News filtered early on Monday morning that Breda Walshe from Bridgefield and originally from Kilcummin had passed away suddenly.

Breda was well known to everyone in Killarney, wife to Enda Walshe, mother to Rebecca and Amy and a much loved daughter to Eddie and Kathleen Morrissey.

Speaking of his loss, Enda said that "a light went out in my life that I'll never replace..my partner for 28 years, my wife for 23 years but my soul mate forever.

The couple have two children Rebecca who is in college and Amy who is studying for her Leaving Cert at St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary School.

Speaking on the loss of his daughter in law, Cathal Walshe said that "It is with great sadness that earlier today we lost this beautiful lady Breda my daughter in law of 23 years and wife to my son Enda and mother to Rebecca and Amy. She was the daughter I never had and a great support to me since my wife June passed away just over two years ago. I loved her for her sense of humour, her generosity, kindness , hard work and wonderful person to be around. She had a great sense of style and vibrant personality to go with it. We will miss her terribly, she was taken far too soon.

Breda was full of life, a hard worker with a great sense of humour, she a keen follower of fashion who always had time to stop for a chat on her daily chores around Killarney.

SCHOOLS TEAM UP WITH COUNCIL TO HIGHLIGHT DOG FOUL PROBLEM

Kerry County Council is teaming up with local schools to draw attention to the issue of dog fouling. The initiative will be run through the Green Schools Programme and will involve students patrolling areas near their schools, spraying any dog faeces found with temporary bright yellow spray paint, thereby highlighting the prevalence of the problem.

"Dog fouling damages the aesthetic value of our shared public spaces, and is a nuisance that undermines our of society such as children, those with visual impairments, and wheelchair users," said Breda Moriarty, Environmental Awareness Officer with Kerry County Council.

"But dog fouling also carries a more serious risk. Dog faeces is harmful to people's health as it can contain dangerous parasites and bacteria," she added.

THAT OTHER CRIMEAN

In the race up the steps of the Tralee Courthouse, а person can sometimes overlook the monuments flanking the imposina buildina on Lord Nelson/ Ashe Street. The northern stone contains the names of 55 local men who lost their lives in the

lost their lives in the Crimean War. That was in 1854-1856 and once again there is war in the very same region.

160 odd years ago Crimea was firmly part of Russia and thousands of Irish flocked to the shores of the Black Sea to defend the European alliance of Britain, France, Turkey, and Sardinia against Russia.

Sevastopol and Balaclava became familiar as war fever gripped Kerry and the rest of Ireland. Medics, administrators, priests and women as wives, nurses and washerwomen all departed for the Crimea.

We don't know how many Kerry women died there. In most wars, women are overlooked. But the Kerry names on the war memorial include Bland, Dee, Barton, Hare, Courtney, Fewright, Healy, Fitzgerald, Lynch, Scully, Connor, Cahill, Flynn, Mahony, Sullivan, Keating, Carey, O'Dwyer, Twist, O'Neill, Murphy, Morphy, Ash, Fagan and Studdert. There's also a McElligot, a Donoghue, a Harrington and a Litton Hewson, a Foley and a Fagan along with a Naughten and a Fitzpatrick. Moriarty, Slatter, Begley, Gallivan and O'Sullivan are listed too. Surgeon James Bowen Thompson died.

On the plinth overhead is a captured Russian cannon.

Funnily enough, the Russians rushed into that war too and for similar reasons - freedom to practice the Russian language and Orthodox religion in Turkey. There are other parallels including that a mighty Russia, then as now, expected a quick victory and were surprised Europe became involved.

'Plus ca change, plus ca la meme chose,' springs to mind.

MEANWHILE, WILL WE HAVE AN ELECTION?

Between wars and evictions, I sometimes wonder if we are doomed to constantly repeat the past. But despite the echoes of the 19th century evictions, I can't see many backbenchers voting against the Government



and throwing themselves to the wolves of the electorate. I know this country is bad at math but there are a few basics anyone can figure out: the more population, the more people we have, the more housing we need. It is that simple. One in five workers here now are not Irish citizens, the IHF conference in Killarney was told and we are dependent on bringing people in to power the economy.

In the UK, the council of Westminster is bringing in a vacant homes tax. There will be a hotline for people to report empty neighbouring properties. An extension of the no-fault eviction will keep people off the streets only for now. Reporting neighbouring buildings for not turning their lights on - and in this day of high electricity bills, who is to say there are not dozens inside all huddling inside in the dark - will also only go part of the way. The real answer is more units.

Meanwhile, the electoral boundary commission/An Coimisiún Toghcháin is inviting submissions to prepare for a general election in a year or two. Is Kerry is too big geographically to be a single constituency? The smart money is on a return to two constituencies. Certainly, the south of the county has lost out in the current single five seater.

But housing is not the only thorny issue. Jerry O'Sullivan on Radio Kerry drew an interesting quip from Green Ireland South MEP Grace O'Sullivan this week, and I was surprised the national media did not pick it up.'Believe me it isn't easy for the Greens in Government with Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael...' Grace said.

So does anyone believe the Greens will last in Government much longer?

CHRISTY HEALY'S SHOP: A MILESTONE.

An important milestone was marked in Killarney on St Patrick's Day. From planting potatoes to opening a business, St Patrick's Day in Killarney and South Kerry is regarded as the day of good beginnings.

And this St Patrick's Day, Healy's Shop in New

Street celebrated 100 years of unbroken service. Christy Healy's, holds a special place in the heart of Killarney.

Opened after the late Christy returned from his travels in the US, the shop at 86 New Street anticipated new ways of doing business seven days a week and in the century of its existence has only ever closed for close family funerals.

Killarney has changed much in recent years, but the taste of customers has stayed largely the same, says Aileen O'Brien, who runs it with her mother Angela O'Brien.

Angela, who began work 70 years ago in the shop founded by her father Christy and mother Ellen still works behind the counter.

Aileen is called after her grandmother Ellen O'Sullivan who met Christy Healy on a trip home from America and stayed.

At that time in Killarney there was a lot of coming and going between America and Killarney and indeed Canada.

Cigarettes are no longer as popular, but newspapers are still bought in great numbers and the ice cream cones which have lured generations of Killarney children are as popular as ever.

'The big thing is ham. People love the sliced ham and they come here for it,' said Aileen.

'It's the way it's cut,' she said, complementing the popular Kay Griffin who began working in the shop 34 years ago.

Christy opened the business on St Patrick's Day 'a big day to open in Killarney', Aileen said. Angela and her brother Johnny took over the reins after Christy retired. He died in 1979.

Much loved customers on the lanes off New Street have passed away and there is so much coming and going in Killarney now it is hard to keep track.

'There was a time when I would know everyone,' said Aileen, as we recalled great Killarney characters like the late Sandy Hayes who lived down the Green Lawn.

As well as pop-in customers, there is still a loyal base, not least the great Johnny Culloty, captain of the winning Kerry Team of 1969. Don MacMonagle snapped Johnny as the shop got ready for the big anniversary.

MARCH STATISTICS LOOK VERY PROMISING FOR CAO COLLEGE APPLICANTS

INTERIM

Interim figures released by the Central Applications Office (CAO) suggest that the demand for 3rd level courses continues to level off. The data covers the period up to 1st March 2023, the closing date for amending course choices. 78,025 applications have been lodged with the CAO, almost on par with the 78,012 at the same time last year. With the economy flourishing, it seems that more Leaving Cert candidates are seriously considering the 'world of work,' apprenticeships, traineeships and further education as alternatives to the CAO route. It looks as if the final number of CAO applications in 2023, which will be released later in the year, will continue the downward trend in applications of 84,420 last year and 84,526 in 2021. The significant decrease in the number of mature applicants (23yrs or older) is further indication of the growth in employment. In total, there are 5904 mature applicants, down by 683 on last year's figure and by 2763 on the 2021 figure.

DARE

9913 applicants to the CAO have registered for the Disability Access Route to Education (DARE). This is an increase of 1200 on last year's figure. DARE is a third level alternative admissions scheme for school leavers with an educational or medical disability.

HEAR

8624 applicants applied for the Higher Education Access Route (HEAR) route, a third level alternative admissions scheme for school leavers from socio-economically disadvantaged backgrounds who are resident in the Republic of Ireland. Despite the current pressure on household incomes, that figure is 623 less than last year.

CHANGE

The interim data will change slightly when late applications are taken into account and when the Change of Mind facility closes on 1st July at 5pm. The majority of CAO applicants will be permitted to use the Change of Mind facility when it opens on 5th May to add, remove or re-order course choices, which will result in changes to the figures released for 1st March. Late applications are accepted up to 1st May at 5pm.

COMPETITION

Despite the stabilisation in the number of

The Kemmy Business School (KBS) and the Business Studies Teachers of Ireland (BSTI) invited the students to acknowledge their achievement in being awarded a Distinction (90-100%) in the 2022 Junior Cycle examination in Business Studies. The four award winners from St. Brigid's were Li Chen (missing from photo), Muireann O'Brien, Ciara O'Sullivan and Gráinne Byrne. Congratulations to the students, their families and their teachers.

CAO applications, competition for prestigious courses will again be intense if the grades are artificially inflated as they were last year. On average, the 2022 Leaving Cert class received about 60 CAO points more than they would have achieved in 2019. It brought more CAO applicants up to very high, if not maximum, points levels, putting pressure on courses where competition is always very keen. It's now time to return to the normality of the pre-Covid marking schemes and reduce the points to the 2019 levels in order to ease the pressure on the 2023 Leaving Cert Class.

SURGE

Disciplines that have seen a surge in first preference applications include Business/ Administration up to 8805 from 8492 last year or by 4%, Law up to 2779 from 2627 or by 6%, Information & Communications Technology up to 4067 from 3829 or by 6%, Engineering up to 4189 from 4025 or by 4%, Architecture/ Construction up to 2778 from 2627 or by 6%, Agriculture up to 408 from 345 or by a whopping 18%.

DROPPED

As expected, the general Arts/Humanities/ Language degrees have appealed to a huge 11,050 applicants, up slightly from last year's figure of 10,942. Surprisingly, social science applications have dropped by 7%, down from 5472 to 5071. Interest in health-related courses is down 7% from 13021 to 12087. Applications for degrees in Environmental Science have dropped from 532 to 452 or a significant 15%, which suggests the 'green wave' has calmed. **SPECIALIST**

In the specialist groupings, applications for Primary Teaching have dropped to 2259 from 2543 or by 11%, which is of concern. Secondary Teaching applications have increased to 2180 from 1960 or by 11%, which is very good news. Nursing degree applications, down by 10% to 3908 from 4363 and medical degree applications, down by 11% to 3606 from 4058 are indicative of the difficult working conditions in these areas. Dentistry degree applications remain steady at 455 from last year's 464 while Pharmacy degree applications have increased significantly to 532 from 484 or by 10%. **TRENDS**

Applications, with the exception of the changing trends mentioned earlier, are very

much on par with current trends in a very healthy employment environment. Applicants are keeping a very close eye on the jobs market and are aware that a good qualification is a passport to a successful career. Prospects for the 2023 Leaving Cert class look very promising. Except for a few very competitive quota-based courses, there will be a third level course on offer for the vast majority of CAO applicants. That's how it should be!

Airbnbs - "If we are not careful, we could kill the goose that lays the golden egg"

A Kerry County Councillor has called on the A Local Authority to be fair and balanced when dealing with Airbnbs and has warned "If we are not careful, we could kill the goose that lays the golden egg".

Tourist accommodation in Ireland is made up of a mixture of types, that suit different categories of visitors to the different areas of the country. There are Hotels, Guesthouses, Bed & Breakfasts, Houses, Apartments, Hostels, etc, and more recently, Airbnbs.

Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill believes that all of these accommodation options are essential to the success of our Tourism Industry and that there should be a level playing field for each type of business.

"These are all in the main legitimate business operations, adding value to our tourism product, different potential customers preferring a particular option for themselves, depending on their circumstances. Some may wish to avail of the many additional facilities of a hotel, some less so, without pools, bars, prepared meals etc,." stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"I don't agree that different regulations should apply to any option being made available to our visitors, as long as everybody is on the same hymn sheet, providing safe, comfortable

accommodation and are complying with the present laws. Tourism provides employment and income for our people and tax returns to the Exchequer" said Councillor Cahill.

"Here in Kerry, it is more visitor accommodation that is required, not less and we should welcome new entrants to a market which I see growing enormously with the opening of facilities, such as the South Kerry Greenway and indeed the North Kerry Greenways. In the case of the South Kerry Greenway it is a widely known fact that a substantial increase in accommodation will be required to service the anticipated hundreds of thousands of additional visitors to the region on an annual basis" said Councillor Cahill.

"There has been a growing anti Airbnb movement in Ireland for a number of years now which seems to be gaining in momentum in recent times and I believe it is time for Local Authorities and in particular Planning Departments to clarify and explain that the majority of these Airbnbs are legitimate businesses, that they are providing a valuable service that is badly needed, that many have proper Planning permission in place, that many more are exempt due to the fact that they have been operating for several years and that families are entitled to earn a small income, if they have a spare room or 2 and

that they play a critical role in accommodating tens of thousands of visitors to our county every year who may not for various reasons be accommodated elsewhere in Kerry" stated Councillor Cahill.

"Not everyone can afford to get involved in Tourist Accommodation with the traditional forms of Hotel or B&B for example, but the Airbnb model does offer an opening to people to rent one or two rooms or a renovated cottage, etc,. Airbnb for most people is just a small additional income of \in 5,500 to \in 6,000 per annum, offering flexibility to hosts and visitors" said the Fianna Fáil Councillor.

"The more varied offerings and options we here in Kerry have for our potential visitors, with different levels of holiday budgets, the more people will visit here to sample the delights of our county" said Councillor Cahill. "I believe we must be very careful here in Kerry and that we do not drive Eirbnbs out of the market as there will always be a need for short-term lets" stated Councillor Cahill. "The Planning Department in Kerry County Council has some big decisions to make and must take into consideration the very obvious requirements for Airbnbs or if we are not careful, we could kill the goose that lays the golden egg" added Councillor Cahill.

SCREEN TIME, FACTS FOR PARENTS

Most parents worry about how much time children are spending on digital devices. Here are the facts

WHAT IS BLUE LIGHT?

Sunlight contains red, orange, yellow, green and blue light rays. Combined, this spectrum of coloured light rays creates what we call 'white light' or sunlight.

Depending on where they fall on the spectrum, light rays have long wavelengths (with less energy) or short wavelengths (with more energy).

Blue light is a high-energy visible light and has shorter wavelengths. It is known as blue light because it is on the violet-blue band of the spectrum.

Blue light is naturally present in sunlight but is also something we can see from screens such as TVs, computers, smartphones and tablets.

Can blue light damage my child's eyes?

There is currently no scientific evidence that blue light causes damage to the eyes. However, there is evidence to suggest that carrying out near tasks, involving looking at something close-up, such as using mobile devices, screen time and reading a book, can increase eye strain for those who do this for long periods of time.

What is digital eye strain?

Digital eye strain happens when a lot of time is spent using near vision, for example, reading on screen or playing online games.

One of the main symptoms is temporary blurred vision but other signs such as sore and tired eyes, dry eye and headaches are also associated with digital eye strain.

may contribute to poorer sleep, which may mean your child's concentration levels are lower during the day. This may be because blue light is linked to the suppression of the hormone melatonin which makes us feel sleepy. However, there is a range of other factors linked to disrupted sleep.

Can blue light filtered lenses help? Some people report that lens coatings that filter blue light make their eyes feel more comfortable or are helpful before bed.

IS THERE A LINK BETWEEN SCREEN TIME AND SHORT-SIGHTEDNESS?

Short-sightedness, or myopia, is increasing throughout the world. Family history, ethnic background, environment (living indoors, in cities) and carrying out near tasks, such as screen use, have all been linked to the development of myopia. However, there is no clear evidence to suggest that screen time alone is the direct cause. But, there is good evidence to suggest that children who spend more time outdoors are at lower risk of developing short-sightedness.

TIPS FOR KEEPING YOUR CHILD'S EYES HEALTHY

Get them outdoors – regular play and exercise can help prevent or reduce the development of myopia (short-sightedness). Studies show two hours of outdoor activity a day is ideal1 Use night settings - using night settings, if your device has them, may help children sleep by reducing the amount of blue light given off by the screen during night-time hours

Make sure digital devices are turned off at least an hour before bedtime

Book your child in for a sight test at least every two years, from the age of three.

HISTORY MAKERS Six Nations: Ireland 29 England 16

For me, the Six Nations is the heartbeat of international rugby. Test matches vary depend on opposition and time of the year; those are games for moulding clay, not baking it. The world cup, and of course I'd love for us to win it (let's be very careful about hatching early chickens in that regard) still has a small veneer of newness and artificiality compared to the six nations. It's deservedly garnered a lot of credibility and is a real showcase for two hemisphere rugby, but the fact is that you are realistically looking at a very small number of potential winners. The Six Nations is obviously an even smaller pool, but with the exception of Italy, every nation has seen it's fortunes rise to dizzying heights and fally to genuine nadirs among the passing generations.

Let's face it. Go back a couple of years and France looked like obvious kingpins. England and real potential and a lot of muscle – yours truly thought that they were very much a coming superpower. Wales and Ireland were much of a much, maybe we had a slight edge but it was very close. Scotland were gallant but labouring. Italy – and I'm not being mean here, just honest – have always made up the numbers.

I could have seen Ireland snatching a triple crown if things clicked. A slam? Forget it. I was actually surprised by our win in 2018, I certainly wasn't expecting one for a very long time to come. A team that included Brian O'Driscoll, Paul O'Connell, and Ronan O'Gara just barely managed one thanks to a late drop goal to bridge a gap of three score years – the camera panning to Jackie Kyle is an image that stays with me.

I thought at the time that beating a tired New Zealand in Soldier's Field was the most exaggerated triumph in Irish sporting history. I really did not think of it as any turning point in history. More a confluence of circumstances. Yes, Ireland did play very well, but that wasn't an All Black team that carried their traditional aura of invincibility. The All Blacks have looked somewhat vulnerable ever since, whereas Ireland have gone from strength to strength - players that weren't getting a look in down under have flourished in Ireland's jersey. The games last Summer and Autumn was more about shaping Ireland and settling on the team hierarchy - I honestly was more interested in performances in adversity than any results. Ireland passed every test, but again, I was disappointed with some opposition displays. I can't help suspecting that understated Andy Farrell has a knack for getting the best out of players. Moreover, even on the hard days along the way, there was a feeling of amiability and enjoyment about this Irish team. They seem to relish being in camp, whereas you get a sense



of a burden of expectation on English players in particular.

I a bit of a pessimist at the best of times. I tend to think of what can go wrong more than what's going right. For instance, I was worried about our injury list after that awesome battle with Scotland, but even I was fairly confident. England have had a nightmare Six Nations, to be blunt about it. They haven't improved as a team in a long time. Again, I'm not trying to be mean, but Eddie Jones adopted a hard line approach that didn't work out and hasn't left a good legacy. Borthwick is guieter, more humble, but I think they still don't really know their best team. That hammering by France may have been an outlier - just one of those days where everything clicks for one team and falls apart for the other - but it would have been a major shock if England beat France. We all felt that the Ireland France game would decide this year's championship; I never saw anything to change my mind on that.

England brought a battle to this one, and I'm glad of that. I'd hate to humiliate them when they are down; that's not how we or they do things. Wheels always turn.

Shaky start. Ireland, imperious through this championship, appear to be able to feel history breathing on the back of their necks. They are jittery. Trying to force things a bit. In fairness, Borthwick has his tactics right, especially in closing off the space on the wings. He wants it tight, make it a dogfight. Can't blame him; it's exactly what I'd be doling in his shoes.

Owen Farrell with a penalty. Points on the board. Ireland with a lineout, a chance to put pressure on England. Ireland penalty....Sexton taps and goes! Wasn't expecting that. England just about managed to clear it, but the fact that Sexton had the ambition and the confidence to try that it a game like this....talk about focus. On days like this Johnny Sexton is the most indomitable player in the world. He just sinks his teeth into it and just refuses to be shaken

off. He'll keep coming. Honestly, it's like the terminator in the sci-fi movies.

Owen Farrell with his second penalty. Early days, but England are a different team to the side that played France. They just keep picking at Ireland's cat-tails and we just can't seem to really establish a toehold in this game. Some of our off-loads are showing more hope than precision. The likes of Hansen and Lowe aren't able to generate any width.

England cough up a soft enough penalty. Nothing wrong with Ireland's work-rate, in fairness. Johnny Sexton slots it over and writes himself into history as the all-time record scorer in the Six Nations, having finally surpassed Ronan O'Gara's record. I have no doubt that his arch-rival of yore will have raised a glass to him. Both teams rely on the boot, but both sides are looking for unforced errors that won't come. This is rugby in the trenches, pressure on every play, and players on both sides answering that pressure. It isn't pretty, it isn't all that exciting, but it's actually good disciplined rugby. If either side had a weakness or was carrying a passenger, this is where they would get eaten alive - but neither one does.

Ireland lineout. I wasn't expecting too much, but Van Der Flier does very well and offloads to Dan Sheehan – it's just a small gap, but at this level and with a player like Sheehan....Massive roar from the crowd. That was a bit of a try out of nowhere for me, but that takes some of the pressure (I'm thinking of me more than the players in that regard; I was getting very jittery here!). It's a difficult conversion – or would be, for ordinary mortals. Johnny adds the points and Ireland are in front by 10 - 6.

Ireland are better now. England are still dangerous, still determined. Nice break by Ireland, but Hansen's offload to Keenan makes him stretch....Steward turns into the tackle. Ooh...red card? It's a tough one. Look, it is the correct call. You can't argue it in modern rugby and we all know the issues around concussion

- that's a conversation that isn't going away any time soon, and I certainly don't want it to. Ireland cough up a penalty and Farrell once again slots over. 10-9. England are testing Ireland's defence, but it's seamless.

Ireland on a breakaway. Good kick by Sexton, England scramble to recover. Scrum to Ireland. Bundee Aki isn't the force of old, but he is still Bundee Aki, and he draws two defenders before timing the lay-off to Robbie Henshaw perfectly and Ireland are in for a textbook try. That's a real heart-breaker for England. They did very little wrong but Ireland were just that fraction more ruthless in the execution. That's a game-breaking score, and Johnny adds the two points to make it 17-9.

England are caught in that awful no man's land of having to chase a lead while trying to keep the channels closed against a team that are finally settling into their groove. Ireland are doing the simple things right now and the Lions are beginning to show the cracks. Hansen finally gets a bit of space and gives it to Sheehan, who surges forward. He's stopped but only temporarily, gathering from Jack Conan and powering over. It's easy to forget how powerful he actually is. Sexton again with the conversion, and you can tell on his face that this game is over.

Good maul from England. This Six Nations has been an absolute nightmare for them, but they'll leave no pride behind. A great drive and Jamie George goes over. It's only a consolation score – it doesn't even interrupt the singing. Jack Willis, who I thought had a fantastic game for England, picks up a yellow card. England down to thirteen men, but it doesn't really matter now anyway. Sometimes there's a momentum in games and you just know that they aren't going to turn;. This one is essentially all over even before Rob Herring waits until England are sucked into the maul before going to the corner for try number four.

Grand Slam. Our first ever in Dublin. It hasn't quite sunk in yet, but they will talk about this one in a hundred years time.

VITAL WIN FOR KERRY National League: Kerry 1-12 Roscommon 0-12

Kerry made a late start to the year and coughed up a few points that were there for the taking that Donegal defeat still stings a bit, to be truthful - but are starting to take shape. They have yet to convince over a full seventy minutes, though, and that was the case again after labouring to see off a fairly limited Roscommon. Jack O'Connor has more players back - Gavin White settled seamlessly back into the action, with his trademark runs showing game intelligence as well as pace. Paul Geaney and Diarmuid O'Connor made their returns to action as well. Kerry are developing options that will likely be needed over the summer - I actually think that the players having lay-offs early in the league because of niggling injuries might actually stand to us later on. The GAA schedule these days is as much about timing and stamina as individual excellence.

Kerry opened absolutely brilliantly, helped by Roscommon's negative approach. They didn't just fail to contest any of our kick-outs; they coughed up a huge amount of their own, and they left Kerry players find space inside their massed defence. I was surprised that Roscommon didn't come at us more – they made plenty hay in running at us later on, but the damage had already been done by then. Lessons to take on board for both teams, and it's getting close to the business end of things. There's no real time left for experimentation.

Roscommon keeper Conor Gammell handled a ball on the ground to give David Clifford the first chance of a score. It tailed wide, but it showed that Kerry were on the front foot. Kerry grabbed the kick-out and Dara Moynihan fisted over from a tight angle. Moynihan was again his tigerish self and has been one of Kerry's best players in this campaign. Star of the show here early on, though, was unquestionably Tony Brosnan. He was once again deployed as a playmaker rather than a conventional corner forward, and his vision and passing skill was sublime. He threaded a kick pass through the eye of a needle to leave David Clifford inside on the keeper – David doesn't RSVP on invitations like that. 1-1 to 0-0. Tom O'Sullivan, again revelling in the space to drive forward, lofted a beautiful ball into Donal Down and Kerry were five points clear - the Kilgarvan man rightly took the simple point rather than try to round the keeper.

Conor Cox slotted a free to open Roscommon's account. A Gavin White burst saw him offload to Donal Down, who fed Tony Brosnan for a well-worked Kerry point. This was good, direct football. Diarmuid Murtagh slotted another Roscommon free but Seán O'Shea replied in kind. Roscommon were at sixes and sevens, but Ciarán Murtagh did well to kick their first point from play and his brother Diarmuid added another free. They were struggling against Kerry's directness - too direct at times, with a crowded David Clifford the recipient of some long ball that was hit more in hope than real intent - but were grinding away. Roscommon are a resilient side, but struggled for reliable marksmen. Conor Cox fills that role to perfection for them and turns their hard work into scoreboard currency. I don't think he was ever a really viable option for the Kerry seniors, despite his accuracy, but Roscommon needed a player like him and he showed why with an excellent mark that he coolly put over. 1-6 to 0-5. To be honest, Kerry should really have been out of sight by now, but Roscommon were starting to choke out our attacks and leave us have outside possession. Barry Dan O'Sulliuvan was working hard at midfield, but we weren't really stamping our authority there. David Clifford closed out the first half scoring with a free.

Half-time Kerry 1-7 Roscommon 0-5

I expected Kerry to come flying out of the blocks in the second half, but it was Roscommon who showed the heart and hunger at the start of the second half. It looked to me as if they had decided that they didn't need to fear Kerry. Daire Cregg got the ball rolling with a super point. Conor Cox picked off another free and then added a point from play. Kerry's defence was reactive rather than proactive at this stage. Seán O'Shea was wide with a free – not a sentence I've said often. I was getting a bit nervous here, having been very confident earlier on. Tony Brosnan showed a lovely bit of skill to tap the ball down to himself and turn

the defender, but rushed the shot and it hit the side netting. A real let-off for Roscommon; that could have been curtains for them. Kerry lost Graham O'Sullivan to a black card at this stage, a fairly clear-cut decision. Kerry actually do better while down a man. Paudie Clifford scores a stunning point. Conor Cox responds with a free but Tom O'Sullivan picks off a nice score and Gavin White wins a free for Seán O'Shea. David Clifford curls in a beauty and Kerry are ahead by 1-11 to 0-9. Time to put this to bed.

Kerry FC had to face another long Friday journey up to Ferrycarrig Park, and they really needed to lay down some sort of a marker after that crushing defeat away to Galway last weekend. They didn't come home with any share of the spoils, paying the price for a poor start, but at least this was a much improved display. Kerry were dismissed a little too easily and too tamely by high-flying Galway – to be fair, Galway are an outstanding team and the pacesetters in Division One, but Kerry's resistance crumbled very early on.

That wasn't the case in Wexford. Kerry were facing a repeat after Mark Hanratty slotted a goal after just three minutes. Ethan Boyle headed a ball across the box - we have to face the fact that we struggle to deal with aerial crosses into our danger area – and Mark Hanratty gave Wayne Githrie no chance from close range. Wexford looked the livelier sides, and Guithrie had to be on song to turn away a dangerous effort by Aaron Dobbs after 17 minutes, but Kerry were handling the pressure well and had good attempts of their own from Leo Gaxha and Nathan Gleeson. Most gardens have a shady spot, a north facing wall, under a tree or in the shadow of the house.

There is a huge range of plants to suit shaded areas including broad- leaved foliage plants, to spring flowers and ever green flowering shrubs. Ferns are probably the first plant you would think of when it comes to shade – you can choose from a wide range of ferns from dwarf, medium or large. Ferns look very natural when planted under a tree or beside a wall. Most ferns will die back for the winter so if you want all year round foliage you will need to plant something evergreen near the ferns i.e something low growing like the Viburnum Davidii which is a great plant when planted in groups of three. Another good evergreen plant for the shade is the Heuchera which comes in lovely shades including dark to light purple and green to light green.

There is also a wide range of flowering plants for shade. A good example is an Astilbe, an Astilbe has a good range of flower colours and foliage to choose from. A good plant for this would a plant called Vinca Minor which is an evergreen flowering ground cover plant.

A Word of Victory

Welcome back dear student "When I said, 'my foot is slipping!' Your unfailing Love, Lord, supported me. When anxiety was great within me, Your comfort brought me joy and renewed Hope....the Lord has become my Fortress and the Rock in Whom I hide and take refuge" (Psalm 94:18,19 & 22). Anxiety is everywhere. All anxiety boils down to fear. So many people are feeling overwhelmed with fear and don't know what to do. "My people are being destroyed (for lack of knowledge) because they don't know Me" (Hosea 4:6). Knowing God and walking with Him in faith is very different from fulfilling religious rituals. A husband and wife can have sex, but if they don't love each other or take the time to know each other's needs and nature, it's just an empty ritual - going through the motions. God isn't interested in rites or token works - He wants real relationship (Matthew 9:12-13). It's why He sent His Son Jesus to die on the Cross for you and me – to be the Way for us to be redeemed and restored back into God's family - washed from our sin, and delivered from Satan's powers of darkness (John 14:6; Colossians 1:13-14).

It is natural to feel fear in certain situations - for instance when close to the edge of a cliff - instinct kicks in that it's dangerous, so step back from it. But there is a fear that is employed by the devil as a weapon to paralyse, taking victims captive - this is a demonic spirit. The Lord Jesus taught that the devil is a liar and a murderer and his way of lying to and deceiving people is worked by ignorance of Who God is, and lack of knowledge of His Word (John 8:44). The fears people struggle with may be carried deep inside, and fear can cause sickness and mental health issues. Fear of future disaster; fear of dying; fear of past traumas happening again; fear of getting sick, or fears about not being able to carry on life as normal if something bad happens whatever the scenario - big or small, the result is the always the same. Fear brings one into bondage causing loss of hope, separating the person from the Truth of what God has declared over their lives. The Lord identifies fear as a spirit which the enemy uses to torment people and tie them up in bondage - creating strongholds that imprisons them (Psalms 142:6-7; Zechariah 9:11-12). But, Hallelujah! Jesus came to set the captives free! (Isaiah 61:1; Luke 4:18-19). "For God has not given us a spirit of fear and timidity, but of Power, and of Love, and of a sound mind and self-discipline" (2 Timothy 1:7). Elisha the prophet was helping the King of Israel giving him words of knowledge and wisdom which protected Israel from their much stronger enemy (2 Kings 6:8-17). So the enemy King turned on Elisha, surrounding his house one night waiting to kill him. When Elisha's assistant went outside next morning he was terrified at what he saw. But Elisha prayed 'Lord open his eyes' and God opened his spiritual eyes and he saw the real story. Yes, they were surrounded by the enemy but, they were more closely surrounded by God's Angel Armies - a much mightier army! O Lord God, forgive us for fearing. Please open our spiritual eyes to see You, and to know Your Love and Power, in Jesus Name we pray, Amen.
