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

Chamber's tribute to former President



Killarney Chamber **Tourism** and Commerce has paid tribute to the late **Patrick** Walsh, а prominent Killarney and businessman one of the county's most respected and

successful building contractors who has passed

Patrick was President of the Chamber in 1984-85 and during his term in office a number of important projects were implemented, including initiatives to considerably enhance the visual image of the town centre.

Chamber said Patrick was very generous with the time he devoted to the organisation and he was a very steady hand as the executive committee at the time worked on several ideas to help to create a better Killarney.

Given that he was originally from Farranfore, it was no surprise that Patrick became a keen aviation enthusiast and he qualified to hold his own pilot's licence.

He was hugely involved in the development of Farranfore Airport and his vision, drive and know-how helped, in no small way, to write several chapters in the success story that is the Kerry Airport of today.

Chamber said while the airport was built initially to boost tourism and the manufacturing industry in Kerry, which it continues to do, thanks to the pioneering spirit of Patrick Walsh and others of vision, the people of the Kerry are now among its principal users.

A building contractor of national renown, Patrick Walsh was responsible for many landmark developments in Killarney and throughout Kerry but a real monument to his craftsmanship is the striking Prince of Peace Church in Fossa.

Close on half a century after its construction, it is still considered one of the most spectacular places of worship in the country and, given its setting overlooking the lakes and mountains from its feature altar viewing point, it is no surprise that it is one of the most in demand churches for wedding ceremonies.

With Patrick and his team working closely with then Parish Priest Fr James Galvin, the foundation stone for the church was laid in the summer of 1976 and the Prince of Peace Church was consecrated by Bishop Kevin McNamara on 5th June 1977.

Chamber noted that, over the years, Patrick was also involved in the vast majority of the maintenance projects in the churches and buildings under the ownership of the Killarney Parish and that involvement is continued today by his son, Martin, who is keeping the Walsh family name to the fore in the construction industry.

In a collaborative effort to promote and enhance road safety and address the rise in road accidents and fatalities in the county, the Kerry Road Safety Working Together Group has launched a new Road Safety Action Plan for Kerry. Aligned with the Government's Road Safety Strategy, this strategic initiative is the result of extensive consultation and involves a wide-ranging group of stakeholders dedicated to promoting a safer road environment.

The Road Safety Action Plan 2024 outlines commitments to safeguarding lives on our roads and promoting a culture of responsible road use. The plan outlines strategic actions and targeted measures to reduce collisions and fatalities on Kerry's roads.

"The strategy is led by a Safe System approach, which is viewed as best practice globally in the delivery of road safety strategies. The successful implementation of the plan is dependent, not

KingJom of Cash! Lidl Killarney sells the winning €1m ticket



MASS CELEBRATED IN PIKE WOOD

canopy of translucent leaves high above us; towering oak treetrunks, pillar-like, supporting our leafy roof; a carpet of mosses, ferns and grasses beneath our feet; an ordinary rock, with a brilliant white cloth atop, upon which stood a chalice, a pottery bowl of Eucharistic Hosts, a crucifix, a candle and flowers scattered around; the background music created by the Sionnach stream, as it cascaded over the terrain of its bed. This was the cathedral created by nature that hosted our Mass at the Mass Rock in Pike Wood last Wednesday week.

That ordinary rock has an extraordinary history. It was around this rock, during the Penal days, that locals gathered, in secret, to hear Mass from some brave priest, who was willing to challenge the laws of the time, the Crown and its forces. The consequence for any priest of that time, who was captured, was likely a short walk to the nearby "Crooked Tree" and a speedy and early departure from the land of the living.

This ordinary rock, mostly covered with moss and some sprouts of greenery, would go unnoticed, except for a number of crosses etched into it over the years by hundreds and maybe thousands, who have come this way, since those Penal days.

On Wednesday, the Kerry Branch of Cumann na Sagart hosted a

pilgrimage to this Mass Rock and Mass, as gaeilge, was said. We learned of a local saint, Saint Carthage (Mocuda), whose Feastday it was. This man appears to have had the following of thirty female admirers, for whom Carthage established convent. The Mass, attended by locals and people from further afield – Australia and Poland – also heard a recitation of the Fr. Seán Quinlan poem, "The Mass Rock Priest 1706" along with some traditional music and song.

I watched and could not but think of those brave souls of a previous time, who stood where I now stood. The consequences of being found there by the forces of the Crown must have weighed heavily. I thought of those, who were on watch, who were perched up in trees or on ledges, looking out for any sign of the red-coats. Ordinary people standing by an ordinary rock, doing what should have been an ordinary thing.

At the end of Mass, many of us took our turn to etch a cross into this ordinary rock. My feeble efforts made little impact against the hard surface of this ordinary rock. But countless feeble efforts had made an indelible groove, in the shape of the cross. Who was the first to scrape a cross on this rock? How many more had followed?



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

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney

How long is a piece of string?

Kerry's and other counties' small roads are not maintained through straightforward programmes. Why is beyond me. And why we have to have so many different bodies looking after a road is surely yet another example of too many State cooks.

The Department of Rural and Community

Development are in charge of giving money to councils to do up roads serving multiple homes, farmland and amenities such as lakes, rivers or beaches under the Local Improvement Scheme.

Dwellers must contribute - as if paying car tax were not enough.

In order to draw down allocated funding, each local authority is required to submit documentation including a list of completed works.

The Department "closely examines the documentation submitted" and will only approve payment once all required documentation has been checked and is deemed to be in order. Any queries are returned to each local authority for clarification, Minister Heather Humprheys told Brendan Griffin in the Dail on April 24th after he sought detailed information regarding an apparent discrepancy between LIS road costs in Kerry and Mayo.

And that is where information has stopped: at the crossroads between council and department. Brendan asked for price comparisons with private contractors, the length of the roads completed and for a table comparing what people contribute towards

their roads.

All he got was the LIS payments per county and another on the number of roads completed..

From the information Brendan did manage to get, his assistant Tommy Griffin who is again seeking election in Corca Dhuibhne was able to deduce how Mayo County Council spent €4.3 million over the past four years on upgrading 242 roads with an average costs per road was €17,656.

73 roads were completed in Kerry for €4.9 million, and the average cost per road being €67.256.

The council says the comparison is not reasonable or fair.

"Every road is a different length, therefore it is not reasonable to draw conclusions from comparing the number of roads repaired with the funding allocated to each local authority. The square meterage cost would be a more accurate comparison."

That's fine. But everyone is talking in the round. No-one, not the council, and not the department is coming out and revealing what that sq metre cost is.

Brendan has received no follow up since his question of three weeks ago; I have been onto the council a number of times. We got an "assurance" from outgoing ceo Moira Murrell to councillors on Monday in Tralee.

Moira who is on the move to Cork said she was not going to comment on Mayo and other counties. "The measure is the number of kilometers" and "the average cost per kilometer is very favourable", she said.

So, why not publish "the measure" and end the speculation?

Speaking of Fadó, Fadó

Last week we mentioned Killarney 200 years ago in newspaper reports and how little has changed in some respects. Killarney had

its issues, much as today. But it was also a vibrant place in the 1840s. Certainly there were tough years during the Famine and there were 13 funerals on a February Sunday in Killarney in 1847.

A steamer arrived in Killorglin in June 1846 with 40 tonnes of Indian meal for the Killarney Relief Committee to distribute in the town.

There were other tragedies in the 1840s. In New Street the Kerry Examiner of February 15 1848 reports how at the premises of a pawnbroker a fire broke out and the respectable Farrell family died. There were bars on the windows downstairs and they couldn't get out when the fire broke out. Four children died. Only a baby survived as the mother threw it to bystanders below - she jumped herself but died of her injuries.

Overall though, Killarney was an energetic and forward looking place. In the early 1840s tourism was flying. There was even advice for tourists taking heading to Mangerton in August 1849 'the grand gathering place for the most dangerous of beggars"!

Temperance meetings were held at Cronin's Hotel. The 1840s were bustling with campaigns. One was to get a connection with the rail line at Mallow; another committee was in place for collections for the building of Pugin's Cathedral; there was concern about proper accounting in a bank; the Fever Hospital was enlarged in 1845 and the stone masons of Killarney were organising.

There was huge excitement at the revival of the races in Killarney in 1843 and "the fairy scene of the race course".

By 1853 the railway had arrived bringing a special train from Dublin for the Killarney Cattle Show. A much shorter journey than with the campaign for Arás Phadraig or for a better traffic system in the 21st century! Looking at the energy of the past, I get the impression we have actually slipped back in Killarney in recent years.

Siamsa Tire the national folk theatre restructuring: A sign of the times.

Fifty years on, the Siamsa folk performances will be moving to Finuge and the purpose built Siamsa Tralee is going mainstream, in line with the change in taste.

The demand for many years is for a new regional theatre in Kerry. It seems that at last we are getting there. Alas, Killarney has missed the

boat - it has taken far too long to revamp Aras Phádraig.

The phrase being used for Siamsa is "refocusing". This is because of a plunge in audience numbers for summer shows like Fadó Fadó. Where once there were audiences of 300, last summer saw just 30.

The acting ceo Nicola Hopcroft said Siamsa's strategic partners,

Kerry County Council and the Arts Council, helped them out of the legacy of debt. We do not yet know how much the council and the Arts Council contributed.

Yet another example of how unforthcoming publicly funded bodies are with regard to information, particularly financial information, that should be readily available to the public and to journalists who act on behalf of the public.







KERRY HAS MOST BLUE FLAG BEACHES IN IRELAND

15 Blue Flags have been awarded for County Kerry beaches in 2024. The high standard of the coastal environment in Kerry has been acknowledged with the awarding of 15 Blue Flags for Kerry beaches and coastal amenities for 2024, the highest number in the country. Kerry has retained its current 15 Blue Flags, including 13 at beaches and one each at the Portmagee Pontoons and Fenit Marina.

The decision of the International Blue Flag jury was announced on Monday, 20 May and sees the following beaches and marinas awarded Blue Flags for 2024: Rossbeigh, Ballybunion South, Ballybunion North, Ballyheigue, Fenit, Maherbeg, Kells, Doire Fhíonáin (Derrynane), White Strand, Baile an Sceilg (Ballinskelligs), Banna, Fionntrá (Ventry), Inch, Fenit Marina and Portmagee Pontoons.

Five Green Coast Awards have been presented for Waterville, Ballinskelligs, Béal Bán, Castlegregory and Littor beaches.

Chamber noted that the support provided to secure the Astellas plant in Tralee and the RDI Hub in Killorglin can be included on her list of great achievements.

"As a Killarney woman, she can be very proud of the progress made with several local projects, including the enhancement of Muckross Road, the finalising of plans for the development of Áras Phadraig, securing URDL funding for key infrastructure developments, the advancement of plans for the Dinis-Torc walkway and cycle path and the planned college development at the former Pretty Polly site," Chamber noted.



The co-presidents also acknowledged that Moira Murrell was at the helm during the outbreak of Covid-19, leading the county and its people through very difficult times and she held the line so effectively and steadied the ship to ensure a safe berthing.

"Killarney is very grateful to Moira Murrell for all she has done for her home town and for the county and we wish her every success in her new role. Cork, going forward, is certainly in a very safe pair of hands," Johnny McGuire and Pádraig Treacy said.

YSI National Gold for Castleisland Community College

Castleisland Community College were the overall National Gold Winners of the Young Social Innovators Awards. The competition empowers young people to use the talents, insights passion and creativity to come up with innovative solutions challenges. Hundreds of project teams enter the YSI Awards each year and shortlisted teams are invited to the National Finals.

The Sun Smarties project consisting of Transition year and fifth year students (and mentored by Elaine Murphy) is based on the school becoming Ireland's first ever sun smart school and to run an awareness campaign about the prevention of skin cancer. Skin cancer is the most common cancer in Ireland, with over 13,000 new cases diagnosed every year. This number is expected to double by 2040. Schools in the UK and Australia can register to become sun smart schools where the health authorities support schools in creating sun safe environments and promote sun protection behaviours. The Sun Smarties in Castleisland Community College hope to introduce this into Irish schools. The team designed a four step programme for schools to follow to become a sun safe school and are working with the HSE to become Ireland's pilot school for their Sun Safe Programme.

Step 1- Create a Sun Smart Charter,

Step 2- Run an awareness campaign e.g. lessons and sun screen dispensers,

Step 3- Consult with Parents

Step 4- Liaise with the wider community.

Principal Teresa Lonergan commented 'The school has won 3 category awards in previous years in the Young Social Innovators Awards

which are fantastic achievements but to win overall is just outstanding. Well done to their mentor Elaine Murphy and the Sun Smarties group.'



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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING **HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY**

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



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

National Physical Activity Guidelines for a Healthier Life

- Conduct 30 minutes daily or 300 minutes weekly of moderate intensity exercise. (60-70% of your maximum heart rate, RPE of 5-7).
- Conduct 150 minutes of vigorous activity weekly (80-90% of maximum heart rate, RPE of 8-9).
- Limit sedentary behavior, if sitting try move every 30 minutes or so.
- Complete 2 strength training sessions weekly with resistance to maintain healthy muscles and bones, and overall mobility.
- Try get a high impact activity such as hiking or jump work once a week.
- People with disabilities should aim to get at least 30 minutes a day of physical activity as their disability allows.
- Children and young people (2-18) should aim for around 60 minutes a day of exercise across a wide range of activities working on muscle strength, bone strength, flexibility and fundamental movements.
- Elderly (65+) should aim for the 30-minute guideline 5 days a week, with an added focus on aerobic activity, strengthening and balance work.
- With lack of physical activity and sedentary behavior being linked with many diseases such as cardiovascular disease and some cancers, following these guidelines can provide a cost effective treatment in lowering a person's chances of developing these illnesses.

WEAR SUNGLASSES

SHOULD YOU BE CONSIDERING SWITCHING YOUR MORTGAGE

Yes, because some of the Irish mortgage lenders have much lower mortgage interest rates compared to others. Important day for Palestine; Proud day for Ireland - MEP Kelleher

EU must return to its role as honest broker in conflict

"Today is an important day for the people of Palestine and a proud day for Ireland," said Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher as the Irish Government confirmed it would recognise the State of Palestine on May 28th.

"Symbolism matters in politics and in diplomacy. There will be people who dismiss this action by the Irish Government, but it is an important statement of Ireland's convictions and its independence as a sovereign nation. "The Irish people have long held the cause and the plight of the Palestinian people close to their hearts. Our people don't need to look too far back into our history to know what oppression looks and feels like. "In 2018, I visited the West Bank. I saw what Israeli occupation looked like. "Ireland can rightly be proud of its decision today. I am proud of the role

my party, and in particular the role of our party leader, and Tánaiste, Micheál Martin, has played in bringing this decision about.

"Israel has a right to exist and defend itself. However, it cannot have a veto over a future Two-State solution. Hamas is a terrorist organisation and must release all hostages. International law must be adhered to. These are all non-negotiable.

"For years, I have called for the EU to go back to being an honest broker in this conflict. The response of President Von Der Leyen last year was not acceptable. The EU must come to the table with solutions and not empty rhetoric. All EU member states should follow the lead of Ireland, Norway and Spain and recognise the State of Palestine. "I look forward to Ireland continuing to lead on a European stage on the issue of a peaceful settlement between Palestine and Israel," concluded Kelleher.

LACK OF INFRASTRUCTURE RAISED BY CLLR. GRADY

Martin Grady has raised the issue at previous meetings regarding the lack of infrastructure at Barraduff and Pairc Chuimin Killcummin, permission was granted for needed housing developments in both areas however this was granted and build without any consideration for those walking to Mass, Shops or Schools, there's no footpaths or lighting in place, this should be completed before a block is laid, residents safety must come first. Madames Hill is no different, its Ludacris to have people walking out on a live road this day and age these aren't small bohereens, these are roads with cars travelling

Kenneally continued: 'it is important for us to address this issue and as a candidate, I will be on the ground locally to meet with residents and hopefully to speak with the people involved in setting these fires to listen to their grievances.'

Caroline said: 'the Ballyspillane Family Resource Centre, which was established in 2004, has been central to delivering valuable support initiatives under the Family & Community Services FRC National Programme. As a Ballyspillane native, I fully understand the issues at play and believe the centre, along with the residents and local businesses, have an important role to play in reducing this type of anti-social behaviour.' She concluded: 'in 2018 we were promised that a CCTV system would be installed as part of a wider plan to reduce antisocial behaviour. However, almost six years later, we are still waiting for it to be delivered.

The local election candidate has said that elected or not, she will seek a meeting with the local authority, An Garda Síochána and other stakeholders, to discuss future funding for the area.

Request for provision of speed ramps on Mill Road



IT'S ALL TO PLAY FOR IN THE LOCAL ELECTIONS



Seventy-seven candidates, a huge number, go forward for the local elections 2024 in this county on June 7th. And with several big vote getters, the big beasts across Killarney Tralee and Listowel out of the picture this time, it is difficult to predict outcomes for the new 33-member Kerry County Council.

hat can be said with confidence is the count in Killarney - where the ballots from Kenmare and Killarney will be sorted - will run into a third day.

We are unlikely to see anything beyond a first count on Saturday June 8th, according to veteran observers.

It could be a similar pattern in Tralee.

A massive 17 candidates are competing for seven seats in Killarney where ten candidates ran in 2019.

In Kenmare, there are sixteen candidates for six seats, five more than in 2019.

Seventeen are running for seven seats in Tralee.

What does it all mean? A few months ago I would have predicted sitting Killarney councillors - they include two co-options would all be returned.

This is now in doubt. Killarney is unique in Kerry as it has more independents than party people, so the machines are very personality driven. But new independents with their own high profiles, particularly in the large Ukrainian and Bangladeshi communities have now emerged. As for the parties, Fine Gael failed to retain its seat last time round in Killarney with John Sheahan losing out to Marie Moloney of Labour. Fianna Fail failed to take a second seat. This time FF is running one candidate, sitting mayor Niall Kelleher. Fine Gael is running a mature well known figure in Dermot Healy.

Sinn Féin failed to take a seat in 2019. Will Sinn Féin with two candidates succeed this time? Registrations have soared in Killarney and to me that indicates the Bangladeshi and Ukrainian community are rocking up.

Candidates also tell me dozens of others, Irish and non-Irish have registered. But who will they vote for? The big questions for Kerry 2024 is how the immigrant vote will pan out, and where their transfers will go.

The other big question is will the three Healy-Raes repeat their astonishing 2019 performances? Although their seats are certain, it would be extraordinary even for the Raes to bring home the same over-quota vote with so many in the field. Remember too, the anti-establishment feeling once captured by the Raes is no longer their sole prerogative.

The other big question for Kerry County Council 2024 is the Greens: Killarney elected the first Green councillor in Ireland in 1985. We have a different Green party and a different Killarney today. Can they do it 40 years on? They are up against huge rural opposition. But the Green party has strong candidates.Corca Dhuibhne sees fluent Irish speaker Dr Peadar O'Fionnáin, the son of Nóirín and the late much loved Dr Micheál. Dr Peadar has to be in with a chance. The very energetic and active Cleo Murphy, former journalist who came near taking a seat for the Greens last time in Kenmare is also very much in the running. Especially with her Fine Gael family background and with Scarteen pulling out. Tralee also historically elected a Green and I could see Anluan Dunne shaking a seat there.

In Tralee the big interest is on the Sinn Fein strategy of four candidates - a strategy that rarely if ever worked for Fianna Fáil.

SF failed to elect a third candidate in Tralee in 2019 and that was when they had a racing certainty and huge vote getter in Toireasa Ferris and an established Pa Daly. Toireasa has left the pitch entirely. And Pa is in the Dáil. Fianna Fail poll topper Norma Foley is also out of the local race in Tralee. Can Thomas McEllistrim with his strong Republican and Fianna Fail roots as an independent pick up the disaffected SF and FF vote?

I will also be watching the National Party in Tralee. We now know the National Party are as well if not better able to wave around the tricolour as Sinn Fein and as Fianna Fail once did. They are running a clean cut candidate, Jacob Sweeney. Could the slide in the SF vote among republicans nationally translate to the National Party and the strong republican feeling in Tralee?

Just 19 candidates in 2024 in Kerry are women.

In Listowel the big question is what will happen now that Aoife Thornton has pulled out.

She topped the poll for Fine Gael in 2019 and it is difficult to see an equal vote getter in Listowel 2024.

In Castleisland, I will be intrigued to see if another woman, Michelle Keane, with a high social media profile, and an out-spoken approach succeeds. Can Michelle's attacks really knock the socks off Jackie Healy-Rae and Fine Gael's long-standing Bobby O'Connell? Nearly every party in the State is represented: Aontú, The National Party, The Green Party, Fianna Fail and Fine Gael, Labour, the Irish People Party, the Kerry Independent Alliance, The Social Democrats, The Party for Animal Welfare and Sinn Féin.

As we go to press, preliminary figures for those registered to vote suggest a substantial rise where there are high numbers of Ukrainians. In Killarney the numbers of those now on the register of electors has risen from 20,864 to 22,464, an increase of 1,600.

(The quota in 2019 was 1,584).

In 2019, Kenmare had 21,813 electors and the latest figures now are at 23,078. It's all to play for.

THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING CRISIS IN KERRY

In a week where a national survey told us that we needed 250,000 plus houses to be build in Ireland, Kerry County Council have have finally decided to listen to their elected representatives and the public in general in relation to the affordable housing crisis in Kerry.

The Housing Commission has called for a "radical strategic reset of housing policy" as it is estimated that there is a housing deficit in Ireland of up to 256,000 homes. This information was provided by an expert body which was established as part of the Programme for Government to examine housing issues, such as supply. Meanwhile Kerry County Council have pubished a survey online to determine interest in an Affordable Housing Scheme in the towns of Tralee and Killarney.

On a social media post on Thursday Kerry County Council posted the survey asking followers

Are you interested in affordable housing?

There were many comments under the post:

One follower said:

What's the point of a fecking survey??? Another way to waste taxpayers money! There's a housing shortage, it's a well known fact. Just build the houses and stop the nonsense.

While another asked:

Who would NOT BE INTRESTED in affordable housing?????

However many followers also questioned why it was just affordable housing in Killarney and Tralee when the crisis is countywide.

The survey included a link for local authority homes loans under the Affordable Purchase Scheme in which local authorities will make newly built homes available at a reduced price for first-time and other eligible buyers who cannot afford to purchase a home at its open market value with a maximum mortgage and 10% deposit.

The local authority will take a percentage equity share in your home equal to the difference between the open market value of the home and

the reduced price paid. This means that if you buy a home at a 20% reduction on the open market value, the local authority will have a 20% equity share in your home.

Killarney Outlook contacted Kerry County Council to see how many newly built homes have been made available by Kerry County Council to those seeking housing through this scheme in the last five years in the county.

At the time of going to print three days after the question was put to the council, there was no reply.

SURVEY DETAILS:

The Government's 'Housing for All' Action Plan includes an objective for Local Authorities, working with delivery partners, to plan and provide affordable homes. Such homes would be available at a reduced price, with the Local Authority taking an equity stake equivalent to the reduction from the prevailing market price for the property (up to 30%). Purchasers could buy out the equity if desired, or the Local Authority will redeem it, should the home be sold or transferred. Affordable Housing Schemes will be aimed at First Time Buyers (never owned a home) and Fresh Start Buyers (divorced or separated with no interest in the family home or has undergone insolvency proceedings) in areas where there is an identified

housing demand and an affordability constraint. Kerry County Council wishes to gauge the public's interest in affordable housing in the towns of Tralee and Killarney initially.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

This survey is for the purpose of gathering information and determining potential levels of interest in affordable housing in the towns of Tralee and Killarney. The survey will remain open until June 14th, 2024 at 5pm.

There will not be any follow-up correspondence to you individually if you submit a completed survey. Completion of the survey does not imply eligibility or convey approval to any future affordable housing scheme operated by Kerry County Council.

If an affordable housing scheme is offered by Kerry County Council, a separate detailed application process will be initiated, and applications will be assessed based on a Scheme of Priority.

Should an affordable housing scheme be advertised by Kerry County Council at some stage in the future, applicants who are deemed to meet the scheme criteria, will have the option to apply for a loan with a private lending institution, or apply for a Local Authority Home Loan (income limits and eligibility criteria will apply). Successful applicants will enter into an Affordable Dwelling Purchase Arrangement (ADPA) with the Local Authority.

What was Kerry County Council's Reply?

HERE IS THEIR REPLY...

CLLR. BRENDAN CRONIN

"To answer your question yes I have asked KCC to provide affordable housing in Killarney and also to provide affordable

sites on Council owned lands s o people could build their own house as was done previously by the council in Firies where serviced sites were made available at €10,000 each.

Following an online meeting this week with Minister Darragh O Brien, involving senior council management and elected representatives from each Municipal District, I raised the serious matter of the lack of social and affordable housing once again in Killarney.

Minister O'Brien confirmed that the Land Development Agency will be meeting next week with the county manager Moira Murrell and KCC director of housing Martin o Donoghue to discuss options for housing on publicly owned lands in Kerry for potential social and affordable housing developments, and in particular all HSE owned lands and property in Killarney.

I welcome this meeting as I have been continuously pushing for the Land Development Agency and KCC to engage and examine suitable sites to deliver social and affordable housing in our municipal district."

CLLR. NIALL BOTTY O'CALLAGHAN


"I have spoken to the council every week in relation to houses in the Municipal district. I have made representations to our housing officer to keep pushing the Minister to buy all the houses in the project near Ballyspillane which would be 250 roughly. I was also on a call with the minister last week where I supported a call for the use of st Finian's land for housing. There are 2 more projects on the bye pass that might deliver more housing. Housing in Killarney is a huge issue and young people are struggling. When asked if he received any favourable reply from the council he said Just from our meeting last Friday with the housing minister I feel a bit positive that these much needed houses are progressing. This time last year the pipeline for houses in Killarney was bleak but now I can see some projects coming to fruition. It's really needed."





CLLR. MARIE MOLONEY

1 have on numerous occasions raised this issue. Even at this week's meeting I again spoke



to purchase within their budget but this is not easy in Killarney Town in particular nor indeed around the Municipal District. Their income is too high for Social Housing but not enough to get a mortgage to meet Killarney prices.

The Affordable Housing scheme would be ideal for these couples.

I had the provision of affordable Housing on the agenda again as late as the May meeting of KMD Cllr. M. Moloney: That Kerry County Council would confirm the provision of affordable housing from the Part 5 of the development at Cronin's Wood.

Reply: Planning permission has been granted for the development in Cronin's Wood, Killarney. This development includes for the construction of 249 dwellings and associated site works at Upper Park Road. A'Part V Condition' forms part of the planning permission as granted. This Condition requires the applicant to enter into an agreement with Kerry County Council in relation to the provision of social housing, in accordance with Section 96 of the Planning and Development Act 2000, as amended. This Condition imposes an obligation

to have a Section 96 Agreement in place prior to commencement or within an agreed period. Any such agreement must be consistent with the Housing Strategy."

Negotiations on the Part V element of this scheme are currently ongoing. The Part V element will be social housing. Given that commercial negotiations are ongoing, we are not in a position to comment further at this stage.

CLLR. MARTIN GRADY


"Yes, I have regularly spoken about the housing issue in Kerry at the council meetings. The crisis is out of control and I am hearing it on the doorsteps.

There are families that are falling between two stools, they are earning too much to qualify for social housing but aren't earning enough to purchase a house with the rising cost of property. Those working are penalised, they struggle to save a deposit for a mortgage becuase of the increased cost of living.

My father, Donal Grady was a huge advocate of affordable housing during his time on Kerry County Council and I will ensure to follow in his footsteps to do my best to get the council to build affordable housing for the people of Killarney."

CLLR MAURA HEALY-RAE

"I have on a number of occasions asked Kerry County Council about Affordable Housing in Kerry. In July 2022 I asked if Kerry



available between 2022 and 2027. Their reply on that occasion was to say that the Government has a number of Actions within the Housing for All Strategy in the area of Affordable Housing."

I raised the issue again in 2023 and in 2024 and this week received this reply:

The council has been working on the preparation of, and shaping of, an initial business case on Affordable Housing for submission to the Department for access to relevant funding. The initial business case will focus on the towns of Tralee and Killarney. As part os this process an initial public sounding of potential interest is necessary. The online survey is now gone live and available through the Council website and will remain open for the responses until 5th on Friday 14th June 2024.

I have consistently raised the nonsensical saga of St. Finian's building and land lying idle when it could be put to good use in providing both social and affordable housing.

LLR. JOHN O'DONOGHUE

I, as I'm sure all councillors have, have asked the Council about the provision of affordable housing in Killarney. The reply is generally the same, citing the pressures facing housing in Killarney due to a lack of available green space and the price of land suitable for development in the area. I accept that the Council's hands are somewhat tied in the sense

that they need to be provided with the funding from central Government in order to proceed with housing, and that is why very often we will ask that the necessary funding be provided to Local Authorities to build more homes.

As it stands, the Affordable Housing Scheme sounds great in principle but there simply aren't enough homes of any description available here in Killarney. I am keeping pressure on the Council to ensure that a certain percentage of the new development at Cronin's Wood will be available under the Affordable Housing scheme and I sincerely hope that when finished, the developer will not be allowed to pay a bond in order to avoid making these available. This has happened far too often in the past which would suggest that the penalties involved for not fulfilling your obligations are not high enough to ensure original agreements are honoured.

It truly is a shame to think that in this country, couples who are both working cannot afford a mortgage and I firmly believe it is a large part of the reason so many young people leave these shores for pastures new. The Government has ramped up housing plans in recent months and this is very welcome, but it needs to be continued and extended further still in order to help alleviate the housing crisis. Years of abandoning Housing to the Private sector has resulted in us being in this situation, and it is important that the Government, and by extension Local Authorities take a more active role in providing new housing."

CLLR. NIALL KELLEHER

Currently Kerry Council are working on the preparation of, and shaping of, an initial business case on Affordable Housing for submission to the Department for access

to relevant funding in the initial step to developing an affordable housing scheme for Killarney and Tralee. The local authority in conjunction with local builders need to develop

a strategic affordable site in Killarney now. Many plans for sites are being developed at the moment and the local authority should be sitting down with these developers to ensure affordable well thought out schemes are developed. I held a public meeting on the 13th May last in the Killarney Plaza to inform the public on the current grants and structures in place to assist with the cost of affordable housing. We had guest speaker Senator Mary Fitzpatrick present a presentation in relation to Affordable Housing, First Time Buyers Grants, Vacant Property Grants, Local Authority Home Loans etc. If elected on June 7TH1 will continue to be a strong voice around housing and communicate with the council on every given opportunity to ensure Affordable housing is at the top of their priorities."

Parents should be very supportive at State Exam time

SUPPORT

Candidates are well aware that the world is their oyster if they can achieve a decent result in the state exams. Likewise, parents are anxious for their children to achieve good exam results to enable them avail of life's opportunities. It's understandable then, as the exams approach, that some parents might feel unhappy with the effort being made by their exam candidate or might tend to project their anxiety onto the student. While parents can't obviously go in and sit the exam for their children their role is to provide unobtrusive support at exam time.

TASK

The parents' task is to provide a calm home environment. When a parent is supportive, the exam candidate will sense that her/his status in the family is not conditional on achieving good exam results. Parents are fully entitled to let their children know that their best effort is expected. By the same token children should be made fully aware that their best effort is acceptable.

ENVIRONMENT

The exam period isn't a time for friction between parent and child. It's not a time for recriminations about time wasted during the year. Disagreements of this nature may create tension at home. At all times, but especially around exam time, every student is entitled to the emotional support of her/his family. A supportive home environment lessens the fear of failure and under-achievement. A child who knows that her/his position in the family doesn't depend on exam results will approach the exam in an upbeat and confident manner.

EXPECTATIONS

Have realistic expectations of your child based on previous performance at school. Don't expect a level of achievement that your offspring cannot attain. Make yourself aware of the levels, which s/he is taking in each subject, the target grades s/he is aiming for and her/his potential points score. Of course, parents want their children to do well but it's important to realise that parents can sometimes expect too much from their children. Parents must keep their own ambitions for their children off the agenda. Instead, priority must be given to the needs and concerns of the exam student.

COMPARISONS

Nothing annoys a student more than a comparison with a sibling, relative or peer. While such comparisons are understandable, they can be very destructive. An unflattering comparison serves to undermine the self-confidence of the student and create doubts in her/his mind. No two people are exactly the same. Even children of the same parents can be totally different in their levels of cognitive ability. Parents must accept different ability levels in their children.

ENCOURAGE

Encourage your child to make the most of the time remaining before the exam. Urge her/him to maintain her/his study schedule right up to the end of the exam period. Continue to remind her/him that good organisation, efficient time management and self-discipline will pay off.

Encourage your child to take exercise and recreation. Regular exercise is the best way to burn off pre-exam tension and is a welcome break from the demands of a study schedule. Reward your child's effort by serving up occasional little treats. A hard-working student will always welcome a favourite meal or a social outing. Long hours of study into the night can be counterproductive so encourage her/him to go to bed early for eight or nine hours of sleep.

DIFT

Keep an eye on your child's diet. Serve up meals that are nutritious and appetising. An occasional reminder about personal hygiene won't go amiss. Regular washing, changing of cloths and footwear induce the feel-good factor, which is psychologically uplifting and leads to better concentration.

BACKSTAGE

In summary, the role of the parent is very important. It involves giving support and being discreet. It requires you to be a listener rather than a talker. It means being prepared for a certain amount of irritability. To draw an analogy with a theatrical production, the parent is the backstage manager while the student is in the lead role. You, the parent, can help to make it a great performance.

It was a wonderful occasion, filled with colour and pride. Well done to all the students involved and to Ms Hallissey for co-ordinating.





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

Kerry 0-24 Monaghan 1-11

I'm not going to dwell on this one too long. It was just disappointing as a spectacle all round, and an attendance under 9000 for a championship game in Killarney means that most people had anticipated it being fairly disappointing. Frankly, attendances were rock bottom across the board last weekend. Galway v Derry was meant to be the weekend's football highlight; even less people showed up to that one. As for Cork v Clare? Those can officially be described as hurling counties now, and I can't blame the supporters for that. One of those two codes – and only one – was actually interesting last weekend.

Full disclosure. I wasn't in the Fitzgerald Stadium last weekend (there was quite a bit on, which didn't help attendances. I actually watched it on Sunday morning, and my perceptions may have been unconsciously biased by Radio Kerry's live report (I usually select my biases very carefully). Even fuller disclosure; I have absolutely no regrets. That's not fair on amateur players who put their heart and soul into representing a traditional and key part of Kerry's culture, and I don't just mean in a sporting sense. But this ridiculous cramming of unnecessary and frankly uninteresting contests into a tightened inter-county calendar is putting me, and everybody else, off.

I'm not going to feel sorry for Monaghan. They were always going to be underdogs here, but they always, always gave Kerry hard battles of it in the past. McManus, Ward, O'Connell? Turn those dogs loose, and you have a scrap on your hands. But Monaghan's incredibly crowded defensive structure? The thing that makes the blanket defence so effective is the counterattack at pace. But this? Frankly, if they wanted to get a ball to a forward in time for it to have an effect, they should have had a taxi on their halfback line. Which was so crowded anyway that it looked like the taxi rank on Dublin's O'Connell street around two o'clock on a Saturday morning (I could tell you stories but I'm not sure about the statutes of limitation).

The game itself is quickly told. Paudie Clifford set the tone by popping over with his left from the throw-in. Gary Mohan replied with a mark. Monaghan are already dropping very deep, so much so that when they do launch a counterattack ball forward, it's easily gathered by Tadhg Morley. They do create one goal chance, Shane Ryan superbly closing down Conor McCarthy's chance - would it have made a game of it if Monaghan had goaled at that stage? Frankly, no, not a chance. Looking at Monagahn's negative tactics, it's like asking if some-one can win the lotto even if they don't buy a ticket.

Seán O'Shea slots over easily enough. David Clifford notches a free. Paul Murphy fists over. Kerry are looking good, but that's because Monaghan look absolutely listless. Kerry defenders have a free license to roam and Tom O'Sullivan fires over a beauty. This isn't a contest; this is shooting practise.

David Clifford from play and Tony Brosnan with a point. Tom with another one. As far as I know, GAAGO doesn't have an option to watch a game in fast forward. And I know that, because I checked. You all think I'm making a mildly sarcastic there. I'm not. It's not Kerry's fault, but this game? There's loads of criticism of people not able to see games behind the GAAGO paywall. In this case, ye got lucky.

Micheál Bannigan with a Monaghan point from play. They clock up their second wide - again, their forwards are just too isolated. Conor McManus is an absolutely iconic figure, one of the best forwards of a generation. I'd say he wishes he had brought a book to read.



The second half was way more exciting. Oh, wait, no, I just made that up. I did diligently note every score and I can go through it piece by piece if ye want. But ye don't want me to, and nor do I. David Clifford opened the second half scoring almost as quickly as his brother had started the first. Monaghan hit back with two points from Andrew Woods and Conor McCarthy (who, to be fair, did impress).

Joe O'Connor had a goal chance well saved by Rory Beggan, but Paul Geaney fisted the rebound over and added a point from play. I've heard a few people talking about Kerry's lack of goals. Wow, that's about as much of a first world problem as you can get. They've just scored 65 points in three championship games, so calm down a bit. Go back to your avocado toast like a good lad.

But it wsa a confluence of circumstances and a good piece of opportunism in a game that was already long over.

I know I sound very critical of Monaghan here, and I know that's easy from the armchair. But they are a far better side than this and I honestly believe that all they were doing here was going through the motions while trying to keep their cards hidden from Meath and Louth. Because they certainly didn't even try to make this a contest, and they are well capable of that. As for Kerry? We didn't exactly learn a lot. How could we in such a tame affair? But 24 points scored, first hurdle safely negotiated (and potentially the highest). The luxury of running the bench (we could have gotten more minutes into players, really). No injuries. Yep, a bad game but a good result.

Kerry were always going to be underdogs here. Pretty much everyone knew that Tyrone were red hot favourites long before any ball was even thrown in. Back to back Hogans, 2022 champions. Lost a really cracking minor final to Meath three years ago. And they lived up to that billing. I'm actually quite proud of the battle Kerry put up. That one wasn't easy and they stepped up to the plate.

There's people in Kerry love talking about 'famines'. Blastye, ye're like hobbits talking about missing 'second breakfast'. There's an awful lot of counties that have been a lot hungrier for a lot longer than us. U20 is definitely a grade where we have been struggling for the past while, especially after thriving at minor. Getting to an All Ireland Final is a massive achievement, not any failure, and Tomás Ó Sé and his players should be extremely proud of themselves.

None of that is intended to take away from the sheer brilliance of Tyrone. They were fantastic.

Half-time Offaly 1-11 Kerry 0-10.



Kerry were a little slow out of the starting blocks, with Tipperary sharpshooter Jenny Grace opening the scoring just two minutes in. She quickly added a well-struck '45 and then punished a foul on Ciara Brennan to make it 0-3 to 0-0

Kerry were beginning to assert themselves now, but it still took no less than sixteen minutes for them to open their account, Sara Murphy launching a monster free from her own half to split the posts. That seemed to settle Kerry; certainly they started winning a lot more of the physical duels and asking questions of their fancied opponents. Jackie Horgan clipped over a free and quickly added another from very long range. She was on the end of another Sara Murphy free, controlling it neatly with one touch and firing it between the posts from over 50 metres, a truly wonderful score. It was the best score of the day, but unfortunately, it was to be Kerry's only score from play, and that was probably the key difference between the sides in the end.

Sineád Meagher squared matters up at 0-4 apiece, but Kerry were on top now and Jackie Horgan added two more frees to give Kerry the advantage heading in for the break.

A foul on Sinead Meagher saw Jenny Grace add to her account on the restart and she quickly added another to make it 0-6 apiece. Ciara O'Sullivan had a Kerry effort drop short – in hindsight, she might have been better off passing off to the waiting Jackie Horgan, but hindsight is easy from the spectators' gallery. Jackie did pop over another free but Jenny Grace rapidly replied in kind and Amy Quinlisk nudged Tipperary back in front, 0-8 to 0-7. A great ball by the excellent Sophie Pembroke saw Jill-Anne Quirke double Tipperary's lead.

A ball in by Jackie Horgan was safely gathered by Tipperary keeper Laura Leenane but great pressure by Amy O'Sullivan saw a '45 conceded and duly converted by Jackie. Just one point in it again – an obdurate Kerry were well in this and surprising a few of the Tipperay supporters with their resilience.

Unfortunately, that was as good as it got. Tipperary did have that slightly sharper cutting edge and it came to the fore as a battling Jill-Anne Quirke managed to cleverly lay off to Emma Flanagan, who raced towards goal and drew a foul. Goalkeeper Laura Leenane came up for the penalty and gave her Kerry counterpart Aoife Fitzgerald no chance with a stinging drive. With ten minutes left, Tipperary were leading by 1-9 to 0-8.lt got worse instantly as from the puck-out, one of too many turned over by Tipperary, Eva O'Dwyer won a free and her long range speculative effort somehow evaded everyone in a crowded square and slipped into the net.

Kerry never gave up, far from it, but all they could muster was one more free from the outstanding Jackie Horgan, and it wasn't enough as Tipperary were crowned Munster Intermediate champions. A tough one for Kerry, who were right in this game until the last ten minutes, but they don't have long to lick their wounds as they have to prepare for the visit of Antrim next weekend for the start of their All Ireland Intermediate campaign.

"We did so much together playing with Crokes' juniors and particularly the years we spent coaching the juveniles in the club. He was an outstanding coach and had great successes with the various minor teams. These minors progressed to the 3 senior teams in the club and many a player would have given up after the minor level, only for Dr Crokes to field 3 senior teams in the Kerry County league. Shaq was the guy who said it didn't matter what grade you were playing in; you were sure of a game in the black and amber at the weekend. He had time for everyone, irrespective of their ability, a true Croke. On a personal level, he worked in the bar (Tatler Jack) for so many years and you could not have had a nicer person to meet and greet patrons. He was such a nice guy. I will miss Shaq's smile and friendship "

The Ladies' teams in particular benefitted not just from his coaching but how he delivered it. **Áine McMahon, Club LGFA officer said,**

"It only took one call back in February 2018 to let Caoimhín know that we were looking for a new Manager for our Senior Ladies' team and his answer was an immediate yes 'Yerra, sure I'll call up to training at the weekend. From that first meeting, he made such a positive impact. Assisted by Jason Stack & Mark Cooper, he also managed our Minor team that year, with the intention of getting to know our younger players and to introduce them gradually to the senior ranks. In September 2018, he joined ranks with Donal Doherty to manage the Killarney (Dr Crokes, Spa & Fossa) team and won the Senior County Championship. There were 11 Dr Crokes players on that panel, and the victory gave the honour of Kerry Senior Ladies' Captain to our own Amanda Brosnan for 2019. His commitment to Dr Crokes Senior ladies over the four years of his tenure was immense,



and together with his management team of Mark Cooper, Jason Stack and Catherine Keogh, Caoimhin and the Dr Crokes Senior ladies secured the Junior A Championship in September 2020 - one of the brightest days for Dr Crokes LGFA. When he took over, we had a very young team, playing in Div 2 of the county league and in the Junior Championship. When he handed over the reins in 2021, we were as good as the best in the county and are now playing in the Senior County Championship for the first time in our history. Thank you, Shaq.", said Áine.

"He was such a joy to work with, just a lovely, pleasant guy", said Mark Cooper, a co-worker with him for the Ladies' teams.

Kayleigh Cronin, the Kerry LGFA centreback and All-Star said, "I was fortunate to benefit from his coaching before I was called into the Kerry team. I was going in with a great base. We thought we had him wrapped around our fingers at Crokes' training, but in his own humorous way it was him that was the winner cajoling us to do one last round of sprints: you couldn't refuse him. First at training every time, he was last to leave when he knew everyone, and everything was sorted. He was so dependable. We'll miss him".

He would have been very proud of last week's Kerry win over Cork in the Minster final.

Big in stature and big in heart. Many a parent had no worries about their young offspring going to discos because the great-hearted Security Officer made sure that all got home safely together in a group. You could depend your life on him. That was the Caoimhín we knew, loved and appreciated in Dr Crokes. Go gcúitítear do shaothar leat, a Chaoimhín. (May your work be rewarded, Caoimhín.)

KERRY LADIES ARE MUNSTER CHAMPS

Kerry 2-15 Cork 0-13

Sheer delight for Kerry as they were crowned TG4 Munster Senior A ladies football champions for the first time since 2017 at Mallow.

The Kingdom started well, before falling behind to Cork, but a goal from Emma Dineen just before half-time got them back in contention. When she raised her second green flag with nine minutes to go it was the killer blow, as they led by six points at that stage and there was no way back for Cork.

Add in a simply outstanding display from Danielle O'Leary, who scored 10 points for Kerry and was the deserving winner of the Player of the Game award, closely followed by Kayleigh Cronin.

O'Leary opened the scoring for Kerry in the fourth minute as she fisted over the bar from a long ball in.

She doubled their lead after 10 minutes, with a long stoppage for an injury in between to players from both sides.

The same player made it 0-3 to no score as Cork were finding it difficult to get going, thanks to some superb defending by Kerry.

Katie Quirke got Cork off the mark after 14 minutes and from the restart Rachel Leahy got their second point to make it 0-3 to 0-2.

With 16 minutes gone Cork were back on level terms when Melissa Duggan did what she does

best. She burst forward to score as Cork were now much more in contention.

Quirke got her second from a free to put Cork in front for the first time after 19 minutes play. Another bursting run from a Cork player, this time Laura O'Mahony, put Cork two to the good as they were now playing the better football.

Quirke pointed from another free, with Aoife Healy and O'Mahony also scoring to make it 0-8 to 0-3 after 28 minutes.

Quirke then got Cork's ninth point in a row as the Rebels were enjoying the better of the play. O'Leary and Quirke exchanged points from frees as Cork led by six as half time approached. Just before the half time whistle Kerry got the boost they needed when a ball in from Katie Brosnan was fisted to the back of the net by Emma Dineen, to see Cork lead by 0-10 to 1-4 at the break.

O'Leary, Kerry's only point scorer in the first half, added another 30 seconds into the second, with Lydia McDonagh replying for Cork.

O'Leary, who was keeping her side in contention on her own hit another to put a point between the sides. And with 40 minutes gone O'Leary scored again to level it.

Another from O'Leary put Kerry back in front after 41 minutes the first time they lead since the 16th.

Louise Ní Mhuircheartaigh, who came on after 39 minutes, scored a point, the first Kerry player aside from O'Leary to raise a white flag for them.

O'Leary got her ninth to increase Kerry's lead, with Niamh Carmody also pointing, to make it 1-11 to 0-11 in their favour after 49 minutes.

Kerry had one hand on the trophy after 51 minutes when Dineen got her, and Kerry's, second goal to make it 2-11 to 0-11.

Quirke hit back for Cork but time wasn't on their side as Ní Mhuircheartaigh and Carmody increased Kerry's lead.

Ní Mhuircheartaigh got the last score of the game as the Kingdom won the title for the first time since 2017.

HERBS



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




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






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Welcome back dear student let's study what God's Word says about Love. If I gave everything I have to the poor and even sacrificed my body, I could boast about it; but if I didn't Love others, I would have gained nothing. Love is patient and kind. Love is not jealous, boastful, proud, or rude. It does not demand its own way. It is not irritable, and it keeps no record of being wronged. It does not rejoice about injustice but rejoices whenever the truth wins out. Love never gives up, never loses faith, is always hopeful, and endures through every circumstance. Prophecy and speaking in unknown languages and special knowledge will become useless. But Love will last forever! Now our knowledge is partial and incomplete, and even the gift of prophecy reveals only part of the whole picture! But when the time of perfection comes, these partial things will become useless.
