops and Supermarkets etc," said Councillor Cahill.

"Emergency support needs to be put in place immediately and a return of normality to our Utility Bills before our whole economy and business community is devastated" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I outlined the seriousness of the situation at a recent meeting with the Minister for Finance, Michael McGrath and I am confident that a greatly improved Energy Support Scheme will be introduced to assist these businesses" added Councillor Cahill.



HIGH COST OF FERTILISER IN IRELAND

eputy Danny Healy Rae spoke in the Dail this week about the crisis in relation to the prices of fertilisers and what's happening to farming in Ireland today

This is the second year that Irish farmers will have to pay unrealistic, exorbitant over the top prices for fertilisers and for the last number of weeks Germany and other European countries and the UK are paying 40% less than our farmers for fertilisers, for example they pay €500 a tonne for urea while Irish farmers are paying €850 to €900.

I thought that when we went into the European Common Market in 1973 that all EU Countries would have a level playing field especially with prices for goods and supplies.

It has become very clear that we don't have enough competition in the Fertiliser market. This problem began back in October/November 2021 months before the Ukrainian war and prices began to soar and after Christmas, still before the war, prices increased further and i €380 a tonne in 2021, last year it was €1,000 some of the co-ops would not even quote farmers. Last March Kerry farmers could not even get fertiliser for 2 weeks as it was being held up by the distributors and Co-ops so they could increase the price further. It is absolutely ridiculous that many Co-ops won't actually quote farmers today for the price per tonne for fertiliser, think of that they won't quote the price, only bring it out to ye or bring it yer selves and we'll send ye a bill after.

It's very clear that the fertiliser distributors and suppliers are profiteering at the expense of our farmers, Yara one of the fertilizer suppliers' profits are up 60% between September and December of last year. Mosaic one of leading producers doubled its profits during the same period, the whole thing is rotten Taoiseach with farmers suffering and households crippled with increased food costs.

Urea started out, before it went up in price at

a tonne and it's still €900 a tonne now. The fertiliser companies blame the war and that the increased cost of gas was the reason for the increase in production costs, there has been a constant reduction in the price of natural gas of up to 85% since last September, likewise we should be seeing a massive reduction in the cost of fertiliser.

Taoiseach, it is now becoming very clear that we don't have proper competition in the fertiliser market with Gouldings, IFI, Grassland and Yara operating together I am calling for a high-powered investigation at a national level and a European level, what are the competition and consumer protection commission for? Is it a charade? Are they being paid for nothing; they are not helping Irish Farmers, or they are not helping Irish consumers by the way they are letting this go unattended.





HOW CAN I GET RID OF DARK HAIRS AT THE CORNERS OF MY LIP?

If it's just a few hairs tweezing is the best option to start with. Do not cut or shave the hairs as they will reappear like stubble because you are removing the fine hair tip. Shaving and hair removal creams will not increase your hair growth but the blunt edge left from cutting the hair makes it appear darker and thicker. Hot peel off wax done professionally in a salon is inexpensive, quick, painless and it will lighten your hairs and hair growth over time. Threading is another option like tweezing using thread to pluck the hairs but it can be painful. Laser hair removal can be expensive, however it will permanently reduce your hair



growth especially if your hairs are dark in colour. Electrolysis is the only permanent solution to removing hairs as it destroys your hair follicle in its growing stage. This can work well on a small area like the lip.

Removing these dark hairs will not encourage new hair growth. Just avoid removing vellus hairs (the fine hairs you were born with) as you do not want to stimulate blood supply to these hairs.





STRONG START BUT NO REWARD FOR KERRY FC

League of Ireland Div Two: Cobh Ramblers 2 Kerry FC 0

This has been a long time coming, over 60 years in the making really. And anyone who thought that Kerry FC's first foray into the League of Ireland would be the faltering steps of a newborn colt very quickly found out that these are thoroughbreds. No, they didn't get the result, and in fairness they didn't really deserve to on the overall balance of play, but they were much closer to it than it looks from the scoreline.

Kerry, understandably, defended deep early on as they established their footing at this level. The Guthrie brothers were simply magnificent. Wayne got down for his first save as early as the fourth minute, while Shane was absolutely indomitable at centre half all night. The problem for Kerry was that it was effectively three against two in the middle of Mounthawk Park and Cobh Ramblers had a very strong wind at their back. Matt Keane made intelligent use of early ball that came his way, while young Ronan Teahan was fearless in pushing forward, a real joy to watch. Graham Reilly did well as an overlapping full back; I expect him to be a real supplier of goals once Kerry get a couple of games under their belt. I did feel that we were trying to take the ball too far down the wings at times, but that will come.

Cobh were on top in terms of possession and always looked dangerous, with both Guthries kept busy. Cobh is a relatively small town with a huge soccer tradition, they are what we are capable of becoming, and they made the breakthrough shortly before half-time. It was a good goal too; it's not as if the defence did much wrong. Jack Doherty timed his move to perfection as he glided into the box and smoothly lifted the ball across for Tiernan O'Brien to smash a volley straight into the

bottom corner after 42 minutes. A friend said that it was "a bad time to concede a goal". Well, yes....l don't think there is a good time to be conceding a goal in soccer. Not conceding goals would sort of be the point.

Kerry had the wind in the second half, but that wasn't the only factor in Kerry's improvement. I may be extrapolating a bit, but it very much looked to me like Kerry were starting to realise that they were as good as their opponents and were less afraid of making mistakes and more willing to showcase their own abilities. Certainly the introduction of Leo Gaxha added direct pace and real venom to our attack. In fact, he very nearly had us on level terms, forcing a very good save out of Lee Steacy. Ten minutes later he was clear again, lifting a beautiful ball over the keeper, only for Michael McCarthy to clear it off the line. That led to a Kerry corner and there were definite shouts for a penalty when the ball came off a defender's hand. It wasn't a completely clear-cut decision, but I've seen the penalty given plenty of times – but this wasn't one of them. Look, that happens, and you can't let decisions like that derail your play.

Cobh were still dangerous themselves, as they proved by the nimble Doherty drawing another great save out of Wayne Guthrie.

Then came a little bit of a disaster. One down against a team like Cobh, you are always in with a chance, but two? And this time, unfortunately, it did come from a Kerry error. There wasn't enough weight on a pass back to the keeper, forcing Guthrie to race out and handle outside the area (I suppose you could argue begrudgingly that the referee saw that one alright!). Yellow for Wayne and a free kick in a dangerous area. Doherty struck it perfectly and Kerry were down two. With Cobh now withdrawing attackers to flood possession and essentially choke off Kerry chances, they were able to maintain that lead to the finish.

2-1 would have been a fairer result, I certainly thought we had a penalty shout and we

created other chances, but Kerry will be happy enough with their display. An attendance of 1200 on the night is crucial and hopefully those numbers will hold throughout the season – given the quality and entertainment value here, one would expect it to. That will give Kerry FC, an amateur team as yet, a sound financial footing and a base to build on.

Kerry has needed to take this step. For that matter, the often neglected League of Ireland needs promotion and fosterage in areas like Kerry, where it's no secret that there is an abundance of talent that until now had no way to showcase that talent locally. It wasn't to be on the scoreboard, but this was qa huge win for Kerry soccer in every other respect.

Next up is a tough trip away to Bray Wanderers, who beat Treaty United in their opening game, this Friday night.

How do Mayo do this? How do they keep going back to the well, year after year, generation after

generation? Lee Keegan has finally stepped away – he will always be in the conversation about the best player never to win a celtic cross. Same with McHale and McDonald. Cillian O'Connor and Paddy Durcan were on the bench last weekend. And yet, somehow, Mayo come back just as hungry, just as strong. People talk about heartbreak – they are wrong. Those hearts are plain and simply unbreakable. I like Mayo. Dog tough, clean, hard, relentless.

Look, it's early. I know it's early, and maybe they were gunning a little bit too hard and too fast. They coughed up a draw to Armagh in their last game when, frankly, potential champions should have had the nous to finish it out. As some-one said after this game, "that's the best All Ireland Mayo have ever won in February. Bit of a barb there, but a ring of truth as well.

But if they are hitting peak form a touch early, Kerry are way behind the curve. I've been nonchalant enough so far, given the length of our club season and the players who not only deserved but needed a rest. But we were so far behind the pace here that time is getting short to close that gap. Even more worryingly, I'm not seeing young guns really picking up the slack or laying down firm markers. Hunger and workrate, sure. Effectiveness? Not so much. Darragh Roche has proven himself an option. Mike Breen has looked like a player who is staking a claim. But frankly I don't think the likes of Paul Geaney, Gavin White, Adrian Spillane (we badly missed his physical presence) will be sweating on regaining their starting places. Jason Foley did well on a tough day against a rejuvenated Aidan O'Shea. Paul Murphy was Kerry's best player for me. I thought Micheál Burns was having a very good game in terms of tracking and work; he wasn't the player I'd have withdrawn at half-time, even though changes were clearly necessary. Donal Down O'Sullivan was over-praised after a very good display against a limited Monaghan; I certainly wouldn't be writing him off on this display. We had physically small forwards for the most part - Barry O'Sullivan impressed me when he moved in as a target-man, while David Clifford and Seán O'Shea also made a huge difference - God help us if they get injured. Our talent pool is a lot shallower than we were hoping, that's the blunt truth. Mayo were fitter, faster, stronger.

They are also very well organised. McStay has been seriously impressive. Physique and, to a certain extent, speed are gaps that can be narrowed on the training ground, so that doesn't bother me. But they threw our defence by going for the jugular. Mayo were happy with one on one duels and it proved profitable for them. Aidan O'Shea is doing tremendous damage inside opening up defences. Ruane, Flynn, O'Shea....that's some axis. O'Donoghue is a deadly predator. James Carr is starting to look like the real deal. Hession is filling Keegan's auxiliary role to perfection. I'm not convinced by Mayo, but they definitely look capable of going toe to toe with Galway and Roscommon. Mind you, Cork have been showing that they will be real contenders in Munster (they have been unlucky with results, but they are playing very good football), and I actually think that will be good for us when it comes to championship.

I'm not going to go through the game play by play. There's no need. There are no significant individual patterns. We were well off the pace. Both sides missed early chances before James Carr won a free converted by Ryan O'Donoghue. James Carr added a long range mark. Enda Hession turned over the kick-out, leaving Ryan O'Donoghue in for a goal that was coughed up far, far too easily. Too many steps? Arrah, you are never going to get that call in your favour. Donal O'Sullivan won and converted our opening score and was then deftly robbed as he broke towards goal. Jordan Flynn picked off the kind of point that looks easy but isn't. Darragh Roche showed nice balance for one point but Jordan Flynn almost got through for goal. O'Donoghue with a point. Another bad turnover in our defence, and James Carr...2-4 to 0-2. Maybe Shane could have done a bit better, but it was a good strike. Again, though, we handed them the opportunity far too easily - our turnovers were giving Mayo scores on a platter, and they were quick to accept. Kerry are playing like a minor team against adults. Flynn, O'Donoghue, Carr....they are picking us off at

their ease, and the crowd are loving it.

Dara Moynihan with a good steal allowed Tony Brosnan to score a beauty – Pádraic Colum wrote about "in wild earth, a Grecian vase", an unexpected thing of beauty in dull surroundings. That point was something similar, but there was a lot more wild earth than Grecian vases in Kerry's football. Three points in 35 minutes? That's the kind of scoreline you would see back in the 1920s when football was a series of one on one battles.

We did improve in the second half. In fact, technically we 'won' the second half by 1-7 to 0-4. Look, that's arrant nonsense. One of those phrases that sounds like intelligent analysis until you stop and think and realise that it's completely meaningless. We brought on probably the two best forwards in the country last year and they shared five points between them. Quelle surprise. David's first point was stunning - mind you, that was a bit of a lazy yellow card. Barry Dan's goal was a real thing of beauty, but it was also pretty much token resistance at that juncture. We didn't 'win' the second half, we lost the game by double figures. Mayo took their foot off the accelerator and could easily afford to.

I don't particularly want us playing in a National League Final. To be honest, given the tighter schedule these days, I expect the Division One Final to be a damp squib this year, most teams are too close to championship to commit to it. That was the case with the last couple of finals. But I don't want us in a relegation battle either, and that's looking like a strong possibility.

happy with two wins from our first four games. I would have expected us to struggle against a Dublin team that has the likes of Leah Caffrey, Lauren Magee and Carla Rowe. Those players took over from Cork as the best in the country, and they have only been a bare fraction behind Meath in the past two years. Remember, Kerry were building from Division Two and still losing out to Cork during that period. But Declan Quill and Darragh Long were quietly and carefully building around the experience of the likes of Lorraine Scanlon, Kayleigh Cronin, Cait Lynch, Louise Galvin, Louise of course (surely her surname is superfluous at this stage) and the young and hungry players like Siofra O'Shea, Hannah O'Donoghue, Rachel Dwyer, and Erica McGlynn. That's without Danielle O'Leary or Paris McCarthy.

Kerry were stunningly good here. Dublin are a strong team, but they were simply blown away. Louise Ní Muircheartaigh has three All Stars; I'd say she can mark this year's date in her calendar already. 11 points against Dublin. There's a majority of teams - teams, not individual players - who aren't going to score that against Dublin. Bean laoch an chluiche. I don't care. I'm just going to save time by filling in that box in my report before the throw-in from now on. That's how good Louise is. Mary O'Connell wasn't far behind her, I thought O'Connell was an absolute colossus around the middle and herself and Lorraine Scanlon were in complete control. Kayleigh Cronin is just imperious. You may as well try to catch lightning as chase Cáit Lynch in possession.

Kerry took control from the off but were caught by a very good Dublin goal. No fault to the defending; that was very well crafted and a fine finish by Kate Sullivan. I remember a time when that would have thrown Kerry off, but this Kerry team didn't even blink. There is steel in them. Louise set up Hannah O'Donoghue to make it 1-9 to 1-4 and Siofra O'Shea hit an absolute rocket after good work by Niamh Carmody. 2-10 to 1-4 at half-time, and Kerry were full value for it.

There was no let-up in the second half either.

Kerry's subs blended in seamlessly and Siofra O'Shea set up Ciara Murphy for a third goal late on to seal a really emphatic victory.

Look, the same caveats apply as to the mens' game against Mayo, except in reverse. It's February. Nobody is handing out any medals just yet. Even so, Kerry have made a real statement of intent here.

GAA CONGRESS

Like our own County Convention, it's a smoother, more clinical operation than it used to be. Part of me misses the firebrand speeches, the passionate arguments. Frank Murphy and our own Gerald McKenna teasing and arguing with each other in a myriad of languages and somehow remaining the best of friends. Now it's all committees.

On the other hand, I remember the drives home from the Austin Stack Pavilion at 2.00am, trying to make a coherent story out of scores of scribbled notes. Half the time I couldn't even read my own writing. It was fun in many ways, but it was chaotic.

Jarlath Burns, the former Armagh midfielder who captained his county, has been involved in GAA administration for a long time. As I recall, his first prominent position was as Player's Committee Chairman - the GAA's attempt to curb the rise of the GPA. He remains a strong critic of the GPA and has never hidden his belief that it is a step too close to professionalism in the GAA, something he has always opposed. He was also Chair of the Standing Committee for Playing RulesHe isn't any firebrand though, and I would expect him to be a proactive President. Certainly he was very much the popular choice. Having come second to current incumbent Larry McCarthy the last time around, he picked up a clear 158 votes out of a possible 277 votes, with Pat Teehan getting 70 and Niall Erskine 49. The ages for the various underage grades was always going to be a big talking point, but the GAA's earlier softening of the restrictions on U20s playing senior and counties being allowed to choose between 'even' and 'odd' ages enabled them to hold a firm line despite strong debate in regard to U17 minor. Weexford's motion to allow U20s play in senior competitions provided there is a seven day window between games was the the only one of nine underage motions to pass. Four were withdrawn as a result of the recent changes and four more were defeated on the floor. Kerry's Tralee Parnells were one of three clubs to put forward motions about restoring the U18 minor grade, citing player dropout, but strong speeches from respected figures such as Dr. Pat O'Neill, Tom Parsons, John Prenty and Michael Geoghegan saw the motions heavily defeated despite an impressive supporting speech from Cork's Kevin O'Donovan.

There was good news for Kerry hurling, with 91% of delegates voting to allow Kerry to enter the Munster Senior Hurling Championship if



they should win the Joe McDonagh Cup, rather than having to win a play-off. It never struck me as fair, an obstacle for the sake of an obstacle rather than for the overall good of hurling. Galway will also be included in the Leinster Minor Hurling Championship from now on. Again, a long overdue decision that only ever required a bit of common sense.

Liam Griffin's proposal to make hurling mandatory in almost every GAA club failed to attract enough support. A good idea in theory, but it would have been a disaster in practise.

It's no secret that the GAA has had a recent and alarming number of incidents at underage games involving match and team officials. Congress had no hesitation in increasing the mandatory penalty to 12 weeks suspension from 8, to be doubled if it is a juvenile game.

Slightly bizarrely, the attempt by Evan Comerford to shake the posts when Seán O'Shea was taking that famous free-kick against Dublin in last year's All Ireland semi-final prompted a motion to allow a kick to be retaken in those circumstances.

ATHLETICS

Congratulations to Killarney Valley athletes at the National Senior Indoor Athletics Championships. Sarah Leahy was once again the headliner, taking gold in the 60m with a new personal best of 7.3 seconds, the fourth fastest Irish time ever. Ciara Kennelly added a Senior Bronze to her U23 Gold in the High Jump. Darragh O'Leary set a new personal best of 9.0079 for the 3000m.

Olympian David Kenny of Farranfore/ Maine Valley followed up on his stunning win in Munster with gold in the 5km in 9'11", well ahead of second placed friend and rival Brendan Boyce.

Irish athletics is flourishing at the moment and two of the biggest names in that are Rhadisat Adeleke and Israel Otalunde. Adeleke has set a number of national records already this year. Last weekend it was Otalunde's turn, absolutely smashing Paul Hession's 16 year 60m record. Otalunde came in at 6.57 seconds, taking a complete 0.4 seconds off the old record (at 60m, you literally measure in microseconds, 0.4 of a second is an eternity at that distance).

As a full forward or center forward, he was a powerful presence who was difficult to stop. 4 O Donoghue Cup medals were won with Dr Crokes, but it was Fossa where he spent the majority of his post playing career, as a hugely important part of the Club's history, from it's creation to the present day, as Chairman and manager in those early year's. Murphys Bar, Barraduff, Killarney at 8pm on Monday 27th February 2023.

South Kerry Development Partnership CLG (SKDP)are looking for farmers in East Kerry and Killarney to join the Rural Social Scheme (RSS). To this end, SKDP are organising an information ,meeting at Murphys Bar, Barraduff at 8pm on Monday 27th February. South Kerry Development Partnership have currently 140 farmers working on the Rural Social Scheme and a further 27 places available for new farmers to join the scheme.

On the 9th January 2023 John Cronin was appointed as a full time RSS supervisor covering East Kerry and the Greater Killarney area in an effort to reach out to farmers and encourage them to join the RSS. John Cronin is based in the South Kerry Development Partnership CLG office at 37 High Street, Killarney, Co Kerry where farmers can meet John to discuss the opportunities provided through the RSS.

The Rural Social Scheme provides a supplementary income for low-income farmers and fishermen. To qualify for the scheme, you must be getting a social welfare payment. In return, people participating in the scheme provide services that benefit rural communities.

You work 19.5 hours per week on a local community project such as sports clubs, developing and upgrading walks ways, care of community buildings, maintaining community grounds, maintaining graveyards, care of the elderly, community administration etc. These hours are based on a farmer or fisher-friendly schedule. This ensures that participation on the scheme does not affect your farming or fishing activities. A participant retires from the scheme on the day before their 66th birthday.

Pictured is John Cronin, Rural Social Scheme Supervisor, Ruth Fleming, Mary Fleming, Kerry IFA 2nd Rep, Patsy Herlihy, Chairman Gneevguilla IFA Branch. To participate in the scheme, you must be 25 years or over and getting:

- · Farm Assist or
- if you are actively farming or fishing, you may qualify for the scheme if you are getting one of the following social welfare payments:
- · Jobseeker's Allowance
- · Jobseeker's Transitional Payment
- · Disability Allowance
- · One-Parent Family Payment
- · Widow's, Widower's or Surviving Civil Partner's (Contributory) Pension
- Widow's, Widower's or Surviving Civil Partner's (Non-contributory)
 Pension
- Increase for a qualified adult under 66 years of age as part of your spouse, cohabitant or civil partner's State Pension (Non-contributory)

You can retain your medical card while you are taking part in the Rural Social Scheme.

You must provide proof that you are actively farming. To do this, you must provide a copy of your application for the Basic Payment Scheme for the current year, including a valid herd number. If you are actively farming and have not applied for the Basic Payment Scheme, you should contact your local RSS implementing body, South Kerry Development partnership CLG for advice.

If you are a child or sibling of a herd number owner and you can certify that you are resident and or working on the farm and you are getting one of the qualifying social welfare payments, you may be eligible to participate in the scheme on the basis of your parent's or sibling's herd number.

If you are eligible but do not wish to participate in the scheme, your dependent spouse, civil partner or cohabitant can take the available place. Alternatively, if your spouse, civil partner or cohabitant is getting one of the qualifying social welfare payments and is actively farming, they can use your herd number to qualify for the scheme.

Your spouse, civil partner or cohabitant can participate in the scheme, if he or she is under 66 and you are getting a State Pension (Non-contributory) which includes an increase for qualified adult for him or her.







The vast majority of alpine plants are easy to grow in any reasonably well drained garden soil. alpines are ideal plants for rockeries and gaps in stone walls and they will give you colour from early spring right through the summer, the most important thing when choosing your alpine plants is to make sure you find out the growth rates so that one alpine plant won't take over other alpine plants in the rockery.

A good example of this would be an alpine called Cerastium (snow in summer) which is quite a quick growing alpine and spreads quickly in a short space of time. it can tend to take over small rockeries. having said that it is a beautiful plant with silver foliage and is covered, as the name suggests, in beautiful white flowers.

It can be pruned back to keep it under control.

There are also lots of alpines which are compact and can make perfect mounds and shapes, alpines are also great fillers for stone walls, an ideal plant for this would be a Campanula or aubrieta.

the aubrieta is a pink flowering plant that you see growing out of a lot of grottos. alpines can also be used in containers such as in troughs or window boxes but try to choose ones that are evergreen so that you will have some colour all year round.


Welcome back dear student, the power of prayer is misunderstood and faith is mocked in our 'woke' society. Yet amazingly, if something bad happens people will turn and blame God asking 'why, if God is good does He allow these awful things to happen?' Let's go back to the beginning. God created Adam and Eve and gave them dominion over this earth (Genesis 1:26-31; Genesis 2:7-25). So, we did not evolve from apes! Mankind is descended from Adam (which means 'man of earth') and Eve (which means 'to give life'/mother) - the couple God created and then joined in marriage. They were our original great-grandparents from whom we have all come. Now God told Adam and Eve to be fruitful and multiply by bringing more children forth for Him, but also to look after and rule over this earth. However Satan seduced them into doubting God, deceiving them into believing that they were missing out, and lured them to trust his lies. By disobeying God's command not to touch the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, they lost their relationship and alignment with God, thus handing over the authority that God had given them to Satan (Genesis 3:1-24). This gave the devil access to take over as 'the god of this world', and he is still blinding people with lies and causing destruction today (2 Corinthians 4:4). The Lord does not tell lies or deceive people, and He is bound by His Word (Hebrews 6:17-20). He gave His Word to Adam and Eve that they had dominion over this earth, and that remains so until Jesus comes back.

God is on the Throne in Heaven, but we are supposed to be in control here as His ambassadors. Unfortunately, many are living far from God - influenced by the devil and that is why the world is so messed up. But God's Word will never fail (Isaiah 40:7-8). He promised to deliver us from sin, redeem us from the powers of darkness, and restore our place in Him, so God sent His Son the Lord Jesus to die upon the Cross to pay for our sins (John 3:16; 1 Peter 2:24). All of us have been forgiven, but few receive the forgiveness and the new life that Jesus offers. Why? Because the lure and deception of sin is seductive, making people not want to change their lifestyles. Jesus said if you follow Me take up your cross (Matthew 16:24-27). He was not talking about a cross of sickness or disaster - that's curse, the very thing Yeshua came to destroy (Galatians 3:13). The cross Jesus speaks of is 'dying to self'. Laying down 'my agenda' and instead turning to, and living for God - obeying His Word, and being led by His Spirit (Romans 8:5-14; John 14:15). Because we are made in God's image we have the same creative power as God to declare His Word of Truth in prayer and see it come to pass. But make sure you deal with sin and unforgiveness because that hinders prayer. (Mark 11:22-26).


