On Saturday February 26th and Sunday February 27th – for children aged 5-11 for 1st & 2nd vaccination doses.

Getting your child vaccinated is a decision between you and your child. If Parent's have any questions regarding your child's vaccination then please speak to staff at our vaccination centres, they will be available to provide you with further information.

People can also continue to book appointments at vaccination centres on hse.ie at this link: https://www2.hse.ie/screening-and-vaccinations/ covid-19-vaccine/get-the-vaccine/covid-19-vaccine-booster-dose/

It's important that you do not go to a vaccination centre if you have Covid-19; if you have symptoms of Covid-19 or if you have been told to restrict your movements.

It's also important to check your eligibility online on hse.ie before you self-schedule your appointment, bearing in mind that you need to wait three months (at least 90 days) after your first round of Covid-19 vaccination before you can get a booster. If you had Covid-19 since you were vaccinated, you should get your booster dose at least three months after your positive test result.

The 44th annual 'Press Photographer of the Year Awards'were announced on Friday last during a specially directed live awards ceremony presented by broadcaster Miriam O'Callaghan alongside Paul Sherwood, President of the Press Photographers Association of Ireland. The event saw photographers from all across Ireland honoured and recognised for excellence in press photography, during a year of many highs and lows with Killarney photographer Valerie O'Sullivan coming third in the Reportage section for her images of the wild fires which raged through Killarney National Park last April and Michelle Cooper Galvin achieving "Highly Recommended" for her image of the fires. The awards, which were presented across ten categories, were opened with a special address by An Taoiseach, Micheál Martin T.D.

Almost 1,400 images were submitted by 100 photographers for this year's awards.

WINDS OF WAR



The Annals of Inisfallen make interesting reading this time of year. I have been perusing them in the light of the colour coded storm warnings we have all been terrified of this past week. There were storms in the 13th century too. Not only that but the topics that are engaging us this early part of 2022 are little different to those of 800 years ago.

Broadly speaking, war, wind and pestilence are as big a concern then as they are today. The entries from around 1092 in the annals are felt to have been contemporary. They were recordings of what had occurred over the year (and not before the event as in the lead up to storm Eunice!). In addition, these are the entries from the monastery at Inisfallen on the lake of Learning. Before the end of the eleventh century, the annals were concerned with ancient history and most of this work is believed to have been carried out in Lismore.

There are a lot of entries in Killarney about bishops and kings and castles rising and castles falling.

Not only is the date always given, so is the moon day. There is much about the MacCarthys, the old Kings .

In January 1268 "a great wind about the Feast of Saint Hilary (January 13) did harm to people both on sea and land", "ar mur agus ar tír", as the old Irish of the manuscript puts it.

There was very bad weather too in early 1271, as well as "general warfare" between the foreigners and the Gaeil of Ireland. Weather and war are followed by a great famine so that multitudes of poor people died of cold and hunger "and the rich suffered hardship". In 1285 around St Brigid's Day there is so much wind it blows down stone towers:

"A very destructive wind this year about the feast of Brigit. It blew down the bell-tower of Ros Alithir (Roscarbery. Co. Cork) and caused much damage generally."

This is followed by more entries about war between the McCarthys and foreigners.

One is tempted to say "plus ca change, plus c'est la meme chose," to this rather contemporary trio of war, weather and pestilence, in our time of Covid, wind and the hostilities in the Ukraine.

However, the sober recording of the weather and war in the ancient chronicle stands in marked contrast to the hype in today's world when fear is being whipped up before it happens at all.

On a serious note, the former minister Jimmy

Deenihan, still very involved in local history, is looking into what happened to his plans to recover the annals for Killarney. He is open to pursuing a facsimile for the town, he tells me.

### COVID COMPLIANCE IN TOURISM FACILITIES AND A CAR PARK FOR KILLARNEY

What might be termed night establishments in Killarney have been found to be hugely compliant with Covid provisions and inspections, a reply under the Freedom of Information Act has revealed.

Previously, the health and safety officers of the Health and Safety Authority had found daytime premises, that is lunchtime facilities, hugely compliant also

This time it was Environmental Health Officers of the Health Services Executive, the HSE who were charged with late night pubs and restaurants and inspections were greater.

The number of premises public houses/ restaurants and other premises inspected by officers in Kerry that were inspected amounted to 152 Public Houses, 248 restaurants, and 100 "others", amounting to some 500 premises inspected between July and December 2021.

The compliance rate was 94.33%, the HSE has said and it also confirmed inspections were undertaken outside of normal working hours at weekends and on weekdays.

Again, we take it as a given that most of those establishments were in Killarney.

We do not know which establishments were not compliant as this part of the request was refused.

Meanwhile, with the ink hardly dry on last week's piece about long and outstanding car parking issues in Killarney, and the chronic lack of car spaces, a decision of An Bord Pleanala overturning a car park refusal by the council emerged.

Last August planners in Kerry County Council refused permission for the retention of the overflow car park from Sheahan's Centra on the Muckross/Flesk Road at Scrahane, and the upgrading of same with surface, landscaping, signage and lighting on what is a vacant site. The Kerry County Council planners said developing an overflow car park to serve Centra would be contrary to the town centre zoning and its objectives. They felt a car park would not be suitable for a mixed use site so close to the town centre.

The council planners also felt a traffic hazard could be created and there was a need for a road safety audit.

However, last week An Bord Pleanála overturned the council's decision. The board gave the go-ahead to a retention proposal by Gleann Beithe Management and Trading Services. The permission is for five years so that there can be monitoring if this is what is suitable for the strategic use of the site, long term.

Among the conditions are the installations of

electric vehicle charging points or stations. Who knows, maybe an electric shuttle bus is on its way.

#### **BLUES OVER BLUEBELLS**

Concern is being raised, and not for the first time about the noticeable degradation of the wonderful bluebell wood opposite the Muckross Post Office.

I seem to recall a general concern was raised a few years ago about the threat to bluebells in Killarney and that time it was by an ad hoc group.

Now a reader has contacted this column to document how the mountain bikes are creating a pathway where there never was a path.

Walkers too are trampling through the magical wood but it is the large - and heavy-tyre mountain bikes which do the most damage.

In essence, the paths through the bluebell wood have become progressively wider.

"This is such a jewel in our environment that it's a crying shame it is being destroyed," the reader correctly points out.

I took a good look, myself, since it was brought to my attention and indeed the floor of the deciduous wood is in a sorry state and completely bare and trodden in parts.

The matter has been brought to the attention of management at Muckross, and suggestions have been made to erect signage and they are concerned.

Older residents of Muckross and indeed Killarney town recall how they never walked through the wood growing up, but always admired it from a distance.

That taboo existed until recently and may well have disappeared with the relatively recent practice of photographing children for First Communions among the bluebells, it is suspected.

Trails are being done up all around Muckross and the Killarney National Park and do we really need to damage the one bluebell wood visible from the road and that brings such glancing joy each April/May?.

This is a hugely important issue. The Muckross bluebells are, in the global context, part of a greatly endangered species and part of a population particularly significant internationally.

The NPWS and the Department of Housing and Heritage has been told of the concerns and they assure the column they are treating the matter seriously and will be back to outline the measures that are to be put in place. Indeed their duty as guardians of the woods and bluebells can be no less. We await the measures and thank the reader.

"We focused on creating stars through different mediums such as modelling clay, paper and cardboard", Tricia added.


"We also jumped on Trampolines outside to explore different forms of movement that our bodies can make while looking at the colours of the sky, the shapes of the clouds and faraway stars.

'Tremendous work continues to be done by the staff of Kerry County by the staff of Kerry County Council around the county in clearing roads of fallen trees, branches and debris and in assisting ESB Networks in their work.'

The Chief Executive of Kerry County Council, Moira Murrell, said that the interagency cooperation in advance of Storm Eunice was hugely important. 'The Kerry Severe Weather Coordination Team had been preparing for a Status Red alert for several days and met regularly to coordinate the

Leah is now looking forward to the upcoming year with the team and all that it will bring.



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

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# **KILLARNEY SEN**

In late 2021 Killarney Chamber of Tourism & Commerce commissioned Mark O'Connell from Repucon to conduct an important survey to ascertain the views of the business community in Killarney on a whole range of important local issues. The commercial interests in the town were urged to respond to ensure a full and accurate snapshot of local opinion is obtained and this week the findings of the survey were delivered to the Chamber at their first lunch since the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic

The Business Sentiment Survey 2021was geared towards discovering what is important for local businesses going forward, what they need and expect from the town and what measures they would like to see implemented. The information provided will be important as Killarney continues moving towards creating a safe, progressive and inclusive town in Covid times.

# **TRAFFIC A PROBLEM AND** STAFF CRISIS ESCALATES

**Traffic management and the problems** : Killarney is a good place to do business with : recruiting staff are the biggest post pandemic issues facing businesses in Killarney, a major new survey has found.

20.2% of respondents to a business sentiment survey undertaken by Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce cited traffic as a major concern and an identical number said finding staff was their main issue.

Other post Covid-19 challenges identified included providing adequate parking (15.5%), attracting international visitors following the various lockdowns (13.1%), cost issues (11.9%) and remaining competitive with online offerings (7.1%).

Interestingly, 57.8% of businesses surveyed said they had identified new business channels as a result of Covid-19 with some reporting a percentage turnover from the new sources to be as high as 27.1%.

Not surprisingly, 71.8% said business levels decreased during the pandemic, 20.4% said it stayed the same and 7.8% reported an actual increase in business throughout the crisis.

That said, a majority of local commercial concerns who participated in the survey said they were confident about business performance following the pressures of the pandemic, with 54.4% describing their outlook as optimistic, 21.4% as very optimistic, 19.4% as somewhat optimistic and just 4.9% saying they were not at all optimistic.

Killarney's strong reputation as a tourist town and the range of things to do in the town was the number one reason respondents believe it is a good place to do business.

The opinion was gleaned from extensive online research conducted in late 2021 - including a business sentiment survey, a separate visitor sentiment survey and a third and very important community sentiment survey commissioned by Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and conducted by professional independent marketing consultants Repucon. A convincing 92% of those that responded to the business sentiment survey insisted that



just 8% disagreeing.

Analysing the research, it would appear the pedestrianisation of Plunkett Street and Main Street in Killarney has been a hit with 58.5% of businesses saying it was effective, 34.0% not agreeing and 7.5% saying they don't know.

In the community survey, 72.3% per cent described the pedestrianisation of Plunkett Street as effective, 22.4% did not agree and 5.3% said they don't know while, in relation to Main Street, 56.9% per cent of the community respondents thought pedestrianisation was effective, 37.1% didn't agree and 6.1 per cent had no opinion.

38.0% would be in favour of introducing pedestrianisation all year round, 36.5% said they would prefer to continue with the current level of car free zones and 25.5 per cent were in favour of removing it altogether.

In related matters, 55.9% of business responses were in favour of the decision to increase the width of footpaths in the town centre during the pandemic, 34.4% were against and 9.7% didn't know.

In the community survey responses, 57.1% were in favour of wider pavements, 36.8 were opposed and 6.0% didn't give an opinion.

57.6% believed that the areas reserved for age friendly and disabled parking were effective, 21.7% didn't agree and 20.7% said they didn't know. 63.7% believed the 15-minute set down limit was effective, 19.8% didn't concur and 16.5% had no opinion to offer on that question. Interestingly, an emphatic 87% of respondents said outdoor dining over the summer months was effective, 9.0% disagreed and 4.0% had no opinion.

On the social scene, 34.0% of respondents found the night time offering in Killarney to be very good, 44.7% described it as good, 12.6% said it was average, 6.8% found it to be poor and 1.9% said it was very poor.

61.5% of business sentiment survev respondents said they would strongly recommend the social life in Killarney, 57.6% of the community survey respondents said likewise while 2.9% of the business respondents said they wouldn't recommend the evening time offering and 1.9% of the community respondents said likewise.

50% of respondents to the business survey said Killarney was a safe town in which to socialise and 21.2% described it as being very safe.

Asked what measures were most important for Killarney, 91.9% of businesses surveyed prioritised street cleaning and other considerations included maintaining Killarney's Tidy Towns profile (85.9%), bin storage on the streets (79.6%), CCTV (63.7%) and maintaining the town's Purple Flag status for a safe night time economy (48.5%).

52.0% of businesses expressed concerns about there being a very high risk of antisocial behaviour on the streets and car parks with 31.4% saying there was a high risk, 13.7% describing the risk as average 2.0% believing the risk was minimal and 1.0% felt there was no risk.

In the community sentiment survey, the view on Killarney's retail offering was interesting with 52.1% of respondents wanting more fashion and clothing stores, while there was also support for more homeware stores (11.4%) and hardware outlets (9%).

Asked what percentage of their shopping was done online, 41.6% of community survey respondents said less than 10%, with 19.9% saying up to a guarter of their shopping, 13.1% replying up to half, 8.2% up to three guarters and 1.4% said all or almost all of their shopping was done online. 15.8% didn't do any of their shopping online.

The key improvements the people of Killarney interviewed would like to see in their town were measures to tackle traffic congestion (24.1%), additional parking (20.6%), more pedestrianisation (12.8%) and more public amenities such as bins, benches and toilets (12.6%).

Asked what they believed Killarney town was lacking, 31% said a bowling alley and 26.5% wanted more indoor facilities in general with 12.5% seeking more activities for children and teenagers.

In the business sentiment survey, more than 100 interviews were conducted last November and December and in the community sentiment survey over 1,000 interviews were conducted in October.

# CLEAR MAJORITY BACK PEDESTRIANISATION

he contentious issue of pedestrianisation continues to be divisive in Killarney but, if the business and community sentiment surveys are to be used as a barometer, a very clear majority is in favour of banning vehicular traffic from key areas in the town centre.

The outcome of the business survey was that 58.5% believed that the pedestrianiation of Plunkett Street and Main Street - trialled at weekends - had been effective, 34.0% said it didn't work and 7.5% said they didn't know. In the community sentiment survey, 56.9% found the pedestrianisation of Plunkett and Main Street to be effective, 37.1% didn't and 6.1 per cent said they didn't know.

Asked if the pedestrianisation of Plunkett Street alone was effective, a much higher 72.3% said

yes, 22.4% said no and 5.3% had no opinion. On the subject of what levels of pedestrianisation they would like to see in the town centre going forward, 38% were in favour of keeping it all year round, 36.5% want to continue with the current levels and 25.5% was in favour of removing pedestrianisation altogether.

Asked if they were happy to see the town centre footpaths being widened, 55.9% of those who submitted views for the business survey said yes, 34.4% said no and 9.7% had no opinion. Responding to the same question in the community sentiment survey, 57.1% said the wider footpaths were effective, 36.8% said they were not and 6.00% said they didn't know.



# 55% WALKED MORE **DURING PANDEMIC**



"he popularity and importance of Killarney National Park was highlighted in the community sentiment survey research commissioned by Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and undertaken by Repucon Consulting.

A hugely significant 41.8% of the over 1,000 people that replied said they like to visit the park a few times a week with 16% enjoying the facilities there once a week.

14.6% visit the park every day and a similar number of respondents, 14.4%, enjoy it a few times a month.

An additional 5.5% of respondents said they go to the national park once a month, 6.6% call there less than once a month and just 0.9% per cent said they never visit the 26,000acre national park.

Interestingly, 55% of those who responded to the survey said their walking habits had increased during the pandemic, 38% said their routine stayed the same and just 7% said their walking regime had actually decreased because of Covid-19. On the whole issue of climate change, 30.3% said they were very strongly concerned, 33.2% were strongly concerned, 24.2% had average concerns, 6.4% said their levels of concern were low and 6.0% has no concerns at all.

Asked what factors could help address climate worries, 26.8% said more bins and recycling depositories, 12.9% called for improved public transport, 11.7% suggested more cycle lanes and cycling promotions, 10.3% suggested improved traffic management, 7.7% mentioned better education on the issue and 7.2% called for increased electric car charging ports.

Other suggestions included footpaths wider and improved walkways (6.3%), pedestrianisation of roads (4.7%), banning the burning of fuels and coals (3.8%), planting more trees (3.4%) and the provision of more parking (2.7%).

# **BOWLING ALLEY HIGH ON KILLARNEY'S WISH-LIST**


Abowling alley is topping the must-have list for Killarney, according to over 1,000 locals who responded to a community sentiment survey initiated by Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and conducted by Repucon Consulting.

Asked what Killarney was lacking that might benefit the town, 31%

suggested a bowling alley while there was also strong support (26.5%) for other indoor, all-weather attractions such as arcades, mini-golf and a climbing wall.

12.5% said they would be in favour of more activities for children and teenagers, such as fun zones and gaming centres.

sentiment research found that 8.5% would like to see a new theatre in the town, 5.1% were in favour of additional sports facilities, 4.7% wanted a new community centre and 3.8% identified the need for a youth club.

Additionally, 3.0% called for more public amenities in general, 2.7% mentioned the redevelopment of Áras Pádraig as a priority and 2.3% asked

very emphatic 86.6% of more than A 1,000 people who responded to the Killarney community sentiment survey stated that they do their shopping in the town.

A surprisingly low 6.3% said they prefer to shop online with 3.4% stating that they travel to Tralee to shop.

Shopping in Cork accounted for 2.0% of respondents with Killorglin (0.9%), Castleisland (0.5%) and Limerick (0.3%) the only other locations mentioned.


63.3% said they shop a few times a week, 19.0% replied once a week, 10.3% opted for a few times a month, 2.8% said they shop once a month and 4.6% said they shop less than that.

Asked to rate the Killarney retail experience, 37.1% said it was average, 30.4% found it to be good, 16.3% said it was very good, 12.1% reported that it was disappointing and 4.0% were of the opinion that it was very poor.

Interestingly, 66% said they didn't think their shopping habits would change post-Covid but 23% expected an increase in the number of visits they would make to the shops and 12% expected their shopping trips to decrease.

Asked what type of stores they would like to see more of in Killarney, the community survey respondents listed fashion retail stores (52.1%), homeware stores (11.4%), DIY/hardware stores electrical stores (7.5%), (9.0%), delicatessens/bakeries (6.9%), sports stores (3.4%), grocery stores (3.3%), toy shops (3.3%) and boutiques (3.3%).

In Killarney shortly after the protest a mixture of private and council builds came on stream with McInerney in Woodlawn and the Kelly Brothers returning from England and delivering Park Road Estate and Countess Grove.

The NBA houses and council built developments in Pinewood, Coolgrain Park and Ardshanvooley and in later years private developers delivered Kings Falls and Castle falls and Dromhall Park,



### WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

**Approved Retirement Funds:** You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

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


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### HOW TO GET "UNSTUCK" AND FREE YOUR ALIVENESS!

#### Can I still buy my Fake Tan in "ultra-dark" and is it safe to use?

Most fake tans use DHA (Dihydroxyacetone), this causes a chemical reaction with amino acids in your skin to produce a brown pigment called melanoidin on the outer layers of your skin. From April 1st a new EU directive means a minimum of 10% DHA can be used in tans. DHA is made from sugarcane or beets and is FDA approved and safe to use on your skin but tans like "dripping gold ultra-dark" which use 14% DHA will need to be reformulated and hopefully be even better than before. Fake tan producers are now using alternative ingredients and color boosters to get the dark pigment without the high percentage of DNA.

# FOOD DIARIES

A food diary can be a useful tool, it helps you understand your eating patterns and habits. It can help you to identify foods that are good for you and not so good that you eat on a regular basis. When wanting to lose weight keeping a journal can be an effective tool in behaviour change.

Tracking your foods helps you eliminate all bad eating habit and foods; these can then be replaced with better and more healthy options.

Tracking your food also will relate back to many of your exercise goals and how you fuel and refuel your body for optimum recovery and preparation pre and post exercise.

Food diaries are also a good way to manage meals throughout the day to ensure that you are eating clean and healthy even in busy periods of your life.



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# **DRIVING AND VISION**

It is important that you can see clearly to be able to drive safely. Conditions that may affect your visual field and driving include strokes and brain tumours, as well as eye conditions such as diabetic retinopathy and glaucoma (if you have them in both eyes).

Make sure you have regular sight tests and if your optometrist tells you that you must not drive, you must stop all driving immediately. Driving when you are medically unfit to do so is a criminal offence, and you may be prosecuted if you are involved in an accident.

#### **Driving glasses**

If you have been advised to wear glasses for driving, make sure you wear them, even for short trips – and keep a spare pair in the car. Choose glasses with thinner sides for driving as they won't block your side vision as much as thicker ones. If you wear contact lenses, keep a pair of glasses in the car in case you need to take your lenses out. Even if you don't need to wear glasses all the time, you will probably find they are particularly helpful when the lighting is poor, and for driving at night.

Headlights of oncoming traffic can be dazzling when you are driving at night or in poor weather conditions. Special driving lenses designed with a specially-developed glare filter and a contrast-enhancing filter can help reduce reflections and uncomfortable glare from oncoming traffic.

If glare is an ongoing problem for you, make sure your windscreen and headlights are thoroughly cleaned and free from grime and dirt. If you wear glasses, and don't forget to keep them clean too. If you find that problems with glare at night persist, make an appointment to have a sight test.

Sunshine can be dazzling too, particularly when the sun is low in the sky. If you wear glasses, you may find it helpful to have a pair of prescription sunglasses in the car, or to wear clip-on sunglasses over your prescription glasses. Polarised sunglasses are great for driving in bright conditions. Polarised lenses are lenses with a special built in filter to reduce glare and improve vision in bright conditions

The Government has this week approved Heritage Ireland 2030, a cross-Government Strategic Policy for Heritage that sets out a framework for the protection, conservation, promotion and management of Ireland's heritage for the next decade and beyond. The Strategy lays out a roadmap for the best possible future for Irish heritage with a joined up approach at government, stakeholder and community levels. A

comprehensive implementation plan is now being developed to deliver on its actions.

Kerry County Council is tasked with the care and management of heritage assets in their ownership such as monuments, protected structures, county archives, museum collections, heritage gardens and parks. Heritage Ireland 2030 will aim to strengthen the role of Kerry County Council in the management, care and promotion of Ireland's heritage and establish policies to underpin their work as custodians of many heritage resources.

The principal themes of the strategy are communities, leadership and partnerships, reflecting the importance of ongoing collaboration between government, communities, stakeholders, citizens and local authorities in delivering upon the objectives of this strategy. The proposed framework sets out structures through which all of these groups can come together to advance the protection of Ireland's heritage. Recognising that responsibilities for Ireland's heritage rest right across government, this structured framework will also enable the integration of heritage policy principles into decision-making across the whole of government.

Heritage Ireland 2030 contains over 150 actions, each of which will be built upon and delivered within working groups. An Implementation Plan assigning actions and timeframes to responsible parties will be developed within six months of the launch of Heritage Ireland 2030, elaborating on the formation of delivery structures and providing a clear roadmap for implementing actions.

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
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

#### **KERRY SHINE DESPITE THE WEATHER** National League: Kerry 1-13 Donegal 0-7

Even the legendary Tom Crean would have considered this to be miserable weather. I don't think I was ever at a colder, wetter game, certainly not in the Fitzgerald Stadium. It was a fair test of any team to see if they could play football in that kind of weather - and only one team on the day passed that test.

To be blunt about it, I was enormously disappointed in Donegal. Fair enough, they killed a lot of ball against that fierce strong wind in the first half. I can sympathise with the tactic - it's the right thing to do to try and kill the ball against the wind - but as the game went on, it became more and more obvious that they simply didn't have anything else in their locker. Michael Murphy is unquestionably one of the best players of his generation (I'd just about give him the nod over James McCarthy for the top spot) but without him Donegal looked very, very limited.

Mind you, that's not to take away from Kerry. We were rock solid. Fitness levels are really a matter of subjective speculation, nothing else - no-one within or without the camp will know if we have timed that particular conundrum right until after the championship) but we are certainly moving with purpose and showing a defensive resilience that bodes well. Still, early davs.

A lot of Kerry players showed well, but Seán O'Shea was comfortably man of the match. The experiment of him out in midfield didn't work - no harm trying these things - but there's no better player on the modern forty than last year's top scorer and he proved it here. He opened the scoring from out on the sideline. Killian Spillane rapidly made it 0-2 to 0-0 – with both David Clifford and Tony Brosnan on the sideline, this was a real opportunity for Killian to cement a starting jersey for himself. He played fine and he has developed into a real worker off the ball, but I'm not sure it was enough in the circumstances. His brother, on the other hand, is rapidly becoming indispensable. Adrian eschews the spectacular but by jaysus, what a warrior in the trenches! Paul Murphy and Brian Ó Beaglaíoch were others who were struggling in last year's panel who are really thriving now. Donegal struck back through their two best players. I had thought Eoghan Ban Gallagher would be at the forefront of a rising Donegal generation who had watched McGuinness and Murphy lead them to the Promised Land. Gallagher was one of a number of great minors of his time, but somehow the rest never really came through with him. He picked off a good point - we were opened a little easily by a simple pass - and playmaker Shane O'Donnell made it 0-2 apiece. It looked like the making of a very good game, despite the truly brutal weather conditions. You could literally watch walls of rainfall sweep up and down the field. None of us had any idea how long we would have to wait for Donegal's next score. The game would be well over as a contest by the time it arrived.

It was headed in that direction soon enough anyway. Seán O'Shea slotted another free and then curled over from long distance with his left leg to double our lead. Dan O'Donoghue came up on a nice overlap and had the confidence to notch his first score for Kerry, a really good score at that. O'Donoghue has been a huge find for the county, really assured at the back and comfortable on the ball, and already looks a lock for our first choice starters. He hasn't put a foot wrong since he got the jersey. Paul Geaney - another forward aware of the competition for starting places - calmly made it 0-6 to 0-2. Geaney has the assured decisiveness of a veteran on the ball, he's still one of the great predators. Seán O'Shea launched another long distance monster - right leg this time - and the ever-industrious Paudie Clifford took the lead to six points. Just before the half-time whistle Killian Spillane kicked his second point.

#### Half-time Kerry 0-9 Donegal 0-2

It was a tentative enough opening to the

second half. For the first ten minutes the only thing worth talking about was David Clifford's insertion off the bench to replace Killian Spillane. Given Donegal's inexplicable unwillingness to even go for the jugular in terms of scoring, I'd actually have given Killian more time. David has a lot of football played already this year and we know what he can do, the whole country knows it. Conor O'Donnell split the posts for Donegal, raising an ironic cheer among their sodden supporters. It was their first point in 36 minutes.

And it was nullified instantly. David Clifford has scored some absolutely cracking goals in his time; this wasn't one of them. His speculative punt fell easily into Shaun Patton's reach but bounce awkwardly between the keeper and the post to somehow slip into the net. It was a perfect summation of Donegal's day in many ways. Jack Barry wasn't far away from goal himself. In fact, Kerry had a couple of chances if they were a bit more clinical in execution, and I have no doubt that sharpness will come.

Seán O'Shea, still imperious, and Shane O'Donnell traded scores. Patrick McBrearty - once the most talked about Leaving Cert. student in the country - picked off a score. Conor O'Donnell with his second. 1-10 to 0-6. McBrearty with a free. But Donegal's attacks were more like random drive-bys than sniper assassinations. I was really disappointed in them. Anyone who doubts that they are a better team than this need only go back and look at the titanic struggle between themselves and Tyrone in Ulster last year. They only created one real goal chance, and an overhit pass made a complete hames of that. The same thing happened against Dublin, if you remember. Our goal has been living a little bit of a charmed life, but we are still coughing up the occasional careless chance and that cost us heavily in our last two championship campaigns. Just a small blip on our radar that we need to be aware of. It's easy (and not unfair) to point out Donegal's limitations in attack. Mind you, the new steel in Kerry's defence was a factor as well. Tom

O'Sullivan focussed more on defence than his famously effective attacks, it makes for less headlines but it's even more important for a winning formula. Gavin White is, of course, a major absentee, but Ó Beaglaíoch seized his chance to start with both hands. Paul Murphy was his old self, fully in control of his patch and a director of operations. But the star of the show was undoubtedly Tadhg Morley, who genuinely rivalled Seán O'Shea for the man of the match.

Kerry had the luxury of running their bench by now and the transition was seamless. Seán O'Shea notched another two points, sandwiching a David Clifford score that again had the unfortunate keeper scrambling to protect his goal.

Look, we can and of course should be aware of all the caveats. Ulster teams no longer go all out for the National League, they tend to keep a bit of powder dry. Teams have to be very careful about timing their peak – it's definitely the hardest trick for any management. A Donegal without Michael Murphy is like a gun without bullets.

But the bottom line is that Kerry are top of the table, and deservedly so. We've had worse days out.

Next up is what Patrick Kavanagh, a better goalkeeper himself in gaelic football than he ever let on in his writing, described as the "stony grey soil of Monaghan". Iniskeen hasn't always been the kindest of venues for us – Monaghan are a durable team who traditionally hit hard but fair. But it sounds almost certain that Conor McManus will be unavailable, and he's the one Monaghan player that any team would fear.

We should have enough to come away with a win on the road. Hopefully the weather will be a little bit more hospitable!

But last Saturday....that was plain and simple the worst full back line I have seen. Mayo did look good, they really did, but Dublin gave them massive leeway. Experimental side or not, one or two heads should be rolling. And lads like Fenton, Kilkenny, and Rock need to start leading, not just showing the way.

In ancient China, they famously had a simultaneous blessing and curse – "May you live in interesting times!" Dessie Farrell – and following on from Jim Gavin was always going to be a bejewelled but poisoned chalice – knows exactly what they meant.

Let's face it. I'd say few of us could care less about the actual John Kerins Cup. That's not

There will be some squeeze of club football played the minute Kerry depart the intercounty scene. I suspect that teams will be drained long before any All Ireland campaign or District Championship rolls around. But that's a problem for another day.

#### John Kerins Cup: Kerry 3-16 Cork 0-13

The fact that the Kerry side featured players who necessarily star at minor but instead have shown form with either club or college is a great sign. The likes of Evan Looney, Ruairí Murphy, and Kevin Goulding have been showing very well and it's obvious that the U20 selectors have cast a wide and fine net. You've a fair few of the Tralee CBS lads in the mix as well, deservedly so.

Kevin Goulding handed Ruairí Murphy an early goal on a plate and that seemed to rattle Cork. I suspect that we haven't seen their full hand, but I don't know....I saw a lot of these Cork lads coming through. I know they are absent a few top guns through injury, but this certainly wasn't any dummy team. But whatever was wrong with them, the engines were definitely misfiring. They kept trying a possession game, trying to dance matador-like through Kerry, and got short shrift. Kerry very simply outworked and outfought them cleanly and the likes of Cillian Burke and Thomas O'Donnell went direct at every opportunity. Dylan Geaney was our best player against Cork last year and he was quick to pick up that baton again, cutting early wreck on the scoreboard. A second Kerry goal from Thomas O'Donnell meant that Kerry led by 2-10 to 0-3 at half-time, and that's with Cork's Callum Dungan making some great saves.

Kerry's intensity dropped in the second half, quite understandably. Cork did improve, but couldn't get past the outstanding Devon Burns. He had a couple of saves out of the top drawer -[Cork's Colin Walsh snapped onto the rebounds to pop them over, a potential lesson there for defenders – and the Na Gaeil custodian also kicked two long range points. Ruairí Murphy's second goal put the issue beyond any doubt. Declan O'Sullivan will be well pleased with his team's start to their campaign.

The truth is that Galway simply took a firm and immediate grip on midfield - the Kelly brothers were outstanding. Galway very much played counter-attacking football. While conservative, I wouldn't call it a blanket defence. There was plenty of one on one space inside for MTU's deadly attack, Savage, Brosnan, Ó Sé, Moynihan et al, but pressure from outside meant that it was poor ball going in and Galway were able to contain the danger and pick off their own scores. They had to win it twice, though. MTU Kerry somehow managed to reel in a five point gap to take the game into extra-time, but finally ran out of steam late on. A late flurry of cards saw three players dismissed - it wasn't that sort of game.

I was absolutely stunned to find out that UL have never actually won a Sigerson. Thomond did – Thomond actually won a Club All Ireland in the seventies with one of the greatest college teams of all time, but that was before it amalgamated to form UL (I think it was NIHE Limerick prior to that, but I'm only reaching into recesses of memory now). I do have a vague memory of Morgan O'Shea of Rahillys being full back for UL in a Sigerson Final, only to lose out to a star-studded IT Tralee, who included his brother Barry at full back.

UL's wait goes on. The truth is that neither Donal Down O'Sullivan or David Clifford really got going – again Galway were able to choke off the supply lines. Paul Walsh did impress off the bench.

Overall, though, Galway were worthy winners of a very entertaining campaign. It's a real shame that Mayo's Tommy Conroy, one of the stars of the show, will unfortunately miss out on the rest of the year with a cruciate injury.

Congratulations to the Higher Education GAA on streaming so many games, including a double broadcast when the semi-final went into extra-time.

#### HOGAN CUP SEMI-FINAL PREVIEW

With only three days notice of venue, The Hogan Cup semi-final Sem v Magherafel is taking place at Connaght GAA Centre of Excellence at 5.30pm tomorrow, Saturday 16th February. St. Jarlaths v Naas is also on Saturday and both games will be streamed live on TG4 Player. It is understandable that there was delays as most clubs are reluctant to give their pitches in this kind of weather – your pitch could be cut up for the entire summer. Literally. People don't seem to realise how expensive it is to maintain a good pitch – you are honestly talking about tens of thousands.

#### ST. MARYS MAGHERAFELT

They are good. Make no mistake; they are very good. Ulster's McRory Cup is, unsurprisingly, the most organised and competitive when it comes to the colleges. Munster has a lot of teams, but few enough outside Kerry really compete at the top level (I was glad to see both Bandon and Skibbereen put it up to the Kerry sides this year; we need that). Connaught again has a paucity of quality – although the re-emergence of a previously dormant St. Jarlaths...the great Seán Purcell was groundskeeper in the school at one stage and he rivals Mick O'Connell as the greatest of them all, but by jaysus you could make some football team out of past pupils of Jarlaths. I don't know

But the Sem are facing St. Marys of Magherafelt. They haven't got that ancient tradition behind them, but they don't need it. They lost to St. Pats Maghera on their first McRory Cup appearance in 1996 (St. Marys current manager along with John McElholm, Kevin Brady, played for St. Pats that day!) and they have played in four more since. They won the 2017 title but lost the 2018 final to St. Ronans, who went on to defeat PS Chorca Dhuibhne in the Hogan Cup Final.

St. Marys have a number of the Derry minor team that beat Kerry in the 2020 All Ireland minor final (played in 2021) including Ben Diamond, Dan Higgins, Luke McCann, Ryan McEldowney, Eoin McEvoy and Niall O'Donnell. St. Marys also feature a number of Antrim minors.

They lost the 2019 Rannafast Cup Final (Ulster's version of the Frewen) by a point to St. Pats Maghera, but reversed that result in fine style when they met in this year's quarter-final.

They beat a fancied Omagh CBS in a testing semi-final by 2-11 to 0-7. It wasn't as easy as that scoreline suggests, but watching a dangerous Omagh attack simply get swallowed up by a relentless Magherafelt defence....frankly, you

either go direct against this team, or don't bother to go at all. Brian Devlin at centre back is a genuine fulcrum.

At the other end Aaron Devlin and Ryan McEldowney are the ones to watch, but it was Niall O'Donnell and Cahir Quinn who got the crucial goals as they beat Peter Canavan's Holy Trinity by 2-9 to 0-8.

Like I say, they are good. They are a very fit side, well organised, and quick in transition. They do defend in numbers, but they also break very fast – overlaps on the wing is a big thing with them. #### **ST. BRENDANS**

They had been threatening the kind of performance that they finally produced in the Corn Uí Mhuirí Final. Everything came together. Will Shine was electrifying; there's no other way to put it, while the likes of Harry Byrne, Dara O'Callaghan, and Killian O'Sullivan really produced the goods. More than anything, though, it was the pressure that they exerted en masse on Tralee CBS that really won the game.

The question is whether the Sem can repeat it. I suspect that now that they have unlocked the rhythm that they have been seeking, they will seamlessly reproduce it. It was getting that

blend of workrate and movement right that was so hard. They can thank Coláiste na Sceilge in particular and Bandon as well for honing their steel. I suspect it was those lessons that stood to them against a Tralee side who won all their games fairly comfortably.

I do expect Cian McMahon and Will Shine (they contribute 90% or more of the Sem's total scoring in general) to be legitimately targeted.

I lay a heavy stress on legitimate, by the way – the Ulster schools play very clean football and take pride in it. They are actually a joy to watch; it's very good football. Magherafelt carry a bit more than they kick, but they certainly take a positive approach and it's good to watch. Good enough to win? Hmmm....

One way or the other, I look forward to finding out.



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


Welcome back dear student, "there is no fear in love; but perfect love casts out fear: because fear hath torment. He that fears is not made perfect in love." (1st John 4:18). Fear involves torment. There are two things in the Bible that give place to torment - unforgiveness and fear, and both are linked to a lack of love. In John's first letter he clearly explains the answer to all fear - love. Specifically, the Love of God, not emotional love which often is not love at all, but merely a form of lust in disguise. The love spoken of here is 'Agape' which means unconditional love. God is Love - not that He has love like you have a laptop, or that He feels love like you love a bar of chocolate: but God's character and nature is Love. Love is Who He is! People seek love, but true love only comes from knowing God, because He is Love. "We love Him because He first loved us" (1st John 4:19; John 15:1-17). Human beings may leave you down, but God's love never fails (1st Corinthians chapter 13). People may love you today and tomorrow they love someone else, but God's love will never leave you (Hebrews 13:5-8). You may do something bad that makes someone stop loving you, but God constantly longs for you to be restored to Him - He loves you because He created you, and His greatest desire is for you to be forgiven and reconciled, safe in His love (Luke 15:18-24).

The world is not a safe place to navigate in our own strength. But God is our Refuge, our Strong Tower where total safety and peace exists (Psalm 61). In order to enter into that safety and peace we need to get to know God and His ways. We can get to know Him through His Word. His Word is not a book to read like you read a novel. God's Word is alive! (Hebrews 4:9-16) Jesus, the Son of God - is the Word of God (John 1:1-14). When we study and obey the Bible we enter into a relationship with Jesus, not simply skimming through some book filled with stories. Jesus gave up His Divinity and supernaturally was born as one of us. He grew up and experienced everything that we encounter, the good and the bad – but, He never sinned. And then He laid down His life willingly to fulfil God's plan of Salvation so every man, woman and child could be saved and restored to God, washed clean of all sin in His perfect blood.

This sacrifice had to be made in order to cleanse us from sin, because sin and God's Love cannot dwell together. So Jesus paid the price for our sins, and became the Lamb of God who took sin away, thus allowing us to be accepted into God's family by our faith and trust in Him (John 3:15-21). We trust in Jesus by inviting Him into our lives - making Him Lord over everything. As we renounce and turn away from sin, we need to instead tune into God's Word and His Love to fill the void. God's Love is the most powerful, holy and pure force, and when we invite Jesus in and obey His Word, His love in us drives out all fear and torment - forever.






