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



NEW MEN'S SUPPORT INITIATIVE LAUNCHED

in Memory of Jamie Doolan



he Kerry District League (KDL) is set to launch a new monthly initiative in memory of Jamie Doolan, a much-loved son, brother, and friend to many, as well as a talented soccer and football player who passed away in July of this year. The Jamie Doolan Men's Huddle will open the doors of the KDL clubhouse in Mounthawk, Tralee once a month, offering a quiet, judgment-free space where men can simply show up, have a cup of tea or coffee, and take a moment to breathe. There's no pressure to talk or participate, men can share, listen, or just sit in company. A professional counsellor will be present at every session for anyone who would like a private chat.

"Soccer gives us teammates. This is about making sure no one has to carry the heavy stuff alone," organisers said. The drop-in sessions are free and open to all men connected to the game players, coaches, referees, volunteers, or supporters from any club or level. The aim is to provide a space where men can connect and support each other without formality or stigma. "Some days are hard," the organisers added. "Talking, or just being around people, can help and help is here."

Each session will take place in a calm, welcoming room at the KDL clubhouse, with tea, coffee, and friendly faces from the football community. There is no obligation to speak; listening is enough. A professional counsellor will be on site at every meet-up, and private conversations are available for anyone who wishes.

The first Men's Huddle will be held on Wednesday, November 19th, from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the KDL clubhouse. Attendance



is free, and men are encouraged to "come as you are." Bringing a friend is also welcome. Those looking for more details or interested in helping out can direct message the KDL social media page. Managers and captains are being asked to share the information with their squads, and supporters are encouraged to pass it on to anyone who might benefit.

The organisers stress that this is a community support space, not an emergency service. Anyone in immediate need of help is urged to reach out now. 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

Are the Irish Far left really the Far right?

As voting day arrives, this Presidential election has raised troubling questions. There are segments of our society screaming they will not vote because they don't like the candidate. Others are determined to spoil their vote - as if anyone will have the time to read their self-indulgent comments. How would any of them sit on a jury? "I want to go home, this case is boring!" I have news for them: Democracy asks adults to do sometimes boring duties.

Leaving aside the candidates - and I have serious concerns about one of them, this campaign has exposed a seam of double standards.

The Social Democrats would suspend an elected TD for holding shares in an Israeli company - but will stand by an extreme left candidate who has questioned the Special Criminal Court and who employs a woman

convicted in that same court of gun crime and has not been garda vetted and enables her to enter Leinster House on a daily basis!

Housing is the Social Democrat's and People Before Profit's number one issue. Or so they say. Yet, they don't bat at the hypocrisy of a candidate who screams about evictions, while donning a gown and doing her best for a vulture fund to evict in one case even her own voters.

What this campaign has thrown up is the far right Trumpism of the Irish left when it unites. The attacks on journalism, the refusal to answer a question, the gas lighting of decent interviewers, the online insults, the smothering of debate, the defence of rank hypocrisy that is supposed to go unquestioned because it involves a candidate from the left. The really worrying attitude towards an objective truth. Do they only believe in their own truth? Listening to their "inner core," to quote Connelly in Tralee?

The Church at its very worst, and highest, couldn't match the sanctimoniousness and double standards of political cardinals Holly, Ivana and Mary Lou of the Irish left, it seems.

This campaign has also thrown a serious shadow over the legal "profession". Solicitors/barristers, banks and property developers were the unholy troika that brought this country to its knees. It seems the legal eagles are again circling the wagons. Putting their allegiance to the law over their democratic duty to be accountable to the voter. The statement by the bar council - the justice minister and a Labour TD - that you are obliged to take the next case is nonsense. I covered repossession courts in Tralee: you didn't have to take that work.

As Mick Clifford in the Examiner put it (I am colouring it): the idea that a senior counsel in Dublin is "obliged" to take a modestly paid case from west Cork about a straying bull, just because a solicitor rings him up, is quite literally "bull".

THE "SHEER" TRUTH ABOUT THE PLANS FOR THE FORMER TIGHT FACTORY

There was a certain "opaqueness" about the rushed announcement by Michael Cahill's announcement about millions for the purchase of the Pretty Polly former tight factory site from the council.

Not to mention a bit of, shall we say political envy, by Cahill's governmental colleague Michael Healy-Rae.

Donning his ministerial responsible hat, Minister of State Michael Healy-Rae said "it is important that facts, not headlines, guide how major public projects are discussed. Deputy Cahill should get his facts straight What has been approved is permission for Kerry ETB to agree a price and begin the due diligence process, not full funding. The Department's own briefing makes that perfectly clear," he thundered after Cahill stole the march on him.

According to the official Department document, ministerial approval has been granted subject to full legal, environmental and technical due diligence for Kerry ETB to acquire the 7.91-acre site at the former Sara Lee/ Pretty Polly premises from Kerry County Council for €2.375 million (ex VAT). This means that the sale, and any associated funding, cannot proceed until those steps are completed and the business case is finalised, Healy-Rae went on.

Cahill hit back:

"There were no constituency deals for any of the Independents in return for supporting the Government. All that was given in return were Ministerial portfolios and in Kerry's case, a Junior one for Deputy Michael Healy-Rae. When will he finally admit this to his supporters and the people of Kerry?" Ouch! Ouch!

Meanwhile, this column without any political clout, ministerial, party, independent, governmental or other, had actually been doing spade work on the lack of progress on the Pretty Polly in recent weeks. Turning up the heat. And we got exactly the same statement as Michael Cahill got .. some weeks before he did!

Only we didn't get the figure - that was whispered in the Dail corridors by Further Education Minister James Lawless to the Rossbeigh man. A figure that was later confirmed to this column.

We'll highlight another issue now in the coming weeks and keep our fingers crossed for rushed announcements. It will be Michael Healy-Rae's turn next to deliver. Hint: I will be looking a the state of the Golden Mile Road, the Muckross Road that is barely passable over potholes.

REPRIEVE FOR LORETO CHAPEL

There is some movement on Loreto Chapel evictions. Mayor of Killarney, Martin Grady had been meeting with the council on the matter.

Last Monday's meeting heard confirmation the council is involved now

"We are engaging with the management company. We will provide advice, support and assistance and we can arrange a specific clinic to explore supports," Council housing director Niamh O'Sullivan told the meeting.

Cost rental and tenant in situ schemes - where the council might buy the houses - were being looked at.

"But this depends on the landlord selling to Kerry County Council," she said.

The matter was raised by Maura Healy-Rae by way of emergency motion, seconded by Deirdre Ferris.

"This is disastrous for the community. These people simply do not have an alternative. There is a complete lack of affordable housing in Killarney. Some have said they will have no alternative but to return to their home countries," Maura said.

Deirdre said this was only the start of the mass evictions and the council will have to have a strategy.

Meanwhile the landlord - a Cypriot investment company - is likely to sell the properties individually, following valuations, some of the

Loreto Chapel tenants have been informed by Home Club in Dublin, the management agency. In fairness to the Home Club team, they are doing their best to inform the tenants of how to get their finances together etc.

The chance to buy houses individually would give at least some of the families a chance to purchase their properties "and make a world of difference", said River James who lives in No 1 Loreto Chapel with his husband and two children.


Sip through the Shadows of Killarney's Past





Over €5.5 million in refurbishment grants returns over 100 vacant and derelict homes to active use in Kerry

645 applications with 407 approvals from Kerry homeowners

Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, James Browne TD, has announced the latest figures which show that nationally over €200 million has been disbursed through the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant, successfully returning 3,672 previously vacant or derelict homes to active residential use across the country.

The figures also show that in Kerry, €5.57m has been paid out which has brought 101 disused homes into use. In total, since the grant was launched in July 2022 up to 30 September 2025, there have been 645 applications from Kerry homeowners with 407 approvals.

Throughout the country, Q3 2025 saw the highest-ever Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant payments, with 760 grants paid, representing a 126% increase compared to the same period last year. Since the scheme's launch in July 2022, 11,059 applications have been approved, underlining the growing momentum of the scheme and its impact in tackling vacancy and boosting housing supply.

Since the introduction of the grant in July 2022 to September 2025, Kerry County Council and Cork County Council have received the highest number of applications with over 1,000 applications received. They are followed closely by Dublin City Council who have received over 900 applications. Mayo and Tipperary County Councils are the next highest in terms of activity under the scheme.

A Trip Down Memory Lane

Bishop Bill

to feature on the Saturday Supplement

Every day since he came back to Killarney as a priest in 1979, 46 years ago, Bill Murphy marvels, as he looks down on Lough Leane and prays the same office as the monks on Innisfallen did 1,000 years ago. Johnny Healy remembers, in the 1940s and '50s, with the money they got from selling scraps of lead from the redbrick mansion ruins, the boys from New Street bought a football.

This is one Bishop Bill's special places that he will take Frank Lewis to visit on Radio Kerry from 9 to 11am on Saturday October the 25th. As a young boy Bill (89) remembers with his father and brother one day catching 33 trout, averaging a pound in weight, on the Owncree River in Glenflesk . Mike Joe O'Keeffe, the founder chairman of the Owncree Angling Club, will never forget the salmon he had hooked jumping into low branches where it could not be retrieved.

Paddy O'Donovan every Tuesday and Thursday delivered 38 pounds/608 sausages to St Brendan's College in Killarney. Bill Remembers football training stopped when a man with a newly born baby under his arm climbed through the fence from the District Hospital.

Winner of four All Ireland medals and two All Star awards Donie Sullivan as a 13 year old and Bill Murphy 15 still remember how awe-struck they were seeing Christy Ring playing for Cork against Tipperary in the Munster Hurling Final played in the Fitzgerald Stadium in Killarney in 1950, 75 years ago.

It is impossible to imagine the suffering of the children who died in the Cathedral during the famine Michael Gleeson suggests. "In the

In his 64 years as sacristan in St Mary's Cathedral Tadgie Fleming saw big changes in funeral and baptism ceremonies. You can take the ab initio route or climb the ladder to a Level 8 Honours Degree

CONVERSATION

As soon as the Central Applications Office (CAO) opens for applications each year, the minds of college aspirants begin to focus. All of a sudden there is a sense of urgency about getting the course choices in order. The clock is ticking. Decisions have to be made. The closing date is fast approaching. The conversation is top heavy with third level choices, college locations, distances from home, types of accommodation and all matters relevant to moving on to higher education. Of course, all of that is very understandable. While it's an anxious time for young people, it's also a very exciting time as they begin to realise that the end of the beginning is drawing near. The next phase of the journey, perhaps leaving home and moving on to independent living and learning, is not very far away.

REGISTER

The 2026 CAO application season opens on Wednesday, 5th November and CAO encourages applicants to register early to avoid a late January rush. A discounted application fee of €35 applies for those who open their accounts by 20th January. Thereafter, until the normal closing date of 1st February, the application fee is €50. A discount of 30% is very generous and not to be sniffed at, especially when dosh is scare in these inflationary times. As the CAO form is interactive, an applicant can log on at will until the closing date. Other than that, the remaining three months should be devoted to course research.

SCHEDULE

It's important to maintain the study schedule right up to the Christmas holidays. In fact, for those who haven't done so already, target grades and points should be set for the Christmas in-house test. For example, a student who hopes to achieve 500 points in the Leaving Cert exam should be in the 450 to 475 range by Christmas. Midterm break is also an opportunity for review and reflection. In the immortal words of Agatha Christie's most famous detective, Hercule Poirot, order and method are vital in bringing a project to a successful conclusion. That sentiment is very relevant to exam preparation. So, the Halloween holiday period should be used to review one's time management of the past few months. Consider what you did well and where improvements can be made going forward.

CHOICES

During January, CAO applicants will need to focus on course choices. Courses which are restricted must be included on the form by normal closing date of 1st February. Other than that, courses can be added or withdrawn during the change of mind facility which closes on 1st July. In fact, thousands of applicants don't list any courses by 1st February, preferring to do so later on. My personal view is that course choices should be listed by 1st February. It brings the psychological closure of having the task done and dusted until the Leaving Cert exam has been completed. The choices can then be revisited, if required, up to 1st July.

PATHS

There are two paths in the CAO to an Honours Bachelor Degree (Level 8). Option one is the ab initio Level 8 course. That option is now available in all CAO colleges as new Technological Universities have been expanding the number of Level 8 courses available in their colleges. Most of the Level 8 courses are of four years duration, although some are three or five years long. The risk factor is that no award is made in

the non-technological colleges until the course has been successfully completed. If you drop out on route, you get no qualification.

STEP-BY-STEP

Option two is to take the step-by step-route by signing up for a two-year Higher Certificate (Level 6) or a three-year Ordinary Bachelor Degree (Level 7). After two years, a successful student is conferred with the award of Higher Certificate. Those who successfully complete a third year are conferred with an Ordinary Bachelor Degree at Level 7. They can then progress to an Honours Bachelor Degree at Level 8. This is commonly referred to as 'the ladder system' and suits those who aren't ready to commit to a Level 8 ab initio degree or who may have come up short on Leaving Cert points.

COMFORT LEVEL

The two options allow people to enter higher education at their own comfort learning level. The traditional big seven of UCD, TCD, DCU, Maynooth, University of Galway, UL and UCC, with a few exceptions, offer Honours Bachelor Degree courses only but the new Technological Universities of TUS, MTU, ATU, SETU, TUD and Dundalk Institute of Technology (DkIT) offer the three levels. In addition to the other colleges in the CAO system, there is plenty of choice for each and every applicant. Use it well and wisely.

Supported by Cystic Fibrosis Ireland, Focus on Happiness, and the Department of



Healy-Raes set the record straight on Killarney-**Farranfore Bypass:** €3 million allocated for 2025,

Minister of State Michael Healy-Rae TD and i to ensure progress could continue." Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae have strongly rejected claims made by Deputy Pa Daly that only €1 million was allocated to progress the Killarney-Farranfore section of the Kerry-Cork Economic Corridor in 2025, describing the statement as "completely misleading and factually incorrect." Deputy Daly had stated that the project was "under review" and that just €1 million was being spent next year. However, Minister Michael Healy-Rae has confirmed that the true figure for 2025 is €3 million, as publicly outlined by Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage Darragh O'Brien TD and reaffirmed at this week's meeting of Kerry County Council. Minister O'Brien's official clarification stated "I can confirm that in 2025 Kerry County Council

were allocated €1 million for this project.

Following direct engagement with KCC, it was

agreed between the Department of Transport,

TII and KCC that KCC could spend a further €2

million on this project in 2025 from its own

resources, which will be reimbursed in early

2026 by TII. This bespoke solution was agreed

At Monday's October meeting of Kerry County Council, Director of Services Frank Hartnett confirmed directly to Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae that €3 million is the sanctioned spend for 2025, precisely as agreed between the Department, TII and the Council.

"This is the kind of joined-up, practical work we've been doing behind the scenes to make sure this vital bypass moves forward," said Cllr Jackie Healy-Rae.

"The facts are simple, €3 million has been sanctioned for 2025. Deputy Daly either didn't know or didn't bother to find out. If Killarney was depending on Sinn Féin to deliver this project, it wouldn't even be at the table. Perhaps instead of spreading misinformation, he'd be better off speaking with the good people in Kerry County Council who actually know what's happening."

Minister Michael Healy-Rae added:

"This bypass is a key part of the Kerry-Cork Economic Corridor. The work underway, including topographical surveys and ground

investigation works starting on November 3rd, is absolutely essential to move into the planning and design phase. You can't pour concrete before the groundworks, surveys and planning are done. This funding is real, it's happening, and it's how we get to the next stage and secure the major investment that will follow."

The Minister also noted that allocations for 2026 have not yet been made pending completion of the national roads budgetary process, but he remains confident that Kerry will be well placed to benefit given the preparatory progress now underway.

"If €100 million was handed over in the morning, it couldn't be spent without this groundwork being completed. That's the reality of how major infrastructure is delivered. We're doing this the right way, with the full cooperation of Kerry County Council, TII and the Department of Transport. But this nonsense talk from Deputy Daly doesn't help progress, in fact it only hurts it !!"

SHORT TERM LETTINGSAND TRALEE ECONOMIC BYPASS RAISED AT CO. COUNCIL MEETING

Cllr. John O'Donoghue has raised the followiNg issues at the recent meeting of the Killarney Municipal District at Kerry County Council.

Since January 1st 2024, how many pre planning meetings have been sought with Kerry County Council regarding permission planning for short term letting, how many applications they have received for full permission to short term let, and how many have been granted/refused.

This rules surrounding short term letting in this country and county have been long debated in this chamber, and my own views on it are well known at this stage as I feel that it is far too heavy handed to be treating all areas in an MD the same, as in my own MD of Killarney, the Clydagh valley at the top of Clonkeen near the County Bounds is treated the same as Main street inside in the town of Killarney. This makes very little sense to me. Also, non withstanding the housing crisis we have, and the shortage of long term lets in the County, I do not believe a balance has been struck given that we are a county very reliant on tourism, and many of the properties affected by the new legislation are small units in back yards of peoples own primary residences and these will never appear for long term let. This type of cottage industry short term letting has sustained generations of families within our county in very rural areas, and they now face being wiped out and any hope they had of their children remaining in their local area have disappeared. Rural depopulation is a colossal problem within our county, and it is a problem which is exasperated by our National Planning guidelines which seem to be very heavily biased towards forcing everybody to live in urban centres. We have been repeatedly told to advise the people engaged in short term letting to apply for planning permission to continue, but most are afraid due to fear of drawing a spotlight upon themselves should their application be successful. I have asked for these figures, including pre planning figures, in an attempt to ascertain if it is a viable route for people, or is the industry just being shut down.

To request an update on the plans for the N22 Cork - Tralee Economic corridor which will provide a bypass for Killarnev Town. Is it likely that we will see work commence in 2026?

This issue appears on the agenda at nearly every Council meeting I have attended, and I suspect it did so long before I began in the Council. The traffic congestion in Killarney is an almost year long issue now and needs to be addressed urgently. The proposed economic corridor which will provide a bypass for the town of Killarney is not a silver bullet which will solve all our traffic woes as given the nature of our town, it will always be in demand as a desirable location for people to live in, work in and holiday in. While I hope that in time public transport will improve to the extent that many people will feel comfortable leaving their cars at home and travelling on public transport, the reality is that the day there isn't traffic in Killarney will be the day we really have to worry for the town. That being said, when the bypass arrives it will have a colossal impact on reducing traffic in Killarney which will make the town a much more pleasant place to live and holiday in. It is imperative that now we have finally some progress on the matter, and I thank our roads teams, both Council and TII for getting it to this stage, that we keep the pressure on to get the work done as quickly as is humanly possible.




This Hallowe'en Don't Burn Tyres on Bo<u>nfires</u>

Tyre manufacturer, Continental Tyres Ireland, is advising people not to burn tyres on Hallowe'en bonfires this year. Aside from the environmental impact of such reckless behaviour, there is a strong public health reason for not placing tyres on a bonfire.

Tom Dennigan of Continental Tyres Ireland said: "We would strongly advise against burning tyres on a bonfire, for, aside from it being illegal, smoke from burning tyres carries toxins that are detrimental to both humans and animals. The residue from burnt tyres can also be very damaging to the environment. In fact, the only safe way to burn a tyre is in a concrete kiln which would have sophisticated filtration systems in place to neutralise any toxins".

"Given the moves by local authorities across Ireland towards lessening the environmental impact of Hallowe'en celebrations, we are asking responsible adults at Hallowe'en events to ensure the celebration is safe for all who attend and that it causes as little environmental damage as possible. As an alternative to kiln incineration, tyres can be recycled in a number of environmentally-friendly ways. Similar to all responsible tyre producers in Ireland, Continental works with Circol ELT, the designated body for finding sustainable outcomes for end of life tyres as approved by the Irish government's Department of Environment, Climate and Communications", concluded Dennigan.




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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.




A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.
This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.
The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and
Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and
rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the
builder €45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.



Dogs Trust Halloween Survey Reveals More Than Half of Dogs Experience Firework Fear

Dogs Trust is sharing their top tips for happy hounds at Halloween on DogsTrust.ie/Halloween

A recent survey by Ireland's leading dog welfare charity, Dogs Trust, revealed that 55% of dogs have shown fear when they hear fireworks. Some common signs dog owners observed were whining or barking, increased clinginess, trembling or shaking, and their dog trying to hide. With Halloween fast approaching and a likely increase in the volume of fireworks being set off, Dogs Trust is offering advice for how dog owners can help their dogs cope throughout the spooky



help hounds happy Halloween, Dogs Trust recommends walking them during daylight hours when fireworks are less likely. Feeding them earlier can be a good idea too, as some dogs won't eat when they are feeling worried. Once it starts to get dark out, the charity advises closing curtains, turning on lights and turning up the volume on a TV or radio to help block the sight and sound of the fireworks.

Paulina Padlo, Communications

Manager at Dogs Trust Ireland, advises: "As dogs' hearing is approximately four times more sensitive than ours, it's no wonder they find the sudden and unexpected noise of fireworks so worrying. One of the best things we can do to help dogs during this scary time is to stay home with them and offer them reassurance if they seek it or allow them to hide away in a safe space if they prefer. If you do need to bring your dog out to the toilet during the evening, never force them outside if they are afraid, and always make sure your garden is secure, or keep them on a lead if there is any doubt. Sadly, many dogs go missing at this time of year as they will try to escape if they are feeling frightened."

The charity's survey also found that almost a quarter of dogs (24%) do not wear a collar and tag with their owners' details on it. With an increased risk of a dog becoming lost, a collar and tag is one of the quickest ways for them to be reunited with their owner. Dogs Trust also recommends ensuring your dog is microchipped and the details recorded against the chip are up to date.

Furthermore, approximately a third of owners (36%) pointed out that their dog struggled with trick-or-treaters coming to the door on Halloween night. While some dog owners (8%) said they would take a trip with their dog to avoid Halloween worries. For those who can't, Dogs Trust suggests relaxing with your dog in a part of the house where they are least likely to be disturbed by the doorbell, or even leaving out a sign asking people not to ring the doorbell and knock instead, as you have a worried dog.

KERRY SUFFER DEFEAT IN FINAL GAME OF THE SEASON

Bray Wanderers 5-1 Kerry FC *By David Moriarty*

Kerry FC embarked on their final game of the 2025 SSE Airtricity League of Ireland First Division season on Friday night as they took on Bray Wanderers in the Carlisle Grounds. After a long season of forty-five games between Friendlies, Munster Senior Cup, FAI Cup and in the League, the 2025 season has finally come to an end.

For Kerry FC, this was their second away game in the week as they travelled to Donegal and faced Finn Harps on Monday. A 1-1 draw was the result in a game where Kerry FC would have been disappointed not to have come away with the three points, as they enjoyed the majority of possession and created the better chances in the game.

For Bray Wanderers, they sat third in the table before the game with their playoff position guaranteed. They had won just two games since the fifth of September and wanted to finish their campaign on a high note before hoping to get into the Premier Division via the playoffs.

A good crowd of Kerry FC supporters made the journey to the seaside and hoped for a good result to finish the 2025 campaign.FIRST HALF The hosts made a brighter start and forced the first opening in the fourth minute, with a dangerous corner delivery headed over the bar. That early pressure paid off just two minutes later when Billy O'Neill opened the scoring. The Bray attacker was quickest to react in the box, slotting home from close range to make it 1–0 and set the tone for the evening.

Bray continued to dominate possession, with Cian Doyle firing wide from outside the box in the fifteenth minute. Kerry tried to respond and began to grow into the game around the seventeenth minute, stringing together a promising move that ended in a half-chance, an encouraging sign despite the early setback. Bray's creative spark came through Richard Ferizaj, who tested Kerry goalkeeper Darragh Foley in the 22nd minute. Ferizaj's curling effort looked destined for the top corner, but Foley produced an excellent save, stretching across goal to tip the ball away for a corner. It was a crucial stop that kept Kerry in the contest.

Kerry sought to respond from set pieces of their own. In the twenty-sixth minute, Oran Crowe swung in a dangerous free kick that Bray initially cleared, but the ball fell to Sean McGrath, whose follow-up cross caused further problems before being cleared again by the Bray defence. The visitors were starting to settle, but they struggled to create clear chances in the final third.

As Kerry pushed forward, Arran Healy picked up a yellow card in the twenty-ninth minute, halting a Bray counterattack. In the fortieth minute, Billy O'Neill struck again, finishing confidently to make it 2–0. It was a composed finish that highlighted his clinical edge in front



of goal and gave Bray a comfortable cushion heading into halftime.

Kerry tried to find a response before the interval, with Oran Crowe seeing two shots blocked in quick succession in the forty-third minute. Despite their effort, the Kingdom went into the break two goals down, trailing 2–0 after a difficult first 45 minutes.

SECOND HALF

Colin Healy made an immediate triple substitution at halftime, introducing Luke Doolan, Chris McQueen, and Sean O'Connell for Finn Barrett, Luke Palmer, and Samuel Aladesanusi in a bid to spark a turnaround. However, any hopes of a comeback were dashed within minutes of the restart.

Barely a minute into the second half, Bray was awarded a penalty after a foul inside the box. Up stepped Billy O'Neill, who confidently completed his hat-trick in the forty-seventh minute to make it 3–0.

Kerry's captain, Sean McGrath, tried to rally his side with a long-range effort two minutes later, but his shot dragged wide. Moments later, Foley once again came to Kerry's rescue, producing a fine save from another O'Neill strike in the fifty-first minute. But the reprieve was short-lived. Just a minute later, O'Neill grabbed his fourth goal of the game, tucking home to extend Bray's advantage to 4–0.

The one-way traffic continued, and in the fifty-eighth minute, Bray's captain Cian Doyle added a fifth, finishing calmly after a slick move through midfield. At 5–0, the game was firmly out of Kerry's reach.

In a strange twist, Bray were reduced to ten men just three minutes later when O'Neill, who had scored four goals, was shown a straight red card in the sixty-first minute for words said to referee Alan Patchell. That gave Kerry a numerical advantage for the final half hour. Healy made further changes, bringing on Carl Mujaguzi for Healy and later Cian Brosnan for Daniel O'Connor, as the visitors sought a way back into the game.

Kerry's substitutes injected fresh energy into the side. Luke Doolan went close in the seventy-fourth minute, sending a shot just over the crossbar, before a dangerous low



cross moments later was smothered by Bray goalkeeper Stephen McGuinness. Despite being down a man, Bray continued to defend solidly, while Kerry searched for a consolation. Bray's Matthew Britton received a booking in the seventy-eighth minute, as Kerry continued to push forward. Their persistence finally paid off in the eighty-fourth minute when Chris McQueen, one of the halftime substitutes, pulled one back for Kerry. A well-delivered corner from Oran Crowe found McQueen in the box, and he rose highest to head home and make it 5–1, giving the travelling supporters something to cheer.

The closing minutes were lively, with Carl Mujaguzi picking up a yellow card in the eighty-eighth minute and Alain Kizenga booked shortly after. Four minutes of stoppage time were added, but there were no further goals as referee Alan Patchell brought proceedings to a close.

Although it was not the ending to the season Kerry FC would have liked, it had been a season full of memorable moments. Everyone in the club won't forget our trips and exciting matches in the cup, along with some fantastic league performances throughout the year. Although the 2025 season comes to a close, the 2026 season won't be long coming and everyone is certainly looking forward to it!



SEMI-FINAL: Austin Stacks 1-16 Rathmore 1-9

Three years ago Rathmore were playing Intermediate football. Just last year, Austin Stacks were an Intermediate team. Is it surprising, then, to see them in a senior semi-final?

No. Rathmore have been quietly building all along the way. A solid core of players like the O'Mahony and O'Sullivan brothers had inspired younger players like George and Brendan O'Keeffe, Michael Anthony Kelliher, Mark Reen, Pádraig McCarthy. An unassuming young defender played for the Kerry U21s. The general consensus as I recall it - it'll sound fairly daft now - was that Paul Murphy was 'tidy'. Things didn't go great for that Kerry U21 team, but the wing back was outstanding. He was indeed 'tidy' in the sense of never making the slightest mistake, never getting wrongfooted, never wasting a single ball. I don't think he has ever since, either. With the Murphys, Ryans, Dineens, Darmodys, Dineens, the likes of Brian Friel and Darragh Rahilly taking up the mantle, and the newer players like of the Moynihans, Holohans, and Ciarán Collins really stepping up now, nobody can be any way surprised to see Rathmore stepping past their old harbour of East Kerry and taking on the best that the Kerry championship can offer.

Not that it can be any shock to see Austin Stacks there, either. Tralee football was so unbelievably dominant in the twenties that it had to be split into three teams, John Mitchels, Strand Road, and Rock Street. Mitchels have the same name, albeit in a different location. Strand Road was renamed after patriots Charlie Kerins and the O'Rahilly of Ballylongford (he joined the Easter Rising, despite knowing that it was doomed, declaring that "I have helped to wind up the clock; I may as well hear it strike!"). Rock Street was renamed in honour of Austin Stack. Initially they continued that Tralee dominance (in both football and hurling) but other teams and divisional sides started to blossom. Stacks,

like their Killarney black and amber rivals at the top of the roll of honour, had a hiatus of around half a century. Except that in the late sixties the likes of Michael Hayes and James Hobbert fostered an underage revolution. The likes of the O'Keeffes, Power, Sheehy, Timmy Sheehan paid attention...by the seventies, the Rockies were back on top, and they have been there or thereabouts ever since. Recently they have been the top club at minor and U21, and another generation is rising fast. A surprise to see them come from intermediate to a senior semi-final so fast? No, the surprise was them dropping to Intermediate in the first place (they were riddled with injury at the time).

The Fitzgerald Stadium was immaculate, but a very strong wind (much stronger than people may have realised) had a very big impact. Stacks had that wind behind them and drew first blood, Paddy Lane punishing a foul on Daniel Kirby. Shane Ryan drew a foul himself and replied in kind. Stacks were making the early running, and shooting from distance, but initially without success. It was interesting to see Paddy Lane, the predominant inside predator in colleges' football for Mercy Mounthawk and at minor/U21 for Stacks in the past two years, drifting out to shoot from distance.

One of the features of the Club and County Championships has been the predominance of county and aspiring county players. One such is Armin Heinrich, and he showed it with a booming two pointer in the fifth minute. That one felt like a little bit of a statement score. Ciarán Collins slotted over a free and Mark Reen fired over a point to level matters, but Jordan Kissane nudged Stacks back in front after a great piece of defending by Colin Griffin, but Mark Ryan, impressive as a third midfielder, kicked a point in the 20th minute.

Stacks were definitely the better team. Both sides were coughing up turnovers, but Stacks were mostly doing it in the last phase of attack, whereas Rathmore, understandably conservative in the face of that wind, were struggling to build any momentum. It did feel

to me, though, that Stacks weren't putting enough of their play on the scoreboard, with Rathmore likely to prosper on the turnaround. Paddy Lane made it 0-6 to 0-4 with a two pointer. Stacks had possession when the hooter sounded and worked it well for Joe O'Connor to send over another monster two pointer. A big score, and I can't be the only one who was instantly reminded of Kerry working the ball after the half-time hooter for David Clifford to raise an orange flag. Double scores at half-time, 0-8 to 0-4 in favour of Stacks.

Joe O'Connor had been the most prominent in a well-contested middle third in the first half. In the second half he was incandescent, while young Ben Murphy showed why he'll either be in with the Kerry seniors or utilising his passport next year. Sadly, it seems that he is bound for the Antipodes, and I don't blame him, it's a life-changing opportunity for a near on once in a lifetime talent.

The loss of Paul Murphy to injury at half-time (too many county players have been playing injured since the All Ireland; I sincerely believe that we are pushing bodies far too hard) was a huge blow to Rathmore.

Joe O'Connor banged over a point to start the second half scoring and Jordan Kissane added another. Six points in it now, and Rathmore needed to react strongly. To their credit, they got the next two scores through Shane Ryan with a two point free and Fionn Murphy firing over.

Stacks were simply winning too many individual duels, though, and more significantly they were linking up well both in and out of possession. They simply never allowed Rathmore to build momentum, and it was very cleverly and cohesively done. Paddy Lane and Joe O'Connor clipped over scores. Paddy added a free and the gap was back to six points.

John Moyniha looked razor sharp on his introduction and quickly raised a white flag. Paddy Lane replied before Shane Ryan split the posts again. Ronan Carroll came on and pointed. Joe O'Cnnnor – incredible this year for both club and county – raced through, exchanged passeswith Ben Murphy, and drilled low to the keeper's left.

Rathmore replied instantly, John Moynihan once again showing his penchant for scoring great goals, but it was more a last gesture of defiance than a resurgence and Ben Murphy coolly closed out the scoring. Austin Stacks advance after a very, very impressive display against quality opposition.

Dingle 1-16 Mid Kerry 0-16

Truth be told, I have a fierce soft spot for both of them. No teams have come as close to the Bishop Moynihan over the past decade without getting to lift it. It's like how you'd always want your own county to win the All Ireland, but if it couldn't be your own county, you'd be okay with Mayo finally ending that long famine. Most people would, anyway; I accept that some of ye have hearts of stone.

Mid Kerry have been quietly building for some time. Laune Rangers and Beaufort have given serious rattles at the Intermediate in recent years and both have players high on Kerry's radar

Mid Kerry have been a growing force of late, losing three finals in the last five years, all of them to East Kerry.I didn't think that they would be the only divisional team in the last four, but I'm not remotely surprised that they made the last four.Having seen Laune Rangers reach last year's Intermediate Final, Beaufort go very close this year, Keel in the Premier Junior semi, Darren Houlihan#s hat-trick for Cromane in the Novice Final, and he form of Liam Smith of Glenbeigh, I honestly thought from the start that Mid Kerry would be only just behind Dr. Crokes and East Kerry as third favourites this year.

You have to go all the way back to 2008 for their last title. A Mid Kerry side that included Mike Burke, Damien Breen, Seán O'Sullivan, Donnchadh Walsh, Darran O'Sullivan, Gary Sayers, Fionán Griffin, Liam Sheehan, and Kieran Foley saw off a Kerins O'Rahillys side that featured Micheál Quirke, David Moran, Tommy Walsh, and Declan Quill and was

managed by Jack O'Connor. I wasn't actually at that replay. It would be rare for me to miss a County Football Final (I always try to make the hurling as well) but as I recall, I was in Mallow reporting on St. Michaels/Foilmore winning the Munster Intermediate Final - Jack's son Cian was among their goalscorers. The reason I remember it so well is because an unnamed journalistic colleague of mine had agreed with a national radio broadcaster to give them live updates....from the Kerry County Final. With one earphone tuned to Radio Kerry, and text updates coming in from a friend (no whatsapp back then), he kept his word, much to the bemusement of the supporters within earshot of the press section at the back of the stand in Mallow. There are some things you don't learn in journalism school! I did watch the game on video after - Mid Kerry won with a penalty in the final minute, a dodgy enough penalty I thought.

It's even longer for Dingle. They emerged from a 61 year absence to reach the County Final in 2012, only to lose to Dr. Crokes, and have lost again to the same opposition since in 2018 and last year. My own honest opinion is that Paul Geaney has taken over Bryan Sheehan's previous mantle as the most consistently outstanding performer in domestic football in recent years and Dingle have blended a lot of the four in a row Corn uí Mhuirí winners of PS Chorca Dhuibhne (they also won two Hogans) into a really strong team around the talismanic forward.

Even 61 years before that 2012 final, Dingle hadn't been crowned champions, losing out to the Dick Fitzgeralds (ironically, the amalgamation was backboned by Dr. Crokes stalwarts). Their last win actually goes back to 1948, when they saw off Shannon Rangers by 2-10 to 0-5. Tht wouldn't have been a huge surprise. The Dingle team of that era, with their famous red and white jerseys (initially commissioned by Cork from the Queen's Old Drapery, but apprentice tailor Jimmy McKenna had no problem bringing them back to his native club after the deal fell through - Kerry actually wore them in the 1939 final against Meath) were one of the great teams. The names still run through Kerry GAA folklore, having won six titles in ten years. Bill Dillon (he used the Sam Maguire to store meat for his hunting beagles), Bill Casey (his nephew Brian Mullins became a good footballer after), Tom 'Gega' O'Connor (Mark O'Connor and Mikey Geaney are grandnephews), Seán Brosnan, Paddy Bawn Brosnan, Tom Ashe, Tim Brosnan, and Tom Long (the Fossa headmaster became a Dr. Crokes legend himself after)......There's generations between them, but the current Dingle team play the same style of football.

They took quite a while to get going, though, with Mid Kerry making all the early running. Jack O'Connor slotted an early free and Ciarán Kennedy added another. Matthew Flaherty opened Dingle's account but I thought they were playing too deep, especially Paul Geaney (Dingle ofen play him as the attacking fulcrum rather than the end target). Seán O'Brien lofted over a two pointer and Ciarán Kennedy added his second. 0-5 to 0-2.

Billy O'Conor kicked a badly wanted point for Dingle. For me, long-serving O'Connor was Dingle's lifeline in this period, the one player willing and able to drive forward and force Mid Kerry onto the back foot.

Ciarán Kennedy responded with a free and Darragh O'Connor joined his brother on the scoresheet. Billy O'Connor surged through to open up a goal chance, but his final pass was just inches too high and Mid Kerry were able to clear. Liam Carey pointed to make it 0-8 to 0-2. To Say that Mid Kerry were rampant at this stage would be an understatement.

With almost twenty minutes gone, the West Kerrymen suddenly burst into life. Conor Geaney kicked a point. Tom O'Sullivan went on a trademark burst before laying off to Conor Geaney, who jinked to open space before confidently drilling to the net. Brian O'Connor, another unheralded performer to impress, levelled matters, Billy O'Connor added his second, and clever play by Dingle saw Dylan Geaney nudge them into the lead for the first time after the hooter.

Niall Geaney kicked a beauty to start the second half scoring. Daire Cleary replied but Dingle, with Mark O'Connor growing in stature, were definitely gaining the upper hand. Dylan Geaney fisted over before Conor put a goal between them. He followed up with a two pointer and Dingle were five points ahead.

Ciaran Kennedy pulled two points back from frees, but Niall Geaney swung over another

two pointer. 1-13 to 0-11. Keith Evans notched two points from play, but again Conor Geaney raised an orange flag. Tom O'Sullivan kicked a point. It felt like Mid Kerry were working like trojans but not closing that gap. Six points in it. Still Mid Kerry hung on. Ciaran Kennedy nailed a two pointer, a big score. Darren Houlihan pointed a free. Just a goal in it - and Mid Kerry looked capable of one. They attacked in waves, but the shot just wouldn't open up. One last ball into the Dingle square was grabbed by Mark O'Connor, who heard the hooter and promptly kicked it wide to end the play - not knowing that the clock doesn't stop after the hooter for a '45. In the end, it didn't matter, as Dylan Geaney finally booted the ball into the stands to secure his team a return to the Kerry County Final.

Mid Kerry weren't the only team to lose out. If they had won the Bishop Moynihan, Dr. Crokes as Club Champions would have represented Kerry in the Munster Club Championship, but with two club sides involved in the final, it will be the winner who goes forward to represent Kerry.

Fossa 0-11 Kilcummin 0-15

Kilcumin avenged their Intermediate semi-final defeat in fine style, seeing off a Fossa side who gave a very good account despite missing the Clifford brothers. Killian and Harry Buckley led Fossa's attack while the O'Shea brothers and Cian Foley were on song for Kilcummin, who led by 0-7 to 0-5 at the break. Jack Clifford levelled matters with a great two pointer. Fossa scored four of the next six points to make it 0-9 apiece, but Chris O'Leary and Paul O'Shea pushed Kilcummin back in front and late scores from Cian Foley, Philip O'Leary, and Paul O'Shea wrapped up a Kilcummin win.

The toughest game to call. Glenflesk, with Darragh Roche in full flight, are quite capable of beating anyone on their own ground. Kenmare Shamrocks have a forward talisman of their own though in Seán O'Shea,and plenty of back-up in players like Donal Down O'Sullivan, Paul O'Connor, David Hallissey, Darragh O'Connor and James McCarthy. Their performance against North Kerry in the County Championship was spectacular; a repeat of that would see them into the last four.

Spa v Listry

Listry impressed in the Junior Premier and have form players in the Murphy brothers, Aaron O'Shea, and Cathal O'Donoghue, but Ronan Buckley will be a big loss and senior quarter-

finalists Spa will look to the likes of Shane Cronin, Dara Moynihan, Evan Cronin, and Cian Tobin to lead them into the last four.

KERRY PLAYERS WIN DUBLIN **COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP**

The list of Kerry players who played in Dublin is a very long one. Paul Russell, who won a Dublin County Championship with the Garda team and played for Dublin in 1927, was an early one. He was selected on both the Munster and Leinster Railway Cup teams and Central Council ordered that he play with Leinster, who won the competition. Tom Long, John F O'Sullivan, Ned Kennelly, Teddy O'Sullivan....a huge amount of gardai and teachers had that honour.

Kerry in the earlier half of the last century had good education, a scarcity of land, and an absolute paucity of jobs...Dublin had government jobs and cheap fares. As such, it had a huge influx that would transform it without diluting the sharp wit of its streets. However, the Dublin jersey was rarely worn by native Dubliners, given the influx of talent from elsewhere, until adopted as a deliberate policy in the early fifties.

In 1934, Murt Kelly, Seamus O'Shea, and Gearoid Fitzgerald all lined out in the 1934 All Ireland semi-final in Tralee – but the three Kerrymen were playing for Dublin. Murt, famously, was at one point simultaneously a Munster player and a Leinster selector in the railway Cup – he quite literally picked the man to mark himself! Another Kerryman, Martin Kelly, lined out for Galway in 1934 and Dublin in 1935.

In 1942 there were seven Kerrymen on the field when Dublin beat Galway in the All Ireland Final - Joe Fitzgerald (Dingle), Mick Falvey (Dingle), Jimmy Joy (Killorglin) and Sean Moriarty (Castlegregory) were all wearing Dublin blue. Sometimes you can actually trace our troubled nation's history through the bloodlines. Big Paddy Casey of Lispole won his All Irelands with Dublin Kickhams 1906 and 1907. Some thirty years later his nephew Billy won his as

the Kerry centre back, and a great one. Billy's own nephew a generation later was another of the greats – Brian Mullins of Dublin. Just in case that chain hadn't enough forged links already, Mullin's own nephews were the famous Casey brothers of Lispole. Gabriel was probably the best known, but they all wore Kerry geansaí at some stage.

Last weekend saw two more Kerry natives pick up Dublin County Championships. Gneeveguilla native Pa Warren and Michael O'Gara of Austin Stacks were both on the victorious Ballyboden St.Enda's team. Pa Warren is quietly amassing a fairly unique set of medals. He now has won County Championships with East Kerry in Kerry, New York, and now Dublin!

RUGBY **URC**

Munster 31 Leinster 14

I wasn't expecting it. To be honest, there's always been a bit of bite between Munster and Leinster. I always thought that was generally a good thing for Irish rugby, even if the generalisation of 'fancy dan' Leinster from the upper class echelons versus the honest working class of Cork and Limerick (and the fertile soil of Currow) always had a tiny whiff of hypocrisy about it. To be honest, hearing some of that stuff made one think of shillelaghs and leprechauns

And it's certainly taken on an unhealthy tinge in recent years. Lenster have unquestionably been dominant, so completely so that the Irish team was starting to feel like Leinster plus a few friends. That wasn't fair; Leister players were there on merit and were provin it with their medals while Munster felt often enough as if they were running to stand still. Andy Farrell has selected 21 Leinster players for his Irish panel that will be facing New Zealand in Chicago (the Soldier's Field, scene of that famous first ever victory over the All Blacks - Thomond Park in 1978 has taken on a mythological status and the rush to give that victory the same status fely a bit overblown as well). Yes, you can make an argument that Gavin Coombes deserved and deserves more of a look. And the debate about Jack Crowley or Sam Prendergast for outhalf....arrah, go back to Sexton v O'Gara or Ward versus Campbell. Read the articles and just substitute the names. It's lazy journalism. It's like those efforts to remake films and tv series that were popular thirty years ago, or manufactured pop bands churning out reworked classics of yesteryear for a new and still gullible generation. Every sport is guilty of it, but rugby has a particular penchant for invented nostalgia. There's real hearts and bodies on the line in a very skillful, intense, and demanding game, but too often the punditry has an element of theatrics and branding about it.

I do think Irish rugby needed this. Needed a bit of a growling performance from Munster. A statement of confidence and a serious wakeup call for Leinster at the same time. It's not actually a huge result; it doesn't shake the game to it's foundations, but it had over 50,000 people roaring on either side. That counts.

It felt like abit of same old, same old, when Ronán Kelliher dotted down the first try. Munster would bring passionate endeavour; Leinster would bring all the rugby.

Except Tadhg Beirne stepped up and just drove tirelessly into blue shirts. He's quite capable of refinement and has shown it often, but in this case it was just relentlessly tearing into his opponents. Not so much thou shalt not pass" as "you'd be an eejit to even try it today".

Add in the performance of Jack Crowley. It has led to some commentators discussing whether he should be starting for Ireland rather than his Leinster counterpart Sam Prendergast.....it's already been done to death lads.

Crowley's crossfield pass created the opening for Brian Gleeson's equalising try and his chip for Tom Farrell to run on to provided the second and the lead. Ethan Coughlan made a great interception and ran all the way over for a third before the break.

Leinster came back out in determined mood. It's been a long time since Munster outplayed them but what must have stung worse is that Munster outfought them.

Dan Sheehan came off the bench but his biggest impact was to concede a soft enough penalty for Crowley to slot over. Leinster were doing plenty of attacking, but Munster were able to hold them off. That included stooping Josh Van der Flier on the line; somehow, that just made it clear that Leinster were not going to pull this one out of the fire.

With three minutes left Munster got a penalty try and it was job done. Leinster did get a late try of their own, but it arrived too late to even be called a consolation.

Look, nobody should be getting carried away. Munster have started very well, but there is a very long way to go. Likewise, Leinster aren't going to panic. They should be better and they will need to be better, but I wouldn't be taking any bets about a Munster victory when they meet again.

And that's just how every rugby fan and Irish supporter should want it.

Commiserations to our Senior Men who exited the O Donoghue Cup at the first round stage against Gneeveguilla. 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


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










Welcome back dear student, last week we looked at how God expects us to treat others (our neighbours), and how strife affects us. In the Scripture above Paul was talking about a thorn in his flesh. He didn't explain what this torment was. Some believe it was a physical infirmity — perhaps the results of the beatings he got for preaching the Gospel, or would it be personal wounds inflicted by others? When he begged God to take it away, the Lord told him that He had given Paul grace to overcome it, and that God's strength is made perfect in weak humanity. It takes a lot to admit weakness. In life folks try to 'put the best side out'. We like others to see the good and try to hide the bad stuff. No one likes their weaknesses aired. The Psalms state that God 'cares for us as a tender Father, knowing how weak we are..' (Psalm 103:13-14). Conflict or strife weakens one internally, but the results are still hard to conceal.

Previously, we've seen how words can poison others. Given opportunity, strife spreads from person to person like a silent virus, infecting those who don't examine what they're hearing. Strife can operate in individuals, families, group settings, and even in communities and nations. It comes through people suffering low self-worth or inferiority, or from un-processed trauma and anger, or simple lack of understanding of the whole picture. Strife can be handed down generations, creating suspicion, victimhood, and paranoia, and is mentally and physically wearing. Rooted in fear, strife is a manifestation of a scoffing and mocking spirit which is a terribly angry spirit getting folks angry at God, angry at themselves, or angry at others. 'Cast out the scoffer and strife will cease, and guarrelling will end' (Proverbs 22:10). In marriage, neighbourhoods, families or work situations, strife is a difficult bridge to cross for others caught in the swirl. Every life has a ripple effect; like the smallest pebble that glides over still water, waves are created! Our lives, our actions and words have an impact far beyond just ourselves - affecting others, good or bad. Usually, a lack of communication is what carries on strife. So that's a place to start to repair - admit the need for help, and talk.

Life is so short - like a vapour, gone in no time (Psalm 144:4). Many people suffer, and deal with heavy things. Friend, at the end: will it all be worth it? What consequences will remain generationally? These are questions we need to ask. Mediation services offer wonderful help, but Jesus is the Ultimate Mediator (1 Timothy 2:5). A human being can only do so much to mend the breach, but God heals and restores. He promises to rebuke the devourer for the sake of His people who live in obedience to His Kingship, remarking, 'there will be a difference between those who serve the Lord and those who don't' (Malachi 3:11-18). It's the difference between straw and grain (Jeremiah 23:28). One is food, the other just a hollow stalk. God's children are called to arise and to shine (Isaiah 60:1; Philippians 2:14-16). Not just in blessings, but in conduct. 'Wise, and shining like stars forever, leading others unto Righteousness' (Daniel 12:3). Our lives are to reflect the Glory of God, causing others to draw close to Him. God is Holy — remember, there is no strife in Heaven. Don't be unwise friend, do what you can to make things right, for there is huge blessing there (Psalms 133). God doesn't despise our weakness - it actually attracts Him (Joel 3:10), 'let the weak say I am strong'! We pray God's Mercy for Ireland in the election today.
