QUICK RESPONSE TO MILL ROAD DUMPING SITE

Residents of Mill Road in Killarney were shocked this week to learn that there was a massive dumping site on their road.

One of the residents was tipped off by a walker and was dismayed to find the area strewn with household rubbish. The scenic wooded area, close to the Old Mill, from which the road gets its name is situated along the banks of the River Flesk.

"It was mostly food and packaging and was previously in black bin bags, but these had been ripped open by wild foxes and rats", and it was obviously going on for a while as there were tonnes of rubbish", the resident told the Killarney Outlook.

Following posts on social media, which got a huge reaction from the people of Killarney, local and national media outlets covered the story and shortly after the Council were informed, officials were on the scene.

"The response of Kerry County Council after the discovery of a huge illegal dumping site on Mill Road was fantastic", the resident added. "On the morning they were informed, the Environment Officer was there along with the Litter Warden and they went through part of the site to see if they could find anything to connect the illegal dumping to the culprits", they added.



On seeing the images of the dumping, Mayor of Killarney, Michael Gleeson said "If a picture is worth a thousand words then this one tells very forcefully of thugs who have absolutely no respect for residents, the environment or Killarney's priceless tourist industry. It is only someone with a criminal mentality that could commit such a despicable act of vandalism. Those dreadful people. I presume, expect overworked Council persons to come and perform the filthy job of cleaning the place. There are so many wonderful people involved in keeping Killarney and its environs looking superb for local and visitor, this gross act is an insult to them and to all decent people. Every effort must be made to identify the few with this terrible mentality and we must be brave enough to ensure that they are brought to justice. We who live in a place of such un-rivalled beauty deserve to have our our special place treated with respect.

NO DECISION YET ON 4TH JULY FESTIVAL

No definitive decision has yet been made on whether this year's 4th July Festival will proceed in Killarney or what exact format the Independence Day celebrations might take in the town that has a long and mutually beneficial relationship with the American people.

An exciting and colourful celebration was being planned for the big day – which falls perfectly on a Saturday this year – but the organising committee will now go back to the drawing board following the Government's decision to prohibit mass gatherings of over 5,000 people, until September 1st, due to the Covid-19 crisis.

The decision means that all major outdoor events will have to be cancelled or rearranged and that will impact on the traditional format of the 4th July Festival which sees thousands of people lining the streets to watch and join in the spectacular Independence Day carnival parade.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and

Commerce will now consider if other aspects of the festival can proceed as more intimate events, including an open air cinema in the national park, flag-raising national anthem ceremonies and a spectacular fireworks display which have all been an integral part of the annual 4th July celebration which was initiated in 2013.

"At the moment, nothing has been decided but we will be meeting very shortly to discuss the matter," Chamber President, Paul Sherry, said.

"We will, of course, be guided by best practice advice from the Government and the health authorities and public health and safety will obviously be the main priority," he said.

Mr Sherry acknowledged that, given the new restrictions on the number of people that gather outdoors, it is extremely unlikely that the festival parade could go ahead in its usual format, but other options will be looked at.

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DALY'S HAVE THE **MIDAS TOUCH**

"We heard the news on Monday morning that a store in Killarney had sold the lucky Lotto ticket but having sold a big prize so recently, there was no way we'd even consider that it

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New York City in Lockdown Niamh tells us of life in the city that never sleeps

A former pupil of Lissivigeen National School and St. Brigid's Secondary School in Killarney, **Niamh Cagney** is living and working in New York City as a Segment Producer at MSNBC, the American cable television channel that provides NBC News coverage as well as its own reporting and political commentary on current events. Niamh is the eldest daughter of Ellen and John Cagney and sister to Orla, Colm and Aine.

In this week's Killarney Outlook, Niamh tells us about life in New York during Lockdown.

When coronavirus first arrived in the US, it was reported in Washington state; which was scary but also on the other side of the country for me: a 42-hour drive to be exact. I, along with everyone else, knew the second it hit New York it was going to explode. When the first few cases started popping up in the city things changed very quickly.

On March 1st a New York lady was confirmed with the virus, two weeks later all schools and nonessential businesses were shut down and cases were nearing one thousand.

As cases climbed in the city, I was riding the subway into Manhattan every morning and entering the 30 Rock building; a building thousands of employees walk through every day and thousands of visitors share the hallways doing studio tours.

I was concerned when it was in the city, but once it hit 30 Rock things became very real. As a producer I work on-set alongside the anchors who broadcast out of New York; the concept of working from home wasn't even a notion



in my mind until people started getting sick in my office. Within days, makeshift studios had been built in our anchors' homes, and over 90% of our network's employees were working remotely. I made my way to the building one last time to grab some equipment, opting for an Uber to avoid the subway; cutting through a deserted Times Square that morning was the eeriest and most surreal experience I've had since moving here three years ago.

Since officially going into lockdown, I typically leave my Brooklyn apartment each day for a walk around the block and once a week for groceries. On a good morning I line up for about 40 minutes to gain entry to the bigger food shop in my neighborhood, standing with up to a hundred others along the social distancing tape outside. As of last week, everyone in New York state is required to wear a face mask when out in public; if you're not wearing one, you best believe you'll get glares or snarky comments from strangers on the street; it's a far cry from Killarney here.

It's terrifying to see cases in New York move towards the quarter million mark and can be easy to get lost in the numbers and lose sight of the people behind the statistics; It's a blessing and a curse working in the news industry during a time like this. On the one hand, it's proving more and more difficult to switch off now that the days are blending into each other and my bedroom has transformed into my office; but on the other hand, I get to tell the stories of those who are battling this virus or have lost their loved ones, while getting the latest and most accurate updates for the public onto the airwaves.

If this pandemic has taught me anything, it's how lucky I am to have the family and friends that I have. When you live away from home, that feeling of helplessness creeps in from time to time; but it's nothing a Facetime chat can't ease.

In all honesty, I'd give my right arm to be able to hop into a car and drive ANYWHERE right now; or be able to go for a walk through Muckross; but I know that day will come again soon. While some states are starting to re-open, New York has just passed the case peak. How long is the descent? No one knows, which is why social distancing is more important than ever before.

Three young boys from Rathmore are becoming heroes of the pandemic by restoring donated iPads, tablets and smart phones for use by residents in nursing home and for those cocooning due to Covid-19.

Alex, Neil and Karl Thompson, along with their mum Una Moynihan and dad Garrett are behind the initiative which is gaining momentum.

" I am a speech and language therapist and will admit to being a bit obsessed with communication, Una told the Killarney Outlook, however, this is independent of my own job, and has been driven by the boys.

"They've needed tech to connect safely with their friends and family and now want to make sure that others who may not be able to access iPads and tablets don't miss out. By using technology, families and loved ones can communicate and support each in the safest way possible. Being able to watch mass online, connect with family, and get reassurance when needed is vital", she added.

"While we have received donations of used tablets to date, we need to raise money for the purchase of more:

- Tablets
- Wi-fi access (e.g. mi-fi & mobile credit)
- tablet cases
- stands for tablets

- headphones with microphones.

kerry-covid19-tablet-campaign. To date they have raised almost €1,400.

"Alex, Neil and Karl have gotten great results with abandoned tablets. They can do so much more with more. Our communities need this", Una said.

So if you have a tablet / iPad / smart phone that you no longer use, the boys will check them to make sure they have functioning cameras and microphones, power supplies. Then they restore them and put on appropriate video call apps on them. They then print out easy to follow instructions to help and put me on the phone to help if anyone needs a hand setting it up. "The response across the county has been phenomenal. The boys would like to thank the staff at Vodafone Killarney (Kerry Phone Centre) for their help in sourcing SIM cards, and mobile WiFi devices to help people stay connected", Una added. Drop Off Points: Rathmore: Hickey's Centra Killarney: Sheahan's Centra, Muckross Road Scartaglen: CircleK. People can also contact the family through facebook and they will arrange collection in Listowel, Castleisland, Dingle and Tralee.

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KEEPING EVERYONE FIT AT HOME

Emir Coffey who owns and runs *Muckross Pilates & Barre classes* is this week passing her skills to enable everyone, including the elderly, to keep fit. Below she has set out 4 exercises that you can do from the comfort of your chair. For some short seated exercises videos please look at my YouTube channel Muckross Pilates & Barrre. Stay active, healthy and safe but only do what feels comfortable, exercises should not be painful. For all 4 exercises, sit up nice and tall towards the front of your seat. Start off with a few breaths, breathing in through the nose and out through the mouth. Engage your core muscles by gently pulling your belly button in and up.



1) Sit to stand. If your chair has arms you can use these for assistance, or you can also push your hands into your legs but try to use your leg muscles and not your arms to lift your body. Start by sitting up nice and tall in the chair, making sure that you are sitting forward in the seat and not sitting all the way back into it. Inhale to prepare and as you exhale lean forward, push your hands into your legs and slowly come up to a standing position. Stand up nice and tall. Make sure the chair is touching the backs of your legs. Inhale and as you exhale lean slightly forward by hinging at the hips and return to a seated position. Repeat 8 to 10 times, or as many as you feel able to do.



2) Seated rows help to work the upper back and chest muscles. If you don't have hand weights you can use a 500ml bottle of water or a tin of beans as an alternative. Sitting tall, feet flat on the ground, shouders relaxed with a weight in each hand. Hold the arms straight out in front with the knuckles pointing to the ceiling. Draw the elbows back, squeezing the shoulder blades together. Return to the start and repeat 8 to 10 times, or as many as you feels able to do.



3)Seated leg hovers. If you have a soft ball or a cushion, place this between the knees. Sit tall with the feet flat on the ground, shoulders relaxed with the arms down by your side and the palms facing inwards. Engage the core muscles by pulling the belly button in and up. To start squeeze the ball with the inner thighs and lift the heels off the ground, keeping the toes on the ground. If you want to proceed hover one foot and inch or two off the ground and then hover the second foot off the around. Hold for 5 seconds and lower the feet back onto the ground. Ensure to keep the core engaged, the back straight and remember keep breathing throughout and avoid holding your breath. Repeat 8 to 10 times, or as many as you feel able to do.

4) Seated thoracic rotation stretch. Sit nice and tall, feet flat on the floor and shoulders are back and down. Place your two hands on the same hip and then rotate around to look over the shoulder on the same side until you feel a stretch in your upper back. Hold for 5 seconds. Return to the centre and repeat the exercise on the other side.

Edele Daly from *B-WELL FITNESS* gives us some exercises that we can do at home. It is important to warm up first - so follow Edele's advice and use this time to increase your fitness levels.

Warmup 1mins on each exercise

2x sets

- Shoulder shrug and tippy toe lift
- Squat to press
- Back lunges
- Jog on spot with knees up *Main section:*
- 4x exercises for 1mins 4x sets
- Squat to back lunges
- Push up and arm reach up rotation

- 2x frog jumps and 2x squat thrusts on floor

GAA GIVE POWER TO MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

he GAA has always prided itself on being an openly transparent, democratic, and amateur organisation. I'm always reminded of Voltaire's great quote about the Holy Roman Empire "neither holy nor Roman, nor an empire"). One can't help remembering the Bertie Bowl (would you believe that our former Taoiseach recently recently suggested that debacle should be revived if some-one "had the guts to do it"? That wouldn't be guts, you strange anatomist, that would be brass neck and stupidity - take a look at how your Children's Hospital project worked out). Or the attempted circumventing of planning rules in regard to Garth Brooks concerts and the disgraceful attempts to blame it on everybody else? Or the TV deal that was counter to the democratic wishes of the vast majority of GAA members, but was presented as a fait accompli? Or....look, there's a long list, and it doesn't make pretty reading.

So it's understandable if people's ears prick up when word goes out of a Special Congress last Friday to decide on GAA competitions will be run for this year. I suspect shenanigans, so I paid attention.

Only it looks like common sense has applied at an administrative level (that's an almost unique sentence in the realms of human endeavour).. Central Council has transferred full authority to its Management Committee for a 12 week period, with possible extensions, to decide when, how and if GAA competitions will be run this year. That's it, that's their full power. They can't instigate major building projects (Pairc Uí Caoimh is just the tip of that appalling iceberg). They can't make structural changes. They are authorised to take any interim measures to get games played with the safety of players and supporters as the main priority.

Ancient Greece and Rome had authority under civil law to vote in a tyrant to take drastic action – Pompey was famously given three years to rid the Mediterranean of pirates, but succeeded in three months (fair trials and right to silence and such trivialities did not apply).

Wisely, no binding decisions on what kind of championships would apply. The few sports who have suggested start dates for such things have been making fools of themselves. This is a situation where man can propose but covid will dispose, and it's not a sentient entity that can be reasoned with (that's not its only similarity to Donald Trump, but I digress....)

This isn't a revolution and this isn't a coup (either prospect could be hugely entertaining; I have no axe to grind here either way). This is both necessary and pro-active. The GAA's Management Committee includes Uachtaráin John Horan, former Uachtaráin Aogáin Ó Fearghaill, five

PLAYING BEHIND CLOSED DOORS

No, no, and a thousand times no. There have been several quietly mooted suggestions that various sports could maybe return in a small way. Not in front of crowds, you understand, not at all.That would put people at risk. We would never do that. That would be terrible.

But maybe....just behind closed doors. Just on TV. With social distancing, and barrels of handwash and mouthwash and three-in-one shampoo and everything.

Not because of the money. We don't want money. We hate money, actually, posiively loathe the stuff. No, its the players. They don't understand what's going on. They are restless in their homes/ stalls, watching re-runs of 'The Only Way is Essex' and 'Glenroe'. It's cruel. No, it's not about money. We'll give some to charity, even. We're cool. Just one or two games behind closed doors, just to amuse people because we are humanitarians.

Revenue generation is vital for any sport, including ostensibly amateur ones. That's a real thing. But human lives are are more important, and that's a much realer thing. Human interaction is dangerous and comes with a genuine risk of lethality right now. That's not an exaggeration in any way, for those of you who have just returned from Mars and are unaware of recent events here on jolly old Earth. This is a pandemic.

No-one, including people infected, can know it right now until the symptoms start showing. So most people have it for more than ten days and can (will) infect people they interact with. Nobody does it intentionally. Do you want to be sharing a dressing room with that person? Or marking them? Or having a loved one do it? Pop quiz – you tackle an opponent and they coughs on you. A. Fun or B. Frightening? Did you have to think long about the answer?

'Behind closed doors' activity is extremely dangerous for people. And there is absolutely no justification for it, none, apart from money. So the next time you see some-one flying that hopeful little kite about 'playing behind closed doors', I respectfully suggest that you take another look at the person holding it. They are chancing their arm a little with that nonsense. They are also chancing some-one's life.



NEWCASTLE TAKEOVER

Newcastle used to be a huge club in England. Alan Shearer is their most famous son but they are giants in the game. Albeit fallen giants. Owner Mike Ashley has been a disaster from start to the impending finish of his ownership. The club's supporters, who live under the strange illusion that they are far richer and more talented than they actually are (any Irish supporters who think poor Stephen Kenny actually has much young talent available should recognise the symptoms), are absolutely thrilled with the news of an impending takeover by a Saudi consortium (Britain's Rueben brothers and Amanda Stavely will take 10% each). Good old Mohammed Bin Salman! He'll be a cool owner.

All they have to do is pass the FA's Fitness For Ownership test, which won't be a problem.

The only fitness for ownership that matters in soccer is having enough money (in many cases, using the club itself as leverage). Being directly implicated in the brutal murder of Kamal Khashoggi? "Pshaw!", I say scornfully. Widespread condemnation for their role in over 100,000 dead in Yemen. "Tish and pish!", I snort. Dissenters jailed and executed without trial? Come on, haven't we all done that on the occasional Monday morning?

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After all, aren't some women even allowed to drive a car in Saudi Arabia now? Some of them can even make personal decisions – without, and mark this, without a male guardian telling them what to do! Yes, lucky for Newcastle that they have gotten rid of that dodgy dealer Mike Ashley and gotten in an upstanding Saudi prince instead. That'll work out fine, if you can hold your nose long enough.

ATP TRIFECTA

Federer, Djokovic, and Nadal are the big guns in the Tennis Pro circuit. They have come up with a great idea as regards helping out the pro game, and most interestingly it's not charitable contributions (at which they have done brilliantly as well). It's that the top 100 singles players and the top 20 doubles players contribute from winnings from this year's tournaments (i.e. the Australian Open, but hopefully more later on) according to their rankings and the money distributed among the lower ranked players according to their rankings. Simple but ingenious. I think it could and should be applied to all sports.

The usual thing is that the most successful teams or players get the most money, and that makes sense at first glance. It's how Reagan and Thatcher



tried to run their economies, the 'trickle-down' effect. By the time Bush and Blair were doing it, nobody was pretending that it wasn't making the rich richer and the poor poorer.

I really hope that the ATP try this in a measured and meaningful way, and I hope that it works, and

I hope that all sports, long after the current travails, consider this as a future model of development. It would cost the big winners small percentages but have massive impact at the roots of most professional sports.



SOUNESS V POGBA

The ongoing spat between Graeme Souness and Paul Pogba has provided a lot of sports news in recent times (in the absence of any actual sport – in normal times this nonsense would only get the attention of click-baiters). Pogba was the most expensive transfer in the world and one of the least rewarding for Manchester United. He was agitating through his agent for a move until world circumstances changed. It's very unlikely that



clubs will be paying the exorbitant transfer sums of yesteryear, certainly not with his recent record, so Pogba is now making calf eyes at Manchester United.

Graeme Souness was the best midfielder in England in the early 80s, and among the best in the world. He has also been a surprisingly decent pundit in general, and he was excellent on RTE. But he has been struggling for relevance a bit in the past year and Pogba in particular has been a continual target. I've criticised Pogba's play myself, but Souness has been over the top in my opinion. In a recent interview, Pogba stated that he isn't sure who Graeme Souness is, but that he is entitled to his opinion. Cue shock and horror. Souness responded (at Jamie Carragher's potstirring prompts) by challenging Pogba to lay out his medals. For the record, Souness has 13 big ones (3 European Cups), Pogba has 11(and the World Cup is trumps in this game).

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Digital and social media giants must help fund and sustain local media in Ireland - Kelleher



Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that social media platforms and other d i g i t a l publishers must either voluntarily dip into their pockets, or be required by the State, to support local

media and journalism.

"The Covid 19 crisis has really hit our local newspapers and radio stations. Many across the country have stopped printing as their print advertising has simply dried up and they can't afford to print every week," added the Renew Europe MEP.

"Yet, the level of digital advertising taking place across the internet has never been

greater. In addition, more and more of us are now turning to sites such as Facebook and Twitter to get our news.

"While there are great benefits to these instantaneous and global news updates, they do not go through the same rigorous, and expensive, fact checking that takes place in newsrooms across the country and cannot replace deep investigative journalism or the importance of truly local reporting.

"In recent days, the Australian government has introduced a new mandatory code for digital giants that will require them to share revenue with struggling newspapers and radio stations.

"The importance of quality journalism has never been more evident. Yet, unfortunately, it is getting harder and harder to sustain it based on traditional newspaper sales. Of course, digital subscriptions can help, but it is nowhere near what is needed to keep our local newspapers and radio stations operating. "Obviously, I would prefer to see the digital and social media companies voluntarily coming up with their own proposals to help their traditional media colleagues, but if they don't, the next Irish government must develop mandatory requirements.

"I have written to my party's Finance and Communications Spokespersons, Michael McGrath and Jack Chambers to request that this issue is raised while negotiating the next Programme for Government. My colleague, former Communications Spokesperson Timmy Dooley has already laid down much of the groundwork on this policy in a policy paper published in early 2019.

"Independent journalism has never been needed as much as it is today. Independent journalism costs money, and here's a way of levelling the playing field and mitigating the distortion created by the rise of digital media," concluded Kelleher.

Focus on Hydrangeas

Hydrangeas are a very popular garden shrub with delicate heads of flowers that come in shades of white, pink or blue and they flower from late Spring to Autumn. The mophead and lace cap Hydrangeas are well known for the ability to change colour in different soils. Hydrangeas thrive in moist but well drained soil, in the cool, semi shady part of the garden. Try to avoid dry sunny situations and east facing areas. Feeding your Hydrangeas once in late Winter or early Spring is probably enough for the year as too much feeding will only encourage too much soft leafy growth and this will lead to the Hydrangeas not developing a lot of \boxtimes flower buds. Pruning your Hydrangeas is usually done in late Winter or early Spring, although the dimbing Hydrangeas should be pruned after \boxtimes flower in Summer.



Citizens Information

Know Your Rights:

Question

I booked and paid for a package holiday in January. I have just learned that the hotel has been quarantined due to coronavirus. I'm hoping the travel agent will find another hotel, but what will happen to my booking if the holiday is cancelled? Or what happens if they do find a new hotel but I decide to not to travel?

Answer

This is an anxious time for people travelling overseas. You should monitor and follow the advice of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFA). You can do this using the DFA's Travelwise app or you can phone DFA's dedicated phone line on (01) 613 1733 for the latest travel advice.

Check with your travel agent that your holiday is a 'package holiday'. A traditional package holiday (also called a pre-arranged travel package) is advertised and sold as a whole and must last for more than 24 hours or include an overnight stay. It also must be made up of at least 2 of the following:

 Transport • Accommodation • Car rental • Other tourist services
 for example, tours, excursions, guides or tickets for concerts or theme parks

If you want to cancel

Under the EU Directive on Package Travel and Linked Travel Arrangements, you have the right to cancel your booking for free, before the start of the holiday, in the event of unavoidable and extraordinary circumstances. This includes disease or serious conditions at the destination. If DFA advises against travelling because of the coronavirus, you can cancel your package holiday and get a full refund.

If the travel agent has to cancel the package

Even if DFA has not restricted travel to your destination, you still have rights if your travel agent cancels or makes a significant change to your package holiday. For example, changing your hotel from the one you originally booked with the package would be a significant change that alters a term of the contract. The travel agent can cancel a package holiday because of factors beyond their control but you are still entitled to:

• A replacement holiday of equivalent or superior quality

• A lower grade holiday, with a reimbursement of the difference in price

• A full refund within 14 days

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HOW TO DEAL WITH REDUNDANCIES An employer having to make someone redundant is a difficult situation.

However, if an employer follows the correct procedures, they will get the correct result.

To make a position redundant, it's not enough to be able to satisfy yourself the role is redundant. Three key areas will be considered:

1. If there was a genuine reason for redundancy

- 2. Was there a fair selection process
- 3. Was a fair consultation process carried out

What's a genuine reason for redundancy?

Section 7(2)(a) of the Redundancy Payments Acts outlines five grounds where a redundancy can be deemed as genuine.

- 1. The employer has ceased or intends to cease to carry on the business.
- 2. Requirements of the business for the employee to carry out work of a particular kind has ceased or diminished.
- 3. The employer decides to carry out the business with fewer or no employees.
- 4. The employer decides work being done is to be done in a different manner, for which the employee is not
- qualified or trained to do.

The employer decides that the work being done is to be done by a person who is capable of doing other work for which the employee is not sufficiently qualified to do.

Where your reasons for redundancy fall under one (or more) of the above five it is important to follow through with a redundancy procedure. This ensures fair procedure and reduces the risk of unfair selection and any potential unfair dismissal claims.

You can easily call Killarney one of the world's most picturesque tracks, ideally suited to a relaxed evening of summer racing and there are few nicer places to be when the weather is right.

Teaching Your Child Emotional Intelligence

Emotional intelligence can be a key to success in life and the ability to developing good relationships. Therefore EI is a very important skills for parents to teach their children. When parents have it themselves, their child will automatically learn EI. Parents with EI will naturally attune to their child and understand what their child is feeling. This in turn helps the child to learn how to read and respond to his own feelings and those of others in a healthy way.

However parents who struggle with EI themselves may lack the necessary skills to teach their child. This can set up a cycle of low EI within a family across the generations. When we ignore a child's feelings, don't notice when they are upset or anxious or teil them that their feelings are irrelevant, we are teaching them to ignore their own feelings. The child therefore grows up to believe that feelings are irrelevant. As adults they can struggle with emotions and in their relationships.

The following are ways in which parents can enhance their Child's Emotional Intelligence.

 Know your child's true nature: Pay attention to see what your child likes, dislikes, gets angry about, is afraid or struggles with.
 Communicate these observations to your child in a non-judgemental way. This helps your child to begin to see themselves through your eyes – and they can feel how well you know them.
 Your child will see themselves reflected in your eyes, thus helping them to know who they are. This can boost their confidence and make them resilient to life's challenges.

 Connect emotionally to your Child: Make an effort to empathise with your child and feel what they are feeling. Your child will feel an instant bond with you when your feel their emotion. This in turn helps your child to learn how to be empathic with others and to form healthy relationships. When your child sees you trying to understand their feelings or feel their feelings, they receive a powerful message.

 Respond non judgementally. When you child is emotional do not judge their feelings as right or wrong – instead look beyond the feelings to the source of this emotion. Help them to name and manage the emotion rather than judging it. This will help your child to develop a healthy relationship with their own emotions. It also teaches them to regulate and manage their emotions.

A message from **Bishop Ray Browne,** April 2020

Due to the continued closure of the schools and the major restrictions on people gathering together in one place, all Confirmation and First Communion ceremonies are postponed. When the government announces details of these situations being reversed there will be consultations between the school community, the parents and each parish with a view to setting new dates for these ceremonies. Every Easter blessing on all the children and their families.

Over the past 5 weeks the focus has been on our hospitals and health services, on so many other public and essential services, and the situation of the over70's being shielded in their homes. What of the family homes where there are children and teenagers? Tensions arise from being confined to home for so long; not being able to meet friends; not having their usual activities and hobbies, sporting, musical and cultural, available; to finding solutions to accommodate parents going to work or working from home.

Besides contact with children of my nieces and nephews, my glimpse of family life is through the Sacrament of Confirmation. When the schools closed, one third of the Confirmations ceremonies had already taken place. At each Confirmation I see so many beautiful moments: twins or cousins being confirmed; the warmth and closeness between a candidate and a baby sister, or an older brother already in third level; a granny so proud of her grandchild. Such beautiful family relationships! What wonderful moments are happening in homes these weeks as children and parents spend so much time together? What fun, what growing as individuals, and at times what rows! It may not be easy, it still is very special. So much that will be recalled fondly in vears to come.

The pandemic impacts on all homes hugely and I am going to highlight three particular situations. It is no exaggeration to say that the Leaving Cert is the most intense exam you ever do. Think of the pressure and stress from before Easter right through to the last exam in mid-June. All the more pressure and stress this year when, because of the Covid-19 virus the exam is put off until an indefinite date in July / August.

All our hearts go out to the Leaving Cert class of

2020. God bless you all. God help you keep calm. It is vital is that you take care of each other, keep in touch with each other (without actually meeting), journey together and be there for each other. At different times each will have their bad day or week, or their moment of panic. Together you can cope with the journey ahead. The students know that their teachers will guide them through the three months ahead. The day will come in October or November when the vast majority will happily start a third level course, just as the class of 2019 did last Autumn.

The other two groups are the Confirmation and First Communion classes. For those in sixth class, Confirmation is part of final term in Primary School, and in a way a marking of the end of childhood. The candidates are so full of life and so positive about the future. Confirmation proclaims the unique Godgiven goodness of each of them and the unique path in life ahead of each. They all would have so enjoyed every day of the final term just beginning.

First Communion is different. The children are full of innocence and fun, fond of their teacher and delighting in their families. They are full of wonder at creation. They are full of love of family, school and everybody, and of God who is Creator and Lord of all. The image of the white First Communion dress captures it perfectly. First Communion tells them that God is love, that love is the secret of happiness, and that love is what really matters.

Communion and Confirmation are highpoints for children, their families and extended families, and for their schools and communities. Dates were set back in September. New dates will be set, plans will be made, and in due course all will enjoy these wonderful occasions.

Meanwhile may children enjoy the wonder of extended home life. Being unable to meet their friends, may they appreciate how friends really matter to us all. And remember what Pope Francis said is the secret to a happy home: "The ability to say please, thank you and ... I am sorry ".
